Lismore Wins Tidiest Town In County

The Tidy Towns Awards 2000 were presented recently at a ceremony in Dublin by Minister for the Environment Noel Dempsey TD. Dungarvan's Housing Boom Set To Continue

Dungarvan's unprecedented housing boom is set to continue, and this week members of the Urban Council gave the go ahead for the first phase of what could ultimately be a massive 400 - house development on twenty six acres of land acquired last year by the local authority for a figure reportedly in the region of £2.6m.

In a report to the monthly UDC meeting, town clerk Brian White confirmed their readiness to commence with a total of ninety houses on the land at Shandon formerly owned by the Dempsey family. It was, he said, proposed to build twenty two bedroomed houses and seventy three bedroomed, all of them two storey.

Mr. White further revealed that forty of the houses will be built by the Urban Council, thirty will comprise the Government's new affordable housing scheme, and

the remaining twenty will come under the umbrella of the Voluntary Housing Agency. They had received a submission on behalf of Cork Co-Operative Marts Ltd. requesting a buffer zone between the housing development and their nearby property, and he was satisfied the proposed layout would satisfy the company's concerns in that regard.

The town clerk told the meeting that the proposed

40 - house local authority scheme would be advertised within a matter of weeks, and thereafter it was hoped construction work would commence without undue delay. He added that they would also be advertising the thirty houses under the affordable housing scheme shortly to ascertain the level of interest in them.

Cllr. Damien Dillon voiced concerns about the proximity

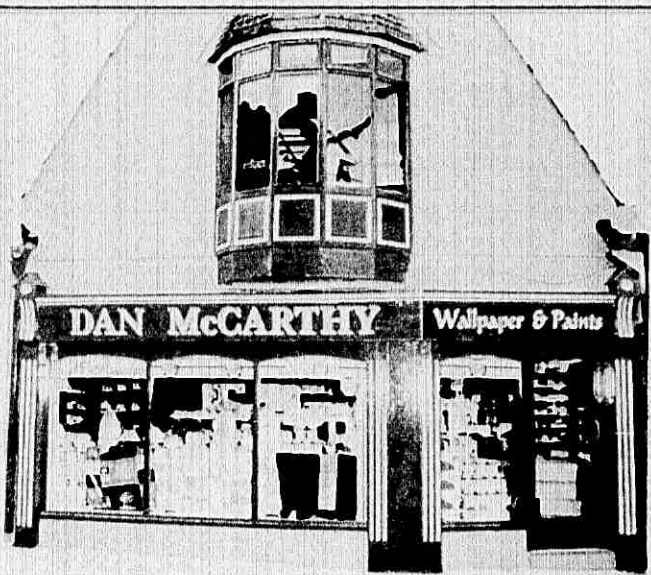

THE HUMAN BODY

IN THE EAR

Sound waves funnel into the outer ear — the flap of skin and cartilage on the side of the head. They pass along a narrow tube, the ear canal, to a small patch of rubbery skin as its end, the eardrum.



The sound waves bounce off the eardrum and make it shake to and fro, or vibrate. The eardrum is connected to a row of three tiny bones linked together, the hammer, anvil and stirrup. The vibrations pass along these bones, like rattling the links of a chain.

The stirrup presses against a small, fluid-filled, snail-shaped part, the cochlea, deep inside the ear. The vibrations pass as ripples into the fluid inside the cochlea. Here, they shake thousands of tiny hairs that stick into the fluid from hair cells. As the hairs shake, the hair cells make nerve signals, which go along the auditory nerve to the hearing centre of the brain.

BALANCE

Balance involves several sets of senses. Deep in the ear, chambers called the utricle and saccule detect the downward pull of gravity, so you know which way up your head is.

Other inner ear organs called the semi-circular canals contain fluid that swishes to fro, telling you about head movements.

Skin detects pressure as gravity presses body parts down. Eyes see horizontal and vertical lines, like floors and walls. The kinesthetic sense detects body position and posture (see above).

All these sense inputs are analysed in the brain, which sends out nerve signals to the muscles, to keep you balanced.



A SENSE OF POSITION



Yet another body sense is our inner sense of posture or body position. Try this. Stand up and close your eyes. Hold your arms out straight, to the front. How do you know when you have done this. You can 'feel' the position of your arms and legs, body and head. Hundreds of micro-sensors in your muscles and joints detect the various amounts of stretch and strain in them. This inner sense of posture is called your proprioceptive or kinesthetic sense.

TASTE BUD

Each taste bud has some 30 gustatory (taste) cells clustered like the segments of an orange. The cells have micro-hairs, or cilia, sticking up on to the tongue's watery surface. As flavour particles touch the cilia, the gustatory cells produce nerve signals. These pass along nerves to the brain, where they are recognised as tastes.

The 2000 National Ploughing Championships will take place on the farms of Mr. David Lalor and Mr. Robin Talbot, Ballacolla, Co. Laois.

The venue for the Championships is situated on the outskirts of Ballacolla village utilising 2 farms for the main event and neighbouring farms as car parks. The event will cover an area of 300 acres. It will be held on the 26th, 27th, and 28th of September.

As always, this year all available trading stand space is occupied with some months, and a number of companies are coming in from the U.K. and Europe. The tractor and machinery stands will be attractive with the latest machines on display. Some exhibitors will have demonstrations in the allotted ground provided to them, close to the exhibition area.

A large number of commercial and business exhibits from consumer affairs, auctioneering, electronics, computer software, hardware and many more will be present. Alongside the trade stands and exhibitions will be a host of other events, including both day and night entertainment. Once on site, all visitors will have the opportunity to admire the ingenuity of our agricultural pioneers. Entertainment will be nightly in the local bars and hotels with the N.P.A. Headquarters in the Killeshin Hotel, Portlaoise. This hotel will be the venue for the Queen of the Plough Dance on Wednesday night, 27 September.

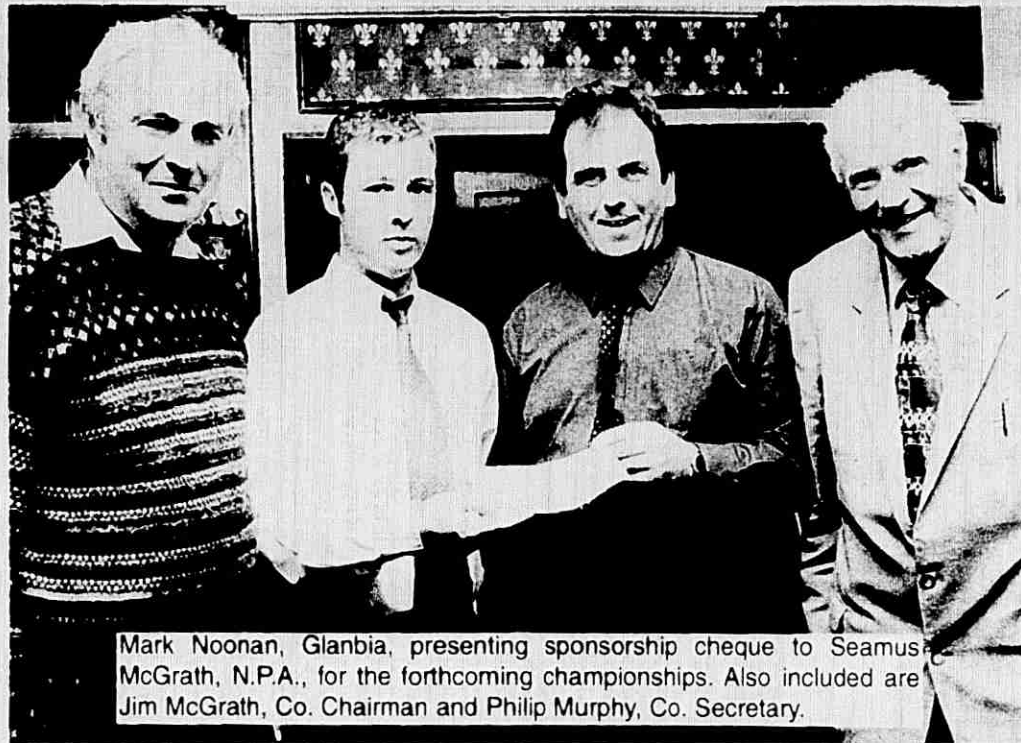

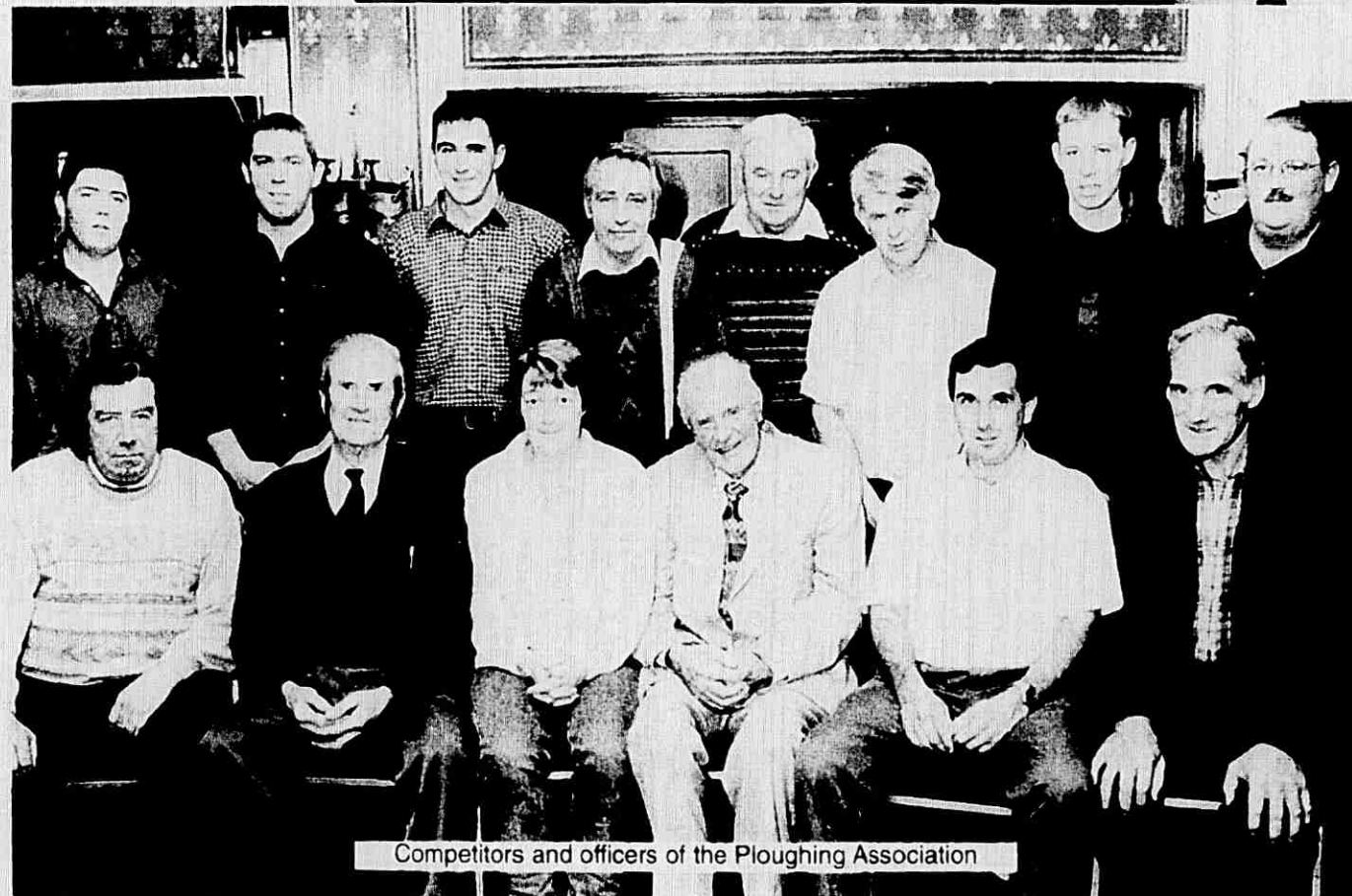

COOKERY CORNER

Meat and Lentil Curry

TANTALISE your taste buds with this versatile, easy-to-make, original Indian recipe for meaty lentil curry.

Ingredients:

- Serves 3-4
- 450g lean beef, lamb or pork, cubed
- 400g can chopped tomatoes
- 300ml stock
- 74g red or green lentils
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 x 15ml medium curry paste
- 1 x 15ml sp tomato purée
- 175g cauliflower, cut into small florets
- 1 red pepper, seeded and cut into chunks

Method:

Place all the ingredients into a large casserole dish, with the exception of the cauliflower and red pepper.

Mix everything together

er thoroughly, cover the casserole dish and place in a preheated oven (to Gas mark 3, 170°C or 325°F) for 60-90 mins until the meat is tender throughout. Stir in the cauliflower and red pepper and return the dish to the oven for a further 30 minutes.

Serve the meal with rice (plain, pilau or wild varieties), fresh naan bread, two or three seasonal vegetables and a variety of chutneys for that extra touch of authenticity.

TIP: For added conven-



ience, follow the recipe using the meat stock, lentils and vegetables with a large jar of curry

sauce of your choice instead of the separate ingredients.

Melon Appetiser Is Sweet and Juicy Mini Apricot Pies A Real Pleaser

A LIGHT and refreshing melon appetiser to impress guests.

Ingredients:

- Serves 4-6
- DRESSING:**
- 2 x 5ml sp wholegrain mustard
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 x 15ml sp white wine vinegar
- 4 x 15ml sp walnut oil
- 2 x 15ml sp groundnut oil
- Salt and pepper

SALAD:

- 1 small melon (preferably Charentais or cantaloupe)
- 1-2 bunches watercress
- 100-175g baby spinach leaves
- 2 x 15ml olive oil
- 1 lemon
- Salt and pepper

Method:

For the dressing, whisk together the mustard, egg yolk and vinegar. Mix the oils together and pour slowly

ly on to the mustard mixture, whisking vigorously. The oils will emulsify with the mustard, giving you a loose, mayonnaise-style dressing. Season with salt and pepper.

For the melon salad, cut the melon in half and remove seeds. With a melon baller, scoop the flesh into balls (alternatively, wedges or large dice), then place in the fridge. Wash the watercress and spinach. Mix the olive oil with a squeeze of lemon juice and season.

When ready to serve, mix the melon with the salad leaves. Add some of the mustard seed dressing to give a light coating and divide between four plates or bowls.

Trickle a little more mustard seed dressing around, then pour a little of the olive oil/lemon juice over before serving.

USE this sweet and juicy fruit to make interesting individual fruit pies.

Ingredients:

- Makes 6-8
- Butter
- 350g sweet shortcrust pastry
- FRANGIPANE:**
- 250g butter, softened
- 250g caster sugar
- 4 eggs
- 175g ground almonds
- 50g plain flour
- 100g dried apricots, chopped

FILLING AND TOPPING:

- 1 x 420g tin apricot halves (reserve syrup)
- Icing sugar
- GLAZE:**
- 4 x 15ml sp apricot jam

Method:

Preheat oven to 170°C/325°F/Gas 3. Butter 6 or 8 tartlet tins 7.5cm in diameter, 5cm deep. Roll out pastry, line tins. For frangipane,

cream butter and sugar. Add eggs, one at a time. Mix ground almonds and flour, fold into butter mix. Add dried apricots. Spoon a little mixture into pastry-lined tins.

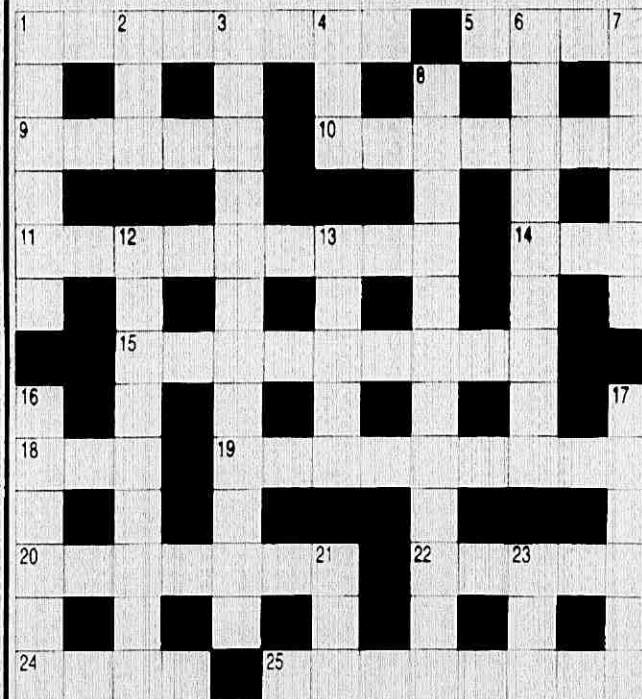
For filling, dice 8-10 apricot halves, divide between tins. Bake 25-30mins - during cooking, frangipane will rise. Remove pies from oven, leave to rest for 10 mins. Lift from tins.

For topping, slice 6-8 apricot halves thinly, overlap around tops of pies. Dust with icing sugar and flash under grill. For glaze, simmer jam for 2-3 mins with 4-6 x 15ml sp apricot syrup, to a coating consistency. For a richer, thicker glaze, dice any remaining apricot halves, add to the jam and syrup. Serve pies, glaze poured over, with custard or cream.

The provision of an ultra modern childrens playground in Dungarvan, costing possibly as much as £100,000, was taken a gigantic step forward this week when all nine members of the Urban Council gave the project an emphatic seal of approval.

There is unanimous agreement on the location, the public park at the Causeway and with the UDC also prepared to put its money where its mouth is, the local authority is planning to turn to the business community to row in with vital financial backing to bring the project to reality.

Before Monday night's UDC meeting was a motion jointly tabled by Fine Gael's Cllrs. John Deasy and Damien Geoghegan calling on the Council to seek financial contributions from the business community for the provision of the playground.

Cllr. Deasy said it is a subject that has been around for a very long time, and given that the Council didn't have the funding to meet all of the financial requirements he didn't think there was any way around going to the business people and seeking their backing.

"Parents in our housing estates are finding it ever more difficult to find a safe place for their children to play. The UDC's in Youghal and Carrick-On-Suir have provided modern playgrounds, and it is my belief that such a facility in Dungarvan would add to the town's attractiveness as a tourist destination" said Cllr. Deasy.

He went on to say that when originally designed the Causeway Park in Abbeyside was intended to have a childrens playground, and it is both a central and ideal location". "When estimates time comes round shortly we will have to sort all of this out, and in the interim we must make a concerted effort to get the local business community on board", he said, adding that they should also consider setting up a fundraising committee.

Cllr. Geoghegan said Dungarvan is crying out for this facility

and it was high time the Council pressed ahead with it. He rejected any suggestion that insurance should be an insurmountable problem because in neighbouring Youghal the Council had developed a state of the art playground.

"There are also two private playgrounds within three miles of our own town and insurance hasn't been a problem", Cllr. Geoghegan added.

Cllr. Teresa Wright, who has been a leading activist in pursuit of the facility locally for a long time, said there is already a childrens playground working group in place and the Council should meet with the members. "At estimates time I believe the money to back the playground will come from somewhere", she said.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan recalled that it is all of thirteen years since she begged the then county manager to provide a playground but they had run up against a brick wall on the finance issue. "Making an approach to the business community for their backing is the only way because this UDC on its own cannot afford to fund the project over the next four or so years", said Cllr. Ryan.

Each councillor in turn backed the proposal without equivocation, with Cllr. Billy Kyne insisting that they should provide a decent level of funding at their forthcoming estimates meeting.

The acting county manager, Peter Carey, agreed it is a matter which the UDC should be proactive about, and he also accepted now that insurance should not be an insurmountable barrier.

The manager described the Causeway Park as "A ready made location", and he would favour going ahead with it as a community project, involving the UDC, the existing playground working group, and the business community.

Cllr. Paddy Power suggested that if all comes to all the Council should consider raising the necessary loan and repaying

it over a number of years. "We have done it for other projects in the past, so why not for this one", he added.

Cllr. Deasy suggested that Waterford County Council should also have a role to play. There isn't a playground between Waterford city and Youghal Bridge, he said, and children from outside the UDC jurisdiction would also be using the new playground.

"Clearly the will is there on behalf of the UDC and the working group, and we must now turn to the business community", the manager said. A viewpoint that was given the unanimous backing of the councillors.

ty of the Fraher Field GAA grounds to the site and the very winding road leading to it. "I would like to see us being provided with a more detailed report than that which is before us", he added.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan said that in total three hundred and ninety houses, including private homes, have been earmarked for the site. "When will it all begin", she asked.

Mr. White said that they will also be advertising shortly to ascertain the level of interest in the private housing sector. Responding to Cllr. Dillon's criticism, he said the councillors will be immediately given all the planning details, and they could then make whatever submissions they considered appropriate to him.

However, Cllr. John Deasy said they couldn't afford to wait as far as proceeding with the proposed forty Council houses is concerned. "We have hundreds of people on our housing list and seriously tackling that is what is paramount with me", the Fine Gael councillor said. "We need to take a decision on this scheme now".

The members gave the all clear, in principle, to the proposals, and the expectation is that the construction of the forty Council houses will commence before the end of the current year.

SEVEN HOUSE SCHEME AT QUANNS

The meeting was also given details of a proposed seven house scheme, essentially for the elderly, on the sea front of Quanns. The houses will be two bedroomed and single storey.

Cutting Hedges The Roman Way

ALTHOUGH it now refers mainly to cutting trees into different shapes, topiary is an art form that has been around since Roman times.

But the art isn't just about cutting. It is about shaping and training and designing trees and shrubs to create bold artificial shapes.

Traditionally used to form strong geometric shapes in formal gardens such as spirals and triangles, it has been developed to include birds and animals and even whimsical features such as giant chess pieces or full-sized trains.

Using topiary for geometric shapes such as cones, obelisks and columns provides a strong structural element in design, perhaps to frame a vista or form an avenue.

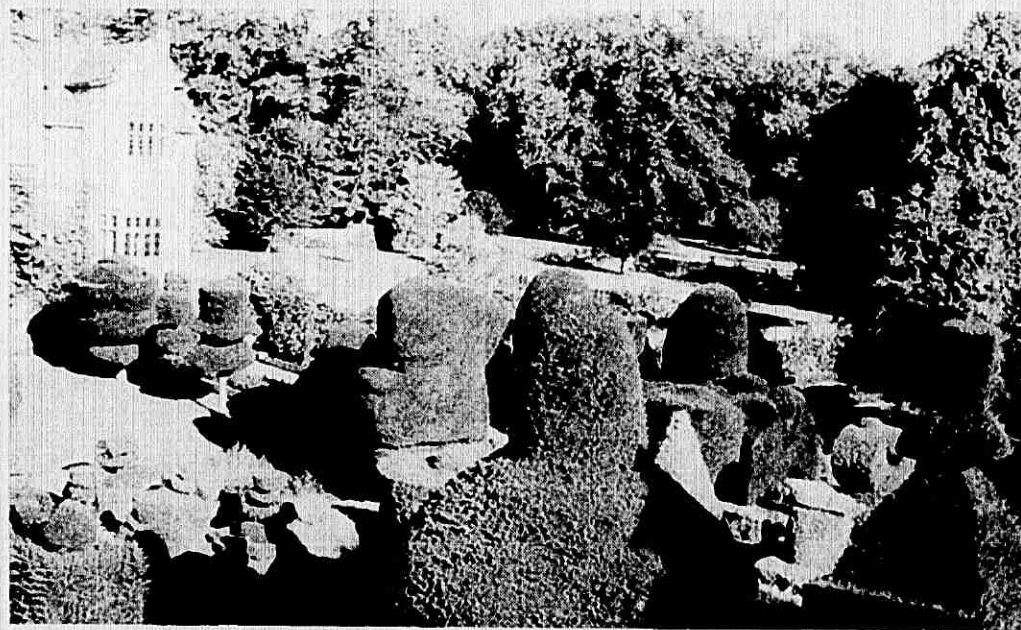
In many gardens topiary is used to create artistic designs at the top of a hedge or yew tree clipping it into one or more birds, spheres,

cubes or more exotic or erotic designs.

Topiary may also be effective in containers, using a single container plant as a centrepiece, a pair to flank a doorway or several to line a path. Plants used in topiary need dense pliable growth, small leaves and the ability to recover quickly from clipping. The most popular are evergreens such as yew, box and certain cypresses. Bay and privet are also very popular while holly and ivy are sometimes used.

Most topiary designs are best formed with the aid of a guiding framework, although some simple shapes may also be cut freehand. Young stems being trained onto a frame grow quickly, and considerable work is required to tie in new shoots throughout the growing season.

Topiary requires much more precise clipping than is required for normal hedge cutting. Do not cut too much in one place as it may spoil

the symmetry of a topiary design for a whole season, until new replacement growth appears.

Even if you have a good eye for shaping plants it is sensible to use levels, plumb lines and other aids to check the accuracy of a cut.

Always work from the top of the plant downwards and from the centre outwards in order to retain a balanced symmetry.

Rounded topiary pieces are easier to produce and maintain than angular geometric shapes and may often be cut

freehand. Geometric shapes are best cut using guidelines attached to canes.

Once a topiary feature is established it will need frequent routine clipping during the growing season. The time between cuts will depend on the rate of growth. An intricate geometric design in a box may need to be cut at four to six week intervals. Trim as soon as any new growth begins to appear uneven.

If a perfect finish is not required throughout the

year, two cuts during the growing season are usually sufficient for a reasonable effect, although this depends upon the plant used.

Yew, for example, needs to be cut only once a year, box usually needs to be cut twice a year and *Lonicera nitida* three times. Plants should be clipped at the appropriate time of year but not after early autumn as the young shoots produced after the first clip need to ripen sufficiently to withstand cold winter temperatures.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

POT AND BOX BULBS FOR EARLY FLOWERING

Now is the time for potting or boxing hyacinths, tulips, narcissi, ixias, gladioli and bulbous irises for flowering in the greenhouse or house during this winter and next spring.

If containers are provided with drainage holes use John Innes potting compost No. 1 or a peat based potting compost.

If they are undrained bowls, use special bulb fibre consisting of peat, crushed shell and crushed charcoal.

Place the bulbs of tulips and narcissi almost touching one another and barely covered with compost. Space the smaller bulbs and corms about 2.5 cm apart and cover to a depth of 1 to 2 cm. Then stand all the containers in the coolest place available.

This can be outdoors at the foot of a north-facing wall if the containers are drained, but undrained containers must be kept under cover or they may be flooded by rain.

SHELTER TENDER PLANTS

Give shelter to all tender greenhouse plants that have been outdoors during the summer. This includes pelargoniums, marguerites, fushias and camellias.

LEADER Activity 2000-2006

Procedure for Funding Application

In July 2000, the Minister of State at the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr. Noel Davern T.D., invited notices of expressions of interest from groups involved in rural development in regard to the new EU Community-funded Initiative, LEADER+ and the National Mainstream Rural Development Programme funded under the National Development Plan 2000 - 2006. Formal applications are now invited from interested groups. **Separate applications are required where it is intended to make application under both programmes.**

I. LEADER+ Programme

Under the EU guidelines on LEADER+, all rural areas are eligible. Funding will be made available to a limited number of local area based rural development groups.

The Programme will provide support for integrated territorial strategies of a pilot nature under the following actions:

- support for integrated territorial rural development strategies based on the bottom-up approach and horizontal partnerships
 - support for inter-territorial and transnational co-operation.
- The strategy proposed must be innovative and structured around one or more of the following themes. One of the themes must be selected as a priority theme:
- the use of new know-how and new technologies to make the products and services of rural areas more competitive
 - improving the quality of life in rural areas
 - adding value to local products, in particular by facilitating access to markets for small production units via local actions, and
 - making the best use of natural and cultural resources, including enhancing the value of sites of Community interest selected under NATURA 2000.

Additional to the priority theme requirement, sub themes may also be proposed.

II. National Mainstream Rural Development Programme

This programme will provide support for multi-sectoral strategies across the country with an emphasis on local innovation in respect of the following:

- technical support to rural communities
- training and recruitment assistance
- craft enterprises and local services
- exploitation of local produce
- rural tourism
- environmental improvement
- transnational and inter-territorial co-operation

In addition to local area based rural development groups, collective bodies involved in rural development may make application for assistance under this programme towards actions they propose.

Submission of formal applications for funding

Groups are invited to submit formal applications (two copies) for funding by **Friday 27 October 2000**. **Please note that applications received after this date will be ineligible for consideration.** If sent by e-mail or fax a hard copy (x2) should follow immediately. It should be noted that as a general rule, applications may only be submitted for areas with populations of not less than 10,000 and not more than 100,000 people. An application must take the form of a comprehensive business plan. Groups can determine the format and content of their business plans. All references to £IR should also specify the corresponding amount in euros. A Guidelines Outline is available from the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Development.

A selection process to appoint groups to deliver the programmes will be based inter alia on an evaluation of the full business plans.

Note: Groups who did not submit an expression of interest earlier may make a formal application at this stage

Local Consultation by applicants

Prior to the submission of applications, groups formulating business plans in respect of areas covered in whole or in part by other prospective groups should consult with each other and, where appropriate, other interested parties in order to resolve potential problems of overlapping and/or duplication of funding arrangements. This consultation process and its outcome must be referred to in the application business plan.

RECENT DEATHS

LATE MURIEL BOWEN



Muriel Bowen, who died on August 23rd aged 74, was an undeniable force, both in her journalistic career and in the equestrian world.

Born at Clonea Castle, Dungarvan, in 1926, she was introduced to things equestrian from an early age. Her father John Kingston Bowen, the county surveyor, and mother Nancy (nee Ryan), from Co. Tipperary were both steeped in the love of the horse, breeders of winners on the point-to-point circuit and producers of numerous champions in the showing world.

From an early age Muriel Bowen's enthusiasm and tenacity marked her out from her peers. Correspondence with world renowned figures such as Ger Dwight Eisenhower and Ger Montgomery resulted in a treasured collection of signed pictures, and it was no surprise that she broke into journalism at the age of 19, taking to her first job as a reporter for the Irish Independent with such success that her salary increased 10-fold within the year.

Horses regularly featured in her copy, but it was her interest in politics that prompted a move to London in 1952 fol-

lowing numerous appearances in the Daily Telegraph's Peterborough column.

Shortly afterwards she was appointed to the William Hickley column in the Daily Express, having impressed editor Arthur Christiansen with her prizes correspondence with Eisenhower and Montgomery.

Her love of horses made the request to cover the coronation of Queen Elizabeth a particular joy and, while researching the story, she hitched rides in the horse-drawn carriages making rehearsal runs to Westminster Abbey, dropping her off at her Fleet Street offices en route.

She stayed with the Express for three years before taking on her own column in the Evening Standard in 1955, where she spent much of her time writing a society column for the paper while moving further into political circles.

Muriel Bowen set about advancing her own political career, bidding for selection as a Conservative candidate. She achieved that goal only once and contested the Labour held seat of West Ham North, but the Labour candidate, Arthur Lewis, held his seat with majority of 16,000.

Muriel Bowen was elected to the London County Council in 1959, however, and served as councillor for South Battersea, becoming a well-known figure on the town planning and historic buildings committees.

When she went to America with a letter of introduction from none other than Sir Chester Beatty, she was appointed to the Washington Post, reporting on day-to-day events in the White House and Senate.

During that time she travelled extensively in America,

Hong Kong, India, Malaya and Basutoland, taking time out as often as her work allowed to indulge in her favourite sport of hunting, meeting King Faisal in Baghdad and Field Marshall Ayub Khan, then president of Pakistan, who lent her a horse. When she returned the horse at the end of the day and offered her thanks to the president, he gave her his astrakhan hat, which then became her favourite headgear when she was reading the scriptures in church.

From 1967 until she was given a staff job in 1973, Muriel Bowen contributed society articles to the Sunday Times before being made regional government correspondent. She was dispatched to Washington to report on President Reagan's inauguration. A devout Catholic, she covered several of the tours made by Pope John Paul II, including his visit to Ireland in 1979.

Despite immersing herself in the world of politics, horses were always her true love. During her life she hunted with around 130 packs in Britain, America, India, Pakistan and Iraq, and wrote of her days with 35 different packs in Ireland in a book simply titled Irish Hunting, with a foreword by Lt-Col Sir Harry Llewellyn.

Horses always played a very large part in Muriel Bowen's life and, even when she was covering society events, she ensured that she could combine work with horses, travelling to Dublin for the Horse Show and, of course, Royal Ascot.

Throughout this time she continued riding, producing some top animals to claim wins all over England. Most notable among these was her champion cob, Cromwell, which won back-to-back championships at the Royal Show and, in 1980, was the first winner of the Bord na gCapall cob award, which was presented to his delighted owner in the international arena at Hickstead.

Three years later, Eddie Macken was given the job of presenting Muriel Bowen with another Bord na gCapall award, this time their points championship trophy, at the Horse of the Year Show in Wembley.

Muriel Bowen was a familiar bustling figure, complete with obligatory headscarf in press rooms at horse shows all over England and Ireland, always keen to promote the Irish-bred horse, particularly the Irish-bred cob which was so dear to her heart.

She was a regular show correspondent for Horse & Hound and also wrote articles for The Irish Field on the advances of Irish exports on the English showing scene.

Predeceased by her brother Vincent, Muriel Bowen is survived by her sister, Caroline Bowen Walsh.

The Science of Farming and Food

HAVE YOUR SOIL TESTED NOW

No matter what enterprises you have on your farm soil sampling, to determine fertiliser requirements, represents good value for money. According to Brian Coulter, Teagasc, Johnstown Castle, whether you sample to improve soil fertility or to avoid spreading unnecessary nutrients, you more than recoup the cost of soil sampling. Teagasc recommends that a sample be taken for every 2-3 ha when you are testing on a 5 year cycle.

The standard soil analysis costs £17; this covers lime, pH, phosphorus, potassium and magnesium. This works out at a cost of £1.13 per ha per year if you are sampling 3ha once every 5 years.

DAIRYING

Reduced Number of Milkings

Bernie O'Brien carried out an experiment in Moorepark in Autumn 1999 to examine the feasibility of one a day milking (ODM) and omitting one weekly milking (13TWM). The pre-experimental yields were 4.2 gals/day and the cows were on average 218 days into their lactation. All cows received 2 kg concentrates per day from the start of the trial. The trial was carried out over a 10 week period (4th Oct to 12 Dec). The results are presented in Table 2. Milk Yield and Composition of Cows on Various Milking Regimes

ODM resulted in a 29% drop in milk yield compared to TDM and resulted in a cumulative loss of 55 gals/cow over the 10 week period.

13TWM did not affect milk yield or milk composition. A milking strategy based on 13 milking per week (dropping Sunday evening milking) has relevance for all dairy farmers.

SCC levels were similar on TDM and ODM routines. However the average SCC in the pre-experimental week was 122,000 and none of the trial cows were infected.

MAIZE WALK

Harvest time for the maize is rapidly approaching. The best time to harvest is one of the topics which will be discussed by Brian Hilliard and other speakers at a Maize Farm Walk on Thursday September 21st on the farm of Pat and Liam Christopher, Ballylemon, Cappagh. Other topics to be discussed are the performance of new varieties and the feeding of maize.

SHEEP

Mating

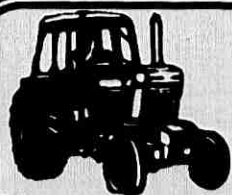
For most producers, rams will be going out in the next month to six weeks. Go through your flock now. Separate out the thinner ewes and flush for 5-6 weeks. Flush the rest of the flock for 3 weeks. You could also delay letting rams with the thinner ones for a week if necessary.

Treat all ewes and rams for lameness now. Footbath all the sheep for as long as possible - let the bad cases stand in the mixture for up to twenty minutes. The footrot bug will only survive in a field for 12 days without sheep. So when you footbath, put the sheep back to fields that have not had sheep in the previous 12 days.

Kildaton College, Piltown, Co. Kilkenny is the venue for the Teagasc National Careers Day, on Thursday, October 5th.

The event will feature information on training and career prospects in every aspect of agriculture and horticulture. It will be an opportunity for young people and their parents to meet representatives from all the agricultural and horticultural colleges and the institutes of technology as well as the employers of Graduates of Teagasc training courses. Self employed opportunities for young people with an agricultural or horticultural qualification will also be featured prominently. Running their own business combined with a small to medium sized farm is an option which is likely to become increasingly important for many farmers in the future.



FARMING LEADER

Curran Calls For Immediate Implementation Of Farm Schemes

Waterford IFA Chairman, Gerald Curran has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to introduce the REPS and Early Retirement Scheme immediately following the go-ahead given by the EU Commission at a meeting in Brussels.

The Rural Development Plan is the final part of the implementation of the Agenda 2000 Agreement and involves important measures worth up to £4 bn. to Irish farmers over the next 6 years. The measures include the REPS, Early Retirement, Forestry and Disadvantaged Areas Scheme.

In welcoming the decision of the EU Star Committee Mr. Curran said that the issue of Disadvantaged Area payments needed to be addressed immediately particularly for the mountain areas where the new scheme is not acceptable. The new Area-based Disadvantaged Areas Scheme which comes into operation in 2001 in-

volves increased national funding of £60m to offset losses incurred in the changeover from a per head to an Area-based system.

The Waterford IFA Chairman has expressed disappointment that 2% survey for 1999 confirms the widespread low farm income problem, with an average income from farming of only £175/week. This was stated by Waterford IFA Chairman, Gerald Curran.

Mr. Curran said "the income crisis on cattle farms in 1999, which led to the IFA boycott of beef factories last January is clearly set out in the survey results".

Mr. Curran welcomed the publication for the first time of information on the off-farm income of part-time farmers. "It clearly shows that these farmers have generally very low farm incomes, and their combined farm and off-farm income is only £15,100 or £290/week."

With reference to the likely

income trend in farming in the current year, the IFA leader said that a combina-

tion of recovery in cattle prices, cost savings due to better weather and some improvement in EU direct payments is likely to offset most of last year's income loss. He said however that farmers are very vulnerable and IFA will be insisting on action in the budget to reduce Ireland's inflation rate.

Chicken Farmers Being Forced "Over The Edge" By Processors And Retailers —PARLON

IFA National Poultry Chairman, Eddie Keane has warned that Irish chicken farmers will be driven to extinction if their margins are not immediately restored to a minimum of 25p per chicken. "Without an immediate improvement in farmer margins of 5p per chicken, Irish producers will go out of business rapidly and consumers will be left without a regular supply of traceable quality Irish product."

Mr. Keane made these comments organised to highlight the ongoing difficulties in the market place for chicken producers and broiler breeders caused by continuous downward pressure on margins by Poultry Processors over the past 2 years. Mr. Keane said: "Irish chicken farmers at present have margins over feed, chick and catching as low as 10p per bird. The national average at present is no more than 20p per chicken, which has to meet all variable costs, loan repayments, financial charges, living expenses and profit. The sector cannot survive on this margin."

The Grange man added "The 20p per chicken margin received by the farmer is in sharp contrast to the £2.50

per chicken margin available to the processor and the £1.30 per chicken enjoyed by the retailer for a £4 chicken (1600 gms) under normal trading conditions.

Mr. Keane continued "Over the last 2 weeks we have seen a spate of below cost selling of 1200 gm chickens by most of the multiples, using chicken as a loss leader in a battle for market share. Often such special offers are funded by processors and farmers and not by the retailer."

Mr. Keane said "the Irish Groceries Order, instead of being relaxed, should actually be strengthened to include fresh food items such as chicken to prevent retailers from undermining the livelihood of farmers. Our Government should follow the example of the German anti-trust authorities who have this week prohibited 3 retailers from selling basic food-stuffs for less than it costs to produce them."

Mr. Keane continued "If Irish chicken farmers are to survive, then the top poultry processors who account for 90% of Irish chicken sales, must return an increased margin totalling 25p per chicken to farmers."

South East ICMSA News

ICMSA ATTACK ANOMALIES IN TAXATION SYSTEM

Mr. Michael Doody, Chairman of the ICMSA Taxation Committee called on the Minister for Finance, Mr. Charlie McCreevy, T.D., to eliminate taxation anomalies which discriminate against the self-employed in the forthcoming Budget.

A self-employed taxpayer faces, in effect, a discriminatory levy of 7% on all pension contributions. Mr. Doody said, "At present pension premiums paid by PAYE employees are exempt from PRSI and health levies, however this same relief does not apply to the self-employed".

This discrimination is in addition to differences in personal allowances. A farm family currently has £2,000 less total personal allowances compared to a family where both spouses are employed and taxed under PAYE. This huge difference is biased against farm families.

Mr. Doody stated that the £1,000 PAYE allowance should be abolished and basic personal allowances should be increased by £1,000 for a single person and £2,000 for a married couple. This would eliminate inconsistencies and ensure equality of allowances. "ICMSA are committed to seeing these contradictions eradicated", Mr. Doody concluded.

ICMSA CALL ON TANAISTE TO INVESTIGATE INCREASES IN GREEN DIESEL

ICMSA is calling on the Tanaiste, Ms. Mary Harney T.D., to investigate the unjustified increase in green diesel over and above white diesel - both fuels are identical except for colour. There is evidence that while white diesel has increased by 45% since March 1999, green diesel has increased by 65% during the same period.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA said, "I would call on Mary Harney to investigate this matter fully or alternatively refer the matter to the Competition Authority".

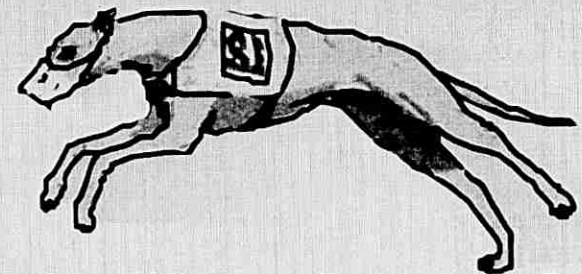

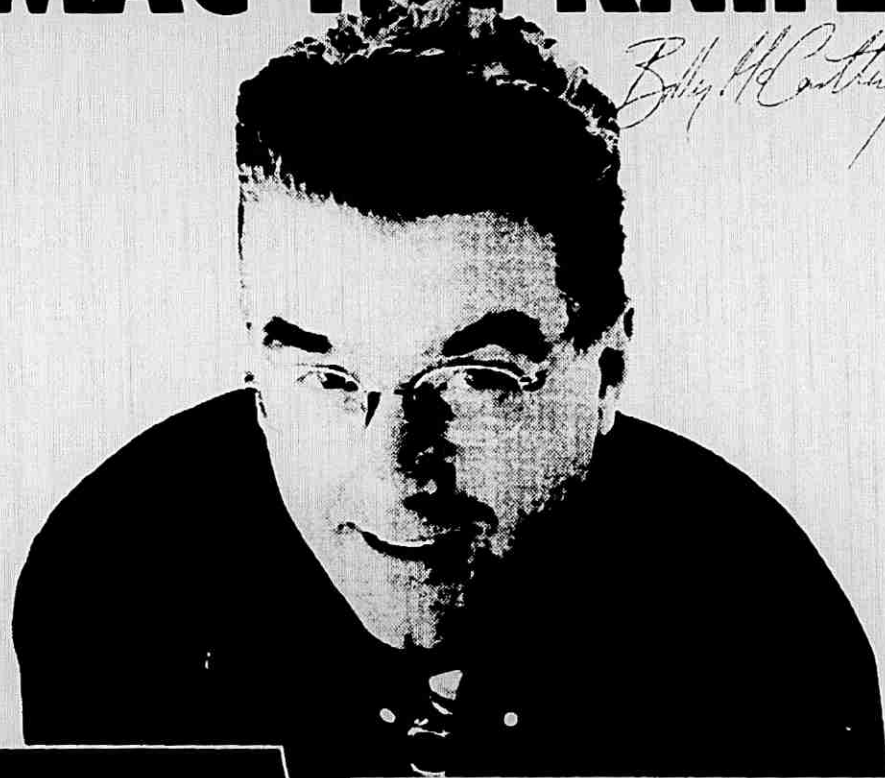



Aglish Continues To Be Well Presented

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH

Your Development Plan is impressive, and provides much interesting environmental as well as sociological information. What is missing from it is a timescale showing what projects will be tackled in which of the five years, with a target year for completion of each project.

You will find that by setting yourself such deadlines you will encourage participants to undertake work assiduously, rather than allowing projects to go 'on the long finger'. Thank you for your map, on which you have clearly marked sites which should be inspected, and thank you too for your photographs.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The Church was still in need of a coat of paint on the date of adjudication, but its boundary was very smart; it is recommended that the same colour be used for both. The School and the Garda station were well presented, as was the Glanbia depot. All the business premises, including the Post Office, were smartly turned out. The Muintir na Tire Hall looked extremely fine in its new green paint. Inevitably, in comparison with the majority of the buildings, a few looked rather drab, among them the Glebe Hall and a building near the bridge. Last year's comment on the garage still applies. Whitewashing here and there was admired.

LANDSCAPING

Trim grassed spaces and flower beds, especially at road intersections, added brightness: these are the things which visitors immediately note with pleasure. Mature and younger trees are well looked after. When grass is mown, the cutting should be removed immediately and not allowed to wither on the site.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

The riverside improvements, and the clearing and tidying of the graveyard, are considered under this heading (as they are not, strictly speaking, 'Landscaping'). Cleaning and planting at the stream has given a real sense of liveliness to this once-neglected amenity: congratulations to those who have done the work. The same must be said about the work at the graveyard, which is now a positively eye-catching site in its commanding situation at the centre of the village. This work is also a touching tribute to those who lie under the many interesting headstones. The wild flower patch was favourably noted, here and near the church. Please seek the advice of the Irish Wildlife Conservancy, as suggested last year.

LITTER CONTROL

The village was virtually litter-free at the time of adjudication, and this is to be commended. Although constant vigilance is required in this area at all times.

Older houses are kept up with pride by their residents. Several houses on the outskirts have extremely charming gardens. It is good to see neat thatch. A very promising development of stone houses to the north of the church was noted, and this will be looked at more thoroughly next year when the work is finished.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS

The village renewal scheme promises well. Much roadwork, and pavement laying, was in progress on the date of the visit. What had been completed looked most impressive. It is very good news that as part of the work cables will be undergrounded and new lamp standards erected. Fine old stone walls, and handsome palings, were favourably noted. Provided the work continues as expected, there should be an opportunity for additional marks in this section as well, next year.

GENERAL IMPRESSION

A village on the verge of rediscovering itself. Considering the initiatives which have recently been taken, the next few years should show important advances. Congratulations to all the community.

SECOND ADJUDICATION (10/08/00)

It was a pleasure to visit Aglish for the purpose of second adjudication. The village continues to be nicely presented. There are some excellent gardens to bungalows and green verges with nice features in the village. More of the stone walls on the approach roads should be revealed to highlight their beauty and some stretches need to be refurbished. An enclosure might be created to the site where the heavy machinery, e.g. tractors, is being stored just at the outskirts of the village. One or two buildings need to be cleaned and 1 or whitewashed. The graveyard is a lovely element of the village with its stands of mature Yew trees and others. The Muintir na Tire Eaglais premises looks very well. The roof of Geraldines GAA hall may need attention before next year's competition. The four acre site of prime development land for sale in the centre of the village no doubt will be developed for housing or commercial and it is sincerely hoped that the design and scale will be sensitive to the character and overall ambience of Aglish.

TIDY TOWN RESULTS 2000

Small Increase in Marks for Ballymacarbray

OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH

A detailed 3 or 5 year Development Plan is the missing element in Ballymacarbray's otherwise excellent Tidy Towns entry. The several benefits to be gained from the preparation and implementation of such a plan have been outlined by previous adjudicators, and of course additional marking under the above heading is a useful spin-off. Your map which arrived just in time for adjudication, has been helpful in identifying essential sites. Yours must be the longest village in Ireland, and it is appreciated how much work goes into maintaining it.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The Pinewood factory is the most imposing building in the neighbourhood, the older sections are exceptionally well maintained, and the recent additions are impressively designed and presented. The curtilages of the factory are also smart, with good signage. The business premises to the south - Melody's, Doodys and the Tourist Information Office make a very charming and well-kept group, so much so, that one is naturally tempted to linger. The Glanbia depot had been much improved. The paint work of both the Garda station and St Patrick's Hall could do with freshening up.

LANDSCAPING

Well-nurtured flowerbeds on

the main roads, at the entrance to St Martin's and especially in the vicinity of the Tourist Office, gave life and colour at the time of adjudication.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

The wonderful natural resources of the surrounding countryside offer superb opportunities under this heading. Cleaning of the river was very favourably noted. It is recommended that the suggestions made by last year's adjudicator under this heading should be considered.

LITTER CONTROL

This was an improvement on last year. Congratulations.

TIDINESS

There is a welcome absence of most of the factors which so often mark other towns and villages - signage clutter, excessive overhead wires, derelict sites, Kerbside weed was at a minimum. A rusty corrugated iron shed near the Post Office needs attention.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Housing in and around the village is well kept. An older terrace at the village centre was admired. The cottages at St Martin's are neatly maintained - the disturbance created here during the building of the two new houses is temporary. Deerpark View provides a challenge to the developers. It is hoped that the new estate will respect the building traditions

RESOURCEFUL CRAFTSMAN PROVIDES OWN FORMULA

A potter setting up in business and wants to economise on the hefty £7,000 or so he needs to buy a new kiln, what would you do. If you were like Dave Dain, handy with DIY as with a potter's wheel, you make your own. Dave took a selection of materials including the gearbox of an old VW beetle and ceramic fibre, an insulation material invented by NASA scientists. The beauty of it all is that Dave's home-made kiln is built to withstand temperatures of 1,250 degrees Celsius and it cost him less than £400. The potter's wheel he built using the gearbox cost him £3,00 and he prefers it to his other shop bought wheel which cost around £1,000. Now Dave Dain is using the same inventiveness to restore an old farm house he bought last March at Graignagower, Ballymacarbray some eleven miles from Clonmel. It's ideal for his work, as he is surrounded by out offices and now he has turned one into a workshop and another into a display room where visitors to the beautiful Nire valley can see his road sign, can stop, browse and hopefully buy. With a number of top class guest houses in the area and limitless unspoilt mountain walks, this is a lovely area to visit, and during the summer the numbers of foreign cars visiting the area proves that the Nire is gradually making its way onto the tourist trail. Dave, previously lived in Poulavone near Kilsheelan but moved house to capitalise on the passing trade on the Clonmel Dungarvan route. He is keeping up a long tradition of crafts as this house was occupied by a first class carpenter and his son, Bill and Jamesy Kennedy, they were outstanding wheelwrights, a trade which is now no more. Dave Dain who hails from Dublin took a circuitous route into pottery. He worked in England, Spain and USA before returning to his native Dublin in 76 where he managed a shop. That was the start of the pottery boom and he taught himself the trade, and decided to move out of the city. In the 90's the Clauin training centre was set up by the South Tipperary Mental Health Association and for six years Dave was in charge of the pottery training there. From there he went into business himself and now he sells his work from his home and at craft fairs. This year he hopes to find an outlet in Dungarvan. He still teaches pottery to groups including the transition year students at Green Hills in Carrick-On-Suir. His enterprise at Graignagower is called Nire Pottery.

Irish Language Internet Awareness Campaign Begins

The motivation to discover and exploit the Internet is the focus of a new Public Awareness Campaign to begin this week.

The Public Awareness campaign will be a series of educational Television Programmes, Radio Programmes and Newspaper articles in created by Milaois na Gaeltachta, the Gaeltacht based Internet Development Initiative. This campaign will educate the Gaeltacht community with regard to the basic requirements for getting online. It aims to create an e-aware community that will be at the heart of the e-commerce revolution.

Milaois na Gaeltachta will be providing material to be published on TG4 and Raidió na Gaeltachta. Articles will also be provided to Regional Newspapers for publication. These articles are written by industry professionals in such a way that is concise and simple, easily read by the lay person. The articles will also be made available on www.gaeltacht2000.com, the community based Internet site being created by the company.

The site (www.gaeltacht2000.com) will be based on the Local Ireland portal format, providing news and features of interest to the Gaeltacht community as well as acting as a reference point for people with an interest in all things Gaelach.

A team of 30 writers from each Gaeltacht region will keep the site up to date on current issues and subjects of interest to the community.

"It's a forum for the Gaeltacht's 86,000 inhabitants to put articles about themselves, their locality, and things that are happening in their

area up on the Internet," said Pádraic Ó Neachtain. "Our aim to build the best community-based Web site in the world."

Ó Neachtain is the manager of Milaois na Gaeltachta, a joint initiative between Udarás na Gaeltachta, Aró, a Gaeltacht-based Internet company, and Local Ireland.

"The Public Awareness Campaign is part of an overall campaign undertaken by Milaois to raise awareness of the Internet and to introduce e-culture to the Gaeltacht community," said Ó Neachtain. Funding for the campaign in the region of IEP400,000 was provided by Udarás na Gaeltachta and the Millennium Committee.

The company has also undertaken a research project in conjunction with UCG on the challenges facing the Gaeltacht in the Information Age. "We've been working on this report since the start of the year and it will be ready for release in November," said Ó Neachtain.

Other ventures include an e-commerce competition to fund an e-business in the Gaeltacht and a documentary about the effect of the Internet on the Gaeltacht which will be broadcast by TG4.

"The aim of the business competition is to fund an e-business to the extent that they'll be able to set up a very substantial company in the Gaeltacht, proving employment for the local community," said Ó Neachtain. "The documentary will show the benefits or otherwise of the Internet on the Gaeltacht community. It will be equally relevant to other small, marginalized rural communities though, such as those in Wales or Scotland."

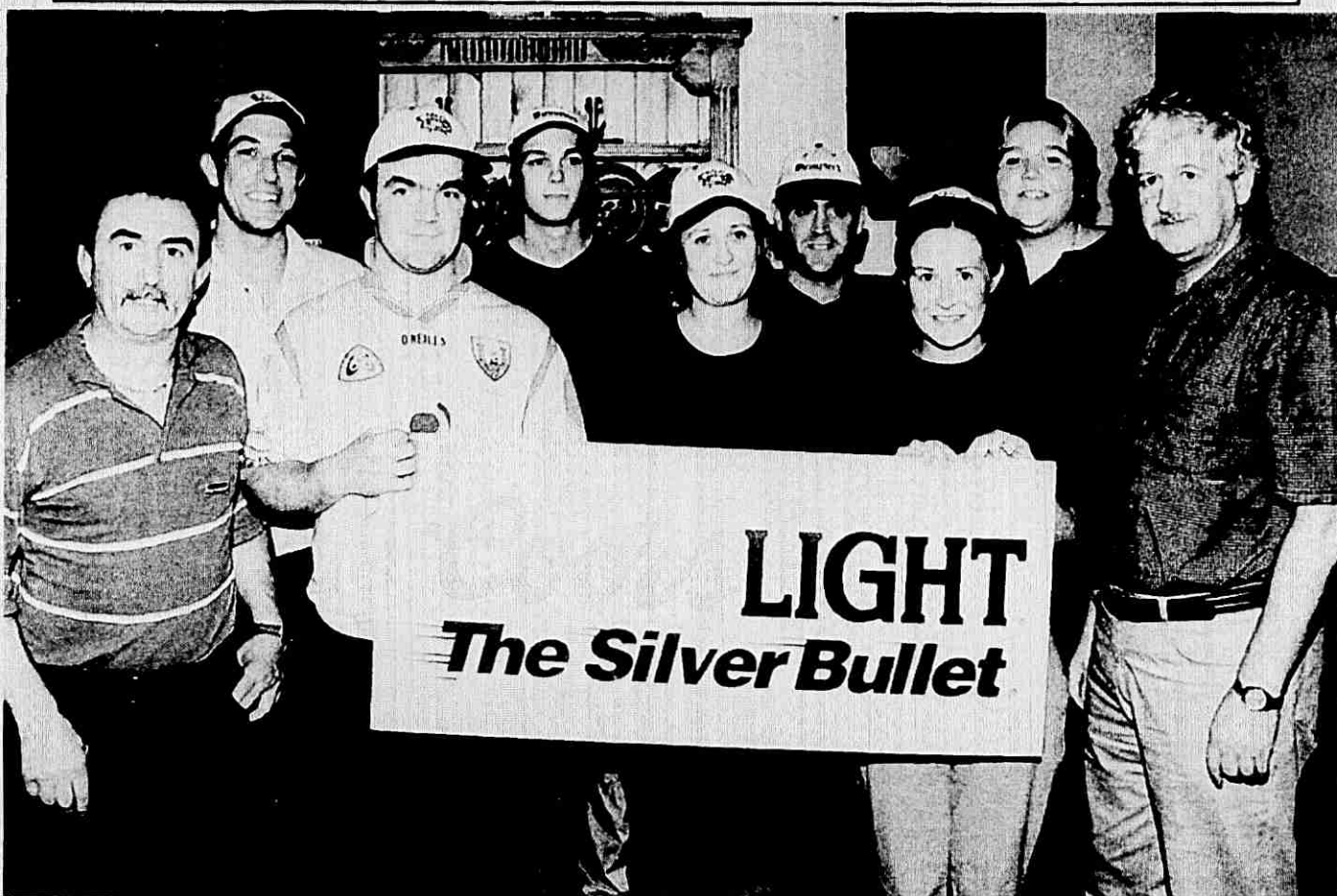

THE HAAK FISHERY

Smith, in his history of Waterford with reference to the Fisheries locally in the year 1756 states: "Some years before this time, six men with a hook and line could take 1000 haak, with quantities of other fish, in one night" but that in his time only half that quantity could be taken. The 1000 haak valued £6 and when saved were worth £18 in the year 1756. It would appear that the cod fishery had declined in the year 1756 for larger quantities were dried and shipped from Dungarvan before that time. The local cod and ling were esteemed as well fed fish, and considered better than the Newfoundland fish. Sole and plaice found here were also considered excellent for eating and it was not uncommon to take 100 large sole, with a quantity of fluke, etc. at a single draught.

BEAM TRAWLING

Smith in his history condemned the system of beam trawling for the decline in the local fisheries as it disturbed and tore away the spawning ground. He gives a table of exports before the introduction of trail nets and compares it with a table of exports after the introduction of trail nets.

Export of Haak

Before Trail Nets	458,648
After Trail Nets	276,410

This shows a remarkable falling off in the takes, attributable to the use of train nets.

Smith speaks very highly of the shell fish found on the coast - oysters, cockles, prawns, lobsters, crabs, razor-fish, periwinkles, etc.

Towards the close of the nineteenth century, some oyster beds were planted off Abbeyside and Dungarvan but they did not prove as successful as anticipated and by 1924, the oysters were entirely gone.

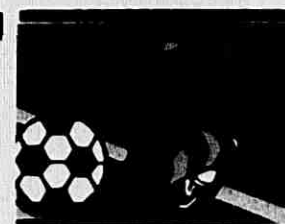

With a decent start Affane have the experience to mount a challenge but they must avoid dropping points against the 'also rans' which has been a problem for them in the past.

Brideview United 'B'— United have added a number of young players to their panel for this season but they could struggle against the stronger clubs. Last year United were always near the bottom and realistically, Brideview would be happy to finish mid table.

Clashmore Ramblers— Along with Affane, Ramblers were relegated last season. In the last four seasons at least one of the relegated sides has always bounced back and Clashmore can draw inspiration from this. Ramblers are basically a young and fit side and these assets could pay dividends. A major worry surrounds their defence which has been very poor in the last couple of seasons, though a good start could see them in contention.

Glenview— The fact that they were in the bottom two for all of last season tells its own story. Glenview, with a full squad of players can pose problems for any of their opponents but too often, the players have let their club down and until they sort out this problem, their struggle will be to avoid finishing bottom.

Kilworth Celtic— These were my tip last season and although they won the Liam Fitzgerald Memorial Cup, they could only finish third for the second successive season. They have the best young players in the league and all they need is to apply a bit of consistency to their game and they can finally gain that long awaited promotion.

Modeligo— There was a slight doubt about Modeligo's future a few short weeks ago but thanks to a dedicated bunch of ex players, the club is back in business again. Modeligo only have a small panel of players available to them and like Glenview, they will more than likely struggle for points this season.

Valley Rangers 'B'— Another club who are relying on young players this coming season. The lack of a goal scorer will seriously hinder their chances and although they had a decent start last time, they fell away badly and mid-table would seem to be their best hope.

In summary we expect to see Kilworth Celtic promoted this season, possibly even winning the title. Three other clubs, Accrington, Affane and Clashmore should be battling for the other promotion spot while Glenview, Brideview 'B', Valley 'B' and Modeligo will be waiting for any slip ups.

These are only personal opinions backed up by conversations with some Red House League personalities. Nobody can predict exactly what will happen and maybe some clubs will find inspiration if they disagree with what we have said. Anyway we wish all the clubs the very best for the coming season and let's hope it will be an entertaining one. Next week we will take a look at the first division.

It is afterwards, when one hears from supporters and various other sources all the different incidents of the game, that a player can fit it all together and get an overall picture of the game.

THE IMPORTANCE OF TRAINING

It is easier to recall incidents and happenings which occurred during the weeks prior to an important game. The laughter, fun and enjoyment when travelling to and from training. The concern if one of the panel was injured. Mak-

ing sure the hurley and gear were in good order.

The practical jokes and yarns between all the people involved with the team. Limerick showed their annihilation of Cork in the Munster Final was no fluke when they beat Galway on Sunday last. Big and strong they play a direct, hard game and if they stay together they could become a serious Senior team in a couple of years.

County Board Meeting

P. S. O'Ryan, chairman presided at this long and very argumentative gathering on Monday night of last week.

SELECTORS

Football and football county selectors for 2001 held the spotlight for well more than an hour before agreement was eventually reached. It was mostly about selectors and when Coisde na Peil, County Bord na nOg, the outgoing selectors all became involved in the debate, it seemed as if the board might have to adjourn the appointments until another meeting.

In their submission, Coisde na Peil nominated the three outgoing minor football selectors, Johnnie Hennessy, Ardmore, Pat Nugent, Brickeys, and Michael Monaghan, Butlerstown, to continue in office for a further term.

Sean Whelan, Chairman County Bord na nOg objected to the nomination being made by Coisde Peil, as such appointments, he said, were the prerogative of Bord na nOg. He said it had been taken from them last year and following a protest by Bord na nOg, an assurance was given that the privilege would revert to them for future years.

Tom Cunningham, Coisde Peil spokesman, said it was in their terms of reference that all football selectors would be appointed by them.

Pat Nugent, spokesman for the outgoing minor football selectors, said it was their wish to move up to under 21 as having been with the minors for the past 4 years and knowing the players who will be involved in the under 21 panel, it would be a matter of normal progression that the selectors move with the players. In their submission, Coisde Peil had also nominated the county under 21 football selectors. This group with one exception, who functioned last year.

It was obvious from the debate that everyone was conscious of the tremendous progress made at minor and under 21 football over the past few years and nobody wanted to 'rock the boat' so to speak. The discussion

centred on two issues eventually, i.e. who had the right to nominate the minor football selectors and if reappointed, would the outgoing minor selectors agree

to remain in office for a further term?

Pat Nugent, on behalf of the minors said they would not go against the wishes of the board in the circumstances. On the other issue, it was unanimously agreed by the board that in future, County Bord na nOg will have the right to nominate minor hurling and football selectors and it was further agreed that at the normal monthly meeting of Bord na nOg which was scheduled for the following evening, that the outgoing minor football selectors would be proposed.

In relation to the senior football selectors, the county chairman said that discussions were taking place on the appointment of an outside manager with Coisde Peil and it was expected that a coach/manager would be in place shortly.

Minor Selectors — Johnnie Hennessy, Ardmore, Pat Nugent, Brickeys, Michael Monaghan, Butlerstown and one from the under 21 county champions after the final is played.

RELEGATION GRADING

It was announced that players from intermediate/junior clubs who play in a senior relegation match, do not subsequently require to be regraded, as a relegation match is not an extension of the championship and has only tournament status.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

In accordance with a Munster Council directive a County Development Committee who will pursue development and administration at club level throughout the county, has been set up and will have the following members: Christy O'Brien, Lismore; Tom Hartery, De La Salle, Ann Hogan, Old Parish, Eugene McKenna, WIT, Joe Cleary, Abbeyside/Ballinacourty, Richard Hickey, Tramore, Stan Flynn, Fenor, Bernard Brannagan, Roanmore, Tommy Hennessy, Kill, County Youth Officer, John O'Leary, will act as

chairman until County Development Officer, John Fraher resumes. The county chairman and board members, at this juncture, expressed their very best wishes to John for a speedy recovery.

SPECIAL MEETING ON FOOTBALL

The Munster Council Development Committee, in conjunction with the county board, will hold a meeting here in Dungarvan on Wednesday September 27th. An invitation to every football club, from underage to senior, the county and divisional board officers, as well as Bord na nOg officers, schools representatives, etc. will be invited to attend this convention style gathering to discuss the future of football. Similar meetings are scheduled for the other three weak football counties.

The chairman expressed the importance of support for this meeting and urged all clubs to be represented.

HURLING PROPOSALS

The chairman gave a brief outline of what is being proposed by way of change in the hurling championships and after a short debate the meeting agreed that they would favour change, without committing themselves to any particular formula at the moment.

The feeling of the meeting was that the end of the 'back door' system is now in sight.

UNDER-20 FOOTBALL

Tommy Hennessy, Munster Council, gave brief details of the proposed under 20 football special Millennium Tournament which will shortly commence.

LADIES FOOTBALL

The board unanimously agreed to a grant of £1,000 towards the cost of training for the Ladies football All Ireland on October 1st. The board joined in wishing the ladies every success.

CENTRAL COUNCIL REPORT

This told that the Ferrybank motion which had been referred to Central Council from Congress and which requested that at intercounty level, when referees are being appointed, that a member whose own county is involved, should absent himself from the meeting, was passed.

The Tramore motion which requested that clubs be compensated for handling cash for the sale of tickets when a game is declared to be 'all ticket', was deferred and will

be discussed again next year.

The motion regarding the Tony Forrester and Sonny Walsh tournaments is still under discussion at Central Council and a final decision is expected shortly.

The importance of appointing an official Safety Officer for each county ground was also pointed out in this report as grants/loans, etc. for field development in the county will not be entertained from counties who fail to attend to this matter immediately.

FINANCE

Treasurer Tony Morrissey gave a financial update and listed all gate receipts since the previous meeting.

FRAHER FIELD DEVELOPMENT

The chairman brought delegates up to date on the situation regarding the proposed acquisition of Curran's Boreen. A further report will be available at the next meeting.

CORRESPONDENCE FROM DUNGARVAN CLUB

Paddy Fitzgerald, chairman, Dungarvan club, asked why a letter from his club concerning the senior football quarter final involving, Ballinacourty and Dungarvan, had not been read to the meeting. He said it was a very important letter which expressed his club's anger and concern about what had happened during this game. The chairman said that the matter referred to in the letter was a matter for the GAC. He said it had been dealt with earlier in the evening at a meeting of the GAC and a response was being sent to the Dungarvan

Tourin Celebrate

Just 50 years ago, the small club (once described as a 'whistle stop' between Cappoquin and Lismore) were the toast of the west after sensationally defeating the mighty Mount Sion in an epic county senior hurling final at the Sportsfield in Waterford city. Bhi bhual amach go leoir insan cluice sin and for weeks and months afterwards that contest held centre stage whenever groups met to discuss hurling.

Last Friday night, the Tourin Club held a golden jubilee function to commemorate the victory and guest of honour there was former President, Padraigh O Fainin who met all the surviving members of the 1950 side.

Next Weekend

In fact as the game was approaching its final stage, when the all important goal came to win the Nire an historic victory and the first senior football title of the new millennium, a replay date was being spoken about in the Press box.

Like many previous crunch games between these clubs, there was no more than a kick of the ball between them at the finish. Back in 1989, they drew in the county final at 0-7 each and then Kilrossanty won the replay by 1-4 to 0-3. This year, in the first round, Kilrossanty again won by a

single point, 2-7 to 0-12. With such a record of close encounters between them another 'nail-biting finish' was anticipated and this is what we got. The 'wides' tally was 8 for the Nire and 7 for Kilrossanty and this again indicated the closeness of the contest.

ATMOSPHERE

The weather conditions were damp and overcast, but the early rain cleared away before the programme began. The Dungarvan Brass Band entertained the crowd before parading the teams, both of whom lined out as listed in the splendid match programme. The Deise stand was packed and many of the supporters wore club emblems and one could feel the excitement in the air in the build up to the throw in which came about 2 minutes ahead of schedule.

PLAY

A minute later (27th), Pierric White, who looked to be having a good game in the middle of the field, scored a splendid point to give them a 2 points advan-

tage, a gap that was reduced when Ger Walsh kicked over another good point just on the stroke of the half time whistle to leave the state of play at 1-3 for Kilrossanty and 0-5 for the Nire at half-time.

SECOND HALF

Throughout this half, the tit-for-tat battle continued right up to the last kick of the ball.

Within a minute Connie Wall had the teams level when he kicked over a point from play. Five minutes later Tony Kirwan pointed a Kilrossanty free to send his side in front again, but again, equality was restored within three minutes when Brian Wall converted a free to leave it at 1-4 to 0-7 by the 38th minute. 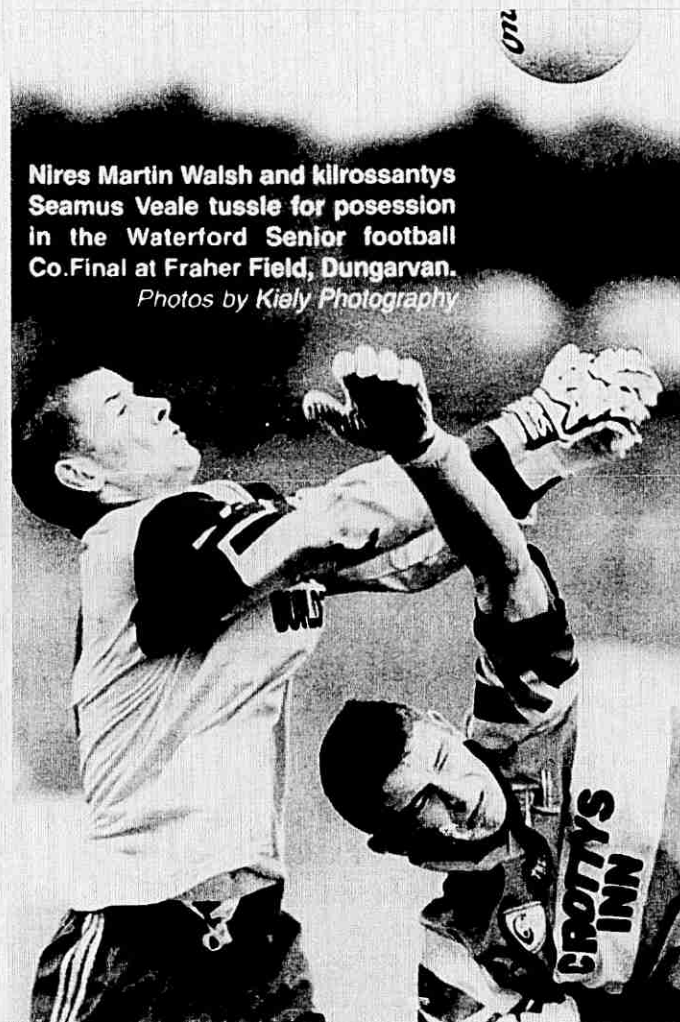
Referee, John M. Kelly, had no problems in handling this very sporting final and as far as I recall, there was no yellow card shown throughout.
