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Dungarvan Set For Economic Windfall As Sporting Extravaganza Hits Town

The arrival of the FBD Milk Ras and the National Marathon to Dungarvan promises to be a sporting extravaganza and an economic windfall to the town and surrounding areas this weekend.

With the two highly regarded sporting events making Dungarvan their home this weekend large crowds are expected to throng the streets and give the towns traders a significant boost following the much publicised cancellation of other large events including Feile na Deise and the St. Patrick's Day Parade.

The weekend will kick off with the return of the FBD

Milk Ras to Dungarvan's streets on Friday afternoon, where the large contingent of national and international amateur cyclists will finish Stage 6 of the race.

With teams from America, Europe and all over Ireland competing, this years event promises to be one of the most competitive for years.

Included in these teams are Waterford's own contingent, among them local lads Patrick Kenealy, Joseph Kelly, Justin Coonan, Eddie Reddy and Alan Buckley while Rory Wyley, a native of Dungarvan, will compete for the Southend team.

Stage 7, which starts at 11 a.m. Saturday morning from Dungarvan sees the start of one of the longest stages in the Ras as the cyclists race the 171kms to Bunclody.

These stages are among the most crucial of the 1,119 kilometre event with the Ras likely to be well on the way to being decided following the Dungarvan stage.

The weekend continues in the same energetic vein when the national marathon will be held in the town.

This prestigious endurance test, which will be sponsored by Waterford County Council, Dungarvan Urban Council, Waterford Crystal and Waterford and Dungarvan Tourism, is also likely to draw huge crowds to the area, with the top athletes from all around the country competing.

The event travels 26 miles around West Waterford, starting on the Duckspool road at 11am and finishing the gruelling continued on page 9

Jobs Boost If £300 Million Project Gets Go Ahead (KRANE)

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A capacity crowd of approximately 250 people attended a public meeting in Lawlors Hotel to debate the future of the proposed multi-million pound development on the former Glanbia site on Thursday last.

The meeting was called by Clancy Construction to present a display of the proposed developments that may go ahead and to address queries about the project.

The project has been subject to four appeals to An Bord Pleanala made by RG DATA, the Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce, An Taisce and a private individual in the past year.

The appeals are based on

varying grounds, among them that the projects run counter in several ways to Dungarvan's draft development plan; that it would impact seriously on existing town-centre businesses and that it could result in huge traffic problems.

With these appeals and the level of interest in the meeting leading up to the event a fractious debate was expected. However, the heated lev-


The meeting, itself, was Chaired by Paddy Gordon of J.P. Gordon Solicitors, Dungarvan, while Billy Clancy representing Clancy Construction and Neil Bannen of Harrington-Bannen, property advisor to Clancy Construction, were also present.

The meeting began with a visual presentation by Clancy Construction which showed the fronts of the proposed shopping centre, four



THE WAY WE LIVE: SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

CARS

Most cars are powered by engines that run on petrol, which is made from oil. Hundreds or thousands of times every second, tiny sparks inside each cylinder of a car's engine ignite a mixture of petrol and air. The mixture explodes and that pushes a piston to the bottom of the cylinder. The piston is connected to the shaft, called the crankshaft, which turns as the piston is pushed down.


Most cars have four or six cylinders, each with a piston. As the shaft turns, it brings pistons up to the top of the cylinders again, ready for the next explosions. The rotation of the shaft powered by the explosions in the cylinders turns gears in the gear box. The gear turns another shaft, which turns the cars wheels.

Cars have batteries, which supply the electric power for lights, and to produce the sparks to ignite the fuel in the piston.

Some cars have diesel engines, in which there is no spark. The fuel and air mixture ignites when it is squashed by the piston rising up the cylinder.

THE FIRST CAR

The first really practical car to be produced was the three-wheeled Motorwagen. It ran on petrol but had a top speed of just 20 kilometres per hours. The Motorwagen was designed and built by Karl Benz in 1885. Since then, more than 300 million cars have been built.



CUSHIONING THE BLOW

Most modern cars are fitted with airbags. These are installed in the steering wheel or the dashboard, and they automatically fill with air if the car is involved in a crash. When the driver is thrown forward, he or she hits the airbag. which cushions the blow.

An airbag will only work in a head-on collision and will not be effective in a side impact or a

HIGH RISK

Claire Hayes says that the purpose of the DAY Project is to engage young people aged 8 to 18 years, deemed to be 'high risk' in the Dungarvan area and divert them away from trouble.

"These are probably young people who are not involved on a regular basis with any other Youth projects and are either involved in, or have the potential for, petty crime or vandalism," she says. "They are certainly at risk and may have already come into contact with the Gardai."

She is under no illusions about the enormity of the task which confronts her, but she is equally conscious of the benefits which await young people who may get involved with the DAY Project.

"If we can divert even one young person," she says, "it will be worthwhile. There are obvious benefits from the young person's point of view and the community also wins. Any money invested will be returned to the community a hundred fold and society will be better off for it as well."

GRANTS

The Project is being funded by the Department of Justice, who have approved of 10% of the funds being made available to go towards community groups who are willing to take on young people from the target group and to support work being done with young people in the local area.

County Council has joined calls for a Yes vote for the Nice Treaty in the referendum to be held on June 7th.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair said that the European Union had been the instigator of much progressive legislation, particularly in relation to workers rights and would like to see it continue to do so. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says he's pleased that the Labour Party will be running its own distinctive "Yes" campaign, reflecting the policy platform of the Party of European Socialists, to which Labour is affiliated.

"The results of a review of the contract documents for the collection and delivery system were received from the Council on 26 April and are now being examined in my Department. They will be dealt with as quickly as possible. The Department is awaiting the submission of tender documents for the Design/Build/Operate contract for the Wastewater Treatment Plant."

"The Labour Party is pressing for several social housing options. In this case, the UDC is enabled to offer houses for sale to eligible first time purchasers at cost price and - accordingly - at a significant discount from the market value of comparable houses in the Dungarvan and Abbeyside area. One can qualify for this scheme if you are in need of housing and your income satisfies the income test.

For a single income housecome (before tax) in the last income year multiplied two and a half times must come to less than £62,500. For the two income household to qualify, the gross income (before tax) of the principal (greater) earner in the last income tax year multiplied by two and a half and then adding in the gross income of the subsidiary (lesser) earner in the last income tax year must come to less than £62,500. Those eligible to apply for qualification include people on the Council housing list, a present local authority tenant or tenant purchaser who wishes to buy a house and return their present home to the Council or a tenant of more than one year in a voluntary scheme who wishes to buy a private house and return their present home to that voluntary body. Upon purchase, a long term mortgage provided by the local authority of up to 95% of the sale price of the house and a subsidy arrangement to reduce mortgage payments of purchasers with a gross household income of up to £20,000 in the preceding year can come into equation. So how do you go about planting a hanging basket that will survive??

The first step is to buy a basket. The size of the basket is very important. Small baskets with a diameter of 30cm or less dry out very quickly and cannot contain many plants. A 40cm basket is best for really good displays while remaining not too big or heavy to manage. Large baskets are better used in sunny places and small baskets are best used in cooler, shadier sites where they won't and plant the top. To avoid run-off and dry out.

The basket itself can be made from wire or plastic. Some of the plastic baskets have built-in water reservoirs which can save you a lot of hassle when it come to watering. However, you cannot plant through the sides of these baskets so you should choose trailing plants to cover the sides.

Once you have chosen the basket it is time to think about lining it. The traditional lining is moss, but today there are many modern alternatives made from renewable resources such as coconut fibre, wool, foam or moulded card. Whichever you choose, make sure the lining you buy fits your basket, otherwise the compost will be washed out.

four pedestrian entrances and described the situation where the development would spark the creation of a new square at the back of O'Connell Street.

The development of these features will take a total investment of £300million with the cost of demolishing the existing site estimated at £1.5m. The new roadway which will run through the site will also cost around £1.8m.

This will all take place in Phase One of the development which will take between 14-16 months to build and will incorporate the development of all but 20 acres of the site.

Future developments on the remaining twenty acres may include 40,000sq ft of office space should the proposed decentralisation of a Government Department to the town go ahead. However, Mr. Clancy said that there is no concrete guarantee that this will happen.

Other possible future proposals are housing, offices, a Business or Technology Park; a car sales room or a tourist related facility such as a bowling alley.

Phase one is expected to create a total of 300 new jobs with an estimated 1,000 to be created in the long term if future developments proceed though Mr. Clancy did say that these depend on the economic climate at the time.

Mr. Clancy also said that the Chamber of Commerce had proposed a multi-storey car park, which he did not see as a viable economic option.

He then pointed out the benefits he believes the project will bring to Dungarvan. He said that it would ensure the quality of the towns physical environment, strengthen the town economically and help it compete with other new shopping centres in other towns.

As well, he said, the development would open access to the back of O'Connell St. and TF Meagher St. for new retail opportunities and the development would provide a new avenue linking the N25 to the town centre. A new roundabout may also be built on the N25 to facilitate the extra traffic.

He also assured the meeting that there would be access to Grattan Square, O'Connell St., Davis St. and TF Meagher St. and that the development will be completely screened off from Grattan Square with the planting of a number of trees.

St. was an issue that concerned the Chamber of Commerce but Mr. Clancy eased those fears somewhat by saying "we have to provide access to O'Connell St. or else pay the Dungarvan Urban Council £300,000".

The purpose of the scheme is to fully integrate the development with the rest of the town, Mr. Clancy said. To achieve this 1.5 km of new road plus cycle lanes will be created. He also said that proximity car parking near Grattan Square would be a vital component of integration with the rest of the town.

The meeting was later informed of a letter Cllr. Billy Kyne received from An Bord Pleanala, which was read by Chairman Paddy Gordon.

It was confirmed in the letter that there would be an oral hearing on the proposed development and a decision will be made on September 17th 2001 though no date has yet been set for the hearing.

A question and answer session followed the presentation.

A number of questions were initially raised from the floor about the architecture of the buildings. Included in these questions was why stone from the area couldn't have been used to front the buildings and questioned whether it was distinctive from other new developments in other towns.

The cost of stone was put forward by Clancy Construction proprietor Billy Clancy as too prohibitive who also said that most of the buildings in Grattan Square are plaster finished and painted. He also said that you would not see a development like its kind in any other town.

Chamber of Commerce representatives and other concerned individuals also raised a number of queries about the development.

Michael Regan from The Grove, Abbeyside questioned the style of the buildings saying that they were not in keeping with the present structures in Grattan Square. He questioned why a scale model of the development was not used as he believed this would be more informative to the general public.

Mr. Clancy said the planned buildings will compliment the new houses being built adjacent to it and described the development as being "the modern version of Dungarvan".

He also said that a scale model would have been impractical to use for a development as large as the Glanbia site and said due to the scales used the models would have been far too small.

David Walsh proprietor of an Office Supplies Shop in Lower Main Street was next to raise a question. He said the plans for the Lookout were great but did not materialise. He also asked did Clancy Construction have any commitment from Government agencies for using any part of the site.

Replying to this Mr. Clancy said that the images were taken from a computer programme which accurately details the architecture involved. He did concede however on the second point that they did not have any commitment from a Government agency to locate on the site.

Standing up towards the end of the two and a half-hour meeting the Vice President of the Chamber of Commerce John Walsh asked to approach the bench.

Describing the development as a 'fortress' Mr. Walsh gave the example that under the previous traffic plan someone who wished to buy a pencil in David Walsh's store would have to travel all around the town to get there from the Glanbia site.

However Mr. Clancy described this as 'misinformation' and while saying traffic wasn't the concern of planning he said under the present traffic plans someone could drive very easily through Grattan Square to David Walsh Office Supplies.

Conor Curran, of Curran's Hardware Supplies, was one of the last to speak and informed the meeting that he was in favour of the project.

Mr. Curran said the project had the capacity to be a new SmithKline and Beecham in terms of jobs with 300 to 1,000 new jobs coming into the town.

A number of questions were also raised about the proposed Rolls Royce Ventures Power Plant but Chairman Paddy Gordon ruled these out, as there was no representative of Rolls Royce present and it was not under the remit of the meeting to discuss it.

Patrick Keohan (Sportsman)

Patrick Keohan was the son of Edward and Bridget (nee Connors) Keohan of Shanakill, Ring. He was born on 16 April 1865. He was amongst the Munster winners of the All Ireland Athletic Championships under G.A.A. Rules at Limerick on 16 August 1888. He won the standing hop, step and jump at 13 feet 3 in. and three standing jumps at 35 ft. 11 1/2 in.

T.G. O'Mahony composed a ballad about Keohan's participation in the 'Gaelic Invasion' team of hurlers and athletes to America in 1888. Eighteen athletes were selected to tour. All were championship winners or runners-up. Dan Fraher was selected but was unable to travel. Keohan was aged 24 at the time. The first verse of O'Mahony's ballad is:

My name is Patrick Keohan, my age is twenty four I was born in sweet Dungarvan, not far from famed Tramore.

To join the invasion team on the Winsconsin I set sail For to uphold the honour of dear old Grainuaile.

The good ship 'Winsconsin' from Queensland did sail.
it grieved my aged mother from her darling boy to part.
But you know I was enlisted in that proud young Gaelic

For to uphold the honour of dear old Paddy's land.

Call For No Car Parking On The Days Of The Visit Of The Relics Of St. Theresa

The Tallow Urban Concern Association(TUCA) are leading the call for buses to ferry passengers into Tallow from surrounding parking fields. This Chairman of TUCA Willie Fitzgerald says "is going to be a slow and very important part of the plan fo Tallow during the visit if the concrete structures known as planters are not removed."

However Mr Fitzgerald said "if the planters were removed and the wide square restored, buses could negotiate and turn around very quickly for their return for more visitors. It would be heaven on Earth for all concerned in this biggest ever event in West Waterford".

Mr. Fitzgerald also said that the structures are estimated to keep over 1,000 people from standing and admiring shop and house fronts and also cause concern with children and teenagers climbing up and endangering themselves.

Reasons For Low Incomes In South East Sought In Dail

Local Deputy Austin Deasy TD has asked the Minister for Finance Mr. Charlie McCreevy the reason that earnings in the South East region are 12% below the national average; and if he will make a statement on the matter.

Mr. McCreevy in reply said "this question refers to a report on 'Household Incomes, Regions and Counties 1991-1998' published by the CSO earlier this month. In the report household income includes:

-Wages

-Income from self employment

-transfer payments from the state

It also includes, in conformity with the definition of income in the National Accounts, the imputed value of farm own consumption and income in kind, as well as the imputed rent of owner occupied dwellings (ie the estimated rent that the occupier as a tenant would pay to him/herself as a landlord). Household income on this national accounting basis is therefore not the same as the cash income that accrues to private households.

The report states that disposable income per capita of the South East region was 12% below the State average in 1998 and was the lowest of the eight Regional Authority Areas.

While no detailed analysis has been carried out by my department of the underlying reasons for this disparity in per capita disposable income in different regions shown in the report, it appears that among the factors involved are the structure of the population and the nature of economic activities in each region.



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

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

My son has a disability and uses a wheelchair. I believe there is a parking permit which would allow us to park in places designated for people with disabilities when he is with us. Could you please give the details?

The Disabled Person's Parking Card is available to people with disabilities, including people who are registered blind, whether they are a driver or a passenger. It applies to the person rather than the car. The person can take it with him/her and display it no matter who is driving or in what vehicle he/she is travelling.

The Parking Card allows the person to park in designated areas and also allows parking at parking meters and in disc parking areas free of charge.

If your son is in receipt of a Primary Medical Certificate (exempting you from VAT, VRT and motor tax on your car and fuel) he will automatically qualify for the Parking Card but he must apply for it.

If he does not have the certificate he still may quality. He will have to get a form completed by his doctor and another form completed by the Gardai.

REMORTGAGING

If you are thinking of refinancing your home loan, many factors need to be taken into account. It is important to remember that the loan is secured on the property. The bank or building society has the right to sell the property to get its money back if you default on payments. It is this security, which allows them to charge a lower interest rate. Therefore in return for a cheaper loan you may be putting your home at risk. It is worthwhile also to note that refinancing often incurs substantial legal and administrative costs which may not be obvious at first sight.

If you feel that you cannot resist the offers that are being advertised on TV and newspapers, try to use the money for improvement of a real assets i.e. house extension/improvements. Don't be lured by the promise of big cuts in your monthly outgoings. If you want to remortgage to pay off your debts, credit cards, car loans etc. beware that in the short term you may benefit, but it may have repercussions in the long term. Your car may be worthless in three years time but refinancing could mean that you will be paying for it for many a long year to come.

Remember debt consolidation offers breathing space if your borrowings get out of control but should not be entered into lightly. Remortgaging may solve your immediate financial crisis but car loans and credit card debts etc. may come back again two or three years down the road and in the meantime your home has been used as security for your original debts.

THE 3 STAGES OF COMPOSTING

Composting will save you money in the long term, because you won't have to put your bin out for collection so often and you won't have to buy in garden compost.

Composting consists of 3 stages. Each stage generates suitable conditions for the next stage. The stages are as follows:

DEGRADATION

This phase consists of Microorganisms feedings on the numerous chemical components of Organic Waste. As they feed, they multiply and create the heat energy required to raise the temperature of the decomposing material. Consequently, microorganisms that thrive at these higher temperature take over and continue the process until the material is degraded. Within a home compost bin, this process begins again each time fresh material is added.

CONVERSION

As the temperature within the compost bin begins to drop due to a decrease in microbial activity at the end of Clean. MATURATION

This is the final stage during which temperatures continue to decreases along with microbial activity. These conditions facilitate the arrival of earthworms, insects and mites to complete the process. The activity of these creatures will result in a dark brown mate-

smell known as compost. Often fragments of material such as eggshells and twigs will be present in the finished product. These can be returned to the bin for the composting process again.


DUNGARYAN MALKING

ICMSA SECURES REA AID CHANGES

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairperson of ICMSA's Farm Services & Environment Committee today announced that the Department of Agriculture, Food & Rural Development had agreed to ICMSA proposals and will allow farmers to add additional land to their Area Aid application up to the end of May.

Mr. O'Connor said: "It is a very welcome development and is in line with ICMSA's proposals to the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Rural Development regarding necessary amendments to take account of the Foot and Mouth (FMD) situation. In previous years a farmer was only able to add additional land where that land was in another farmers Area Aid in the same year.

"For 2001, because of the FMD situation, where a farmer acquired additional land after 27 April 2001, the farmer will now be allowed to add this land to his Area Aid application irrespective of whether it is included in another farmers Area Aid for 2001 or not".

Mr. O'Connor advised any farmer who acquired additional land since the end of April to immediately amend his/her Area Aid application in order to get the benefit of Area Aid from the land.

PARLON PRESSES FOR REVIEW OF MOVEMENT PERMIT SYSTEM

Following a meeting Thursday, 17th May with the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh, IFA President Tom Parlon said the Minister has agreed to call a meeting of the Expert Advisory Group again next week to address the within farm movement system which he told the Minister was highly bureaucratic and was not working in practice

The Minister said he was prepared to consider immediate issuing of permits from DVO's and the introduction of fax facilities for farm to

farm movement permits from SWS in Bandon.

The IFA President said he pressed hard for the reopening of livestock marts from June 1st and this issue will be brought before the Special Advisory Committee next week. He said marts are the best and fastest way to return the trade to normality.

FMD Permit Changes HORSES

Permits for the movement of horses or export of horses are no longer required. Permits for the import of horses are still required.

MOVEMENTS TO SLAUGHTER PERMITS

Permits for the transport of all susceptible animals to slaughter plants is now operated by the district veterinary office. Before moving animals to slaughter farmers must first obtain a permit number by telephoning 051

WITHIN FARM (SPLIT HOLDING) MOVEMENT

Permits for the movement of susceptible animals within split holdings (same herd number) will be issued by the District Veterinary Office. A form FMD 10 must be completed and faxed to the D.V.O. fax number 051 855870. Veterinary certification or the tag numbers of individual animals are not required. A permit number will be issued by telephone within 24 hours.

FARM TO FARM MOVEMENT

Permits for the movement of susceptible animals between farms (different herd numbers) is operated by S.W.S. Bandon, who will accept applications by fax or by post. Fax no. is 023 43799.

Teagasc is no longer involved in issuing any permits. However blank permit forms are available from all Teagasc Offices.

SHEEP SHEARING

The current ban on sheep shearing has been extended until May 28th. Farmers may shear their own sheep but may not use a contractor.

Silage is expensive so we must save on costs. How at this stage:

Allow grass to grow to full yield (10 - 12 tons/acre of settled silage). Because cutting costs have increased yield is important. Use the cheapest additive that will preserve your silage

The cheapest additive will cost £8 - £10 per acre, but if it is possible to wilt you could save on this cost. If tedding costs less than the additive cost then wilting must be an option. Or if investment in a tedding machine plus running costs are cheaper than £8/acre then you could justify the purchase of a tedder, if you have time available. Because silage-cutting costs are £60+/acre maybe, you could justify buying a disc mower, which also could double up for topping.

Join up with a neighbouring farmer for the purchase of machinery to save costs. Slurry tanks should be agitated so that it can be spread on the silage fields within 1 - 2 days of cutting.

It is extremely difficult to get opportunities to spread large areas of slurry in the springtime or autumn, due to block grazing. So be ready to empty slurry tanks on 1st cut silage fields.

Apply 1500 - 200 gallons/acre in an even spread. Check your grass for sugars, either through Teagasc or local Co-Op. Will indicate how much additive is required.

Do not cut low. Too much muck will be brought in. Cause good grasses to die out. More weeds (dandelion) will

Cllr. Criticised **Nature Of** Invitation To State Receptio

Waterford County Council Chairman Cllr. Willie McDonnell has said he was "appalled" that a reception in honour of Cardinal Desmond O'Connell was to be hosted by both the Taoiseach and his partner, Celia Larkin.

The reception, which was held hours after the May Meeting of the Waterford County Council, was held in Dublin Castle's state apartments and attended by many councillors from across Ireland.

However, Cllr. McDonnell who described himself as a "very conservative man" said he was "appalled that Celia Larkin's name was on the invitation".

However the remarks were criticised by two Labour Councillors and a Fianna Fail councillor.

Cllr. Billy Kyne and Cllr. Fiachra O'Ceilleachair of Labour and Cllr. James Tobin of Fianna Fail all expressed their disappointment at the Chairman's remarks.

NON- EEA STUDENTS NOWENTITLED TO TAKE **UP CASUAL EMPLOYMENT**

The Minister for Justice, Equality and Law Reform has just announced that non-EEA nationals who have permission to remain in the State as students, will be entitled to take up casual employment (defined as up to 20 hours part time work per week or full time work during vacation periods) for the duration of their permission to remain in the country. The entitlement to take up employment ceases upon the expiry of their permission to remain and their being in casual employment will not in itself entitle them to further permission to remain. It will continue to be a breach of their student conditions to be in full time employment other than during vacation periods.

As the primary purpose of their residence continues to be study a work permit will not be required. Arrangements will be made to amend the stamp currently endorsed in the passports of students so that casual employment is exempted from the general prohibition on employment. Employers should note therefore that a person with a current and valid permission to remain as a student stamp in their passport is entitled to take up



Exams - some approaches severe stress is debilitating. Learning involves experience and practice and in order to gain knowledge you must have a motivated interest in what are



One day your son or daughter walked through the doors of secondary school. Then you blinked and now they are sitting their exams. This year was an extraordinary year for students and parents with industrial action causing disruption and anxiety for all, including teachers.

Many students weigh themselves under chronic stress and much of the anxiety comes from a fear of poor performance and self doubt. Many begin to experience intense pressure by mid May and everything gets out of control which is what stress is. They may spend a lot of time splintered, bolstered by negative thoughts - 'I'll never understand this,' etc .etc. Remember a certain amount of stress is beneficial as it motivates one towards greater effort and achieving goals but

a motivated interest in what are are studying and a sense of confidence that comes from knowing that you know what you know. All learning cultivates an attitude of mindfulness. Mindfulness is about focusing on your present task without thoughts of the future

Self doubt is the result of low self esteem. If you lack confidence it's perhaps because you are knocking yourself down by negative statements - 'stupid' -'not as good as others'. The first step in building self esteem and confidence is to stop criticising yourself. Stop these negative self scripts and make a list of your qualities and successes. Accept yourself as you are. Eliminate negative self messages such as - 'going to fail' or 'Ill never get the points I need'. Negative self scripts and messages have an impact on your self concept. Replace these messages with positive self messages and by doing this you will find that your anxiety becomes diluted.

One of the main reasons many students have retrieval problems at exams is that excessive stress causes them to lose focus and become distracted. Arousal and performance are essential but if a student is over anxious arousal is retarded. When a student becomes stressed the central nervous system triggers a stress adaptation response and this in turn

interferes with and lowers memory performance. Research suggests that chronic stress shrinks the area of the brain that deals with learning. The key to managing your preexam stress is to aim to have as much control over the situation as possible. Every person is the architect of his/her own life so through careful planning, motivation, time management and reflection you can steer yourself to success and self fulfilment. This allows you to change and say - 'can move from the way I am' to 'I am capable of taking the initiative in my life.

Stress management leads to emotional wellness. Relaxation, meditation and visualisation combined with a healthy exercise regime are tools that are invaluable in dealing with stress. Then approach your exams with confidence. Avoid all night cramming - all night cramming blurs the mind with jumbled facts. Stay focussed and challenged and change any distorted or negative self messages such as - 11m going to blow this exam - to - 11m going to relax stay calm and give myself a chance to think more clearly.

When you get your test paper glance over the whole paper as this allows you to find some questions you feel competent to answer. This in turn reduces your stress and makes you feel

more confident. Tackle the what you have to study and re- causes further anxiety. questions that appeal to you and keep in mind the marks value and time allowance for each question. Read the questions carefully and watch for significant words and phrases. Make some short notes as a plan for your answer. Then work methodically.

Conviction is belief in yourself and your ability. Your core beliefs and values are what make you confident because they make you what you are and lead you to your mission. You will become more energised and other strengths will be amplified

STUDY AND REVISION STRATEGIES

The following pointers should help you stay in control during those weeks and days before the exams. When you learn goal setting skills you develop success habits and a clear focus. These goals lead to the defined objective. I encourage students to ask themselves what is the purpose of this particular piece of study - what are the priorities - and to set and stick to an agenda. By taking control students can prioritise and make lists of what they have to do. By reviewing, students can test themselves and try to recall information studied.

- · Get up early. For most of us early morning is the time when concentration is best.
- Have an overall plan of

- Make a plan of study the night before for each day. Even if you don't get through everything it helps you to focus on your goals.
- Control any distractions that waste time - don't spend unnecessary time on the phone. watching T.V. etc.
- Make summaries or graphs or 'mind maps' of what you are studying. Converting your knowledge into visual images will help you retain it.
- Take some exercise every day. A good physical exercise program sharpens the mind.
- Eat a healthy diet. Eating lots of fresh fruits and vegetables and avoiding fast foods or 'fry ups' reduces stress. It is important to remember not to go into exams fasting as that

- If you get bored or tired when studying stop for a while because staying locked in this mode could lead to non-productive study time. Students may think they don't have the time to take breaks in their study but if stress takes over it dulls the concentration, inhibits short term memory and causes mental exhaustion.
- Tension causes shallow quick breathing. To offset this do some deep breathing. Simply take in a deep breath. Hold it for a few seconds. Then as you breathe out say 'RELAX'. Keep doing this until your breathing returns to normal. You can even do this in the

In 1868, statistics point to a combined total of two thousand, six hundred people working in cotton and linen plants in the two towns. Quakers were noted for treating their employees well and as many workers were of a young age, a school was established in Carrick-On-Suir to look after their education. In Carrick-On-Suir, the old tannery site was the Malcolmson factory where flax arrived at the nearby railway line to be weaved into linen. The work force was mainly female. In the middle of the 19th century, Portlaw was a thriving town and a prominent publication of the period listed it as having the best accommodation for tourists in Ireland. The standing of the Malcolmson family can be measured from the fact that the company in Portlaw issued to their workers, tokens that were accepted by business premises in Waterford/Tipperary area as legal tender. The Malcolmsons constructed many outstanding houses in the South East such as the Woodlock House in Portlaw and the original building which is now the Minella Hotel across the river from Clonmel. In 1870 the Malcolmson companies had total assets of £1.5 million and amazingly, some six years later the family applied for bank-

There are many theories as to what happened in such a short space of time but the most likely answer is that the global nature of their many and diverse businesses suffered greatly during and in the aftermath of the American Civil War. Liam Hogan on behalf of the Heritage Centre committee thanked Tom Hunt for his most interesting lecture and presented him with a piece of Tipperary Crystal. LATE MR. PATRICK WATCHORN

It is with deep regret we pen the death of Mr. Patrick (Paddy) Watchorn, Anne Street, Clonmel. A founder member in 1963 of the Clonmel Branch of the Credit Union, he occupied every officer position in the intervening years. He was highly respected and always warmly welcomed by chapters throughout the country who valued his vast knowledge and wisdom, the benefits of which he unstintingly passed on. He was well known and popular in Credit Union circles everywhere, twice president of the league board of which he was a member for eighteen years, he represented Ireland at World Conferences on a number of occasions in such countries as Australia, Kenya, America. Paddy Watchorn and Credit Unions were virtually synonymous; the man and the organisation having become inextricably linked. Totally committed to promoting the principles of that cooperatives association. Paddy contributed much to its development at home and abroad. Nobody of course will miss him more than his wife Maureen and family, his grandchildren and great grandchildren all of whom loved him dearly. His death is all the more poignant as his daughter Elizabeth who recently attended his funeral died herself unexpectedly a week later. The last of a generation Paddy, a native of Carlow was one of a family of two boys. An outstanding footballer, he won a number of medals in his home county. In 1939 he married Maureen Bergin and they had a family of seven, three girls and four boys. He was a member of the LDF during the emergency and he subsequently joined the newly formed FCA. He was a member of the first group of FCA officers to be commissioned in 1946. He was a maintenance engineer with Bulmers working for a time at the Rope Walk and at Dowds Lane. Continuing his involvement with the FCA he enjoyed army life revelling in the camaraderie and the manoeuvres, particularly in the mountains, as he loved the outdoors. Obliged to retire from the FCA due to age requirements some twenty eight years ago. He retired from Bulmers after twenty seven years, he joined Probus in Clonmel and was their first President. He was also a member of the Historical and Archaeological Society. From pitch and putt he joined the Golf Club. He often recalled the good times he had with his wife as they drove around the country and they were looking forward to their sixty second wedding anniversary later this year, but the good Lord had other plans. His remains were removed to St. Mary's Parish Church, Irishtown where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. James Denmead C.C. On the following morning requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his gentle soul, the celebrant was Rev. Fr. James Denmead C.C. St. Mary's, Clonmel. His coffin was draped in the Credit Union Flag and a guard of honour was provided on both occasions by former colleagues from the Credit Union in a fond farewell to a loyal member of a true friend. The funeral took place to St. Patrick's Cemetery, Clonmel where he was laid to rest. Fr. Denmead C.C. officiated at the graveside and the President of the Irish League of Credit Unions gave an oration a fitting tribute to a man who devoted so much of his life to promoting the aims of Credit Unions. 'YE OLDE TROOP

By Seamus O'Brien

The first troop kettle was purchased sometime before the first troop camp at Colligan in 1931. It cost in the region of three shillings and the hardware merchant who made the sale assured us that it was a utensil of exceptional quality and that it would give good service. It's not mentioned in the Guinness Book of Records, but if justice were done, then our first official kettle, should have been given some recognition somewhere.

During its lifetime, it endured more hardship and boiled more water than most other kettles of its size and age. It was well travelled as it served at all the summer and weekend camps in the Thirties and early Forties and it was used as a communal utensil on hikes. I have seen photos of it sitting on an open fire in such places as Coumshingaun, Deelish, Cruachaun, Glendine, Stradbally, Colligan and other places. In campsites in Killarney, Limerick, Rathdrum, Blackrock, Glngarriff, Cahir, Kenmare, The Eucharistic Congress in Dublin and other places. I was the one who spent time cleaning and shining the kettle. I have seen its bottom beaten by a wooden spoon to simulate drum accompaniment to mouth-organ solos at camp fires. I could name Scouts who spoke in very unfriendly terms to the kettle, when it was slow "to come to the boil". In later years, when a Primus stove became part of the troop equipment, the kettle could produce six pints of boiling water in exactly eight minutes!

Every member of the troop loved and revered our kettle and whenever it was taken on a hike, it was part of the hike plan that one of the hikers would be responsible for its safekeeping on its outward journey and another hiker would be appointed to bring it safely back.

One such occasion was the hike to Waterford City for the Easter Sunday Commemoration Ceremonies in 1939. About a dozen Scouts attended and Christy Power took charge of the kettle. I was the kettle minder on the return journey.

About twenty Scouts were ready at the Den to leave on a cycling hike to Stradbally on the following day (Easter Monday), when it was discovered that the kettle was missing. Consternation and a hurried investigation ensued and then the discovery was made that it had been left on the bank of a stream just below Kilmeaden - about twenty four miles away and the spot where the returning hikers had rested and were "watered" on the previous evening. "What a rotten thing to do to an item of equipment that had served the troop so faithfully for almost a decade. Within minutes of the discovery Power and I were dispatched in all haste back to Kilmeaden and told not to come back without 'you know what'.

On the way down we visited E.J. Conway or "Foxy" as he was popularly known in the troop at the time. At his place of work at Kilmacthomas, "Foxy" allowed us to boil tea and cook the two eggs we had taken as rations. He expressed the hope that the journey would be successful and an opinion of what would happen to us if it wasn't.

About one o'clock, Kilmeaden was reached and there, all alone and forlorn was the troop kettle sitting where it had been left on the bank of the stream. What a relief! I bet if it could talk it would have spouted a few nice words on the occasion. MORE NEXT WEEK

Another free side show was Beat the Buzzer sometimes called Steady Hand. We had U.F.O. Knockdown, a miniature skittle game, talking mouse where the competitor had to guide the battery operated mouse through the hole in 30 seconds. Find the Softie, one had to place their name on a grid and there was just one lucky square on the grid. Niamh Walsh was the winner here. Guess the number of Pennies in the jar attracted as much attention as always and there were 3 winners. The drink stall ensured all and Sunday could wash down the hot dogs and hamburgers.

THE MIDDLE AGES

The parish of Kilrush, which was 567 ha in extent, was considered separate from that of Dungarvan. It is interesting to find that in 1292 the rector of Kilmeaden released the townland of Mapstown in the parish to Cecily de Hortsel. The rector was Roger de la Hay, related to Sir Walter de la Hay, a high officer of the crown in Ireland. The latter dealt with the Ricardi of Lucca in Italy who bought wool in Ireland each year and imported it into their own country. However, these merchants never came to the local district because there was no abbey there to supply the quantities of wool that they required. There is no explanation or hint as to how Roger de la Hay had held this land in Mapstown.



National Marathon To Town

If you haven't heard about it by now, then turn the page because tá a fhios ag gach mac mathair agus íníon athair that the most important road race in the history of local athletics - The National Marathon Championship - will be held in Dungarvan this Sunday May 27th. The race begins at Duckspool, Abbeyside at 11 am and will continue throughout the day with the first runner finishing again at Duckspool at 1.24 pm exactly!

of Pheidippides (some say his surname was Veale), from the Battle of Marathon to Athens all of 3,000 years ago, the National Marathon will be held in Dungarvan this Sunday. The story goes, Don that when he arrived with news of victory he collapsed having only the breath to utter, "Conquer, We Rejoice" which has been repeated over the years by thousands who have been delighted to finish this daunting 26.2 miles run.

The marathon distance is 26 miles 385 yards. This peculiar distance was established at the 1908 London Olympics. Most runners will tell you that 20 miles is more of a natural distance and doesn't present the problems that the extra 6.2 miles does during which imaginary walls bang off runners and ambulances and first aid personnel suddenly appear on the scene. One recalls a local run-Marathon, who, not feeling well, boarded an ambulance at the 24 miles stage. The ambu-

Thanks to the legendary run mark to pick up another casualty. Our runner, now feeling slightly better, got back on track and finished the route the only athlete to ever run 27.2 miles in the Dublin marathon and in a new P.B. at that!

Going back to the 1908 Olympics, an original course of exactly 26 miles from the lawns of Windsor Castle to the entrance of White City Stadium was selected. An extra 385 yards was subsequently added so that the race could finish directly opposite the Royal Box on the express wishes of the Royal family. A similar request by Bro. Lennon so that Sunday's race could finish outside his window in Duckspool House was refused at a recent committee meeting!

RACE **ORGANISATION**

No report of Sunday's race would be accurate without mention of the trojan work of race organiser James Veale behind ner in the 1985 Dublin the scenes, a place where he prefers to operate from. When news broke that West Waterford A.C. would be hosting the Nalance went back to the 23 mile tional Marathon, James enthusi-

astically took on the role of race organiser and he has done a truly professional job and he has given this championship the status and attention that it deserves. No stone has been left unturned by James and his willing band of helpers and indeed West Waterford A.C. are very grateful to everybody who have and will be assisting Sunday's race.

The first task was to select a course and here James chose the flattest and fairest one available. As there was no real practical backing from the AAI in staging a fixture such as this local, public bodies Waterford County Council, Dungarvan Urban and District Council, Waterford Crystal, Waterford and Dungarvan Tourism Board and property advisors Sherry Fitzgerald Reynolds gave the organisers a financial boost which has made Sunday's run a very worthwhile event. Because of this backing the event will feature valuable Waterford Crystal prizes for the winners and among other things a finishing medal, an Asics sports watch and a souvenir T-shirt for everybody who finishes the run. Post race refreshments will be provided by the West Waterford A.C. "kitchen staff" at St. Augustine's whose facilities are once again being generously made available by the college. At this stage between one hundred and one hundred and thirty participants are expected to toe the line on Sunday and the club are satisfied that the organisation is now in place to properly stage this event.

RACE COURSE

In brief, the race will start at Duckspool at 11 am and finish there from shortly after 1 pm onwards to 5 pm. In between the route will take in a trip around Ballinroad and Ballinacourty, and to the N25 via Duckspool and a lap of the Whitechurch circuit back to Duckspool via the Cappoquin and Waterford roads. Detailed route is included in feature on pages 50 and 51

West Waterford Athletic News

Much of the history of the National Marathon is contained on the Lord Wakefield trophy, one of the oldest and finest trophies in Irish athletics dating back to 1947 and presented to the winner of the 'National' each year. Interesting names inscribed on the base include Noel Henry, one of the pioneers of long distance running in Ireland, Mick Molloy from Oughterard in Galway, a three times winner in 1966, 68 and 69 who was also an early Ultra distance runner, the popular and economic Cork runner Dick Hodgins and one of Ireland's past and present most travelled Irish athletic supporters Harry Gorman. When John Treacy won the World Cross Country Championship in 1979 the then veteran Donegal runner Danny McDaid enjoyed his finest hour when finishing 11th. The same Danny won the National Marathon crown on four occasions - 1970, 74, 76 and 83. Most wins in the National belongs to Raheny's Dick Hooper. By the age of twenty six he had won four titles, 1978, 1980, 81, and 82 and he won his fifth title at 41 years of age in 1998. He may not be finished yet as he is entered in Sunday's race in the home of running three months short of his 45th birthday.

We regret any inconvenience caused.



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

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
