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# Bord Pleanala Decision Due On Cappoquin Wind Mast

Locals in Cappoquin and Melleray are currently awaiting the ruling of An Bord Pleanala regarding a proposed wind test mast on the Knockmealdown mountains. A final decision on the project is expected to be made within the next few days. The matter was appealed to An Bord Pleanala by the Knockmealdown Protection Committee after the

promoter, Charles Keane of Cappoquin Estates, was given the go ahead by the Council for a 40 metre test mast on the mountain to monitor the wind over a year.

Just a fortnight ago however on August 16th, An Bord Pleanala overturned the decision of Waterford County Council to grant permission for a similar wind test mast four miles away at Coolacrena. On extensive examination of the project, the national planning authority found that the proposed development would "seriously injure the visual amenity of the area" and would be contrary to the proper planning and development of the area.

The local men behind the project, Ned Morrissey and Seamus O'Donnell applied for a 40 metre test mast to monitor the wind on a site over Affane, again over a 12 month period. They had hoped to erect a small scale wind farm which would produce less than 5 megawatts of electricity and would be connected into the nearest power line on Mr. Morrissey's land.

Members of the Coole Action Group who referred the Coolnacreena test mast to An Bord Pleanala are reported to be delighted with the decision.

The wait continues however on a final conclusion to the proposed wind test mast in the area of the Vee.

The proposed site in the Knockmealdowns is on the southwest slope of Knocknafalia in the gap near Knocknagauv.

Chairman of the Knockmealdown Protection Committee, Willie O'Donoghue, previously told the

"Leader" that the committee is opposed to the erection of wind turbines in the area of the Vee.

"Aside from the blight of the turbines themselves, the hills will be scarred forever by access roads. It may mean fighting for many months. But we must preserve our natural heritage",

# College Project Must Start Before 2001 — Clir. Kyne





A member of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee has urged that construction work on the long awaited new technical college for Dungarvan must start before the end of this year.

Labour councillor Billy Kyne said the ball is now firmly in the Department of Education's court and the public deadline, as far as he is concerned, is that construction must start before 31st December 2000.

Dungarvan Urban Council granted planning permission for a new £1m plus college last March. The new state-of-the-art college will replace the existing building at Wolfe Tone Road and will be located on a green field site on the former Presentation land.

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# **Know Your Rights**

Question

I live with my elderly mother who is suffering from Parkinson's Disease and is becoming very immobile. I work full time and pay someone to come in once a day to help her wash and dress. She will soon need more care. I do not want to leave my job permanently but is it possible to take paid leave from work to look after my mother?

Answer

It will soon be possible to take up to 15 months unpaid leave from work to care for someone on a full time basis and legislation is being introduced to ensure that the carer's employment rights are protected during this period. From October 2000 there will be a new Carer's Benefit of £88.50 per week based on social insurance contributions which will be payable to people who leave employment to look after someone in need of full time care. All classes of PRSI will be eligible except Class S (self employed) and Class J (earnings less than £30 a week). It will be available to employees who have at least three years PRSI contributions and who are employed for at least 19 hours a week before starting full-time caring duties.

It will be payable for up to 15 months. An increase in payment will be made in cases where a carer is caring for more than one person. In addition, an annual Respite Care Grant (currently £300) may be payable. The general conditions for eligibility will be the same as for the Carer's Allowance, e.g. medical conditions, but it will not be means-tested.


# ABBEYSIDE COMMUNITY GAMES

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# THE HUMAN BODY

Even in a clean and spotless place, there are probably a few germs. These microscopic living things, such as bacteria and viruses, get on to our skin, and into the food we eat, the drinks we consume. and the air we breathe. They may also get into the body through a cut or wound.

> If enough germs get into the body, they can start to multiply and cause problems. This is an infection. But the body has several sets of defences against germs. They include the skin, the moist germ-trapping linings of the breathing and digestive passageways, the way blood clots to seal wounds and leaks, white cells and other substances in the blood, the rhymus gland in the chest, and small lymph nodes or glands spread all over the body. Together, all of these parts form the body's immune system.

# THE BODY'S **GERM-KILLERS**

The body's immune system includes several kinds of white cells in blood, body fluids and lymph nodes. Some are phagocytes, always on the lookout for germs such as viruses and bacteria. If a phagocyte finds a germ, it flows around it and 'eats' it alive. Other white cells, called lymphocytes, make body substances called antibodies. These stick on to the germs and make them helpless or burst open.

The white cells recognise germs and other invading substances because the invaders have foreign or 'non-self' substances, antigens, on their sur-

Antibodies work by attaching to intigens, like keys fitting into locks, to destroy the germ.

Also certain white cells 'remember' the identity of the germs. If the same type of germ tries to invade the body, the immune system recognises it at once and kills it, before it can multiply. This natural protection against an infection second time around is called immunity.



#### EDWARD JENNER


Edward Jenner (1749-1873), an English country physician, noted that people who had compox, a mild disease caught from cattle, seemed resistant to the far more serious small-

In 1796 he gave a local boy cowpox Six weeks later, he deliberately infected the boy's body with smallpox. The boy survived and Jenner's work laid the basis for immunisation.

The lymphatic system is a network of tubes called lymph vessels, filled with a milky fluid, lymph. At various places around the body — especially the neck, armpits, lower body and groin — these form lumpy-looking lymph nodes.

Lymph fluid comes from general body liquids around and between cells, and blood leaked from blood vessels. These collect in lymph vessels and ooze along very slowly.

Like blood, lymph fluid delivers nutrients to body tissues. and collect their wastes. It also contains white cells which defend the body against germs. The lymph vessels come together as large lymph ducts that carry lymph fluid back into the blood system near the heart.

# **Call Made To Reform** Higher Education **Authority Grant**

A Dungarvan Labour Councillor has said the 5% rise in the Higher Education Authority Maintenance grant for third level students is insufficient, as it neither takes account of inflation or rising costs in rental accommodation.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair says the grant payable to Co. Waterford students through either the County Council or the Corporation - in many cases is not enough to keep someone in college. Cllr. O Ceilleachair says dependency on part-time employment is a reality for many students from Co. Waterford whilst at universities around the country. Cllr. O Ceilleachair is also concerned at reports from student organisations citing the level of the grant as preventing people from taking up university places and pressurising others into dropping out.

The level of the HEA Maintenance grant is an issue regularly raised with me by students and their parents. They aren't happy with the maximum of £1,717 for the academic year. That amounts to only £50 a week or so. A source of particular frustration has been the unwillingness to alter the means test criteria to take account of net household income as opposed to the gross totals as applied at present. Everyone knows that a worker is not getting enough of the wages in excess of the £20,000 earnings cut off point in the means test for the full grant. For those PAYE workers paying

higher rates of tax and PRSI on their wages every week, it is a big drain to be means tested out of qualification and then fund an offspring's third level education. Meanwhile there have been cases where offspring of some non PAYE workers - who may have greater resources - actually qualifying for the

Twice in the last week I brought the children to the playground on the outskirts of Youghal and low and behold there were no cries of "Mam, can we go home now", or "can we go somewhere else now", in fact I had trouble getting them to come home at all.

My grievance to the above is that I feel I shouldn't have had to drive 16 miles to Youghal (I live in Cappoquin). I should have been able to walk out my own door and somewhere in the vicinity of my own town been able to bring my children to a playground. Could someone tell me if the powers that be have any children or grandchildren of their own? Do they know that during the summer months children need someplace to go? for goodness sake we are only asking for a playground not Disneyland! There seems to be a policy in Waterford to deprive our children of simple pleasures. I had to go outside the county to a playground, no town in the surrounding area has a playground. Does this mean that our children are not important enough?

Red tape and bureaucracy seem to be denying our children the simple things in life. Insurance seems to be the big excuse every time something of this sort is put before town development groups. I am well aware that we are living in a world where litigation plays an enormous part in our everyday lives but I seriously think things are getting out of hand when we leave it dictate what we can or can-

I appreciate that town development groups are doing a lot of good work and that it may be expensive to install playgrounds and fund insurance to cover it, but I think it's time to weigh up the enjoyment the children will receive against the cost. After all there is no price in the world you can pay for a child's smile.

#### PATTERN MASS

The Mass to celebrate the feast of St. Augustine, the patron Saint of Abbeyside was celebrated on Sunday last. Our parish priest Fr. Doherty during his sermon on the life of St. Augustine pointed out the stained-glass window depicting the saint. It is on the right hand side of the church as the priest looks down from school on Wednesday 6th at the altar. Immediately opposite is the stained-glass window depicting St. Monica who was the mother of St. Augustine.

# WHERE THREE PARISHES MEET

A very interesting religious ceremony took place at the Ballyvoile end of the parish on Monday evening the 22nd August when Mass was celebrated at a Mass rock used to divide three parishes. The location for the unique religious ceremony was well sign-posted from Ballyvoile Bridge and having turned left from the Main road we travelled two miles and then turned left into a field. Cars were able to drive along the perimeter of two fields before we reached the field used as a car park. From there people walked to the rock which was situated under a tree covered alcove. There, men and women, young and old formed the congregation for a millennium Mass.

#### FR. ENRIGHT'S INTRODUCTION TO THE ROCK **CLOCH AN EIDHINN**

This massive structure behind us divides the three parishes of Stradbally, Abbeyside and Kilrossanty. Across river is Abbeyside, behind the rock here is Kilrossanty and where we are all congregated is Stradbally. This massive and impressive structure which leans over the river Dalligan was originally from the Comeragh Mountains and carried down here and left here by a glacier which is a river of ice during the Ice Age. The glacier cut out the whole valley that we see now so you can imagine the power of this river of ice. All we see now is it's descendant, which is a small flow of water which flows from its source above what is now Kil-

A number of hundred years ago it was decided this was the landmark to divide the three parishes.

In 1890 a historian by the name of Canon Power who wrote a book "Placenames of the Decies" which is available in Dungarvan Library, travelled these parts and visited this site as part of his research. He was informed by the local people here that this landmark was "Cloch an Eidhinn" which translates in english as 'The Rock of the Ivy" which is a suitable name for it as you can see. People over the years heard the name verbally as "Clock an Abhainn" " The River Rock" which would also be a suitable name but the correct name is 'Cloch an Eidhinn''.

The river here was a lot deeper before the building of the dam thirty years ago, one hundred yards up stream. It was therefore a great place for trout and many the story could be told of fishing and swimming expeditions to this site. People fishing for trout could actually swim under the rock and into an air pocket under the rock and wait there for a few minutes and then nab a trout. Today you may see small trout but unfortunately we will not be performing the miracle of the "Loaves and the Fishes" unless of course someone is prepared to jump in and catch two hefty trout.

The choir were accompanied by musicians with guitars and the opening hymn was appropriately 'The Rivers of Babylon'. Fr. Enright informed us that the Feastday was that of Pope Pius X, the first reading which was from the Acts of the Apostles was read by Lisa Fennell. She also recited the Responsorial psalm which was the familiar 'The Lord is my Shepherd, there is nothing I shall want.' The gospel was taken from that of St.

The reading outlined how John was arrested but continued to announce that the kingdom of God was close to hand. At this period the fishermen left their boats, and nets and followed Jesus. The Prayers of the Faithful were read by Fr. Fives, Fr. Doherty and Canon O'Mahoney. For the offertory hymn the choir sang 'The gifts we offer' four priests distributed Holy Communion while the choir sang - 'Soul of My Saviour', 'We are Yours' and 'Let there be Peace"

At the invitation of Fr. Enright, Fr. Doherty P.P. Abbeyside, Ballinroad and Garranbane was asked to speak. He referred to the magnificent proportions of the rock and believed it was something special to have the three parishes coming together on common ground. He asked us to be carriers of peace

Fr. Enright thanked the Civil Defence, the stewards, Tom Drohan for the excellent public address system, Virgil Power for the generator which enabled the ladies to make tea for all present, the Choir and the altar boys.

Tom Carroll was thanked for the use of his land and the historical information he shared with the organisers. In a humorous aside Fr. Enright presented Tom Carroll with a large bottle and reminisced how he had often served Tom a large bottle when he helped out in Crotty's pub in Abbeyside. The congregation joined the choir for the final hymn 'Faith of Our Fathers'

A SOCIAL GATHERING TOO

Many people examined the rock and noted the special plaque put in position in memory of the occasion. The wording is as follows:

'Mass celebrated at this rock, where the parishes of Abbeyside, Kilrossanty and Stradbally meet - 21st August, 2000.' The millennium logo is also inscribed in the

It was on Friday 18th of August that the locality learned of the unexpected passing of Willie Power, Ballinroad at his residence in Ballinroad. 

# **Product Price Levels Crucial To** Farm Incomes - IFA

"The Government Plan of Action for Agriculture and Rural Development must fully recognise the fundamental fact that the product price level is the single most important determinant of farm income. The Government carries a major responsibility in the future negotiations on the WTO and on Eastern Enlargement to ensure that major price cuts are resisted.'

This was stated by IFA

President Tom Parlon in response to the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development of the Action Plan for the agri-food sector. The Action Plan is a follow-on to the Agri-Food 2010 Committee report.

Mr. Parlon said: "Political pressure in the past by Governments with a commitment to agriculture and the rural economy, including France and Ireland, resulted in substantial improvements in the course of the CAP Reform II negotiations and the GATT negotiations. The Irish Government should now set down some markers for the future. Firstly, price supports must be maintained at levels sufficient to provide farmers with viable incomes and the "world market" price scenario should be rejected. Secondly, if any price cuts are eventually conceded, it must only be on condition of full and lasting EU compensation."

The IFA leader continued: "The vast bulk of the points in the action plan make sense. The support services to agriculture - research, education and advice, needed to be more responsive to the demands of the 21st century on the industry, particularly quality and environmental requirements, while also recognising the growing problem of the shortage of labour in agriculture. I welcome the support for rationalisation in the processing sector, and also look forward to the introduction of the new on-farm grant schemes and structural measures in the National Development Plan in the early Autumn."

Tom Parlon added that in the recent PPF negotiations, the most urgent problems facing the sector were addressed, and the Programme contains a number of important commitments by the Government. "IFA will be working to ensure that commitments and deadlines are honoured by the Government, including those on animal disease eradication."

#### The Science of Farming and Food PASTURE CARE

#### Weed control in Grassland:

- You can still spray for Docks up to mid-September if you get warm, dry sultry weather.
- Spot spraying is a good idea if the concentration of docks isn't too great and the stronger sprays can be used in this situation because the clover won't get any spray.
- It is important that you should do all in your power to promote clover and that means only using Azulox or Prospect for "whole crop" spraying of pastures to kill docks
- Spot spraying is working very successfully on many farms and is a chore where all family members can contribute and with a bit of organisation 5-6 acres a day can be
- Fields with other grass weeds should be sprayed with
- Do between paddocks and along the side of readway:

- In some of the light sandy soils reseeding could be done up to 10th September, but any later is a waste of money.
- Because clover won't establish
- Because weed grasses flourish and dominate the pasture within 2 years and because they are the same colour as rye grass you won't notice them until it is too late.
- New Reseeds (sown in August) should now be examined carefully for seedling docks.
- When clover has one true leaf spray with Legumex Extra. Nintex. Acumen.
- It will cost £15+ per acre but it is definitely worth every
- · Fritfly can do serious damage to stitched-in reseeds or minimum cultivation reseed:
- Spray with Dursban, Foliothion or Derris just after emer-Reseeds should be grazed early with weanlings to thicken
- the sward. Results in more tillering.
- High cover prevents tillering.
- They also kill soft weeds.
- If grazed before 26th September they should get 20-25 units of Nitrogen after grazing.

- Watch out for hoose and stomach worms in weanlings because they are now back grazing paddocks already grazed by calves this year.
- Because, they are now grazing tighter.
- Because the effectiveness of boluses and convenience doses is now wearing off.
- Don't let any calves graze the fields near the calf house for the remainder of the year. This will facilitate early let-out next Spring (March). The risk of parasite carry over will be greatly reduced.
- Inject weanling replacement heifers for leptospirosis at 6-9 months of age
- Must be done if cows are being injected. Otherwise forget about it if cows are not on a programme.
- Order your Dry Cow Mastitis tubes now.
- Until Irish research proves otherwise, dry cow treatment represents the best way of reducing mastitis spread and
- By shopping around now you should be able to get reasonable value.
- Order your end of year dose for Stomach Worms (Type 11), lice treatment and Fluke dose if necessary.
- Castrate weanlings now if not going for Bull Beef.
- Grange work has shown that weanlings castrated in September compared with next March will weigh 4 Kgs lighter at turnout (mid April) but will weigh 3 Kgs heavier at the end of October. Early castration reduces stress.
- A local anaesthetic must be administered when castrating calves older than 6 months.
- Lame cows will carry this problem into the house unless treated now. - The Farm Relief Service offer a very good preventative
- service for lameness. Have a chat with your Vet about an Animal Health Care
- programme for your farm this Autumn and Winter. He may have some interesting ideas at a small cost.
- Cows in a condition score of 2.7 or less should get special attention to improve body condition.
- Feed them 4-6 lbs of meal from now.
- If quota doesn't allow meal, dry them off immediately and after 2 weeks dry give them good grass.

# IFA Calls For **Publication Of EU Sheep Policy Report**

Mr. Parlon said that he was extremely disappointed with the negotiations to date, particularly with the Department's attempt to link the introduction of the new system to new conditions, which are not related to how farmers are compensated for their reactors.

"The only clear deadline laid down in the animal health section of the PPF is September 1st for the introduction of live valuation. The Department must focus on putting this in place. Any other issues should be subject to separate negotiations" he said.

Mr. Parlon went on to say that IFA could not accept a situation where animals tested after September 1st would not be eligible for live valuation. He said that if the Department failed to have valuers in place by September 1st, IFA would be advising farmers to have their reactors valued by suitably qualified people, such as livestock auctioneers or mart personnel in advance of them leaving the farm.

"If a farmer is unhappy with what is on offer within the current compensation scheme they should have their animals valued professionally. Farmers should keep a copy of the valuation certificate so that they can be paid retrospectively if the Department fail to establish the scheme by the deadline" he concluded.

# SOUTH EAST NO BARRIERS TO LIVE TRADE

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of the ICMSA, said the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Rural Development, Mr. Joe Walsh, T.D., must ensure that any proposed new regulations do not hinder live cattle exports.

Mr. O'Rourke said: "The live cattle trade is a multimillion pound industry and is crucial to cattle prices and farm incomes. Given the nature of the live trade, the proposed new regulations are a logistical nightmare and the Minister must look again at the implementation procedures".

Mr. O'Rourke stated due to the importance of the live trade, there must be no disruption to the orderly marketing of cattle. Mr. O'Rourke assured farmers that ICMSA are demanding a rapid and practical solution from the Department of Agriculture, Food & Rural De-

# ICMSA CALL ON **GOVERNMENT** TO CONSIDER LONGER **DEPOPULATION PERIODS**

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Deputy President, ICMSA today said the Department of Agriculture, Food & Rural Development, should consider longer periods of depopulation following a serious outbreak of brucellosis.

Mr. Cahill stated the current regulations allow for a four month depopulation period. "ICMSA believe that a longer period between depopulation and restocking should be considered in the interest of avoiding repeat outbreaks, which are becoming more prevalent of late. However, this would only be acceptable if the farmer is fully compensated for income lost during the entire pe-

Mr. Cahill added: "The veterinary view and experience at farm level suggest that the brucellosis bacterium can remain active under certain conditions for periods longer than previously assumed. ICMSA feel there is a greater benefit to remaining depopulated for longer periods as opposed to suffering a repeat outbreak"

Mr. Cahill concluded by stressing that this proposal was strictly on the basis that farmers affected would be fully compensated for all income lost during depopula-

#### Lift Main Crop Parrots

Lift the main crop carrots sown in April. If they are left in the ground any longer the roots might begin to crack. Dig them up carefully with a fork, cut off the tops and store the roots in a heap in the shed or cellar, or other frost-proof place. They will keep better and be less likely to shrivel if they are covered with sand or sifted ashes

#### Lift Main Crop Beetroot

The main crop of long beetroot sown in May should be lifted and stored at about this time. Twist off the tops without injuring the skin of the beetroot in any way and store them in a cool shed.

#### **Prune Loganberries**

By now loganberries will have finished fruiting and they should be pruned as soon as possible. Simply cut out to the base of the plant all canes that have just borne fruit and train the young canes to the wires in their place.

# **Problem pests**

- Powdery mildew looks like a kind of whitewash coating on the stems and leaves. It is not uncommon. The best thing to do is cut out and burn badly affected shoots and spray with benomyl or thiophanate-methyl to give adequate control.
- Downy mildew symptoms are yellowish patches on older leaves, grey or white spores on the undersides of the patches, later turning brown. There is no cure. To grow mildew resistant plants in the future, spray with mancozeb when they are at seedling stage.
- Slugs and snails tend to cause a problem in the winter. The safest chemical method of getting rid of them is slug pellets or liquid, made from metaldehyde and methiocarb. The non-chemical alternative is to clean the plant thoroughly, clearing away thick foliage and debris. Pick off the slugs and snails by hand when they emerge at night and drop them in a bucket of water.

that a small elite group of hurlers were to receive financial rewards for promoting a particular organisation, came as a shock to an awful lot of GAA supporters throughout our club area and the country. People who have all their lives loved and supported the GAA and its games are very disappointed at the very selfish attitude adopted by those players and the organisation known as the Gaelic Players Association. This organisation, which is not recognised by the GAA, can have a very detrimental affect on the whole organisation if the governing body do not take steps to 'nip this in the bud'. The GAA which has done such tremendous work for the youth of this country down the years has always prided itself on the amateur status of its players. The money made by the Association was always ploughed back into improving the facilities available to players and spectators - not into the pockets of players and officials as in other codes, where no proper facilities are available.

All of us who follow the GAA have the greatest pride in our Club and County players, part of this pride came from the fact that they were doing all the training and suffering, all the punishment for the glory of their clubs and county, and the respect and admiration that they got from their neighbours was all the reward they ever sought.

Of course nobody would dispute that players should be well renumerated for their out-of-pocket expenses and this is why the President has set up a group to deal with the question of sponsorship etc. Under this scheme all players would benefit, not just an elite few.

But there is a bigger question at stake here - will those who, over the past 116 years have given their time and efforts to coaching and developing young players, in running clubs and looking after playing pitches etc, still give this service free of charge? I have no doubt but that they will. It would be hard to imagine the people that I saw in the Sportsfield in Cappoquin on Saturday evening last from both within and outside the County looking after their Juvenile teams in a tournament, not continuing to do so. But a lot will depend on how the matter is handled by the people at the top. The whole question of tickets for matches etc. will also have to be examined, as this is one of the points raised by the GPA. There is a perception, whether right or wrong, that a disproportionate number of tickets are being allocated to sponsors.

#### TO CONSERVE USE OF ENERGY

Use a timer on your immersion heater, which will switch off after a preset time. It is not cheaper to leave your immersion switched on all the time!

On average a shower costs half as much as a bath. When using your kettle - only boil the amount of water you

If possible have a full load when using your washing machine or tumble dryer. When drying clothes try to use the clothes line, where possible.

Consider using a sensor light outside, rather than leaving lights switched on all the time.

Use timers for your lights when you are out. It is safer and cheaper than leaving a light on continuously.

Consider replacing 100w bulbs with 60w to save energy. A 100w bulb uses two thirds more energy than a 60w one. All the above will help you tighten your belt financially. However, if you are having difficulty with your debts, the likelihood is that they did not accumulate overnight and therefore will not go away overnight. Don't lose heart. Many of you will be familiar with 'The Butcher Boy' - the story of Francie Brady, an antisocial young man whose anguish goes unheeded as he sinks into a pit of rejection and finally madness. It is full of humour but essentially it presents a bleak vision of a child who is left alone and without support in the indifferent and sometimes hostile world of a small town. The tragedy is that much of the causes of the horror that occurs is rooted in the absence of love in Francie's life.

#### Love

The opposite of love is not hate, it is indifference and the opposite of life is not death but indifference. Love is an activity in giving. The only love is unconditional and unconditional love is very clear to a child. It must come from both parents saying I love you no matter what but I don't like what you do sometimes. Healthy unconditional love should always be practised but unacceptable undesirable behaviour should never be tolerated. When a child is disciplined for misbehaviour the issue is dealt with and it is over. Children are astute and interpret love in whatever fashion is most favourable to them and when parents are splintered and exercise different standards children become confused and insecure. Also one parent often sides with the child more than the other parent as a slight or punishment on the other parent. No child should be faced by ambiguity or contradictory signals as confusion around this issue leads to a disturbed and neurotic child.

Leo Buscaglia was once asked to judge a contest to find the most caring child. The winner was a young boy. The boys next door neighbour was an elderly man whose wife had recently died. The boy saw the old man sit on his front porch alone and cry so he went up to him on his porchclimbed on his lap and just sat there. Later his mother asked him what he said to the old neighbour-the young boy

replied-I said nothing-I just helped him cry.

Love is built on empathy and consideration for others. Parents should foster a loving environment by encouraging the disciplined child to love others by sharing and caring. A common mistake is calling a defiant child 'bad'. If this label is reinforced the child will believe that he is indeed bad and as he grows will not disappoint the parents. Other parents in the name of love erroneously rationalise the misbehaviour exclaiming Johnny is acting out because he doesn't see his dad often enough or his teacher doesn't understand that he's a sensitive child. Insecure parents will always blame others or deny there's a problem. Parents must make children take responsibility for their actions and this responsibility develops through the exercise of constructive and consistent discipline.

#### Discipline

Discipline comes from the Latin word Edisciplina, to teach and is the basic set of tools parents require to solve problems.

Discipline means having the focus to keep things in balance and to see the long term picture. A Chinese proverb teaches "if you are patient in one moment of anger you will escape a hundred days of sorrow". Good and bad behaviour are choices and they are reinforced by the accumulation of choices that may develop into habits. To change habits you must be aware of them and then change the choices that form the habits.

Rebellion is a part of growing up and most children rebel at times. They are also generally a little egocentric which is a mechanism for self-protection. However children grounded in values modify their bad behaviour and will show consideration for others. These are traits not found in deviant children.

#### Problem or Deviant Children

Deviant children are self centred and their needs and wants take priority over others. Problem children lie frequently and for no reason. These children will always blame their siblings for their misbehaviour and then laugh when their brothers and sisters get punished. This causes further problems as it fills the good children with resentment. Stealing is part of the problem child's makeup. They start young and never feel guilty when caught. In fact they develop a false esteem on getting caught and brag to their friends about their stealing.



Bullying
Deviant children cannot tol-

they have a low tolerance of authority. These behaviours are the hallmark of the school yard bully. Bullies exercise power and control over everyone they perceive as weak. They push, shove and hurt other children and when playing games erupt in temper and violence if they are losing. These bullies are clever and very selective about whom they push around and rarely challenge those more powerful than themselves. Also they have no scruples about bullying their mothers, in fact they will not hesitate to strike their mother when she does not comply with their demands.

These problem children often hurt animals and cause damage to property, getting a "high" from such behaviour. It is interesting to note that research carried out into harassment at work has shown that many adults engaged in such behaviour were bullies in school.

Deviant or problem children have low frustration tolerance and want everything "NOW". If their wants are not met instantly they become very demanding and act out in many ways. Young children with low frustration tolerance

cleverly perceive that public places such as shopping malls and stores are good places for demanding behaviour in order to manipulate parents into giving them what they want, knowing that when parents are embarrassed or frus-

trated they will give in.

Problem children are hedonistic and so they regularly look for a buzz usually at someone else's expense. They are indifferent to the pain of others even if they caused it. Sound familiar? - "Ha ha I got you in trouble!". When they hurt another they will usually deny it or blame someone else with laughter and ridicule. If caught they will refuse responsibility or discipline, often blaming the victim. These individuals are experts at making excuses for not doing what they are supposed to do or promised to do. Problem children sabotage structure. They disregard rules and if this lack of responsibility and discipline is allowed to continue these will be key indicators of their life. In adulthood these individuals rarely keep a regular job or meet commitments.

Children develop in many ways as part of their drive toward individuality and some may exhibit some of the traits I've covered but with love and awareness behaviours can change. However the misbehaviours are serious and need to be addressed. When children exhibit multiple traits in multiple situations therein lies the predictive of deviant or possibly criminal behaviour. Parents must be able to clearly identify deviant behaviour early in a child's life and there must be an emphasis on how to change it.

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




We managed to salvage second place in the game and left, still friends with Clonmel, but, wondering why they didn't put the cows out on the field a couple of days earlier!



## New Football **Proposals**

The proposed new football format for next season was launched last week and generally they have been given a mixed reception. Some of the football people here in Waterford to whom I have spoken feel that they are not fashioned to suit Waterford. While they agree that what is in place at the moment is bad enough, the new deal is less attractive.

The general feeling is that at the end of it all, the top eight counties will still survive and while this is as it should be in any championship, it does not progress the cause of the weaker counties.

I feel, as I have felt for very many years, that the senior football championships should be run in two distinct divisions: two championships of 16 teams with a promotion and relegation clause attached.

A decision will be taken at the special congress in Dublin on October 7th.

The Waterford county board will debate the matter at their meeting on Monday week, before instructing their delegates on how to vote.

The matter of the increased cost to counties may be a factor in deciding the issue and it is likely that a strong case will be made for funding from Central Council.

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
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
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
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
