Deasy's Merger Investigation Call

Three years after the controversial merger of the South East's two biggest dairy co-ops, the Fine Gael TD and former Minister for Agriculture, Austin Deasy has called for a fullscale investigation to determine if any "sharp practices" were involved in the lead up to the billion pound Glanbia plc amalgamation.

The Dungarvan based Deputy has also launched a scathing attack on the Tanaiste and Minister for Trade and Employment, Mary Harney on what he has termed her "deafening silence" in the wake of the loss of almost three hundred jobs

at Glanbia as a direct consequence of the 1997 merger between Waterford Foods and Avonmore Foods.

Deputy Deasy is now calling on the Tanaiste to initiate a fullscale inquiry into the procedures adopted to bring the merger about. "That" he said, "is the least the three hundred people who have lost their jobs in Dungarvan are entitled to".

Most of those losses came through the closure of the local milk processing plant which became one of the first major casualties of the merger. The company decided that all its future milk processing would be done at

its Co. Kilkenny headquarters at Ballyraggett, a decision that was blasted and vigorously opposed by the trade unions representing the workers directly involved.

Deputy Deasy said that in all the time that had elapsed since the closure of the milk plant in Dungarvan there hasn't been as much as a word of concern from Mary Harney. "People in Dungarvan and in Co. Waterford as a whole, are appalled at the direction the merged company has taken since the hugely controversial amalgamation of the two giant co-ops three years ago", he said.

"I have no doubt", he went on, "that the majority of the shareholders who voted for the merger wouldn't have done so had they known the very weak structure within the Avonmore Group prior to the vital vote".

The Fine Gael TD said the man appointed as chief executive of the newly merged company, Kilmachthomas born Ned O'Sullivan, is now about to leave. "I wonder if he feels he was sold a pig in a poke", said Deputy Deasy.

He said that the Tanaiste should immediately set in motion a thorough investigation into the manner in which the 1997 merger of the Waterford and Avonmore co-ops was presented to the Waterford shareholders so as to determine if there was any sharp practice in the lead up to it.

"Or maybe", he continued, "the Stock Exchange should also have an inquiry into the manner in which the merger was brought about, and explain to the public the reasons for the extraordinary weak share price. The level of that share price on the Stock Exchange has fallen so dramatically that in my opinion there must have been

considerable misinformation about the true nature of the finances and structures of the Avonmore Group".

In response to Deputy Deasy, the Tanaiste, who has given no indication of her willingness to initiate the kind of investigation being called for by him, said she had cleared the merger without referral to the Competition Authority and without any conditions. The amalgamation was approved by

both societies in accordance with the Industrial and Provident Societies legislation.

The Tanaiste has also told Deputy Deasy that she was aware that concerns had been expressed by some members of the merged society in relation to investment stock units issued by Waterford Co-Op, but she added that this was a matter between the parties concerned and not one in which she has a function.

LANGUAGE

Every time you speak you use a complicated system of sounds called a language. A language is a way of organising the sounds to communicate information and ideas.

We use language in so many ways it is impossible to imagine a world without it. Language helps us to describe how we feel, to talk to other people and to learn about them.

Finding words for objects and ideas also helps us to make sense of the world. There are probably between 5,000 and 6,000 different languages in the world today. English is spoken by around 1,400 million people, but many other languages are used by just a few hundred people.

The languages we use today have taken thousands of years to develop, and they are still changing so that we can describe new ideas, inventions and discoveries.

SIGN LANGUAGE

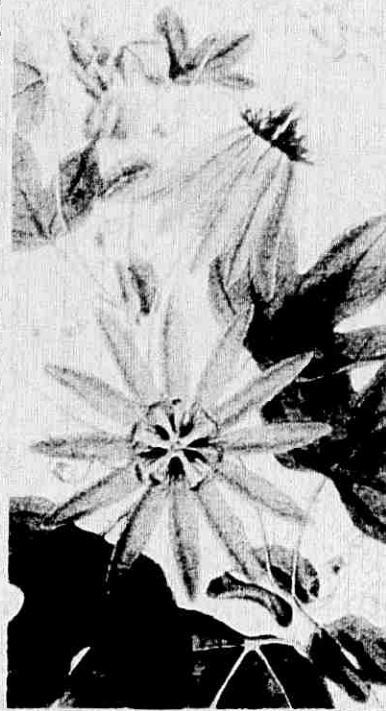
People who are deaf communicate using a language of hand signs. Some signs represent whole words or ideas, such as 'hungry' or 'animal', other words have to be spelled out using the sign for each letter of the alphabet.

LATIN

Latin was the language of the Romans, whose civilisation dominated Europe around 2,000 years ago. Although Latin has not been a living language for centuries, it has continued to be used as a common language in many areas of learning, such as science.

There are millions of different species of plants, for example, but biologists all over the world can be sure that they are talking about exactly the same species because they have an international 'master' list of names.

ESPERANTO

In 1889 an artificial language called Esperanto was invented by Ludwig Zamenhof. His idea was to create an international language that would be easy for everyone to learn.

Esperanto is used at meetings of international organisations, like the United Nations, and is taught in many schools.

There are journals and newspapers in Esperanto, radio broadcasts in Esperanto and the Bible and the Qur'an are among many books translated into that language, but it has not yet been recognised, due to opposition from groups who want English to be accepted as the world language.

LANGUAGE AND IDENTITY

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

How To Grow A Jack-O'-Lantern

THE pumpkin is a warm-season vegetable that can be grown throughout much of the UK. Besides being used as jack-o'-lanterns at Halloween, pumpkins are used to make pumpkin butter, pies, custard, bread, cookies and soup.

WHEN TO PLANT

The pumpkin is a very tender vegetable. The seeds do not germinate in cold soil, and the seedlings are injured by frost. Do not plant until all danger of frost has passed, and the soil has thoroughly warmed. Plant pumpkins for Halloween from late May in cold areas to early July in warmer ones. If pumpkins are planted too early, they may soften and rot before Halloween.

SPACING AND DEPTH

Vining pumpkins require a minimum of 50 to 100 square feet per hill. Plant seeds one inch deep (four or five seeds per hill). Allow five to six feet between hills, spaced in rows 10 to 15 feet apart. When the young plants are well-established, thin each hill to the best two or three plants.

Plant semi-bush varieties one inch deep (four or five seeds per hill) and thin to the best two plants per hill. Allow four feet between hills and eight feet between rows.

Plant miniature varieties one inch deep, with two or three

seeds every two feet in the row. Rows should be six to eight feet apart, with seedlings thinned to the best plant every two feet when they have their first true leaves.

Plant bush varieties one inch deep (one or two seeds per foot of row) and thin to a single plant every three feet. Allow four to six feet between rows.

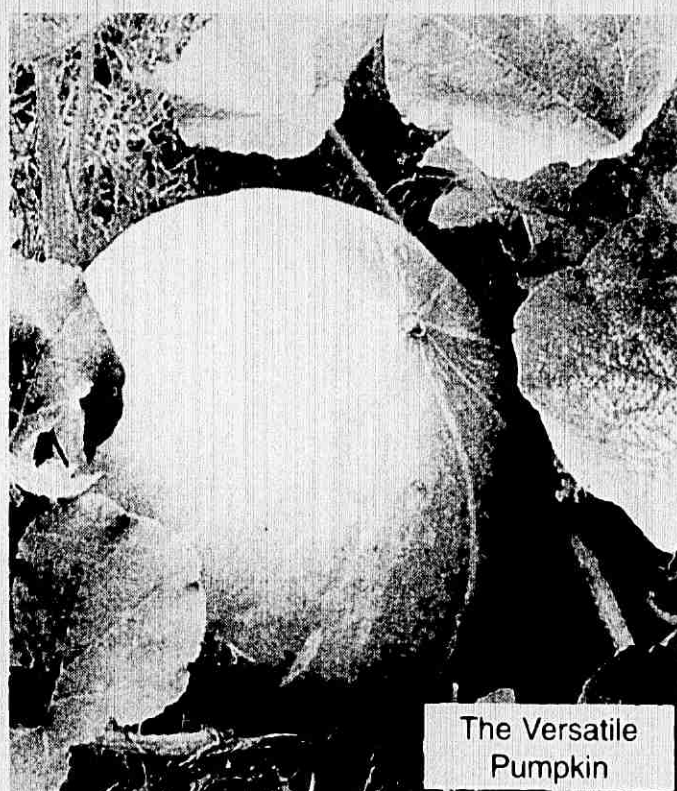
CARE

Pumpkin plants should be kept free from weeds by hoeing and shallow cultivation. Irrigate if an extended dry period occurs in the summer. Pumpkins easily tolerate short periods of hot, dry weather.

Bees are necessary for pollinating squash and pumpkins, but they may be killed by insecticides. When insecticides are used, apply only in late afternoon or early evening when the blossoms have closed for the day and bees are not flying about.

HARVESTING

Pumpkins can be harvested whenever they are a deep, solid colour (orange for most varieties) and the rind is hard. If vines remain healthy, harvest in late

September or early October. If vines die, harvest the mature fruit and store them in a moderately warm, dry place. Cut pumpkins from the vines carefully, using pruning shears or a sharp knife and leave three to four inches of stem attached. Pumpkins without stems do not usually keep well. Wear

gloves when harvesting fruit because many varieties have sharp prickles on their stems.

COMMON PROBLEMS

The main pests faced by pumpkin gardeners are powdery mildew, cucumber beetles and squash bugs.

This Week In The Garden

SOW SWEET PEAS

The best exhibition sweet peas are obtained from sowings made now. Some growers sow outdoors where the plants are to bloom. A better method in most areas is to sow in pots, about five seeds in an 8cm pot, and to germinate them in an unheated frame. Once the seedlings are up they can be ventilated freely - you will only need the lights in very frosty or windy weather. The advantage of this method is that the seedlings are much more under control and can be protected from excessive cold or wet if necessary.

GATHER ALL REMAINING APPLES AND PEARS

Complete the gathering of all apples and pears. It is not advisable to let them hang once the weather gets really wintry. Apples keep well packed in boxes in a cool but frost-proof place, preferably with a slightly moist atmosphere.

Pears keep better in a dry atmosphere. Lay them thinly in a room with an average temperature of 10°C. Never pile them one on top of the other. Watch carefully for ripening.

- Pumpkins contain potassium and vitamin A.
- Pumpkins are used to make soups, pies and breads.
- Pumpkins are members of the vine crops family called cucurbits.
- Pumpkins were once recommended for removing freckles

and curing snake bites.

- Pumpkins range in size from less than a pound to over 1,000 pounds.



- The name pumpkin originated from "pepon" - the Greek word for "large melon."

- Pumpkins are 90 per cent water.

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Council Deplores Large Sums of Money Paid to Eircom Executives

A notice of motion tabled by Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan at last week's meeting of Waterford Co. Council calling on the Council to deplore the large sums of money recently given to executives of Eircom was given the unanimous backing of his colleagues.

Cllr. O'Ryan said the sleaze that had been taking place in the country for some time past is "nobody's business and everybody's business". And while he wasn't alleging sleaze in the running of Eircom it was offen-

sive to ordinary people, and not least the unfortunate shareholders now facing huge losses as a result of investing in the company, to see the millions of pounds paid out in bonuses recently to the top executives of the company.

"It surely is time for the representatives of the ordinary people to stand up and be counted on issues such as this", said Cllr. O'Ryan. "I know that ninety five percent of the people will be behind me on this". He said it was incomprehensible that millions

could be paid out to the Eircom executives at a time when shareholders were losing heavily on their investments. And many of the same investors, he added, had borrowed to buy the Eircom shares.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham in an obvious sideswipe at former Labour leader Dick Spring said that "maybe, the executives need to be paid millions given that one of them didn't have enough money to buy shares when they were first floated".

"We will pass on before we get

too deeply into this", the Fine Gael chairman. Cllr. William McDonald, responded.

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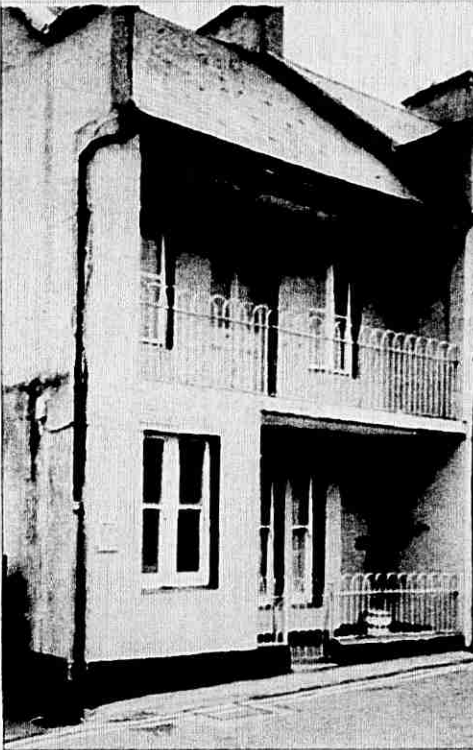

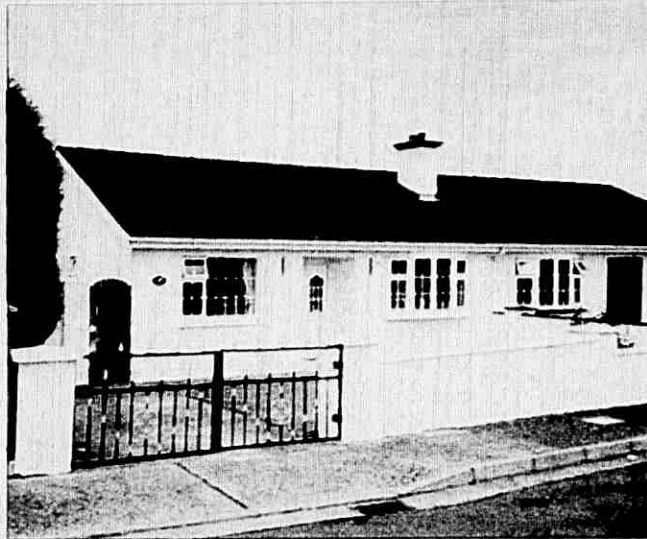

The remains were met and blessed by Very Rev. Maurice O'Gorman P.P. On Saturday morning Requiem Mass celebrated for the happy repose of his soul. Fr. O'Gorman officiated, assisted by Fr. Bluet, Youghal. Following Mass Tom

National Roads Authority Accused of "Turning A Blind Eye"

The National Roads Authority (NRA) has been accused of turning a blind eye and a deaf ear to calls by the elected members of Waterford County Council to carry out road safety improvements at some of the most notorious stretches of the county's main roads.

The accusation was levelled last week by Fine Gael's Cllr. John Deasy, who told the monthly Council meeting that the views expressed by councillors and officials alike on the dangers of certain stretches of their main roads had been blatantly ignored by the NRA.

With the death trap at Cusheam outside Dungarvan on the main N25 Waterford/Cork route clearly in mind, Cllr. Deasy asked, "how many more deaths do we have to have on the roads of Co. Waterford before the National Roads Authority takes us seriously".

"Clearly the views of the Council officials and the councillors are not being taken on board by the NRA, but it is now high time our voices were heard", Cllr. Deasy said.

He then referred to the NRA's "inaction" in relation to the notorious area at Cusheam Cross where several lives have been lost over the years. He said he had specifically called for some safety measures to be introduced at this location but still they are awaiting a response from the NRA.

He warned that there will be still further fatalities in that area unless some safety improvement measures are carried out.

His proposal that they invite a representative from the National Roads Authority to attend a meeting of the Council for a "full and frank" discussion was unanimously supported.

Earlier at the meeting the veteran Fianna Fail member, Cllr. Kieran O'Ryan, referred to the recent continuing carnage on Irish roads when ten people lost their lives two weekends ago. Cllr. O'Ryan said he had raised the issue time and time again, endeavoring in the process to highlight the seriousness of speed and the major contributor it is to that carnage. He said that while the local authorities are spending large amounts of money on improving the roads at the same time the motor manufacturing companies are assembling cars with the capacity to reach speeds of 120 and even 140 miles an hour. "Where is the point in local authorities and other bodies doing what they can when their efforts are falling on deaf ears", said Cllr. O'Ryan who added that the horror story of road fatalities is getting worse by the day. "This" he said "is an issue that should be debated at every Council meeting in the country today".

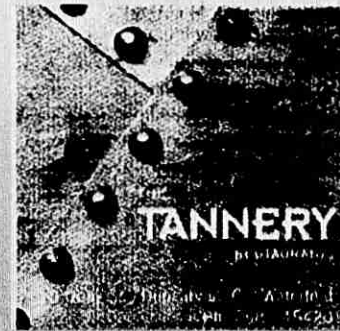

The President of the Chambers of Commerce of Ireland Mr. Tom Clarke referring to the delay in the implementation of the Government Waste Management policy, called on the Government to set up a National Waste Management Authority. He stated that such an authority should develop and implement a coherent strategy based on the spatial planning that strikes the correct balance between the alternative waste management solutions.

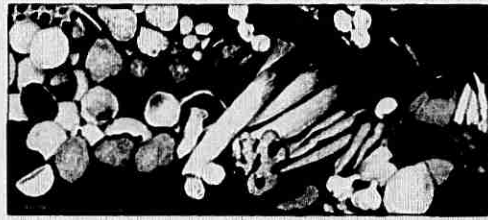

COOKERY CORNER

Spice At Real Speed

Cheats' Chilli

THIS deliciously simple dish is quick, easy and perfect for any occasion, from a dinner party or family meal to a meal on the run.

Cooking time: Approx 25-30 minutes.

Ingredients:

(Serves 3-4)
450g lean minced beef or minced lamb/pork
1 onion, chopped
1 clove garlic, crushed
1 x 5ml sp chilli powder
397g canned chopped tomatoes
397g baked beans
2 x 15ml sp tomato ketchup
1 x 5ml sp dried oregano
1 stock cube
Salt and black pepper

Method:

In a large non-stick wok

or saucepan, dry fry* the mince, onion, garlic and chilli powder until browned.

Add the remaining ingredients, bring to the boil and simmer for 15-20 minutes.

At this stage the chilli can be served with boiled rice or the chilli can be topped.

Potato and sweetcorn topping:

150g instant mashed potato (dry weight)
227g canned sweetcorn, drained
3 x 15ml sp semi-skimmed milk
2 x 15ml sp fresh parsley, chopped
25g low fat cheese, grated

METHOD:

Transfer the chilli to an oven proof dish.

To make the topping, make up the mashed potato as per the packet instructions, stir in the tinned sweetcorn, margarine and parsley.

Top the chilli dish with the potato and sweetcorn mixture



and sprinkle with grated cheese and place under a preheated grill for 5 minutes. Serve with green salad and pitta bread.

• Dry frying is a much healthier method of frying where only the melted fat

from the meat is used. Place meat in a cold non-stick saucepan.

Cook over a low heat until some of the juices from the meat run out, then increase the heat and fry for 4-6 minutes.

Mini Vegetable Croquettes

A REALLY refreshing way to serve vegetables, which should appeal to even the most hard-nosed anti-vegetarian!

Ingredients:

Makes 8 croquettes
100g carrot, grated
100g courgette, grated
100g potato, grated
1 x 15 ml sp plain flour
salt and pepper to taste
vegetable oil

Method:

Squeeze out any excess moisture from the grated carrot, courgette and potato.

You can do this quite easily by putting them on several sheets of kitchen paper, covering them with

more kitchen paper and pressing down on them to soak up any liquid.

Mix the vegetables together in a bowl with the seasoning and the plain flour.

Heat the oil in a frying pan and fry heaped tablespoons of the mixture, flattening with a fork to make eight spiky round croquettes.

Saute them for 5 minutes, until they are golden brown on the outside and well cooked on the inside.

This recipe can be adapted to include a variety of different vegetables such as sweet potato, parsnip, swede, garlic and also broccoli and cauliflower. Whichever ones you use, you must remember to chop them very fine.

A Cake From The Capulets

HAVE a taste of what Romeo tasted after he climbed the balcony – chocolate Juliette.

Ingredients:

(Serves 4-6)
225g milk chocolate
225g margarine
1 egg
25g caster sugar
225g Nice biscuits*
150ml double cream, optional
Chocolate triangles to decorate

Method:

Line a small loaf tin, measuring 19 x 10 x 6cm, with tin foil. Break the chocolate into small pieces, place in the pan with the margarine and heat gently.

Heat until melted, stirring

thoroughly all the time. Beat the egg and the sugar until blended, then gradually stir in the chocolate mixture, a little at a time.

Break biscuits into 1 cm pieces and stir into the chocolate mixture.

Pour into tin and smooth top. Set in fridge for 6 hours (or it can be frozen at this point if you prefer).

To serve, turn the cake out and peel off the foil.

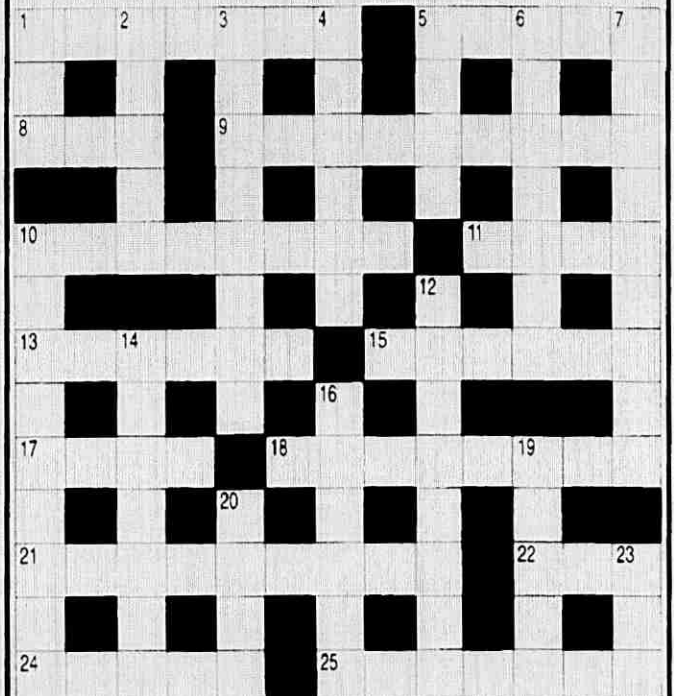
Whip cream, if you're using it, pipe on top and decorate with chocolate triangles.

Health Tips from "Remedies"

Echinacea

USES: Immune stimulant, Colds, Flu, Healing of wounds and other minor infections. The Echinacea (pronounced "A-kee-nasha") herb is one of the most popular herbs used in Europe. It is considered to be the prime remedy for the immune system and this view has been supported by extensive research.

HOW IT WORKS: Echinacea works principally by stimulating a group of cells in the immune system known as the macrophages. These cells have the unique ability to 'eat' matter foreign to the body, such as viruses, bacteria and other particles entering the body as a result of air pollution.

The Science of Farming and Food

Dairying

DRYING OFF

Cows may be successfully dried off even when they are milking three or four gallons per day.

The following procedure is recommended after the last milking.

- ★ Clean the teats with methylated spirits and insert the dry cow tubes 3-4 cms into the teat
- ★ Take care not to contaminate the tip of the tube before inserting it into the teat end. Massage the contents up into the udder and teat dip afterwards.
- ★ Keep the cows on a low plane of nutrition for a week, far removed from the sound of milking or view of cows that are still being milked.

The three weeks after drying off are crucial to preventing problems during the dry period. Recently dried off cows must be maintained in clean housing (if indoors) or on clean pastures.

POACHING

Poaching should be avoided at all costs because:

- ★ Less grass will grow next year.
- ★ Reseeding (expensive) will have to take place more often.
- ★ Sub-soiling or drainage will have to be done.
- ★ Keep cows in or house them once they have grazed out their section during wet weather (after 3-4 hours).
- ★ Allocate square rather than rectangular blocks because this reduces the amount of damage done.

Block graze and back fence from the back of a paddock if cows have sufficient grass for three to four days grazing in one area.

Cattle

HOME GROWN VALUE

There are few feeds better than barley or wheat for finishing cattle and the good news is that Irish cereals have never been better value. Relatively low cereal prices, a record harvest and the effect of a weak Euro on imports from outside the Euro zone have combined to put Irish grain in pole position for cattle finishing. With rolled barley available in cereal growing areas for about £110/tonne at present, it can form the main (or even sole) ingredient of concentrate rations for finishers.

Table 1 below illustrates the relative value available on the feed market at present. The table is based on the average cost of protein and energy across all the listed feeds and each ingredient is rated again this average. Obviously where the value is higher than the cost, the feed is well priced and vice-versa.

Minerals should always be fed to housed cattle and care should be taken when feeding high cereal rations to avoid acidosis - introduce gradually, feed regularly, never feed more than 3 kgs at one time and have fresh clean water available at all times.

PROTEIN FOR CATTLE

Many farmers are reluctant to omit protein from cattle rations and indeed consider higher protein to indicate better quality. It is very well proven that finishing cattle on good grass silage requires no protein beyond that found in barley, beet pulp or similar i.e. about 10 - 12%. Where feeds such as maize silage, wholecrop wheat, sugar beet or fodder beet are fed in quantity, protein is required to compensate for their low levels.

In weanlings and in finishing bulls, where growth is important a 14% - 15% protein inclusion can be an insurance against lower than expected protein levels in silage. This level can usually be attained cheaply by using feeds such as distillers' grains, maize gluten etc.

FARM FORESTRY COURSE

Teagasc in association with the Forest Service is running a 20 Hour course in Farm Forestry commencing on **Tuesday October 24th at 8.00 p.m.** and continuing for seven Tuesdays. The course will take place in the **Teagasc Centre, Main St. West, Lismore.**

There will be five indoor session and two outdoor sessions. The topics covered will include land use options, forest establishment and maintenance, information on economics, grants and premia, live demonstrations, weed control, implications for headage, extensification, Retirement and REPS Schemes.

The course is primarily aimed at those considering forestry as a farm enterprise. It is free of charge due to E.U. sponsorship. All are welcome.

TRAGIC DEATH OF BALLYMACARBRY WOMAN'S NIECE

Sympathy of the district is extended to Mrs. Mary Theresa Walsh, St. Martin's Place, Ballymacarbry on the tragic death which occurred in a road accident on Monday morning of Woodsgift woman Carol Fox, one of the few female electricians in the county. Carol in her early twenties, died following injuries she received in a road accident near Watergrasshill, Cork on Monday morning at 8.10 am. A fully qualified electrician, based in Clonmel, she was travelling to Cork on a work assignment with An Bord Gais when her car was in collision with another vehicle travelling in the opposite direction at Bishops Island a short distance from Watergrasshill on the main Cork-Dublin road. HEPATITIS C COMPENSATION TRIBUNAL

1. The Tribunal is currently dealing with applications from:
 - (a) persons who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C resulting from the use of Human Immunoglobulin Anti-D within the Republic of Ireland.
 - (b) persons who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C as a result of receiving a blood transfusion or blood product within the Republic of Ireland.
 - (c) children or spouses of persons referred to in (a) or (b), who have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C.
 - (d) diagnosed relatives (i.e. parents, brothers, or sisters whether of the whole blood, the half blood or by affinity of persons referred to at (a) and (b) above.
 - (e) persons responsible for the care of any of the persons referred to in (a), (b), (c) and (d) and who have incurred financial loss or expenses as a direct result of providing such care arising from the person being cared for having contracted Hepatitis C.
 - (f) where persons referred to in (a), (b), (c) or (d) have died as a result of having contracted Hepatitis C or where Hepatitis C was a significant contributory factor to the cause of death, dependants of such persons.

POTENTIAL CLAIMANTS ARE REMINDED OF THE RELEVANT TIME LIMITS WITHIN WHICH AN APPLICATION TO THE TRIBUNAL MAY BE MADE.

Subject to S.4 (15) and (16) respectively of the Hepatitis C Compensation Tribunal Act, 1997 persons referred to in –

- (i) (a), (b), (c) or (d) above may only make an application to the Tribunal within the period of 3 years of the date upon which she or he first became aware of the fact that she or he may have been diagnosed positive for Hepatitis C or the establishment day, whichever is the later,
- (ii) (e) above may only make an application to the Tribunal within the period of 3 years of the date upon which she or he first began to incur such financial loss or expenses or the establishment day, whichever is the later,
- (iii) (f) above may only make an application to the Tribunal within the period of 3 years of the date of the death of the person referred to or the establishment day, whichever is the later.

THE ESTABLISHMENT DAY REFERRED TO ABOVE IS 1st NOVEMBER 1997 (cf. S.I. No. 443 of 1997).

ACT OF UNION

There was an election to the Irish Parliament on the 9th January, 1798. Elected for the Dungarvan Borough were Marcus Beresford, Esq. and John Brabazon, Ponsonby, Esq. Edward Lee, Esq. replaced Mr. Beresford deceased.

This closed the representation for Dungarvan in the Irish Parliament for the Act of Union was passed in 1801 and at the next election it was law that the member returned for Dungarvan would serve in the English instead of the Irish Parliament. Waterford County could elect two members, Dungarvan, one; Waterford City, one.

Lismore and Tallow had now no representative.

The first member returned locally under the new order of things was Edward Lee Esq. This Parliament was dissolved on the 24th October, 1806. An election was held in Dungarvan Borough on the 14th November and George Walpole, Esq. of the City of London was returned.

At elections held in 1807, 1812 and 1818 George Walpole was returned each time.

In 1820 William James Clifford was elected.

On the 18th February, 1822, there was another election and George Lamb of the City of Westminster was elected.

The burnt out car and all the litter left by the travellers have been removed. The railings surrounding this green area have been replaced by a much stronger barrier which should be sufficient to keep caravans out in the future. Well done to the Council for acting so quickly regarding the barrier.

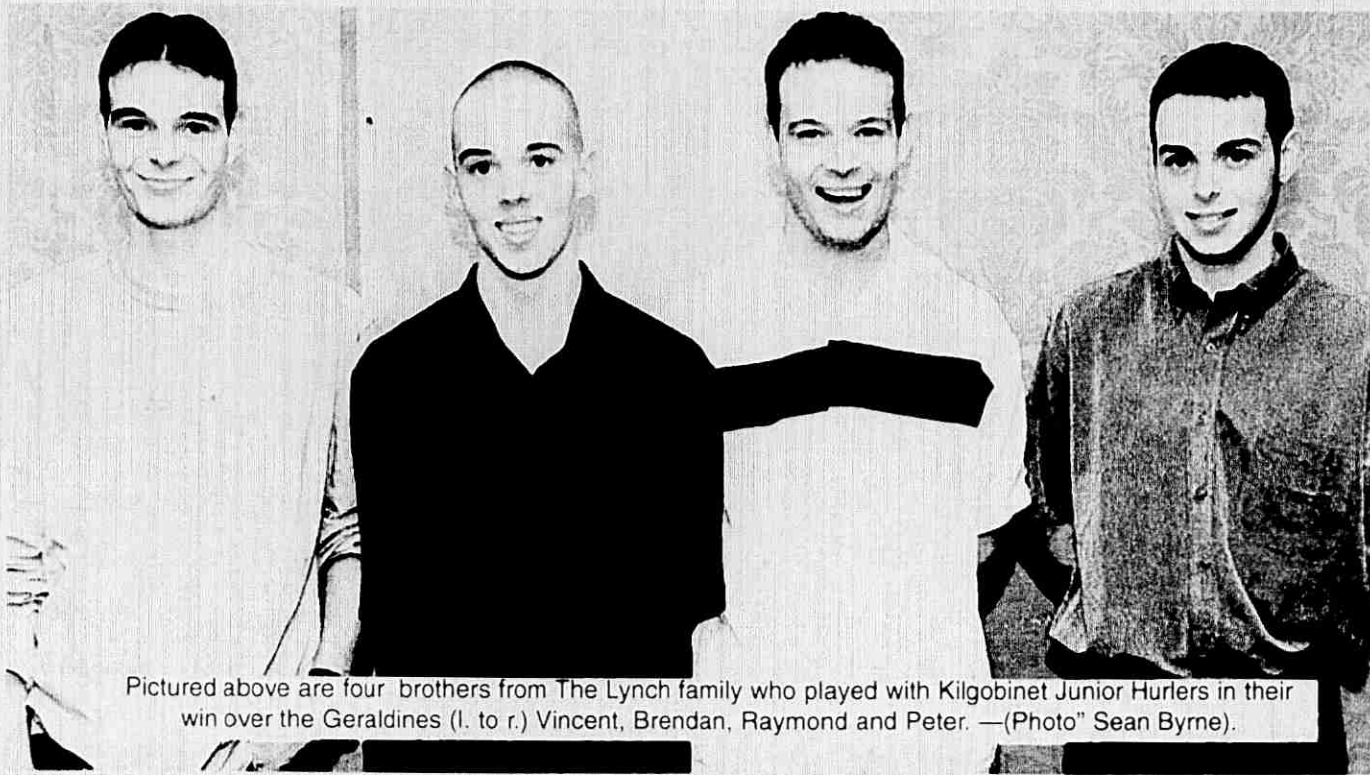
JF CHAMPIONSHIP

G.A.A. NOTES

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

P. S. O Riain, chairman presided at the October meeting of the county board held in Dungarvan on Monday night of last week.

The debate on the way our championships are structured was one of the three main items discussed. The other two, the role of the club and the state of football were also given quite an airing by delegates.

CHAMPIONSHIP STRUCTURES

The clear message coming from this debate was the fact that practically every club is dissatisfied with the way in which they are structured and programmed at the present time.

Liam Moroney, whose club, Tallow submitted the motion to have this whole business examined well in advance of the 2001 championships, opened the discussion and outlined the reasons why the club had submitted the motion. He emphasised that his club were not blaming any of the board officers for the haphazard way in which the championships are run. He referred to the long delays between matches and the subsequent pressures when clubs are required to play matches in close proximity to each other. Part of the blame for this was the shut down of the championships in order to allow intercounty players to train.

The county chairman said that all the blame could not be levelled at the intercounty players. We have, he said, applications for postponements for such matters as "stag Parties," "hen parties," honeymoons, christenings, examinations, holidays, weddings, etc. etc. It was also pointed out that with players playing minor, under 21, junior, intermediate and senior in both hurling and football, the matter of producing a master-fixtures list, would be an impossibility.

About 30 delegates in all contributed to the discussion on the subject and while a couple of new formulas for the senior championships were mentioned, these were not debated as the actual structuring of the championships will have to be left until the new board is elected.

In winding up the debate Liam Moroney said his club will be very happy with the interest shown in their motion which, he felt, had highlighted many of the problems associated with the championships.

THE ROLE OF THE CLUB

When introducing acting Development Committee

chairman, John O'Leary to explain what was involved in the development programme which is being put into place immediately, the county chairman referred to the unhealthy state of the majority of clubs in this county at the present time. He referred to the difficulties in getting people to take up officering in clubs, etc. He said it was imperative that all clubs co-operate to the limit with this committee. John O'Leary outlined the programme and the topics that will be dealt with when a member of this ten man committee visits a club. Every facet of GAA activity will be dealt with.

Earlier in the meeting when the championship structures were being debated, falling attendances at our club championship games was one of the matters highlighted. Massive increases at intercounty matches, a huge increase in the 'armchair spectator' who is given first class viewing of our games on TV, etc. is having a damaging effect on the less glamorous club matches. Despite the massive sponsorship by the multi-nationals at top level in the association and the increased glamour of our intercounty games, the club which is the cornerstone of the GAA is losing out badly and delegates discussing the matter were wondering where it will all end.

FINANCE

An update on gate receipts was given by the treasurer, Tony Morrissey, and these are seen to be down on the previous season.

The chairman reported on the negotiations concerning the purchase of the land at the north side of Fraher Field. Nothing is finalised and further meetings will be held with the county manager and his officials.

PLAYER PERSONAL INSURANCE

A communication from Croke Park informed the board that as of now, only 92 players in this county have availed of the scheme which costs a mere £20 per player. The county board were asked to urge many more players to become involved in the scheme. Jimmy O'Gorman said the big objection by players was that under the terms of the scheme, no benefits would be paid until after the seventh week and most injured players would have returned to work by this time. Clubs were asked to inform their members of the benefits of the scheme.

FOOTBALL AFFAIRS

When it was reported that only 8 players turned up for senior football training at a session in the previous week, some criticism was levelled at those in charge and many delegates made it known that they were unhappy about the situation. One delegate described it as a disgraceful situation at a time when we are only weeks away from the first round of the national league. It was suggested that the under 21 football selectors take over.

Note — It was subsequently learned that the fact that only 8 players were present, gave a totally misleading picture of the true position. The facts subsequently revealed that twelve members of the panel of 24 were club tied and engaged in championship action within a day or two of that training session. Five of these were involved in the Abbeyside/Fourmilewater 1/H final. Panelists from Kill, Ardmore and Tramore were also championship tied, one player was in the USA and two players were in Spain on holidays. One member of the selection committee told me that their members were 'livid' at some of the irresponsible comments that were made when discussing the subject. He said that football selectors in Waterford have a very difficult task and not too many people are anxious to become involved.

CONVENTION TO BE RESTRUCTURED

Not before time, the executive committee of the board have decided to obtain permission of the board to ex-

amine the running of the annual county convention with a view to making it run more smoothly.

The chairman stated that he was appointing the following committee: Seamus Grant, Tony Morrissey, Seamus O'Brien, David Kirwan, Declan O'Meara and Eddie Cunningham, who will discuss the matter and come back to the November meeting with recommendations. The county chairman will chair the meeting.

OTHER BUSINESS

Several delegates expressed their disappointment at the decision to have the replay of the Football All Ireland fixed for a Saturday. One delegate said it was downgrading the showpiece of our most attractive championship. There were complaints about the manner in which the presentation of trophies was done at Croke Park after the All Ireland and about Sonia O'Sullivan doing the 'lap of honour' before most of the crowd were in Croke Park.

The Central Council Delegate was instructed to take up the matters with Croke Park.

FOOTBALL CHANGES

Unexpectedly, the delegates at the Special Congress on Saturday dealt more cautiously than had been anticipated, with the proposed format of the All Ireland senior football championship. They were not prepared to change the rules and allow the proposals to become permanent, as had been asked by the committee. Instead they went for a two-year experiment which means that if they do not work or if counties do not like the idea, then the championship, without congress approval, can revert to the way it has been heretofore.

The changes are:

1. The 4 provincial champions will qualify for the quarter-finals;
2. An additional All Ireland qualifier will be played as follows:
3. Round 1 will include all counties who do not qualify for the provincial semi-finals. These 19 teams will be reduced to 16 by playing preliminary rounds. A draw will take place among this 18 and played knockout.

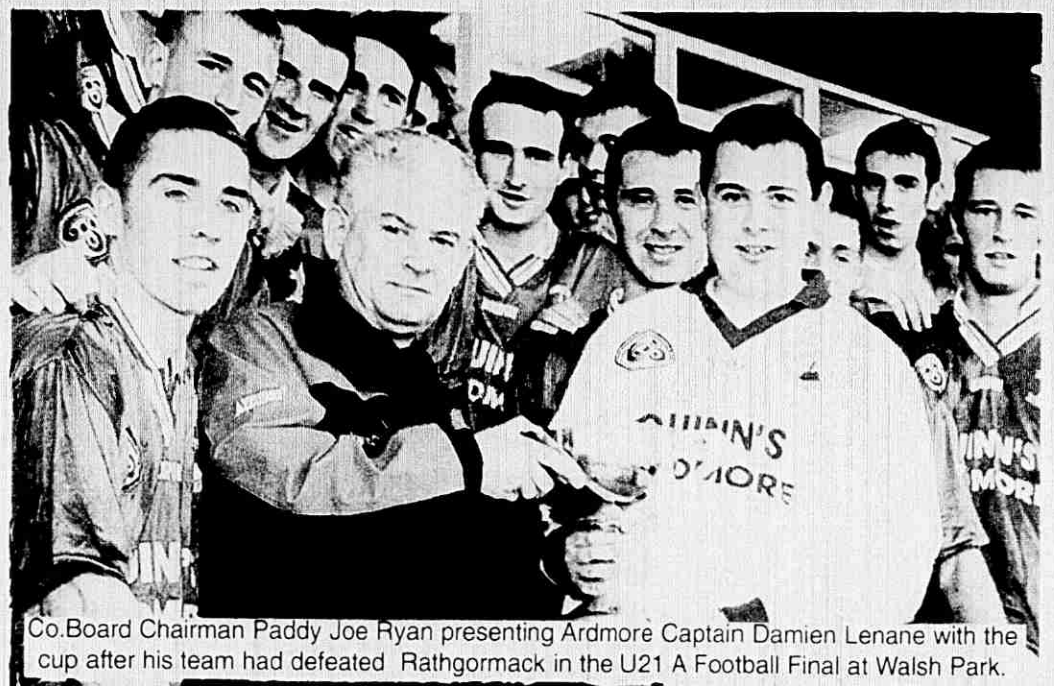
The 8 winners will play the defeated semi-finalists

The 4 winners from round 3 will be drawn to play the 4 provincial winners in the semi-finals. The semi-finals will be decided on a rota basis.

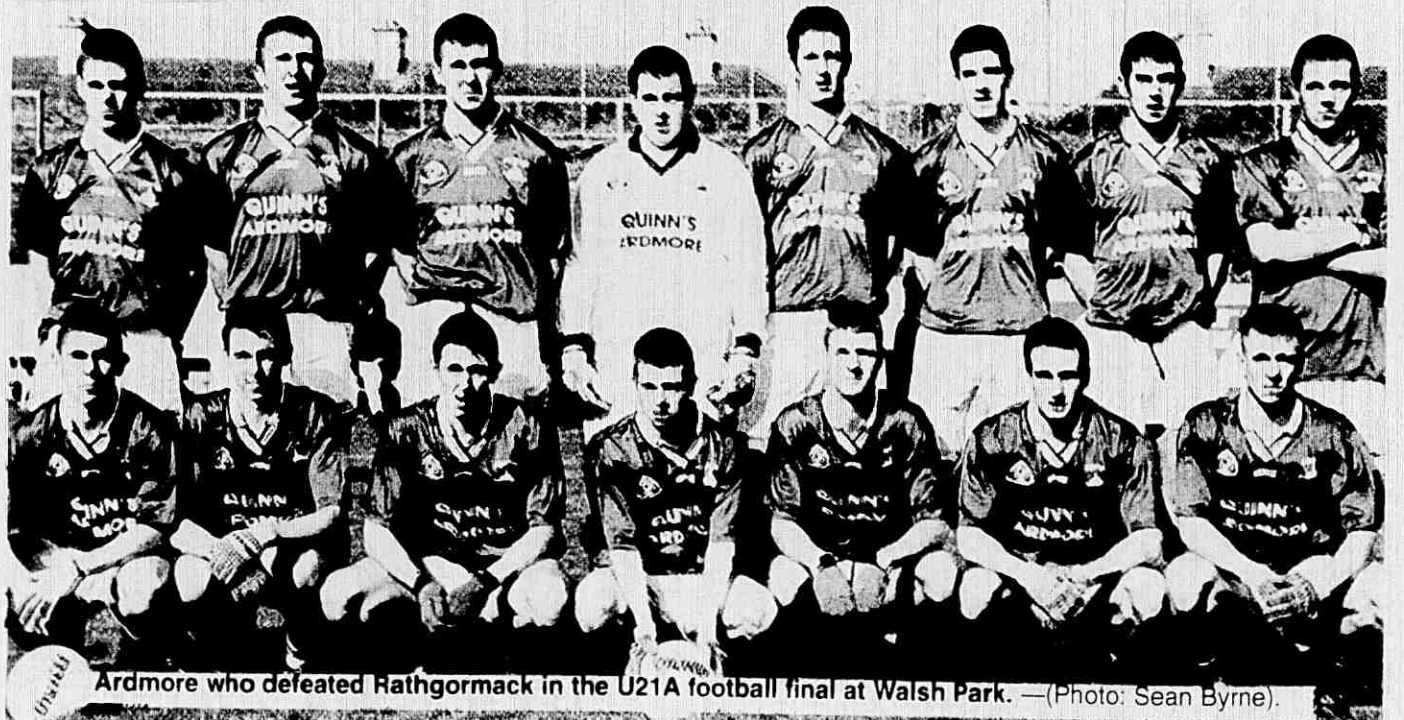
The championships in all 4 provinces will commence 2 weeks earlier than before.

MIXES FORTUNES FOR U-16 HURLERS IN NENAGH CO-OP TOURNAMENT

It was a day of mixed fortunes for our U-16 hurlers on Saturday last in Dundrum. As we arrived at the venue at 10.45 a.m. for an 11.15 a.m. start we could see that the overnight rain had left the pitch in a very wet and murky state. We took the field at 11.05 only to learn that Wexford who were our first opponents of the day had been unaccountably delayed. We waited a full hour for Wexford with no luck. At about 12.00 p.m. the Dublin team arrived and at 12.30 p.m. a full 90 minutes after we first took the field, the first of our games took place against Dublin and not Wexford as fixed.

This game produced very little open hurling and it was very obvious from the way Waterford played all through this game that the 1 1/2 hour wait had played on their concentration and hurling. Dublin were deserved victors on a scoreline of 0-7 to 0-5

in which woeful wastage of clear cut changes by the Waterford forwards proved fatal.

Disappointment was definitely the mood in the Waterford camp after this as we approached playing a very confident and useful Wexford

team.

To their eternal credit this team lifted themselves and put on a five star performance to beat a very good Wexford side on a scoreline of 3-6 to 2-6. This turned out to be the best hurling game of the group section as Wexford duly beat Dublin which vindicated the view of the Waterford camp that the 1 1/2 hour wait for the first game cost us the Dublin game.

We were to have another stroke of bad luck in the quarter-final draw and we missed out on finishing top of our group by one solitary point and that meant we were paired against a crack Galway outfit who already had accounted for a very fancied Kilkenny side. If we had finished in top spot we would have had the easier draw of Tipperary "B" team in the quarter-final spot. Regardless of that Waterford again put on a very brave display and would have not been flattered at half-time if we had a four point lead but again our forwards were guilty of woeful wastage of very good scoring chances. Galway took over in the second half and ran out convincing winners.

There was much more than bad luck and bad organisation involved in the teams defeat and could not be fully used as any type of excuse.

As a team we were as good, if not better, than any other up to midfield but when it came to the forward division we were sadly lacking. The team needed a leader in attack at centre forward but this was sadly missing on Saturday. Also we needed a physically aggressive full forward. In a nutshell our forwards were not able to shift tackles and return same, their ability to take advantage of good possession and to take scores under pressure was clearly evident.

This team must be brought forward from this on. A very comprehensive programme must be put in place at U-17 level which incorporates coaching, management and improving the skill level of the game.

If this is not done Waterford hurling will continue to play catch-up on all the big guns of hurling and will decline very rapidly to the lower sections of hurling.

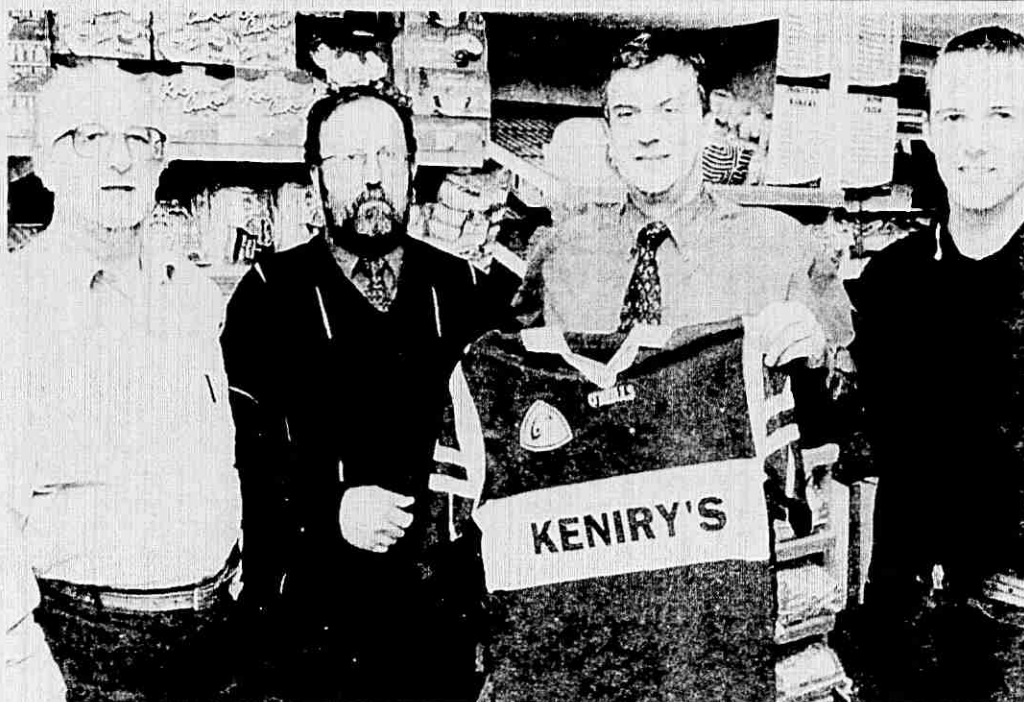
We need now in place U-13, U-15 and U-17 plans for hurling which will stop the present rot in Waterford hurling. We are at this moment a long way off the pace. We also need at club level a more comprehensive coaching system which emphasises all the aspects of hurling we are falling down on and also referees must allow forwards within the county to take the type of pressure and punishment meted out at inter county level and not be wrapping up in silk gloves.

We thank all the panel for their efforts in this campaign and also the selectors for their hard work.

We were very appreciative of the presence of county chairman Sean Whelan on Saturday and his words of encouragement both before and after the tournament.

Their calls will be duly returned, as soon as possible.

The system is now up and running and is currently proving very effective.

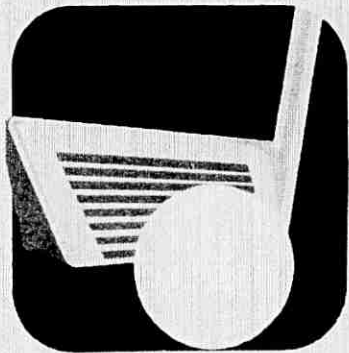

"Rory Wyley Is An Extraordinary Man" Says Cycling Legend Sean Kelly

Cycling legend Sean Kelly has described his lifelong friend, Rory Wyley as an "extraordinary man". Last week the Dungarvan based professional photographer celebrated his 72nd birthday, and has well and truly earned Kelly's accolade after completing a grueling 330 mile cycle over four days from Waterford City to Letterkenny in Co. Donegal.

One hundred and thirty riders from the four corners of the country with a few from the UK added in for good measure participated in the Blazing Saddles Cycle organised by the National Council For The Blind and sponsored by Hibernian Insurance with the Dungarvan / South Tipperary branch of M.S. among the beneficiaries.

Rory, a proud grandfather, was the oldest participant by the proverbial mile, but he was right up there with the pack from first pedal to last. They averaged more than eighty miles for each of the four days, with some of the stages involving tough uphill climbs.

"I found the final stage to be the most demanding, with Ballygawley Hill outside Omagh a real tester", Rory said. However, he came through it with flying colours and was as fresh as any of his colleagues when the finishing line was reached in Letterkenny.

While marathon cycles are absolutely nothing new to him, Rory confesses to having had "second thoughts" about taking on the Waterford/Letterkenny challenge. "I might not have done it but for the persuasiveness of Sean Kelly, but now that it's behind me I'm delighted that I did", he said. Rory has always kept himself as fit as a fiddle and

last month he took part in a 112 mile cycle for the local branch of the M.S. (multiple sclerosis), which included a backbending climb over the famous Vee in South Tipperary. In successive years he also completed a Dungarvan - Dublin cycle (130 miles) for the same deserving cause. Cycling has been his great sporting love from an early age when he competed successfully around the country for a number of years, including the FBD Ras when it was just a two day event. He gave up competitive cycling when he married but subsequently renewed his interest and has been peddling in his own words "for enjoyment" ever since. Two of his sons Gerard and Rory jnr., also followed dad in the sport. Gerard chalked up many victories and also participated in the FBD Ras on two occasions while the younger Rory, who lives in Maidenhead, is a member of the Thames Velo Club in England. He has distinguished himself in all of the top races in Britain and took part in this years FBD Ras. He also has a time trial of 54 minutes and 34 seconds for twenty five miles to his credit.

Even though he is now into his seventy third year since last Wednesday Rory continues to ride out three times a week, averaging forty five miles for each cycle. Nor does he see himself putting his bicycle away "for some time yet". "I'm fitter now than I was a decade ago, and I intend to keep going for as long as I am enjoying it", he said.

In an era when lack of exercise is threatening the health of the nation, no surprise at all then that Sean Kelly should describe his Dungarvan friend as "an extraordinary man". It's a description that fits Rory Wyley like the proverbial glove.
