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Gaelic Footballers Victims Of "Despicable" Theft

Young Waterford gaelic footballers have been left out of pocket to the tune of hundreds of pounds after their dressingroom was raided last weekend as they trained just yards

Dungarvan gardai are investigating what they have described as a "despicable theft" at the local Fraher Field GAA venue last Friday evening when the thief, or thieves, stole cash, watches and other items of property to the value

The Waterford under 21 football team was to have travelled to Thurles to play Tipperary in a challenge, but when the game was called off at the 11th hour the team management arranged a training session at the County Board ground in Dungarvan. That session was in full swing around 6 o'clock when entry was forcibly gained to their dressingroom.

A garda spokesman said the players clothing was systemat-

ically gone through and every amount of money found was taken. A number of wrist watches were also stolen.

"It is a despicable theft, and one for which we are desperately anxious to apprehend the culprit or culprits", a garda spokesman said yesterday. "All the young footballers were understandably shattered, and if there is any member of the general public who can assist us in our investigation we would greatly appreciate that help", he added.

Meanwhile the robbery has also been strongly condemned by the chairman of the Waterford County GAA Board. Paddy Joe Ryan who has added his voice to that of the gardai for public support to apprehend the guilty ones.

Mr. Ryan said that his executive committee will discuss the incident at their next meeting, but it will be his strong recommendation to that meeting that the players not be left out of

Woman Cleared On Lotto Fraud Charge

Fianna Fail T.D. Welcomes Funding **Boost for Roads Network with** Waterford-Cork Route to Benefit

Kenneally has welcomed the allocation by the National Roads Authority (NRA) of almost £14.3 million to local authorities in Waterford.

"I was delighted to learn from my colleague, the Minister for the Environment and Local Government, Noel Dempsey TD that the NRA has allocated a total of £7.864 million to Waterford County Council and £6.425 million to Waterford Corporation for the current year", commented Deputy Ken-

neally. The main focus in the County Council allocation is on improvements to the N25 between Waterford and Cork. For instance, £600.00 is allocated for improvements to the Dungarvan Ring Road. A further £1 million will be spent on the stretch between Dungarvan and Youghal while £5 million goes to the ongoing work associated with the Kilmacthomas By-Pass. £100.000 is to be spent on strengthening the Burgery at Abbeyside with a similar allocation for the planning and design phase of a major project at Kinsalebeg on the Dungaryan-Youghal route.

"The NRA has also approved funding of £25,000 for the planning and design phase of the Cappoquin By-Pass on the N72 while

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D Day For Bruton

As the pressure to quit the Fine Gael leadership continues to mount on a now beleaguered John Bruton, and will reach its pinnacle this afternoon (Wednesday) when the Parliamentary Party debates a motion of no confidence in his leadership, the rebel Waterford TD who unsuccessfully launched the heave to oust him two months ago has repeated his assertion that Fine Gael cannot win the next general election under Bruton's leadership.

Austin Deasy, who will be retiring from national politics at that election, and whose son John is hoping to continue the Deasy dynasty in the Waterford constituency, said at the weekend that while an electorate sickened with political sleaze doesn't want Fianna Fail in Government, Fine Gael's prospects of returning to power after the next election will be seriously inhibited unless there is a leadership change.

Meanwhile a former Fine Gael member and chairman of Waterford County Council, Leamybrien farmer Oliver Coffey, has also called on Mr. Bruton to resign in advance of this afternoon's meeting so as to avoid the bruising battle that will be inevitable if he doesn't.

Deputy Deasy, one of Fine Gael's most successful ever Ministers for Agriculture, who has been a Dail deputy in the four seat Waterford constituency for more than twenty years, has denied any personal animosity towards John Bruton. But he said he

is convinced that he cannot lead the party to victory in the next general election. "You only have to listen to what party supporters are saying all over the place", he added.

Deputy Deasy said it was with "great reluctance" that he had tabled his motion of "no confidence" in the party leader two months ago. There, was, he said, no one else prepared to do it.

"In that last attempted heave", he went on, "people who had privately agreed with me then had the gall to go into the Parliamentary Party meeting and vote for John Bruton".

But he repeated his claim, in the immediate aftermath of that unsuccessful move that people at the most senior level within the party had "doctored" the actual result to make things look considerably better for the leader then they actually were. He accused those involved of putting a misleading "spin" on the vote by stating that the majority in favour of Bruton was as high as five to

one. "It was nothing of the sort, it was in fact less than a three to one majority", he said.

Deputy Deasy said the latest opinion poll findings which have put the FG vote at twenty per cent, and John Bruton's own personal satisfaction rating at a seven year low of thirty seven per cent, hadn't surprised him. The clear message from them, he insisted, is that the leadership must change.

Who would he back to become the next party leader? "I would go for people that are not so senior in Fine Gael. One of the many fine young people we have and that would appeal equally to the broader electorate. People with backbone", he added.

Meanwhile Cllr. Oliver Coffey, who represented Fine Gael on Waterford County Council for twenty years and served as chairman in 1995/96, said the whole leadership issue has become a "shambles", and in the best interests of the party he believed Mr. Bru-

ton should stand down in advance of this afternoon's Parliamentary Party meeting.

"Under his leadership the party is going downhill, and fast", said Mr. Coffey. "My fear is that if he does not voluntarily stand down it will be a bruising three way contest that will ultimately play hell with Fine Gael and wreck its chances of returning to Government after the next general election".

Mr. Coffey said that whoever ultimately emerges in the leadership contest will have a monumental task in rebuilding the party's fortunes. "A change at the top is undoubtedly needed, but that change may not necessarily involve Michael Noonan and Jim Mitchell", said Mr. Coffey. "Two months ago when Austin Deasy tabled his motion of no confidence in the leader neither of these two men had the bottle to support it", he added.

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

MAKING A MOVIE

Making a film usually begins with a producer. The producer chooses the storyline and finds the money to film it, picks the director and other technical teams and plans the making of the

On the set the director is in charge of the large teams of people involved in production. He or she directs the actors and makes the creative decisions that will give the film its character

The set is designed by an art director, a cinematographer is responsible for the cameras, there are sound and lighting crews and many others.

PUTTING A FILM TOGETHER

Once a film has been shot the different individual sequences must be put together in the right order and combined with a sound track. This is done by the film editor who works closely with the director to tell the story in the best way.

The editor's choice of which pieces of the film to show and what to leave out can affect the character of the film, by building up the suspense, altering the audience's understanding of the plot or speeding up the drama.

SPECIAL EFFECTS



Part of the magic of cinema is the special effects that enable a director to recreate dramatic action sequences, such as accidents and catastrophes, and fantasy worlds populated by dinosaurs.

CINEMA IN INDIA

India is the largest cinema-going nation in the world. Around 9 million cinema tickets are sold each day, and more than 700 full-length feature films are made each year. Most Indian films are action-packed and full of romance, singing and dancing, and are made in Bombay. Every Indian city and town is full of cinemas, and travelling cinema vans visit remote rural areas.

American film-making took off at the beginning of this century in a small town outside Los Angeles called Hollywood. The sunny climate meant films could be made all year round.


Today Hollywood is the home of the big American film studios (film-making companies) and of many glamourous film stars. Every year, the stars gather at a glittering ceremony, when Academy Awards (or Oscars) are given for achievement in the film industry.

ANIMATION

Animation is the art of bringing drawings or models to life in film. Cartoons are made by filming a sequence of drawings - at least 12 per second to give the impression of movement.

Today computers are able to draw the pictures linking one action to another, making animated films quicker and cheaper to produce.

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


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Beef and Wine Sauce

Preparation: 30 mins Cooking: 20 mins

BEEF steaks with a little extra touch to liven up your taste-buds

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

4 thick pieces of fillet or scotch fillet steak

45g butter or margarine 2 tblspns oil

1 tspn flour



Aesculus

SES: varicose veins, Haemorrhoids.

The use of Aesculus (Horse Chestnut) in venous disorders has been recognised for a long time. A commonly held belief in the 18th Century was that carrying conker seeds 'in one's pocket' would prevent gout, rheumatism and back pain.

HOW IT WORKS: The constituent of Aesculus which has been most studied is Aescin. It has the ability to improve the tone of the veins, reducing leakage into the surrounding tissue. Often varicose veins are more troublesome in the summer and starting with a course of Aesculus during the spring can prevent the distressing symptoms during the warm weather. For best results, I find that a three to four month course is advisable. Those suffering from varicose veins will also benefit from ensuring that constipation is not a factor.


COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

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

On the 1st of March 1976 the Samaritans in Waterford first opened their doors (then at Waterside) and their phone lines (just five digits then and no 1850- number) to the people of the South East. Far fewer homes then, of course had phones. Suicide was still a crime and many of the individual, institutional and domestic difficulties which we are now aware of were part of a more traditional culture of silence. Many adults had grown up with a philosophy where depression equated "something wrong with you" and you "only" had to "snap out of

It was even harder twenty-five years ago for many people to contact the Samaritans. A quarter of a century and a new millennium later people's perceptions are more accepting but the underlying problems are still the same:

— loneliness, isolation and depression. In today's society people are aware of the need to talk about their feelings. The Samaritan response to each individuals needs continues to be offered in a confidential and non-judgemental way.

Regrettably, there are still some who don't know of our services.

To mark the occasion of our twenty fifth anniversary, all those who have been Samaritan volunteers in the past are invited to a social get-together. Anybody reading this who had been thus involved, ring or drop us a note at 16 Beau Street and you'll be sent an invitation.

Aubrieta - spring flowering summer. Trim after flowering.

Juniperus communis 'Compressa' - dwarf conifer ideal for Iberis sempervirens - dwarf giving rock gardens height. evergreen shrub with white Height 60cm (2ft). flowers in late spring and early

Pulsatilla vulgaris - pasque

red, pink and white flowers with yellow centres in spring. Height 23cm (9in)

Saponaria ocymoides -Ted'. Produces mass of pink Height 10cm (4in).

flower which produces purple, and crimson flowers in summer. Height 8cm (3in).

Sedum spurium - mat-forming semi-evergreen that is easy to control. Pink flowers sometimes called 'Tumbling appear mid to late summer.

This Week In The Garden

Prune flowering shrubs and clematis

Flowering shrubs such as hydrangea paniculata, spiraea japonica, SS douglasii, menziesii, salicifolia, holodiscus discolor ariaefolius, sorbaria aitchisonii, SS arborea. SS sorbifolia, tomentosa, tamarix pentandra, hypericum moseranium, willow trees and cornus alba - need to be pruned now.

Stems made last year should be cut right back to within one or two joints of older wood. With some larger specimens, a few longer branches could be left at three-quarters length to make up the main framework of the plant.

Pot annuals for the greenhouse

If you were able to sow annuals in September for flowering in the greenhouse in the spring it is now time to pot them in 13cm to 15cm pots. According to the growth they have made, pot them in a suitable container using decent potting compost and stand the plants close to the glass to encourage sturdy growth.

Meningitis C Campaign Update

The vaccination campaign against Meningitis 'C' started last October and already 45,000 vaccinations have been given in the South East region. The first phase of the campaign targeted those age groups deemed to be at highest risk of contracting the disease, young children up to the age of 4 years and teenagers 15 to 18 years incl. (i.e. up to 19th birthday). The young children are being vaccinated by family doctors in their surgeries and the teenagers are being vaccinated by Health Board teams in 2nd level schools and other centres.

As the first phase of the campaign is now drawing to a close, parents of young children who are under five years are encouraged to take the opportunity to have their children vaccinated by their General Practitioner over the next few weeks. Likewise, young people between the 15th and 19th birthday who have not yet been vaccinated are encouraged to avail of the opportunity to attend for vaccination at one of the clinics now being arranged by the Health Board in various locations over the coming weeks. Times and dates of these clinics will be advertised in local papers.

If infection occurs, meningitis or septicaemia can develop quickly and cause serious illness or even death. The vaccine will provide long-term protection from group C meningoccal meningitis and septicaemia. Meningitis C accounts for one in three cases of meningitis in Ireland, that is why it is vital that children and young adults receive the vaccination.

Phase 11 of the Meningitis C programme will begin in March when children from the ages of 5 - 6 years of age will receive the vaccination through school vaccination teams and special clinics. Parents will be notified in advance for information and consent. 

Science of Farming and Food DAIRYING: What to do with Cull Cows?

All cows going for slaughter are likely to be going into the Purchase for Destruction (PFD) Scheme for the foreseeable future. A price of 60 p/lb for O4 cows seems likely. Where cows are not in calf and/ or not suitable for rebreeding they should be sold as soon as possible. Where cull cows are severely under-finished, it may be worthwhile feeding these further until an acceptable degree of finish is achieved. Very poorly finished cull cows will take a severe cut in price (20p/lb).

Beef Cattle on Dairy Farms:-

It will be more crucial than ever that cattle are finished under 30 months in the future. This means that the management and performance of beef cattle on dairy farms is crucial to ensure they finish before 30 months. On dairy farms, the weak link in a calf-to-beef system is often the first summer at grass. This issue must be addressed to ensure that weanlings have reached the target weight by

There are two options for animals over 30 months:

Sell into PFD Scheme

 Test and sell for consumption. If there is no sign of an increase in the prevailing market price for over 30 month beef, the recommendation is to sell into the PFD Scheme. Aim to finish cattle under 30 months at present **before** they reach 30 months.

 Stores for finishing off grass later this summer, should be gaining enough weight for the remainder of the win-

ter to ensure they finish off grass.

 Friesian/ Holstein bullocks should be finished out of the shed i.e. these types of cattle should not go back to grass at any cost, as they will not finish easily off grass.

Day-Time Calvings Only:-

The benefits are enormous.

Can it be achieved? Yes, with over 90% of cows.

• How?

 Move cows into a "maternity pen" (loose pen with straw or turf mould that can hold 9 10 cows) five to seven days before calving date.

Feed them silage by night only (remove all feed from them during the day)

- If cows are fed meal (1-2 kgs is recommended during

this period), it should be fed in late evening. For this to work well animals must have adequate feed-

 11/2 2 ft. per animal for silage. - 2 ft.+ per animal for meal feeding.

SUCKLERS

Care for Cow to Produce Healthier Calves:-

Recently I referred to the effect of body condition score of suckler cows at calving on subsequent breeding performance. Very thin cows take longer to return to heat and this delays mean calving date in the following year as well as leading to a greater spread in calving and a higher proportion of barren cows.

The aim should be to have cows in a forward fit condition of body score 2.5 to 3.0. When the herd average is over score 3.5, there is likely to be more calving difficulty unless an easy-calving bull has been used. There are other consequences of poor body condition apart from reduced breeding performance. Very thin cows can have above average calving difficulty, can "go down" after calving and can have poorer quality biestings which affects the calf's resistance to diseases.

Minerals:-

Trace element deficiencies, especially copper, selenium and iodine, can reduce the resistance to calf scours, cause greater incidence of calf deaths around the time of calving and generally give less vigorous calves. Selenium deficiency is also associated with greater calving difficulty. Cows that are on a sole diet of silage or hay need a mineral/vitamin supplement in the final six weeks of pregnancy. I know of farms where this is not done and calves and calving are perfect - but it is still a good husbandry practice. It should be done where problems referred to above have been diagnosed. The cheapest method of giving minerals is to sprinkle about 120 grams per day of a pre-calving mineral mix on top of the silage. Mineral licks are more convenient, but the intake can be variable and they are more expensive than loose minerals. However, licks may be the only suitable method for outwintered cows on rough grazing.

SHEEP: Feeding Ewes in Late Pregnancy

 Silage intake will decrease as the unborn lamb develops during the last few weeks of pregnancy. A twin-bearing 70kg ewe will typically require 10 MJ of energy (ME) per day during the last 6 weeks of pregnancy, increasing to 17/18 MJ ME in the last week. Protein requirement will be 200g per day in these final weeks.

 Energy level, protein content and minerals are important considerations when feeding meal. Check if your ingredient declaration is quoted on a dry matter or 'as fed' basis -Dry Matter declaration will always be higher. Aim to feed a good quality ration — ME 11.0 to 11.5 as fed and a protein level of 16-18%, depending on the forage quality.

For example, under the Dairy Hygiene scheme new milking machines and bulk tanks will now be eligible for aid and while under the Farm Waste Management scheme, mobile slurry spreading equipment will be eligible for grant aid. Also, the schemes have higher investment limits and farmers who got grand aid under previous schemes will be eligible to apply again.

The increase in the standard costings by 11.5% on their 1999 level has been welcomed by IFA and is in line with the agreement reached in the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness (PPF).

PARTNERSHIP ANNOUNCEMENT WELCOME

Waterford IFA Dairy Committee Chairman, Michael Murphy has said that while the announcement by Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh of his intention to cater for dairy farming partnerships was indeed very welcome, no time should now be wasted by publishing the detailed legislation to allow interested farmers to plan ahead.

"Farming partnerships hold within them the potential to help solve labour related problems, as well as improving farmers' quality of life. and allow them develop economies of scale", Michael Murphy said.

"Indeed IFA has been instrumental in putting forward proposals for such partnership framework in the last few years", he added.

"We have been receiving many enquiries from farmers trying to plan future developments on their farms. Many see partnerships as an opportunity to remain in farming in better conditions, or even to develop their enterprise by improving efficiencies and achieving better scale," he said.

LOW AND FIXED RATE LOANS REQUIRED FOR ON-FARM INVESTMENT

ICMSA welcomed the announcement of the long-awaited commencement dates for the farm grant schemes by Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Joe Walsh, T.D. These schemes will play a hugely significant role in supporting farm development over the next six

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairperson of ICMSA's Farm Services and Environment Committee said: "It must be remembered that these schemes will not yield any additional income for the farmers, thus the grant aid is both justified and necessary. In addition, Banking Institutions should establish competitive financial packages to compliment the farm investment grants. There is no reason why the low and fixed rates available in the home mortgage sector cannot apply to farmers".

Regarding the conditions of the schemes set down, they are in line with the commitments agreed under the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness. However, ICMSA believe these schemes should be further improved by making grant aid available to all farmers. The grant rate and maximum investment level should also be increased. Mr. O' Connor welcomed the decision to increase the standard costings by 11.5% over 1999 levels, a decision in line with ICMSA policy. Given the significant increases in buildings costs an annual review, as already agreed under the PPF, is essential.

"The Government must meet its commitment under the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness to ensure that adequate funding is available for these schemes for the life of the Programme. However, it is a sad indictment of the future of farming that only 3,800 young farmers are expected to avail of the Installation Aid Scheme", Mr. O'Connor concluded.

BSE DESTRUCT SCHEME CHANGES NEEDED BY **FEBRUARY 1**

ICMSA has set February 1 as the date by which the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr. Joe Walsh, T.D. must introduce a targeted programme for cows under the Purchase for Destruction Scheme. The delay on the Ministers part in making changes that he promised is causing significant difficulties at farm level.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA said: "Farmers across the country at a number of public meetings held by the Association are demanding that the destruct scheme is made more attractive to older cows for which the market has completely collapsed. Therefore, ICMSA are proposing a minimum payment of £350 per animal".

Mr. O'Rourke said: "the current grading system is nonsense and a fixed price of 67 pence per lb should be introduced. The reason I am proposing a minimum price and fixed price without grading is that it makes no sense for farmers to be holding and feeding these animals to increase weight and grades".

This ICMSA proposal, which was originally made on January 3, has received the overwhelming support of farmers, the Food Safety Authority and the industry as a whole.

MALIGNANT CATARRHAL FEVER (MCF) IN CATTLE

The Department of Agriculture and Food wishes to alert cattle and sheep farmers about the risk of Malignant Catarrhal Fever (MCF). The disease is transmitted to cattle from sheep, particularly at lambing time, even though sheep show no signs of the disease. The risk of cattle becoming infected is greatest if they come into contact with sheep at lambing time. Contact between sheep and cattle should be avoided during the lambing season and under no circumstances should they be housed together or use the same accommodation. The disease can be prevented through sensible stock management practices. Proper disinfection should be carried out before cattle are put into sheds previously used for sheep.

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This disease is generally fatal in cattle. The clinical signs include dullness, discharges from the mouth and nose, cloudiness of the eyes, difficulty in breathing and enlargement of the lymph glands.

MCF occurs sporadically and usually affects only one or two cattle in a herd. However, severe outbreaks can result in the death of several animals in affected herds. The severe form of the disease may be attributable to contact between cattle and sheep arising from shared housing.

If MCF is suspected, farmers are advised to consult their veterinary surgeon without delay.

IFA GIVEN BSE VALUATION COMMITMENT

Waterford IFA Chairman, Gerald Curran has said that IFA has been given assurances by the Department of Agriculture that a number of independent valuers will be recruited to deal with the BSE valuation backlog. He said a number of valuers commenced with the valuation on Wednesday (23 January) with a view to having the backlog cleared within a week.

Mr. Curran said a situation where farmers had to wait for over six weeks without a valuation was intolerable and should not be allowed to recur. He said IFA will be monitoring the Department's delivery on this issue closely over the next week.

Mr. Curran said that the farmers in question have already had to deal with the stress of finding out that their herds are going to be depopulated, they now want to put the matter behind them and start again.

He pointed out that there was currently no income payments for farmers who were affected by BSE and these farmers were not allowed to sell milk or cattle since the infected animal had been confirmed.

"Farmers have to wait for 30 days after the animals were removed before they can restock and when this is added to delay in waiting for valuers it will mean that the farmers would have no income for 3 months", he said. Mr. Curran said that IFA were still demanding that income support payments will be made to the farmers in question in recognition of the fact that they have not had any income for the past six weeks and that it will take at least a further six weeks before any of the farmers will be back in production.

FAMINE EXHIBITION

We have just completed a new display on the Famine in Dungarvan Union. The illustrated panels explain the construction of the workhouse, the onset of famine and the aftermath. There is a model of how the workhouse appeared when first constructed in 1841.

Recent donations include photographs of James Galwey of Colligan Lodge, The National Volunteers Dungarvan corps and binoculars used by a member of Liam Lynch's brigade and a copy of a printed circular titled 'Names of Men on Hunger Strike From Dungarvan Town and Surrounding District'. It contains twenty names the first one being Pax Whelan.

PUBLICATIONS

The latest issue of Irish Architectural & Decorative Studies contains an article on the architect John Skipton Mulvany 1813-1870. Of particular interest is his research on the houses Mulvany designed for the

Malcomson family. The cover of the journal has a picture of Mayfield house, Portlaw, re-designed by Mulvany for Joseph Malcomson. Since the picture was taken in 1982 this fine listed house has become a vandalised ruin. A plan of the house is reproduced along with photos of other Malcomson houses in the Portlaw area.

LOCAL PERSONALITIES Michael Joseph Stapleton (1923-1994)

Michael Joseph Stapleton was born in Dungarvan on 26 May 1923. He lived for some time with his family at Youghal Road, near Rice's Street, where the Garda Station now stands. He died in London on 13 November 1994, aged 71 years. He was a noted author and editor. His achievements were more noteworthy given the fact that he had no education.

The following obituary notice was written by David Shipman:-

"Michael Stapleton was the

only man I knew who had read all of Thomas Love Peacock and most of Harrison Ainsworth. He was entirely self-taught, he left school at 12 to become a butcher's boy, by which time he was discovering literature and music; opera became an abiding passion. He joined the Merchant Navy on the outbreak of the Second World War, and spent some of his first 48 hour pass reading Dickens and sleeping in King's Cross station waiting-room.

After the war he become an actor, without much success, and then joined Oxford University press as a packer. His exceptional knowledge of books did not go unnoticed and he was promoted to proofreader. In 1956 he published a history of Sadler's Wells, which brought him to the attention of Edith Sitwell who encouraged him to write his autobiography, 'The Threshold' (1958). This was an account of his life to the time of his joining the Navy. It was one of the most successful of Hutchionson's New Authors series and brought him literary friends beyond the Sitwell circle.

He joined the Hamlyn Group in 1964 and became commissioning editor for all titles on literature, biography, history, mythology and movies. He also wrote several books on ancient and oriental mythology.

He edited 'The Cambridge Guide to English Literature' (1983). It is masterly in its knowledge, scope and freshly expressed opinions. He was rightly proud of it. It compensated for what he regarded as his biggest professional disappointment — failing to persuade Hamlyn to start a list of out-of-print titles, which he felt had been unjustly forgotten."

SURROUNDING MOUNTAINS To the north is the most southerly peak of the Monavullagh

OUR SITUATION

Abbeyside nestles in a corner of a bay that bears the name

Dungarvan Bay. This bay is almost rectangular and faces to-

wards the east from where the winter cold and the cooling

breezes of summer enter the land. At the entrance to the bay

Helvick Head dominates the harbour mouth on the south side

and the gentle peninsula of Ballinacourty at the other. While

the fullness of the tide makes the bay vibrant and alive, the

ebb turns it into a mud flat at low tide through which the

rivers Brickey, Colligan and Glendine weave their way to the

ocean. Abbeyside is on the north bank of the Colligan River

and has grown enormously over the second half of the 20th

Mountains, the southern spur of the Comeragh Mountains -Crohaun 484.9 m high. This is Cruachán Déiseach, Crohaun of the Decies, to distinguish it from Crohaun near Clonea-Power, which is Cruachán Paorach, the Powers' Crohaun.

North of the Crohaun hill is the higher Farbreaga height and north of that is Seefin 726 m. high. The Monavullaghs come within six or seven kilometres of the town.

SURROUNDING COUNTRYSIDE

North-westwards from the harbour is the fertile limestone plain that stretches to Cappoquin and to the Munster Blackwater. In the distance are the gentle Knockmealdown mountains and nearer to our locality we have the hill country of Slievegoe in Touraneena and Modeligo. Slievegoe, derived from Sliabh gCua may have been the original name of the Knockmealdowns. The road begins to climb the hill northeastwards that reveals the dramatic grandeur of the Comeragh mountains, Sléibthe na gComarach, the mountains of the Welshmen. South of our locality is the peninsula of Ring which forms the northern part of the Drumfineen hills. These were known also as Slievegrine which is said to be Sliabh go Rinn, the mountain to Ring. The Drum Fineen hills stretch to Ardmore and their highest point is Carronadavderg, 'the quarter of the red stag', which is 601 m high.

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
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
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

SOLOHEADBEG AMBUSH COMMEMORATION

On Sunday last 21st January the eighty second anniversary of the Soloheadbeg Ambush was marked by the Ireland Institute and the Irish Bardic Federation, with combined ceremonies of the historic Ambush site, where the War of Independence began on the twenty first of January 1919. The parade headed by the Sean Treacy Pipers Band left Coffey's Forge on the Donohill/Tipperary Road at around 2.50 pm for the ambush site. Historian bard and leader of the renowned Wolfe Tones, Derek Warfield delivered the oration.

Soloheadbeg is now accepted as one of the great shrines of Irish Republicanism. It is marked by a simple stone erected by the Third Tipperary Brigade Old IRA Commemoration committee and the two great gate peers, behind which the Irish Republican Brotherhood members sheltered for cover, the hedges and the roadway remains as if time stood still at the Ambush site over the last eighty two years. The tricolour was hoisted over the Ambush site by Anthony Ryan, the proclamation was read by Tim Ryan, a Dublin based P.R. consultant, a decade of the rosary was recited before the oration. A wreath was laid on behalf of the Maguire family, former owners of Vaughans Hotel, Dublin, the Headquarters of the I.R.B. during the War

Amongst the large attendance were relatives of the great men of Soloheadbeg, Sean Treacy, Dan Breen, Sean Hogan, Seamus Robinson, Tadhg Crowe, Pat McCormack, Michael Ryan, Paddy Dwyer, also relatives of the two constables of the R.I.C. McDonald from Belmullet, Co. Mayo and O'Connell from Coachford, Co. Cork.

All the people attending last Sunday's parade were asked to sign the book of Soloheadbeg 2001 to permanently record their attendance and have it tucked away for the next fifty years or before it, if Ireland is reunited under a Federal or single state, form of Government.

BALLYMACARBRY NUN ACCEPTS £50,000 WINDFALL

A Ballymacarbry nun, Sister Veronica Mangan, one of the founders of an award winning addiction centre has made a plea to parents to rescue their teenage children from the misery of drug and alcohol addiction by taking the first steps to seek help. She urged parents and other family members not to fear reaching out for help for their teenage sons and daughters caught up in the nightmare of addiction after she accepted the top prize and a £50,000 windfall in the AIB Better Ireland awards on Saturday night 20th January for the Aislinn Adolescent Addiction Treatment Centre. This centre is based in Ballyragget, Co. Kilkenny and was born out of the Aiseiri Centre in Cahir, Co. Tipperary and four of its five trustees are based in South Tipperary and two people from the Clonmel area are on the board of management of the centre. Sister Veronica said the centre catered for fifteen to eighteen year olds who were addicted to drugs and alcohol. Since the centre opened over two years ago and even since this time last year the extent of drug and alcohol addiction has risen dramatically. A lot more people are experimenting and its down to parents or siblings to take the first step to help loved ones. Please don't delay in seeking help pleaded Sister Veronica. She appealed to parents to contact the centre, the only one of its kind offering a residential service for fifteen to eighteen years olds, their GP, local addiction councillors, the school principal or somebody who can advise people on how to make a start. A native of Tooracurragh, Ballymacarbry, Sister Veronica who worked in Nigeria before returning to Ireland to work in Aiseiri said she was thrilled for everybody involved with the centre. Winning this award will highlight the work we do and the need for more centres. I was thrilled when the centre was declared winner of the overall award. The centre has a permanent staff of seventeen and five part time facilities, accommodates twelve adolescents from all over the country. Sister Veronica recently was awarded Kilkenny Person of the Year. Cuan Saor, the Clonmel based womens refuge in Clonmel won the AlB Better Ireland Award in the Community Development Category, getting £5,000 in prize money.



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



I was disappointed to see that Gowran Park made no attempt to offer any sort of apology to customers in the days after the fixture.

Tony McCoy gave the Martin Pipe trained plenty of time to find his rhythm but he failed to sparkle in the closing stages as the pace increased upfront. See More Business blundered his way to victory under Mick Fitzgerald but this was hardly a Gold Cup winning performance.

A major plunge on Youll Never Walk Alone in the Cleeve Hurdle went astray as the Christy Roche trained to 2/1 crashed out at the very first hurdle in the straight. Barton stood out as the likely winner at that stage but he failed to produce the goods as the Diminutive Lady Rebecca 7/1 stormed up the hill for rider Norman Williamson to defeat Mister Banjo by six lengths. This was a great training performance by Venetia Williams as Lady Rebecca came back out of retirement to contest this race.

CHELTENHAM FACTFILE

THE CHRISTIE'S FOXHUNTERS STEEPLECHASE

This particular race is the highlight of the season for many Point -to-Point people. Run over the same course as the Gold Cup, the trophy is the largest presented at the

festival and it has been won three times by lady riders - Caroline Beasley in 1983, Kate Rimell in 1989 and Polly Curling in 1996. No horse has managed to win the Foxhunters 3 times.

THE GRAND ANNUAL STEEPLECHASE

The Grand Annual Chase is the oldest race to be run at the Cheltenham Festival and is the oldest in the Steple-chase calender. It was first inaugurated in 1834 at Andoversford as a three mile event over open countryside and the Grand Annual Meeting became Cheltenham's first organised race fixture. The race died out in the 1860's but returned to Prestbury Park early this century.

THE BONUS PRINT STAYER'S HURDLE

The Stayer's Hurdle is a young race by festival standards. It was introduced in 1972, replacing the Spa hurdle now run at Cheltenham's New Year Meeting. It is the only Festival Race to have been run on each of the three days. The Irish have won this race nine times.







Huge Crowd Attend Very Successful Point To Point

Gerry Cully and rider Damian Murphy have experienced a remarkable start to the season and the pair combined for a short priced brace at the Dungarvan Harriers very successful Point-To-Point yesterday with False Tail and Forest Thyne.

False Tail (2/5), sporting the silks of Drumcolliher born Tommy Quaid, had little more than an exercise canter when humping 13 stone to victory in the eight runner Open.

Watched by a huge crowd the market leader led from the fourth of the 15 fences and was closely attended to by pointing debutante Treanaree until the latter weakened with four fences remaining.

False Tail made the rest and the eventual winning margin of five lengths over veteran Ashley Heights, just a second points ride for 16 year old Gavin O'Keeffe, in no way reflects his overall superiority.

"I was delighted with that and he will have one or maybe two more runs in points before going to Cheltenham for the Foxhunters", commented Cully of False Tail, whom he purchased for just 2,000 guineas at the Doncaster sales last May.

Forest Thyne (4/7), a full brother to Finbarr Tierney's dual Bumper scorer Ardkilly Eclipse, had to work much harder in the closing seven year old Geldings Maiden.

Formerly trained by David Nicholson, the victorious chestnut struck the front at the fourth last. Hurton mounted a serious challenge from the penultimate obstacle and indeed touched down in front over the last. Forest Thyne though had the valued inside berth and wasn't going to be denied inside the final 75 yards eventually

triumphing by half a length.

Britway amateur Dan O'-Donovan (19) was credited with his initial success in the plate when the Liam Burke trained/Tom O'Mahoney owned newcomer Ask Henry, a half brother to the progressive Valley Henry, sprang a 7/1 surprise in the first section of the opening five year old Geldings Maiden.

This certainly was a griefstriken affair as Voer Anxious (5/1) appeared destined for victory until running out on the bend before the last.

The Pat Crowley-ridden newcomer Noble Buck was duly left with the event at his mercy, but this one capsized at the last where the pursuing Jordan's Lad was badly hampered ultimately depositing his partner.

Valleymore and Tobair Padraigh were then left at the head of affairs, but the pair had no reply when the towering Ask Henry, standing all of 17 hands, powered past a hundred yards out.

Johnny McGrath piloted his initial winner for Innishannon handler Finbarr Sheehy when first timer River Paradise (8/1) had just enough in reserve to fend off the promising Euro Alert by a length and a half in the second division of this contest.

Incidentally, River Paradise was purchased for just 2,500 guineas at Tattersalls last August.

Eoin Gallagher brought his seasonal tally to six following the Pat O'Connortrained Aibitir's scintillating success in the Winners of Two.

A shade disappointing when finishing fourth to Noble Justice at Killeagh seven days previously, Aibitir (3/1), racing in the colours of Abbeyside owner Serita O'Brien, eased past Mr. Perkupp before three out and wasn't troubled thereafter eventually accounting for Glen Bree Native by six lengths.

The Ould Boreen (5/2 fav), runner up to Mary's Fun at Dromahane on New Year's Day, survived a few anxious moments en route to landing an incident - packed Mares Maiden under Carrig-towhill-based Johnny Collins, whose 27th career victory this was. The long time leader Ardkilly Angel still held the call two out, but The Ould Boreen quickly eroded that advantage on the run to the last and despite needing all of Collins' assistance, the daughter of Good Thyne forged to the front in the closing stages to oblige by five lengths from Misty Native.

Trained by Seamus Cotter, The Ould Boreen is jointly owned by John Roche and Jeff Geary, both from Midleton, and has the coveted Gain Mares Final as her ultimate objective.

Sir Mark Brunel (6/4), ridden by Tony Costello, proved to be an initial Irish points success for Portlaw handler Lord Tyrone when outbattling Rian Bo Pádraig by half a length in the Confined Maiden.



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
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
