Defiant Deasy Unapologetic On Bruton

Concerns are being voiced within some sections of Fine Gael in the Waterford constituency of possible internal friction following Deputy Austin Deasy's unsuccessful "no confidence" move against party leader John Bruton last week.

One of the first to publicly criticise the former Minister for Agriculture was Waterford Corporation member, Cllr. Maurice Cummins, who was the Dungarvan based TDs unsuccessful runningmate in the 1997 general election in the constituency.

Ironically Cummins and Deputy Deasy's son, John, who is a member of both Dungarvan Urban Council and Waterford County Council, were recently selected to represent Fine

Gael in the next general election in what could become a key marginal four seat constituency.

However Cllr. Cummins was quick to distance himself from Deputy Deasy's move against Mr. Bruton, insisting that there is no justification for his motion of no confidence in the party leader.

"I believe John Bruton is an honest, decent and capable leader of Fine gael, and twice in the past Austin Deasy has supported him. CONTINUED ON PAGE 7

7% Increase In Town Rate **But Refuse** Charge **Remains At** £2 Per Tag

It took the members of Dungarvan Urban Council little more than ninety minutes to adopt a rate of £41.68 in the £ for the coming year at Monday night's annual estimates meeting.

This new figure represents an increase of 7% on the existing rate, and while that represents not very good news for the commercial sector which pays rates, householders throughout the town will be relieved that the £2 bin tag charge for refuse collection remains unaltered in 2001.

The detailed book of estimates presented by County Manager Donal Connolly was described by Cllr. Damien Dillon at the "best deal we can have for the town". However Labour's Cllr. Lar Hart didn't view things in a similar light, and he alone among the eight councillors present voted against the adoption of the new rate.

"Last year I also voted against the adoption of the estimates on the basis that they contained a charge for **CONTINUED ON PAGE 7**



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

A good night was had by all in aid of the RNLI, a very deserving cause.

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
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THE WAY WE LIVE

For thousands of years people have enjoyed bringing stories to life by acting them out. The firstperformances were probably ritual dances by ancient peoples calling upon the spirits to help them and using dance, music, make-up nd costumes to add force to their message.

Today, plays or stories are usually performed by actors in a theatre - a building specially designed for dramatic shows. In the grandest theatres the stage is overlooked by rows and rows of seats so that a large audience can watch the performance.

There is a large area behind the stage for scenery, and an area where the orchestra can sit so that live music can accompany the perform-

Special lights hung around the stage help to create the atmosphere. Many people work in a large theatre, designing and making the scenery and costumes and preparing the actors for the show. But actors can be just as entertaining when performing plays in a small open space with a few simple props.

FACE MASKS

In ancient times actors would play several parts in a drama, changing masks to show which character was speaking. Below are the masks of comedy and tragedy.



SHADOW PUPPETS

Shadow puppets are popular throughout Southeast Asia. They are made of leather and moved from beneath by means of metal rods. A light behind them throws their shadows on to a screen, beyond which the audience sits to watch the drama.

GREEK THEATRE

The earliest theatres that survive today are the open air Greek theatres built over 2,300 years ago. The actors performed on a stage at the centre - an area called the orchestra - and the audience sat in a semi-circle around them on rows of stone seats.

The clever design of the theatre meant that the actors' voices carried clearly to the back rows. Behind the orchestra was an area for costumes and props. The actors were all men and they wore masks depicting a range of set characters, including women.

On the right is one of the most magnificent theatres of ancient Greece, the theatre of Herod Atticus, built on the Acropolis at Athens.

NEGOTIATING WITH CREDITORS

If you are in financial difficulty, it does not pay to ignore those bills that are dropping through the letter box. Try to make contact with your creditor and never ignore any letters or demands from them.

Make out a precise statement of your income and expenditure, so that you can offer to reduce each debt as much

Write to your creditors and explain to them about your situation. Your letters should be brief and clear. They are not interested in hearing your life history about how you got yourself into debt, but are interested in hearing about your proposals to repay them. Most creditors will look more favourably on your predicament if they hear from you before you fall behind in payments.

Be realistic about your repayments. Do not promise a payment that you cannot maintain.

Keep copies of the letters you send and replies received. If your situation improves, try to pay a little extra to your creditors with each payment.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I have been receiving Deserted Wife's Benefit since 1990. If I take up employment will it affect my payment?

ANSWER

Deserted Wife's Benefit (DWB) was replaced by the One-Parent Family Payment in January 1997 for new claimants. If you were already getting DVM prior to 1997 you will continue to be paid the payment as long as you satisfy the conditions of the scheme.

In 1992 income limits were introduced for the first time for determining entitlement to DWB. If you have been receiving DVM since before 1992 you may take up employment without it affecting your payment in anyway.

For those who have only been getting DWB since 1992 they may have an income (i.e. earnings and other reckonable income) up to £9,999 per annum without it affecting their payment. For income between £10,000 and £14,000 a reduced personal rate will be paid. However, the full rate of payment will be made for each child dependant. No DVM will be paid if income exceeds £14, 000 per annum. For further information contact your Social Welfare Local

refuse collection, and I am going to do likewise now", he added.

The estimates provide for a record expenditure of £2,711,677 in the coming year - an increase of just over £270,000 in the current year. Estimated revenue is put at just short of £1.5m, leaving £1.2m to be levied by way of commercial rates.

"A rate of £41.68 in the £ will be required for 2001, an increase of 7% over this year which is in line with inflation and is below the 9% cap placed on rate increases by the Minister for the Environment", the County Manager

Some of the more salient features of the estimates include a proposal to increase from thirty pence to forty pence the hourly car parking charge from July 1st next. There is provision of £18,000 towards the funding of a new childrens playground, while a sum of £14,000 for new public lighting was described by Cllr. Billy Kyne as "disappointingly small" in the overall context of their annual budg-

However the county manager said the officials will meet with the ESB and ask the semi State company to look at the general public lighting standards within the urban area, and they may come back to the Council later in the year with a proposal to spend further monies on lighting. WATER

In the coming year there will be a £100 charge on business premises not using water for commercial premises, a £150 charge on business premises using unmetered water and a £200 charge for water on restaurants and B&B's.

A number of councillors, including Cllr. Nuala Ryan expressed concern about the size of the latter charge as it relates to B&B's. However the manager said that over a twelve month period it amounted to about £4 a week and that could not be considered excessive.

Confirming his intention not to increase the £2 charge for the refuse collection tag, Mr. Connolly disclosed that while that had estimated that the charge would bring in £185,000 to the Council this year they now estimate that there will be a shortfall of £30,000 on that figure. The estimated revenue for the coming year however is £170,000.

ALLOWANCE

In the current year the allowance for the Council chairman is £2,000 but that will increase to £3,500 in 2001. Also members expenses for attending seminars and conferences has been increased from £9,000 this year to £12,000 next.

The county manager disclosed that the estimates also provide for a sum of

£169,000 to be spent on housing maintenance and repairs in the coming year, £5,000 to provide smoke alarms in the remaining Council houses still without the facility, £30,000 on the provision of facilities for the disabled, £240,000 for a roadworks programme, £157,000 for the operation and maintenance of the water supply system and £116,250 for the sewerage system, £404 for the waste management programme.

The chairman, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, welcomed the managerial decision not to increase the £2 refuse tag charge, but Cllr. Billy Kyne commented on the ominous warning from the manager that it will have to be "seriously looked at" next year.

Cllr. Kyne said that while he remains unhappy that there is any kind of charge for refuse collection he will support the estimates because they provide for funding for a new childrens playground, for the provision of facilities for local clubs such as the boxing and pigeon clubs. The 40 pence car parking charge was also of concern to him, he added.

However on the proposal of Cllr. Ryan seconded by Cllr. Dillon the new rate of £41,68 in the £ was adopted on a 7/1 vote. Cllr. Harty's proposal that the estimates be rejected failed to get a

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Defiant Deasy Unapologetic On Bruton Heave Attempt

"Can I take it that he is now admitting that he was wrong on those two previous occasions" asked Cllr. Cummins.

He also referred to a similar type heave by his constituency colleague against another former FG leader, Alan Dukes, "It's a case of history repeating itself", added Cllr. Cummins.

Given that Cummins must now share an election platform with the Deputy's son when they will seek to win two seats in the constituency next time out, the current situation will undoubtedly create - at best an uneasy peace between them. Others may see the situation as a recipe for disaster as far as attaining the two-seat objective is concerned.

While many of his constituents are undoubtedly

critical of Deputy Deasy, he is not without support however within the constituency for his move against Mr. Bruton. One leading party member insisted that the long serving TD and regular constituency polltopper is saying publicly what many of the Parliamentary Party and general membership are thinking privately

EVEN MÓRE TRENCHANT

Within twenty four hours of last Thursday's "no confidence" vote, Deputy Deasy was interviewed on RTE radio, and if anything was even more trenchant in his insistence that he was fully justified in doing what he did. In fact if FG supporters, or the electorate as a whole, were expecting some kind of apologetic back tracking by him they were in for a very major surprise.

In a vigorous defence of the stance he had taken, he vehemently rubbished claims by top ranking Parliamentary Party members that his motion had been defeated on a five to one vote ratio. "That", he said, "is totally untrue", although when pressed he refused to

give the specific details of the vote on the understandable grounds that he was prevented from doing so under party rules.

He praised those who, he said, had taken their courage in their hands in support of his motion - irrespective of what consequences it could have for them down the line in furthering their political careers.

He went on to reiterate that his views about Mr. Bruton's leadership are shared by many people - he even suggested a majority of people within Fine Gael around the country. "I know, I am hearing it at meetings everywhere I go", he insisted.

Unrepentant, Deputy Deasy said he was relieved to have gotten it off his chest, and he did not believe his action would damage the party electorally in the long run.

Asked if it could impact negatively on his son John's chances of winning a Dail seat in the Waterford constituency in the next general election, he said that was possible but he didn't expect that it would, "In any case John is a tough guy", he

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


Loosen the skin around the turkey breast. Tuck the lime slices, garlic cloves and ginger root under the skin.

Health Tips Black Cohosh

USES: Menopausal symptoms

Black Cohosh is a member of the Buttercup family, originally used by the Native American Indians, who gave it the name "Squaw Root", for its effect on normalising the female hormones

HOW IT WORKS: The mode of action is not clear. It seems to act both directly on the tissues of the reprodu tive system and indirectly through the nervous system. Black Cohosh contains several important constituents. One group of constituents acts to reduce the concentration of Lutenising Hormone, which in turn decreases the relative balance of progesterone in favour of the oestrogens. At the same time, another group has been found to act directly on oestrogen receptors.

The herb provides a natural source of salicylic acid. This accounts for some of the beneficial effects seen with painful menstruation during menopause. (Do not use Black Cohosh if allergic to Aspirin.)

This Week In The Garden

Protect all delicate and tender plants

Plants such as gunneras, eremuruses, escallonias, evergreen ceanothuses and crinodendrons are not damaged by early autumn frosts. If they happen to be growing in very exposed spots it is advisable to protect them during the harshest frosts of mid-winter. Those not overly exposed will need some protection too. Wall shrubs and climbers can be protected by hanging sacking in front of them. The plant must not be closed off entirely to the air. The top of the cover should be left open to let the foul air out

Care for hardy plants

Christmas roses are not tender, but the flowers will benefit from protection from the elements. Just protect them from heavy rain and being splashed with mud Late celery may be harmed by the weather - cover with straw or bracken held down with wire netting and dig a trench either side for excess water to drain into.

With Christmas on its way, now is the time for gardeners to think about new equipment for next year and include it on their list of gift wishes. A new technology era could be drawing near as members of the public get a chance to step on board a virtual learning machine.

government-sponsored Information Society Commission is currently planning on bringing their technology roadshow to County Waterford with the assistance of South East Technology Training (a subsidiary company of Waterford Leader Partnership Limited) giving those not familiar with the Internet a chance to surf the web. 



The Science of Farming and Food

The new scheme specification and application form are now available. The basic rate of grant is £118.92/ha up to maximum area of 40 hectares, which would give a maximum payment of £4,756.

In an effort to attract smaller farmers who have been under-represented in the past, holdings up to 20 ha are eligible for a new increased payment of £129.95 per ha, giving a maximum payment of £2,599.

Another significant change is that the former supplementary Measure A (for targeted areas has been incorporated into the general REPS programme. These target areas include Natural Heritage Areas (NHAs) Natura 2000 sites i.e. SACs or SPAs and commonages.

For all lands in these areas, REPS farmers must follow special conditions in their plans - though there are extra payments to compensate for meeting these conditions. The rate of payment is £190.59 up to 40 ha. This is reduced to £19/ha for 40 - 80 ha and £14/ha on 80 - 120 ha.

The clause on partial participation provides for farmers who do not wish to participate in the general scheme but have land in a targaret area - on which they will be eligible for premia of £190.59/ha on up to a maximum of 10 ha (£1,900). However, this is subject to a requirement that they observe Good Farming Practice on the remainder of their holding.

Teagasc provide a full REPS planning service for all farmers in County Waterford, supported by a network of researchers and specialists. For more information phone 058 41211. The first consultation is free of charge.

DAIRYING

Dry Cow Management:-

Allow a 10-week dry period for heifers and 8 weeks for all other cows. Up to 12 weeks may be required for animals in poor body condition.

Ideally, cows should dry off in the body condition needed for calving.

Animals in poor body condition or 2nd calvers will give a response to 2-3Kg, concentrates before calving but very little response to mature cows with a condition score of 3.0. The protein content of the supplement (if needed) with grass silage needs to be only 12-14%.

Dry Cow Minerals:-

For your dry cow, average grass silage supplies: More than enough Calcium (Ca).

Ample Phosphorus (P). Low levels of Magnesium (Mg), Copper (Cu), Iodine (I), Selenium (Se)

A shortage of any of these pre-calving will lead to weak / dead calves, retained afterbirth, ill thrift and reduced immunity to infections.

Recommendation

Feed 100 grams of a good pre-calver mineral / cow / day starting some 6 weeks before calving. Some feeds such as Beet Pulp and Fodder Beet are low in Phosphorus and diets which contain significant amounts of these need to be supplemented with Phosphorus in the mix.

A good pre-calver when fed at 100 grams / cow per day should have a specification close to the following: Ca. 0-6%

P. 0-10% cows on good silage need little or no P. Mg. 13-17%

Na. (Salt) 5-18%

Copper 1500-4500 Mg/Kg. Selenium 36-72 Mg/Kg.

MIND YOUR HEALTH

Musty hay or bales silage will cause Farmers Lung.

Use a protective mask (it is now socially acceptable) of an approved type (BS 2091: 1961). Do not feed it to pregnant animals as it may cause abortions.

Many farmers end up with "bad chests" due to wettings. It is worth buying good protective rain gear.

Many farmers are "half deaf" because of excessive noise levels while using tractor, chainsaws, milking machines, etc. Always use ear muffs.

A breather line (costs very little) will reduce the noise levels caused by relays in milking parlours.

Rest as much as you can, because Spring time is coming. Farmers bring a lot of clay and muck on to the road at this time of year. You must clean it off. A resultant accident is your responsibility.

National Building Agency To Advertise For Tenders Mr. White said that wou indeed be so, but it wasn't

The National Building Agency will be advertising for tenders for forty new Local Authority houses on the former Dempsey land at Shandon, members of Dungarvan Urban Council were told at the monthly meeting.

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Brian White, Town clerk, said they are also advertising voluntary housing on the twenty six acre site while as many as seventy five people have expressed an interest in a proposed affordable housing scheme on the same site.

"It is our intention to meet with these people in a month or two and hopefully we will have a further report on the situation for the January meeting", said Mr. White.

Replying to Cllr. John Deasy, the town clerk said it will be six to nine months before construction commences on the forty Local Authority houses and it could be eighteen months from now before the scheme

is completed

Mr. White went on to disclose to the meeting that in recent days they had received updated confirmation from the Department of the Environment that they will be able to build 110 new houses over the next four years - an increased allocation of thirty houses on what had originally be earmarked for the town.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said it would surely be more cost effective and efficient to build all the houses together rather than settling for a first phase of forty.

Mr. White said that would indeed be so, but it wasn't a practical proposition given that they still haven't finalised demand in respect of the voluntary and affordable housing sectors.

Cllr. Deasy asked if the Council has any plans to buy available housing stock around the town, given that it could be six or more months before the new Shandon schemes commences.

The town clerk assured the members that they will avail of any and every opportunity that comes their way to acquire houses. He added that they have also advertised for a smaller seven house scheme at the Youghal Road.

UDC Members Demanding Face To Face Meeting With ESB



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Members of Dungarvan Urban Council are demanding a face to face meeting with senior executives of the ESB to discuss what they insist is an unacceptable deterioration in the level of public lighting maintenance being provided in the town.

There was scathing criticism of the semi State company at a meeting of the UDC, with one councillor alleging that public lights in one area of the town had been out of action for three weeks before they were attended to.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said that in the Parklane area of Abbeyside it had taken seven days to get a response from the ESB and he had personally been on to the headquarters of the ESB in Waterford three times. "I am not blaming the ESB crews, but rather management", he said.

Cllr. Lar Harte said the ESB service locally has now deteriorated to an all time low, and assurances given by ESB management to the UDC that all repairs would be attended to within twenty four hours of them being reported have not been honoured. "We should ask the ESB to send senior executives to our next meeting to hear what they have to say", he added.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan said that in another area of the town last year fifteen public lights were out for three weeks before they were repaired. "That", he said "is an utterly unacceptable situation"

unacceptable situation".

Cllr. Paddy Power said the service has gone from "bad to worse", and he believed the situation is so bad that they should write directly to the relevant Minister and make a formal complaint.

Brian White, town clerk, said the Council will convey the views of the members to the ESB and they will also invite the company to send senior executives to their December meeting.

Cork Pops - Report by Dermot Walsh Transition Year

On Friday the 17th November we attended the Cork Pops Orchestra at City Hall, Cork. Every section of the orchestra was represented. The string, the woodwind, the percussion and the brass section were all there. The conductor was Evelyn Grant, a presenter on Lyric FM and is a lecturer at the Cork School of Music. She has presented the Children's Music Hour Concert for schools since 1984. She holds a Masters Degree in Community Music from the University of York - the first Irish person to do so. Last year, she hosted the highly successful West Cork Chamber music festival education community project and the Cork Pops Orchestra Millennium Project - 'Tea Dancers for the Young at Heart' which proved very popular in Cork city and County.

The orchestra played 15 pieces in all, performing some suites from artists as diverse as Strauss, Handel, Beethoven, Rossini and Eiffel 65. The orchestra also performed such tunes as 'The Star-Trek Theme'. They also performed some audience participation anthems like the Irish football supporter's song commonly known as 'Ole Ole'.

Overall the concert was hard to understand and was boring at times but the conductor tried to lighten things up by performing some modern songs and pieces. The highlight of the concert was the climactic finale of 'Overture to William Tell' by Rossini more popularly known as the Lone Ranger's signature tune. The conductor also explained to the audience about the various techniques used by composers and gave us a little fact about the composers involved. There were also some instrument demonstrations. We were shown the bassoon and the trombone and how they worked. We learned that there are not any buttons or keys on a trombone and good judgment and memory are needed to become a trombone player. We also learned that the air from a bassoon goes out the top as being proved by the rubber glove trick. There were also demonstration on the Wind Quintet (bassoon, oboe, flute and clarinet) and the string quartet (2 violins, cello, viola). The conductor also showed us how the lasted technology can be used to develop classical music. The concert was quite difficult to concentrate on but I think everyone learned something from it.

COMMENT

Geoservices of Boyton, Florida were hired by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) to find out which liners were the best. Although the resulting study might make boring reading to the layman, it puts it in a nutshell that they did not have a lot of good things to say about clay liners.

Their calculations show that, with 3 inches of water standing on the bottom liner it will only take 15 years for leakage to break through a 3 foot-thick compacted clay liner. Once this breakthrough has occurred they calculated 90 gallons of fluid per acre would pass through the liner each day. On a 50 acres site they expect 4500 gallons of fluid to leak through the liner. I'll leave you to figure out how long you think it would take for leachate leaking at the rate of 4500 gallons a day to contaminate a supply of drinking water either close to or beneath the site.



Magnificent 'River Painting' **Enthrals Crowd**

In years to come, when Danny Cunningham looks back on the opening of his first solo exhibition, he will remember it for the contrasts of weather displayed on the occasion. Outside, as the cold, wintry rain beat down on roof and pavement and while special guest Caroline Senior read of it in poetic terms, the paintings, which Danny had so meticulously mastered in the months and years before, radiated 'peaty' warmth and summer colour from the walls of the exquisite Arts Centre.

Despite the inclement conditions, it was, arguably, the best attended opening in recent years and judging by the red spots which quickly ap-peared beside many of the works, one of the most successful as well.

Danny Cunningham, who declined to speak publicly on the occasion, does not easily fall into the standard description of artist. The clean cut image, with fashionably short hairstyle, places him in a category of his own in artistic terms and his bronzed good looks speak more of the beach and playing field, than a lonely indoor studio.

Hardly surprising then to find that the artistic fruits of his years of work, resulted from many summer days sitting by the rivers and mountainy streams of the Comeraghs and Knockmealdowns and that for hours on end he sat on little rocky islands or stood thigh deep in the middle of Waterford's streams to capture the essence of what we now see as "River Painting'

Cllr. Ml. O'Riordan, Cathaoirleach of Dungarvan Urban District Council, in welcoming the large attendance, said that the exhibition was proof, if such were necessary, that County Waterford is indeed, well endowed with talented artists. He described Danny as 'one of our young artists who is making a name for himself, not the work again and appreciate just what is only in the County, but also much further afield'.

"As a person who has been close to nature all my life and who loves nothing better than to the peace contained in the paintings and the walk through the countryside," said Cllr. O'Rior- sense of being at one with nature, of being



CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

"No report would be complete without reference to the entire question of discipline and conduct, on and off the field. While it might be contended with some justification that indulgent refereeing and lack of clarity of playing rules themselves are a reason for some acts of indiscipline on the field of play, the major cause, however in most instances can be found in lack of self control and a failure of club officials to be in the vanguard when it comes to chastening such offenders. There is a need at all levels to show that foul play at all levels must be punished without im-The player who does not hold or the official who attempts a grave injustice to himself, large.

"The number of breaches of good conduct on the playing fields during the season under review were virtually non existent. However, some serious incidents did take place that necessitated Board action and while these were few and far between, the fact that they Division who cannot claim a took place at all should be a good reason for greater vigi-"In addition, most clubs lance and attention in the fuhave erected dressing rooms ture. "Apart from good conduct on the field of play, there is also an apparent need for impeccable discipline with regard to the administration of our affairs. During the year under review the board found itself on a number of occasions because of contravention by clubs of general rule, with the task of taking forceful action in order to continue progress of the championships. Unfortunately, while such decisions were accepted in the main by club officials, players directed what I would call intemperate language at Board officials during the course of their daily duties. This is an unacceptable practice and is damaging severely the good name and image of the club and portrays an example that cannot be conunder doned circumstances.'

OTHER FEATURES

Other features of the report find the Board Secretary referring to such topics as the Irish Language and asks if the board should seriously consider the appointment of an Irish Language Officer.

On the subject of refereeing, he states that there is an improvement in the numbers refereeing this year, but at the same time he refers to the number of clubs who fail to supply a referee and then feel entitled to object to the appointment of a particular referee for matches in which they are involved.

On the subject of social activities, he praises those clubs and individuals who are involved in Scor at adult and juvenile level and congratulates those who have been successful during the season.

Championships and leagues are dealt with in great detail: "The club championship was relegated to a back seat situation during the championship days in Munster and furthermore the needs of approximately 10% of the players throughout the county are again an absolute priority in relation to the completion of the senior championships to the detriment of 90% of the players who constitute the other grades."

The secretary is very critical of the situation where teams are required to play championships in the atrocious conditions of winter and asks for a policy decision about playing our championships in midsummer and early Autumn.

In conclusion he thanked the media, the clubs, the groundsmen, gatemen and his fellow officers for their wonderful co-operation through a very long season.

Next week I will get back to the convention and deal with the balance sheet, etc.





Ponies travelled from all over the country for the



This "Star-maker Championship" for 148 C & D ponies had 11 who found the answers to the maximum height course in the first round and even with further raised dimensions they all went through again to jump against the clock. Richie O'Hara from Portlaw one of the retiring riders this year set a good target of 43.66 with "The Foxy Wan" and then Anthony Condon with Jonah Wragg's 4 year old "Bertie Brown" had one down but he had already secured the award for the best four year old. Barry Griffin travelled from Dublin on Sunday morning and made the trip worthwhile when the five year old "Hidden Extra" came through in 39.07 to take an early lead.

Next in though, Gemma Phelan gave regular judge at Ballyrafter, Jimmy Ivers's a great tonic as he is recuperating in hospital, by guiding his "Ballyclough Riot" also five, to a great round in 37.68 to incredible cheers. It was even suggested Jimmy could be heard from his hospital bed in Cork. Claire Condon with "Limbo Molly" had a very professional flowing round but just a tip at the double cost her the lead as she got 37.33 but now everyone was on the edge of their seats, as her brother Anthony came in on Seamus Hutchinson's "Additional Risk". He has built up an uncanny rapport with this five year-old by "Puissance" and after a tremendous turn off the double and then a great gallop to the Starmaker fence he sailed through the beams in 35.80 and the crowd were now on their feet. European team member Dominic O'Halloran from Killarney got another lovely round in 41.71 with James O'Sullivan's "Greenfield Heights" to go into fourth and then the audience were up again, as Dublin lad James Derham and "Milverton Snowey Amber" were slightly up on time coming off the double. They scorched down to the final oxer and were extremely unlucky to touch the front rail, which left them sixth in 35.54 and Anthony was able to breath again. A remarkable co-incidence came to light as it was realised that after four runnings of the Starmaker Championship three of the winning riders have all come from the same small National School in Ballinameela, Cappagh, Stevie Keane, Tom Kiely and now Anthony.

Tommy and Lelia Veale presented the "Hunter's Folly Perpetual Trophy" this year to be awarded to the Grand Prix winner and what a result they got, as their niece Rebecca, had just the one opportunity to put her name on it, as she retires from ponies this year. A top class entry went down to seven for the jump-off as the big technical track found out those not quite in tune. Dublin, Cork, Kilkenny and Waterford were represented in the seven and Rebecca Veale had two of those. Going first with Lelia Veale's former Starmaker Champion "Hunter's Holly" she unluckily touched the big parallel at seven in 37.10. From Kilkenny Ivan Dalton was going exceptionally well with his new ride "Kildysart Lad" but just a slight misjudgment after a tight turn meant he took the lead on three faults. Fiona Beecher has made a great transition to 148's and rode Linda Shorten's "Dark Butler" to a superbly well judged round, never putting a foot wrong and went well ahead in 36.99. 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
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
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
