



As well as explaining life, myths teach the rules of life good triumphs over evil, and weaknesses like greed or vanity are always punished.


Many myths have survived for thousands of years, passed down by word of mouth, or in pictures and written words, and these shared stories bind communities

ARRANGING CAR FINANCE

At some point in our lives, most of us avail of the many forms of credit available to finance the purchase of a new car. It is important to note that all types of credit agreements are regulated by the Consumer Credit Act 1995.

Consider the following points before you sign any car finance

Shop around for the best value. All credit advertisements must show the Annual Percentage Rate of Charge (APR) which is the total cost of the credit. In general the lower the APR the better the deal for the consumer.

Many garages offer finance packages. As credit intermediaries they must hold an authorisation issued by the Director of Consumer Affairs. They are obliged to provide you the consumer with a written quotation detailing the nature of the finance, the amount, number and frequency of payments. The agreement should also clearly state who has ownership of the goods during the agreement.

Establish what type of agreement you are entering into and take time to read the contract carefully to see what your rights and obligations are. If you are unsure of any aspect of the agreement, do not rush into anything - seek independent legal advice if you have to.

Do not confuse a hire purchase agreement with a consumer hire agreement. In a hire purchase agreement you are hiring the car and ownership of the car only passes to the purchaser when the last payment has been made. In a consumer-hire agreement you are leasing the goods for the duration of the contract. Ownership never passes to you.

If you change your mind after signing an agreement, you may still withdraw from the contract within ten days of receiving a copy by giving notice in writing. Carefully consider whether or not to waive your 'cooling-off rights' when completing the form. Before you finally add up all the costs involved in running the vehicle, include not only car finance repayments, but the cost of insurance, taxation, petrol and depreciation.

According to national figures issued by An Taisce it is estimated that 60% of all household and commercial waste is recyclable or reusable and yet only 7.4% of this waste is currently recycled and with the proper structures in place this figure could be drastically increased.

The Fine Gael Councillor feels that there is widespread public support for recycling and to support this claim he pointed to a recent survey carried out on behalf of the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce which showed that in excess of 98% of local retailers were in favour of recycling.

CIIr Geoghegan has pointed to a number of areas where improvements could be made to existing programmes and also at measures that he feels should be introduced by the local authorities.

A kerbside collection of recyclable goods in the Dungarvan Urban area initially, with a view to expanding the service to cover outlying areas over a period of time. An initiative such as this could be run on a public/private partnership basis between the Council and one

of the larger recycling com-

The "bring-to" centres that are currently in operation at various locations throughout the county need to be expanded to cater not only for glass but for paper, aluminium cans (1 00% recyclable), cardboard, plastic and maga-

An expansion of the compost-bin scheme that was set up, on a pilot basis, by Waterford Co. Council last year which was an astounding success. This was a scheme that allowed members of the public buy compost bins at a subsidised price from the Council.

Cllr Geoghegan goes on to point out that "recycling makes good economic sense and the benefits of recycling are enormous in that it has the potential to boost jobs and encourage economic activity at a local level, can be expanded quite easily and quickly while at the same time recycling does not pose a threat to our communities or existing industries."



SOIL TESTING

Fertiliser Prices to Increase by 40 Per Cent:-

It has recently been announced that for various reasons the price of fertiliser is likely to rise by 40 per cent next year. It sure y makes good business sense that all farmers get the maximum value from farm fertiliser used.

The first step is to have your soil sampled and analysed. There is no point in spreading expensive phosphorous if there is sufficient reserve in the soil already to give optimum growth. Neither does it make sense to apply high nitrogen levels if low phosphorous levels are limiting grass growth.

It costs £17 per sample and each sample covers 2 ha. (5 acres). It only needs to be repeated every 3 years. This works out at a cost of £1.13 pence per acre per year. You are then in a position to ensure that you will get maximum return from every bag of fertiliser that you apply.

HORSES

Nutrition of horses during the winter.

Roughage — Horses need roughage in their diet and the rec ommended rate is about 50% of total diet but this will vary whether the animal is just being maintained or working hard in training/competition. Hay constituted 80% of the roughages fed to horses over the winter up until the last 5 years.

While this year has been one of the best years in the past decade for saving good quality hay, there is an increasing tendency among horse producers to feed alternative roughage to hay Silage is the next most popular roughage with Haylage, Horsehage. Equi-grass and other products are now becoming more readily available.

Silage is becoming popular, especially amongst breeders be cause it is easier to control the quality than it is with hay. Feed ing can be a problem if you have only one or two horses but otherwise silage, well preserved, can be safely fed to horses and it is dust-free. The other (roughage) alternatives mentioned also give a nutritious, dust-free and easily handled product but they can be expensive.

Roughage can be reduced gradually to a minimum or 1% of bodyweight (1kg per 100kg weight of animal) and meals increased. If feeding minimal roughage, it is advisable to add beet pulp, making sure it is soaked for 24 hours and keep the maximum level to one and a half kg of wet (soaked) pulp per day in

Meal Feeding - In-Foal Mares - After weaning, mares in good body condition do not require supplementary feeding until the last third of pregnancy. Estimate the date of foaling and count back 120 days. That is the date when to start feeding concentrates. The ration should be balanced for protein, minerals and vitamins. A 15% protein stud cube is sufficient. Two kilograms per mare per day should be plenty. If the mare is thin, feeding should begin earlier.

Wearlings - The wearlings should get 2kgs per head per day during their first winter (two feeds if possible). Again, a balanced ration is important and foal/yearling pellets are ideal. If you want to show the weanlings as yearlings next year, then the amount fed should be increased.

DAIRYING

Drying Off Cows

Nationally, we are currently over quota. Consider drying off cows if quota problems are anticipated. Irrespective of herd SCC. all cows should be treated with long-acting antibiotics at drying off. New mastitis cases occur four times more

frequently in untreated cows than in cows treated with antibiotics at drying off. Using long-acting antibiotics will help cure current infections and prevent new cases of mastiffs in the early part of the dry period. Cows should be dried off abruptly. Restrict feed for a week or so.

Body Condition

Now is a very good time to assess the body condition of your cows. Try to have cows in good condition entering the dry period. Late lactation is the most efficient time to achieve good body condition on cows. Cows that calve down thin will milk

poorer in early lactation and may prove difficult to get back in calf. Select out the thin cows and allow them a longer dry period. Some small amount of meal feeding may be necessary to have cows in adequate body condition at calving.

Mr. Gray warned the Minister that he must make sheep a priority issue on the Brussells agenda at this stage.

Mr. Gray pointed out that the report contains that the whole basis of the ewe premium calculation is "politicially motivated and largely subjective" in the way the basic price is established.

MINISTER WALSH ANNOUNCES INTERIM ARRANGEMENTS FOR **BSE SUSPECT ANIMALS**

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr Joe Walsh TD, today announced that his Department is to put in place interim arrangements which will enable it to discontinue the practice of burying BSE suspect animals. Minister Walsh explained that it has heretofore been necessary to bury such animals because no alternative means of disposal, such as incineration, is available. "It remains the case that we have no ready alternative for disposal and ultimate destruction of such animals, but my Department is very actively engaged in pursuing options which may provide a solution," the Minister said. "Such options require the agreement of other parties, and further meetings to advance this process have been held today."

The Minister said that pending a final resolution of the problem, it had now been decided to retain in cold storage the carcasses of such animals, rather than continue to bury them. The necessary arrangements are now being made. The Minister explained that the decision was based on a desire to avoid a repetition of a recent incident in County Galway in which an animal which had been buried in August last had been dug up and left in the open and further public controversy of the type which had been generated within the past few days and which had clearly caused unnecessary alarm and distress. "We can not risk a repetition of the recent deplorable incident in County Galway and of the risks which it creates," the Minister said. "Nor are we prepared to allow further public distress be caused by alarmist statements or unwarranted inferences about the safety of water supplies, when no evidence has been produced which indicates that the burial of any of these animals has adversely affected a local water supply. While we have at all times been open about the need to bury animals and how we go about doing so, we have not until now encountered developments of this kind. Not withstanding that we have confidence in the safeguards which have been a feature of our burial practices, we believe that on balance it is now right to change our approach if that is necessary to avoid the risks and obvious distress to which these recent developments have given rise."

The Minister stressed that the new arrangements are interim in nature and that the Department remains committed to finding a durable solution to disposal and ultimate destruction of all BSE suspect carcasses.

South East ICMSA News

SOME PROGRESS AT DISEASE ERADICATION TALKS

Some progress has been made during the on-going discussions regarding a new scheme for Disease Eradication. Speaking following a meeting with senior officials with the Department of Agriculture, Food & Rural Development, Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA, said he was pleased the Department had accepted an ICMSA proposal that all farmers will receive a report from the DVO if there is a disease breakdown in their herd.

Mr. O'Rourke said: "For too long there has been vague talk and promises on follow up after a disease breakdown.

Hopefully now, the agreement by the Department will ensure there is a full follow up in all cases, and in particular the removal of infected wildlife".

ICMSA has major reservations about proposed changes to the brucellosis scheme and the proposal to introduce a pre-movement test for TB. The Association believes that the latest Department proposals are focussed on wrong issues, for example further restrictions and penalties on farmers. ICMSA are, as always, willing to have meaningful discussions with the Department to eradicate brucellosis and significantly reduce the level of TB.

"The Departments acceptance today of ICMSA proposals on follow up is a positive development, which will ensure progress and confidence in the scheme. However, much still remains to be done before I will be able to recommend the new proposed package to the Associations National Council", Mr. O'Rourke concluded.

IFA SAYS FARMERS SHOULD INSIST ON PAYMENT ON THE DAY

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman Tom Leahy has said that should demand and insist on payment on the day when selling livestock. He said "the risk associated with credit is too high and unacceptable. IFA strongly advise farmers not to sell unless you get payment on the day"

Mr. Leahy said payment on the day is a well established valuable principle in the cattle trade. It is a simple and straightforward policy which avoids any payment problems. Mr. Leahy said farmers must be vigilant in insisting that the payment on the day policy operates. He said with cattle members getting tighter all the time farmers should insist on and receive payment on the day.

Reiterating what he said earlier this year, Mr. Leahy strongly encouraged farmers to transact the business of selling weanlings to the live export trade through livestock marts. He said there are major benefits in going through livestock marts in terms of security of payment, convenience and accuracy in terms of weights and values.





Tasty Veg That Even Kids Eat!

KIDS' rule - if it's good for you, don't eat it. But many parents have talked their children into eating this surprisingly tasty vegetable by telling stories about why it looks like a miniature for-

Broccoli is an excellent source of vitamin A, vitamin C and calcium. Medical research has shown that eating broccoli may even help prevent cancer. So why not get digging and grow your own?

Broccoli is a member of the cabbage family and grows best in cool weather and with plenty of moisture.

It generally comes in three types purple-sprouting, green-sprouting and white-sprouting. The purple-sprouting variety is hardier but probably not as tasty


Seeds are usually planted indoors for about six weeks and then transplanted into the garden in early spring. It is also a good candidate for autumn planting. Exposure to frost is no problem for broccoli, but it prefers cool, moist weather.

Plant each broccoli plant about 18 to 24 inches apart in rows, with 36 inches in between each row. After transplanting, water your broccoli plants well. Don't worry when they start wilting - they will soon pick up

Make sure you stake the growing plants if they are becoming vulnerable to high winds.

Fertile soil is essential, with lots of manure or compost incorporated during the winter. The best acidity level is

This Week In The Garden

SOW HARDY PEAS

Some gardeners take culinary peas, plant them outside to mature and are very successful at it. To have any chance whatso-ever you must choose a sheltered spot with well drained soil. To improve your chances further, choose the hardiest variety of pea you can such as Pilot Improved or Meteor.

DIG UP SEAKALE FOR FORCING

The top growth of the plant should have died back by now and this means the ideal time has arrived to lift the roots for forcing. Dig them up carefully and cut off the side sprouts of the root bundle and leave in a sheltered position outside for planting in March. Face the central roots against a wall and cover them with sand until only the crown is visible

FORCE RHUBARB

If you start your roots at once in a 21°C greenhouse you should get good sticks in time for Christmas. Strong roots should be lifted and left in the open for a few days. If the weather is frosty it will actually improve the growth of the plant later on. Plant in the greenhouse, in deep soil close together, cover them with bin liners so they are in complete darkness, water moderately and try to maintain a temperature range of 13 to 24°C.

TIDY HERBACEOUS BORDERS

Most herbaceous perennials will have finished flowering and the borders should be made ready for winter. Cut off all of the dead or dying leaves and stems but leave all the evergreen leaves alone. Give the ground a dusting of bone meal and prick the surface of the ground with a fork, being careful not to disturb plants or bulbs in the process.

TURN OVER ALL FREE GROUND

By this time there should be lots of free ground for digging. Most of the garden should be attended to with a spade at this time of the year. Most of the vegetable garden should be dug over to two or even three depths of a

COMMENT **COWS IN PLASTIC** BAGS

It is interesting to note the concerns that have arisen nationally regarding the issue of dumping of cattle infected with Mad Cow Disease close to water sources. Proposals currently exist to locate superdumps close to rivers and above groundwater - the same water that makes its way into our taps.





ANOTHER EXCITING ELECTION

When Parliament was dissolved in 1874, Henry Matthews was opposed by Minor O'Keeffe of Ballylemon Lodge. He was regarded as a local man and the supporters of Charles Barry believed the local influence would be sufficient to beat Matthews. And in this view they were correct. For the result of the election showed that Mr. O'-Keeffe had got a majority of votes and he was declared elected. This Parliament was dissolved on the 24th March,

However, on account of the death of Mr. John O'Keeffe, a by-election for Dungarvan took place. This was a memorable election. Mr. Matthews was invited by his supporters to come forward and he was promised great support. The date of the election was 25th January, 1877. Mr. Matthews consented to contest the seat. It was not known at first who was to be his opponent, but the name of Frank Hugh O'Donnell was spoken of

HOME RULE

This movement had been going on for some time and the Party had been established in the House of Commons in England. It was thought by some that the Home Rule movement was falling away and Mr. Matthews evidently was of that opinion. Both of those expectant candidates left London simultaneously and intelligence reached Mr. Matthew's supporters that he would arrive on a certain day, about a fortnight before the election. A deputation went along the Waterford road to meet him. Mr. Matthews drove a carriage from Waterford, having landed from the Milford boat.

THE MEETING PLACE

The parties met below Leamybrien and they consulted with Mr. Matthews. From the information given, the forthcoming candidate, Mr. Matthews offered to return instantly to London and do no more about the election. He was urged to come on. As the parties were conversing on the road, a carriage came along. It passed. Inside there was a gentlemanly-looking man with fair hair. He wore an eveglass. He looked at the party on the road and they looked at him. "Who is that?" said one of the party. "Is that Frank Hugh O'Donnell?" "I don't know," replied Mr. Matthews "but he travelled across in the boat from Milford." Mr. Matthews continued his journey into Dungarvan and on arriving there he was informed that Frank Hugh O'Donnell had arrived before him and that he was to be his opponent. (More next week.)


INTERMEDIATE HURLING FINAL



columns on different local personalities. This week our article is on Sarah Purser (1848-1943). She was born in Dun Laoghaire on 22 March 1848. She was the daughter of Benjamin Purser and Ann Mallet. They came to Dungarvan in the 1840's and lived firstly in Strand side South, Abbeyside, which is now the home of the Parish Priest. Later they moved to a house called 'The Hermitage' in Abbeyside. Sarah lived here for about 25 years. Her father was involved in brewing and flour milling while in Dungarvan.

At the age of 13 Sarah was sent to school in Switzerland for two years. She left Dungarvan in the summer of 1873 to make her living as a painter and settled in Dublin. There she trained in the Metropolitan School of Art and later went to the Academie Julian in Paris and also to Italy. She became a highly successful portrait painter and an important figure in the Irish art world at the turn of the century.

In 1903 she founded An Tur Gloine, the first Irish stained glass studio. She was instrumental in drawing the attention of the art world to the works of John Yeats and Nathaniel Hone. She persuaded W. T. Cosgrave to give Charlemont House in Dublin as a modern Art Gallery and also to house the Hugh Lane collection.



The threat to the environment was discussed in detail, in particular the risk of pollution to the ground-water in the proposed spread-lands area, which are situated on a vulnerable aquifer.

Maurice Lannon and other representatives from Bonmahon were at the meeting, and added their voices in opposition to this development. Cllrs. Ger Barron and Tom Cunningham also attended the meeting, and Paul Walsh who asked to address the meeting asked that they do everything in their power to ensure that Waterford County Council upholds its statuary responsibility to protect ground-water.

Those attending the meeting were unanimous in their opposition to this factory, with several individuals opposing the development through their own initiatives. The Stradbally Environmental Group will shortly be making a submission to the E.P.A. opposing the granting of a license.


