ASTI Claim Is Outlandish And Bizarre

SAYS CLLR. O'RYAN

Secondary school teachers throughout County Waterford and nationwide took to the picket lines on Tuesday morning in pursuit of their 30% pay increase demand with the most stinging criticism ever voiced of them by a public representative ringing in their ears.

Co. Waterford's longest serving councillor, Kieran O'Ryan unsuccessfully sought to have Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council "deplore" the teachers strike action, having accused them of sowing the seeds of selfishness by an action which, he said, has been motivated by "sheer greed and irresponsibility".

Cllr. O'Ryan (FF), who is in public life for almost half a century, said he felt compelled to table his motion to the meeting calling on the Council to deplore the teachers strike action, and said that even at this eleventh hour he would call on the ASTI to stand back from the brink and come down from the clouds of unreality.

He warned that if the Government concedes the thirty percent claim to the teachers the floodgates will open with every other sector seeking a similar concession. "With four months

holiday a year to go with all the other perks, this ASTI claim is outlandish and bizarre", he said.

"In fact", the veteran FF councillor continued, "it is the most outlandish pay demand I have witnessed in almost fifty years in public life. The teachers will benefit to the tune of almost eighteen percent under the existing national wage agreement and they now want Government to concede them another thirty percent".

Cllr. O'Ryan said the teachers make the point that they

£.5m Storm And Flood Damage

The most recent floods and storm damage to the roads of County Waterford has been estimated at just under £0.5m, county engineer John O'Flynn told this week's County Council meeting.

Mr. O'Flynn said that in one instance four inches of rain fell within a matter of hours. "It was unprecedented", he said, "and we have now estimated the damage at £496,000".

The county engineer said that one of the worst hit areas was Kilgeaney close to the flood ravaged town of Clonmel but still deep within the county Waterford boundary. Roads in the Kil-machthomas area had also

been very badly damaged, while a major job needs to be done to improve one of the most flood prone roads in the county - the Tramore/Waterford main route.

Mr. O'Flynn confirmed

that they have now made submissions for funding to the Department of the Environment, with cost details included. "Our estimate is that a figure just under £0.5m will be needed, and I hope to be able to present a more detailed report on the overall situation to the December meeting", he said.

The chairman, Cllr. William McDonnell, voiced particular concern about the extent of the flooding on the main Lismore/Cappoquin road close to Lismore Bridge where, he said, serious flooding has been occurring twice a year for the last forty years.

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


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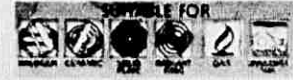

CREATION MYTHS

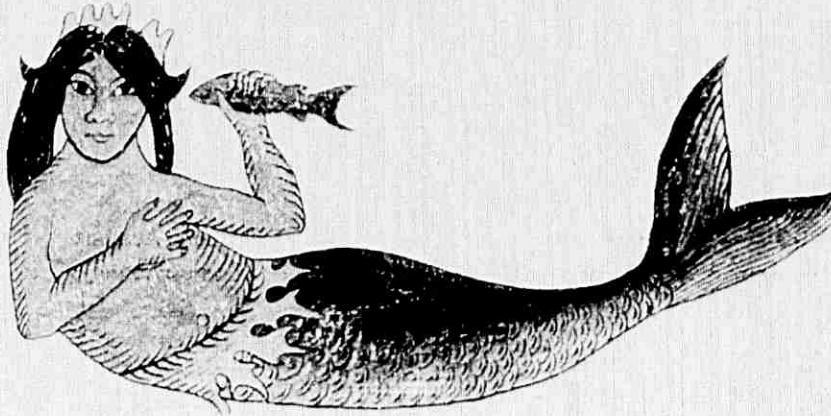
All over the world, people have tried to explain how the world began and where the first people came from. The Ancient Egyptians believed that at the dawn of time Ra, the Sun god, created the air, moisture, the earth and the sky, and that humans came from his tears.

The sea was the source of food for the Inuit people of Greenland and northern Canada. Sedna the sea goddess was worshipped for the sea creatures she provided to eat. She was also feared in case she was offended and made the Arctic weather so harsh that hunting and fishing for bears, seals and whales became impossible.

The legend of the English King Arthur and the Knights of the Round Table is full of mystery and magic, but it is believed that the real Arthur was a brave Celtic chieftain who lived around 500 A.D.

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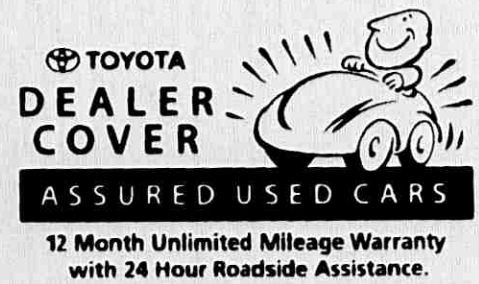

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I applied recently for a copy of my Birth Certificate to the Superintendent Registrars Office in Dublin in connection with my application for Non-Contributory Old Age Pension. I was charged the full fee for the certificate. Why was I not charged the reduced fee, as I needed it for Social Welfare purposes?

ANSWER

If you require a copy of a Birth Certificate for any purpose you can obtain it from either the General Registrar of the County in which the birth was registered or from the Superintendent Registrars Office, Joyce House, 8-11 Lombard Street, Dublin 2.

If you need a certificate to support an application for a Social Welfare benefit or allowance you will only be able to avail of the reduced fee (currently £0.70) for the certificate when you apply to the General Registrar of the County in which the birth was registered. You may require a letter from the local Social Welfare office in order to obtain the certificate at the reduced rate.

If the birth was registered outside the Dublin area you will be charged the full fee when you apply for the certificate to the Superintendent Registrars Office in Dublin. Where the birth was registered in Dublin you will only have to pay the reduced fee when you apply to the Superintendent Registrars Office.

The same arrangements apply to Marriage and Death Certificates.

COOKERY CORNER

A Meaty Alternative

Goulash

A Hungarian dish made at home in your English kitchen.

Cooking time: 1 1/2 to 2 hrs.

Ingredients:

- (Serves 3-4)
- 450g lean beef lamb or pork, cubed
- 400g can chopped tomatoes
- 300ml stock
- 150ml red wine
- 1 onion, sliced
- 2 x 15ml sp tomato puree
- 1 x 15ml sp paprika
- 1 x 2 1/2ml sp caraway seeds

Dumplings:

- 100g self raising flour
- 50g beef suet
- 1 x 2 1/2ml sp caraway seeds
- Salt and black pepper
- Water to bind

Method:

In a large casserole dish place the meat and

sauce ingredients. Season and stir.

Transfer to preheated oven (Gas mark 3, 170°C, 325°F) and cook until the meat is tender.

Meanwhile, make the dumplings. Mix the flour, suet and caraway seeds and season. Add cold water and mix into a soft dough.

20 minutes before the end of cooking time, divide the dumpling dough into 4-6 pieces and drop into the casserole. Return to the oven, uncovered for the final 20 minutes.

Serve with mashed potato, sprouts and leeks.

SUITABLE CUTS:

- Beef - braising cubes; chuck, blad - stewing cubes; shin, leg
- Lamb - braising cubes; shoulder, leg
- Pork - braising cubes; shoulder, leg



TIPS:

- For convenience, dumplings can be bought ready made, frozen or in a packet.

- All stock can be used instead of red wine.
- Dried mixed herbs can be substituted for caraway seeds.

Cheesy Topped Vegetables

GIVE plain vegetables an exciting twist, serve them with a tasty cheese sauce.

Ingredients:

- (Serves 6)
- 3 carrots, peeled and sliced
- 1 cauliflower, divided into florets
- 225g small broccoli florets
- 75g frozen peas

FOR THE SAUCE:

- 40g butter
- 40g plain flour
- 450ml semi-skimmed milk
- 100g half-fat double Gloucester, coarsely grated
- 2 x 2 1/2ml sp Dijon mustard
- 1/4 x 2 1/2ml sp salt
- black pepper

Method:

Cook carrots in boiling water for 3 minutes. Add cauliflower, broccoli and peas. Cook for 3-5 minutes, or until vegetables are just tender. Drain well. Put vegetables in large, flame proof dish, cover and keep warm. For the sauce, melt the butter in a pan. Add flour and cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Remove from the heat and gradually stir in the milk. Return to the heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in three-quarters of the cheese, the mustard and the seasoning. Pour the sauce over the vegetables and stir to coat. Sprinkle over remaining cheese. Grill under a medium heat for five minutes, or until cheese is bubbling. Serve immediately.

Chocolate Angel Torte - It's Simple

Make this impressive cake for a special celebration.

Ingredients:

- 165g plain flour
- 25g cornflour
- 10 egg whites
- 1/4 x 2 1/2ml sp cream of tartar
- 275g caster sugar
- 2 x 2 1/2ml sp vanilla essence
- 175g plain chocolate
- 200ml soured cream
- 2 x 2 1/2ml sp orange juice
- 225ml double cream
- 150g low fat natural yogurt
- 25g plain chocolate curls
- 8 raspberries

Method:

Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/ Gas Mark 4. Grease and flour a deep, 23cm ring tin. Sift together the flour and cornflour. Whisk the egg whites and cream of tartar until soft peaks form.

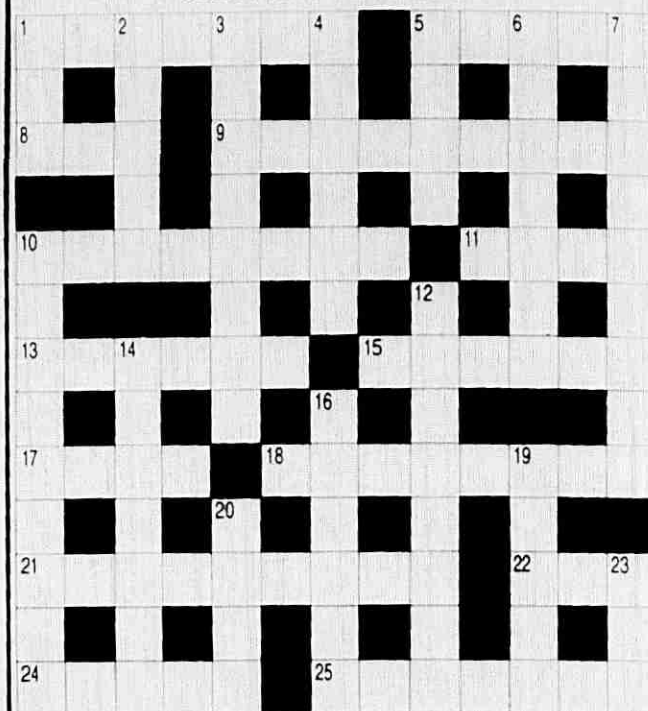
Gradually whisk in sugar. Fold in flour mixture and vanilla with a metal spoon. Pour mixture into tin. Stand tin on a baking sheet. Bake for 35-40 minutes, or until the centre springs back when pressed. Invert tin on to a wire rack. Allow cake to cool in tin. For the filling, break up the chocolate and melt in a heat proof bowl over a pan of simmering water. Remove from the heat. Stir in soured cream and orange juice. Cool for 10 minutes.

Turn out the cake. Cut into three layers. Sandwich together the layers with filling. Put on a serving plate. For the icing, whip together cream and yogurt until soft peaks form. Spread over cake. Chill for 1 hour. Decorate with chocolate curls and raspberries.

Hawthorn (Crataegus)

USES: Heart tonic.
HOW IT WORKS: Hawthorn is perhaps one of the most widely used herbs for the heart. The precise mode of action is still unclear - although we do know that the plant does not contain digitalis-like compounds. Flavonoids found in Crataegus have been found to be able to improve the circulation of the heart, and to a lesser extent, the circulation of other parts of the body. Glycosides present are believed to increase the tone of the heart, improving the force of contraction whilst reducing the rate of contraction - in short, making the heart work more efficiently.
 (NB - Let your doctor know if you are using Hawthorn in addition to any prescribed medication for the heart.)

Dream Gardens Need Planning

YOU have just moved into your beautiful new home, the living room needs a bit of work, a new bathroom is definitely on the shopping list and a little DIY wouldn't go amiss in the kitchen either. You can cope with all this - but the garden is a living nightmare.

When a garden is overgrown and all you can see is six-foot weeds and masses of plants - most people don't know where to start.

Many people make the mistake of rushing out and planting hundreds of bulbs and seeds on the first warm day of spring.

Many of these bursts of enthusiasm produce badly thought out and planned out gardens which are doomed to failure. The plants wither and the would-be gardeners become convinced that they lack some secret knowledge or inherent skill.

In most cases, a few hours of preparation would have made all the difference. It is easy to dig up a plot and throw some plants in the ground. It is another thing to create a healthy, living garden.

Planning a new garden can be a great deal of fun. After you have cleared away all the mess and rubbish, you can start the planning process.

Don't go out and buy plants before thinking about the conditions you are going to plant in. The three main factors which affect plants are sunlight, soil composition and moisture.

Two of these factors you can influence and improve on - but with sunlight you are stuck with what you are given.

You will be able to find a plant which

will thrive in every condition, from full sunlight to half sun (under a tree or where there is only sun in the morning/evening), to the darkest of shade all day. You will have to watch your plot and determine which types of plants you need.

Next, you must determine the soil composition - the type of soil you'll be working with.

The three main ingredients of soil are sand, silt and clay. Sand has the largest particles and clay has the smallest. An ideal soil would be about 40 per cent sand, 40 per cent silt and 20 per cent clay.

The easiest way to see what type of soil you have is to take a fistful of soil and squeeze it into a ball. If it is unable to hold its shape, your soil is probably too sandy. Try to break the ball apart by pressing on it with your thumb. A good soil will break apart readily - if not, you have too much clay.

Another method is to take a few handfuls of soil and put them in a jar half filled with water. Mix the soil and water around and then let it settle overnight. The next day you will see that three distinct layers have formed: sand at the bottom, then silt and at the top a layer of clay.

Once you know what type of soil you have you will have to amend it - the best way to do this is by adding organic matter.

Soil which is high in sand or silt needs a combination of topsoil and peat moss or compost.

If the problem is too much clay, add peat moss or compost and some



sand. Sand can help loosen clay soils and allow for proper drainage.

Moisture is obviously connected to the climate of the area you live in. But even in a small garden, there can be big differences.

If your garden is at the bottom of a hill, the soil might stay wet for long periods of time. In this situation, stick to plants that enjoy having their feet wet. If your plot is very dry, don't assume you'll be

able to fix the problem by constantly watering.

Choose plants that will be happy in a dry place and you'll be able to take a two-week holiday without worrying.

A little bit of forward thinking goes a long way towards creating a place you can be proud to say is connected to your house - so stop putting it off and start planning your garden now.

This Week In The Garden

DIG AND STORE JERUSALEM ARTICHOKE, PARSNIPS, HORSERADISH AND SALSIFY

Jerusalem Artichokes will have finished their growth so it is safe to cut off the tops and dig up the tubers with a fork. Store the bigger tubers the same way you would potatoes and put the smaller ones aside in a dry room or shed for planting later. Parsnips and horseradish are perfectly fine if left in the cold all winter - but you may find it hard to eat them if you can't dig them up because the ground is frozen! Dig a few now and store them for eating later. Cut off the tops and cover them in some dry sand or soil in a dry room or shed. The salsify should be dug and stored in the same way as the parsnips and horseradish, but if you want the plant to flower in spring it is perfectly OK to leave it planted throughout winter.

CUT BACK DECIDUOUS HEDGES

All deciduous hedges such as hawthorn, blackthorn, myrobalan plum, sweet briar, beech and tamarisk can be pruned in November. This is also a good time to do any hand cutting you think may be necessary to keep plant growth within bounds. The base of the hawthorn or sweet briar sometimes gets a bit bare, but this can be rectified by pinning the longer shoots into position.

PLANT DECIDUOUS TREES, SHRUBS AND CLIMBERS (ORNAMENTAL AND FRUITING)

Planting cannot take place when the ground is very wet or frozen. Otherwise this is the perfect time to plant trees, shrubs, roses and climbers when lifted from open ground. Replanting should be taken care of as soon after the leaves have dropped as possible. However, if you have little time to spare, the planting of several plants can be spread over a period. If you cannot finish by the first or second week into December, postpone planting until early February. Make the hole deep enough to cover all the roots with 10 cms of soil and wide enough to fit them in a perfectly natural manner.

are selfish people whom the elected public representatives should stand up to.

Cllr. Mary Green (FG), who is an active member of the ASTI said she would emphatically refute her colleague's "astonishing" claims and the action being taken by the ASTI is the only one still open to them. She warned that the situation will get worst and teachers will not

be bullied by a Government, the ASTI is calling on to enter meaningful talks and discussions.

Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair (Lab) said the word "deploring" should never have been a part of Cllr. O'Ryan's motion, and said that some "smart alics" in the media who were constantly having a go at the teachers wouldn't themselves last five minutes

in a classroom.

Cllr. Nora Flynn said the teachers are only exercising their constitutional right in taking strike action, while Cllr. Tom Higgins accused Cllr. O'Ryan of "teacher bashing".

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson (FF) said he is also chairman of a Parents Council and a member of a school board of management, and believed

teachers have a right to seek improvement in their conditions. However their thirty percent pay increase claim was too high, but the Minister for Education instead of digging in should meet the ASTI for further discussion.

When Cllr. O'Ryan's motion "deploring" the teachers pay claim - seconded by Cllr. Tom Cunningham (FF) went to a vote it was defeated 11/8.

Cllr. McDonnell suggested that the nearby canal might be dredged, while considerations should also be given to raising the level of the roadway by eighteen to twenty four inches.

Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson agreed that this location is constantly flooded when the rains come but he doubted if raising the road would be a solution. "It is difficult to know what the answer is, but the Council will have to make every effort to resolve

it", he said.

The county engineer also expressed doubts that raising the road level would solve the flooding. In fact, he said, his fear was that it would only shift the problem somewhere else. They could be talking big expense and there might be little they can do other than to resort to using sandbags and the like.

The chairman said expense should not be a factor. The Lismore/Cappoquin road is

one of the major routes in the county, and for decades the area has been subjected to massive ongoing flooding.

"The people of the area have had enough and insist the time to cry halt is now", said Cllr. McDonnell.

MAJOR PLANS FOR FRIARY HALL

The Friary Hall, Dungarvan may be about to undergo a major re-development, creating a state of the art performance space to service the people of West Waterford.

There have been informal discussions for some years about developing a performance space in Dungarvan to facilitate residents in County Waterford. This idea has recently been given focus, in the form of an application to Government for grant-aid towards the cost of redeveloping the Friary Hall.

It is proposed to construct a 300 seat performance space for drama, music, dance, musical theatre and readings, with additional areas capable of facilitating rehearsals, workshops and education activities.

An application has been submitted by Waterford County Council, Dungarvan UDC and a committee of interested citizens for ACCESS funding, to redevelop the Friary Hall. The application includes, reasons why such a venue is required, provisional programme of events, proposed educational activities, promotional plans, financial

projections and designs.

Many other worthy projects from around the country will be seeking support from the ACCESS fund. The Government will announce the successful projects early in 2001.

ACCESS, is a funding programme being administered by the Department of Arts, Heritage, Gaeltacht and the Islands. The fund has been created to assist communities develop arts facilities at local level.

Waterford County Council and Dungarvan UDC are committed to a strategic policy approach to arts and cultural development in the county. The Councils have developed a series of projects which aim to give operational effect to its cultural development policies. One of these is the redevelopment of the Friary Hall, Dungarvan.

The Local Authorities have the support of the Augustinian Order, present owners of the premises, for its proposals, and is working closely with a committee representing local interests to bring this exciting project to fruition.

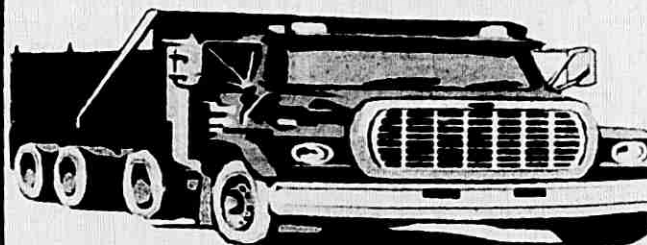

IFA WELCOMES MINISTER WALSH'S DECISION ON NATIONAL ENVELOPE

Waterford IFA Livestock Committee Chairman Tom Leahy has welcomed the announcement from Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh allocating £8.2m from the National Envelope as a top up on replacement heifers in 2001.

Mr. Leahy said the Minister's decision should make a very positive contribution towards improving the quality of our beef breeding herd. He said under the scheme qualifying heifers would be required to have calved by December 31st 2001.

Mr. Leahy said the Minister's announcement was in line with the IFA National Livestock Committee proposal on the National Envelope Allocation. Mr. Leahy also welcomed the decision to continue with the existing top up on the slaughter premium for beef breed heifers. He said this will bring the slaughter premium payment on beef heifers up to £60/head from January 1st 2001.

On the decision of Minister Walsh to increase the milk quota threshold for suckler cow premium from 30,638 gals to 32,478 gals Mr. Leahy said "This move must be matched with a decision to protect existing suckler cow quota holders by freezing the number of suckler cow quota rights with dairy farmers". He said "we can not continue with a one way traffic system in this area".

SOUTH EAST ICMSA NEWS

POOR PLANNING ONE OF THE GREATEST THREATS TO RURAL DEVELOPMENT

The planning practices being adopted by many County Councils represent one of the greatest threats to rural development and, unless changed, will result in the virtual depopulation of many rural areas, according to ICMSA. Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairperson, ICMSA Rural Development Committee said: "ICMSA is becoming increasingly concerned about the number of rural people that are failing to get planning permission in their home area for themselves or their families. It is incredible that people who have lived in an area all their lives are unable to get planning permission to build a house".

ICMSA feel that if we are to maintain a rural population, County Councils will have to ensure their policies allow people to build in their home townland, where suitable. It is unacceptable that people are being told that they can buy a house or get planning permission in the nearby town.

Mr. Harvey said: "the objective should not be to maintain the rural population but to increase it to build a more vibrant and secure rural community. To allow this to happen, County Councils will have to allow landowners to sell sites if they so wish, thus increasing the population of rural areas".

"County Councils have a critical role to play in promoting rural development. They should start by ensuring their planning practices encourage and not discourage rural development, Mr. Harvey concluded.

ICMSA CONCERNS ABOUT BELOW COST SELLING

The ICMSA has expressed serious concern that some supermarkets are in flagrant breach of the Groceries Order with regard, to below cost selling of milk.

Mr. Jackie Cahill, Deputy President of ICMSA said he has been reliably informed that at least one supermarket is selling milk at a reduced price of 86p for two litres having purchased it from the dairy for 92p for two litres.

Mr. Cahill called on the Tanaiste, Ms. Mary Harvey, T.D., to ensure there is full compliance with the Groceries Order for all food items covered by the Order. "The Groceries Order is a progressive, common sense piece of legislation which the Tanaiste decided to leave on the statute books. Now ICMSA want her Department to follow through with it application", Mr. Cahill concluded.

LATE RICHIE HARTY



The locality learned with disbelief and shock of the unexpected passing on Thursday 2nd November of the ever-popular and well known Richie Harty. Aged 52 years, youngest in family to Richard and Nonie, Richie was a native of Ballinagoul, Ring. Educated at the local Scoil Náisiúnta na Rinne, he furthered his studies at Mean Scoil San Níoclás. Employed at Quigley Magnesite up to its closure, Richie also gave of his best at Radley Engineering in Kiladangan. He worked the land for a time and was a valued member of staff at Tom Curran, Hardware, The Square. It was while tending to his duties as lorry-driver that Richie went to his eternal reward. To say that Richie was well known would be an understatement, his work brought him in daily contact with so many of the public and his well known love of sport ensured that Gaelic and the sporting public knew of Richie and of his efforts on behalf of the teams and individuals coached by himself. In his younger days he ran cross-country and won a novice county title. He also donned with pride

and gave one hundred per cent commitment, the jersey of his native Ring when they contested many a hurling and football fixture. When he moved into town, he became a true blue and threw in his lot with Dúngarbhan. His motivation and leadership was also clearly evident when he coached on the line and many a game was rescued from the jaws of defeat by Richie's experience and intervention. When Dúngarvan GAA embarked on its major building project a number of years ago, Richie Harty was a cornerstone in the effort. He assisted greatly with fundraising and indeed the end result is a fitting and lasting tribute to Richie and others who gave of their time and energy for the cause. He loved all sports but certainly the clash of the ash was top of his agenda. He loved the atmosphere, be it in Thurles, Cork or Limerick. When the Decies threw down the gauntlet in the heat of a Munster championship, Richie was always in attendance. Richie also had a great grá for the long tails enjoying the racing at all the nearby Greyhound Tracks. He took a great pride in the sporting endeavours and activities of his son Alan and daughter Niamh. He followed Alan's fortunes on the golf course and playing pitches while Niamh excelled at athletics. Richie would always be there to share their joys, successes and as in life their disappointments. When his wife Rita (nee Moore) went to her eternal reward in 1989, Richie redoubled his efforts and was a tremendous guiding influence on his children. While the scribe has tried diligently to pen this tribute to Richie, no words of mine could do justice to this most popular of individuals who despite his short years won the respect and was held in high esteem by the entire community. Although Richie has departed the scene for greener pastures, he will always be re-

It is interesting also to note the predominant surnames in Coisbride in the mid 19th century. These included Ahern, Barry, Keane, Tobin, Walsh. In the barony of Kinnataloon which bordered Coisbride on the Cork side, the popular surnames at the time were Keefe, Ahern, Carthy (Mac), Cotter, Daly and Fitzgerald. It is safe to say that in the year 2000 the Coisbride under age teams will feature some, if not all of the surnames among others.

7% Increase In County Rates For Coming Year

With expenditure due to top £30m for the first time, Waterford County Council's already hard pressed ratepayers are going to have to fork out an additional seven percent increase in rates for the coming year.

A rate of £47.87 in the £ was adopted at last Friday's estimates meeting, with Labour's Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair the lone dissenting voice as the new figure was adopted on a 20-1 vote.

County Manager, Donal Connolly, disclosed that it will cost an estimated £30.6m to administer the affairs of the Council in 2001. He projected income at £28m, leaving just over £2.5m to be levied through rates. "That", he told the councillors, "will require a rate of £47.87 in the £ - an increase of seven percent on the current figure".

The estimates provide for an expenditure of £12.5m on the county's main roads in the coming year - £3.5m more than in the present year. An additional £1.8m has been earmarked for local non national routes.

County engineer, John O'Flynn, disclosed that the study plan for the biggest by pass route in the county should be ready in about six months time. This multi million project will commence in the Kilineen area five miles on the Waterford side of Dungarvan and continue for almost ten miles before rejoining the main Cork/Waterford N25 route at Pulla some four or five further miles on the Cork side of the town.

Asked by Fine Gael's Cllr. John Deasy if the tolling of this route would expedite the construction programme (it is not envisaged to be completed sooner than 2012), Mr. O'Flynn said there are no plans to introduce a toll charge on the new route.

"I would think it will not be a candidate for tolling, it is unlikely to be the subject of such a charge", the county engineer added.

Cllr. Billy Kyne welcomed that assurance, commenting that the local motoring population certainly wouldn't take kindly to a toll charge. "Already", he added, "there is mounting opposition to a Government proposal to introduce a toll charge for the proposed second bridge crossing in Waterford city, and another one outside Dungarvan would be fiercely resisted".

The estimates provide good news for householders throughout the county in that the £3 weekly refuse collection charge is being frozen for the coming year, but that wasn't sufficient year to persuade Cllr. O'Ceilleachair to support the new rate. He said he could not, and would not, vote for the county rate that made provisions for such a charge.

Finally however, and after little more than two hours of deliberation the new rate was passed on the proposal of Fianna Fail's Cllr. Pat Leahy, seconded by his party colleague Cllr. Tom Cronin.

FIRE SERVICE

During the debate on the estimates Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson asked if there are plans afoot to close some of the fire stations in the western end of the county. "There are rumours going the rounds to that effect, and I would like to know what the official situation is", the FF councillor added.

Cllr. Nora Flynn supported her colleague and said the fire brigade is one of the most important services the Council provides. "We saw that", she added "in the most recent storms and floods".

The manager responded with the categorical assurance that there are no plans to close any of the fire stations in West Waterford. "In fact" said Mr. Connolly, "we have applications with the Dept. of the Environment for new stations in Ardmore, Tallow and Kilmacthomas. We are continuously reviewing the fire service and in those reviews no closures of the existing stations are envisaged".

Cllr. Wilkinson said he welcomed the managerial assurances, as will the people throughout the entire West Waterford region.

The most noteworthy thing about her was her strength of character. Over the years she made trips to Lourdes. As her health deteriorated she was removed to Saint Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel last March and from there to the Cottage Hospital Nursing Home where she passed to her eternal reward.

Her remains were removed to S.S. Peter & Paul's Parish Church where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Brian Power C.C. S.S. Peter and Paul's.

Requiem Mass was celebrated the following morning, the celebrant was Rev. Fr. Colm O'Brien C.C. After Mass the funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel where she was laid to rest. To her sons, daughter, sister and her many relatives we extend our sympathy.

A familiar diminutive figure around the town, he loved company and loved to chat with someone. A single man, he lived alone and despite his ripe old age he was noted for the neatness of his home. He was a creature of habit, he had a daily routine which he seldom varied. At his favourite table each morning at the same time in Coyle's Cafe in the Mary Stone Centre where he was a most popular person, he enjoyed his cup of coffee and a slice of toast in the company of his friends, after which he would walk up O'Connell Street. Part of his ritual down the years was helping out Sister Joachim with the tables and chairs in her club in Morton Street as well as collecting for charity. He was a regular attender at the evening devotions in St. Peter & Paul's Church where he always sat on the same seat.

As a young man his working life began in the Boot Factory at the Gas House Bridge and after it was burned down he moved to their new premises in Nelson Street, he enjoyed many years in the Solution Department there. Neddy often recalled the Mouth Organ band set up in the Boot factory which he joined, he also had great memories of the wonderful social events which the staff organised from time to time. During the emergency he moved to England where he worked for many years. CHAMBER SURVEY SHOWS THAT 98.5% OF RETAILERS WILLING TO RECYCLE

98.5% of retailers are in favour of recycling - that's according to the results of the recent Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce retail recycling survey.

The survey of the entire business community which was undertaken during the summer months shows that 85% of those surveyed would be willing to separate waste into categories such as cardboard, paper, plastic, bottles etc. 55% of retailers also stated that they would be willing to deliver waste to a central control location on a weekly basis.

The Chamber also asked if retailers would be willing to use environmentally friendly shopping bags if competitive prices were available and 78% of respondents were in favour of this initiative. The survey also showed that 67% of retailers spend up to £5 per week disposing of their waste.

The results of this survey certainly show that there is a willingness in the local community to recycle if given the opportunity to do so. The Chamber is continuing to liaise with the Urban District Council on this matter.

CHAMBERS CONDEMN DEMPSEY'S INFLATIONARY COMMERCIAL RATES MOVE

The Chambers of Commerce of Ireland (CCI) have condemned Environment and Local Government Minister Noel Dempsey's decision to raise the cap on local authorities commercial rates levies to 9%. CCI had earlier this autumn argued that commercial rates should be capped at current levels as part of the Government's fight to combat inflation.

A recent CCI study "The Forgotten Business Tax" shows that local authorities increased commercial rates by an average of 4.6% for the year 2000. Over the ten years 1991-2000, the average increase in commercial rates was 47%, while aggregate inflation for the same period was 22%. Two years ago, Minister Dempsey capped the size of the annual rates increase at 5%. Local authorities are spending over £1.87 billion this year of which over £455 million comes from commercial rates.

CHAMBER BUSINESS AFTER HOURS TO FOCUS ON "THE FUTURE OF THE FOOD INDUSTRY"

Former Secretary of the Department of Agriculture and Food, Mr. Michael C Dowling will be guest speaker at the next Dungarvan Chamber "Business after Hours" session. The focus of the evening which will take place on Thursday October 23rd at 8 p.m in Lawlors Hotel will be "The Future of the Food Industry".

As Secretary of the Department of Agriculture and Food from 1989 to 1997, Mr. Dowling had responsibility for all aspects of EU, international trade and domestic policy in regard to the agriculture, trade and forestry sectors. He was involved in all EU negotiations in regard to these sectors and was deputy Irish spokesperson at the EU Council of Agriculture Ministers.

In 1997, Mr. Dowling was appointed director of An Bord Bia-the Irish Food Board by the Minister for Agriculture and Food and in 1998 was appointed member of the EU Commission's Conciliation body.

His directorships include Kerry Group plc, An Bord Bia, Irish Distillers Group plc, The Agricultural trust and Dowling Consultancy Services which acts as advisor to a number of major firms in the agri-business, banking, bloodstock breeding and food sectors.

ANOTHER EXCITING ELECTION

Last week we wrote about the arrival of Mr. Henry Matthews and Mr. Frank Hugh O'Donnell in Dungarvan to contest the election to be held on the 25th January 1877.

On arriving in Dungarvan Mr. Matthews was warmly received. A crowd with green bushes met him at the Bridge and there was much enthusiasm. It was arranged that Mr. Matthews should address the electors on the following evening. He did so from the balcony of the Devonshire Arms Hotel (now incorporated into Lawlor's). He was received with much cheering from an immense crowd. In his speech in regard to Home Rule he said "there was no use in flogging a dead horse". The phrase was his undoing. His opponents took it up, and the "dead horse" was used as an election cry for the remainder of the contest.

The Opposition

Later in the evening Mr. Frank Hugh O'Donnell spoke from the same balcony. He was an avowed Home Ruler. He commented in terms of sarcasm on the sneer of Henry Matthews on the agitation for Home Rule. He announced himself as being one of the Vice Presidents of the Home Rule Confederation of Great Britain and while he said this he, with a dramatic gesture, left fall a book among the crowd and told them to look in that book and they would find his name as one of the Vice Presidents. He was a most impressive orator, a singularly cultured and able speaker. Gradually, by his persuasive eloquence, he won over his listeners, and they cheered him lustily in the end.

CAMPAIGNING

The Very Rev. Dr. Cleary, afterwards Archbishop of Kingston, Canada, was Parish Priest of Dungarvan at the time. He warmly espoused Mr. O'Donnell's candidature. He was supported by the clergy, who were good platform orators and nightly speeches were made from the windows of Flynn's Hotel. Great excitement prevailed during the election. Mr. Matthews gradually lost ground. His sneering reference to Home Rule did him a lot of harm and when the votes were counted after polling day it was found that O'Donnell was returned by a majority of some thirty votes. Mr. Matthews left hurriedly for London. Frank Hugh O'Donnell became a member of the House of Commons and when another election came in April 1880 he was returned easily, and remained member for Dungarvan until the passing of the Redistribution of Seats Act, which merged the local borough into the constituency of West Waterford.

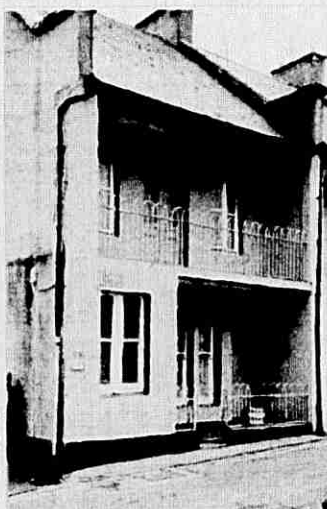

Danny Cunningham's 'River Painting' Opens This Week

With the number of artists who are exhibiting in Dungarvan continuing to grow, there is little doubt but that branch of the arts is being adequately catered for in this part of the County. This week another young artist is mounting his first solo exhibition, which promises a completely new perspective on one aspect of the rural landscape in County Waterford. Danny Cunningham's 'River Painting' will open at the magnificently appointed Old Market House Arts Centre this Wednesday night at 7.30 pm, and promises a collection of exciting works which are set to delight the large numbers expected to view.

A native of Dungarvan, Danny graduated from Crawford College of Art and Design, in Cork with a first class honours degree in Fine Art Painting. During his final year in college he returned home, to Dungarvan, to draw inspiration from the places familiar to him, the shallow riverbeds around Co. Waterford that he used to explore in his scouting days. These he painted on paper in the middle of the woods and, considering their size, some of which were up to twenty feet long by nine feet high, it was a brave undertaking. These

spontaneous and vibrant paintings won him Crawford's "Adventurous Painters Prize".

Over the next few years Danny experimented with unique and exciting compositions inspired by the lush and meandering Tay river valley, near Stradbally. He initially painted in the same 'on the spot' style that won him much acclaim in Cork.

Gradually, however, he found that this method was somewhat limiting and more

could be achieved by working these same compositions onto solid canvases. His approach became more methodical as he began to work, not only in the forest, but also in his studio, building up layers of colour and texture over months and even years.

This new method allowed the work to go one step further, creating a new solidity and a greater awareness of light and shade, colour and mark-making. It also allowed Danny to experiment with the many textures of oil paints, applying them with different implements from a plaster trowel to a domestic sweeping brush, creating various thicknesses from 'elephant skin' to watery translucent varnishes. In 'River Painting', Danny uses colour in a very considered way. Exaggerating the actual



rich natural colours of objects in the damp river valley, enjoying the 'peaty' colours of water in flood or the seasonal variations in foliage.

Over the last few years Danny has moved out from Gleshelane and Tay valleys searching for new motifs on the Finisk, Dalligan and Colligan Rivers. He has exhibited in several local and national

exhibitions. He has also has been 'Artist in Residence' on a number of educational projects for the Co. Waterford Arts Office.

'River Painting' by Danny Cunningham will run from Nov. 15th - Dec. 22nd, and the opening hours will be Tuesday - Friday 1:30 pm - 5:00pm and Saturday 12 noon - 6:00pm.

Paul Walsh reported that it was a very constructive meeting, the subject being breaches of EU directives by Waterford County Council and An Bord Pleanála, in relation to the proposed intensive piggery at Rathnaskillogue.

A recommendation by DG Environment to pursue this matter legally could ultimately result in a hefty fine for the Irish Government. The spokesperson for DG Environment said that it was reassuring to see citizens in Ireland taking up their right to bring legitimate cases to the EU, privately and in Community Groups.

Paul Walsh said that €350 was raised for this trip, of which €340 was spent on accommodation and travel for himself and Brian Corry (the expenditure excluded food). A further €600 will be needed to pay for the legal costs of the Section 30 and the submission to the E.P.A. which will be done in the next two weeks. 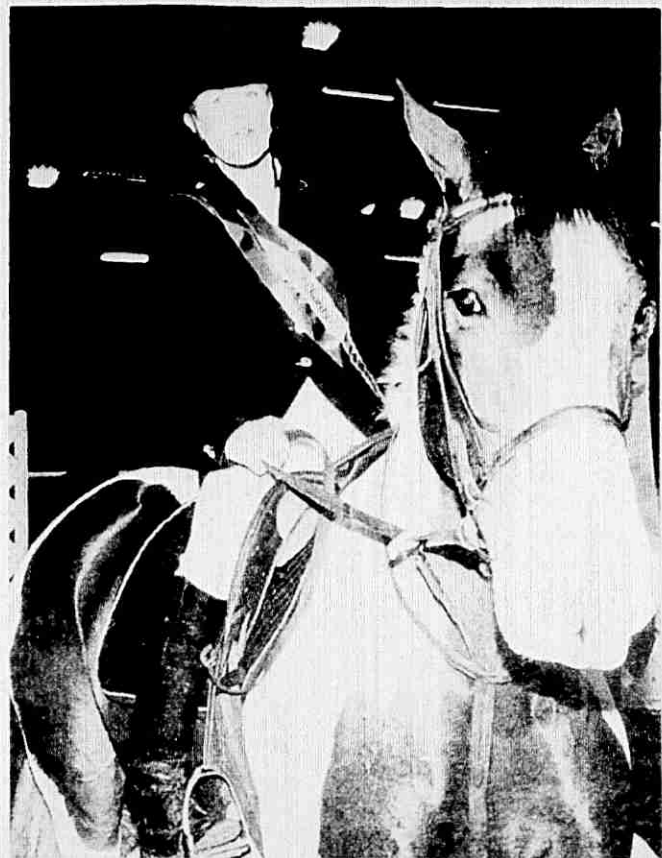

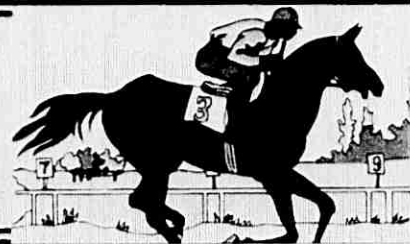

Mt. Sion 3-4 Ballyduff 0-12

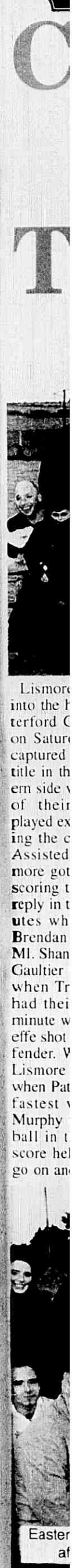

Senior Championship Structures

It would seem from the recent western board meeting and the discussion on the Tallow motion at the county board meeting, that the losers group is not going to be continued for the new championship year. Giving clubs a second chance is not only a good idea, it is now essential. Teams should not be expected to train for months for just 60 minutes of championship hurling or football, if beaten in their first match. But the losers group system does not

seem to be the answer.

Over the next six or seven weeks to the fixtures meetings, ideas about formula's will be put forward and all will have a second chance built in, whatever the system.

The senior championships in both codes, as they stand, cannot be a great success because of the imbalance in standards. We do not have 12 senior hurling and football teams as while they are there in name, not more than four or five of them have a realis-

tic chance of winning their championship.

Staying up senior is a 'status' thing with a lot of mediocre teams when they know very well that they do not have a snowball's chance of winning the championship. This applies to football and hurling.

However, while clubs insist on keeping senior status, a system must be formulated to keep them in competition for a full league and give them as many championship games (and chances) as possible without prolonging the championships and with as little interference as possible with the divisional championships. All senior clubs are tied in to divisional championships as well.

My suggestion for both the senior hurling and football championships is that the twelve clubs be divided into 4 groups of 3 teams in each group. In a seeding operation, the 4 top clubs (in hurling) Mount Sion, Ballygunner, Lismore and Ballyduff be listed in separate groups and the other two teams for each group be drawn from a hat. This will guarantee

a minimum of 2 matches for the poorest teams, 3 matches for the next, 4 for the semi-finalists and 5 for the county finalists. The top 2 teams in each group to qualify for the quarter-finals on a knock-out basis. This would entail 19 matches in the championship in each code.

In football the same system to apply with the 4 semi-finalists. Nire, Rathgormack, Kilrossanty and Ballinacourty being seeded and placed in separate groups before the draws are made.

AWARDS

The special committee who will adjudicate on the annual awards for club of the year, players, adult and underage and the Jack Furlong Award winner, are expected to meet shortly in order to ensure that the winners can be announced to County Convention.

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

The November and final monthly meeting of the outgoing county board is deferred until Monday 27th inst. because there will be no monthly meeting in December.

Owned by TJ Myron and trained by Seamus Graham Daddy Cool trailed the early leader Dearthair Dubh to the third bend. When the leader stayed wide the jolly nipped into the lead to race on for a length win over a hampered Busy Decision.

In the second semi-final Bolivian Buddy (Ready About NGA-Couch Potato) justified evens favouritism with a deserved victory in a career best 29.42. Knocked about on his only outing at Enniscorthy Bolivian Buddy started much better on this occasion tracking the front running Outlikealight to the middle of the back stretch. Coming in for sustained support in the second semi-final from an opening show of 5/4 the Joe Langton owned and Declan Byrne trained Castlecreen Echo (He Knows-Maltese Angel) made short work of the opposition with a pillar to post 29.40 success. Outpacing his rivals in every department the favourite coasted to a three and three-quarter lengths win over Scaldy Slu.

Taking on race dogs the Michael Greene owned Desert Harry (Arrigle Buddy-Proper Club) 1/2 made a pleasing debut capturing the eleventh race in 29.38. Led early on by Boher Joy the favourite struck the front down the back to motor on for a facile five and a half lengths victory over Boher Joy.

Racing came to a successful conclusion for Clonea owner Michael Power whose Spanky Scheels a full sister to earlier winner Castlecreen Dino ran away with the twelfth race in an impressive 29.29. Powerful Spiral closed right up on the winner running down to the third bend but "Spanky" kicked again drawing well clear for a deserved six and three-quarter lengths win over Kittys Mole.

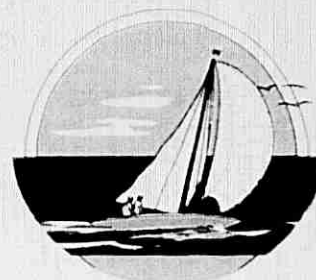

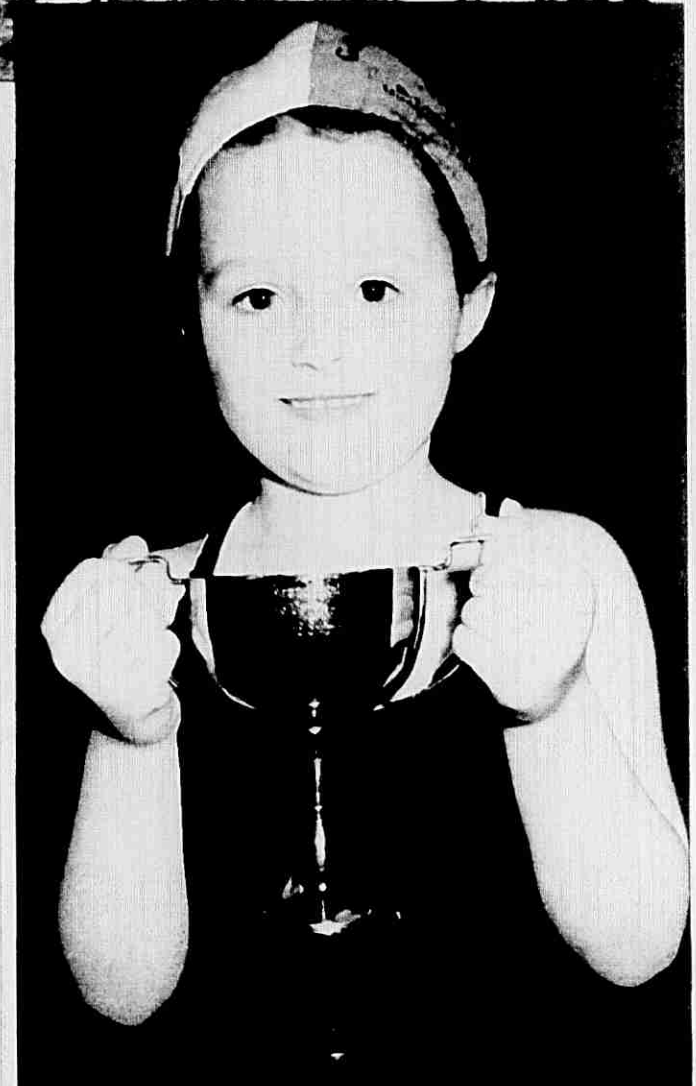
Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club Notes
