Tallow In Line For Forty-Five New Jobs In £6 million Plant

A £6 million development in Tallow which will employ 45 people looks set to be on course after a meeting between local residents and the new owners of the proposed fish processing plant in the old Flair Plastics factory on Thursday evening last.

The meeting was called by Cllr. Willie McDonnell to address some of the local residents concerns with the plant, which is set to be located in the old Flair Plastics factory on the Youghal

The local residents had feared that there would be a substantial drop in the value of their homes, a smell of fish emanating from the factory and an increase in the volume of traffic and in noise pollution in the area.

However, Mr. Dan O'Regan, Director of Fermoy Fish, claimed that none of these factors would effect the area should the development go ahead and further added that the majority of the work is done at sea and because of this most of the residents worries were unjustified.

Mr. O'Regan clarified this by stating that there would be the same level of traffic on the roads as when the Flair Plastics factory was in operation. He also said he could guarantee there would be no smells coming from the factory.

Fermoy Fish, who are the new owners of the disused factory in the Tallow area, currently employ 25 people in Fermoy but it is understood that Mr. O'Regan plans to base his operations in Tallow where it is expected he will live should the

plant be given the go-ahead.
Cllr. McDonnell who was addressing the monthly meeting of the County Council welcomed the proposed plant and said fish

processing was a very viable and well established business that could thrive in Tallow

Former Waterford County Board Chairman Brands GAA Decision "A Disgrace"

A former Waterford County GAA Board chairman has branded the Associations weekend Congress decision not to open up Croke Park to other sports organisations "a disgrace".

Kieran O'Ryan, who served in the past as Chairman of both the West Waterford Divisional Board and the County Board, and has represented his native county in most grades of hurling and football, said that in a time of the Peace Agreement in Northern Ireland and the attempts of so many people to bring about

reconciliation in the province the negative decision at the GAA Congress had greatly disappointed him.

O'Ryan, who was speaking at Monday's meeting of the Waterford County Council on which he is the longest serving member said he was "aghast" when he learned of the result of the vote on the motion from Roscommon seeking to have the gates of Croke Park opened up to other Sports bodies.

Cllr. O'Ryan said the decision was a disgrace and is

the kind of negative one that is not needed from the GAA at a time when so many people are working so hard to find a solution to the problems in Northern Ireland.

The former Waterford GAA Chairman also expressed his reservations about the Government decision to make a further £60 million available to the Association over the next four years at a time when hospital waiting lists are lengthening and many patients have to settle for a trolley in

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




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THE WAY WE LIVE: SCINCE AND TECHNOLOGY

TERIALS

Among the most useful materials in the modern world are wood, concrete and steel for buildings, paper for writing and printing, and glass for windows and bottles.

Most people use the word 'material' to describe substances like these, which we use to make things. To a scientist, however, a material is really any solid, liquid or gas - even the air you breathe.

Some materials come from plants or animals or from underground. Examples of these natural materials are paper, leather and marble. Other materials are made by chemical reactions in fac-

Metals are examples of such "synthetic' materials. They are obtained from rocks in which they are chemically combined with other elements.

Plastics are also synthetic materials, because they are made when compounds in oil undergo carefully controlled chemical processes.

Scientists are always striving to find new materials for an ever-increasing variety of products.

TOGETHER THEY ARE **STRONG**

Concrete can hold up a load that would squash other materials. That is why it is used for the pillars of this suspension bridge. Steel is strong if you try to pull it. That is why it is used to make the cables, which are under incredibly high tension. This winning combination allows engineers to build bridges with long spans



KNOW YOUR MATERIALS

The first plastic was celluloid, which was used to make photographic film.

The first metal to be used was gold. This is because it occurs naturally, whereas most other metals must be smelted to remove them from the rocks called ores.

Whereas water molecules consist of just three atoms each, plastics have very large molecules, each of which consists of thousands of atoms.

Rubber is a natural material — it is solidified latex. which is the sap of a rubber tree. Its properties can be changed to make it stronger and more elastic, by a process called vulcanisation. This involves heating rubber under pressure with sulphur. The process can also turn rubber into a harder substance, called vulcanite.

WHAT'S IT MADE OF?

It may surprise you to know that glass is made of sand. In a glassworks, sand is mixed with other substances, and heated until it melts. As it cools it becomes thicker, and can be moulded or blown into shape before it hardens to form glass. Metal-containing compounds may be added to make coloured glass.

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
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

WILLIAM WILLIAMS 1820-1875

William Williams was an antiquarian Irish language supporter, artist and manuscript collector. He was born

The first reference to Williams in Dungarvan is found in the minute books of Dungarvan Board of Guardians for September 1849. He is described as a "Hardware Merchant" and supplied leather goods to the Workhouse. Slater's Commercial Directory 1856 lists William Williams as a 'Leather Seller' of Main Street. His address is given as the Loan & Discount Bank, Dungarvan. In 1859 William Williams, shopkeeper and James Boland were employed as auditors to Dungarvan Town Commissioners. In 1869 William Williams 'Banker' was named as a surety for the clerk of Dungarvan

Williams, in the company of others, explored the countryside looking at ancient churches, ogham stones, etc., speaking only Irish between themselves and to those whom they met.

In 1863, Williams was asked by Dungarvan Town Commissioners to design a new Coat of Arms and Seal as the original had been lost in the 18th century. He designed the present town Coat of Arms.

There is a manuscript by Williams in the National Library which is dated August 1867 detailing the genealogy of the family of Samuel Edward Maguire of Clonea Castle near Dungarvan. It shows Williams's skill as a calligrapher and illustrator. Most of the genealogical information contained in it was coped from a previous account of the family compiled by Charles Lynegar in 1731 for Bernard Maguire.

Williams was also interested in Irish antiquities and was one of the first to study and record Ogham stones in Ireland. He was a member of the Historical & Archaeological Society. The National Library has a bound collection of Ogham inscriptions compiled by Williams between 1858 and 1859. In 1868 Williams published an article on the Drumlohan Ogham stones in the Journal of the Historical & Archaeological Association of Ire-

Seán Ó Cadhla notes that Williams was also a poet. There are two poems by Williams in the National Library. Williams was a founder member of The Keating Society. The main aim of this Society was to publish works written in the Irish language. When he died in 1875 Williams was working on a new edition of Eochair Sgiath An Aifrinn (A key to the shields of the mass) a corrected version of a work previously published by Geoffrey Keating).

Williams died on Dungarvan on 14 July 1875 at the age of 55. His death cert noted that he was a bachelor and his profession as 'clerk.' According to Seán Ó Cadhla Williams is buried in an unmarked grave at St. Mary's Parish Church, Dungarvan.

In parts of France brides would break an egg as they entered their new home. One must never throw an egg shell into the fire or the bird that laid the egg would never lay again.

Should a farmer want female chicks, setting the eggs after sunset was advised. Some farmers kept the final egg from an old hen as a charm to guard their chickens. An egg laid on Good Friday would keep fresh for many years and be of great value to fishermen because if thrown into the sea during a storm it would reduce the fury of the waves. An egg laid at the reputed time of Our Lords crucification - 3 pm would have the emblems of the Sacred Passion imprinted on the shell.

In parts of England - in the country villages - young men would go around collecting eggs from householders. They were called "Pace Eggers" and blackened their faces. wore masks and coloured ribbons hanging from clothing. The eggs were given to the poor and to invalids on Easter morning.

The egg is a time honoured symbol of Christ's death and the triumphal rising from the grave. No symbol could be more

The West Waterford MABS not only deals with people experiencing debt but also with their creditors which John Lawless says they "also have a responsibility towards".

"We develop a practical plan of action for the person in debt. If the person doesn't respond or keep that plan of action we have to inform the creditor that it is not working. From that point of view many people may say we are quite tough on them but I would say we are straight talking because there is no point in beating around the bush with the question of debt."

However John Lawless says they have "a very compassionate view of where a person is at, at a given time in terms of their experience of debt. We look at the sort of pressure they are under and take that into account when drawing up a plan for them".

Pressures people are under can be very grave, according to John Lawless.

"People are sometimes worried sick by their debts and go through sleeplessness and that's something you can never forget. So we take a tough but human approach."

West Waterford MABS is not standing still in its dealing with people's difficulties however and are already pioneering the whole IT end of the service.

"We're developing software mers to administer the service and various budgets. Therefore we're at the forefront of communications and are responsible for developing MABS national Web-

The West Waterford MABS strives to be as accessible as possible and in this end they are also willing to meet people in their own areas if they are unable to travel to Dungarvan.

This Week In

STOP EARLY-FLOWERING CHRYSANTHEMUMS From time to time during this month the growing tips of

rooted cuttings should be pinched out. The ideal moment is when the cuttings are well rooted, growing freely and about six-inches high.

This should only be done to those plants being grown specifically to produce a lot of flowers, the objective being to produce a number of sprays or branches on

With this in mind, the plants should be stopped again

Plants intended for individual flowers, perhaps for display purposes, use a different method and they should not be stopped now.

SOW FRENCH BEANS UNDER GLASS

For a supply of tender young beans in July, sow now in seed boxes or pots.

The latter method has the benefit of avoiding any root disturbance later.

Place one seed in each pot, cover with a little soil and put to germinate in a greenhouse or heated frame. The ideal temperature is about 13 C but no harm will be done if it falls a little below this occasionally. Frost will kill the bean, however, so don't be too anxious to harden off until late May.

PLACE EARLY TOMATOES IN FINAL POTS

Tomatoes from a January sowing should be ready for final potting. Alternatively, they can be grown in boxes or planted

directly into a border of compost prepared on staging or even on the ground if the greenhouse is a light one with low walls or glass to ground level. Choose a suitable compost.

THIN OUT OVERGROWN WATER PLANTS

Pond maintenance can include thinning out some of the more overgrown water plants, but to avoid this problem in future try less-invasive types such as water iris and marsh marigold.

However the Councillor also warned that a number of people had grave concerns about the plant and that these concerns must be addressed in order that the plant be given the go ahead.

While it was understood that most of the local residents in the vicinity of the proposed fish processing plant were at first against the plant, now that their fears have been addressed the majority are said to be in favour of the go ahead and welcome the news that 45 new jobs will be brought to the area.

The planning application for the Fish Processing Plant will be received by Waterford County Council during the week.

Tallow in Numbers Of Rural **Gardai Raised** At Meeting Of The Waterford **County Council**

Gardai are finding difficulty in manning rural stations in West Waterford, according to Chief Superintendent Sean O'Halloran who was addressing the monthly meeting of the Waterford County Council on Monday

The Chief Superintendent has said the Division is stretched between two large counties and two cities with a limited number of Gardai in their Division.

This in turn has had the result that the service the Gardai can give to local rural communities is limited though many Councillors went on the record as stating they have been exemplary in the implementation of their tasks.

However the policing of isolated areas in West Waterford, in particular, was called into question and it is believed to be a headache for the Gardai due to the large districts and the sporadic nature of the population in these areas.

It is also believed that because of the large, and increasing, number of elderly people living in isolated districts of West Waterford there is a danger that a spate of attacks on these vulnerable people could occur.

This follows a number of such attacks in rural communities throughout the

country over the past few years that have, in many cases, resulted in serious injury or death.

However, Chief Superintendent O'Halloran stated that isolated areas get a proportionate number of Gardai to those that enter the force but admitted that he is unable to compel any recruit to live in a particular station.

The Chief Superintendent said that his ideal model, which has worked successfully in Co. Kilkenny, would be to place new recruits into rural stations where ever possible.

However he said while he couldn't force a Garda to live in isolated regions he was accepting people looking for transfers into the division on the basis that they give an undertaking to move to rural areas.

The Chief Superintendent was answering a question from Fine Gael Councillor John Deasy who added that he was concerned that people were afraid to go to funerals for fear that they would come back to find their homes ransacked.

In reply to this the Chief Superintendent said that the majority of the crimes of this nature were committed by people who were travelling long distances and so he believed that the crimes had to be tackled at the source.

Meanwhile the Chief Superintendent was also queried about Kilmacthomas Garda station and also the situation in Tallow where Cllr. James Tobin asked about the high turnover of Gardai in the region.

In answer to the question on Kilmacthomas, the Chief Superintendent stated that he was hopeful that commencement of the building of the Garda Station would start in the summer and with regard to Tallow the Chief Superintendent said he was confident that the new Garda who is now in the area would be located there for an acceptable length of time.

The Chief Superintendent was also pleased to inform the council that the Waterford-Kilkenny division had the highest rate of crime detection in the country over the past three years.


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
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Mediterranean Lamb

Mediterranean lamb

Cooking: Approx 12 mins plus marinating time

Try this different way with lamb cutlets.

INGREDIENTS: (serves 2)

4-6 British lamb cutlets

1 small courgette, quartered

12 small aubergine, cut into large

1 yellow pepper, seeded and cut into 4 pieces

2 tomatoes, halved

Marinade:

3 x 15 ml olive oil

2 x 15 ml spoon lemon juice

1/2 garlic gloves, crushed

1 x 15ml sp dried mixed herbs

Salt and freshly ground black pepper

In a large rectangular dish, mix together the marinade ingredients.

Add the lamb and vegetables and turn to ensure well coated in the marinade.

Cover and leave to marinate in a refrigerator for 3-4 hours. Arrange lamb and vegetables on the rack in the grill pan and cook under a preheated grill for 4-6 minutes each side.

Serve the lamb with the vegetables, crusty bread and a salad.



Mixed Salad Nicoise

Cooking: 15 minutes Preparation: 20 minutes

This salad was first made in Nice in the South of France.

INGREDIENTS:

2 tbsp olive oil

drained 3 medium eggs

4 small tomatoes, quar-

tered

4 little gem lettuce

225g fine green beans, cut into 3cm lengths

100g black olives

Dressing:

75ml olive oil 30ml white wine vinegar parsley

1 tspn freshly chopped 1/4 tsp wholegrain mustard salt and black pepper

Method:

Put the eggs in a saucepan and cook until hard boiled.

Shell the eggs, cut them into quarters and mix with the tomatoes.

Quarter the lettuce, bring pan of water to boil and add beans. Cook for 15 mins until 400g can tuna chunks tender. Drain and plunge into blow of cold water. Drain again.

Assemble the salad using the tuna eggs lettuce beans and olives. In a bowl whisk together the dressing ingredients until thickened and smooth. Pour over the salad and toss gently.

Spread the topping over the fruit and bake in a preheated oven 160C gas 3 for 45 minutes.



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

The Order is under the Diseases of Animals Act and has the effect of banning all AI and the movement of bovine semen until that date.

The Minister said that since the beginning of the Foot and Mouth restrictions, AI had been suspended by means of a voluntary action by the Al

This is in line with the recommendations of the Expert Group set up by the Minister to advise on FMD restrictions.

Minister Walsh said the Al stations had behaved responsi-

Equally crucial will be full adherence to the protocol now being put in place aimed at ensuring that when the service resumes, it does so without risk. He was confident that farmers also would fully cooperate with the measures now agreed. Today's Order provides for serious penalties in the event of non adherence to the ban until 19 April and thus ensures there will be no illegitimate exploitation of the voluntary ban by illegal oper-

Minister Walsh concluded by saying that all of this was, of course, conditional upon developments in the wider context of FMD and if there were any deterioration in the situation between now and then, these dates would be reconsidered.

South East ICMSA News

John Quigley area development officer with ICMSA in the south east region outlines some of the issues currently being addressed and ICMSA's proposals.

1. A.I. Services

ICMSA welcomes the announcement that A.I. services will resume on 16 April.

The suspension of A.I. services posed considerable difficulties for many farmers, in particular for winter milk producers and early spring calving herds. The implications include possible loss of winter milk bonuses and a delayed calving season in 2002 with the subsequent impact on farm income.

ICMSA is also concerned about the long term damage that may result from the restrictions to the objectives set down by ICBF for the future of Irish cattle breeding. ICMSA is proposing that a major campaign be considered by the Department and ICBF to recover lost ground.

2. Sale of Calves and **Breeding Stock:**

Many farmers have to sell calves, as they do not have the facilities or land to keep the calves on their farm. 3. Establish Timeframe and Flan for Resumption of **Normal Trade:**

ICMSA believes that an announcement on the possible timeframe for the resumption of normal trade is required. For example, when is the earliest possible date for marts to reopen?

ICMSA accepts the variables involved but believes that the likely developments if no further outbreak is confirmed should now be outlined to farmers. This is essential to allow some level of planning at farm level.

Farmers need to know the likely stock numbers they will have to manage for the foreseeable future.

4. Milk Quota Implications for Farmers:

ICMSA welcomes the scheme recently announced for farmers with milk quota problems due to additional breeding stock on some farms and the commitment to re-examine the operation of milk quota schemes for 2001.

To provide assistance for farmers, ICMSA is proposing the following:

The first stage of the Restructuring Scheme should take place in April and the second stage at a time recommended by the Milk Quota Review Group.

A scheme to address the difficulties of those with excess cows due to the inability to sell breeding stock should be put in place. This scheme would be similar to that operated for TB/Brucellosis restricted herds under the Milk Quota Appeals Tribunal.

5. Milk Recording:

Milk recording is currently suspended. This will have implications for area aid, disease eradication compensation and farm management.

Given the exceptional circumstances, a farmer should be allowed to opt for the previous year's records or partial records for 2001 if milk recording is resumed in 2001.

A mathematical model can be used to give average annual milk yield from partial records. Appropriate adjustments must be made to the schemes affected by the suspension of milk recording to ensure that no farmer loses out on his/her entitlement as a result of the foot and mouth crisis.

6. Ewe Premium Payments: Given the current restrictions on farmers, many sheep farmers have severe cash flow

problems.

ICMSA is proposing that the first two instalments of the ewe premium would be paid together. In previous years, when there were difficulties in the sheep sector, this proposal was implemented.

7. Code of Practice for Slurry Spreading/Silage Cutting:

The disposal of slurry is a major concern and difficulty for farmers and the silage season will be commencing soon.

To minimise risk and to provide clear guidance to farmers, ICMSA is proposing that a Code of Practice should be established setting out best practice in terms of Foot and Mouth Disease prevention and a code that is workable at farm level. The code should be introduced with the agreement of the farm organisa-

Other issues causing concern include commodity prices, extensification payments 2000 and the implications for extensification 2001, area aid deadline, reps, farm waste management/diary hygiene scheme, early retirement scheme TB/brucellosis/bse.

HOUSING STRATEGY REQUIRED UNDER PART V

Part V of the Planning and Development Act 2000 requires that Planning Authorities prepare a Housing Strategy and integrate it into their Development Plans. Each housing strategy should have regard to the proper planning and sustainable development of an area and should be concerned with the overall supply of housing within the planning authority

The Act specifies that Housing Strategy shall take into Account:

- The existing need and the likely future need for housing in the area covered by the Development Plan.
- The need to ensure that housing is available for persons who have different levels of income.
- The need to ensure that a mixture of house types and sizes is developed to reasonably match the requirements of the different categories of households, as may be determined by the Planning Authority, including the special requirements of the elderly persons and persons with disabilities.
- The need to counteract undue segregation in housing between persons of different social background.

THE INVASION

For the last two weeks we wrote about Church Reform through the Synod at Rathbreasail IIIIA.D. The ultimate church reform came with the Anglo-Norman invasion in the years after 1169. The foremost military race in Europe were the Anglo-Normans but they left behind them, not only the results of an invasion, but also castles and abbeys and a new political system. When King Henry II arrived in Waterford in 1171 on the heels of the first invaders, he went through the Decies to Lismore and then to Cashel. He declared his policy of converting the Irish people to the True Faith, a rather odd policy of the slayer of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Thomas a Beckett. On this journey to Lismore he hardly went over the Dog's Gap but must have used a bridle path going past Dungarvan to Lismore from Waterford city.

With the settlement of Ireland by the invaders the building of towns began. Where there was a settlement already in a suitable place, it was fortified. One of the first fortified Anglo-Norman towns was Dungarvan, because it stood at the head of a harbour and was probably well known to seafarers. The Anglo-Norman fortification was built at the Seandún, "the old foot or enclosure", "Shandon" in English. It is difficult to understand how this name came to be applied to the later marshy area where later the railway station and after that a hotel were built.

The new fort began with the building of an earthwork strongpoint, a motte-and-bailey of which only Gallows Hill remains. This is the remains of an artificial hillock on which a wooden turrent was built. On a lower level there was a large fenced area oval in shape where a house, stabbling and a storehouse could be built. That was the bailey but nothing remains of it at Gallows Hill. East of the settlement was the market area that grew up around it and which became known as Fair Lane. However this "Lane" was the original fair field. That this "lane" was more than a street originally is borne out by its status as a distinctive townland of 0.809ha.

The Liturgy group produced their Easter celebration of the life of Jesus at Abbeyside Church on Sunday night last and again on Monday night at Ballinroad Church. CONTROL IN RELATIONSHIP

Carl Jung wrote "Where love rules there is no will to power, and where power predominates love is lacking. The one is the shadow of the other.2 Most of us like to feel we are in control of our lives but with the controlling person there is an overwhelming need to be in control in all situations. Control - or power - often causes serious problems in relationships for in order for one partner to be in control power has to be taken away from the other or there will be continuous conflict. A common scenario is a controlling husband. He will be the person who makes all the decisions often without consultation, he will control finances, routines, habits, access to family and friends and general lifestyle. Control is a compulsion and is virtually the opposite of being a victim. A victim looks to others for help and rescuing whereas a control freak never asks for help since he feels he must handle everything himself. Mothers commonly control their children through overprotection or perfectionism. No matter how the children perform it is never quite good enough so living becomes a constant struggle to please mother. Perfection is a primary symptom of this compulsion and it manifests itself in aggressive or passive-aggressive behaviour. The first takes the form of setting rigid rules and codes of behaviour which if transgressed cause the controller to fly into a rage. The latter takes the form of manipulation and making the other person feel guilty if they don't comply with demands. Controllers are fear-filled dependent people who are alone inside. By controlling all details and feelings they can avoid facing deep relationship issues that they feel might get out of control. They make sure they don't fail at anything. They constantly blame and criticise others to control them as they themselves lay trapped in isolation and fear. Controlling, perfectionist people want everything in its place including people. If that can't happen it causes mental chaos and a sense of being out of control. They often project a sense of grandiosity and superiority as a mask for insecurities. They often try to hide their perfectionist traits as perfec-

The controller erodes a sense of self identity in those around them. The controlling persons dependent also created dependency in others because by taking decision making away from others he ultimately renders them incapable of making their own choices. Children who grow up with this pressure from family often make bad choices to win love such as getting married to escape. Then when difficulties arise they will

return home to become a child again under the loving

control of concerned parents.

tionism erodes trust.

Children who grow up in controlling families are conditioned to repress their real feelings like anger. This childhood conditioning causes many to live their life in fear and unidentified repressed anger. Many others go about feeling inadequate and unable to function, dreading mistakes and hiding under the cloak of shyness. Within every person lies the need to be himself/hers and this fundamental need is the foundation of self esteem. Dysfunctional families and systems are shame based and this creates feelings of inadequacy, insecurity, depression and fear. Because of this many become super-achievers to be loved, giving a false sense of being loved on the outside but inside they feel terrified of love and life.

Where does the compulsion to control come from? It has its roots in childhood when the individual felt powerless and full of fear. From infancy to adolescence we create mental road maps of our experiences, what we see, hear and feel in the world around us. These maps shape every aspect of our lives. When a child grows up in a home where there is physical, emotional and/or sexual abuse real feelings are repressed. They develop a 'pleaser' personality so as to be accepted and approved. This gives birth to the need to put up emotional screens. These screens force them to bury

their feelings and so they never achieve true happiness. They go through life in a performance as it were and reality becomes intolerable. When a person believes he cannot be himself addiction gives a sense of well being and allows them to forget the pain and assume a feeling of wellbeing albeit temporary.

Emily Dickinson wrote: "I feel a cleavage in my mind as if my brain had

split/I tried to match it seam by seam but could not make them fit." The only way we can overcome hidden fears is to understand them. The reason why so many never understand behaviour is because they are driven by the need to protect themselves against emotional pain. People will not deliberately expose themselves to physical pain or injury and so to avoid rejection, abandonment or disapproval they use projection systems, that is the controller projects his unwanted feelings on to others and when victims feel bad the controller arrives in the mantle of a rescuer.

Reality allows one to move closer to more of what they are really deep inside and allows one to experience all too often hide emotions and feelings. There is no need to hide or deny feelings from oneself. This reality allows one in relationship to share feelings with a partner freely and spontaneously and completely.

All meaningful relationships have conflict. Conflict is simply a result of something getting in the way of the forward flow of life. Those who use others to satisfy their needs or purpose are always filled with conflict. Conflict is really a catalyst that precipitates a chain of responses and consequences that are not reactions or chaos. Fear of rejection is our primary fear and so the fear of being loved or rejected in conflict shuts out vulnerability. To dare to be vulnerable means taking a risk but this is the doorway to change.

Unfortunately control is not an easy pattern to deal with. Controlling people have difficulty with intimacy and therefore admitting they have this problem. They are far more likely to blame their partner and refuse to discuss it. In relationship each person has a need, indeed a right to be an individual and some time spent in developing individually actually nurtures a relationship. However much can be done through taking on a commitment to change and a willingness to risk the fear associated with relinquishing some of the control.

QUESTION

I applied for a Medical Card to the health board but was refused. I appealed the decision but I was still refused. I feel I am entitled to it and that I have not been treated fairly. What can I do?

KNOW YOUR

RIGHTS

ANSWER

If you feel you have been treated unfairly by a public body, such as a health board, and have already tried to resolve your problem, as you have by appealing the original decision, you can make a complaint to the Ombudsman. Any individual, company, organisation or association can make a complaint.

The Ombudsman can investigate complaints made about services provided by government departments, local authorities, health boards or An Post. He cannot investigate complaints involving the actions of private companies, individuals, private practitioners, dentists etc. He also cannot investigate complaints where there is a right of appeal to an independent tribunal or appeal body.

You should complain as soon as possible but not later than 12 months after the action you want to complain about occurred. No special form is required and complaints may be made in writing, by telephone, by calling to the Ombudsman's office or by email. You should supply copies of any relevant documentation or correspon-

If the Ombudsman finds that your complaint is justified he will report this to the public body concerned. He may recommend that it should change its decision or review its action.

MAKE YOUR £ GO FURTHER

Set aside the amount of money you can spend on food each week.

Write out a shopping list. Plan menus a few days ahead; it will save you money as you are less likely to buy food on impulse.

Fish is quick to prepare and very nutritious and can be good value depending on the season. You can always ask what offers the best value at a particular time. Mackerel, Coley, Herring, Fish Fingers and tinned fish are good value for money.

Tuna is a very versatile and popular fish. Serve it with a stir-fry and pasta for an interesting evening meal.

Eggs are cheap, easy to cook and full of nourishment. Fresh vegetables are much cheaper processed/frozen vegetables, e.g. potatoes are cheaper than ready-made chips, but they take time to prepare. Fresh vegetables tend to be cheaper in vegetable shops and open-air markets than supermarkets. Make vegetable soup, which is simple to prepare and is nutritious. Cheapest vegetables are generally, cabbage, carrots and broccoli. Vegetables in season will be cheaper too. Fresh tomatoes will be much cheaper in the summer time and more expensive in winter. When fresh vegetables are not in season, frozen or tinned ones will be cheaper.

Meat is usually cheaper in a butchers shop than the supermarket and you can choose the exact amount your want. Mince is low in cost and has no waste from bone and gristle. It may however be high in fat, it is a good idea to buy a smaller quantity of leaner mince.

Irish Horseracing Authority Announces New Fixtures

The Fixtures Committee of the Irish Horseracing Authority has announced details of new fixtures and amendments to the published fixture list up to the end of May 2001. This follows the statement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development that, subject to strict adherence to agreed protocols, horseracing can resume on a limited basis with effect from 16th April with the normal fixture list applying from 19th April.

Horseracing in Ireland has been suspended since 27th February, following the introduction of certain measures to prevent the possible spread of Foot & Mouth Disease. 27 race meetings will have been lost during the period of suspension, 8 new fixtures will be scheduled during the month of April and a further 9 in May.

★ Racing will commence on Monday 16th April with a two day fixture at Leopardstown and Cork. This will be followed on Wednesday 18th April with a new fixture at Gowran Park.

★ The 4 day Fairyhouse Easter Festival originally scheduled to commence on Sunday 15th April will now take place over 3 days on the May Bank Holiday weekend starting on Friday 4 May. The Powers Gold Label Irish Grand National will be run on Sunday 6th May.

★ The Navan fixture scheduled on Sunday, 22nd April will move to Sunday, 29th April and the Curragh will stage a new 2 day meeting on Saturday, 21st April and Sunday, 22nd April.

★ A new fixture is scheduled for Tramore on Monday, 23rd

★ As Punchestown is not in a position to stage racing, the first 3 days of the Punchestown Festival will now be run at Fairyhouse on Tuesday 24, Wednesday 25 and Thursday 26 April. The final day of the Festival will be held at Leopardstown on Friday 27 April.

★ Cork will host an additional meeting on Saturday 28 April. This fixture precedes the scheduled Cork meeting on Sunday 29 April.

★ Tipperary is already scheduled to hold a fixture on Wednesday, 2 May. An additional fixture has been allocated to Tipperary on the following day, Thursday, 3 May

★ In addition to the rescheduled 3 day Fairyhouse festival, a new two day fixture has been allocated to Wexford at the start of the May Bank Holiday weekend on Friday, 4 May and Saturday, 5 May. The meeting at Dundalk and the two Limerick fixtures scheduled over that weekend will not now take place. An additional fixture will be allocated to Dundalk later in the year. The Navan fixture scheduled on

Sunday 6 May will move to Friday 11 May.

★ Thurles will host an additional fixture on Thursday, 10 May. On the following day, Friday, 11 May, the rescheduled Navan meeting will take place. Navan will also run on the following day, Saturday, 12 May to replace the planned Fairyhouse date, In addition a new fixture has been allocated to Tramore on this Saturday.

★ Ballinrobe will host an additional fixture on Thursday, 17 May while Clonmel will run an additional fixture on Saturday, 19 May.

★ Two new fixtures have been added in the following week. Roscommon's scheduled. meeting on Monday, 21 May will be followed by a new fixture at the track on Tuesday, 22 May. Tipperary's scheduled meeting on Thursday, 24 May now becomes a two day meeting with an additional fixture on Friday, 25 May.

Every effort will be made to add additional fixtures throughout the remaining part of the year with an emphasis on the months of October, November and December to make up for the remaining opportunities lost. A revised fixture list for the period 16 April to 31 May is attached.

Bobbyjo was a winner of an Irish National in 1998 accounting for Papillon and he was trained throughout his career by Tommy Carberry while the trainers son Paul partnered Bobbyjo to all his major victo-

Both winners were returned at 7/4 with the J. P. McManus owned first gold producing a flawless round of jumping to easily account for 20/1 shot Lord Noelie.

With overnight rain the going was very much on the heavy side for day two of the festival. Ruby Walsh gave the Paul Nicholls trained Fadalko a peach of a ride in the grade one Martell Melling Chase, running away from a good class field in the closing stages.

The John Huges handicap chase run over the National course was a grief stricken affair with only a quarter of the field completing the two mile five furlong trip. Victory in the end went to the Richard Johnson ridden Gower Slave who stayed on dourly up the gruelling home stretch. Spare a thought for Waterford born rider Robert Widger who as we mentioned last week is going through a lean period. He was booked for the ride on Johnson's indented mount Pennybridge was scratched, trainer Phillip Hobbs switched Johnson on to Gower Slave and the rest as they say is his-

Lady trainer Venetia Williams enjoyed a mixed day of emotion. Her Montalcino looked very impressive over hurdles earlier in the afternoon but had the misfortune to lose her good servant. Meeting between Bord na gCon and the Department of Agriculture, Food & Rural Development Re Resumption of Greyhound Racing

In a Press Statement issued this week, Bord na gCon announced that they have prepared an extensive submission for the early resumption of greyhound racing and have sought an urgent meeting with representatives of the Department and the Expert Group on Foot and Mount Disease Controls.

Since the Foot and Mouth Crisis began, the Board has been in constant contact with the Department and wishes to reassure all greyhound owners, breeders and trainers that every effort will be made by the Board to effect an easy and prompt return to greyhound racing - in strict compliance with the Minister's guidelines - as soon as approval for a resumption of racing is granted by the Department. The Board is confident that greyhound racing will resume within the same timeframe as horseracing.

The Board is cognisant of the serious implications that the curtailment of racing has had on all sectors of the grey-hound industry and wishes to place on record its appreciation of the responsible and conscientious manner in which all section of the greyhound fraternity have complied with the Minister's directives to prevent the spread of the disease.

One can only speculate at this stage as to when racing resumes but all the signs indicate that we will be up and running by the end of the month.

Dungarvan United -v- St. Kevin's Boys (Dublin) Kilrush Park — Sunday, April 15 — Kick-off 2.30 p.m.

Next Sunday, April 15th will see Dungarvan United host the most important Junior Football game in their illustrious history at Kilrush Park. St. Kevin's Boys from Dublin A.U.L. will be their guests in the 7th round (i.e. the last sixteen of the Statoil Junior Cup). This is the biggest junior football tournament in Europe and almost 700 clubs from all over Ireland started out on day one.

St. Kevin's have been favourites for this cup from the outset at 8/1. At that stage Dungarvan were 140/1. Since then the Saints have been cut to 6/1 and Utd. to 25/1.

One look at St. Kevin's profile or the Tangerine Dream as they like to be known will tell you why they have the favourites Tag. Twice finalists, the last being in 1993, quarter

finalists in 1999 and senior finalists in 1998. They have won every trophy available to them over the last decade excluding this one. And that's something that rankles with the Tangerine Dream. At present they are top of their league with two games in hand. This league also contains Baldoyle who Dungarvan put out in the 5th round. It also has Portmarnock who Waterford Utd. could be playing in the semi final of the Senior Cup if Portmarnock overcome Longford in the Quarter Final.

On the pitch, they have top quality players in Declan McGuinness and Anto Canavan who are both current Junior International panelists. Stephen Hayland and Brian Goulding are members of the A.U.L. Oscar Traynor team. Anto Wilkins in 1996 and Philip Long in 1998 have won the Opel/FAI Junior Player of the Year. Up front Dessie O'Hara is considered by some so called experts to be the

Dungarvan beat last years finalists St. Michael's in their own back yard in the 4th round and if they can produce a performance like that day, the Blues will have nothing to fear. They have built on the confidence of reaching two Cup Finals last season and have proved to be no pushovers for anyone, be it inside or outside the pale.

They are also the only unbeaten team in the Premier League having passed the half-way stage.

The Blues have excellent players in the Lyons, Bar-

rys and Landers brothers, great competitors in Crotty, Walsh, Keane and Ferncombe. And on the day Downey, Power and the Donnelly's will cause any team problems. Dunford, O'Connor, Fernandaze and Power will leave no one down when called on.

Yes, Dungarvan Utd. know they have it all to do against one of Ireland's biggest clubs. But one thing is certain, they will not be going out to just make up the numbers. Ask Birdhill, Granagh, Killusty, St. Michael's, Ballydoyle and the Geraldine's.

The people who sowed the seeds of soccer in Dungarvan through the 40's, 50's, 60's and nourished it through the 70's, 80's, 90's should feel very proud of the club's achievements. Thankfully many of these people are still around and hopefully they will be there on Sunday to cheer on the Blues.





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
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
