A proposal to provide the through two existing private housing estates at Western Bay and Bay View, has been described by a member of

Dungaryan Urban Council as "crazy" and a definite "non runner"

Cllr. John Deasy told the monthly UDC meeting last Monday night that the proposal isn't feasible and cannot be allowed to happen. "There is", he suggested, "a perfect alternative route to the proposed housing development that can be created".

Up to twenty residents from the Western Bay and Bay View estates sat in on the meeting as observers. All of the residents are implacably opposed to having the main route to the proposed 108 unit development at Cloneety through their estates, and they heard pledges of support from each councillor for their opposition to that proposal.

Cllr. Billy Kyne urged the Council officials to sit down with the developer to discuss and do all in their respective powers to come up with an alternative access route.

Cllr. Kyne said he feared that if the Council simply refused planning permission the developer could then appeal that decision to An Bord Pleanala and ultimately that body could give the go ahead to access to the development through both housing estates.

"This Council", Cllr. Kyne continued, must make every effort to get the developer to agree with our view that the main access route should not be through the Western Bay and Bay View estates".

Cllr. Lar Hart supported his colleagues and said that if the access road was allowed through both estates it would impact negatively on the lifestyles of the residents in a very major way.

Cllr. Hart said the residents are not opposed to the proposed housing development at Cloneety but they most definitely are against having their estates as the main route to it. He disclosed that the residents of Congress Villas also have concerns about certain aspects of the proposed development and there are a number of points they would like the UDC to take on board adjudicating on the planning application.

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
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THE WAY WE LIVE

GREAT CLASSICS

Great stories are still read many years after they were first invented. The Thousand and One Nights is a collection of Middle Eastern stories believed to be 2,000 years old.



Great legendary heroes have often been celebrated in long poems, called epics (or sagas). At first these poems were not written down, and would have been sung or recited.


One of the most famous epics is the Anglo-Saxon poem of Beowolf, a legendary prince who kills Grendel, the maneating monster who lives in the marshes. and then kills Grendel's mother.

THE POWER OF BOOKS

Throughout history, writers have challenged old ideas and explored new lines of thought, and books have proved an important influence on public opinion.

In 1850 Harriet Beecher Stowe wrote Uncle Tom's Cabin, a novel that describes the evils of slavery in the United States. The book played an important part in bringing slavery to an end.

But books that criticise governments are sometimes banned or burned and can get the author into trouble. In 1974 the Russian writer Alexander Solzhenitsyn was exiled for his criticism of his country's regime.

Welcome For Abortion Report, Referendum Not

O CEILLEACHAIR

Dungarvan Labour Councilwelcomed the publication of the abortion report by the All-Party Committee on the Constitution

Speaking at a meeting of his party's National Executive in Dublin on November 16th. Cllr. O Céilleachair says the report clearly shows consensus around the task of tackling the issue of crisis pregnancy thereby reducing the number of Irish abortions and providing the necessary supports for women in crisis pregnancy. The fact that no consensus has been reached in relation to a referendum is, in Cllr. O Céilleachair's view, an indication of the complexities surrounding abortion.

"Labour believes that it is

Necessary lor Fiachra O Céilleachair has important that the central self to a referendum

issue arising from the publication of this report is not about a referendum at all, but rather about facing the realities of abortion and the needs of women in a crisis pregnancy. A referendum will not make the slightest difference to that reality, except that it might put certain women's lives at risk if it passes.

The needs of women in crisis pregnancy are too important to be drowned out by yet another unnecessary referendum. The Government is clearly split on the issue: the Tanaiste has already stated that she does not want to see another divisive referendum. On the other hand, the Taoiseach has committed himthe demands of four Independent Deputies, who might otherwise threaten the future of this Government.

We have a choice: either we can, yet again, go down the unnecessary and divisive route of a referendum or we can move to find common ground, rather than division. We all share a desire to reduce the number of crisis pregnancies that Irish women are experiencing. We can work together to ensure that a strategy can be effective to meet this objective.

A referendum will prevent that kind of consensus being found and will lead to further confrontation, while the real issues are overshadowed."

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

150ml cider

1 large sprig rosemary 2-3 cloves garlic, peeled and sliced

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
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


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
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STRADBALLY NOTES





REDUCING LABOUR IN SHEEP

At a very well attended Teagasc Seminar in Dungaryan last Monday, Teagasc Sheep Specialist, Pat Clarke gave the preliminary results of a Teagasc Labour survey of sheep farmers. Thirty farms are being surveyed with an average flock size of 370 ewes per farm.

There have been a number of interesting observations to

The average time spent per ewe per year is 8 hours

The average amount of time spent per livestock unit of sheep and per livestock unit of cattle is the same

The top third of farmers in terms of time, spent five hours per ewe per year and sold 1.54 lambs per ewe to the ram The bottom third spent 10 hours per ewe per year and sold 1.42 lambs per ewe to the ram. Spending more time does not necessarily increase output.

Pat then when on to discuss how the workload on sheep farms can be minimised.

Good sheep fencing is essential

A good sheep dog can save a lot of time.

A basic handling unit consisting of a holding pen, race footbath and two drafting pens should be provided on each block of land where sheep are grazed. This eliminates driving sheep long distances to handling facilities.

Access to paddocks and handling facilities must be well laid out.

Suitable equipment for doing different jobs must be available e.g. dosing guns, foot shears etc.

In some cases the system of sheep production on the farm may need to be changed. Early and mid season lamb production on the same farm means a lot of time is spent supervising lambing. A good layout in winter accommodation, so that feeding, cleaning etc. can be done mechanically, is vital.

Fire is a risk on every farm and in every home. Take the time now to look at y0our buildings and procedures to reduce the risk of fire.

Fire Risks - Vehicles and Engines

Hot exhausts and sparks from exhausts setting fire to straw or other combustibles.

Wiring faults igniting insulation

Heat from the engine setting fire to the materials allowed to come in contact with it.

Keep machinery clean and in good order



Misused and faulty electrical equipment causes fires. Ensure all sockets are protected by a 30 amp RCD All metalwork of electrical apparatus should be earthed

The local community in Dungarvan and Abbeyside has lost one of its most respected and revered members through the recent death of Mrs. Nancy Nagle, "Inis Ealga", Clonea Road, Abbeyside, which occurred at St. Josephs Hospital on November 10th after a protracted ill-

A member of the widely known Norris family, Nancy was wife of the late Michael C. Nagle who was Editor of the Dungarvan Leader newspaper for many years and who predeceased her in May 1993

A lady of immense charm and personality, she endeared herself to everyone who knew her. An exemplary wife and mother, she was also a truly wonderful friend and neighbour on whom one could place their very life. When a good turn needed to be done, or a helping hand to be extended, people didn't have to look beyond Nancy.

The older generation in her home town will always remember her for the outstandingly successful ladies hairstylist business she set up and managed with such business acumen for all of thirty three years. At all times a lady who had great personal faith, she lived a life full of goodness and kindness and was a lady virtually incapable of doing one a wrong turn. She went about her life in an utterly unobtrusive way, never seeking plaudits for this, that or the other, content simply to do what she could when she could without any sense of public acknowledgement.

The death of her husband seven years ago was a great personal setback to her



in life, and she also suffered the pain and anguish of losing her son John more that twenty years ago when he was only in his mid 20's. But she was above all a very resilient person and that resilience and fortitude enabled her to carry on despite the great sense of loss she undoubtedly felt.

Your Own Nuts Worth The Wait

IF you have a largish plot of land which you intend to keep in your family for many years and should be harvested in the years you may like to consider turning it autumn. into a nut garden.

Several nut-bearing trees and bushes are suitable for gardens and orchards. Some, such as chestnuts, walnuts and pecans, eventually form large trees and make handsome specimens.

In small gardens an almond tree may make a nice feature, although it may produce nuts only in a warm climate. Cobnuts and filberts may be pruned as compact bushes in a fruit garden or planted in informal groups in a wild garden.

WALNUTS

Irish walnuts (although strictly speaking they are Persian) are deciduous trees that grow to a height of 60ft and are suitable

planted for fruit since seedlings may produce poor quality nuts.

A well-drained moisture retentive site is best for walnut trees. Flowers and young shoots are susceptible to frost damage so cold exposed sites should be avoided.

Walnuts may be slow to establish but stronger growth will occur after two or three years once the root system is well developed.

Walnut trees will need many years before they start bearing.

CHESTNUTS

Sweet or Spanish chestnuts are deciduous summer-flowering trees which can grow up to a height of 100ft with a spread of 50ft. They are normally wind pollinated.

A site with moisture retentive soil is preferred. Young trees should be wellwatered and kept free of weeds. after five years, although full production Applications of fertiliser should not be

COBNUTS AND FILBERTS

Cobnuts (or hazels) and filberts are valued for their winter catkins as well as their nuts. Unpruned they reach a height and spread of around 12ft.

They are deciduous and crop best in cool moist summers. Cobnuts and filberts are wind-pollinated and self-fertile

A partially sheltered shaded position is preferable and a soil pH of 6 is hest. Adequate moisture with good drainage is important. Saplings should be planted in autumn or early winter.

They should be weeded and mulched regularly and watered during dry spells. Established bushes bear heavier crops if only for large gardens.

Named cultivars should always be after just three or four years. pruned in late summer. Nuts are borne

PECAN NUTS


Pecans are deciduous trees which may grow to a height of 100ft so, like walnuts, they are suitable only for large gardens. They grow best in warm-temperate cli-

mates. Choose selected cultivars that have been grafted on to pecan seedling stock as trees

raised from seed may not produce fruit of good quality. Plant young trees in a site that has deep fertile soil which is sheltered from strong winds. Keep the site weed-free and well-

watered during dry periods. Pecans are quite resistant to drought but require plenty of water during the summer months. The trees are seldom affected by pests and diseases.

The first crop of nuts may be produced will not be reached until the tree is 15 to ed. Most cultivars are partly for almond trees to produce 20 years old.

This Week In The Garden

Pick and store grapes

There is no longer any point in leaving grapes hanging on the vines. If you have a cool, dark and dry room to store them in, all the better - but they should be picked by now anyway. Cut each bunch with about 23 centimetres of the vine still attached. Put the vine end in a jar full of clean soft water with a few pieces of charcoal in it making sure the grapes are hanging freely outside

Prune the vines

By now the leaves of early or maincrop vines should have started to wilt or fall off. Outdoor vines can be pruned. The method for cutting both back is the same. Cut off the two nearest new shoots to dormant growth buds stemming from the main rod or spur. Tear off or remove all loose bark from the main rods and rub in Gishurst compound, made up of soap and sulphur. It kills bugs and parasites that live in the gnarly parts of the plant. When finished, remove any ties you have keeping the plant upright and lay it as close to parallel to the floor as possible. This will help encourage an even growth.

Plants in frames

From now on until early spring, plants kept in frames will require very careful handling. Some, such as rooted viola, pansies, violet cuttings, sweet pea seedlings and violet clumps, are quite hardy and only need protection from heavy frosts and beating rain. They also need ventilation. Lights should be placed on the frames when the sun sets. Plants such as pelargoniums, marguerites and choice fuchsias are likely to be damaged by the smallest amount of frost and need to be protected by sacks at night. Remove and burn any yellowing leaves and poke the soil around with a stick to aerate it.

Cauliflower protection

The curds of the cauliflower should be starting to form. To protect them from frost, bend some of the outer leaves over them.

Recovering from Depression

Freud's classic paper "Mourning and his thinking and behaviour Melancholia" emphasised the self reproach of without help and support. depressives. In that paper he went on to say that. That is where a course of the distinguishing mental features of melancholia are a profoundly painful dejection and cessation of interest in the outside world. He further wrote that there is a loss of the capacity to love, the self esteem, self knowlinhibition of all activity and a lowering of self- edge, self care, self moderregarding feelings - and depressive feelings culminate in a delusional expectation of punishment. This picture becomes a little more intelligible when we consider that with one exception the same traits are met with in mourning. The disturbance of self regard is absent in mourning but otherwise the features are the same.

Profound mourning - the reaction to the loss of someone who is loved - contains the same painful frame of mind, the same loss of interest in the outside world, the same loss of capacity to adopt any new object of love and the same turning away from any activity that is not connected with thoughts of the dead one. The psychiatrist, Aaron Beck, referred to depression as a malignant invasion by emotions - particularly sadness of the cognitive processes that maintain a depressed person's self defeating and pain inducing attitudes. Depressives are locked in

CASE HISTORY

"Joan" came to my office a few years ago. She was unkempt with a fearful tense and exhausted appearance. She didn't smile and was unable to look at me directly. She in fact appeared to be in a trance like state. Her memory was confused and uncertain. She talked of how she was letting everybody down and that family - the world would be better off without her. She revealed a deep sense of paranoia and a conviction that no one understood her. Her objective and subjective symptoms indicated that she was suffering from a deep depression.

Indeed her overall profile was a classic case of severe depression in an adult.

ROAD TO RECOVERY

Depression is retroflexed rage, a despairing cry for love that is full of anger. So the journey out requires the nurturing of healthier attitudes. The most crucial attitudes are perceptions in acceptance, mindfulness, forgiveness, patterns of think-I would describe recovery as akin to climbing out of an abyss into daylight. The first step in recovery is coming to an understanding of the why of depression. Depression has its roots in childhood experiences and is a mask for very deep and painful feelings which are buried in the conscious and subconscious. From infancy to adolescence we are recording what I call "mental tapes," based on what we experience in our family systems. These tapes and recorded conditionings and behaviours determine how we deal with life and relationships. Depression is really a disconnection from inner feelings and will continue until the sufferer reexperiences these emotions. Depressives who as children were rejected experience uncomfortable feelings when criticised in or you will be blamed, punished etc. adulthood. Each criticism sets off fragments of just get into the moment. See the colours of life total feeling experience. So the childhood feelnow converted into what is going on at the moment. When these are buried they leave a residue of tension which must be released and when a person becomes depressed he is thrown into that part of him which makes him feel tense. anxious and fearful. Hopelessness emerges and the sufferer caves in.

HEALING

Healing begins when a person begins the return journey into childhood trauma.

In doing this defences used to mask the depression must be laid aside. The sufferer must confront his innermost feelings, unplug childhood traumas and get in contact with all the wounded parts of himself.

This confrontation of feelings is the gateway to developing a real sense of self and establishing healthy boundaries. However it can be very difficult for the deeply depressed person to transform

counselling with an experienced therapist comes in. In therapy the person learns ation, self protection. This discovering of the self I compare to peeling back the layers of an onion.



After peeling back the many layers the depressed person finds that the blackness inside lightens and the rays of light filter through like the chords of a symphony.

Self-help groups also help a great many people in their journey out of depression. When a person who is deeply depressed joins he finds fellowship with others who have had similar experiences. Isolation is ended and the person feels he will be listened to and that he can talk and be understood. He will learn that recovery really is one step at a time, that setbacks are a part of recovery, but with support problems can be worked through. He will be inspired by the stories of those who have recovered and in time will reach out to rigid, negative views of the self that are not based others. A good self help group is two-way - there is giving and receiving and that is wonderfully therapeutic. For a group to be successful there must also be total confidentiality and trust and it must be highly organised and structured so that everyone feels they are a valuable part of the

CHANGING THOUGHTS

The journey out of depression is an ongoing one. It is essential that you change old beliefs that you are bad and unlovable. You must move from self accusation to self acceptance. I say many times that we are what our thoughts and that we can only focus on one thought at a time. For a depressed person to be told to "snap out of it" is unhelpful and only plunges him or her deeper into deeper gloom. In fact it can take quite some time to change old habits of thinking but with awareness and discipline it can be done. The rewards are great as a whole new life opens up. The sufferer is renewed, he can now face the day with joy, he can take on fresh challenges readily and can bring a new vitality to relationships.

Depressed people are always tense and find it difficult to relax. They think that if they do relax something worse will happen because they are losing control. Slow, deep breathing, relaxing visualisation and meditation all help greatly in moving from tension to relaxation. When you relax physical tension is released and as the mind and body are part of a whole, mental tension is also off-loaded, thus allowing you to think more clearly and rationally.

GRATITUDE

It is not what happens to us that matters but how we interpret our life experiences. Instead of thinking how you are deprived, cheated, long suffering and how you must do this or that perfectly

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I have heard that there is a new public service number. Is this the same as my RSI number or do I need to get a public service number for myself?

Answer

The Personal Public Service Number (PPS Number.) replaces the existing Revenue and Social Insurance Number (RSI Number). It is your unique reference number for all dealings with the public service, including social welfare, tax, education and health services eligibility. If you already hold an RSI number, then you do not need to apply for a PPS Number, as it automatically becomes your PPS

Women who are not employed and who use their husband's RSI Number with a "W" after the number will have to register for a PPS No. as the tax office will not issue a Certificate of Tax-Free Allowances using the RSI number with a 'W'.

In order to register for a PPS No. they should go to their Social Welfare Local Office with the following documents; Long version Birth Certificate.

Passport or Driving Licence.

Supporting documentation eg household bills.

Non-Irish national will need to provide their passport and/or Green Card and supporting documentation, such as household bills.

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

The Environs **Circa 1920**

Below we include an interesting article from Keohan's History of Dungaryan

The environs of the town present very healthy and interesting walks. It is so easy to get into the country. Immediately you leave the town you are among the green fields, the hedgerows and the rural beauties. This is the case on all sides, except that of the sea. The "New Line" is a favourite promenade, so is also the Youghal Road, the Hospital Road, Shandon, the Kilrush Road or the road to the Burgery. The latter is a beautiful suburb of the town in the Abbeyside district. It is nicely sheltered with trees and the walk around Boherawilling, either to or from the Burgery, is one of varied attractions, each curve presenting new features which creates a pleasing impression. Of late years some new houses have been built - one at the Burgery, where the Abbeyside curate resides, six fine houses below the Abbeyside school house (at the Pond) and a new scheme of eight houses built by the Urban Council - four at Abbeyside and four at Fair Lane, Dungarvan. Nevertheless, there is a great want of housing accommodation in the town. The Government are endeavoring to promote building and are giving grants as subsidies to private builders. still, with high cost of labour and material, as well as conditions which do not tend to the comfort of house owners, it may be that the efforts made will not have the desired effect.

CONTRAST

The last sentence above echoes a familiar note when one discusses house building today. It is all a matter of scale really. Contrast Keohan's comments with those of the scribe in the Parish Newsletter for November 2000, - the building of Southways, Meadowlands, The Ministers, Strandside, the massive building at Ballinroad, making it a Village in its own right, The Hermitage, Tournore Court, Sallybrook on the Clonea Road and the huge building programme which has studded the Ballinacourty / Clonea areas with new dwellings. In the last forty years the number of houses has doubled and the population of the Parish has more than doubled.

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Unity All The Way As Fianna Fail **Nominate Three**

In stark contrast to the rancour and bitterness which have narred past conventions, it was unity all the way among undreds of Fianna Fail delegates in Dungarvan last Saturlay night when they unanimously nominated outgoing Deputies Martin Cullen and Brendan Kenneally, together with Tourin based county councillor Ollie Wilkinson, to ontest the four seat Waterford constituency in the next

Three years ago this same "team" went very close to capturing three seats, with Wilkinson making a spectacular electoral debut that yielded him almost 5,000 first preferences. The battle cry at Saturday night's convention chaired by Environment Minister Noel Dempsey - was that the winning of an extra seat next time is an attainable objective.

Once the party's national executive confirmed that three candidates should be selected the convention became nothing more than a formality. In fact it was all over in less than an hour and a half without the necessity of a vote.

Minister Dempsey said that the absolute minimum return from the Waterford constituency in the next election must be two seats, but clearly they have an outstanding chance of making what would be a vital gain for the party.

Cllr. Wilkinson, who recorded the biggest ever vote by a candidate in last year's local elections in the Lismore electoral area, in a post convention comment said that he believed they have a fighting chance this time of winning a third seat in the constituency.

We went very close the last time, and with Fine Gael's Deputy Austin Deasy standing down I believe we can improve on our excellent 1997 performance", he said.

The convention was also attended by members of the FF national executive, including key constituency strategist

At earlier conventions in the constituency Fine Gael selected John Deasy a son of the sitting TD and Waterford Corporation member Maurice Cummins who unsuccessfully contested the last election for the party. Labour unanimously nominated their outgoing Deputy, Brian O'Shea, while the Progressive Democrats, who didn't field a candidate in the constituency last time, have nominated their lone Corporation member, Oliver Cleary.

Sinn Fein hasn't contested the constituency for decades and isn't expected to do so next time, leaving only the Workers Party to decide on its candidate. The late Martin O'Regan who polled in excess of 4,000 first preferences in 1997, would have been the automatic choice but his recent unexpected death has dealt a major blow to the party

The frontrunners, should they decide to stand, will be the late Alderman O'Regan's Corporation colleagues John Halligan and Davy Walsh.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan said that with cars parked in Western Bay it isn't always easy to drive freely through the estate. The situation would become significantly worse if the estate was to service the additional traffic another 108 houses would generate, and she feared what might happen in the event of a fire at the far end of the estate.

Cllrs. Damien Dillon, Paddy Power, John Deasy, Damien Geoghegan and the chairman Cllr. Michael O'Riordan all spoke strongly against accessing the main route to the development through the two estates, with Cllr. Geoghegan insistent that the increased traffic and the speed factor would have a devastating impact on the residents. "It would be lost unfair to impose that route on them", he added.

Cllr. Power however expressed similar concerns to those voiced by Cllr. Kyne regarding a "blanket" refusal of the planning application and the possibility of that decision being subsequently overturned on appeal by An Bord Pleanala.

"It would be far better for the Urban Council to sit down with the developer and try to find an alternative route beween them", Cllr. Power said.

Cllr. Damien Dillon, who has written personally to all of the Western Bay and Bay View residents offering his support to them, reiterated that support, while the chairman, Cllr. O'Riordan, said an alternative to what is being proposed must be found.

The town clerk, Brian White, said the planning application was only lodged with the UDC on November 10th and a decision on it is not due until January 9th. He assured the members that they will take fully on board all the submissions that are made and the councillors will also be kept fully informed.

Mr. White also said they will endeavour to meet with the developer and any other landowners that might be involved in the creation of an alternative route to the Cloneety site.





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
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
