Deasy Graphically Details Trail of Destruction

Standing Orders were suspended at Tuesday's meeting of Waterford County Council to enable Cllr. John Deasy to graphically detail the trail of destruction and devastation a series of horror crashes have brought along a two hundred and fifty yard stretch of the main N25 Waterford/Cork road at Cushcam just three miles outside Dungarvan.

The Fine Gael councillor has been calling for major safety improvements to be carried out to this notorious stretch of roadway over a protracted period. Now in the wake of yet another motor cyclist fatally injured;

major accident last weekend he was compelled to do so again, he said.

Cllr. Deasy said that last Friday a car and lorry had been involved in a head on collision at Cushcam when the motorist had been dragged from his blazing car. "It was", he added, "a scene of devastation".

He then went on to cite specific date details of eight serious accidents which have taken place at the location over the last twelve months. The litany went as follows, (1) March 17th, 2000 a lorry overturned, (2) March 25th,

(3) May 23rd four vehicle accident involving two cars and two lorries; (4) June 13th two car crash; (5) July 1st lorry careered off road and into nearby house; (6) December 10th, four car pile-up; (7) December 13th crash involving a lorry and car and (8) March 16th 2001 **CONTINUED ON PAGE 47**







Accident At Cushcam Results In No **Fatalities Thanks To Passing Motorist**

A collision, last Friday be-

from the two vehicle collision that occurred at Cushcam, Dungarvan but three units of the Waterford County Fire and Rescue Services, who were quickly on the scene, soon brought the fire under control. The two Dungarvan units under Station Officer Paul Moynihan were in attendance at the fire and were assisted at the incident by the Kilmacthomas Fire Brigade under Station Officer Tom McGrath.

Assistant Chief Fire Officer Des O'Brien complimented the quick response of the Waterford County Fire and Rescue Services and for the professional manner in which they dealt with the accident.

The condition of Cushcum Cross has recently come under close scrutiny from local Councillors and the County Engineer, John O'Flynn, who has admitted it is the worst junction on a primary route in Waterford. The junction has a high accident rate with an estimated twenty people having lost their lives at this junction over the previous two decades.

A senior figure from the National Roads Authority was invited to survey this junction for himself and as a result, it is expected that the National Roads Authority will now grant extra funding to the County Council to make this dangerous junction

TRADE AND MONEY

Trade is the exchange of goods and services - buying and selling. Coins were invented when overseas trading began and merchants used weights of precious metals, such as silver, to buy and sell. Overseas trade has changed the

When European traders found rich markets in foreign lands they made great efforts to protect their interests. Sea-faring nations such as Britain, Portugal and Holland established colonies in distant lands with their own armies and police forces and so, through trade, built huge empires and became world powers.

The world today survives on trade. Few countries are self sufficient, so they sell what they have to raise money to buy what they need.

Products are visible items such as food or cars, or "invisible" items such as the labour or manufacturing expertise that makes a product, or a financial service, such as insurance.

In international trade today little actual money changes

STOCKS AND SHARES

The initial cost of starting up a business is called the financial capital, and often this money is borrowed. The people who lend the money all hope to have a share in the company's profits in the future.

The capital is divided into a number of shares, and each share has a certain value. This value may go up or down, depending on how the company performs.

The only place shareholders may sell their shares (or a unit of shares called a stock) is through a Stock Exchange (below). Here they are traded (bought and sold) by a broker who is a member of the Stock Exchange



MONEY

Money is a recognised form of payment. Today units of money are represented by notes and coins, but they have taken many other forms.

Cowrie shells were once used in China, India, Thailand and Africa. Other forms of money include copper rings, salt, beads, stone dishes, cocoa beans and axes.

When the first coins were issued, it was the weight that determined their value.

Paper money was first used by the Chinese in the 10th century as an alternative to dealing with large quantities of metal coins. At first, paper money was simply a handwritten receipt, but later receipts of fixed values were issued by governments.

MONEY FACTS

 A currency is a money system, such as the Japanese yen, the French franc, the US dollar, the Mongolian tugrik or the Bhutan ngultrum. The exchange rate is what it costs to buy or sell one currency for another. This changes on a daily basis.

 The process of stamping a design on to a coin is called minting. One side of the coin usually shows the head of the monarch or the symbol of the body that guarantees the value of the coin. Or by an authorised producer, known as a mint, is allowed to manufacture and stamp coins. Coins not made at a mint are forgeries.





The jobs that have been created over the last few years have come from across the board, from the smallest one-man operation up to and including the multi national organisation.

Working locally where and when it is possible is becoming more and more attractive to employers and the job seekers.

Finding a job on your doorstep is every employees dream as driving for up to three and four hours to and from work is reality for a lot of workers. This means that your ordinary thirty-nine hour week at work can often turn into a fifty-five or sixty hours per week when everything is taken into account.

LOCAL PERSONALITIES PROFESSOR ERNEST T.S. WALTON (1903-1995)

Professor Walton was born in 'Epworth Cottage', Strandside South, Abbeyside in October 1903. He was the son of the local Methodist minister, John Arthur Walton. His mother was Ann Elizabeth Sinton, from nine, the family moved to Cookstown, Co.

College, Belfast and later at TCD where he graduated in maths in 1926. A year later he was awarded the prestigious 1851 great Exhibition Overseas Research Scholarship them in at the Museum during opening hours. in nuclear research at Lord Rutherford's Cavendish laboratory in Cambridge. Cavendish was a grandson of the 2nd The winner of the first £100 draw held on Duke of Devonshire. On 14th April, 1932 Friday 16th March was Gearóid O Cuirrinn, he split the atom with Sir John Cockroft. In recognition of this work they shared the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1951. Ernest Walton was the only Irish scientist ever to receive this honour. In 1934 Walton returned to TCD as a fellow and in 1946 was appointed Erasmus Smith professor of natural and experimental philosophy. After retirement in 1974, he went to live in Belfast but continued to visit and work in the Physics Department of TCD. In November 1989, Professor Walton was given a civic reception in Dungarvan and the new Park in Abbeyside was re-named the 'Walton Causeway Park' in his honour. He died in a Tangrene, Co. Armagh. When Ernest was Belfast hospital on 25th June, 1995. He was predeceased by his wife in 1983 and Tyrone. He was educated at the Methodist survived by two sons and two daughters.


GUITAR LESSONS

Dungarvan Adult Education Centre Graduates To New **Standards Of Education**

Starting as a temporary education centre in the Courthouse, Dungaryan, the Adult Education Centre has gone from strength to strength since its humble beginnings a decade and a half ago.

offices in 24, Lower Main Street, the centre has full time staff as well as voluntary workers who continue in their pursuit of excellence and remain as one of Dungarvan's standard bearers for education in the County.

Beginning with just four students in its original year the centre now deals with between eighty to a hundred people each year and has become a vital part of many people's daily lives whether they hope to gain employment or develop their reading and writing skills.

Many challenges face those without the advantage of a full education. Helen Whelen, Adult Literacy Organiser at the Adult Education Centre, knows this well.

Helen says "Adults without an education feel they

Located now in their own cannot participate fully in society. They may not be able to join local clubs and organisations because they think their lack of reading and writing skills may be found out or they may drop out of these clubs because they are asked to take notes or take down names or addresses. They feel they could not cope with this.'

For years, perhaps for most of their lives these adults hide their problems with literacy. So how does the centre treat them differently to other institutions that have left them down in the past?

Helen says "We talk to them about their problems with reading and writing and reassure them that it isn't their fault. They gain a lot of confidence from this and go on to participate more fully in their communities and do things like note taking that they wouldn't have felt able to do before."

So what does the Adult Education do to help its students? Helen Whelen says they have a wide range of initiatives in place to help its students to succeed.

She says "We do a number of one to one tuition initiatives where we have a volunteer or staff member dealing directly with a student. A student then may graduate to group sessions where they are together with a number of other people who are at a similar stage of development. The student may also do the two classes together if they feel they might be struggling in the group classes. They might then go on to the VTOS programmes."

The Adult Education Centre also actively encourages peo-

ple with good reading and writing skills to join the centre as volunteers.

Helen says "People in the home with good reading and writing skills will hopefully come in here and help on a volunteer basis. They may find they have an aptitude for this kind of work and move on and do further training. They then become involved in other areas of education for adults. The adult education Centre is the first step for them to achieve this goal".

So has the centre been a success?

Helen says "I think the centre has been a success. It has grown and established itself and helps more people with each year to overcome their difficulties. We are always available to help them with the problems that face them. For example parents who want to help their children with their homework. Before they may not have anywhere to turn, but they can find help in the centre to come to terms with their difficulties, whether that is getting ready for the workplace again or improving their self esteem and confidence."

The Dungarvan Adult Education Centre can be the first step for many people in pursuit of a better standard of living whether economically or socially. The Centre aims to help those with educational problems either great or small and will continue to pursue this agenda for many years to come.

American Psycholoist Information Night

An information night for stammers about the Mcguire programme is due to be held in Hotel Kilkenny on Thursday 22nd of March at 8pm.

The McGuire Programme which was developed by Dave McGuire, an American Psycholoist, who himself had a servere stammer, is aimed to develop stammers physically, mentally, emotionally and spiritually but does not cliam to be a complete cure from stammering.

However by learning the technique involved in the programme it is possible to become an eloquent and confident speaker with only an odd reminder of your stammer.

The technique itself, which was shown on the Late Late Show and Ear to the Ground, is practised by the groups that attend an intensive four day training course taking you

- Videotaping of your introduction to the group.
- Breathing exercises.
- Speech delivery(pause-breath-speak-release)
- Fear reduction technique
- Making presentations to the group
- Dealing with the phone.
- Public speaking on Grafton Street.

The McGuire institute promises that you will be made to work very hard from morning to night during the intensive course.

The first two days and nights are spent drilling the technique and mentality, while on the third day you will learn the fundamentals of public speaking and begin testing your new 'tools' in public. The last day is for reviewing and preparing you for some of the complications of the real world including how to deal with possible relapses.

The main goal of these courses is to help stammers become eloquent speakers rather than simply "non-stammers". However, should you wish to hone your techniques and improve with further couses, the McGuire Institute run an unlimited number of refresher courses.

For a lifetime membership there is a fee of £600 which is due on the second day of the course but should you decide before the second day that the course is not for you then their is no charge. For subsequent intensive courses it is £10 per day to a maximum of £30.

POT ANNUALS FOR THE GREENHOUSE

If you were able to sow annuals in September for flowering in the greenhouse in the spring it is now time to pot them in 13cm to 15cm pots. According to the growth they have made, pot them in a suitable container using decent potting compost and stand the plants close to the glass to encourage sturdy growth.

SOW BROAD BEANS UNDER GLASS

Sow broad beans in boxes or pots this week - but do not scatter the seeds haphazardly. Set them out 5cm away from each other in all directions and cover them with about 2cm of soil. Germinate in a well heated greenhouse or frame and protect from the frost.

SOW LETTUCES, CULINARY PEAS AND CAULIFLOW-ERS

If you want to have lettuces to hand very early this year make a planting of the cabbage variety this week. Plant the seeds in boxes and place in a warm greenhouse to germinate. Keep the temperature steady at around 13C.

You can also sow culinary peas - sow and germinate in the same way as the lettuces.

Cauliflowers should be grown in a greenhouse of around 13C to 16C. Sow them as thinly as possible in very shallow holes.

MONEYMATTERS

Money Lending and the Consumer Credit Act

If moneylenders wish to operate legally they must apply to the Director of Consumer Affairs each year for a licence. This licence may be refused on several grounds including charging excessive interest rates. The Consumer Credit Act governs the provision of money lending. The following are the main provisions of the Act:

Money lending agreements and repayment books must contain comprehensive information about charges, repayments and interest rates. If the agreement does not contain these details it may be unenforceable. It must also have the words "Money Lending Agreement" in a prominent position on the agreement.

The loan agreement must be a separate document from the loan itself. There is a 10-day cooling off period to allow the borrower to change his/her mind. It is advisable that the borrower does not sign away their right to do this. If information about this cooling off period is not provided the loan

is unenforceable.

The loan must be advanced in full. Previous to this Act, Moneylenders could "top up" loans whereby part of a new loan is used to pay off an existing loan.

The moneylender may not write to you at your place of employment about the debt and cannot telephone or visit you at work without your consent.

Moneylenders may not charge for any costs incidental to the loan apart from collection charges.

If you are experiencing difficulties about a money lending agreement, call into your local MABS office, which will be able to help you in a Confidential and Independent way.

Exploration Rights In Celtic Sea

During a Dail debate on February 8th Deputy Austin Deasy raised a parliamentary question with the Minister for the Marine and Natural Resources Mr. Fank Fahey with regard to exploration rights in the Celtic Sea, apart from Helvick, held by Providence Resources.

The minister replied that "three licensing options held by Providence have now expired, the most recent of these Options was over part-blocks 50/6 and 50/7 and this expired on 31 January 2001. The two other Options, one over part-blocks 49/13, 49/14, 49/18 and 49/19 and the other over block 50/11, expired some time ago and applications by Providence for Lease undertakings over these areas were under consideration.

the Minister goes on to say "the fact that Helvick cannot be made commercial has resulted in Providence reviewing its plans for the Celtic Sea as a whole and conducting a strategic appraisal of a number of business development options and discussions in that regard with my Department are ongoing. As Providence do not in fact hold any authorisations at present, the question of a timescale to carry out exploration does not arise at this stage."

planning on a joyous upbeat Spring article, alarming reports force me to change my theme to writing about the horrific slaughter of childhood innocence by predators of sexual abuse. Recently I was asked by a victim "does the pain ever go away?" The pain cannot be scrubbed away nor buried six feet under so victims traumatised often try to deny it. In attempting to suppress feelings sadly many try to control their feelings with guilt, shame and self abuse.

People who suffer childhood trauma in their early developmental years may or may not remember what happened but these traumas have a direct influence on how they live their future lives. In adulthood, these people suffer anxiety attacks, obsessive-compulsive behaviour, depression, addiction problems such as substance abuse or engage in abusive addictive relationships when exposed to certain stimuli. In relationships they will try to regain the control lost in childhood and behave with perfectionist tendencies or go through life malingering in chronic illnesses. As parents they over-protect or become permissive, vowing to give their children everything they were denied. Others may try to recapture their lost childhood through their

These victims are conditioned to feel it's not O.K. to have needs and feelings. In order to be approved they learn quickly to please, be good, stay out of the way, shut up and think like an adult. Real childhood experiences are not allowed, they cannot be vulnerable or spontaneous. This conditioning deprives children of identity formation. Many children learn from this that they are bad and so they act out because of a lack of security and then externalise their parents1 denied hidden feelings. If parents are unable to deal with their own internalised feelings children in turn learn to bury their feelings and later on this develops into self-hate, dissociation and isolation. This causes a rift between the real self and the injured, shame-based self.

HEALTHY DEVELOPMENT

In normal development as children grow and develop they learn how to sift through the real and make-believe. They do this through having the ability and sense of self to ask questions such as "where do babies come from?", "when Grandpa died where did he go?" but children growing up in trauma and dysfunction don't explore like that. They are exposed to fear, shame and pain and they absorb further shock and traumas with conditioned defences. They have an external crust that allows them take further painful situations in their stride.

In order to develop healthily children must have a sound basic trust in the security of their family and environment which is paramount to a sense of positive identity and self esteem. When children can experience emotions with spontaneity and vigour with no fear of abandonment, abuse or shame they have a capacity to be themselves. When parents exhibit unconditional love children develop a sense of security fostered by the continuance of this love. This security becomes imprinted on the child1s mind and even when the parents are absent the child feels safe. Children internalise this positive sense and this is the cornerstone of a child Is sense of self esteem and worth. This allows a child the opportunity to accept the disappointments and frustrations of life. The parents' positive force teaches the child self discipline and self control and further enhances their sense of worth and esteem. When a child experiences encouragement he becomes confident, giving him the courage to take further risks.

SHAME-BASED FAMILIES

However in families where this autonomy is absent or denied children are unable to resolve the ups and downs of everyday life. Sadly those who experience put-downs and criticisms become critical of themselves and deny their needs. Fearful and anxious parents teach their children to be fearful and some children compensate for this by engaging in overly risky behaviour. Many children of such environments in adulthood live out their internalised identities as a tough "bad apple," "you're a bastard." After all throughout their young life they have memorised the many negative mantras ranted by parents so now in adulthood they must become what their parents saw in them. A further sad spin-off from this is that as they have internalised being bad they believe they will get the punishment they deserve. These parental reflections are lived out time and time again. You see for children of trauma to drop their defences could expose them to their reality - that of a frightened child.

Anna Freud in her work "The Ego and the Mechanism of Defence" stated that the ego's defence system acts as a protection against traumatisation. She went on to say "a phobic individual who is forced to meet the object of his fear or anxiety instead of avoiding it is force undefended into a traumatic situation and breaks down in panic."

SCHOOL

Children growing up in abusive homes become further victims to teasing and taunting when they move outside the home or go to school. For these children there is an acute conflict between the desire to be loved by the parents and the shame they feel inside. If children sense the parents are suffering from low self esteem and are denying the experiencing of feelings the child may become guilty and in identifying with the parents, play down his own sense of success.

Many children experience the powerlessness of a learning difficulty such as dyslexia. In school their teacher may not pick up on this. The child suffers ridicule by being called lazy or stupid. These teachers pass on their remarks to parents and so the child is further criticised or ridiculed. This labelling is internalised by the child which causes more behavioural problems and depression. However I must add that most schools have competent perceptual screenings and testings

VALIDATION OF EVENTS

With children it is vitally important to acknowledge and validate feelings and happenings. Many women who have been ictims of sexual abuse have told me that their failure to be believed was more painful and devastating than the actual assault. This is true also when there is a death in the family. Children who have experienced the loss through death, of a parent or sibling, sometimes have their feelings denied, ignored or invalidated. In fact in many such instances the deceased, out of family fear, is never a topic of discussion again. This type of emotional withdrawal leads to further problems. With the loss of a sibling, clinging to the dead brother or sister is the only way some children can actually validate themselves. The sociologist, Bob Berkus, wrote "Grief makes no comparisons or judgments nor has it any understanding or degree." I have experienced death first hand in the death of my first wife and more recently in the death of my son. In both situations I and the children acknowledged the grief and loss and this process, though painful, was a necessary first step in living without our loved ones.

When children grow up forced to adapt to the parents! needs rather than the other way round the consequences are detrimental. Alice Miller wrote in 1981 "The impossibility of consciously experiencing feelings of his own either in childhood or later in adulthood is a direct result of having to adapt to the parents1

STAGES OF EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In the growing up stages the child moves from "I am," that is total dependence without boundaries to "Who I am," an individual separate from parents. If parents are emotionally healthy they help their children to learn trust. When children feel they belong unconditionally they feel loved, wanted and approved and they internalise everything the parents do with them from a loving look to loving strokes. This allows the children to love themselves. Eric Erickson declared that in the early months of infancy children learn basic trust and this trust develops as the child grows and will be with him even if situations change

An infant of about a year and a half explores the world on his own with his newly acquired skills. At about two years he further asserts "I am" in language such as "No2," and "I want." This is the emergence of a child determined to become a person in his own right. In "Barney," Baby Bob has a yellow "blankey." This blanket for many children is really the security partition between the parents and the child's need to connect with a separate reality. This blanket is the child1s first milestone between the world of Eme1 and Enot me1. The relationship the child has with the blankey is so important as the child dumps and retrieves the blankey in a type of unconditional love-hate situation. It teaches the child that you can love and be loved, be angry, and accept others can be angry with you and that you can have intimacy without loss of the self. This process is fundamental for a person to exist in his/her own right.


Emotionally damaged parents demand their children to be good, perfect and adult so as to meet their needs. Unfortunately, they deny the child the need for a yellow blankey. This child will be conditioned to repress anger and expressions of self and be denied the right to know that love and conflict can co-exist simultaneously. This childhood abuse develops so much that as adults these victims are hostage to their own emotions

In dysfunctional families, mistrust is ever present and is learned and cultivated. Through this a child learns self-contempt, fear of aloneness, and goes on into adulthood in fear, isolation and without trust in himself or others. In adulthood this victim will move from relationship to relationship, terrified of being alone and his only security will be in total fusion with his parents. This need for enmeshment is fertilised in childhood as a child learns that he has to be good to be approved otherwise he risks rejection or abandonment. In adulthood this disables persons so much that they don't trust their own achievements without checking with others.

In conclusion a client once told me: "once in a while when I allow the feelings stored from childhood to bubble to the surface I have a hard time keeping them under control. I immediately want to fight or flee, destroy someone, something, sometimes even me." This sadly is the journey many travel but is there another route? I say yes, the journey of discovering the true self and the healing that will ensue.

The Science of Farming and Food

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE UPDATE

Another week has passed and the country still remains free of Foot and Mouth Disease. This is due in no small measure to the sacrifices of many people both farming and nonfarming to keep the risk to an absolute minimum.

As I drive around the roads the standard of disinfection measures which I observe in many farm entrances are not high enough. The most common problem is that the disinfectant mats or straw are not long enough. A lorry wheel has a circumference of 12 feet and a tractor wheel is 20 feet in circumference. Therefore, in order for the disinfectant to come into contact with the entire circumference of the wheel of a tractor the mat must be 20 feet long.

The permit system seems to be working well. It is an inconvenience but it is well worth the effort to keep the country clear of infection.

CATTLE

The current Foot and Mouth Disease trade restrictions on buying and selling of livestock has created problems for some cattle farmers. Those who normally buy in animals now and can't have a surplus of grass and those who normally sell now can't have a shortage of fodder. Surplus Grazing Land:-

The months of April and May give the highest response to applied nitrogen and hence the best return on bought in fertiliser. Where nitrogen has not yet been applied at least 30 units/acre should be applied on this land as soon as ground conditions allow for it. In three to four weeks time the buying/grazing options can then be re-examined. If cattle can be bought this land should have enough grass cover to allow grazing to begin. If cattle still cannot be purchased the option will then be there to apply a further 50 -70 units/acre and target these fields for silage/hay in late May early June.

Where 90 units/acre of urea (£190/tonne) are applied to grow a crop of silage/hay the overall cost (urea + spreading) would be £21/acre. An option this May/June would be to sell this meadow. There may be a market for grass meadows this summer especially from farmers who have to graze their silage area because they cannot sell stock of their farm. Alternatively, where facilities allow it, this extra silage could be cut and saved on farm and either sold at a later date or fed to extra stock bought in next winter. Shortage of Fodder:-

Apply additional Nitrogen and take a second cut (REPS

Sowing time for maize is fast approaching and the interest among Co. Waterford farmers in growing maize continues to increase. The 2001 recommended list was recently published by the Department of Agriculture and it shows little change from the 2000 list.

IFA FIGHTS AGAINST BEEF CUTS IN **BRUSSELS**

FROM FRANCE The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr Joe Walsh TD, has announced a ban on the importation of susceptible animals (cattle, sheep, goats, pigs, and deer) and certain animal products from France.

MINISTER ANNOUNCES

BAN ON IMPORTS

"The Standing Veterinary Committee of the European Commission considered this matter today," he said, "and agreed on a draft Commission Decision banning the export by France of susceptible species and certain animal products, except under strict conditions involving additional certification by the French authorities".

The Minister said that in view of the seriousness of this matter for the Irish economy, he had decided to immediately ban the importation of susceptible animals and a range of animal products from France, until the French authorities had confirmed that the necessary arrangements are in place to ensure that the controls envisaged in the draft Decision had been established.

He expressed his gratitude for the efforts that the Irish public had made to date in relation to the Foot and Mouth Disease crisis and said that this latest development brought into clear focus the need for continued vigilance in relation to the disease.

At a meeting with the Head of the Commission Services in beef meat Mr. Deane pointed out that on the one hand the Commission and the Council of Ministers are saying they want to promote extensive grass based quality beef production and on the other hand they are attempting to force through severe cuts on extensive suckler cow beef production and on premium stocking rates.

Commenting on the situation, Waterford IFA Livestock Chairman, Tom Leahy said, eliminated all possible risk.

IFA President Thanks Sporting Organisations For Support In Helping **To Keep Country Foot** and Mouth Free

The IFA President, Tom Parlon today (Wednesday) wrote to the GAA, the FAI and the IRFU to express the appreciation and the thanks of the entire farming community for the support which they are giving in the national effort to keep Ireland free of foot and mouth disease.

In his letter Mr. Parlon said "I know that farmers are very conscious of the disruption caused to your sporting fixtures as a direct result of the strict precautions against disease spread".

"As an Association with very close links to sporting organisations at local level, we understand the disappointment of both the players and fans over the postponement of fixtures, particularly as we approach this St. Patrick's Day weekend"

"I have said publicly that the great prize for Ireland will be to keep this country free of foot and mouth disease. On the other hand, the consequences of an outbreak for the entire community and for the national economy would be very serious indeed"

"The scale and extent of the disease outbreak in Britain requires that we maintain the utmost vigilance in this country in adhering closely to Department of Agriculture advice on avoiding unnecessary risk and minimising the possibility of disease spread".

"Hopefully, as soon as the disease threat recedes, normal arrangements for matches can resume as quickly as pos-

"In the meantime, I wish once again to convey my appreciation and that of the farming community for your continued understanding and support".

WALSH ANNOUNCES **DEVELOPMENTS** IN RELATION TO **USA BAN**


The Minister for Agriculture Food and Rural Development, Mr Joe Walsh TD, met with the Charge d'Affaires at the US Embassy, Mr Earle Scarlett, to discuss developments in relation to the FMD related ban by USA on EU food products.

The Minister said that following the announcement last evening of a USA ban on product from the EU, immediate representations had been made by his Department via our Embassy in Washington. This resulted in Ireland being assured that most of its food and drink exports to the USA would not be restricted. Some of the products concerned would require specific approval following certification by the Department of the processing and treatment procedures, but the Minister said that this should not pose problems. Other products would simply not be affected by the

Minister Walsh said he was pleased with the speed and the positive response by the USA to his representations. He had sought to impress upon the US authorities, both in Washington and through the embassy here in Dublin, the facts surrounding FMD here in Ireland, the main one being that we do not have a case and remain FMD free. He also referred to the range of controls and measures in

place aimed at remaining so.

The Minister concluded by saying that the USA was a hugely important market for Irish food and drink products and in total is worth approximately £200m per annum. They include mainly dairy and dairy-based products including milk proteins and cream liqueurs. So far we had succeeded in maintaining the vast bulk of this trade free from restriction and the Minister said he would do everything possible to ensure this remains so.



Chinese Roast Pork

THIS roast pork dish has an authentic Chinese taste that will make your mouth

Ingredients:

1.25kg lean boned and rolled pork loin, shoulder or leg joint, rind removed 1.25cm fresh root ginger,

peeled and cut into thin strips

For the stuffing:

8 spring onions, finely chopped

1/2 red pepper, seeded and finely chopped

1 clove garlic, crushed

1 x 5ml sp oil

100g breadcrumbs 1 x 15ml sp Hoi Sin sauce

For the glaze:

3 x 15ml sp honey

2 x 15ml sp brown sugar

1 x 15ml sp Hoi Sin sauce

1 x 5ml sp ground ginger 1 clove garlic, crushed

Method:

Cut slits into the joint and push in slithers of ginger. Weigh the joint and calculate the cooking time using the panel on the right.

Place joint on a rack in a roasting tin.

Open roast in a pre-heated oven (Gas 4-5, 180°C, 350°F).

Meanwhile, make the stuffing, fry the spring onions, red pepper and garlic in the oil for 3-4 minutes or until

Stir in the breadcrumbs and Hoi Sin sauce and mix.

Shape into seven or eight stuffing balls.

Place on a baking tray and bake for the last 20 minutes of cooking time.

For the glaze, mix all of the glaze ingredients together.

20 minutes before the end of cooking time, remove the joint from the oven and brush with the glaze.

Return to the oven. Reglaze the joint 10 minutes

Serve the joint with the stuffing, stir fry vegetables and new potatoes.

Alternatively slice the joint thinly and serve in Chinese pancakes drizzled with Hoi Sin sauce and garnished with shredded lettuce and cucumber strips.



He'd make a lovely pet for some lonely spinster in Clonea! But John Harney the slipper had a rare eye for a dog. And knew to go by appearances was nothing but humbug. He hid him in a kennel and he was named Master McGrath. Was it ballistic expectation or mere peasant guffaw! If McGrath was small and short-tailed, he had the footwork of a pro. He won a trial or two and Lord Lurgan chirped, 'Hare we go! Hare we go!' The visitors Cup at Lurgan (1868) he took with consummate ease. 'I'm on a roll' cried The Master, in the finest greyhoundese. Tallow Notes

"SHOT WHILE TRYING TO ESCAPE"



Arthur Mulcahy - A **School Picture**

On the night of March 22nd, 1921 a typical Irish household retired to rest in the townland of Currabaha, between Tallow and Fermoy. On the back of the door a list of names was affixed as demanded by the British Curfew Order of the day.

The list read William Mulcahy, Hannah Mulcahy, Parents; Arthur Mulcahy, Denis Mulcahy, sons; Mary (Minnie) Mulcahy, Alice

Mulcahy, daughters (the Caplis was placed under aryoungest son Michael was staying at his uncles house in Inch at the time).

No sound broke the stillness of the cold moonlit night as the Mulcahy's of Currabeha slept peacefully. The hours went by. The waning moon was bowing out to another day when the family were suddenly awakened by the battering of rifle butts on the farmhouse door. Four British officers brandishing revolvers and followed by soldiers stormed in, thrusting William Mulcahy aside. They ordered Denis and Arthur to dress. The officers withdrew briefly and hurried consultation took place outside. On return they singled out Arthur. As Arthur tied his boots a soldier roared "your boots are alright. Come on you dog". William Mulcahy bid his 22 year old first born son what was to be a final adieu with the words. "Have you got your rosary beads

Close by the Caplis household came in for similar treatment from another British detachment. As John rest he heard a volley of shots. Little thought he that the bullets had found their target in the body of young Arthur Mulcahy. As the soldiers passed through Glengoura on their tour of terror, the people heard distinctly the moans of the wounded boy in the back of a lorry until British bayonets ended his agony. On the roadside in a pool of blood, scarcely a mile from his home in Currabeha, his cap was found next morning, Arthur was dead in a lorry when it returned to join the other group at the Caplis Home.

William Mulcahy and his daughter Mary (Minnie) set out for Fermoy where they were told by some of the town people that the raiding party had returned with a dead body in one of the lorries. At the British military Barracks in Fermoy his worst fears were confirmed as he gazed on the mutilated body of his son Arthur. The authorities refused to release the corpse unless William attended a military enquiry

next day. This he did, to hear the verdict upon sworn evidence by soldiers, "shot while trying to escape".

As the funeral cortege arrived in Tallow it was attacked by British forces who attempted to remove the tricolour from the dead volunteers coffin.

Arthur Mulcahy was 22 years of age when he died. An outstanding athlete - a champion sprinter who had not yet reached his prime. He is buried along with all the family who were in the household that night and his brother Michael in Tallow graveyard. Arthur Mulcahy was a volunteer in Oglaigh na hEireann having joined the IRA after the 1916 Ris-

with the settlement of Vikings in Munster. They were raiders in search of 'gold and glory' certainly but were also merchants with outlets in every part of Europe and North Africa. Already in 863 AD they had founded the seaport of Waterford. In 916 AD they swarmed all over the Province of Munster. As the early Irish historian says, there were 'seavomitings of ships in all of Munster' and there was no place in Munster that was not visited by the Vikings. It was probably at this time that they built an outpost at Helvick where they moored their clinker built ships, the finest ocean Helvick means 'the settlegoddess of the dead. Helvick was, of course, more suitable for these men as landfall than Dungarvan, because the tides did not effect their ships and they lived by the sea which was the element that linked their trading empire of ports.

KILLONGFORD

There is another intriguing hint in a place-name, which throws some light on the presence of Vikings in the Dungarvan area. This is Killongford, 'the church of the encampment'. A longphort was generally an encampment of Vikings where they pulled their ships ashore and used them for shelter and, if

The 10th century opened need be, they also threw up some temporary fortifications around them. This then became a base for raids over the surrounding countryside.

NO ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

There is nothing further known of the Vikings in the Dungarvan district, where there were no monasteries for them to raid. There was, of course, no place like Lismore where the raiders came and apparently settled. Ardmore appears to have been in decline by the 9th century. Apart from the oratory, there was still no other stone building there at that time and these were built later.

In Ireland the only urban settlements were monasteries going craft so far in Europe. where a concentration of wealth could be found. That ment of Hel', who was the is the reason why the Vikings raided them.

Sunday, March 25th, which is also the Feast of the Annunciation, is now celebrated worldwide as Mother's Day. 

A REQUEST TO ANGLE NOT TO GO FISHING

A request by the Minister for the Marine and Natural Resources to all anglers not to go fishing at this time as part of the drive to prevent the spread of Foot and Mouth Disease to this country. He appealed to all sections of the community to play their part to counter the spread of FMD. Anglers are in a particular position to help, in view of their contact and use of farmland to access rivers and lakes. In light of the current situation the Minister has issued the following advice. All anglers should refrain from fishing at this time. No fishing permits will be issued in respect of State Fisheries until further notice, private fishery owners should not operate their fisheries for the moment, tourism angling promoters should encourage visiting anglers to postpone their angling trips for the immediate future, all angling competitions should be cancelled for the moment and Fisheries Boards will cease stocking and transfer of fish in fresh water until further notice. He has also called on all angling clubs to encourage their members to refrain from angling at this time to cooperate with the Fisheries Boards to avoid any risk to our livestock resource.

FOOT AND MOUTH MESSAGE

Minister Walsh thanks the public and the many organisations concerned for their invaluable co-operation and forbearance during the current Foot and Mouth emergency.

The Minister said that to prevent an outbreak, we must continue to remain vigilant and take strict precautions for as long as is necessary. The Minister reminded the public not to travel to Northern Ireland, Great Britain or France unless absolutely necessary; not to visit the countryside and not to bring meat or dairy products into this country from Northern Ireland, Great Britain or France.

Speaking to farmers, the Minister advised them to continue to restrict access to farms; to regularly change/clean the disinfectant mat/straw at the entrance to the farm; not to travel to other farms, to move animals only under permit and to report any suspicious movement to their local Department office. "It is in all our interests to keep foot and mouth out of Ireland," the Minister said.

Minister Walsh also announced a timetable for the relaxation of certain restrictions for specified categories of events in the light of the current FMD situation. These guidelines are available on the Department's website (www.irlgov.ie/daff) and were published recently in the national newspapers.

On the 25th of June 2001, five successful candidates will arrive at an Irish airport, having absolutely no idea where they are headed for. Only hours before they depart, will they find out what their destination is to be (all we can say at the moment is that they will definitely be exotic). The travellers will also have to survive on a meagre budget equivalent to the local value of £150 per week as they explore the locations to which they have been sent.

'Buail Bóthar' will show the adventures of the five intrepid travellers, warts and all as they journey through exotic and far-off countries in a quest to survive on their own with only a backpack and a camersperson for company. For four weeks we will follow each of our presenters as they come to terms with a number of challenges which have been set for them - which could range from trekking across the Sahara to exploring the deepest reaches of the Amazonian rainforests. The journey will be a rollercoaster ride of success and failure.

Candidates need to be adventurous, resilient and above all resourceful. They also need to have a good knowledge of Irish and be 18 years of age or over. REST AND

Bodily growth and repair occur only during rest or sleep, never during training. Successful development of an athlete is always a delicate balancing act between three variables - a training programme of progressive overload, the correct raw materials (nutrients) to maintain and repair tissue and build new tissue and sufficient rest and sleep to permit the repair and new growth to take place. Short sleep athletes are the first to succumb to that big killer of sports careers - overtraining. Many recent studies document that the overtraining syndrome occurs primarily because of insufficient rest. The general rule for rest is to get 71/2 to 91/2 hours sleep a night. For athletes who train twice a day and you should if you want the maximum training effect, a 30 to 60 minute nap after your first training session is invaluable. It may be a hard habit to get into, but persevere.

WEST WATERFORD ATHLETICS NEWS Marathon Man Of Yestervear

With an all time interest in marathon running in the area at present because of the upcoming All-Ireland Marathon Championship in Dungarvan on Sunday May 27th, we include, this week, an account of a famous win by a Waterford runner in a long distance event all of ninety two years ago.

THE "HERALD" ROAD RACE Won by Ballinamult Man

Memories of Great Achievement Recalled

The "Herald" Road Race held on 5th July, 1909 was won by a County Waterford man. T. F. O'Flynn, Ballinamult who in addition to the Cup, received a cheque for £10. An Irish tweed suit and a dozen cabinet photographs of himself. He has won well all his honours. The road race from Drogheda to Navan is over 17 miles of stiff, hilly country, and Mr. Flynn covered the dis-



tance without ever getting out of his stride in the time of 1 hour, 35 minutes, 50 seconds.

Thos. Hynes of Galway, winner of the Irish marathon at Jones' Wood was beaten into second place. A young unknown Dublin athlete named James Walsh came third and proved better than such old champions as Fegan Curtis and McArdle, all of whom qualified for prizes. Michael Downes, a County Meath competitor finished fourth. Twenty nine started in the race and it is known that 25 of those competitors competed the distance under 2 hours.

The description of the race continues: "From the point of view of competitors and the general interest and enthusiasm yesterday's race eclipsed all its records of previous years. The race, promoted as it is by the Evening Herald", entered on the seventh year. It's popularity appears to increase with the advance of years and yesterday there were entries from all parts of the country. Dublin, of course claimed the largest member of competitors but the provinces were also strongly represented and counties so far removed as Tyrone and Waterford sent their athletes to compete for their athletes to compete for this coveted trophy. No fewer than 72 competitors were entered and of these 29 faced the starter.

"Previous races have been usually associated with the sweltering heat of the day when it was almost a burden on one to walk much less to undergo such a trying test of physical endurance as to cover 17 miles within a space of time considerably within two hours. Yesterday, however weather conditions were all that could be deterred, the race being run on a cool afternoon with a delightful refreshing breeze blowing.

"At Drogheda, the streets of that historic town was filled with spectators waiting for the start of the great race and there is a rush for vantage points then the start took place. Fagan, Dublin and Curtis, Ashburne, who recently ran in the Great Marathon Road race at Madison Square Garden, New York were among the competitors. Fagan was strongly fancied for the event, as was Hynes of Galway who was yesterday installed favourite".

But very few spoke of Thomas O'Flynn, the man from Ballinamult who without once breaking his style

Navan an exceedingly distance in front of Hynes.

The account continues — They're off!! The run to Navan! As the town clock fled 2 o'clock the starting pistol rang out and the competitors bounded away. As they passed along the street the excited onlooker waved and peered and pressed in on their favourites like waters on the track of a ship. One of the first to row in front was a hair-haired youngster, Peter Rooney, of Slane and the crowd signalled their encouragement and admiration of his pluck. For the first couple of miles Peter, held his own pretty well, but the superior stamina of his rivals soon

"After leaving Drogheda at a strong pace, the team straggled off nearing the Boyne Bridge and were scattered on the road for nearly a mile. Although the road was black with vehicles, pedestrians and cyclists no inconvenience was occasioned to the runners. Admirable order was preserved throughout and not a single incident or obstruction occurred at any points".

Running Order At the Boyne

At the Boyne Obelish, the leading competitors were" O'Flynn, Waterford going strong with a long regular stride and was well ahead of last year's winner. Pat Fegan, Dublin. Fegan headed a bunch a few yards only separating each - Cummins, Oldcastle and Hynes, midway running in grand style, and McArdle Louth: Downes, Meath, and Walsh, Dublin. The others were anywhere from a hundred yards to a half mile behind.

There was a big crowd awaiting events at Slane village, halfway to Navan, where O'Flynn was seen in the front to even greater advantage. He had covered eight miles in 45 minutes and he led by about seventy yards from Fegan, who was looking somewhat distressed but bore on spiritedly. McArdle, Downes, Timmins, Hynes and Walsh followed Fegan in close order and separated themselves from Curtis, Meath, by a clear 100 yards while Curtis was about 300 yards from his nearest follower.

O'Flynn Keeps the Lead

Coming on to Slane Castle, Walsh, Dublin burst out in pursuit of O'Flynn and was now in front of Hynes who still looked fresh and kept his brisk stride. Fegan had lagged back into fourth place and 300 yards behind Fegan were McArdle, Downes and Timmins, followed by Curtis, Geraghty, Kells and Keegan, Dublin strongly fancied for the event.

Passing Stackallen, O'Flynn was loudly cheered by the crowd, who saw him leading the great Hynes by about 40 yards with Walsh dropping back after his effort now hanging on the heels of the Galway man. Behind in straggling order came McArdle, 50 yards in front of Fegan, pursued by Downes and his fellow countrymen Timmins and Curtis while Geraghty, the Kells man was plodding along half-mile in the rear. This order was unchanged along Flawe Hill, where a multitude cheered the leader, who was striding rapidly but easily.

At The Finish - O'Flynn's Enthusiastic Reception

Nothing could have executed the enthusiasm of the people of Navan as the line approached for the finishing scenes of the race. From long before noon, crowds began to pour into the town and when the time approached for the final scene, everyone of the thousands who thronged the streets was in a state of subdued excitement. The minutes flew and all eyes were turned to-

of running, fresh man and a satisfactory journey to wards the outskirts of the town awaiting the first glimpse of the hero of the day, whoever he may be. Just five minutes after the clock of Navan chimed out half past three, a cheer arose at the north eastern entrances to the town. It was taken up along the dense line that blackened Watergate Street, Market Street and Trimgate Street and was continued far beyond. It announced that the leader, the fleet-footed Ballinamult man had arrived and was sprinting like a school boy over the course that led to the tape of victory. Everybody cheered O'Flynn, everybody waved their caps and hats and those of the crowd that had neither caps nor hats, waved handkerchiefs. Old men held their grandchildren up high in their arms to see O'Flynn and young men supported old men who craned their necks over other people's shoulders to "get a good luck" at O'Flynn. But the Ballinamult man as he tripped through Trimgate Street paid no heed to the jubilation of the throng. He looked neither to the right or left, but firmly kept his eyes fixed on the tape at the top of the hill. He was not overheated or panting and seemed as fresh as when he left the starting point. He just sprinted a little when he came in sight of the tape just to show that he could run back to Drogheda again if necessary. He covered the distance of 17 miles in 1 hour 35 minutes and 50 seconds without ever getting out of his steady pace and well did he deserve the royal reception extended to him by friend and stranger alike.

Scarcely had the excitement consequent on the glorious entry of O'Flynn subsided when Tom Hynes from Galway came in sight. Hynes had a splendid record as a long distance runner but was not as fresh as O'Flynn. He looked more or less flagged when he breasted the tape, although he made a sporting sprint in the last few yards. At his heels came Walsh of Dublin, and a minute and a half later came Downes, whilst P. Fagan, Dublin who had won the previous year's race entered fifth looking none too well after his strenuous efforts to maintain his place.

This is the story as published in the Press of that period of one of the outstanding events in that brilliant career of one of Ireland's famous athletes. To the older residents and readers it will awaken memories of the past. To the youth it will be a story retold of one whose name will ring down the ages wherever and whenever the names of Ireland's great athletes are recalled.

Tom O'Flynn died at the age of 35 years after he was given Caustic Soda instead of medicine by a

Tom's twin brother Pat O'Flynn was the mile champion of Ireland in the very early years of the 20th century.

of every distance runners diet, if your training for a marathon they are a must, novice runners use them as a springboards to the finish line, and elite marathon runners do multiple long runs to improve their times. But what is the specific purpose of the long run? Is there a perfect long run distance? And how frequently should you do them, and at what pace? The one thing all athletes agree upon is the critical role long runs play in any marathon schedule, shun them at your pearl, here are some of the answers to a number of the crucial long run questions.

1. WHAT IS THE MAIN PURPOSE OF THE LONG RUN?

A long run is a dress rehearsal for your race, think of it as a test, it gets you

The long run is the stable for a long time, equally important you learn patience, "many runners push too hard on daily runs", the long run forces them to slow down and pace themselves wisely, one of the most important reasons for long runs is to condition the muscles to delay the onset of fatigue.

2. WHAT IS THE **BEST LONG RUN** TRAINING DISTANCE FOR **MARATHONERS**

In short there is no perfect

distance, there are some marathon training schedules which never take you further than 13 miles and ones that suggest you run the complete distance or further in training, but most marathon schedules suggest you don't go further than 20 or 22 miles. Most coaches feel that once you reach 14 miles your in long run territory, that 's used to the stress of lugging the point where the psychoyour feet up and down near- logical and physiological ly 5,000 times in a marathon, changes start to take place, long runs build confidence some athletes prefer to keep in your ability simply to run track of the long run by time

rather than distance which is the approach generally, recommended for the slower groups training for the marathon. Your time goal for your longest run should approximate the total length of time you expect to run in the marathon itself, without worrying about the distance or the speed. For example, if your marathon goal is 3 hours, you should probably do at least one long run of close to 3 hours. The exception, if you're a first timer with a goal of 4 hours or slower you shouldn't do a long run of that length, instead, do a long run of around 3 hours but no more than that.

3. HOW FAST SHOULD YOU **RUN DURING** LONG RUNS?

Speed is of limited importance during long runs, its more about time spent on your feet, first timers, following most training schedules will often run them at a pace close to the one they will run in the race, that's because they are encouraged to select a conservative time goal to guarantee that they finish, the normal rule of thumb is if you can't hold a

conversation during the closing miles of your long runs the pace was probably too fast. Experienced marathon runners who do long runs at race pace risk both injury and over training, while you need to do some training at race pace to condition you muscles to that specific pace, you should do this only for selected stretches of your long run, or better still during midweek speed sessions, or steady runs, not every long run needs to be done at the same pace, nor does the pace within each run need to stay the same it is suggested you should try and run a negative split in your long run, that is, run the second half marginally faster than the first half, this is also the strategy you should aim for on race day. The rationale in training is that by following this plan in your long runs you establish the discipline of going out slowly, rather than allowing the excitement of the marathon to push you on at a pace that you'll pay for later, if your looking for a specific pace for your long runs aim 60 seconds slower per mile than the pace you expect to run the marathon, don't worry if your ever slower, it isn't a problem.

LONG RUN RULES

Here are five key principles to guide you through your long runs.

Distance: Most coaches advise long runs of 16-23 miles, depending on your experience. Slower runners should concentrate more on time than distance and do runs of three to three and a half hours.

Frequency: Most coaches suggest three to six long runs of 16 miles or more in the three months leading up to the marathon.

Pace: Run at a comfortable, conversational pace. This may be marathon goal pace for slower runners, or 30 or 90 seconds slower per miles than goal pace for sub-3 hour marathoners. Take short walking breaks if they help you cover the distance or if you're planning to take walking breaks during the marathon.

Recovery 1: You can improve your long run recovery by making sure you are adequately hydrated during your long run. And immediately after the run, be sure to drink plenty and replenish lost muscle glycogen stores with carbohydrates.

Recovery II: Always have an easy day or a rest day after your long run days.

"It is in fact at this point a matter of life and death", he

County engineer, John O'Flynn, said the situation at Cushcam is exactly as Cllr. Deasy has analysed it. It is undoubtedly an extremely dangerous junction, and while they had submitted a scheme to the NRA they were not entirely happy with it so they had submitted another one.

Mr. O'Flynn disclosed that the NRA's safety adviser had visited the location at Cushcam and is now talking about a significant realignment programme which it is hoped will be done as soon

as possible.

He went on to confirm the intention to construct a massive multi million pound outer Dungarvan bypass road that would take all vehicular traffic away from Cushcam. The time, he said, is fast approaching when they will need that new route but the likely start of its construction would not be earlier than 2006.

Mr. O'Flynn said they will again write to the NRA regarding the Cushcam situation and will also furnish them with the details of the serious accidents of the last twelve months as outlined to their meeting by Cllr. Deasy.

"Clearly the County Council is treating the matter as an urgent priority, and I thank them for that", Cllr. Deasy




