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Teenager On Abduction Charge Still In Custody

At the time of going to press the teenage Co. Water- trict Court which lasted little more than a quarter of an ford woman who allegedly abducted a day old infant from the Erinville Maternity Hospital in Cork city last Sunday night is still in custody

The incident, which sparked off a massive garda response to it, ended on a note of high drama last Monday morning when nineteen year old Susan McGovern, with an address at Kilbrien, Ballinamult, Dungarvan, was taken into custody by gardai in Mi-

After several hours of questioning by senior garda officers Ms. McGovern was brought before Judge Michael Pattwell at a special sitting of Midleton Dis-

McGovern, who was represented by solicitor Donal Daly, spoke only briefly to confirm that she is currently unemployed. She was then granted free legal aid.

When the abduction charge was put to her, prosecuting Supt. Liam Hayes asked that she be remanded in custody to the Bridewell Garda Station in Cork until the following morning. The application was not opposed by her solicitor and Judge Pattwell then acced-

On Tuesday morning the accused appeared before Judge Uinsinn MacGruaire at a sitting of Cork District

Court and this time her solicitor made an application

However there were strong garda objections to the application on the grounds that they feared she might not stand trial if given bail.

The prosecution pointed out that the accused woman does not have a permanent address and that at one stage she was sleeping in her car.

Judge MacGruaire remanded McGovern in continuing custody, but indicated that he would be prepared to hear evidence from her parents this morning (Wednesday) on the issue of residence when he could again consider her application for bail.

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
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
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HE WAY WE LIVE

The similarities between these groups of languages could mean that many thousands of years ago tribes from northern Europe moved south into Asia.


Over the centuries Indo-European developed into the many different languages spoken in these countries today, but certain words and structures remain the same.

BODY LANGUAGE


It is often not just the words that matter when you speak, but the way you say them and the signals you give with other parts of your body, such as the expression on your face or the gesture of a hand

It is impossible to give an accurate figure for the number of languages there are in the world. As people explore the world and discover new communities, they find new languages. But languages are also disappearing. When more widely spoken languages are introduced into remote communities the native language often becomes forgotten. A quarter of the world's languages have fewer than 1.000 speakers often just a hundred or so people - and these languages will almost certainly disappear over the course of the next half century.

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KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I am on Disability Allowance and I understand I am eligible to do a FAS Community Employment scheme. Will I be able to keep my Disability Allowance?

Somebody on a disability payment may be able to keep their payment while on a Community Employment scheme if the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs agrees to it. However, they will only be paid the single adult Community Employment allowance (£96.75 from May 2000) even if they have dependents. How this allowance affects your payment depends on whether it is a means tested payment or a PRSI based payment.

Both Disability Allowance and Blind Person's Pension are means tested payments. You can earn up to £75 per week from 'rehabilitative type' work without it affecting your payment. The first £75 of your Community Employment allowance will be disregarded. The remainder will be deducted from your disability payment. A single person would receive £96.75 from the scheme and £57.50 Disability Allowance (£61.50 Blind Person's Pension). You will keep your secondary benefits including your Medical Card and Fuel Allowance and a percentage of your Rent Allowance. However, if you are receiving Blind Welfare Allowance from the Health Board it may be affected. Disability Benefit and Invalidity Pension are PRSI based payments.

You will be paid your full disability payment as well as the Community Employment allowance but you may have to pay income tax. You will keep your secondary benefits including your medical card but you will lose your Fuel Allowance. Providing your total income does not exceed £250 per week you will keep a percentage of your Rent Allowance.

For those who keep a percentage of their Rent Allowance they will receive 75% in year 1, 50% in year 2 and 25% in year 3. Further information is available from the Citizens Information Centre below.

MONEYLENDING AGREEMENTS

To be legally enforceable a moneylending agreement must have the following four elements:

- It must be in writing, with the names and addresses of all parties to the agreement.
- Signed by the borrower and the moneylender.

 The borrower must receive a copy of the agreement at the time it was made or within 10 days of making it.

The agreement must contain details of the right to cancel within 10 days of receiving a copy of it. This is called the coolingoff period. You can only cancel the agreement by giving notice in writing. Be aware, however, that the moneylender may require you to sign away this right by a separate signature on the agreement before they give you the cash or goods involved. The words "moneylending agreement" must be clearly stated in an obvious position and the agreement must also set out the following details:

- Amount and Date of loan
- Details of collection charges
- Amount, number and timing of repayments
- Rate of Interest
- Total amount payable
- Date loan ends
- How to repay early and the amount of rebate you are entitled to for doing so. A rebate here means that if you decide to repay the loan early, the moneylender is not entitled to charge you interest for the full length of the agreement.

You must also get a repayment book from the moneylender. All payments against the loan must be recorded in this and should state the amount of loan outstanding after each payment. If you have any queries about Money Lending Agreements or any budgeting matter please contact you local MABS Office.

MINISTER ANNOUNCES PRELIMINARY RESULTS OF MILK QUOTA CHANGES

The Minister for Agricul- quota regime. ture. Food and Rural Develtoday outlined the prelimi-

He said his main objective opment Mr Joe Walsh TD in introducing the changes in April was to provide comnary results of his changes to mitted dairy farmers with the management of the milk greater access to permanent

quota at a reasonable cost. The rigid link between land and quota and the volume of dormant quota which existed had hindered the efficient restructuring of the sector.

Even at this early stage, the benefits of the new regime are very clear. Over 62 million gallons of quota have been made available under this years restructuring scheme to active milk producers. This is almost equivalent to the total quantity restructured during the past 5 years. The positive response of the Minister for Finance in the tax treatment of purchases under the scheme had helped considerably in making it a success.

The Minister stated that this year's Restructuring Scheme, together with future schemes will have a significant impact on the structure of the dairy industry. A preliminary analysis of the effects of this year's scheme shows that there has been a significant increase (in the region of 13%) in the number of producers with quotas in excess of 35,000 gallons even compared with last year. In addition about 90% of the quota was taken up by producers in

the small to medium size categories. He was heartened to see that such a significant number of producers in these categories had the commitment required to invest in expanding their enterprises and to better prepare themselves for the future.

The Temporary Leasing rules had also to be amended to take account of the impact of the Restructuring Scheme and he was happy that, even in this first transitional year, the schemes had worked extremely well together.

The Minister went on to say that he had asked the Milk Quota Appeals Tribunal to consider cases where producers, for reasons outside their control, still have significantly less quota available than they had last year. The Tribunal will also be dealing, as they have done in the past, with cases of severe hardship.

The Minister concluded by saying that he will shortly announce details of the criteria that will apply to partnerships in the dairy sector. He had already made legal provision for partnerships with a view to bringing more flexibility into the sector.

The Science of Farming and Food MANAGING TIME ON THE FARM

Due to shortage of labour and increasing demands on time many farmers find it necessary to work harder and longer hours. Matt Ryan, Teagasc Specialist spoke following the award presentation, on time management. He did not have ready made answers to solve peoples problems but he did send people home thinking about their approach to working their farm.

What Are The Ways To Better Time Management?

- a.Time Planning
- b. Time Saving
- c.Work Shedding

How do I do time planning on my Farm?

You must sort out the urgent duties and jobs from the important duties. They are not the same. Important activities are those which contribute to the achievement of your job objectives. Therefore, for you as a farm manager important activities might include briefing employees/contractors, keeping accurate performance records (Profit Monitor), making reports to banks, or accountant, submitting premia claims on time etc. These activities must get priority over other jobs that appear urgent and pressing. How Do I Address Time Saving On My Farm?

Simply identify what time you spend on each job for a few days in spring, summer, autumn and winter, from the time you start until you finish in the evening. For example, if you spend five hours per day milking, if you spend three hours per day feeding calves, if cows are very slow walking to or from parlour, if office work is time consuming and frustrating, etc. then you must look at putting in place time saving devices or activities

What Work And When Should I Shed It Off To Someone

After embarking on some level of planning and having as many time saving activities/devices as possible in place. you still find yourself working hard for long hours, then you must shed, or get someone else to do some work for you. It may be getting the Farm Relief Service to milk for you once or twice per week, getting them to feed calves, or provide any of the other services they give. You could get a contractor to spread more of your fertiliser or slurry, as these can be very important/urgent chores when you are very busy. You will now have a little more time to do important/not urgent duties such as doing the calf register, making area aid or premia claims, planning your grassland programme for early let out etc.

MEAL FEEDING

A good investment if required.

Strong weanlings, dry cows in good condition and store cattle being grazed on your farm next year should not get dry meal this winter unless silage is very bad.

The following are the meal feeding levels recommended per day with 70% DMD silage:-

Fattening Steers - 4-5 Kgs. Fattening Heifers - 2.5-3 Kgs. Fattening Cull Cows - 3 Kgs. Strong Weanlings - None. Small Weanlings - 2 Kgs. Dry Cows (C.S. 2.5+) - None. Dry Cows (C.S. 2.5 or less) - 1-2 Kgs. Autumn Calvers -7-9 Kgs. Spring Calvers - 1-2 Kgs. Incalf Heifers and Second Calvers - 1-2 Kgs

For every 5 units DMD change in silage quality increase or decrease meal feeding by 1 Kg. Most of the stock listed above do not need minerals. Except weanlings who need 2-3 oz. per day.

IFA/FBD EUROPEAN TOUR

Co. Waterford Farmer Gets Insight To European Farming

Lismore winner of the 2000 IFA/FBD European Scholarship Tour in Co. Waterford was one of a group of farmers drawn from 925 IFA branches for their voluntary help in developing the Associations membership. Here he writes of his experience on his visit to Spain and Portugal and outlines some of the challenges and opportunities which Iberian farmers pose for Ireland's farming and food

The 2000 IFA/FBD European Scholarship tour took over 30 farmers from the IFA Executive regions to see for ourselves how the farming colleagues in Spain and Portugal do their business and what concerns they have for their future in farming. We observed the ways in which Mediterranean farmers are working to overcome the many major structural and climatic challenges confronting

Spain is a huge country, with approximately 40 million people and with a tradition of small scale farming. The country's main crops are olives, vines, maize and hard wheats. Grass, particularly in the South of Spain is rare. Water supply is an issue everywhere with increasing costs of production through irrigation making a difference as to whether it is commercially or technically viable to operate certain types of farming. Good availability of water can quadruple the value

Spanish beef farmers are huge importers of Irish weanlings. During our visit we meet the President of Aprovac, the largest group of beef producers in Spain. He emphasised the need to prepare weanlings properly for export. They should be weaned to a period before sale, treated for worms, viruses and eating a good level of concentrate. The sale processes and the journey to Spain can be stressful on animals and he praised the quality of livestock transport from Ireland. Spanish beef farmers feel that the price of weanlings in Ireland is too high. He said this was not sustainable and looked forward to the Enlargement of the EU and a time when Spain could freely import weanlings from countries such as Poland at much cheaper prices. Obviously we had something different to say to him on weanling prices!

Portugal is a country which has made massive improvements to the road and transport infrastructures over the last 10 years. We travelled from city to city almost always by motorway. Many Portuguese farmers were disappointed at the level of support and compensation they got for this road infrastructural development across their land. Certainly in Ireland where we

infrastructural development, our organisation has a big job of work to do to ensure that those farmers affected are fairly treat-

Milk production in Spain and Portugal is all done indoors with a cereal / maize based diet. Yields are between 9,000 and 10,000 litres and milk prices are much the same as in Ireland. Farm labour costs are the equivalent to about £600 per month and the cost of production is higher than here due to feed costs and water irrigation. Many Dutch farmers have moved to Spain and Portugal and have established large dairy farms there.

We visited the largest state owned farm in Portugal with 50,000 acres of land. It grows an abundance of crops including maize, vines, cork and pine trees and has 3,600 suckler cows finishing all stock to beef.

surprising crops grown in this farm was rice and we had the opportunity to see the crop being harvested. We found it amazing that a crop that requires water all year round was being profitably grown in a country whose main restricting factor to growth was in fact water. The other interesting thing about this farm was that nearly everything produced was processed into added value products. They have their own wine, rice and meat brands, all of which we enjoyed during

It was a fantastic tour, with everybody getting a chance to meet with farmers across Europe and farming colleagues. from all over Ireland. Not alone was it an interesting experience from a farming and food perspective but our experiences of visiting two countries in a short period of time showed us an

of language, the cost of exchanging our money, the benefits of the Euro, the developed road infrastructure across Europe, the differing topographies and the comparisons across so many things that one could only experience by visiting these countries on such a well organised tour.

Not only was it an interesting experience from this perspective, but our visits to Madrid and Seville, Toledo in Spain and Lisbon in Portugal was an experience that will stay with us for the rest of our lives.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank FBD and IFA for this trip of a lifetime and the chance to experience what Ireland is up against in competing with countries like Spain and Portugal and particularly the challenges facing Irish farmers with EU Enlargement into the

It is designed to alleviate the costs difficulty of some herdowners whose holdings are restricted on foot of a herd re-test and where animals are retained and fed during periods of restriction. Potentially eligible herdowners must meet certain conditions including requirements that they
- (i) must not have any income from milk sales, and (ii) must not have any off farm income. The Grant may provide eligible herdowners with a payment of up to £200 per month for a period not exceeding 4 months within the period 1 November 2000 to 30 April, 2001.
- The specific eligibility criteria attaching to the Hardship Grant are outlined in the terms and conditions document which will accompany the application form ER 97. Potentially eligible herdowners will be issued with the terms and conditions document, important notice and application form ER 97 by the District Veterinary Office. Supplies of the relevant documentation will also be available at District Veterinary Offices
- The onus is on potentially eligible herdowners whose holdings are or may be restricted at a re-test at 1 November, 2000 or during the period 1 November, 2000 to 30 April, 2001 to ensure that they obtain and familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions document and application form ER 97. The onus on the herdowner to apply for a Hardship Grant.

Herdowners who received Hardship Grant payments in respect of a previous cycle of the Hardship Grant Scheme can qualify for a Hardship Grant during the current eligibility period 1 November, 2000 to 30 April 2001 provided they meet all the eligibility criteria for 2000/2001 Hardship Grant.

NOTICE MESSAGE TO LANDOWNER/OCCUPIERS

Owners or occupiers of land are obliged under the Roads Act, 1993, to take all necessary care to ensure that trees, shrubs, hedges or any other vegetation on their land is not, or could not be a danger to those using a public road or to somebody carrying out maintenance or improvement work on the road.

Hedge Maintenance

Where labour is available the most friendly method of hedge maintenance is by hand tools:

- A reciprocation cutting bar is very suitable for hedges which are in good condition.
- A flail cutter is suitable for hedge growth of not more than 2-3 years and has the added advantage of mulching the cut materials. A flail cutter should never be used on heavy, woody
- A circular saw should be used on heavy growth and is ideal for shaping up overgrown hedges

The Best Time to Cut

- Trim during winter to fill slack periods of farm work.
- Avoid disturbing nesting birds by not trimming during Spring or early Summer, Autumn trimming can destroy birds winter food supplies
- Trimming can take place from late August to February with minimum wildlife disturbance.

Where a landowner/occupier fails to meet his/her obligation under the Roads Act 1993, a Notice will be served by Waterford County Council requiring him/her to take whatever remedial action is considered necessary to ensure public safety. Remedial action may range from felling to trimming, lopping of branches or preservation. It is an offence not to comply with the terms of such a Notice. If you have not already done so, it is in your own interest to attend to hedge trimming on public roads immediately.

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Letter To Editor

HIGH VOLTAGE POWER LINES

Dear Sir.

With reference to a letter from Mr. Michael Morrissey published in the Letter to the Editor's section of The Dungarvan Leader dated Friday 13th October, I would like to question Mr. Morrissey's dismissal of the effects of the high voltage powerline on the town and surrounds.

Less than a month ago both local newspapers ran articles on papers by Professor Denis Henshaw of the University of Bristol detailing the health affects of living near powerlines. Professor Henshaw's work is revolutionary in that it demonstrates that powerlines ionise pollutants in the air to make them 'sticky' so that when they are inhaled they stick to the lungs rather like dust being attracted to a television screen, once in the lung, pollutants pass into the bloodstream reaching all body organs, which may explain why studies have found increased leukaemia in children living near high voltage powerlines. Professor Henshaw has found that the people most in danger are those living down wind from power lines. It should be noted that work has begun on the first stage of the Council's North Shandon Housing project which will eventually see 370 new houses down wind of this proposed 110kV powerline.

Buildings may not be erected within 26 metres either side of a power line thus creating a 52 metre 'sterile' corridor under the line. Dungarvan is already limited in the directions that it can expand by virtue of the sea. The ESB now wish to cut off one of the only other directions left for expansion of the town. The ESB say that they will move the 110kV overhead line when future development occurs but in practise this is not the case as 110k V lines are very difficult to move due to the fact that if the line deviates from a straight line it requires an angle mast tower to change direction.

The Generating station that the ESB propose to connect up to the National grid is the brainchild of a group of businessmen and Rolls Royce Power Ventures.

This consortium chose to site the generating station in an urban area perhaps to avail of the fact that there is a small 2MW generating station in existence on that site and so planning permission for the 105MW station was relatively easy to obtain. There are consequences to situating a generating station in an urban area if future development in the surrounding area is not to be affected. Nobody could have foreseen the massive development that has occurred in this direction

in the past five years, what was a country area is now a number of growing industrial parks. The proposed overhead route will have a serious, long-term, detrimental affect on any further development in this area.

I would like to take issue with Mr. Morrissey's simplistic attitude towards the power line that 'economics' should determine that the line be over ground. The future development of the Town will be adversely affected and the future health and well-being of a large number of residents in this town will be put at risk if planning permission is granted for the overhead line - it costs more to have safety belts installed in a car but one never questions the cost, or wisdom of having them.

The distance, by road, from the generating station to the distribution station at Killadangan is only 2.3 miles, this power line should be buried.

Thank you for the opportunity to voice my concerns with respect to this project.





PARLIAMENTARY ELECTIONS

The elections of 1826 were famous as the country as a whole was stirred to its depths over the question of Catholic Emancipation. This was the year Henry Villiers Stuart of Dromana was elected for the Couty. In that election George Lamb, of the City of Westminster was again elected for Dungarvan.

Another election followed in 1830 and George Lamb was again returned. He was elected on the 4th may, 1831.

George Lamb continued to be a member till 1834 when Ebenezer Jacob was elected.

On the 12th January 1835, Michael O'Loughlin, Esq. was elected. He was appointed Attorney-General for Ireland and and was re-elected on the 4th may, 1835.

On the 5th August, 1837 Cornelius O' Callaghan was elected.

On the 5th July, 1841 the brilliant orator, Richard Lalor Shiel became the member for Dungarvan, his address being Long Orchard, Co. Tipperary. He was afterwards appointed Master of the Rolls and on the 10th July 1846, he was again elected

This Week In The Garden

LIFT GLADIOLI

All gladiolus corms will be better out of the ground now. Dig them up carefully with a fork, cut the leaves off just above the corms and place the latter in shallow boxes, in which they can be stored in any dry, cool but frost-proof place. Remove any small corms and keep these for growing on a reserve bed. They may not flower next year, but they can be fattened up for the following season. Pull off and throw away the old, shrivelled corms that adhere to the bottoms of the new ones.

STOP FEEDING CHRYSANTHEMUMS

If feeding is carried on too long, buds tend to decay in the centre. From now on supply chrysanthemums with plain water only.

LIFT AND STORE TURNIPS

Lift a good supply of turnips of reasonable size and store them in a frost-proof place for the winter. They will keep quite well in a heap in any dry shed or outhouse, but fare all the better for a light covering of dry sand or ashes. Cut off the tops first. If you leave some roots in the ground they will supply a useful crop of turnip tops in late winter and

AERATE THE LAWN

A garden fork or a hollow-tined aerator can be used to advantage at this time of year to relieve compaction on lawns - particularly those which have been used for

PREPARE ROSE BEDS

Get all new rose beds prepared in October. The ideal time for planting roses is in November and it is good if the ground can have a few weeks to settle between digging and planting. Dig the ground at least 60cm deep, and, unless it is already very rich, work in plenty of well rotted animal manure or decayed vegetable refuse in the second spit, but keep it away from the surface for it will do no good to freshly planted roots. Finish off with a surface dusting of basic slag at the rate of 170g per square metre. This adds phosphates to the soil.

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
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

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SELF ESTEM - THE POSITIVE VACCINE

Are you in control of your life and work or do you feel trapped?

Do you believe you have the power to shape your destiny or do you feel youare always at the mercy of others? Do you have the ability to solve problems rather than just

Do you have the ability to confront or eliminate fear? Do you have the ability to take risks? Do you nurture yourself?

If you answer NO to most of the above questions then you probably have low self esteem. Self esteem has become a modern day buzzword but there is no value judgment more important to any human than the estimate of increasing their self esteem a person places on himself and there is no factor more decisive in human development and motivation. Selfesteem is the centre of personal gravity, it is the core of how we feel about ourselves and other people. It also provides us with balance and inner strength to withstand unhealthy external pressures.

Ghandi said self esteem is self discovery and it is the most significant key to behaviour. Self esteem has prolonged effects on thinking processes, emotions, values and goals. People with high self esteem do not pretend to be perfect, they can accept their limitations and expect to grow and improve. They take risks and are not afraid of making mistakes. People with high self esteem do not have to put up pretences to maintain a sense of self.

They are responsible for their choices and decisions. They focus on achievable goals and on their strengths and potentials. This gives them confidence to reframe negative thoughts into positive ones and feel good about themselves. Self esteem is important in coping with challenges. When people can believe in themselves and believe they have the capacity to achieve their goals they are experiencing self esteem. This motivates, excites and fer from love addiction and continually search for someempowers them and it allows them to become more of what they are capable of becoming.

Every aspect of your life - your personal happiness, success, creativity and relationships are dependent on your level of self esteem. People with high self esteem care about themselves and other people and do not build themselves up by taking others down. High self esteem isn't to be confused with self centredness, pretentiousness or grandiosity - those behaviours hide negative feelings of the self. High self esteem is a shield that protects people from the rejection, frustrations, disappointments and mistakes of life. Everyone at some point experiences failure but high self esteem gives people the robustness to weather the storm.

LOW SELF ESTEEM

Low self esteem manifests in many different forms depression, anxiety, social withdrawal, lack of confidence, anger and frustration being some of the most common. So many people have an ongoing battle with a negative self image and constantly feel bad about themselves. Sadly even when they succeed they still don't feel good because they have a pervasive feeling of not being as good as others and not deserving. So much of their energy is consumed by fear of failure when they do experience failure or disappointment they feel at home with it.

Both self confidence and insecurity are self perpetuating, they feed on themselves. Self esteem is fostered and developed in childhood. If you are made feel competent and lovable for yourself as a child those core

feelings will form the basis of your feelings about yourself in adulthood. Children with high self esteem consider themselves worthy and view themselves as equal to others.

Children who grow up in homes where they are shamed and continually told they are no good will become adults consumed by a sense of failure even if they become successful and very often they will develop compulsive

Everyone has an inner critic, a voice that drags you down

and causes psychological damage. In order to disarm your inner critical voice you need to be able to catch that critical voice in the process of dragging you down. You cannot hit a target that you cannot see. so also you cannot change anything you are unaware of When you catch your inner voice in the act you can turn it off and replace it with positive self talk. Everyone is capable no matter how bad they feel. The key to high self esteem is accepting yourself as you are. This self acceptance enables

you to feel good and this in turn allows you do more which in turn allows you accomplish more which allows your self confidence increase. This positive chain leads to self respect, pride and a sense of being fulfilled. Self esteem informs every relationship you have. Good self esteem shows off the best you. Inner strength can be compared to a muscle. It allows you to live up to your demands and encourages you to be self determining rather than being dependent on others.

A person who has a solid sense of self esteem doesn't make people close to them an extension of themselves. They don't feel threatened by difference or independence. People who were invalidated as children tend to look for surrogate partners because they are seeking from others the affirmation denied them as children. People denied approval in childhood have low self esteem and fear the rejection and criticism of childhood from others. They sufone who will love them as they don't love themselves. However relationships are not a cure for inadequacies and when people feel bad about themselves they cannot reveal themselves to anyone else. For those people fear

Self esteem is not a wish list but it is a confidence that is proactive not reactive. It's a YOU CAN DO persona which energises you and allows you to take control of your life. You are what your thoughts are so you can make a choice to push self doubt aside, create your dream and become a person you can believe in.

Self esteem is neither new nor frivolous. The French call it "amour propre", love of self. It is an appreciation of your own worth, it is the responsibility to be accountable for yourself and to act responsibly towards others. Self esteem isn't everything but there is nothing without it. There are two things which are fundamental to self esteem - the potential of your life lies within you and it is inside every other human being. Self esteem is the science of the self.

Several hundred people turned out at the Park Hotel, Dungarvan last Saturday night to welcome home Old Parish athlete, Jamie Costin after his very committed performance in the Olympic Games in Sydney.

group of cheering and applauding friends, family and fellow athletes. Jamie was accompanied at the top table by his parents, Jimmy and Margaret Costin.

Also present were several members of the Urban District Council; Mr. Donal Connolly, County Manager, administrators of athletics at Club, County and Munster level, former Olympian, Robert Power; Mr. Frank O'Donnell, Principal, Ballymacart N.S. and members of the teaching staff of Dungarvan CBS. Mr. Tom Corcoran, Chairman of Glanbia represented one of Jamies' foremost sponsors.

In the course of his speech, John Treacy congratulated performance in one of the most demanding of all events, the 50 km Walk. "It was a truly magnificent achievement on his part in


"It is the desire and wish of every athlete to represent his or her club in their chosen sport and then to compete for

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

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
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
