

A dark cloud of gloom descended on Dungarvan with the announcement of the

loss of 104 jobs at the successful, drug and heath care product factory, Stafford-Miller, on Thursday last.

The main casualty of the job losses will be those involved in the manufacture of toothpaste as a result of the phased transfer of its renowned Sensodine brand, to a plant in Maidenhead, England.

The giant, English owned, multi-national Glaxo-SmithKline, is currently seeking the voluntary redundancy of some of the

plants workers as it will have transferred the toothpaste operations completely by the summer of 2002.

Waterford County Council have revealed that dumping at Dungarvan landfill may

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have to stop from the 11th of July this year. This follows a draft licence received by the Council from the Environmental Protection Agency.

The proposed licence states that waste other than items used for the landscaping and restoration of the landfill will be prohibited from July. The items which the licence permits to be taken into the landfill are clay, topsoil and rubble. These materials will be allowed to be used for a period of two years. However the licence states that the dumping of any other form of waste will be prohibited.

Proposal To Erect Statue To Mark The Birthplace Of St. Cathaldus

It was proposed by Cllr. Tom Higgins that following the great welcome the councillors received when they visited Taranto in Italy that a statue to commemorate St. Cathaldus in either Dungarvan or Ballinameela be erected.

The councillor said that he had never realised how popular and venerated the Saint is in Southern Italy until the visit. He said by placing a statue in West Waterford the links between the area and Taranto would increase.

He also suggested that a statue of some magnitude would draw more Italian tourists into the area.

Cllr. James Tobin supported the idea of a statue but said the decision of where it would be placed should be decided by a sub-committee involving people from Ballinameela, Dungarvan and council officials. He stated







"Discriminatory" Scheme Claimed To Be Driving People From Rural Areas

The Local Improvement Scheme, which provides grant assistance for the improvement of small roads in rural areas, was deemed discriminatory, unfair and part of an ongoing drive to force people from rural areas by Fine Gael Councillor Mary Green.

These sentiments came after the terms of the Scheme, which is funded to the tune of £120,000 by the Department of the Environment, were revealed at the June meeting of the Waterford County Council.

This funding will involve 10-25% payment by the applicant with the Department of Environment footing the rest of the costs involved in the road improvements.

However it was the conditions which the Department of Environment laid down this year that was a source of contention. Previously all that was necessary was that two holdings be situated on the road in question but now it is stipulated that these holdings must both be farm units.

In response to these terms Cllr. Greene went so far as to say that the Department of Environment are "going out of their way to make people ineligible to qualify for the scheme".

The size of the allocation was also called into question with only a small percentage of applications being afforded grant aid though the majority of these applications met all the terms necessary. It was claimed by Cllr. Greene that at least £600,000 was required to properly implement the Local Improvement Scheme.

In one of the strongest criticisms of the meeting Cappoquin Councillor Nora Flynn claimed that there is "a move to keep people from living in rural Ireland as the Government want to cut down on services to rural communi-

ties"

The councillor asked every County Councillor to "get up and fight the movement towards urban centres".

She said that the Council should put a motion to the Government to prevent this discrimination.

Cllr. Betty Twomey agreed with the earlier statements from her fellow councillors. She described the situation where groups of isolated houses were serviced by roads which are in "an awful state."

"Some of these dwellers are willing to contribute to the up-keep of the roads but they are not eligible for the Department of the Environment grants", the councillor said. She believes that the Scheme should be available to all in these situations.

Cllr. Tom Higgins said he was surprised that the Scheme did not cater for lone farmers and also felt the scheme to be discriminatory.

"If you want to keep people living on these roads." the councillor said "I don't see why you have to stipulate that two or more land owners have to live there".

Cllr. Higgins asked was there anything that could be done to improve the scheme as he was aware of some "horror cases."

Cllr. Ciarán O Riain also urged that the Local Improvement Scheme be changed completely. The long serving councillor said he had been listening to the same complaints about the lack of funding

down through the years but nothing had been done.

Cllr. O Riain said the Council must take a stand and ask the Department of the Environment to change the present system.

However Cllr. Tom Cunningham said that the allocation given to the Local Improvement Scheme was up from £80,000 last year which he described as a significant increase in funding.

The Kilmacthomas representative said that the councillors should thank the Government for the increased allocation.

In response the County Engineer said that the rules for those that were eligible for the improvement of their roads were tightened up this year. He said he did not know why they were changed but Waterford County Council would appeal to the Department of the Environment.

The County Manager Donal Connolly said that the Council would make a case to the Department for extra money. He said it was always intended that the scheme would cater for two or more land owners living on a road so private avenues wouldn't get funding.

However he said that there is room to improve the scheme and make it open to house owners as well as land owners.

Despite the criticisms levelled against it, the scheme was adopted by the Council, having been proposed by Cllr. Paudie Coffey and seconded by Cllr. Patrick Leahy.

THE WAY WE LIVE: SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

There are many different ways of communicating in the modern world. People within speaking distance use words and gestures. But what about telecommunications getting a message to someone far away? In the past, flags and smoke signals were used to pass information over large distances.

Today we can use the telephone. It is an instant way to communicate, and has a microphone that converts sound into electrical signals.

Television and radio are other ways to communicate. Television, radio and telephone signals pass along metal wires of fibre-optic cables.

Printing — in books, magazines, newspapers and letters - is another way of communicating. Today, the written word can be sent instantly across the world from computer to computer. The internet is a vast, world-wide network that allows people on opposite sides of the globe to exchange information between their comput-

Information — words, sounds and pictures — must be digitised before it can be stored, transmitted or received by computer in the near future, most communication will be digital, allowing even easier exchange of information.



Alexander Graham Bell

(1847 - 1922)

In March 1876, Scottish inventor Alexander Graham Bell sent the world's first telephone message to his assistant, Thomas Watson: 'Mr. Watson, come here, I want you!' Bell was calling for help to Watson in the next room at his workshops in Boston, Mass., U.S.A.

Other researchers including Thomas Edison were trying to develop the telephone, and had some success. However, Bell became famous because he was the first to apply for a patent (a document that claims an invention as yours).


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Satellites are used for many different purposes. Comsats (communication satellites) allow us to make telephone calls to people far away, or see television pictures made in other countries.

The signals from the ground are sent up to a satellite and bounced back down to earth to receiving 'dishes.' These collect the signals, and pass them to your telephone or television set. Other satellites send information down to earth, about weather, about other countries and about space itself.

Dungarvan Bids To Become Host Town For 2003 Special Olympics

A briefing session, with the purpose of heightening awareness about Dungarvan's bid to become a host town for the athletes of the Special Olympics, was held in the Bank of Ireland on Tuesday last.

The 11th Special Olympics World summer Games will be held in Ireland in June 2003 and will be the first time this major event will be held outside the United States. The Games, which will be the largest sporting occasion of 2003, will feature 7,000 athletes and 2,000 members of the media. Towns from all over the country have been invited to apply to host some of the athletes.

The Host Town Programme is one of the most important elements of the Games, as communities from around the island invite our international visitors to avail of good old-fashioned hospitality.

Should Dungarvan's application succeed, this would almost certainly give it a chance to show its facilities and the character of its people to a world-wide audience, as well as becoming an inte-

gral part of the Special Olympics itself.

In the Host Town a number of activities will take place that will ensure the athletes and the community benefit from an international exchange. As part of this integration it is planned that the athletes will meet with communities and experience the towns hospitality.

They will also be given an opportunity to practice their sports prior to the start of the official competition. The arrival of the athletes will also help to promote public awareness about people with a learning disability.

A number of requirements have also been set out which the town must comply with to become a host town. Included in these are its capacity to accommodate the athletes, language assistance, a police presence, medical facilities, and a

centre which would cater for the athletes requirements.

Mr. Jack Stephenson of the Bank of Ireland, stated that Dungarvan has the majority of these facilities in place already and with Carriglea Centre in close proximity to the town, it may have a significant advantage over other such applicants.

The town also has a number of sporting facilities with St. Augustians College already renowned nationally in this regard. Accommodation, particularly for small to medium size countries, should also pose little or no difficulties with the participation rates from countries ranging from 6 to 650.

A committee charged with overseeing Dungarvan's application for host town status was also set up on the night. This committee will comprise of Dungarvan Urban Councillors Damien



Dillon and Michael O'Riordan, the Youth Resource Centres Triona Foley, Carriglea's Tom Scanlon, the Bank of Ireland's Jack Stephenson, Town Clerk Brian White and Waterford County Councils Tom Keith.

A public meeting will later be called after the outcome of the Dungarvan's application is known and this will set in place the frameworks involved in hosting the athletes.



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Successful Launch Of Pilot Pottery Project At Cappoquin Boys' School

An exhibition of Pottery in the Boys' School on Thursday June 14th marked the end of a very successful six-week Pilot Pottery project conducted by Cora Cummins, Potter, Cappoquin and funded by The Arts Office of Waterford Co Council.

Speaking at the opening of the Exhibition, Margaret Fleming, Arts Officer, Waterford Co Council paid tribute to School Principal Ms Anne Devine who had approached her with the idea. 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




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Tragedy Strikes Local Girl In Brazil

News of the death of popular local girl, Julie Curran, 26, has shocked and saddened the entire community in Dungarvan and surrounding areas following the discovery of her body in Brazil.

Julie was celebrating her recent qualification as a pharmacist by taking a two month holiday in South America. Her last stop, before she was to return home, took her to one of the world's most acclaimed beauty spots, Ilha Grande, the Great Island, some 70 miles south of Rio, where the tragedy was ultimately to occur.

It is understood that Julie was not robbed of her money though other items including a walkman, a camera and her John have flown out to Brazil

passport were taken.

Following the discovery of Julie's body by tourists, her remains were taken to Angras Dos Reis hospital where an autopsy was carried out. The Brazilian authorities are now involved in a full scale murder investigation and a man is understood to have been taken in for questioning. The man at the centre of the investigation is a 23 year old Brazilian who worked as a tour guide. The guide has confessed to the murder.

There is still no official word as to when Julie's body will be flown home. That decision will be taken by the Brazilian police. Two of Julie's brothers Michael and spectively.

Julie, herself, was educated at the local Mercy Convent and was regarded as a brilliant and exceptionally gifted student. She pursued pharmacy as a profession and qualified for one of the most prestigious academic courses in Ireland, at Trinity College Dublin. She was due home last Thursday and was to have started work on Monday of this week, at Kelly's Pharmacy owned by her aunt, Mairead Kelly, the Causeway, Abbeyside.



New Lobby Group Formed In Ring/ **Old Parish** Gaelthacht

A new community group has been formed in the Ring/Old Parish area called Gaeltacht i mBaol (Gaeltacht in Danger) . It has come about in response to the planned proposal by Waterford County Council to allow up to five housing estates to be built in Ring and the 'funnelling' of people into a small town type development in Old Parish. These developments are ominous and will undoubtedly spell the end of the Gaeltacht status of this area.

It is the intention of Gaeltacht i mBaol to remind Waterford County Council that it has obligations under the Planning Act 2000 to care for to plan the Gaeltacht in a way which will ensure its survival. The County Council receives, on an ongoing basis, huge sums of money from the Department of Arts, Heritage, Culture, Gaeltacht & the Islands, from Udaras na Gaeltachta and other such bodies towards the development of the Gaeltacht. According to the group it would appear that the County Council are willing to jeopardise this assistance by taking decisions that will prove hugely harmful to the Gaeltacht.

There are at the moment a number of thriving industries in the Ring/Old Parish area, all of which are heavily funded by Udaras na Gaeltachta. People living in the Gaeltacht get assistance towards buying boats, equipment for small businesses, grants for using Irish as their family language, not to mention the numerous community initiatives which are supported because of its Gaeltacht status. Much of its tourism industry is based on the Irish language.

The minister Sile de Valera TD has ordered a review of all the Gaeltacht areas and this is currently in progress. If Waterford County Council continues to press ahead with its destructive policy in the smallest of all Gaeltachtai which is under its care, responsibility will lie with them alone for its death, according to the group.





Tallow Rejoiced In Relics Of Therese

Last weekend, the Sacred Relics of St. Therese visited the Carmelite Monastery in Tallow amid great joy and rejoicing. The people of the West Waterford town had pulled out all the stops and in company with the County Council, had the streets and environs looking resplendant and fit for any visiting dignitary.

The Monastery was appropriately decorated with flags, bunting and rosettes and the gates were tastefully decorated with the name of the Saint in fresh flowers. There were fresh roses everywhere to welcome the modern day saint who is also known as The Little Flower. These arrangements had been made by the combined efforts of the Flower Clubs of West Waterford.

The predicted tens of thousands of people arrived through the course of the forty six hours of the visit and best estimates of the numbers through suggest that as many as forty thousand entered the Monastery gates between Saturday morning and Monday afternoon and venerated the Relics.

After an emotion filled Ceremony of Departure of Monday morning, Prioress of the Monastery, Mother Joseph said that the Sisters were deeply moved by the numbers who had come to visit and who had prayed and venerated so solemnly at their Monastery. There was little more they could have hoped for from the visit, she said and thanked everyone who had worked so tirelessly to see that all arrangements were in place.

'We will always treasure the memory of the visit of our Saint,' said Mother Joseph, 'and remember the

the people of Tallow, who assisted us in making the extensive arrangements necessary for such a large and important event.

'We pray that the spirit of St Therese will be with our people and that she may bless them and their families each day of their lives. May they know that they have a true friend close to them always.

Despite a last minute announcement of a delay of the arrival time, there was a large crowd at Tallowbridge on Saturday afternoon. eager to welcome the Saint and accompany her to the Monastery. The Procession was led by a colour party drawn from secondary school students of the area. who carried a magnificent County Banner, with pictures of St. Therese, followed by the Tricolour as well as the flags of Normandy (home of the Saint) and the parish of Tallow

Dungarvan Brass Band played Sacred music appropriate to the event and they were followed by the Chairman and members of the County Council, Dungarvan Urban District Council and Lismore Town Commissioners, as well as Co. Manager, Mr. Donal Connolly and other senior officials. Members of CBSI, Tallow Schoolchildren, a large party of First Communicants and young dancers from the locality also took part.

A large body of clergy was led by Most Rev. William Lee, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore and providing a quard of honour for the Reliquary in its specially converted vehicle were the Carmelite Sisters led by Prioress. Mother Joseph and Sr. Patrice who had co-ordinated the extensive arrangements for the visit.

On arrival at the Monastery a bearer party drawn from the Military Police of the 1st Southern Brigade, under the command of Capt. Sean Dunne brought the 400 pound Reliquary to its place of honour in front of the Altar, where the Sisters were first to ven-

The Monastery grounds had been specially set up in corrals to accommodate the anticipated crowds and the three thousand or so who were present at the time had a clear view of the specially constructed altar.

A group of twenty Tallow girls under the tuition of Sacred Dance Teacher, Betty Lynch added a touch of pageantry and colour as they gracefully strewed petals before the Reliquary in the Monastery grounds. A concelebrated Mass of Thanksgiving followed, at which the Chief Celebrant was Bishop Lee and the homily was given by Fr. Eu-







gene McCaffrey.

Throughout the weekend, a steady stream of the faithfui came to visit and venerate the Relics of the Saint, even through the course of the two nights of the visit. Three priests were available continually for reconciliation throughout the visit and many availed of the opportunity. Comprehensive security and traffic control for the visit was provided by the Gardai under the direction of Insp. Con Cadogan and Sergts. Gerry Moloney and Pat Norris. They were assisted by Civil Defence under CDO Colm Bannon and a large body of Stewards drawn from the locality. Catering was provided by a committee of local women. A medical centre was maintained obver the weekend by the Doctors and Nurses of the area.

On Saturday night there was an event specially for the youth of the area which was attended by up to 1,500 young people. The comprehensive programme was coordinated by Rev. Martin Keogh, C.C. Abbeyside and a committee drawn from second level schools and youth groups of the area. This in-

cluded the Pageant A Shower of Roses' as well as music singing and drama from a combined choir under the direction of Ms. Deirdre Collender. The programme culminated in a Concelebrated Mass at dawn which was a very moving and spiritual experience.

On Sunday, the Feast of Corpus Christi, there was a Service of Intercession for the Sick and Infirm with anointing and Blessing with

the Blessed Sacrament. This was followed at 5 pm by a Family Mass at which the largest congregation of the weekend assembled.

Prior to departure on Monday morning, almost two thousand primary schoolchildren of West Waterford gathered for a special Mass celebrated by Fr. Willie Purcell, St. Canice's, Kilkenny. The Reliquary was then taken to the front of the Monastery where a commemorative sculpture in the form of a fishing boat on the crest of a wave was blessed and dedicated and will stand as s reminder of one of the most sgnificant events in the life of the Monastery and the town of Tallow.A lone lady piper from Castlelyons Pipe Band led a final procession through the town to the Parish Church and as the Reliquary, escorted by the Carmelite Sisters, made their way once more to the Monastery, they were loudly applauded by the children and also by the townspeople who were appreciative of the presence of the Saint in their streets.

There were some emotional

moments as the Reliquary departed from the Monastery gate on its jour ney to Limerick, but un doubtedly a sense of happiness and achievement at the success of the visit. Tallow resident and Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. William McDonnell paid tribute to everyone who had played a part in the planning of the weekend visit. 'The sisters are deserving of our every support," he said, 'and it has been a pleasure for every one to be part of this his toric occasion. The Committee were superb, he continued and I must also

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acknowledge and thank the part played by The Co. Manager and Senior Engl neering staff of the Council. Area Engineer, Ms. Ann Kiely, together with local Overseers Ger Beecher and Michael Bennett and their staffs for the huge efforts they made. ICMSA NEWS

EWE PREMIUM PAYMENT

The Ewe premium payment should be made immediately according to ICMSA. Under the Protocol For Direct Payments agreed in July 2000, the Department of Agriculture, Food & Rural Development agreed to pay the 2001 Ewe Premium to all eligible applicants within two weeks of publication of the relevant regulation. Given that the said regulation was published on 1 June 2001, ICMSA are calling on all payments to be made without delay

Mr. T. J. Nally, Chairperson of ICMSA's Sheep Committee said "I am calling on the Minister for Agriculture. Food & Rural Development to immediately pay the first instalment of the 2001 Ewe Premium to farmers. This was agreed and should now be adhered to.'

"Due to the Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) crisis continuing since February, this payment may represent the first cheque that many sheep farmers will have received this year and therefore is critical. Any delay in payment is unacceptable", Mr. Nelly con-





DAIRYING

GROW MORE GRASS

Most dairy farmers, except those in calf-to-beef are still overstocked. Consequently, they will be short of winter feed as a result of more grazing acres being used. It is, therefore, essential to grow more grass. How? We must make sure not to engage in practices that result in less grass growing.

How Could We Grow Less Grass? — Very short rotations. (In a 21-day rotation, grass doubles in the last 7 days). Grazing too tight (no less than 6cms). Using too little Nitrogen. Use 25-35 units per acre, as every 54p spent on N gives £6-£8's more milk and meat. Missing out on Nitrogen after a grazing can be a disaster – reduce the rate of N if you appear to have too much grass now. Not applying Sulphur (use 15-20 units) on light soils results in 15-40% less grass on those farms. Animals spending 3-4 days or longer (happens with cattle and heifers) in fields or paddocks will result in over 20% less grass in 21 days time because the regrowths will have been eaten. Consequently, the rotation will have increased to 27+ days. Cutting or topping reduces the amount of grass growing. If you have to top, be careful not to top too low, too frequently or too many paddocks at the same time. Finally, to grow more aftergrass, apply 40-60 units per acre of Nitrogen after 1st cut.

SHEEP

Compared to dipping using a pour-on to control blowfly requires less labour and the majority have a much shorter withdrawal period. However, be mindful that the incidences of lice infestations have increased in recent years. If using an injectable in the autumn to control sheep scab it may be worthwhile using a pouron that also controls lice. The alternative is to dip periodically.

Lamb growth rate invariably drops in the month pre-weaning ... mainly due to a decline in ewe milk yield and a deterioration in pasture quality. This drop can be minimised by not allowing sward height to fall below 6 cms in June.

To maintain good growth rates after weaning sward height should be less than 7-8cms. Make use of aftergrass in this period. On an all-sheep farm it is difficult to have sufficient aftergrass. Another option....select one or two fields that contain the highest clover level and graze these tightly in early June (preferably with dry sheep) and use these in addition to aftergrass post weaning.

Feeding meals will improve lamb growth rate. Each 5kg fed will increase liveweight by about 1kg. An option to reduce costs....at weaning split lambs into heavy and light groups and feed meals to light group. Having lambs accustomed to meals pre-weaning reduces weaning stress and minimises the loss in growth rate. In deficient areas give a cobalt dose at the 10 week worm dose. An alternative ... if lambs are fed meal, supplement with a suit-

There is little advantage in keeping lambs on the ewes for more than 12-13 weeks. If grass is scarce wean earlier ... 10-11 weeks. If lambs are on creep and consuming 250g/day it is possible to

wean at 8 weeks and suffer no loss in thrive. CATTLE

365 Day Calving Interval - Good Management Needed — The number of days between one calving and the next is the calving interval. To maintain a regular

calving season and compact calving, the average calving interval for the herd should be about 365 days. Otherwise the calving season will spread out over most of the year or there will have to be a high degree of culling of late calvers.

How many 365 day calvers have you got in your herd? Without keeping breeding records you cannot know for sure but the 400 day model is far too common - this animal could be costing up to £50 in lost profit if you are selling weanlings.

With continental sire breeds on continental cows, a gestation period (conception to calving) of 290 days is quite common. This means that there is only an average of 75 days (365 - 290) from calving to the next conception.

Teagasc Research at Belclare and Athenry has identified two factors that have a major influence on the interval between calving and first heat.

- Body condition score at calving
- The suckling effect (cow/calf interaction)

BODY CONDITION

When thin cows (body condition score of 1.75 at calving) were compared to cows in good condition (body condition score of 2.50 and 3.50), the thin cows took an average 12 to 16 days longer to reach first heat than the cows in good condition.

The thin cows were on average 71 days calved before showing first heat. Allowing for conception rates of 60 per cent, a 365 day calving interval cannot be maintained in a stable herd of cows at condition score of less than 2.0 at calving.

SUCKLING EFFECT

The presence of the calf with the cow also delays onset of first heat. The effect is more pronounced on thin cows. Where calves were separated from cows, after day 30 post calving, and only allowed suckle once per day, thin cows showed heat 21 days earlier than where calves were let run with the cows. Separation of calves from cows in good condition produced a response of just 10 days earlier heat onset.

If cows were thin at calving and are calved for 40 days or more the separation of calves and once or twice per day suckling should bring on heat in these cows within two to three weeks.



Deputy Deasy said "the Stafford-Miller operation has been one of the success stories in West Waterford, and following the closure of Waterford Foods, this loss creates a serious employment problem in the area."

The news came as another body blow to the economy of the town, with Glanbia's decision to shut up shop in Dungarvan, still fresh in people's minds. The closure of the former Waterford Foods plant was also described as asset stripping at that time.

The SmithKline facility will not be affected by the redundancies and will continue in its manufacture of a wide range of health care products, including the world leader Panadol tablet.

Stafford-Miller, which was formerly run by the Block family, has been located in the town since 1981. Having started with an original workforce of 150, it was a highly successful business involving high quality, well paid jobs.

would be huge implications for the whole community and would almost certainly mean the creation of a new dump in the immediate rather than long term future.

There is already a court case on the proposed superdump which would service Dungarvan, Waterford and Tramore in the Lickey Valley area. Judgment on this case is pending. However the proposal by the EPA may come as a significant confidence blow to the Lickey Valley Concern Group as Tramore and Waterford's dumps are also expected to be shut soon.

Waterford County Council, with this contentious issue almost certainly on their minds, will be appealing the decision as it maintains that there is sufficient capacity in the landfill for a further 3 years.

Councillor Fiachra O'Ceilleachair has described the proposal by the Environmental Agency as having serious consequences to the whole of West Waterford.

A rethink is also warranted on Waterford County Council's Waste Management Strategy in light of the proposal, the Labour Councillor said.

THE MICHAEL CAVANAGH



Over the weekend of June 22nd to 24th, Cappoquin will be the venue for a unique Irish-American commemoration of one of the town's most famous men, the son of a cooper from Cooke Street.

Michael Cavanagh (1823-1900) distinguished himself in several fields during his lifetime. As a poet, he was proficient in both Irish and English and his works ranged from portraying the beauties of his native place to Ireland's struggle for nationhood. It is Michael Cavanagh who is credited with the first literary representation of the 'Cornerstone' legend synonymous with Cappoquin.

Cavanagh also earned fame for himself in America, both as a poet and translator of Gaelic poetry into English which brought Irish literature and Celtic studies to a much wider American audience than ever before. He also wrote the biographies of no less than three celebrated Young Irelanders, including the mammoth life of Thomas Francis Meagher.

Michael Cavanagh is also remembered for his involvement with the nationalist and non-sectarian Young Ireland movement itself. He saw action in the rising of 1848 and was one of the main organisers of what became the last action of the Young Irelanders, the barracks attack at Cappoquin in September 1849.

The Cavanagh weekend opens on the evening of Friday, June 22nd, with an exhibition at the Parochial Hall of material relating to Michael's life and the Young Irelanders generally. This will be followed by an informal gathering of locals, along with visitors from America, Australia, Britain and around Ireland at the Railway Bar, where a 'good crack' is assured.

On Saturday, the visitors will be going on a day-long tour of the historic sites of County Waterford. This will include a ceremony in Waterford, where a beautiful edition of Cavanagh's life of T.F. Meagher will be presented to the city archives by Mr Tom Overlander of Texas, one of Michael Cavanagh's descendants. The official commemorative dinner takes place that evening at Richmond House, Cappoquin.

On Sunday, June 24th, following a special commemorative mass at St Mary's Church (11.30), the Michael Cavanagh memorial - weighing well over a ton- will be unveiled at the Square in Cappoquin. A tour of the locality's historic and cultural sites will follow.

Proposal To Provide Funding For Playgrounds

Chairman of the SPC on Housing, Social Policy, Cultural, Heritage and Community Affairs, Cllr. John Deasy has recommended to the members of Waterford County Council that they provide up to two playgrounds in the county each year over a five year period.

The councillor, on behalf of the members of the committee, proposed that the Council provide the site where possible, that 50% of the financial cost of the project be funded by the Council and that a local committee is formed to oversee the facilities when in place.

The proposal by the Strategic Policy Committee also asked that £100,000 be put aside in the Council estimates to provide these playgrounds.

The County Manager Donal Connolly said that while the funding cannot be guaranteed in advance of next years estimates, it will be up to the councillors to decide what allocation would be provided in 2002's estimates.

Date For Official Opening Of Kilmac' **By-Pass Changed**

The opening of the Kilmacthomas by-pass has been delayed. The previous opening date of the road was the 20th of July but it has now been revealed by the County Manager Donal Connolly that the road will not be completed until mid August and the Minister of the Environment Noel Dempsey will be unable to officially declare the by-pass open until the 3rd of September.

Concerns were also raised by both Cllr. John Deasy and Cllr. Tom Cunningham about the problem farmers would face crossing the by-pass with

The County Manager agreed that it wasn't ideal for farmers to have to bring cattle across busy roads but he said that the severing of land holdings is taken into account when providing compensation. Where possible, the County Manager also said, the Council would attempt to provide safe Cunningham access (tunnels) for the farmers herding livestock.

Improvement Of **Ballyduff Bridge Proposed**

The Chairman of Waterford County Council Cllr. Willie McDonnell, following a representation made by Ballyduff Tidy Towns Committee, has proposed that Ballyduff Bridge be renovated.

It has been twenty years since the bridge that spans the Blackwater River was repaired and painted.

However the County Engineer John O'Flynn stated that the cost involved in hiring a contractor to paint the bridge would be in the region of £40,000. This sum is not available under the under current Roadworks estimates.

Mr. OFlynn did say though that the bridge is in need of painting and the Council will be looking at providing this work next year.

The structure was also declared safe and not in need of any structural repair.

LEVEL OF INFORMATION ON AREA **ACTION PLANS CRITICISED**

Cllr. Fiachra OCeilleachair has claimed that the public are not being kept informed by Waterford County Council about its Area Ac-

He stated that there were two or three controversial points in this plan including that you have to name the buyer of the land before you sell it. The Labour councillor described this as CIIIr. Fiachra a ridiculous proposal.



The Ring-based councillor in a reference to the No vote in the Nice Treaty said "I think we've all learned a valuable lesson that the public need to be kept informed"

He then went on to call for a public information day to be held where the public would be able to ask questions and get a better understanding of the structures of the Area Action Plan.

The councillor also asked the Council to consider putting together an information leaflet that would be sent to the areas involved in plan.

The County Manager Donal Connolly replied that the plans have been on display and information days in the areas including Ring-Old Parish. He did not see a necessity to hold a further information meeting.

Director of Services Denis McCarthy said that he was willing to meet anyone who had difficulties in understanding the plans either in the Civic Offices or on site.

Council Goes To Tallow For First Time In **One Hundred Years**

The members of Waterford County Council gathered in Tallow for the first time in its one hundred year history. The visit started with a meeting with the Carmelite sisters who were preparing for another historic event for the small West Waterford town: the visit of the relics of

but a number of Councillors believe that it doesn't go far enough.

One of the provisions it does not have are incentivies for inward investment which was criticised by

Cllr. Coffey as the towns will have to rely on their own struggling economies.

The councillor did say though that the scheme has a lot of potential and needs to be brought to the fore by the Council. Councillor Nuala Ryan was also concerned about the scheme. Many people in the towns did not have a taxable income, she said, and so they would not qualify under it. The Fine Gael councillor said she would have preferred to see tax incentives offered to the whole of rural Ire-

Cappoquin Councillor Ollie Wilkinson disagreed with the sentiments expressed however. The Fianna Fail councillor said it is too early to write off the scheme.

He did say though that he | Wilkinson wished the scheme could be spread out to rural Ireland as well.

Cllr. James Tobin supported his Fianna Fail colleague and said he was more worried about those outside the scheme than the provisions of the scheme itself.




Mr. Connolly said that the County Council had apthe areas but they had not received much hope of this happening.



The National Senior Club Championships were held in the O'Loughlin's Sports



REFEREE PROBLEMS

NEW HURLING MANAGER

Already the matter of filling the vacancy left after Gerald McCarthy's departure has aroused speculation and it is no exaggeration to write that the county is awash with rumours concerning his replacement.

Names like Liam Griffin, Wexford, Tom Ryan, Limerick, Ger Loughnane, from you know where (he certainly did not endear himself to Waterford supporters with his ruthless and ridiculous comments last weekend),

Babs Keating and a couple from Cork are names plucked out of the air and sent into circulation around the county. I was told that Gerald McCarthy had agreed to come back as a selector and as assistant to Colm Bonner, if he takes over. There appears to be no Waterford man named in the speculation, but I do know that it is being suggested that our present under 21 hurling selection committee should take over the management for a couple of seasons.

I think that very soon all the speculators will begin to realise that hurling or football team managers do not grow on trees and that the problem of recruiting high profile people to take on the responsibility is becoming more and more difficult.

This is because the demands on the leader, as well as on the players, are becoming almost insufferable. Training goes on for a minimum of six months of the year and close to championship time the training requires attendance on four nights per week. All very demanding on amateurs who are expected to do a professional job.

The team manager, for the most part of his tenure, is under scrutiny for everything that he does and if he is not successful he is sometimes branded as a loser. Take for instance the situation in Munster this year, 2001, where we have 5 of the highest profile people managing the teams. Only one of these is going to win the provincial

championship. Taking this a step further, only one manager will train a team to win the All Ireland. All the others are losers and no matter what the reasons for their failure, they will be criticised and knocked.

In spite of all this, we, as well as other counties, will have to find a manager to lead our team and in the

weeks ahead, interest in the subject is sure to increase.

Whether or not the fact that we have a splendid panel of players and given a few more players, we can be described as a county with great potential, will be a help in enticing qualified people to apply for or consent to do the job, is something we will have to await and see.

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
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
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
