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
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

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The Human Body


Most people are mostly healthy, for most of the time. We can help to improve our chances of a long and healthy life by understanding our bodies and how they work, and what makes them go wrong.

Numerous medical studies and surveys have shown how our health is affected by various factors — what we eat and drink, how much and what type of physical exercise we take, the everyday activities we take part in, whether we take in harmful substances such as tobacco smoke, the way we relate to our family and friends, and even the way we organise our daily routine.

Most of these factors are under our own control (more or less). So it's up to us to give our bodies the best chance. But there are also factors we cannot change sop easily, such as where we live. And we cannot change some factors at all, like the genes we inherit from our parents, which may make us more likely to contract certain diseases.

FOOD AND DRINK

The body needs a varied diet. This includes proteins for growth, body maintenance and repair, starches (carbohydrates) for energy and some fats for energy and maintenance. as well as vitamins and minerals for healthy teeth, bones, skin and other parts. Too much of any single food can cause problems. In general, plenty of fresh fruit and vegetable is helpful. Too much fat, especially animal fats from red meats and rich dairy produce, is not.



MAIN PARTS OF A HEALTHY DIET


Carbohydrates (starches and sugars) breads, pastas, potatoes, rice and other grains. especially wholemeal or unrefined types.

Proteins - In plants such as peas, beans and pulses, grains (and so in breads, etc.) and in animal food such as meats, especially poultry and fish, and dairy produce such as eggs, milk and

Fats - In plant oils such as olives, soya, sunflower and safflower oils, also (but less desirable) in animal meats and dairy produce.

Fibre — In most fresh vegetables and fruits, also unrefined or wholemeal grains and their products such as wholemeal bread or rice.

Vitamins and Minerals - In fresh fruit and vegetables mainly, also most other foods.

CHAMBERS CALL ON MINISTER DEMPSEY TO ORDER LOCAL **AUTHORITY RATES** FREEZE TO HELP COMBAT INFLATION

The Chambers of Commerce of Ireland have called on Environment and Local Government Minister, Noel Dempsey to cap commercial rates at current levels as part of the Government's fight to combat inflation. The call was made recently as CCI published a detailed study on commercial rates that found that businesses in Limerick City pay the highest commercial rates in the

The study "The Forgotton Business Tax" shows that the local authorities increased commercial rates by an average of 4.6% this year. Over the ten years 1991-2000, the average increase in commercial rates was 47% while aggregate inflation for the same period was 22%. Two years ago, Minister Dempsey capped the size of the annual rates increase at 5%. Local authorities in Ireland will spend £1.87 billion this year, of which over £455 million comes from commercial rates

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I have heard that there is a new social welfare means test for pensioners. I am a widow on a reduced pension because I have some money in a savings account. Does

ANSWER

Yes, if your pension is Old Age or Widow's Non-Contributory Pension paid by the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs. This capital assessment test applies to all means tested social welfare payments except Supplementary Welfare Allowance. The means test for these payments takes into account other income you may have and this may reduce your payment. If you have money in a savings account the Department does not look at the actual interest you receive but instead it assesses the capital according to set rules.

Previously the first £2000 was disregarded and the balance was assessed against your payment. However from October 2000 the rules for assessing capital have changed and now the first £10,000 of capital is not assessed. Capital of between £10,000 and £20,000 is assessed as weekly means at a rate of £1 per £1,000. Capital of more than £20,000 is assessed as described in last month's Rights Column.

So, for example, if you are on a Non Contributory Old Age or Widow's Pension and have savings of £16,000 it would be assessed as weekly means of £6. As you may have weekly means of £6 and still receive the full payment you may have savings of £16,000 without your payment being reduced. Uneven amounts are rounded down so amounts between £16,001 and £16,999 are rounded down to £16.000

Your means will be reassessed by the Department of Social Community and Family Affairs according to these new rules for assessing capital and if your savings amount to £16,999 or less and you have no other means you may receive a full pension.

MONEY LENDING AND THE LAW

Have you recently bought goods from someone at your door? Or borrowed cash from a loan company? Do you repay each week to a collector? If the answer is yes to any of the above you may be involved in a money lending agreement. Under the Consumer Credit Act 1995 you, the borrower, have certain rights as well as placing obligations on the moneylender and making certain practices

Did you know that;

- You are entitled to a proper written agreement when borrowing money.
- You also should get a repayment book which should be correctly filled out.
- It is illegal for a moneylender to grant a loan to clear an existing loan.
- It is also illegal for the moneylender to contact you at your place of work without your prior permission.

It is illegal for a moneylender to trade without a licence. Someone who carries on the business of moneylending without a licence is engaging in a criminal act. One simple way of checking is to ask the person to show their licence. Avoid borrowing altogether from a person who does not hold a licence as they are unlikely to carryout their business in according with the provisions of the Consumer

Do you have mud and dirt trodden into the house? Then how about an affordable recreation area that will still tant to remember that the look good in 10 years'

Before you start relaxing this weekend, why not take a while to appreciate the great outdoors and deck out your garden instead? The latest "must have" garden feature. timber decking brings a really appealing rustic feel to even the smallest garden and can be used to create the perfect patio or cover up one that's seen better days. Best of all, it is quick and easy to lay especially if you're a dab hand at DIY.

Before you start, prepare a plan of your proposed deck by doing a sketch on a piece

sists of two elements - a bearer frame and the deck boards which cover it. The bearer frame is designed to provide a perimeter for the deck and accommodate supporting bearers placed at 500mm intervals. It is imporsize of the deck boards (2.4m) x 140mm x 28mm) and the required 5mm gaps between them (to allow for drainage and expansion) will determine the size of bearer frame you will require.

Both the frame and the supporting bearers should be constructed from 3-metre deck bearers nailed together using 150mm nails. Once that's done, attach the deck boards using chipboard screws where the deck board meets every bearer. Finally, prepare the ground by removing grass and applying a weedkiller or, in areas which are soggy or likely to become so, by laying pea

There are loads of accessories and extra items you can add to your deck to make it look that little bit more eye catching - including handrails, wooden benches and pot plants. If you are feeling adventurous, try building a deck around your pond or swimming pool, or designing it around building a pergola

Remember to take safety precautions when working with timber products, such as wearing gloves to avoid splinters and a nose and mouth mask to avoid inhaling dust when cutting.

Do not use any off-cuts as fuel for a barbecue as they have been treated with preservative. Finally, deck boards, like any natural timber, can expand and contract depending on conditions. It is best to leave them outside for a week before constructing your deck. This will enable them to adjust to the atmos-



MELLERAY NOTES

HOLY YEAR CROSS - ANNIVERSARY

This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the Holy Year Cross situated at Knockboy, Mt. Melleray. Fifty years ago, a public meeting was held in Melleray with a view to erecting a cross. A large crowd attended and due to immense local interest in the venture, it was decided to raise money for funds by holding Ceili dances in different venues - Cappoquin, Lismore, Ballysaggart, Funds raised at these events were used for the purchase of gravel and cement. A large number of people from the locality were involved in the building of the Cross, including students attending the college in Melleray at that time; they played their part by bringing gravel and cement to the top of the hill in bags. The cross, which was completed in 1950 was officially blessed in the Spring of 1951 by Rev. Fr. Conleth O.Cist. assisted by Fr. Gerard O. Cist., (deceased) and Fr. Senin O. Cist. (deceased) . A large number of people attended the ceremony.

In 1981 the first Mass took place at the Cross in Knockboy to mark the year of the disabled. Rev. Fr. Tom Paul Geary celebrated the Mass. A further Mass was celebrated in 1987. In recent weeks it was decided that it would be fitting to mark the 50th anniversary of the building of the Holy Year Cross with a Mass in Knockboy, During the past number of weeks, members of the local community, many of whom are descendants of those involved in the building of the Cross have been putting in a tremendous



effort to clear the path towards the Cross and are in the process of painting it to ensure that all will be ready for Sunday Oct. 8th when Mass will be celebrated there at 3 p.m. It is envisaged that all who wish to attend the Mass will be at Mt. Melleray Abbey at 2 p.m. and walk together in procession following the path which leads to the Cross. However, this will depend on favourable weather conditions. Comment 1 - Waste Management Expert says 'Landfills are not a solution'

Professor Schrenk, a leading European toxicologist spoke out against landfills on behalf of Local Authority waste management consultants. He said that landfill was not a solution and was a waste of land and that the waste stayed there for centuries. Also toxic chemicals remained and would be emitted from the landfill. In

landfills, constituents including dioxins and biologically hazardous substances may be released, he said.

Comment 2 - Democracy Under Pressure - Unfair Play

The Lickey Valley Group have tried without success to get definite information regarding the Regional Waste Management Information Plan. To the Group's dismay, they learnt

late that at the last possible moment. Waterford County Council had forwarded a motion to this month's County Council meeting to join in the regional plan. The

Group feels that it is wrong to pressurise councillors to vote on such an important motion without giving them time to consider the implications of this motion once passed.

Misinformation - Doesn't know the rules

The County Secretary Mr. Peter Carey has misinformed councillors on a number of issues at the recent council meeting.

1. The County Secretary described the plan as a clean slate. This is not true. The plan is a follow-on from a strategy which has been in vogue for some years.

2. Referring to the proposed superdump in Co. Waterford, the County Secretary said that there would be 'no question of a regional superdump'. This is not true. Local Authorities are not allowed (by European Law) to refuse waste just because it comes from another county. For this reason, it is likely that a superdump in County Waterford would end up taking rubbish from Cork, Wexford, South Tipperary, Kilkenny and further afield.

3. The County Manager, at the July meeting promised councillors that he would provide written proof of the legislation which he says justifies his decision to ignore instruction from a majority of councillors.

Information provided to date does not indicate that this decision has been vindicated.

Developments not permitted near scenic routes - Did you see that, referee?

In the course of the meeting, it was pointed out that An Bord Pleanala has not permitted a development adjacent to a scenic route and thus that it was unlikely that a superdump would be allowed to be built adjacent to a scenic route as is presently proposed.

The County Secretary said during the meeting that, as regards the Regional Waste Management Information Plan, the Council are signing in principle to a regional solution. It should be recalled that the last time councillors voted against the imposition of a superdump in County Waterford, the County Manager ignored them on the basis that a previous administration had accepted the principle of a superdump in County Waterford.

SUCKLING

Removing Cows In Stages Lessens Weanling Stress

The recent wet weather and rapid decline in grass supply has prompted cattle farmers to think about weaning, particularly the heavier older calves.

Weaning will help stretch grass supply because weaned cows that are in good condition require less grass than lactating cows

Where pasture is limited, leaving a strong calf on the cow will cause a reduction in the cow's body condition, resulting in a higher winter feed requirement if the cow is to meet target body condition score of about 2.5 at calving in spring.

Tetany:- There is also a Grass Tetany risk with unweaned suckler cows at this time of the year if the energy supplies suddenly drops. This typically happens on a wet, windy day if the cows are under pressure for grass.

For example, if you are trying to get an extra day's grazing out of a field and a wet spell occurs, the limited pasture gets very wet and dirty and the cows intake drops drastically. In these situations, move the cows on to better pasture if they are not taking an adequate level of Calcined Magnesite.

Providing some supplementary feed such as hay in round feeders is very useful during risky spells of weather, continue feeding Calcined Magnesite for a period after weaning until cows have settled. The stress of weaning can often bring on Grass Tetany where cows are borderline.

Weaning:- From early October onwards, weight-gain in suckled calves is likely to be declining to well under 1 Kg per day as grass feeding value declines, the cows milk supply dries up and the maintenance requirements of weaning is increasing.

Weanlings intended for sale should be on creep to maintain performance and reduce the stress during sale, in transport and on arrival in the new farm. It is also very useful that weanlings being kept on the home farm are trained to creep as they will also be much less upset at weaning than weanlings that are not on creep. Procedures:-

At Grange, Michael Drennan has found that removal of some cows (those with the older calves first) over a period of weeks causes least stress to weanlings. This is because calves remain in a familiar herd with some cows that have a setting effect on the whole herd. Cows can be removed over a 3 - 4 week period, say one-third on each occasion.

Weanlings should be on creep and have access to good pasture for this to work. Where calves are not on creep, put the herd into a good pasture and remove the cows after a day or two.

Introduce meal immediately, place troughs close to where the calves congregate and put in a small supply of fresh meal daily. Where there is very good electric fencing, cows can be put in an adjacent paddock.

An alternative would be to house the stock, giving the calves access to a creep area and meal. After a few days when calves are eating silage and meal, separate the cows from the calves.

If weaning indoors, cows need plenty of space in order to avoid teat damage while their udders are large before drying off. There is also greater risk of mastitis with indoor weaning.

Farm Incomes Highly **Exposed To Inflation**

critically important for farming because farm incomes are uniquely exposed in an inflationary environment.

Mr Parlon was speaking in advance of the PPF Pre-Budget consultation meeting of the Social Partners in Dublin, and following a meeting with the Minister for other Social Welfare recipi-Finance, Charlie McCreevy in Kildare.

"The main EU supports for agriculture, CAP product price supports and direct payments, contain no indexation for inflation. The market-place for food, whether it is the world commodity market of the highly competitive retail food in Ireland and Europe, will not compensate for excessive Irish inflation.

Mr Parlon said there are major costs of production in agriculture and the primary reason for IFA's involvement in the National Partnership Agreements has been the achievement of economic stability, particularly low inflation.

This year Irish farmers will be purchasing inputs and services from other sectors of the economy amounting to £2.5 billion (almost 60% of their total farm revenue including direct payments). If these costs are inflationary they cannot be recouped from the market; instead they will come out of farm income."

If inflation can be held to 2% or less, which is the goal of the European Central Bank, then ongoing productivity growth in agriculture can offset the effect of inflation. But there is no possibility whatsoever of offsetting an inflation rate of 6% or 7%.

The IFA President said the goal of the 2001 budget must be clear-cut and single-mindland's inflation rate to more acceptable levels.

The buoyancy in the public finances must be used to cut the indirect taxes, VAT and also excise on fuel, which could moderate the consumer price index by up to 2%. Also, income tax must be further reduced, so that real after-tax incomes are protected."



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

The extraordinary amount of £2,507-64 was raised in one

Stradbally G.A.A. club at the recent Race night held in aid of the 'Share-a-dream' foundation. Shay Kinsella, the founder of Share-a Dream was at the G.A.A. club last week to accept the cheque on behalf of the organising committee. Shay explained that he set up the foundation following a bad accident, and during a lengthy recuperation in hospital met a young girl with cancer. Shay vowed to get the money together to send the girl on her 'dream' trip to Disneyland, but she died before he could make it happen. The money went to another seriously ill child and

then Shay was besieged with thousands of requests to make 'dreams come true'. Although £380 million pounds leaves Ireland every year to overseas aid, not one penny of assistance comes from the Government or any other State agency for this foundation. The monies raised come solely from Commit-tees like the Stradbally Race night organisers. Shay showed a very poignant video of different children who have had their dream made a reality by the foundation, all but one of the children featured are now dead. Share-a-dream works with 4,800 severely ill or

physically impaired children, and are inundated by the 128 children's charities in Ireland with requests. The foundation also deals with children who have one of the 250 rare illnesses in Ireland today, who don't have a voice, their aim is to create one special moment in time for each child to cherish no matter how short their young lives are.



PERSONAL APPROACH

In helping a child with ADHD the emphasis should be in promoting the child's development rather than in controlling the behaviour. Many people believe that parents with a child with ADHD are lax with discipline so dictate tighter controls are the answer. COUNCIL NEED TO EXPLAIN RING/OLD PARISH DRAFT DEVELOPMENT PLAN

In welcoming the publication of the Ring/Old Parish area action plan, a local representative has urged Waterford County Council to clarify the planning strategy it proposes in the draft document. Speaking at an Udarás na Gaeltachta meeting in Sligo on Friday September 29th, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair said the detailed analysis in the plan which is currently on public display and open to submission to the middle of December - is of great assistance to anyone interested in the development of the Waterford Gaeltacht region. Cllr. O Ceilleachair added, however, that locals are anxious to establish the practical implications of various measures. Cllr. O Ceilleachair hopes the Council will act sooner rather than

later on his request for open information days to be held in both Ring and Old Parish.

"The three settlement units of Heilbhic, Baile na nGall and Maoil a' Chóirne in Ring are singled out as was the case in the 1999 County Development Plan. Whereas there appears to be an assumption that estate development will not be possible in those areas, there is need to clarify that the application of "open space" or "green belt" guidelines will not result in a complete ban on houses in those parts of the areas concerned.

For areas of Ring outside the three zoned settlement units and throughout Old Parish, there needs to be clarity that individual applications will be treated on their merits. The policy and expectations of the Council in this respect need to be expanded. Questions in relation to availability of sites on what has been farming lands must also be addressed, in addition to the implimentation of linguistic impact criteria in some applications for development. Regardless of the explanation days I am seeking, it is my own opinion that a copy of this important draft document should be distributed to every household in Ring and Old Parish. I hope a positive and balanced outcome results from the debate the County Council has encouraged."

The Dungarvan/Abbeyside area as well as Lismore and Tallow had each the privilege of electing two members to serve in the Irish Parliament and we have records which have been unearthed by the historian Mr. Egan giving the names of the representatives from the year 1559. This is the earliest date for which lists can be found in the Public Record office. The dates of the returns of the Members of Parliament are also given. It should be mentioned that the franchise was a restricted one, probably thirty or forty voters only being allowed to vote, as religion was a barrier to the extension of the franchise, and in almost off cases, the Lord of the Manor had sufficient influence to have his own nominee returned as representative. In looking over the lists of the members for the city and county, we find the names of the Walshe's, the Sherlock's and the Powers as well as the Beresford's to predominate.



Curragh trainer Dermot Weld was out of luck with his recent runner Grand Finale at Belmont Park finishing eighth behind the former Aidan O'Brien trained Ciro. Ciro finished a well beaten second behind Sindaar in the Budweiser Irish Derby but his career had really blossomed since going stateside and he is now considered one of the leading performers in the U.S.A.

Arc hero Sindaar returned to the Co. Kildare stables of John Oxx safe and sound but he has now run his last race this year. A decision on whether or not he continues his career as a four-year-old next year will be taken later on this year.

TRAINER PARKER DIES

Fifty-five year old Scottish trainer Colin Parker died at his residence in Dumfrieshire last Friday. He was suffering from bone marrow cancer since last summer and had been ill for quite some time. One of his best ever horses was Sparky Gayle who went unbeaten through six races during the 1996/1997 season. Sparky Gayle also captured the Cathcart Chase at Cheltenham. His son Andrew has taken over his late father's licence with immediate effect and hopes to have his first runners at Carlisle.

FIRST FOR TWENTY TWO YEARS

Sindaar owned by the Aga Khan became the first Irish trained winner of the Arc since Alleged's second triumph for now retired trainer Vincent O'Brien back in 1978. When informed of the fact that Sindaar is the first horse to win English and Irish derbies and Arc, he said that "Sindaar is an exceptional horse".

COOLMORE BOSS TOPS SHEIKH MOHAMMED

Coolmore boss John Magnier has clashed more than once in the sales ring with Sheikh Mohammed in the past number of weeks. Three weeks ago the location was the sales in Keenland in the U.S. where Magnier went to an astonishing 5.8 million dollars to secure a Storm Cat yearling. THE LATE MOSSIE CASEY

We record the sudden death of a Stradbally Football Legend, Mossy Casey last Friday morning. Mossy was known the length and breadth of the county and followed the fortunes of the Stradbally Club throughout his life. It is fitting that long time friend and team mate Tom Foley gave the following oration at his grave side. Tom sympathised with the Casey family and thanked them for the contribution Mossy made to the Stradbally Club over the many, many years.

"In the early fifties after the golden years of the forties where they won five championships in a row the team was regraded to Junior and for a period in those years it looked as if it would go out of existence and the parish became very worried. Word came through that there were a few promising young footballers in Ballylynch which was in the Faha area. Mossy joined the Stradbally Club. He influenced others to join, his brothers, Pierce, Eugene and Austie, the Connors of Fahafeelagh, the Guirys, the Goughs, Billy Barry, the late Jim Power and mentors Dan and Paudie Flynn and again the nucleus of a team was formed. They went on and won the Junior Championship in 1957 beating Gaultier and returned to Senior ranks.

As a player he was fast and skilful and was a brilliant midfielder. The nearest he ever got to winning a senior medal was in a final in 1961 which Stradbally lost to Mount Sion. Something he yearned for until Father Time caught up with him.

In later years when he visited his local - Crotty's of Leamybrien and when the friendly and not so friendly arguments about football took place with the Kilrossanty Boys he was painfully reminded of his medals. But his day came in that hostelry when his nephews the O'Briens, Eoin, Conor, Fintan, Liam and Mike lifted the Conway Cup three times in the eighties and one of his trademarks was to put two fingers into the top pocket for the

Simple passions, the GAA being foremost. Farming from which he was very successful after coming from a small base. 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
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




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
