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New Radiology Unit Opens In Dungarvan

A new radiology unit at Dungarvan District Hospital, costing over £100,000, was officially opened on Thursday last by the Chairman of the South Eastern Health Board, Ald. Hilary Quinlan.

The radiology equipment, which was commissioned in March of this year, complements the state-of-the-art diagnostic equipment at Waterford Regional Hospital.

One of the main benefits of the new equipment is that the results of an x-ray examination can be on the Radiologist's desk within minutes. The images are transferred via an ISDN line to the Radiology Department at Waterford Regional Hospital.

They can also be transferred to the Accident and Emergency Department for an im-

mediate consultation, should one be required.

The Computer Radiology system also provides the platform for the entire South Eastern Health Board to take the next step, to a full P.A.C.S. (Patient Archiving and Communication) system. This will allow all the x-ray images to be stored, diagnosed and distributed throughout the hospital at the touch of a button.

The Health Board Chairman, Ald. Hilary Quinlan, said it was a great day for Dungarvan and West Waterford: "This equipment will be of enormous benefit to the people of the area who, up to now, had to travel to Waterford Regional Hospital for such examinations."

Cappoquin Celebrates The Life Of One Of Its Most Famous Sons

Cappoquin celebrated the life and exploits of one of its most famous sons, Michael Cavanagh with a hectic schedule of historical events, last weekend.

The son of a cooper (person who makes or repairs barrels) from Cooke Street, Cappoquin, Cavanagh has earned himself a place in the hearts and minds of both the literary and historical fraternity for his poetry and overall contribution to Irish

Literature and Celtic Studies, as well as being one of the main organisers of a Young Irelander attack on the barracks at Cappoquin in September of 1849.

The idea of a weekend in honour of Michael Ca-

vanagh came from Tom Overlander of Texas, who wished to dedicate a monument to Cavanagh. There followed much preparation on both sides of the Atlantic for the ultimately successful weekend.

The weekend, which arrived after much expectation, was well attended, with as many as fifty American relatives making the trip across the Atlantic, as well as numerous descendants for all

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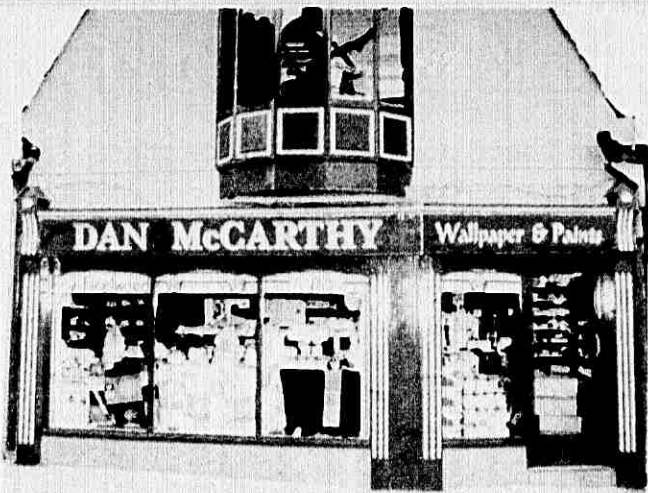
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Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce Elects New President

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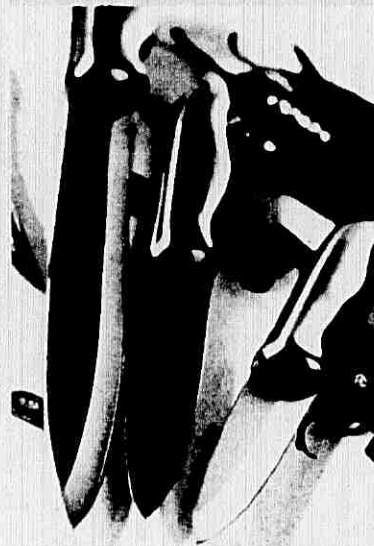

THE WAY WE LIVE: SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

THE INTERNET

Perhaps the most exciting and convenient way to communicate is on the internet. It is a huge network of interconnected computers. Most people connect their computers to the Internet using modems that convert digital signals into analogue signals that can pass along ordinary telephone cables.



ON THE MOVE

Mobile telephones allow people to stay in touch even when they are not at home. The signals to and from the telephone are carried by radio waves to a local receiving or cellular station, which is connected to the normal telephone network.

TOMORROW'S WORLD

In the near future, most telecommunications equipment will send and receive huge amounts of digital information through the fibre-optic cables of ISDN - Integrated Services Digital Network.

This will give people access to the Internet, digital television and radio, and a videophone which will allow them to see the people they talk to.

Telephone Signals

Inside the mouthpiece, a microphone produces an electrical signal that is a copy of the sound of your voice. The signal passes down cables, through exchanges and to the earpiece of the other telephone, where a loudspeaker produces the sound.

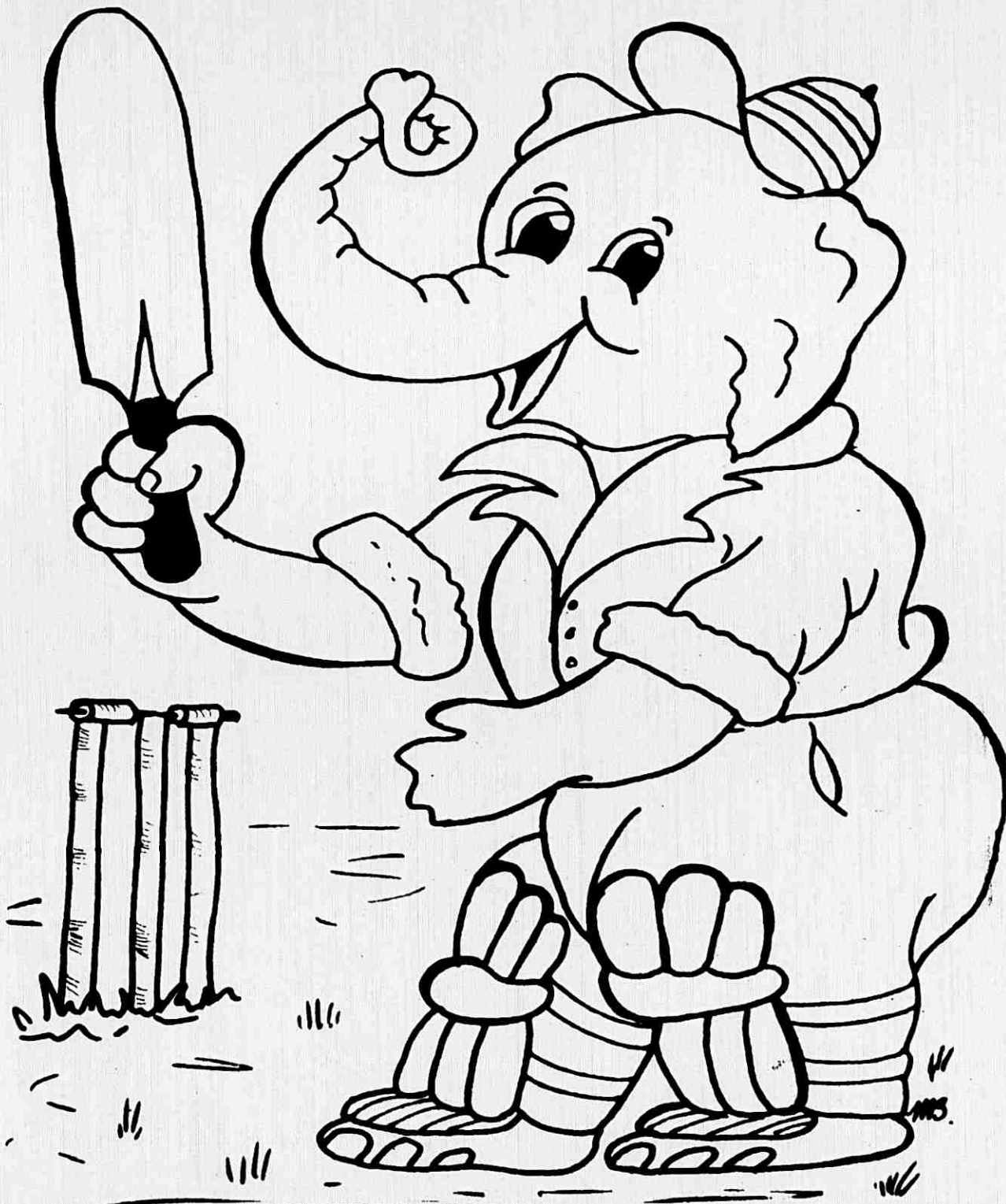


THE DIGITAL WORLD

Microphones produce continuously varying electric currents that are copies of sounds they pick up. These wave-like signals are analogue. They must be digitized — represented as a series of on and off pulses — before they can be used by computers or sent through modern digital telecom networks.

This is done by sampling the analogue signal thousands of times each second, and representing the value of each sample as a binary digital number.

Spiced Up Burgers

Spiced up burgers BRING a bit of variety into your life by spicing up this typical barbecue food which could otherwise be plain and ordinary.

Ingredients:

Serves 4-6

BEEFBURGER:

- 450g lean minced beef
- 2 x 15ml sp tomato ketchup
- 1 x 15ml sp Worcestershire sauce
- Salt and black pepper

LAMBBURGER:

- 450g lean minced lamb
- 50g Feta cheese, crumbled
- 1 x 5ml sp dried mixed herbs
- Salt and black pepper

PORKBURGER:

- 450g lean minced pork
- 227g can pineapple in natural juice, 2 rings finely chopped
- 1 spring onion, finely chopped
- Salt and black pepper

Method:

PLACE the ingredients

Burgers can be livened up even more if served with a tangy sauce.

Serve lamb burgers with tzaziki.

Serve pork burgers with sweet and sour sauce.

Serve beefburgers with barbecue sauce.

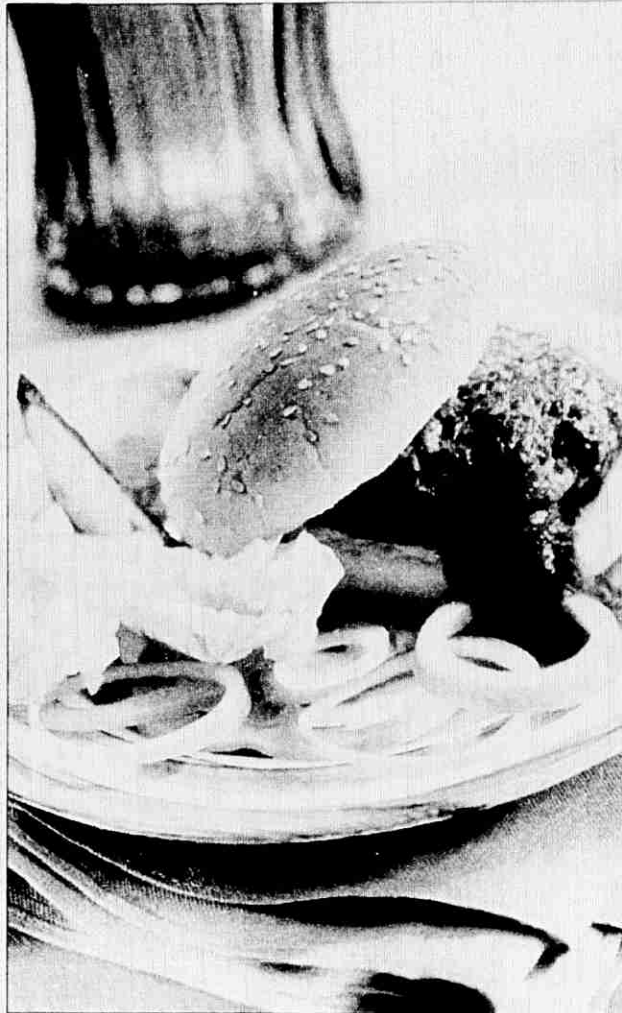
for your chosen burger into a large bowl and mix thoroughly. Divide the mixture into four or six and shape into burgers.

Place on the barbecue (or under a preheated grill) for 4-6 minutes each side, turning once.

Serve the burgers with a large bread bun, salad of your choice and sauce.

Recipe for barbecue sauce to be served with beefburgers:

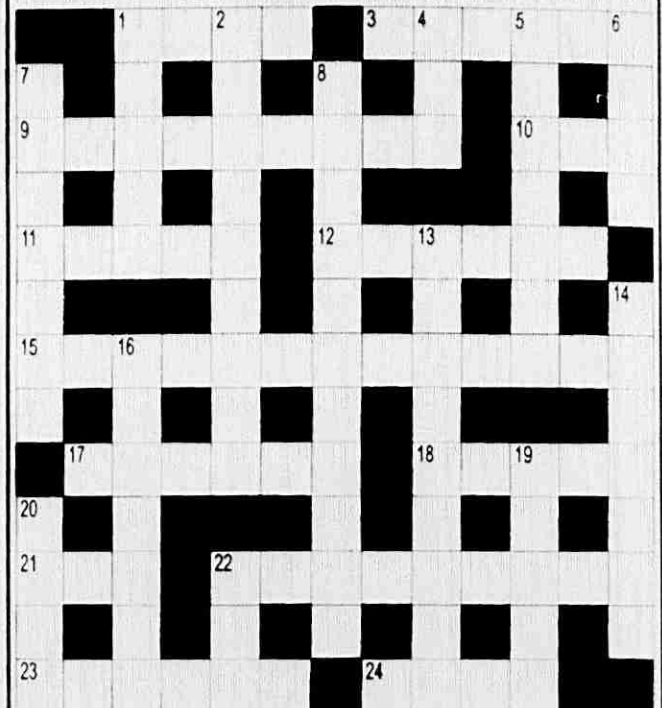
Mix 5 x 15ml sp tomato sauce, 2 x 15ml sp Worcestershire sauce, 1 x 21/4ml sp English Mustard and 1 clove garlic, crushed together in a bowl, and serve either hot or cold with the burger.

Thai Curry-style Skate Wing Salad

SKATE wing salad with seaweed and a Thai red curry dressing.

Ingredients:

- Serves 2
- 10g dried seaweed (from Chinese supermarkets)
- 350g fresh skinned skate wings
- 50ml sherry vinegar
- 100g onion, peeled and sliced
- 2 sprigs parsley
- 1 bay leaf
- 10g mixed salad leaves
- 1/2 x 5ml sp Thai red curry paste
- Juice of 1 lime
- 1 x 15ml sp Camellia oil or sunflower oil
- Salt to taste
- 6g capers
- 6g red shallots, sliced
- 4g flat-leaf parsley
- 2g dill

Method:

SOAK the seaweed in

water for 3hrs, then drain. Wash the skate wings and place them in a frying pan. Pour 1/2 litre of cold water and sherry vinegar, add the onion, parsley and bay leaf. Cook gently for about 15 minutes until the fish is tender.

Wash the salad and place on a large plate with the seaweed.

To make the dressing, blend the red Thai curry paste with the lime juice, coconut milk, fish sauce, sunflower oil and salt to taste.

Drain the fish and place on a dry cloth. Lift the flesh from the bones and arrange on top of the salad. Scatter over capers and red shallot rings.

Pour the dressing over the salad and decorate with flat-leaf parsley and dill.

Savoury Golden Fried Sandwich

A QUICK, nourishing snack, golden on the outside, with a warm filling just waiting to ooze out.

Ingredients:

- Serves 2
- 2 eggs
- 4 x 15ml sp milk
- 50g cheddar cheese, grate
- 1-2 tomatoes, thinly sliced
- 2 slices cooked ham, cut into strips
- 4 slices white bread
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- Large knob of butter

Method:

IN a shallow dish, beat together the eggs and milk. Sprinkle the tomato and ham on top of two slices of bread, season with salt and pepper, then place the two remaining slices of bread on top. Press

firmly down with your hand to make sure that none of the filling falls out of the sandwiches when cooked.

Place each sandwich in the egg and milk mixture for a few minutes. Soak both sides well until all the mixture has been absorbed.

Melt the butter in a frying pan over a medium heat, then fry each sandwich for 3-4 minutes on each side until puffed up and golden.

It is important not to fry the sandwiches over too high a heat, otherwise the cheese filling won't have time to melt before the outside turns golden.

Serve the sandwiches on their own with tomato ketchup or with a fresh green salad.

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Waterford Co. Development Board Hosts Social Strategy Planning Day

A SHARED VISION FOR COUNTY WATERFORD

More than 80 representatives of social and community groups and organisations from throughout Co Waterford gathered in Clonea Strand Hotel, Dungarvan on Thursday last (June 21 2001) for a strategic planning day organised by Waterford County Development Board. This Social Strategy Planning Day was one of a series of such events being organised by the County Development

Board (CDB) as it works towards the production of an integrated 10-year economic, social and cultural development strategy for County Waterford.

Last Thursday's Planning Day focused on social and community issues in particular. Invited representatives spent the day developing a Framework Strategy Document for presentation to the CDB in the autumn. Those attending the Planning Day

included representatives from the South Eastern Health Board, Foróige, Waterford Regional Youth Service, Dungarvan Youth & Family Centre, Waterford Vocational Education Committee, Waterford Institute of Technology, FÁS, Department of Social, Community & Family Affairs, Dungarvan Resource Centre, Tramore Community Care and various youth organisations and community groups. The representatives spent the day defining the goals, objectives and visions for integrated social development in the county, and the specific actions required for the achievement of these goals and objectives. The groups were facilitated in their task by staff from the Tipperary Institute.

Jim O'Donovan, Director of Community & Enterprise with Waterford County Development Board, whose team organised the seminar, was extremely pleased with the outcome of the Social Strategy Planning Day. "We had people from all over the county here today discussing and planning strategies for

dealing with a wide range of issues including health, education, youth and the elderly, childcare, family and community issues, as well as social inclusion in general. I am confident that, through today's session and the other information the CDB has gathered on these issues, that the Board will be able to produce a worthwhile and comprehensive strategy document that will point the way forward for the social development of Co Waterford in the next 10 years."

Waterford County Development Board was established by the government with the express purpose of bringing together for the first time the key players at local level to engage in a process of long-term planning for the county for the next ten years. County Development Boards have been set up nation-wide, as part of an overall strategy to integrate the work of local government, State agencies and local development bodies and community groups. Waterford CDB is being led and supported by Waterford County Council.

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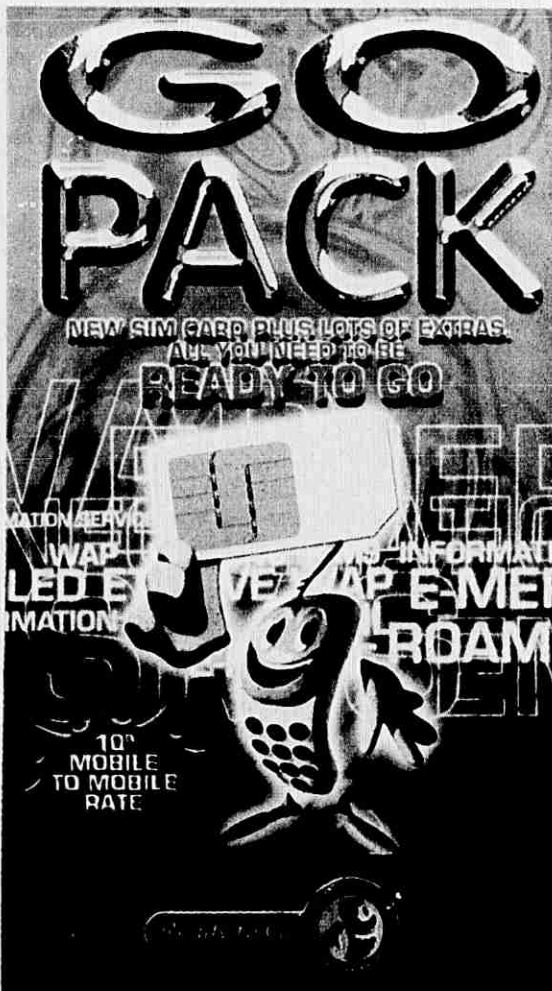


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RNLI AHoy!

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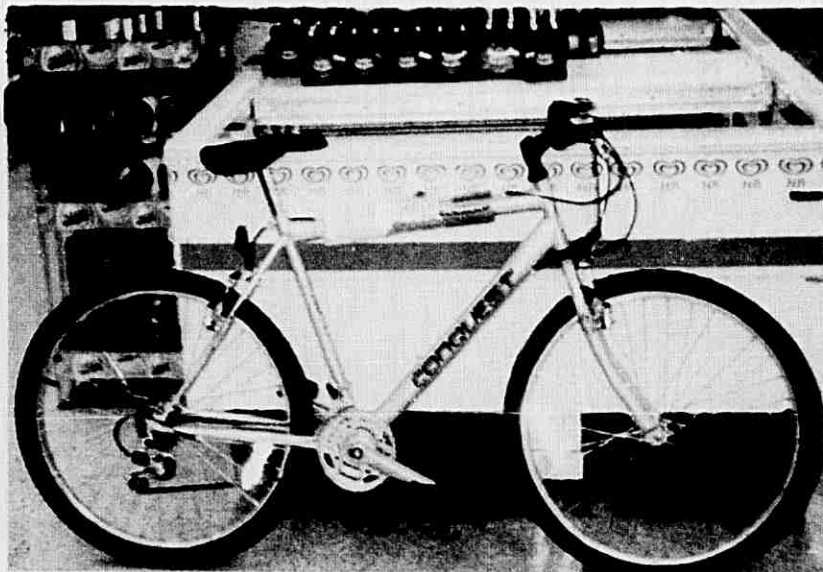


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MUSEUM NOTES

The first of the commemorative plaques has been delivered. This is one of a series of eight plaques which will commemorate individuals and buildings of historic interest in Dungarvan. This project is being sponsored by Dungarvan museum, Dungarvan U.D.C. and the Millennium fund.

Local Personalities Declan Goode

He was the son of Richard and Helena (nee French). His father was from Mallow, Co. Cork while his mother was from Ballinagoul, Ring. They had four sons and one daughter. At first the family lived in Main Street but later moved to Church Street. Dec was educated at the local CBS. On leaving school he served his time with Dan Fraher at his drapery business in Grattan Square. He later worked at the Leather factory, the Chocolate Crumb plant and Sarah Vaccine, a veterinary and medical concern. He then worked at Mulcahy's drapery store for 23 years until its closure.

He had a strong interest in politics and represented the Fianna Fail party both as an Urban and County councillor. He was Chairman of Dungarvan U.D.C. on three occasions and was a County Councillor for ten years.

His great love was the

G.A.A. On his death he was President of the County Board. He played both hurling and football, and brought glory to Dungarvan and then Waterford. Major honours won by him include All-Ireland minor victory of 1929, junior All-Ireland honours in 1934, in 1938 he won his first Munster title, senior county hurling medal with Dungarvan in 1941 and won medals in both codes in every grade. He represented Munster teams in Railway Cups in both hurling and football, Dec retired from intercounty activity in 1946 and concentrated on administrative duties which he held for thirty years, including membership of the Munster County Fixtures Committee. He was county Secretary for 33 years, retiring in 1971. Dec died at his residence at 17 Church Street, on 4 January 1998, aged 84 years.

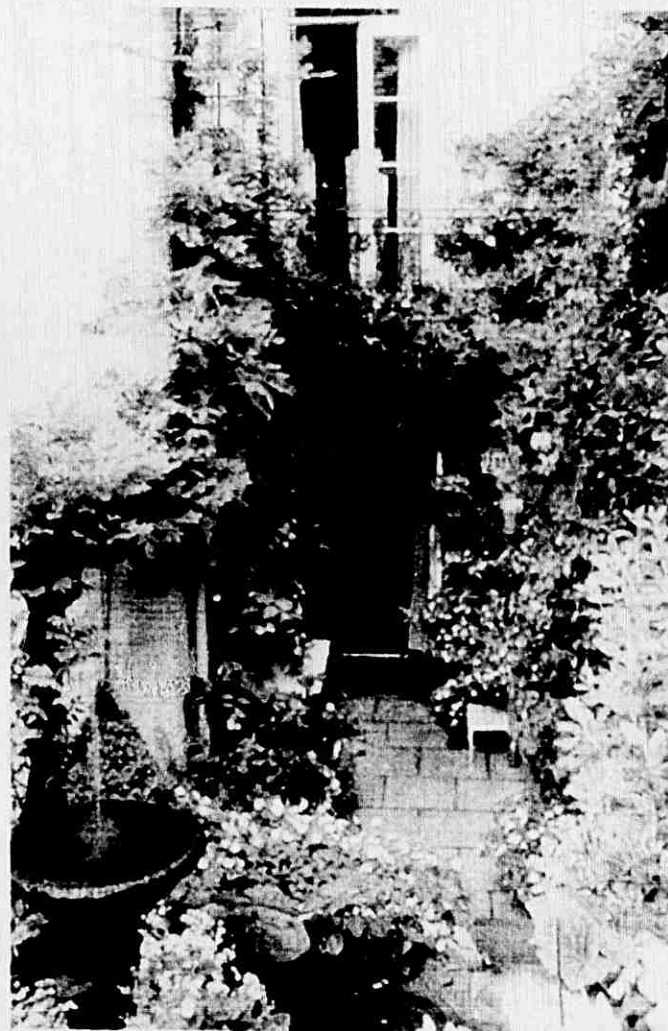
What to do with a town garden

MOST people who are too lazy to make an effort in the garden say it is because it isn't big enough to do anything with - but that's no excuse! Follow these top tips on how to make a gardener's paradise out of barely enough space to swing a cat. Town gardens can be a nightmare to deal with if you don't have the right know-how. Most are small in size and mainly covered with concrete. But they do have their advantages - because they are surrounded by houses, they are sheltered from harsh wind and rain. Also, the brick walls and concrete slabs on the ground keep the earth warm, attracting many

creatures and plants which thrive on that type of environment. Its all a case of picking and choosing. A lot of plants have dwarf varieties which are more suitable for a town garden environment. And even vegetables can be grown in tiny areas if you choose the right types and species. Follow this advice for maximising the potential of an enclosed town garden. ■ Trail runner beans up a trellis against a wall, both for the beans and exotic scarlet flowers. ■ Sow climbing nasturtium and let it wander among your shrubs; chop the leaves and flowers and use them raw to pep up a salad. ■ Train Merton Thornless, a luscious, big blackberry, along rear

fences. ■ Plant tomatoes, aubergines, cucumbers, peppers, courgettes and lettuce in growing bags or, for an even better display, in 10in tubs. ■ Set five or six Swiss chard plants in tubs. They'll keep the family supplied with fresh spinach from June until September. ■ Grow the sugar pea or mangetout in a container. The plants look particularly good against an edging of decorative herb such as golden marjoram. Oregan Sugar Pod is a good late summer cropper. ■ Fill a tub or tower pot with strawberry plants. Wild Alpine varieties such as Red Alpine give summer colour and autumn fruit.

■ Use another tub or barrel to grow an early crop of potatoes. After they are harvested, you can use the compost again for a later crop of leeks or onions grown from sets. ■ Pot out some herbs. Rosemary, sage, parsley, thyme, mint and chives are all attractive plants. Add a splash of blue with hyssop.

This Week In The Garden

PLANT MADONNA LILIES

This is the ideal time to plant *Lilium candidum*, the Madonna lily. It differs from almost all other lilies in making quite a lot of new growth in late summer, and it should be planted before this starts. Another peculiarity is that the bulbs grow practically on the surface. You should plant them 20cm apart and only cover them with 5cm of soil. After a while they will probably work themselves out until they show; make no attempt to cover them again. This lily prefers a sunny position and reasonably good, but not freshly manured, ground.

LIFT DAFFODILS AND BULBOUS IRISES

Daffodils and narcissi, also the various bulbous irises, will now have completed their growth and may be lifted and cleaned off if they are overgrown or you need the ground for something else. Otherwise leave them undisturbed for another year. They do not gain anything by annual lifting and drying, as do tulips and hyacinths. If you do lift them, get them replanted as soon as possible and certainly before the end of September.

CUT BACK HELIANTHEMUMS

Sun roses tend to get rather straggly if left to their own devices, but if cut back a little each year at about this time they can be kept quite neat and tidy. You can do the work with a large pair of scissors or garden shears.

Town gardens: tips for the winter

A LITTLE town garden can look grey and dull in the winter. To liven it up head down to your local garden centre. You will find a wide choice of colourful winter shrubs - in a sheltered garden, most will flourish. Try making a feature of the autumn cherry - its masses of pale pink blossoms clothe its

bare branches. Recommended shrubs: *Viburnum x bodnantense*, *Mahonia lomarifolia*. Recommended climbers: *Jasminum nudiflorum*, *Lonicera fragrantissima*. Also, try heathers, cyclamen and snowflakes.

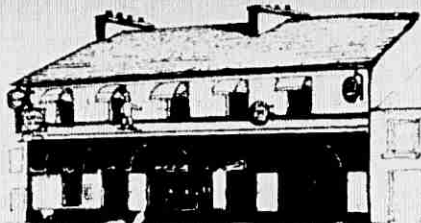

Overcoming Fear And Negativity

Fear is an essential emotion. When you are in danger fear is called into play and it responds automatically with the fight or flight response. When this happens various physical symptoms are evident -- the heart rate quickens, muscles become tense and the digestive tract is slowed down. In today's busy world this fear becomes stress as people are bombarded by increased workloads, tight deadlines and the fear of failure. Anything that threatens your sense of self esteem makes you fearful of the criticism of others or of looking foolish. This fear causes culture lag - in other words there is a lag between how the mind and body unwind and often as it is recovering from one crisis it is thrown into another leaving the body in a permanently tensed state. With this thoughts, feelings and behaviour are affected, causing depression, stress and loss of concentration - which in turn give rise to anger and poor judgment.

When people come to me complaining of not being able to cope they invariably talk of being afraid of things in the future. Many people fear the unknown because of some imagined pain or discomfort or suffering that might happen. Fear rips at the one commodity everyone wants - happiness and contentment. Worries about many things seep into the mind and like a dense fog consume the sufferer with critical negative thoughts. This critical inner voice is the voice of fear that jettisons into paralysing depression. This is the voice that eats away at you making you worry about what others are thinking about you.

Depression is a mood state characterised by a deep sense of inadequacy and most depressed people are caught in a time warp. They are trapped in the past or consumed by the future. This prevents people from experiencing the moment. When this happens you ignore what is going on around you and so you don't appreciate how you really feel. The past and future are meaningless if the present is not lived. The only reality that exists is the NOW. However too many people are so engrossed in the past that they harbour resentments and hangovers which go back years. When you tune in to the NOW you get in touch with the ongoing process of the past towards the future.

You are what your thoughts are and negative thoughts create negative feelings because they riddle the mind with inconsistencies and distorted thinking. Do you ever feel irritable, over anxious or depressed? Do you ever feel frustrated, bored or fed up? Your negative thoughts are the result of negative beliefs. These negative beliefs are the result of negative childhood conditioning. Unfortunately they become the basis of major premises on which present behaviour is based. These erroneous beliefs give birth to erroneous conclusions and behaviour which in turn create great emotional pain and low self esteem. False belief systems lead many to accept constant defeat and force them to believe they are hopeless and worthless, often leading to despair and the belief that suicide is the only solution. Many times people exclaim - "no one cares about me and life will never be worthwhile". Trapped in this distorted thinking they may develop obsessive-compulsive behaviours or become crippled with anxiety and depression or develop hysterical and phobic personalities.

Beliefs are conditioned in childhood and for too many negative self-defeating thoughts become the norm. These imposed self beliefs are the source of most problems as they become extreme and absolute beliefs such as - "when people disagree with me they don't like me" - or - "if I make mistakes I'm a failure."

Many people place self esteem on how they are viewed by others. Every person's sense of self esteem is based on the unconditional acceptance of the self. Everyone makes mistakes, we are all human and fallible and so healthy self esteem is to be immune to the demands of others. Self esteem is how you talk to yourself about yourself and when you have high self esteem you can accept others for who they are. Distorted thinking and irrational beliefs suggest you be loved and approved by everyone and that you must be perfect. This distorted thinking amplifies fear of failure and prevents you from taking action. Many others through negative self messages interpret events in their life through their feelings of unhappiness rather than taking control over their interpretations of events.

A rational person will not exaggerate unpleasant situations or awfulise but rather will work at improving or accepting these unpleasant situations if they cannot be improved. When people continue to berate themselves with negative

compulsive thinking they perpetuate a cycle of negative self talk and irrational behaviour. So how do you become aware of automatic negative behaviour? The first stage is to step back from those negative self scripts and asking yourself - what are your feelings and how do your feelings relate to what you are thinking and doing? By doing this you will see how you have automatically assumed certain attitudes and certain rules and you will see how your emotions have triggered reactions in you that you can't control.

These rules and attitudes are masks you wear under certain conditions. Have you ever noticed the roles you play with your partner, parents, children or in shops or at social events. By stepping back you can observe you even lie to yourself and others and that you emotionalise perpetually. You are what your conditioning made you. This mosaic, this life print was prepared in childhood. When you observe your life you may feel pain as you come face to face with the many facades you have used for so long but you will slowly move and change from a false self to a positive harmonious true self.

When this growth begins you will know no one can effect you but your own thinking. You will accept that your mind alone keeps you in bondage and that you are responsible for your own thoughts and decisions. Because in childhood you identified with what was said or done to you now you continue to be fearful, angry, hurt and perpetuate grudges, resentments and hatreds.

By focussing on feelings you fully experience them and then you let them go. Many people imagine that by suppressing feelings they go away. Not true. In fact they build up and fester which leads to anxiety and stress related problems and depression. Suppressed feelings cause irrational behaviour that (a) you don't understand (b) you can't control. Others "blow up" believing this clears the air. However this doesn't get rid of the feeling and causes guilt and distress.

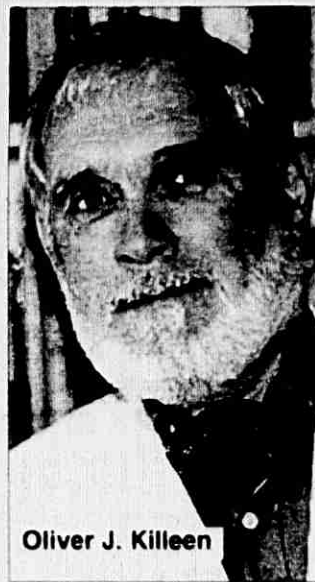
When you identify your feelings you can begin to see the primary reason for the feeling. You can see a problem area, perhaps a relationship or work or health or other problem that causes you concern. Then describe the situation. Ask yourself what do you believe to be true about it. In this way you can hopefully identify the distortion in your thinking and then you can change and restructure your beliefs. Change means you are at the glorious evolutionary stage in your life when your perceptions of yourself are coming into question. It's a time to grow and see yourself in a new way. Isn't that exciting? You have arrived at the threshold of emotional management and you have put yourself in charge of your thoughts, your feelings, your life.

Finally here is a short list of some of the more common patterns of distorted thinking:-

- Awfulising - looking at the negative side of things and amplifying it.
- Black and white thinking - things are either wonderful or terrible.
- Tunnel vision - ignoring other points of view.
- Over generalising - if something bad happens you expect it to happen over and over again
- Negative thinking - "we haven't seen each other for a day, I think the relationship is on the rocks."
- Blame - this is saying someone else or something else is responsible for your pain, loss or failure.
- Guilt - Feeling dominated by "should" or "must" - feeling guilty if you don't do something a certain way.
- Resignation - accepting unhappiness because those who do good are rewarded in the end - or in heaven.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I have a disability and I believe the Living Alone Allowance has been extended to people with disabilities. Am I entitled to the allowance?

ANSWER

You may be entitled to the allowance if you are living alone and receiving a disability payment from the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs. The Living Alone Allowance is an additional increase of £6 a week to people who are living alone and are in receipt of an eligible payment. Previously it only applied to people aged 66 or over. Since April 2001 it has been extended to include certain social welfare recipients under 66 years of age.

If you are aged 66 or over the eligible payments are

Old Age (Contributory or Non-Contributory) Pension
Blind Person's Pension

Widow's or Widower's (Contributory or Non-Contributory) Pension.

Invalidity Pension

One-Parent Family Payment

Deserted Wife's Allowance

Widow's or Widower's Pension under the Occupational Injuries

Benefit Scheme

If you are under age 66 the eligible payments are

Invalidity Pension

Disability Allowance

Blind Person's Pension

Unemployment Supplement

You must apply separately for this allowance to the section of the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs which pays your main pension or benefit.

FARMING LEADER

"OUTCOME OF BEEF NEGOTIATIONS MEETS KEY OBJECTIVES"—WALSH

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, Mr. Joe Walsh TD, has referred to the outcome of the negotiations on adjustments to the beef regime in the Agriculture Council in Luxembourg.

Mr. Walsh said that going into these discussions his main objectives were: to secure an increase in the intervention ceiling to cope with the Autumn beef surplus and to achieve an orderly transition from the end of the Purchase for Destruction Scheme.

The Minister said that he had secured these objectives in the course of the negotiations. The Council decisions would place the beef sector in a much stronger position to deal with the ongoing surplus arising from the sharp fall in consumption as a result of the BSE crisis at the end of last year. In particular, he had secured an increase of 150,000 tonnes in the intervention ceiling for 2001 and, even more importantly, he had secured a commitment from the Commission that the intervention system will be used to stabilise the market in the Autumn. This would remove a significant uncertainty in relation to market supports for the coming months.

Mr. Walsh said that, while his over-riding priority is to secure the re-opening of third country markets, the intervention concession will help to ensure a smooth transition from the Purchase for Destruction Scheme to intervention after 1 July. The Minister pointed out that the Destruction Scheme will have removed 275,000 animals from the market by 30 June at a cost of approximately £200 million

to the Irish taxpayer.

On the other elements of the package, the Minister said that he had succeeded in restricting the proposals on the Special Beef Premium quota and the Suckler Cow quota to the two years 2002 and 2003 and the removal of the proposal on individualisation of the Special Beef Premium quota; in addition, the minimum heifer requirement in the Suckler Cow premium had been reduced from 20% to 15%, which was close to the normal suckler cow replacement rate. Minister Walsh said that he had also secured an exemption from this requirement for producers with less than 14 suckler cows and

this would exclude two thirds of Irish producers. Furthermore, the reduction in the stocking density limit from 2.0 to 1.8 lu/ha would be phased in over two years.

Commenting on the reduction in the Special Beef Premium quota for Ireland, Minister Walsh said that he was satisfied that the new quota, which was 3% higher than payments made in recent years, would be adequate for our requirements. In this regard he pointed out that applications for the Special Beef Premium this year were 15% lower than in 2000 and male calf registrations were also down.

In relation to the overall pack-

age, Minister Walsh said that any loss in premium income to Irish farmers, which he estimated at worst at £2 million p.a., would be substantially outweighed by the higher level of intervention support which he had negotiated as part of the package. In the absence of these arrangements, there was a real prospect that cattle prices in Ireland would collapse in the Autumn. The Minister also pointed out that it was in the long term interests of Irish producers - more than any other group of producers - that the EU market was restored to balance as soon as possible and that agreement was reached at this particular Council.

SOUTH EAST ICMSA NEWS

FMD RESTRICTIONS - ROSSLARE PORT

While the farming community are slowly getting back to something near normal with the opening of marts and the lifting of other restrictions, John Quigley Area Development Officer with ICMSA in the south east region visited Rosslare port during the week to see what kind of restrictions are in place.

On arriving at the Dept. of Agriculture Offices in the port compound I was greeted by Mr. John Cushen veterinary inspector Dept. of Agriculture. Mr. Cushen took me on a tour of all the loading/unloading bays where there is sprayers fitted into the roadways in order to disinfect underneath vehicles as they enter. All these sprayers have adequate reserves of disinfectant stored in tanks and forty-five gallon drums. A quick demonstration showed the efficiency of the system.

All commercial vehicles are also power washed in the port compound.

Before passengers leave the ferry, Dept. officials put disinfectant mats in place so that all passengers including those going to the car holds pass over these mats. All passengers are questioned as they leave the port. Campers vans have their fridges checked for any risk material, which is confiscated.

All machinery been imported is fully checked. If it is in a dirty condition it is returned. All machinery allowed in, is fully disinfected.

I must say that I was very impressed with the level of FMD restriction in place. Well done to Mr. Cushen and the Dept. of Agriculture Staff.

DAIRYING

Low Cost Milk Now!

Now is the time to do it.

The response to meal feeding is very low and at best it is not much better than breakeven, even when feed to high RBI cows. So keep your meal until September - October

Quality, quality grass.

That's the aim

With 70% DMD a cow only eats 14 kgs which will only sustain 3.75 gallons whereas if the grass 80% (our target) she will eat 17 kgs and give 5.2 gallons.

That piece of information tells all about how to approach grassland management.

Topping may be necessary on some fields that were not topped or that have too

many dung pads (tall grass) as a result of under grazing.

Extra milk (5%) can be got by changing your liners now.

They will also result in less liner slip, thereby preventing mastitis. Tubes with holes such as the long milk tubes, the long and short pulse tubes, should be trimmed back.

If you have the slightest doubt that your milking machine is not working well, then have it checked out, because the loss of milk and other problems arising will be enormous.

Farmers do not give enough consideration to the importance of the milking machine, resulting in poor servicing.

Second Cuts:

Cutting 42 - 46 days after the first cut will give a DMD of 68 - 72%. Yield won't increase much if cutting is delayed longer than 50 days.

As new leaves grow leaves at the base die off.

Again, collect silage effluent.

Make sure to empty all slurry tanks onto these silage fields.

It is your last chance to get it all out together without spoiling grass.

Dilute the silage effluent before spreading on grass.

With 2000 gallons of slurry apply 50 - 60 units of Nitrogen for aftergrass

Check how you are "fixed" for silage.

Per month during winter, a cow needs 1.3 tons, a weaning needs 0.6 tons, and store cattle or in calf heifers need 1.2 tons.

If you are tight or short put extra Nitrogen on the grazing and cut area so as to generate extra baled silage.

Second cut silage fields being cut in late July and earmarked for reseeding should:

Be sprayed pre-cutting (6 - 7 days) with Roundup or Gallup.

This will facilitate sowing within days of cutting.

CATTLE

Parasite Control:-

As calves begin to increase their grass intake the risk of stomach worm infestation gradually increases. A severe infection of either stomach worms or Hoose can reduce an animals overall lifetime performance.

Animals most at risk would be artificially reared, Autumn born calves and even Spring born calves who have been forced to eat grass because the cow has poor milk supply.

Although Hoose infection is unpredictable watch out for any sign of calves coughing and dose immediately. Stomach worms infection is much more predictable and dosing in mid-late July should be effective.

Choice of Dose

Several important factors should be noted about the various types of doses available.

White & Yellow doses: These types of products are reasonably cheap at 50p - £1/dose for a 200 kg calf. They require a higher labour input because the majority are oral drenches and the fact that they have no carry over effect means that calves should be moved onto clean grass after dosing.

Avermectin Products: These type of products are more expensive at around £2 -2.60/dose/200 kg calf but they require less labour because they tend to be injectable or pour-on type products. They also have a 4-6 week carry over effect so often only 2 doses are required over the grazing season if timed correctly.

SHEEP

Weaning:

March born lambs should be weaned in June/early July. There is absolutely no advantage in keeping lambs on the ewe for more than 12-14 weeksewes are giving little milk and will compete with the lambs for grass.

Confine or house ewes for a few days to dry off after which a number of options can be applied depending on grass supply.

Where there is a plentiful supply of grass the ewes may rotate behind the lambs to clean off pastures or mob stocked on a field that has headed out.

Where pasture is scarce, the ewes may be confined on a limited area at 15-18 per acre. However, avoid confining very thin ewes, ewe lambs that reared lambs or culls that will be sold.

Lamb weights:

A reasonable growth rate target for twin born lambs is 275 g/day from birth to 14 weeks with the result that they should average 32 kg at weaning. This target should be achievable on grass only without meal supplementation.

Liam Griffin Rules Himself Out

Since the retirement of Gerald McCarthy a number of high profile names have been bandied about throughout the county as possible successors. Liam Griffin was one name which cropped up at regular intervals and one which needless to say I would have enthusiastically endorsed.

The Wexford hotelier took time out from his busy schedule at his flagship hotel, the beautiful Ferrycarrig, to talk hurling. Griffin is never too busy to talk hurling!

He expressed surprise but said he was honoured that his name was mentioned in connection with the Waterford job. He spoke at length about his great affinity for Waterford hurling going back to his days as a boarder in De La Salle College. The former Wexford manager drew many interesting parallels between the situation. Waterford find themselves in and that of Wexford prior to their All-Ireland success in 1996. Known at the time as "the nearly men" Wexford had a propensity for missing scores and squandering comfortable leads. Witness the comments of Vincent Hogan in the Irish Independent following Wexford's defeat by Offaly in the 94/95 league match.

"Wexford blunder like it is an art form. Open the door and they'll jump out the window, something in their bloodlines". Also "Hurling with zeal and rhythm Wexford threatened to chase what remains of the All-Ireland champions out of town but then Offaly stuck their chests out. Dammit why did they

have to do that!"

Does it remind you of anything? Griffin was warming to the subject and expanded a little. "You have no idea how hard we worked both physically and mentally on this weakness". This gave me the opening I wanted. You took them over that hill, maybe you could do the same for Waterford" I said. He was adamant however that his personal and business commitments were such that he could not entertain a return to inter county management. Not least amongst his commitments is the St. Mary's under 10 hurling team.

"They wouldn't be too happy if I walked out on them", he quipped. The St. Mary's man values loyalty which he further emphasised with his next comment. "If I was ever to return at inter county level it would have to be with a Wexford team".

Interestingly enough he did say that if he could be of any assistance on a once off or occasional basis to Waterford he would be glad to help, but he added "That would be entirely up to the new management".

Almost inevitably our conversation drifted back to under age hurling and the need for a more progressive approach in the GAA.

He was of course preaching to the converted but more about that anon.

Whatever about Waterford Coisbhríde U-14 hurlers will benefit from the "Griffin Experience" before long as we have been invited to Rosslare to take part in a friendly against St. Mary's and a coaching session with the man himself.

Late September, back in '96, Liam Griffin and the Wexford team had reached the pinnacle of hurling success. Griffin was in demand. He was voted Phillips manager of the month. Pat Kenny interviewed him. He appeared on the Late Late Show. Journalists vied for interviews. Griffin was a star in big demand. At the time a few of us were struggling to hold the line in East Tyrone. If Griffin and Wexford were at the top of the hurling world, we surely mirrored the other extreme in the "hurling backwoods of Ulster". Griffin had spoken passionately on the Late Late and other shows of the need to take hurling to the 32 counties. "Right ye boy", I thought. We will see what you are made of. I rang Griffin at his hotel in Rosslare, which he has since sold. It was a traumatic time for him. His wife Mary, a most elegant attractive lady had been diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis and Griffin told me had would be announcing his resignation to the press next day - the players already knew on top of that he was about to leave on a tour of the United States with the Wexford team. My God, I felt so guilty about my pathetic request for him to come to Tyrone and apologise. "There is a lot going on" he said, "I will contact you when I get back". I had no right to expect he would.

Some six or seven weeks later, on a cold coalisland night, the phone rang. "Will you hold for Liam Griffin," said the sweet sounding receptionist. "All night if I have to girl" I said. Liam Griffin came to Tyrone with his wife Mary and the two boys. I will never forget him for it, but that's a story for another day.

Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. William McDonnell chaired the meeting with Cllrs. James Tobin, Ollie Wilkinson and Nora Flynn also in attendance.

Dan O'Regan of Fermoy Fish Processing Company is looking to change the use of existing industrial building from metal plating, light engineering, woodworking and plastics, moulding to food processing and packaging including secondary processing and packaging of fish, effluent treatment plant and three loading docks at Townspark, East Tallow (Flair Plastics).

The local residents had fears of noise and smell which may occur especially when the word fish was mentioned. Many fears numbering around seven or eight were put forward and the council were asked to make sure these were taken into consideration before granting any planning permission.

Continuing on the National Spring Clean theme, Waterford County Council has, in conjunction with a number of community groups, organised the following clean up events.

Σ The Bride and Blackwater Environmental Alliance are running a cleanup event of Knockanore a favourite beauty spot of theirs. The clean up starts on Saturday 30th of June at 10 am at Knockanore School.

Σ Coiste Maisithe na Rinne, the division of Comhairle Pobail na Rinne who organised the very successful clean up of the Cunnigar last week, are back in action with a new clean up. This time its the turn of Baille na nGall beach in Ring. The clean up is set for Saturday, June 30th at 2:30 pm. and the

invitation to come along is extended to everyone.

Σ A bulky goods collection is scheduled for Cappoquin on Saturday 30th. There will be skips at the GAA field, the car park at Twig Bog, At Shanbally Upper, and at Tivoli Terrace from 8am till 12 noon. Bring along any unwanted goods such as beds, bikes, cookers etc. Please note that domestic rubbish will not be accepted. Feel free to join in the clean up of litter in and around Cappoquin too.

Gloves, bags and litter pickers will be provided by the County Council for all the clean ups and all rubbish collected will be removed.

While you are out and about at the clean ups take a while to notice the abundance of wild flowers that are in bloom at this time of year. Our wild flowers have been brightening up the roadsides over the past month or two with dashes of scarlet from the Common Poppy and white and yellow hazes from the Ox-eye daisy. While Woodbine and Dog Rose in the hedgerows add welcome summer-time smells to an evening stroll.

The native wildflowers of our

island have adapted to the climate and soil conditions over the centuries. Birds and insects have, in turn, adapted their life cycles to the plants. Because they have time on their side, native areas support a much greater number of plants and animals. Conserving natural habitats and the variety of life they support is far more important than many of us might think.

Over time, native plants have developed resistance to a huge range of pests and diseases that would wipe out cultivated plants. For example, during the 1970's, the grassy-stunt virus devastated rice fields across Asia. For these rice-eating nations, this was a disaster. It took four years of searching and the screening of 17,000

samples of wild and cultivated rice before a disease resistant variety was found. The one out of so many samples that proved to be disease-free was found growing in the wild near Gonda in Uttar Pradesh, India.

This is why conserving the diversity of our wildlife is so important. We must preserve the genetic variation of plants, and look beyond the endangered species and those that are sources of miracle cures.

Environmental and community groups may be interested to know that application forms for the Environment Partnership Fund are available from the Environment Section in Waterford County Council. The Council has been allocated £5,000 from the Department of the Environ-

ment and Local Government and will match this sum giving a total prize fund of £10,000.

The theme of the campaign is: The Environment: It's Easy to Make A Difference. It is the Department's intention that projects selected for funding in 2001 should support the objectives of the campaign. Examples of suitable projects that link in with the awareness campaign include projects that focus on waste prevention and recycling at a local level or educational activities involving young people.

Taxi Fare Structures Adopted

It was recommended to councillors that taxi fares structures submitted by the taxi representatives be adopted with some changes.

The Town Clerk Brian White set out the details of the Taxi fare structure. These will include the single minimum fare up to one mile at £3.00 where the Urban Council proposed £2.00.

The Council recommended an extra 50p after midnight while the Taxi group wanted a 50p charge after 8pm until 8am on Monday morning while on Saturday's and Sunday's this charge would remain the whole day.

The UDC proposed a call out/stop charge of £1.00 while the Taxi Group suggested that this be set at 50p and an extra charge of £1.00 be levied where a taxi stops on route.

The fourth difference was where the UDC proposed a charge of 10p per 1/10 of a mile after one mile, the Taxi group proposed a charge of 13p per 1/10 of a mile after 1.5 miles.

The Taxi Group also suggested a soiling charge of £50.00. A decision had to be taken on this contentious issue at this meeting as a fare structure had to be implemented by the Council before the 1st of July.

While Councillor Nuala Ryan was in agreement with all the fares set out by the Taxi Group, the Chairman of the Urban Council Cllr. Michael O'Riordan was concerned about the extra 50p proposed to be charged all day Saturday and Sunday.

A consultation with the Taxi Group was then decided with Cllr. O'Riordan and the Town Clerk Brian White meeting with the Taxi representatives.

It was decided, after the brief consultation, to implement most of the Taxi groups proposals with the exception of the all day 50p extra charge on Saturday and Sunday. This has been changed to a charge of 50p every night from 8pm to 8am with the exception of Saturday night when the charge will run from 10pm to 8am Sunday morning. There will also be a concession of 50p to pensioners at all times.

King John's Castle To Open July 1st

King's John's Castle is due to be opened to the public on July 1st with tour guides to go in this week for training. In a tour of the circa 12th Century castle by the Dungarvan Urban Councillors details of the refurbishment of the barracks were set out.

The former military and Garda barracks, which dates from the early part of the 18th Century, has been turned into an interpretive centre. This centre will have touch screen computers and literature available in the three exhibition rooms upstairs. The barracks will feature an office for employees, two canteens and lifts for the disabled or the elderly. Despite these renovations, the original timber and walls have been kept.

The exhibition rooms boast distinctive views of the quay and of the higher portions of the castle itself.

More work is due to be carried out on the castle and the central tower will be re-roofed.

A budget of £500,000 was spent on the restoration of the barracks and castle with a further £120,000 earmarked for the castle under the Urban and Village Renewal Scheme.

Date For Annual Meeting Set

The date for the annual meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council has been fixed for the 9th of July. This date coincides with Waterford County Council's annual meeting. A date as close to the County Council's annual meeting, though not on the same day, was hoped for, by the Chairman of the Urban Council Cllr. Michael O'Riordan.

With this in mind a number of dates were sought around the 9th of July. But, due to absences of councillors through holidays no other date was deemed suitable.

It is expected that this meeting will take place at the usual time of 7.30pm

Bandstand Seriously In Need Of Repair

The Bandstand in the town park is seriously in need of repair and work needs to be carried out before winter for fear it will be adversely affected by weather conditions, Councillor Damien Geoghegan claimed.

This statement came after a report by Town Clerk Brian White which was released to the councillors stating the allocation Dungarvan will get under the Urban and Village Renewal Programme.

King John's Castle will receive £120,000 while the Bandstand, which has fallen into disrepair in recent years, will receive £80,000. These allocations will be made during the period of 2001-2006 and in answer to Councillor Geoghegan's question, the County Manager said they are going to tender at present for the repair work and they hope the work is carried out as soon as possible.

Councillor Damien Dillon was disappointed to see the pond was not included under the allocations but "it was a matter of priority" according to Mr. Connolly, what work was carried out first.

Clean Up Campaigns

The Dungarvan Urban Council will run a number of initiatives to clean up locations around the town, the County Manager Donal Connolly said in answer to a question from Councillor Teresa Wright.

The Council will provide gloves and other equipment necessary to clean out the harbour of trolleys, baskets and bicycles, clean the railway line, clean the parks, the beaches, the square and all other streets and use the gumbuster on pavements around the town.

A number of groups will be involved in the clean-up effort. These will include personnel from the Urban Council, the Ard Scoil na Deise pupils, the Vocational Education Committee, the Dungarvan Boxing Club, St. Mary's Primary School, Urban Councillors, various Estate Committees and local Supermarkets.

The clean-up events have already begun since Tuesday 19th of June and will be coordinated by Jim Landers, the Anti-litter Supervisor.

Work Carried Out At Geal Gua Estate

The issue of allegedly sub-standard work carried out by the developer of Geal Gua estate was raised for the second week running at the Urban Council.

It was claimed previously that the developer had left roads unfinished and had badly constructed gullies and footpaths as well as a number of other complaints and the residents wanted work to be carried out to a satisfactory standard before the end of August.

It has now been revealed by the County Manager Donal Connolly that the developer in question is back working on the estate. Work being carried out includes lighting and the placing of a stop sign at the entrance to the estate.

The work is also being carried out to a satisfactory degree according to Town Engineer Joe Brennan who was answering a query by Fine Gael Councillor Damien Geoghegan.

Draft Litter Management Plan Discussed

Dungarvan Urban Council has prepared a Litter Management Plan for 2001. It has already been running a joint Litter and Environmental Programme with Waterford County Council over the past few years.

This has proved beneficial in terms of improved litter performance and especially the involvement of young people, according to Town Clerk Brian White.

The Draft Plan is on display and submissions have been invited up to July 13th.

Dungarvan has entered the 2001 Tidy Towns Competition and Council Staff and many Residents Associations are said to be busy keeping the town clean.

Waterford Glass, Dungarvan have sponsored environmental improvements at The Spring Roundabout to the sum of £5,000 and other projects are underway.

In an effort to encourage more individual action, the Dungarvan Urban Council will sponsor awards for best garden, best shopfront, best hanging baskets, best commercial/industrial premises, most improved area and best use of the Irish language.

Judging on these competitions will take place between 21st of June and July 31st 2001.

Date Set For Opening Of Walton Park Playground

Work on the playground which had been originally proposed by Cllr. Billy Kyne in February of this year will be completed by Friday 6th of July.

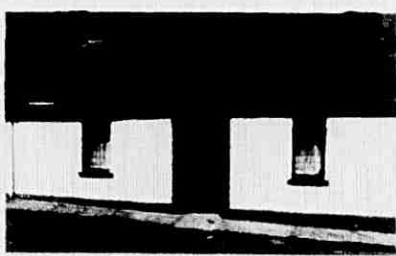

FESTIVAL OF YOUTH 2001

On Saturday night, June 16th, the youth of the Parish of Abbeyside, Ballinroad and Garranbane, gathered in the Carmelite Convent, Tallow to present and partake in the Festival of Youth in honour of St. Therese of Lisieux.

This Festival of Youth took the form of an All-night Vigil commencing at 11.00 pm on Saturday night and ending at 4.15 am on Sunday morning with concelebrated Mass to greet the dawn. The Festival's extensive Programme was co-ordinated by Fr. Martin Keogh, C.C. who was assisted by a committee which consisted of members from the various secondary schools and youth groups of the Diocese, and included Abbeyside Parishioners, Deirdre Collender, Deirdre Moore and Jonathan O'Donovan.

The Vigil commenced at 11.00 p.m. with singing from the combined choir, under the leadership of Deirdre Collender, who co-ordinated the music for the vigil, and followed with a Pageant 'Shower of Roses'. A solemn candlelight procession around the Convent grounds then took place, led by two students from St. Augustine's College strewing rose petals, in front of a statue of St. Therese also being carried by students of the College.

During the procession, the students maintained a candlelight Guard of Honour around the statue. The people then proceeded around the grounds, while the choir sang, and then entered the chapel where they venerated the relics of St. Therese. Throughout the night, the programme included music rendered by Carrick-On-Suir Folk Group, the pupils of Ard Scoil na nDéise recited the poem 'My Joy' by St. Therese accompanied by the group Cul Ceol.

St. Augustine's College then performed a drama, which involved 14 students, based on the life of St. Therese, as a young child, entitled 'Mysterious Illness'. Sr. Elizabeth then gave a reflection on the life of Mary, which was followed by Fr. Keane's Prayer of Healing which included singing and testimonies from his Youth Group.

The Festival concluded with concelebrated Mass at 4.15 a.m., at which the Chief Celebrant was Fr. Martin Keogh, C.C. TAXES

An interesting view of commercial life in the town of Dungarvan appears in a document that dates from 1282. This details what the burgesses or citizens of the town paid that year to the Crown.

First of all, they paid £13 17s. 4d. as individual taxpayers. For the use of four mills they paid the annual fee of £28 13s. 4d. They also paid £1 a year for the "prisage of fish," a tax on fish, and a similar sum for the "prisage of beer." There was also a six shillings annual charge for permission to fish in the "Pool." This was the expanse of water between the town and Abbeyside, which was the Sáilln, already referred to in a previous article.

The prosperity of Dungarvan and Abbeyside at this time is evident from a list of subsidies granted to the King of England in 1295 to pursue his wars against the Scots. The city of Waterford gave 100 marks, that is 1,333 shillings. Affane paid 100 shillings but Dungarvan paid in kind with 15 hundred of fish valued at 2,000 shillings.

This was a rather large donation indeed but for these times. Furthermore, the importance of the fisheries in the economy of the locality appears in this statistic for the first time.

PAPAL TAXATION

The Papal taxation exacted by Pope Nicholas IV in 1302 gives the value of the church revenues in the various parishes. Dungarvan parish is mentioned and its revenues came to £26 10s. 4d. The parish of Kilrush was worth £3 in revenues compared to this, which seems to underline the decline of the earlier settlement. The tax to be paid to the pope was calculated as a tenth of these sums. Other parishes in the district that paid the tax were Ardmore worth £8, Lisgenan (Grange) £5, Kilgobinet £5 6s. 8d., Whitechurch £8, Clonea £3 and Kilrossanty £7 10s.

RECENT DEATHS

LATE MR. JOHN MORRISSEY

A wave of sadness was cast over the entire district with the news of the death of Mr. John Morrissey, Knockavannagh, Ballymacarbry and formerly of Lisnatubrid, Ballypatrick, Clonmel, which sad event took place suddenly on Friday 15th June.

Deceased in his early seventies was a member of an old established family highly respected in the farming community. An outstanding farmer in the district where he took over from his late uncle Michael some fifty years ago. A member of a family with strong republican views his late uncle Sean was one of the outstanding members of the 3rd Tipperary Brigade, Old IRA, while his uncle Geff was also a member of the 3rd Tipperary Brigade IRA, while his cousin Sean Morrissey was Commandant of the 7th Waterford Brigade who died accidentally on the 12th May 1922.

He was a man of outstanding qualities who possessed a wonderful warm personality and made friends with ease, anybody who ever called to his house were made feel truly welcome, for he was a caring neighbour abounding in Christian charity who made an immediate and lasting impression by virtue of his courteous and easy going nature which endeared him to all. A very devout person he attended Mass in Clonmel every Sunday and on his return he attended his farm chores.

He was a great supporter of local fundraising projects. His demise leaves a void in the district that cannot be filled, for he was a fine type of gentleman who never uttered a harsh word about anybody, and his demise has evoked feelings of sincere regret among his family, neighbours and friends.

The measure of the esteem and high regard in which deceased and his family are held was clearly indicated by the large and representative concourse of mourners who were present on Sunday evening when his remains after the rosary was recited by Rev. Fr. Colum O'Brien C.C. S.S. Peter and Paul's, Clonmel were removed from Fennessy's Funeral Home, Clonmel to the Parish Church of Saint Mary's, Touraneena where they were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Paddy Hallinan, retired foreign mission.

On Monday morning the feast of Saint Marcus and Marcellianus (Martyrs) requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his eternal soul. The celebrant was Rev. Fr. Cornelius Kelleher P.P., assisted by Rev. Fr. Paddy Hallinan. After Mass as the June rains descended down a kind and loving man was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery. Fr. Kelleher P.P. officiated at the graveside in the presence of another large concourse of mourners paying their final respects to a Christian friend whose memory they will treasure. Fr. Hallinan recited a decade of the rosary.

The death of a popular young man last weekend is the second tragedy to strike a south Tipperary family in five weeks. Patrick (Pat) Fitzgerald from Killanure,

Ballylooby died on the 17th June when he was a passenger in a car involved in a collision with another vehicle at Sagart village in Dublin. Pats uncle Gerry Coffey of Castlegrace also died tragically at the beginning of May after he suffered a brain tumour.

Mr. Coffey who had lived for some years in America returned home to Castlegrace a few days before his death.

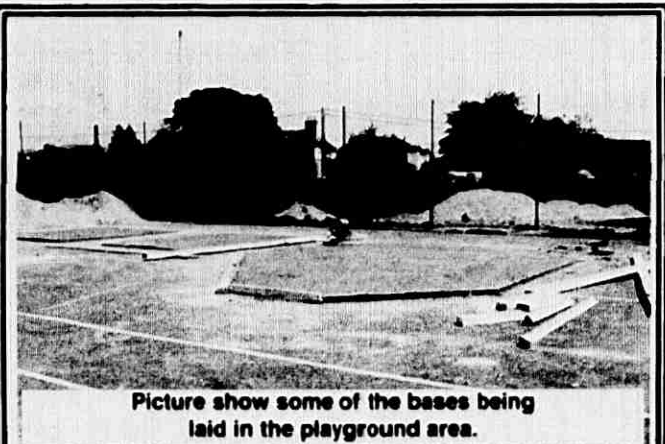

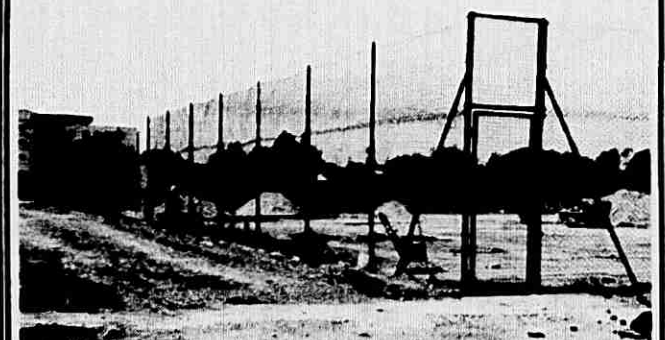


Picture show some of the bases being laid in the playground area.

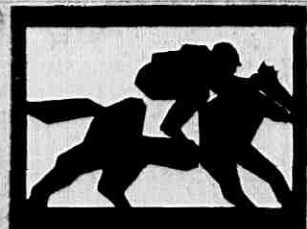

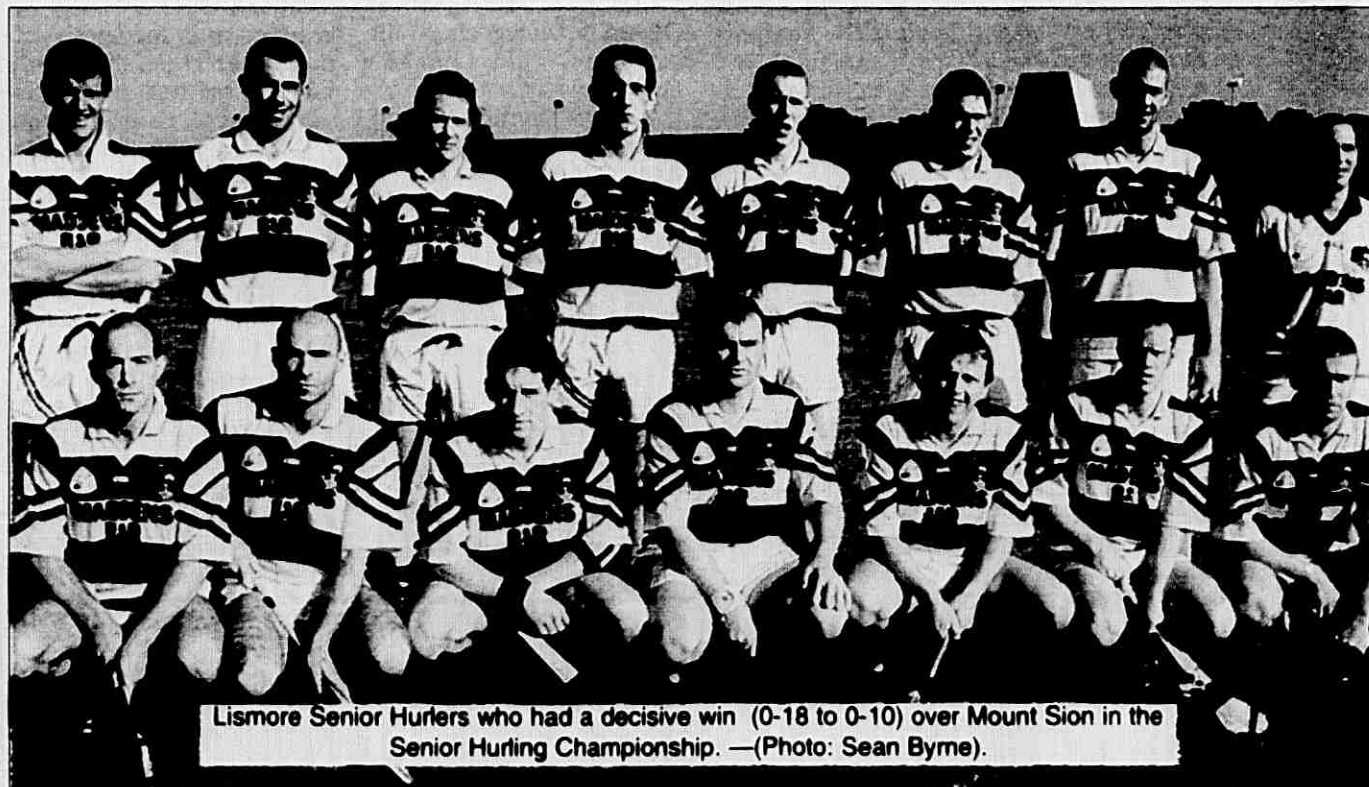

PETER O'CONNOR GAMES WATERFORD

On August 5th 1901 in Dublin Peter O'Connor set a new world Long Jump record of 24 feet 11 3/4 inches which stood for a quarter of a century and as an Irish record for over ninety years. He won the Triple Jump at the Olympics in 1906.

On the centenary of his world record achievement in the Long Jump on Sunday August 9th the Peter O'Connor Games will be staged in the Regional Sports Centre in Waterford starting at 2 pm. 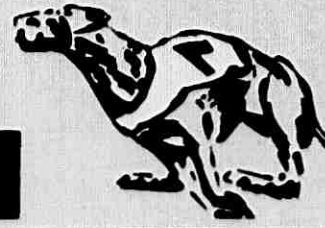

Kilmacow owner Annie Harney and her trainer Perry Aylward combined to capture the third contest with debutante Annies Star this October 99 son of Some Gamble and Pure Penny coming back a second time to score in 29.34. Breaking well 2/1 chance Annies Star gave way near the first bend to Pals Official. Pals Official was still in front down to the third bend where Annies Star made a bid to come through on the inside of the leader. A gap eventually came for the persistent Annies Star who went on to score by a length in a tight finish.

Clonskea Rocket (He Knows-Fethard Vixen) 3/1 ran out a clear cut winner of the fourth event for County Kilkenny owner Breda Dunphy in a career best 29.27. The always prominent Clonskea Rocket was pushed all the way down to the penultimate turn by Savana Springer but when the latter was carried wide by Jeffys Sara who incurred the wrath of the stewards Clonskea Rocket galloped clear for a comfortable four and a half lengths win over the unlucky Savana Stinger.

Winning form lines were pretty scarce amongst the six contestants in the sixth but the D Green owned Kylies Honcho (Top Honcho-Kylies Quest) did manage to register two victories at Reading in the U.K.

Now in the care of Foulksmills trainer Harry Seery Kylies Honcho was duly dispatched as the 6/4 favourite and securing a nice run up the rails early on the favourite quickly headed Maple Flag. Rightful

Banbh made sound late headway from the rear of the field but Kylies Honcho was gone beyond recall winning out by a length and a half in 29.65.

The run of favourites continued in the seventh event as 5/4 chance Kobyashe (Dew Reward-Springmount Dame) the 5/4 market leader ran away from the opposition in 29.51. We wish Tom many years of happy retirement and thank him for the important role he has played in the community.

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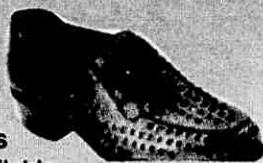
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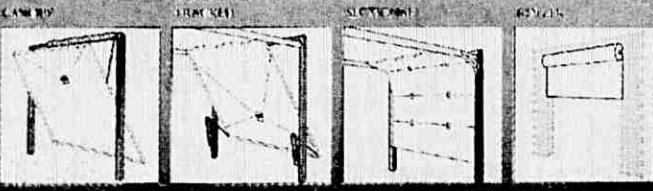
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
