Planning Permission For Knockmealdown Wind Farm Overturned

In the third instalment of a long running saga involving the Knockmealdown Mountains, An Bord Pleanála has ruled against the development of a Wind Farm, near the Vee, Cappoquin.

Planning permission had been granted to Edward Sheehan of D.P. Energy Limited - a Co. Cork based firm - by Waterford County Council late last year. However, soon afterwards, an appeal was launched against it by the Peaks Mountaineering Club and the Knockmealdown Protection Committee.

In their appeal the two organisations stated that the project would prove destructive to the natural beauty of

Developments In Store For Tallow And Lismore Libraries

PROPOSAL FOR MOBILE LIBRARY UNITS ABANDONED

A proposal to reintroduce mobile library units into the county has been dropped by the Library Committee, on the recommendation of County Librarian Donald Brady.

The aim for the mobile units was to deliver books to those in rural areas at various stop-off points around the county - a service which was first discontinued by the current County Librarian 15 years ago.

When the service was discarded originally it was due

to other projects which were in the pipeline including the much needed modernisation of facilities. The current decision appears to be based on the same premise, as on this occasion the Committee were given the choice between the mobile units or the updating of libraries in Tallow and Lismore.

The County Librarian told the Committee that while the full price of the mobile units would have been granted, the cost of recruiting the librarians needed, and

the provision of a stock of books, would have to be provided. TURN TO PAGE 7

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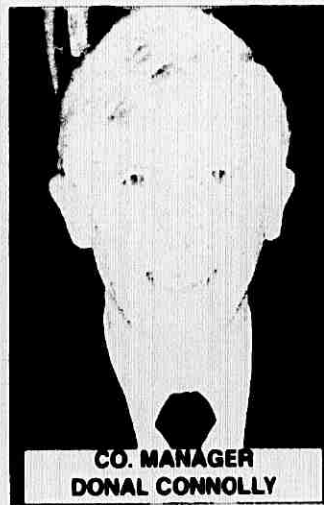

Co. Manager Fails In Bid To Withdraw Undertaking To High Court

The appeal case in the High Court against the placing of a landfill in Garrynagree has taken yet another twist. Earlier in the week Waterford County Manager Donal Connolly applied to withdraw an undertaking he gave to the High Court in February of this year. This undertaking stated that Waterford County Council would not apply for a waste licence for the proposed landfill at Garrynagree until legal proceedings brought by a local resident, Ms Ann Hogan, had been determined.

However circumstances changed for the worst for Waterford County Council when earlier this month the Environmental Protection Agency refused to grant a waste license for Dungarvan's landfill in Ballinamuck.

While Mr. Connolly has appealed this decision Waterford County Council are actively seeking other alternatives if the appeal

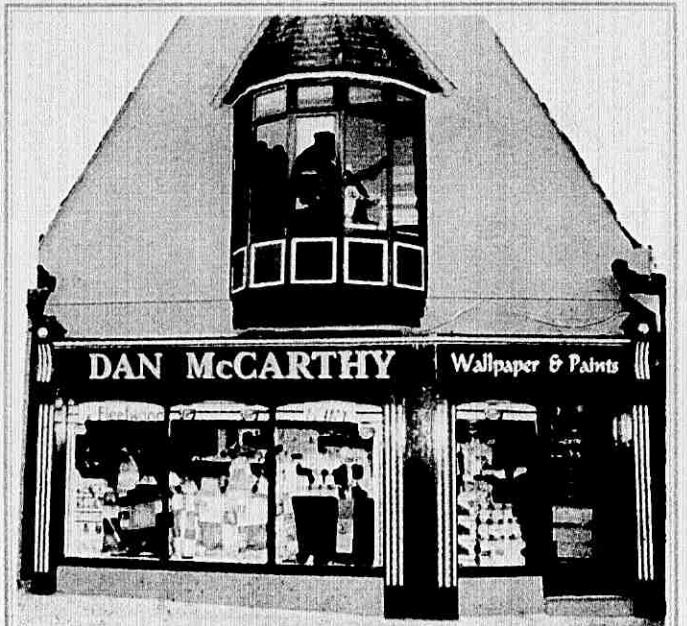

does not succeed.

The siting of a landfill in the Garrynagree area is seen as the best option but Mr. Justice Herbert refused the application on the grounds that it was "ill-founded, not proven and based on a false premise".

He also awarded all costs of the application hearing to Ms Hogan, although this is subject to a 21-day stay to allow for any appeal.

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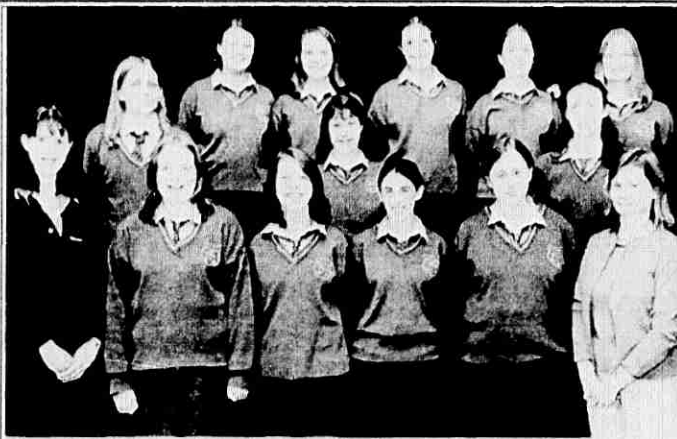
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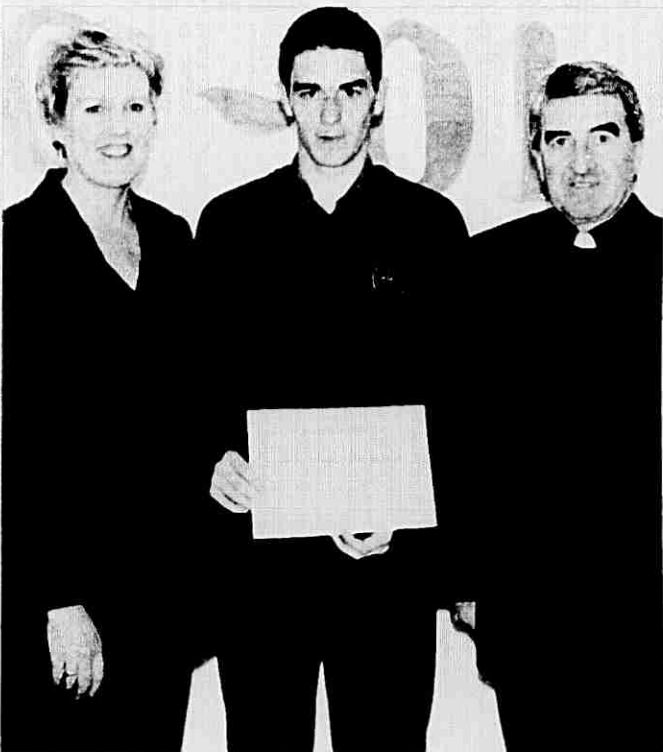

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Waterford County Council To Be Hit By £450,000 Waste Levy

Waterford County Council is to be charged an additional £450,000 waste bill as part of a countrywide landfill levy passed by the Dail last week. This follows the introduction of a controversial Waste Management Bill which puts an obligation on County Councils to pay a levy to the Government of £15 per tonne of waste going to landfill.

As Waterford County Council distributes an estimated 15,000 tonnes to its Dungarvan landfill and a further 15,000 tonnes to Tramore landfill the total cost to the local authority will come to around £450,000. Further responsibility is then put on the

County Councils to recover their costs.

To do this, Waterford County Council will have to pass the charges onto households and industrial users of the landfill and raise its bin charges, in turn, by at least £15. The rises are unlikely to stop there. A provision in the bill allows for a further increase of 5 euros a year for the following years.

The Government hope that these levies will reduce the amount of waste going to landfills that are almost at their capacity. Indeed Dungarvan's landfill in Ballinamuck has already been declared full by the Environmental Protection Agency though this is subject

to an appeal by County Manager Donal Connolly.

The bill will also be responsible for a charge placed on plastic bags, which if they are used at the same rate as now, will net the Government a £150 million windfall.

The bill is seen as a further incentive for County Councils to begin their recycling programmes. In this regard Waterford County Council is one of the most advanced, having already announced that kerbside collections of recyclable's is to begin in the next couple of months.

However, the new Waste Management Bill has already been strongly criticised by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair because

the bill states that County Managers will be given extra powers to implement waste management plans if councilors fail to introduce its measures. The levies, so, will ultimately lie in the hands of the County Manager should Waterford's elected councillors refuse to implement them.

New Web-site To Provide One Million Records Of Local Interest

A new library web-site is to be launched by the Minister of the Environment Noel Dempsey on September 4th.

This site will include details of community groups, link's to national organisations, a register of electors and a library catalogue. Information about a persons fines and overdue books will also be available on the site although this is subject to the entering of a private password.

Historians and those who are

putting together a family tree will be interested in the other aspects - the death register, details of war memorials and grave memorials as well as maps and a file of newspapers.

Indeed, it is estimated that there will be a total of 1 million records which will be of interest to various groups in doing research of a community or personal nature though how this will co-exist with a persons right to their privacy remains to be seen.

The target group for this information are schools and those in rural communities though it can be foreseen to be a huge resource for tourists tracing their heritage and their relatives.

As yet it is not known for sure where the web-site will be launched but it is thought that it will be in Tramore library as Minister Dempsey will, on the same day, be officially opening the new fire station in the town.

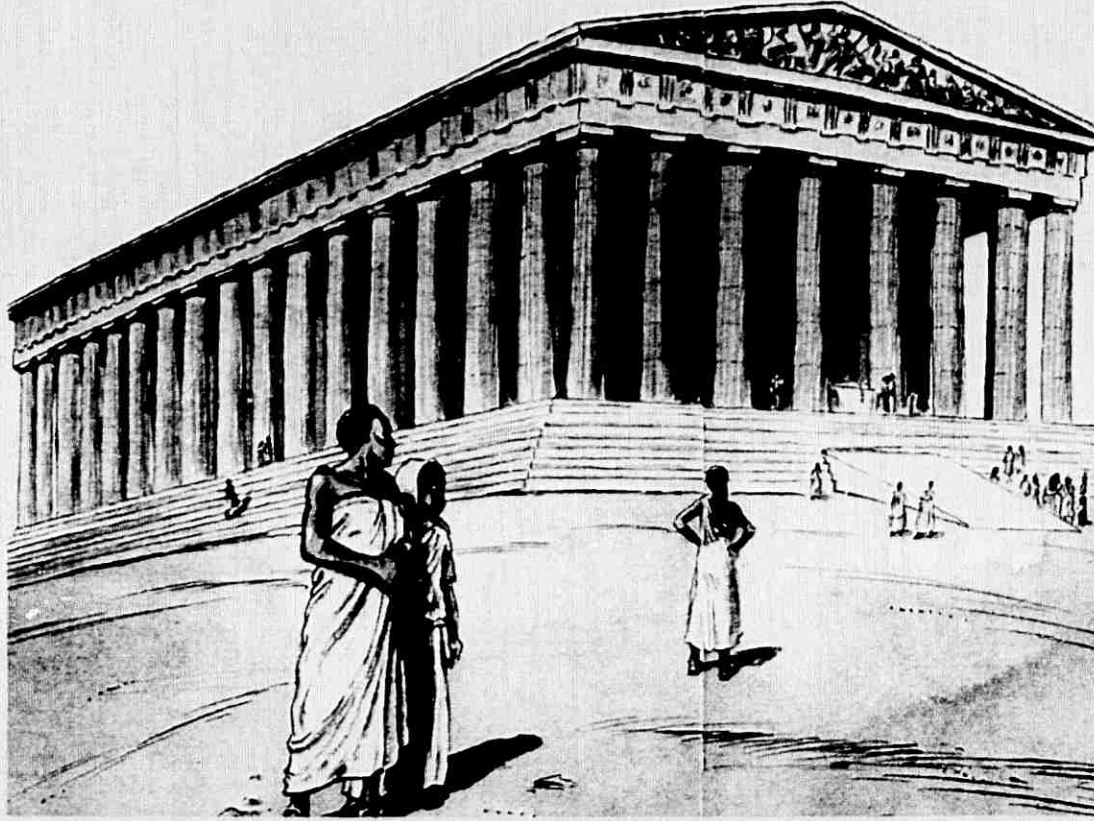

THE PARTHENON

The glittering white marble temple known as the Parthenon was dedicated to Athene, guardian goddess of the Greek city - state of Athens. It was built between 448 and 432 BC on top of the Acropolis, a high cliff-fortress in the centre of Athens and was part of a grand rebuilding scheme planned by General Pericles (495-429 BC) after the Persians had invaded.

Pericles was the leading Athenian statesman who encouraged science, learning and the arts and wanted to make Athens the most beautiful city in Greece.

The parthenon housed a gold and ivory statue of the goddess Athene. Every four years, the people of Athens held a ceremony to present the goddess with a new robe, called a peplos.



ALEXANDER THE GREAT

Alexander the Great (356-323 BC), king of Macedon, was a brave and brilliant army commander who had ambitions to rule the world.

After conquering Greece and the mighty Persian empire, he led his army on a long march across (about 30,000 km.) across Central Asia to India and back.

This journey took over 10 years, and helped spread Greek language, art and ideas over a very wide area.

Alexander died of a fever aged only 33. His empire was divided among his generals after his death.

Planning Permission For Knockmealdown Wind Farm Overturned

the area, and that it would take away from the scenic walking route through the Knockmealdowns.

Waterford County Council had, already, twice granted planning permission for Wind Masts - both of which were overruled by An Bord Pleanála. But, in this, the third attempt by an individual developer, a Wind Farm was granted permission with certain conditions attached.

The Wind Farm itself was to include 12 wind turbines, of which, four were to be 60 metres high with the remaining eight turbines, 40 metres in height. The rotors which make up a large part of the wind farm machinery were to have a diameter of no larger than 62 metres - conditions which D.P.

Energy agreed to.

However, despite the conditions which were set down, An Bord Pleanála ruled against the natural energy project on a number of grounds.

Firstly, they stated that permission for the wind project was contrary to the County's own Development Plan, as this plan states that the Vee area, is a designated "Scenic Landscape".

Indeed, the board felt that not alone could the wind turbines affect the view of Waterford residents, but also those in Tipperary. One area which particularly concerned An Bord Pleanála was the proximity of the Wind Farm to an area of "Primary Amenity Value" in the neighbouring county.

The ruling states, as well, that

had the development gone ahead, "it would have seriously injured the scenic and natural amenities of the area".

A fourth reason, which took its lead specifically from the mountaineering club, was that the proposed wind farm would detract from the features of an important walking route.

And finally, An Bord Pleanála believed, that had they ruled in favour of the Wind Farm, this would have set an "undesirable precedent" for developments of a similar nature in the Knockmealdowns.

Responding to the ruling the Chairman of the Knockmealdown Protection Committee, Mr. Willie O'Donnell, said that it echoes the views put forward by the Protection Committee. He also said that it strongly suggests that it (An Bord Pleanála) is never going to sanction industrial development in the Knockmealdowns.

He feels that those who wish to develop wind farms or other developments in the mountain range should take note of the decision, as should Waterford County Council.

However, the County Manager, Donal Connolly said that he would not be in a position to preclude any application on that particular mountain range. All applications will be dealt with on their own merits, he said.

Mr. Connolly stated that the Wind Farm application was

seen as an attractive form of development as it is a clean natural energy.

Also, while an area that is designated as a "Scenic Landscape" needed careful development, the County Manager said, that it did not preclude development altogether.

Meanwhile, DP Energy, which was originally a Environmental Charity Group, who are now pursuing a policy of actively promoting wind energy, have stated their disappointment at the An Bord Pleanála decision.

Maureen De Piepro, one of the main organisers within the group - which already have three such wind farms in operation in Ireland - said that they changed the layout of the wind farm to meet the criteria set down by Waterford County Council. When this was done, she said, the Wind Turbines had a very limited visibility and would not have been seen at all from Tipperary.

Mrs. De Piepro also said it would be difficult to re-apply for planning permission in the Knockmealdowns, as they "do not know what criteria An Bord Pleanála is using to make their decisions on wind farms."

Concluding Mrs. De Piepro said there is a great need for wind energy developments of this kind to abate the use of Carbon Dioxide - which is said to be the cause of Global Warming.

Developments In Store For Tallow And Lismore Libraries

It was estimated that this would come to a cost somewhere in the region of £200,000 - £250,000 which would, in turn, adversely affect the development of the current libraries.

These developments will take place in Tallow library and the Library Headquarters in Lismore.

The historic library building in Tallow will see a complete rewiring and the introduction of internet facilities. It is also expected that Tallow library will be purchased back off the Credit Union - a move welcomed by Tallow Cllr. James Tobin.

The Library Headquarters, meanwhile, are due to be moved into the old Christian Brothers School in the town. This building will now hold the area office (on the ground floor), and the new library on the two higher stories. Work on this project will be carried out on a 12 month contract.

A further incentive to drop the mobile units plan was given in the shape of an expanded schools service.

In previous years the schools service delivered books where as now they will also circulate and order books teachers request for their students. This service may be expanded to include the elderly and those who do not have their own transport.

It was also argued that the present libraries provide for the majority of the public and that people are now more mobile than in previous years.

However, this point was disputed by Cllr. Ciarán O'Riain who said the Nire region did not have a library of its own and so people had to travel to Clonmel or the 16 miles to Cappoquin.

In the end, though, the option to develop the libraries and expand the schools service was proposed by Cllr. James Tobin and seconded by Cappoquin Cllr. Nora Flynn and was passed unanimously.

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Recipes



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1 onion, thinly sliced
1 clove garlic, peeled and crushed
185g mushrooms, sliced
3 tbspens tomato paste
425g can tomatoes, roughly chopped
1 beef stock cube
1 cup water
1 tspn dried basil or 1 tbspn fresh basil, finely chopped
2 tbspens parsley, finely chopped

1 tspn sugar
Salt and pepper
Black olives

Method:

HEAT oil in frying pan and fry the sausages until golden brown all over - about 6-8 minutes.

Remove from pan and drain on absorbent paper. Pour excess oil from pan, leaving about 2 tbspens in pan.

Return pan to the heat, add onion and garlic and fry until onion has softened slightly but not browned - about 3 minutes.

Add mushrooms and fry until they just begin to wilt and juice runs from them - about 2 minutes.

Add tomato paste, tomatoes, stock cube, water, basil, parsley and sugar. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Bring to the boil, lower heat and simmer uncovered for 15



minutes, stirring occasionally. Return sausages to the pan with the olives and simmer for a further 5 minutes.

Hearty Bread and Butter Pud

THIS is a simple but filling desert for people with hearty appetites.

Ingredients:

(Serves 6)
300ml (1/2 pint) single cream and 300ml milk or 600 ml (1 pint) milk
4 thin slices of day-old white bread
50g (2oz) sultanas
25g (1oz) mixed peel (optional)
Grated rind of 1 lemon
50g (2oz) butter, preferably unsalted
2 eggs
2 egg yolks
25g (1oz) sugar
1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg
1/2 tablespoon jelly (ie shredless) marmalade, heated

Method:

Butter the slices of bread and cut each into four triangles. Place a layer of

bread in the base of a buttered one-litre (about two-pint) pie dish.

Sprinkle the sultanas, the mixed peel, if using, and grated lemon rind over the top and cover with the remaining bread triangles.

Beat the cream, if using, with the milk, eggs, egg yolks and sugar.

Strain the mixture over the bread. Set aside to stand for 30 minutes.

Grate a little nutmeg over the surface and bake in a preheated oven, 180°C (350°F, gas mark 4), for 30-40 minutes.

When the pudding is cooked, remove it from the oven and brush the hot marmalade over the top. Serve hot.

Many people enjoy this dish with custard or cream, but ice cream is also a delicious accompaniment.

CHINESE SOUP WITH MEATBALLS

THIS Oriental starter is almost a meal in itself.

Ingredients:

(Serves 2)
Meatballs
250g lean minced pork
2 salad onions, finely chopped
30ml light soy sauce
5ml sesame oil
5ml fresh root ginger, peeled and finely grated
30ml light soy sauce
Soup
600ml chicken stock
1ml Chinese Five Spice powder
10ml grated root ginger
1 red pepper cored, deseeded and thinly sliced
50g medium egg noodles
50g bean sprouts
3 Chinese leaves, shredded
2 salad onions, trimmed and shredded
30ml freshly chopped coriander

Method:

Mix together all of the meatball ingredients except the oil, then form into 12-16 balls the size of large marbles.

Heat the oil in a large saucepan, add the meatballs, and cover and fry in two batches for 6 minutes each batch. Lift out and drain on kitchen paper.

Pour the stock into the saucepan, then stir in the Five Spice powder, ginger, soy sauce and red pepper. Cover and simmer for 5 minutes.

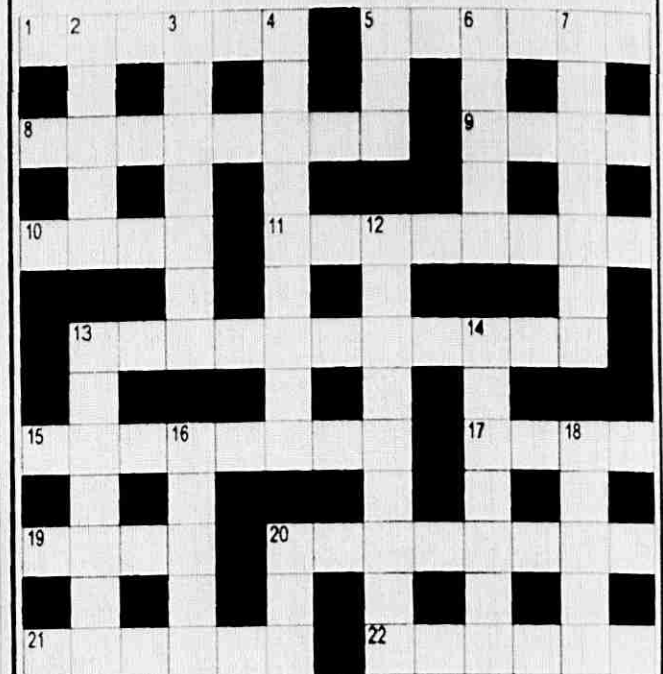
Place the noodles in a bowl, then pour over boiling water and leave to soak for 5 minutes.

Return the meatballs to the saucepan with the bean sprouts, Chinese leaves, salad onions and chopped coriander, then cook for 4 minutes.

Pile noodles into large soup bowls, top with the meatballs, vegetables and soup and garnish with coriander.

Health Tips from "Remedies"

Hayfever and the Remedy for you

Gelsemium

Gelsemium sempervirens, Yellow Jasmine. This remedy is probably most commonly used to relieve flu and cold symptoms and therefore has a use to treat hayfever where the patient shows flu like symptoms, particularly with tired, aching limbs.

Nat. mur.

Common salt, Sodium chloride. Commonly used for migraine symptoms, particularly where the sinuses are involved. Applied to hayfever these patients tend to have copious catarrh and sneezing.

Nux. Vomica

Poison nut. The nut contains Strychnine, a powerful poison of the central nervous system. Used to treat hayfever symptoms with excessive irritation of the nose, eyes and face.

Pulsatilla

Pulsatilla nigricans, pasque flower. Pulsatilla symptoms are usually characterised by thick discharge and in the case of hayfever a thick catarrh like discharge would be evident.

Silicea

Silica. This remedy is usually associated with problems centred on the head, and especially involving the sinuses. Silicea hayfever shows a blocked, stuffy nose, often with symptoms worse in the morning.

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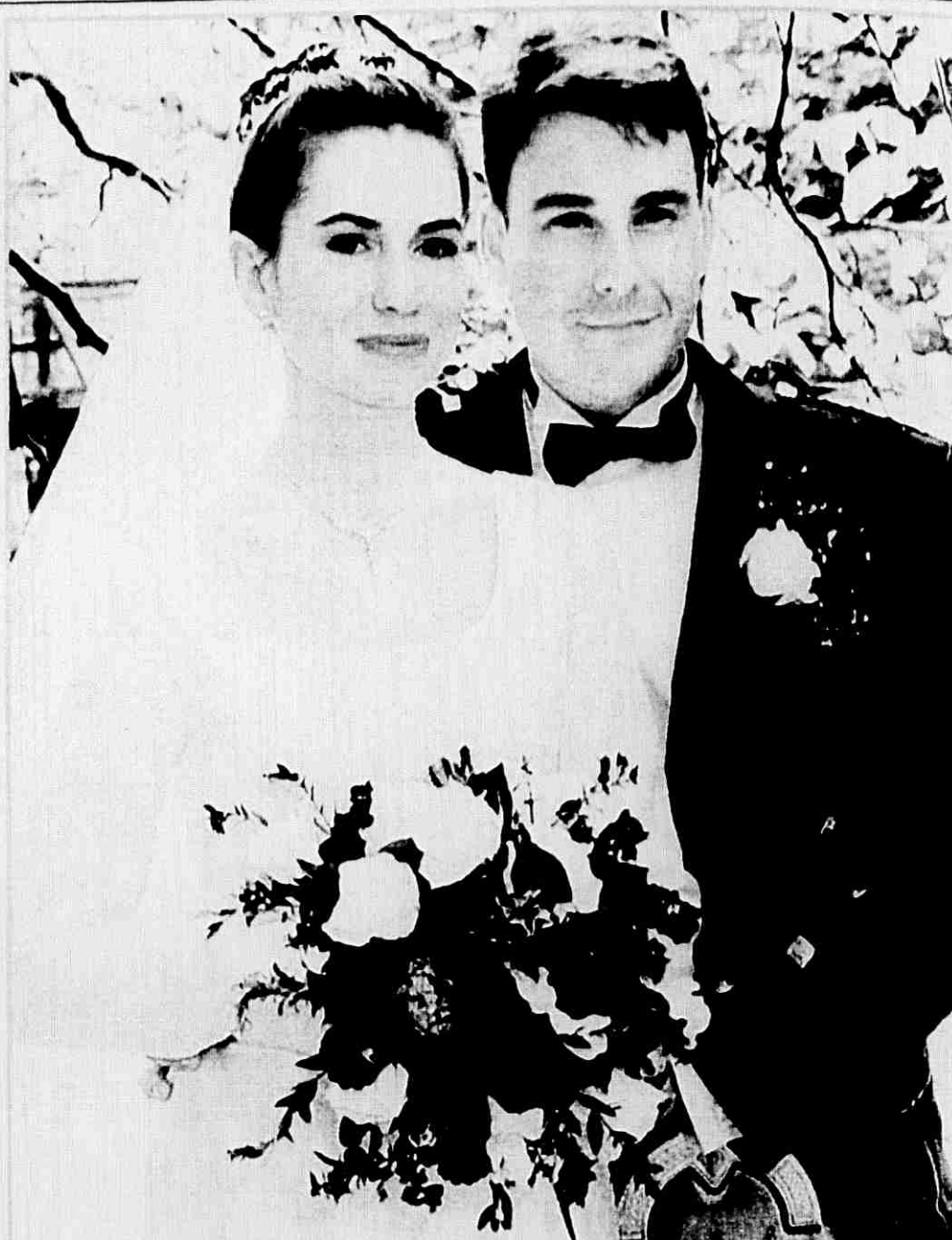

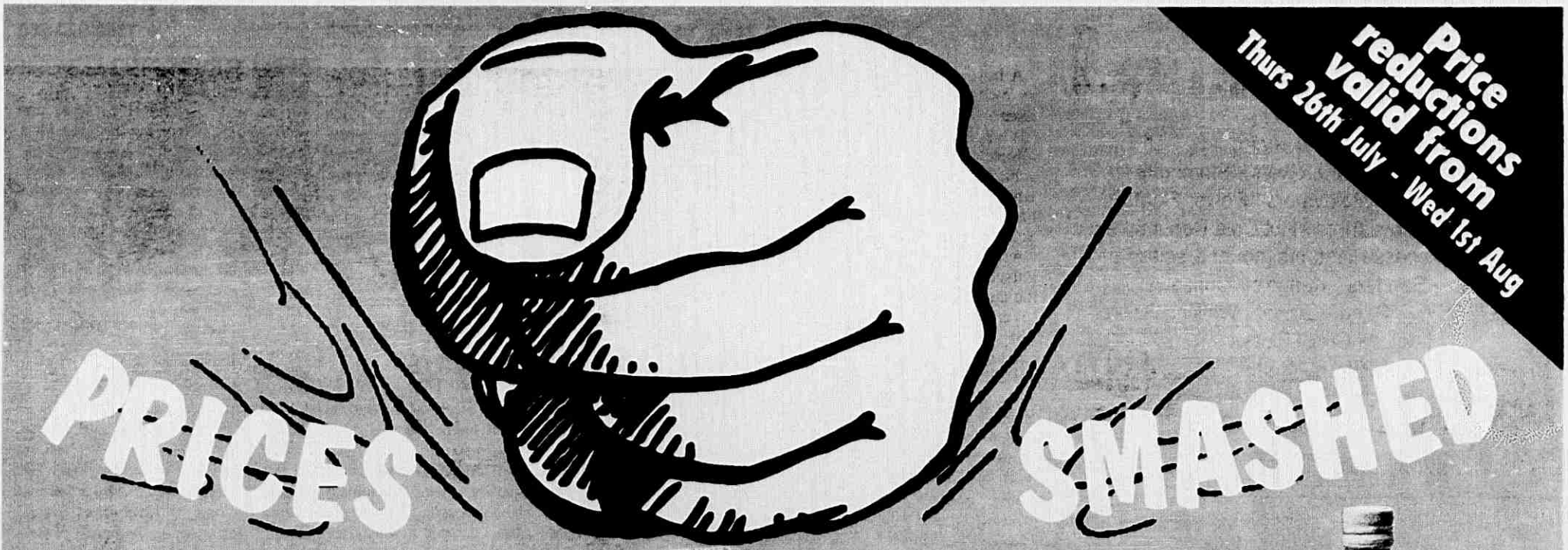

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Bringing Your Garden To Life

A great way to bring wildlife into your garden is to build a pond.

No matter how small, the water will attract frogs, newts, toads and dragonflies.

With a PVC or butyl rubber liner you can create your pool where koi, Japanese carp, could provide a flash of gold to the scenery.

Depending on what type of garden you have, the idea can be extended to include a waterfall, a fountain, a water spout or watercourse. These options allow you to grow many plants that thrive in wet conditions.

Whatever you decide, an open sunny site is best away from overhanging trees - fallen leaves can cause nasty, smelly water when they are left to decompose.

Water brings an ever changing pattern of reflections, sound and movement that is appealing in a garden. There are also

many other decorative features the gardener can add for interest.

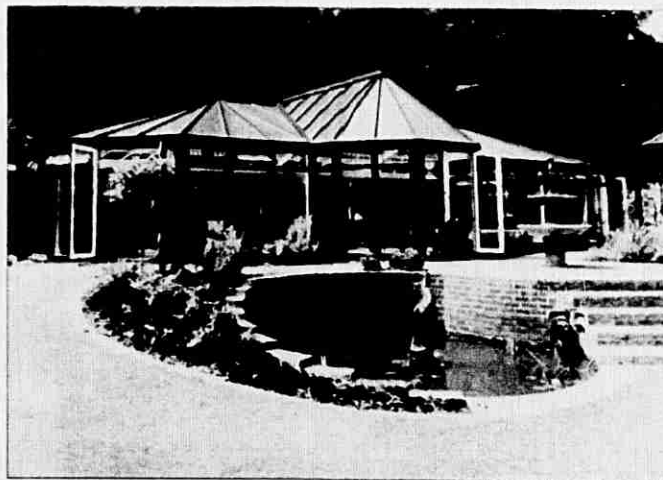
Why not try feeding the birds by adding a bird table and a bird bath to your garden.

Place them in sight of your window - and out of reach of cats - avoid overhanging branches or fences. You can help the bird population survive the winter with regular feeding - and keep entertained and cosy indoors while still enjoying your garden.

A herb garden is an excellent feature to build, you could try an old sink for your favourite herbs but make sure there is adequate drainage so it doesn't go soggy.

If you can get hold of an old cartwheel, it's a great shape for growing a selection of herbs. Sink it into the ground slightly and put slates beneath the spokes to prevent them rotting.

Similar shapes can be achieved with bricks or paving

stones embedded in the ground, grass paths or low growing hedges like box. These prevent the plants from overwhelming each other.

A sun dial, a small statue, and interesting shaped pots add an extra dimension to the garden landscape but if you are more of a plant fan, then why not try a rockery.

It can be very rewarding to grow the delicate looking alpine plants in the comfort of your own back garden - without having to climb distant mountains to

see them. And what better way to rest at the end of a hard day's gardening - sitting in your own arbour.

This can be as simple as a comfy garden chair under the shade of your favourite tree.

A more formal pergola or arch planted with climbing roses, honeysuckle and clematis, over a wooden or cast iron bench, set against a fence or wall, is another option.

Put your feet up, enjoy the results of your hardwork and smell the fragrance of those flowers.

This week in the garden

Lift tulip and hyacinth bulbs

Tulips and hyacinths will now have completed their growth and can be lifted and cleaned. Lay the bulbs in shallow trays and stand them in a dry, cool, airy place, but not in full sun. Dead tops can be removed.

Spray potatoes

Do not wait until disease attacks your potatoes, spray them now with Bordeaux mixture. The potato blight disease is common and some plants are likely to become infected unless you take this precaution.

Sow carrots

A small sowing of carrots made now is often justified, especially if the season happens to be a bad one for carrot fly. This fly does all its damage early in the summer, and seedlings from a July sowing usually escape. Sow stump rooted or intermediate varieties.

Complete thinning of apples and pears

Now is the time to complete the thinning of apples and

pears. Reduce the fruits to one, or at most two, per spur.

Finish planting celery

All remaining celery seedlings should now be planted out in the trenches as soon as possible. The last plants to be dealt with will be those from the April sowing in a frame.

Mulch and spray runner beans

Runner beans will benefit from a fairly thick mulch of well rotted manure spread on the ground for a distance of at least a couple of feet on either side of the row. When the plants begin to flower, spray them every evening with tepid water. This will help the flowers to 'set' and so ensure a good crop of beans. Keep this up all through the month and on into August.

Spray apples against Codlin moth

Repeat an application of one or other of the sprays recommended by the manufacturers and used in June.

POND POINTERS

- The centre should be three feet deep to be self sustaining and not stagnant, leave a ledge 12 to 18 ins deep and a similar width around the edge of the pond. Choose a liner with a ten year guarantee

- Avoid damage from sharp stones by covering the base with sand before fitting the liner
- Don't trim liner until the water is in
- Water should be left a fortnight before adding fish.

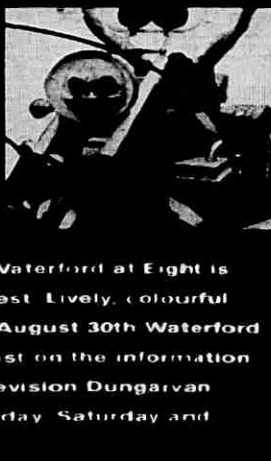
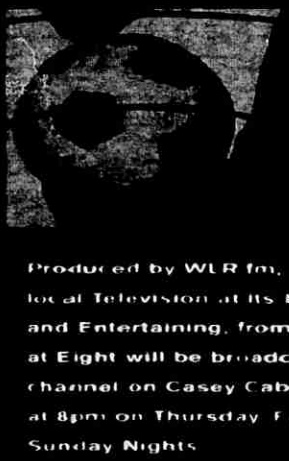

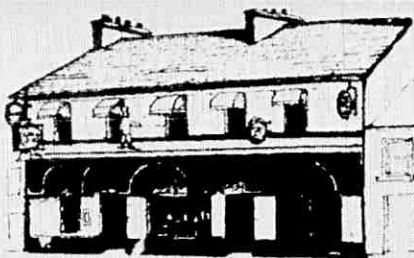

FARMING LEADER

Dairy Hygiene Grant Concessions Welcome But Should Be Extended

— IFA

IFA Waterford Rural Development Chairman, Mossie O'Connor has welcomed the decision of the Department of Agriculture to waive the pre-inspection process under the Dairy Hygiene Scheme for farmers who installed milk bulk tanks during the foot and mouth crisis earlier this year. Farmers who had applied for Bulk tank investment aid will now be paid grant aid for work carried out, subject to inspections which will take place shortly.

However Mr. O'Connor said this waiver needs to be extended to other on-farm investments which could not be deferred due to inspection delays.

Mr. O'Connor said the waiver only applies to bulk tanks but he is aware of cases where farmers had other developments to carry out including milking parlours and pollution control facilities. IFA is proposing that the waiver be extended to any farmer who made an application but had to proceed with work where the viability of the farm was under threat.

The IFA Waterford Rural Development Chairman is also calling on the Department of Agriculture to make urgent payments to farmers who carried out work under the National Farm Pollution Scheme. Many of these farmers have borrowed heavily to carry out such investments and the Department of Agriculture must make immediate payments.

FARM SAFETY — OUR RESPONSIBILITY

"Every farm household should obtain and read the new code of practice for the safety of children on farms". This was the advice of Mr. Pat O'Rourke at the launch of the "Code of Practice on Preventing Accidents to Children and Young Persons in Agriculture" by the Health and Safety Authority today. "Unfortunately, despite the highlighting of the dangers in the past by many groups, the number of injuries and deaths on farms is still unacceptably and tragically high".

"I am convinced that we all need constant reminding of the dangers on farms and the need to take a pro-active approach — particularly with regard to children and young people. With this in mind, I have decided that all notices of ICMSA meetings should carry the message 'Farm safety is your responsibility'." concluded Mr. O'Rourke.

The National Hill Farmers Association

DINGLE MEETING

A meeting of the National Hill Farmers Association took place at the Hill Grove Hotel, Dingle, on Tuesday night, July 17. There was a very large attendance (in the region of 250 people).

Junior Minister for Agriculture, Eamonn O Cuiiv TD, who was the main guest speaker, spoke at great length on the Area Based Headage Scheme. He is now aiming for £70 per hectare, up to 45 hectares, for Hill Farmers, rather than the previous agreement by the IFA of £45 per hectare. This is his goal for 2001. He hopes to improve that in 2002 and 2003. He also answered numerous questions that came in from the floor.

Reps 2 was another major topic that night, es-

pecially with £77 an acre being paid on commonage land, which was not the case in Repts. 1, also the acreage being increased from 100 acres to 300 acres, with a maximum payment of £9,500.

Other politicians present included Jackie Healy-Rae, TD, Cllr. Michael Healy-Rae and Senator Tom Fitzgerald. Jackie Healy-Rae gave a tremendous speech. He praised the officers of the NHFA for the great work they are doing for hill farmers.

Those who attended were very happy with the outcome of the meeting, which was chaired by John Devine, Co. Waterford, Chairman of the Association.

Ewe Premium Payments To Be Paid This Week

Following a meeting with Senior Officials in the Department of Agriculture on the long delay in the payment of this year's ewe premium, IFA National Sheep Committee Chairman Frank Corcoran said today, over 30,000 payments should be issued on Wednesday to flock owners.

Mr Corcoran said, as a result of strong protest from the IFA the Department of Agriculture have also written to producers who blood tested animals for FMD and subsequently received the incorrect accusing letter from the Department last week threatening their ewe premium payments. Mr Corcoran said "IFA will not tolerate the Department of Agriculture threatening sheep farmers with this type of contempt. Having railroaded producers into an over bureaucratic system of sheep tagging without having adequate tag supplies organised, the Department overstepped the mark with their threatening letter."

The sheep farmers leader said IFA pointed out to the Department that producers are fully entitled to sell sheep, on which they did not apply for premium, during the retention period. Mr Corcoran said "we also made it clear to the Department that the principle of using movement permit information to ascertain compliance with ewe premium retention was utterly flawed."

For the 8,000 odd producers who's payments are held up because of compliance checks, Mr Corcoran said the Department of Agriculture must make payment run every week until all these payments are fully made.

CLOSING DATE EXTENDED TO 14 SEPTEMBER FOR AID SCHEME FOR MARKETING AND PROCESSING OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS

The Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development Mr Joe Walsh TD, today announced that the closing date for receipt of completed applications for funding under the scheme of aid for the marketing and processing of agricultural products has been extended. The new closing date is Friday 14 September, 2001.

Under this scheme, 40% grant aid is available for capital projects which are intended to improve the marketing and processing of products in the horticulture, potato, eggs, grain and livestock sectors and which do not fall within the remit of the industrial development agencies or are not covered by the Department's on-farm schemes. A competitive selection process will apply.

Minister Walsh said that the time extension will facilitate potential applicants in submitting completed forms and business plans to the Department and will overcome delays being experienced in securing supporting documentation during holiday periods.

HANDLE SLURRY SAFELY

Fifteen people have drowned in slurry tanks over the last 10 years. Nine of these were children. All the deaths resulted from farmers having to lift slats in order to empty slurry tanks, thereby leaving a gaping hole.

Man hole Covers

It is crucial that every slurry tank on every farm is fitted with a safety access manhole cover. This eliminates the need to lift slats when emptying tanks. A man-hole cover costs just £350 and it is a small price to pay for safety and peace of mind.

Dangerous Slurry gases

Exposure to gases released during slurry agitation can lead to death within 10 seconds. Gases released during slurry agitation include hydrogen sulphide, methane, carbon dioxide and ammonia. Hydrogen sulphide is the most lethal and leads to immediate suffocation of humans and animals.

All doors must be opened and all animals must be removed from the building before agitation begins. No person should ever enter the building while agitation is in progress.

BEEF

Weanling Trade

Over the past few years the export of quality weanlings to the Continent was the dominant feature of the Autumn weanling trade. Since last November the European beef industry has suffered a severe shock from the outbreaks of BSE on the continent. Beef prices in Italy and Spain, the two main export markets for weanlings are 15% - 20% below last years levels. It is reported that French weanlings are currently being sold in Spain at 15% - 20% lower than last years' prices. If this trend continues we could expect the price of export type weanling to be down £60 - £80/head on last year.

The supply of weanlings for export will depend on price and home demand. Home demand is likely to be strong because of the move towards earlier slaughtering, it takes a larger number of weanlings to take the place of the over 30 month cattle and the expected large supplies of autumn grass and winter fodder. Projected price falls for weanlings could be cushioned by strong home demand.

Meals at Grass

(a) Finishing Cattle

● When pasture supply is adequate and quality is good there is not an economic response to meal feeding at grass.

● Where grass is in short supply or quality falls there will be a good response to concentrates.

● In Autumn, even when grass is plentiful a conversion rate of 1 kg carcass per 12 kg - 13 kg concentrates is likely at a feeding rate of 2 - 3 kg per day. This is an economic response at a beef price of 77p/lb and a meal price of £130 per tonne.

With an uncertain market outlook it could be an advantage to start meal feeding to more forward cattle earlier in order to get them to slaughter while supplies are relatively low or before they reach 30 month

(b) Weanlings

Where cows have adequate milk and pasture quality is maintained there is not much scope for meal feeding. However, all weanlings should be trained to eat meal before sale. The most economic method is to creep graze weanlings ahead of the cows and provide a limited amount of meal in troughs in the creep grazing area. Introduce creep meal about a month before sale. Bull weanlings will give a better response. By August, the herd can be split into heifers and bulls and additional creep provided to the bulls.

SHEEP

Grass

Highest growth rates are associated with leafy pasture, rich in clover. Over 220gms/day may be achieved, which is over 1.5kg/week. Aftergrass will give growth rates of 200gms/day. The lower parasite level on this pasture, as well as its leafiness, is critical.

It is difficult to get more than 150-160 grams/day where weaned lambs are put on pastures that were grazed in Spring by ewes/lambs.

Forcing lambs to graze down to 4cm, rather than 6cm will reduce potential lamb growth rates by up to 50%. Lambs will be forced to eat a layer of poor quality herbage at the base of the sward. A leader/follower grazing system is useful where dry ewes or cattle can follow the lambs. These stock can clean up and lambs have leafy grass continuously.

With rotational grazing, lambs should not be grazed tighter than 6cm even on leafy pastures. With set stocking have a continuous supply of 8-9cm of leafy grass.

SPECIAL RATES OF STUDENT MAINTENANCE GRANTS PAYABLE RETROSPECTIVELY FOR 2000/2001 ACADEMIC YEAR

Following on from recommendations made by the Action Group on Access to Third Level Education, the Minister for Education and Science, Dr Michael Woods, TD, has approved the following increases to promote participation by disadvantaged students in further and higher education:

- from £1,775 to £3,000 for disadvantaged students residing more than 15 miles from college; and
- from £710 to £1,200 for disadvantaged students resident within 15 miles of college.

The Total Reckonable Income limit in the tax year to 5th April 2000 must not exceed £6,600 {net of standard exclusions, as set out in the Maintenance Grants Schemes 2000 and net of CDA(s)}.

The special rates of maintenance grant are payable retrospectively to all grantholders in 2000/01, who meet specified criteria.

NIRE VALLEY FISHERIES ASSOCIATION

While the Minister for Agriculture Mr. Joe Walsh T.D. has announced the resumption of livestock trading in the marts - no official word has come to T.A.F.I. or M.R.T.A.C. on the lifting of the restrictions placed on the Angling sector during the Foot and Mouth crisis, despite several requests for clarification to the departments of Marine and Agriculture by the T.A.F.I. executive.

The Munster Regional Trout Anglers Council are advising clubs to contact local farmers when returning to fishing and to still respect the farming community fears and to follow any requests made to them by farmers. We are advising that designated entry points be agreed on and anglers refrain from entering fields where animals are grazing, also anglers should try and avoid going from one farm to another without going through the proper disinfecting procedures. We would ask that any clubs holding competitions confine these to local anglers. Any clubs holding open competitions seek the farmers approval first and have disinfecting procedures available for those competing. When anglers are fishing lakes we ask that they commence fishing from the public access areas. Also that they do not go ashore where there are animals for their lunches but to stick to public or non-grazed islands. We can only highly praise and thank anglers and clubs for their support shown to farmers over the last few difficult months and hope we have seen the last of this threat to our agriculture industry.

According to the Councillor, who was raising an issue previously brought to the fore by Cllr. Lar Hart residents are unable to go on holiday for fear that their homes would be broken into.

ellers who come to Dungarvan cause trouble, intimidate and cause hassle".

However Cllr. Teresa Wright said that "we have good traveller families who work hard within the community with a number of groups". Her concern was that the development of the current halting site has gone on for 6 years and it had limited space for new families.

Cllr. Hart said that what was needed was a transient site for travellers.

This issue will not easily be fixed, according to County Manager, Donal Connolly. The local Authority is limited in the powers it has to move traveller families on. Those in Abbesside would not go into the permanent halting site in Shandon even if there was room to cater for them.

Cllr. Hart concurred and said there is no sign of the travellers moving. "It's not good enough for people living in these estates to put up with this kind of abuse," Cllr. Hart said.

"There are old people who can't even walk their dogs as the travellers are shouting abuse and threatening them".

Cllr. Paddy Power said it was true people were being terrorised. He also said that shopkeepers were losing business and were being threatened.

The emotive matter was made more controversial by a statement made by Cllr. Deasy who said "the majority of trav-

Friary Street Depot To Be Relocated To Waterford City

The brewery depot in Friary Street is to be moved to Waterford City. This, according to Cllr. Nuala Ryan, is a significant worry to publicans.

Cllr. Ryan said that publicans in Cappoquin or other nearby towns who run out of alcohol go to the depot in Dungarvan and as such was a useful resource for the town. The move will be a disappointment to both publicans and the workers in the depot, which is owned by O'Donoghue's of Wexford, Cllr. Ryan said.

Workers in the depot will also be relocated to Waterford City and negotiations are currently ongoing with the unions involved.

Resolution To Increase Fines For Disabled Parking Violators

Cllr. John Deasy proposed a resolution that the statutory fine for parking illegally in a disabled parking space be increased from £15 to £50. The resolution was passed unanimously.

Cllr. Deasy said, "Some drivers treat the parking laws as if they were a matter of opinion and don't think or just don't care about the difficulties experienced by disabled drivers."

The councillor was especially concerned about the space outside the Bank of Ireland where, he said, people were ignoring the disabled sign. Cllr. Deasy believed that if the fines were increased people would take more care.

"Right now a fine for parking in a disabled bay is £15, the same as your regular parking ticket. Offenders should be severely penalised for parking in a spot that a disabled driver relies on being vacant."

At present if you don't pay the £15 you can be brought to court and the fine increased there, however Deasy believes there should be a real and immediate deterrent without having to rely on a court action.

Cllr. Deasy also wanted other local authorities to consider an increase in fines at their next meeting as he believes "the more pressure on the minister to consider the better".

The UDC's resolution will be distributed to all other local authorities around the country for review. It is also being sent to the national association representing all local authority members.

Proposals Put Forward For Possible Solution Of Quayside Benches

The contentious issue of the benches on the quayside was discussed at the recent meeting of the Urban Council.

A number of proposals were put forward by Councillors as a solution to the issue. Included in these was the idea of closing off the quay on a trial basis, which was put forward by Cllr. Damien Dillon.

However there are a number of factors which would come into play if the Council wanted to carry out this option.

The Town Clerk, Brian White, told the councillors that regulations dictate that the Council would have to put a proposed road closure on public display for a significant length of time and then would be subject to submissions.

This would mean that should the Council approve this option they would have to pick a date several months beforehand without even the guarantee that it goes ahead.

Another proposal was to limit parking to one side of the quay and so be given the opportunity to keep the benches further away from the edge of quay - an option put forward by Cllr. Paddy Power.

Chairman of the Urban Council Cllr. Teresa Wright supported the removal of the benches

saying that they were in no way family friendly and children that were sitting on the quays edge could be in grave danger of falling in.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said that the main danger of the benches being so close to the water was youths becoming intoxicated and falling into the water and drowning - an argument which was not accepted by Cllr. John Deasy.

Cllr. Deasy said "people have been getting drunk on the quay for the past 400-500 years".

The situation of the benches will be put on public display and submissions can be made by members of the public. The options will then be weighed up.

Mixed Reaction To Proposed New Traffic Measures

New traffic measures, which were discussed at a recent meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council, propose only minor changes to traffic flow with none of the main thoroughfares suggested for a one-way system.

St. Mary Street and O'Connell Street have notably been avoided and instead less populated streets such as Western Terrace, Bath Street, Castle Street and the section of road on the quay from King John's Castle to the Moorings Bar are proposed for one-way traffic.

Traffic flow in Grattan Square is also proposed to be changed. Under these proposals traffic going into the square from Davitts Quay will be allowed to turn left via Paddy Foley's Bar while those entering from O'Connell Street will be allowed to turn left via Michael Currans.

The small scale of change would appear to be as a result of the public outcry at a previous attempt by the Urban Council to put in place a one way system in the centre of Dungarvan.

After the failure of that particular endeavour it now seems that the Council is try to bring about an overhaul to the traffic flow by a more gradual means.

However, some Urban Councillors had already given a commitment not to introduce traffic measures until the full extent of the traffic requirements for the Glanbia site are known.

Changes are also proposed to be made to double yellow lines. Cllr. John Deasy believed that double yellow lines should be introduced on the Curran's Hardware side of O'Connell Street where he said "the main bottleneck" was.

This was not accepted by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan who said that one yellow line would do as there were no problems with traffic after six o'clock.

Chairman of the Urban Council Cllr. Teresa Wright said the plan should be put on public display. This suggestion was accepted by the members of the Council with double yellow lines on O'Connell Street added to it.

The proposal to put the plan on public display was accepted with only Cllr. Billy Kyne abstaining due to the undertaking he had given on the Glanbia site.

The next phase of the plan is the public display of the proposals which began on Monday last. Submissions will then be invited on the traffic management plans.

Following a review of the submissions from the public the plan will be altered, if necessary, and then be implemented two years from now.

Presentation Convent No Longer A Protected Building

The Presentation Convent has been delisted as a protected structure. While the convent is at present a protected structure Dungarvan Urban Councillors wanted to delist it due to vandalism and also because they believe it has become a danger.

The resolution was passed by councillors unanimously.

Boreenatra Covered In The Stench Of Seaweed

The residents of Boreenatra are concerned that seaweed which is causing a "terrible stench" in the area is being washed up near the houses, Cllr. Paddy Power said. The Councillor is also concerned that dogs in the estate are dragging the seaweed and rubbish that is washed up into peoples gardens and, on occasion, the owners houses themselves.

The County Manager, Donal Connolly, said that he will look into the situation.

Upstairs, in Seomra de Paor, is the annual ICA - Art on Tour exhibition with a selection of paintings from the women of the ICA guilds in Co. Waterford. This exhibition continues until Saturday the 11th August 2001 and it then moves to Tramore Library from 14 to the 29 August 2001.

Both Cherubs and Journal in Cloth, in the main gallery, will

only be running for the next two and a half weeks (until 4 August 2001), so don't miss them. The Old Market House Arts Centre opens from 1.30 pm to 5 pm, Tuesday to Friday and 12 noon to 6 pm on Saturdays and is located at Lower Main Street in Dungarvan.

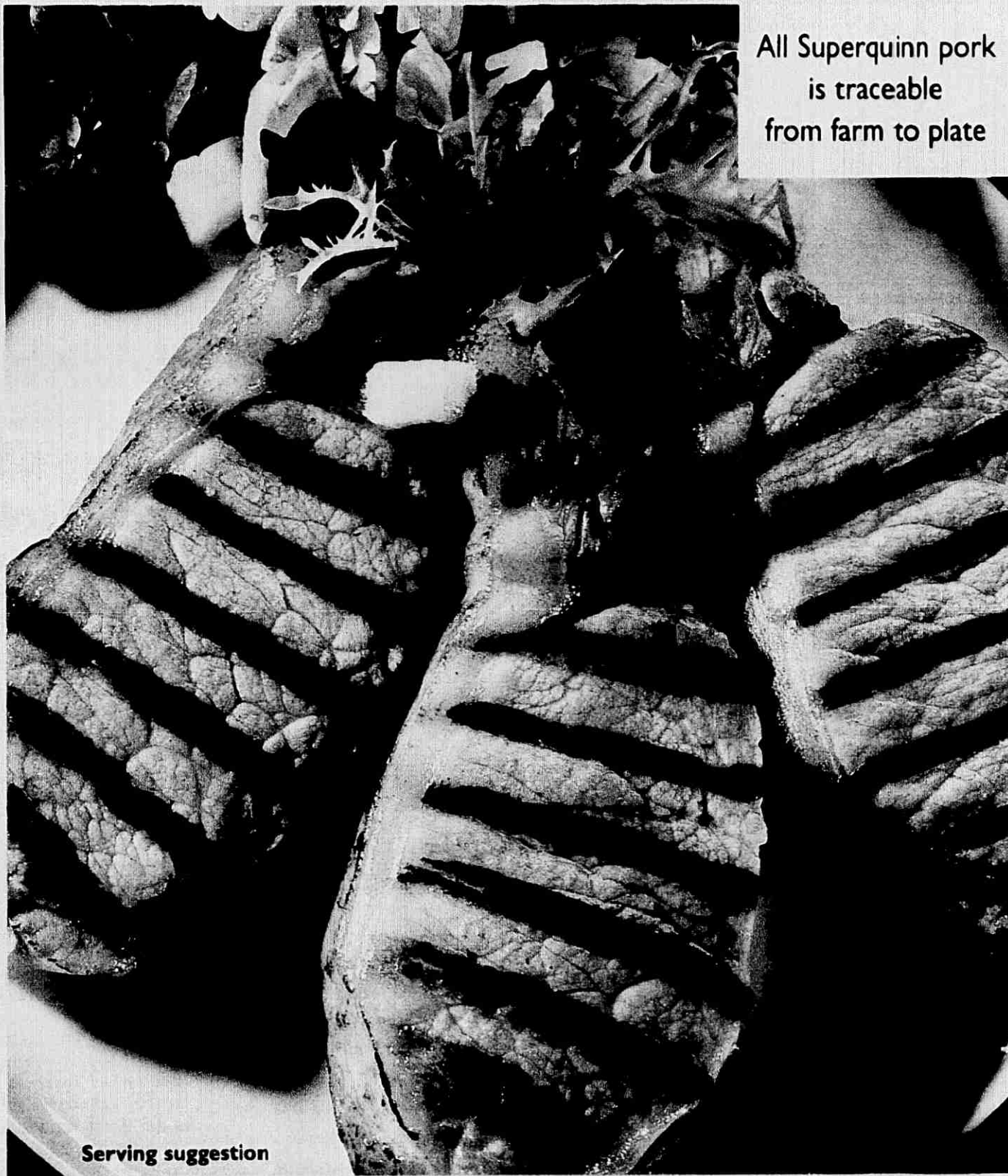
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Abbeyside Topics

MANOR COURTS

The manor courts were held regularly and all holders of land and property in the manor had to attend. For example, in 1340 the obligation of a landholder to give the Earl "suit of court" once a year at Dungarvan is mentioned. In other words, he had to attend the yearly manor-court in the town where he served on a jury. The Earl of Desmond or some deputy appointed by him held this court in the king's name. Although in general terms a betagh or labourer was at his lord's mercy, a landholder had the right to a trial by his peers, which was a trial by jury.

In the 15th century the authority of the English Crown over Ireland declined and became confined mainly to an area around Dublin in a banked in area called the Pale. The countryside outside of Dublin became disobedient when central control broke down and each great lord rules as he thought fit. The cities such as Dublin, Wexford, Waterford, Cork, Limerick and Galway became almost city-states loyal to the Crown.

However, they remained independent of the great lords of the soil. In this state of affairs small towns such as Dungarvan suffered economically and socially.

In practice the Earls of Desmond ruled Co. Waterford only as far eastwards as Dungarvan and in the east the Powers acted as the masters, although they had no legal right to do so. The city stood aloof from them both although the Powers joined with enemies of Waterford to hinder and cripple its trade.

The aim of the award is to foster an appreciation of the environment among young people by encouraging them to undertake practical community or school based projects to improve their surroundings.

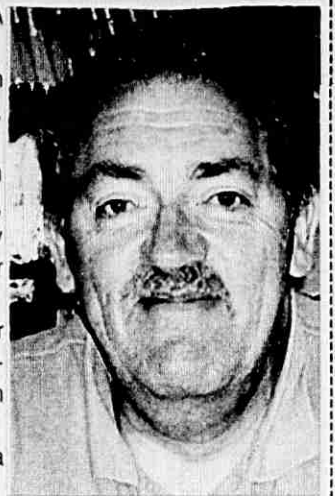

Museum Notes

We read with interest the report on the Anglo-Normal settlement uncovered at Shandon. Reports state that it is only the second archaeological site of its type to be discovered in Ireland. We understand that the site has been covered over. We hope that it will not be too long before this important site is fully excavated.

DENIS B. CASHMAN

Denis B. Cashman was born in Dungarvan in 1842. He was a member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood (Fenians) by 1858. One of his first activities may have been to help hide Lawrence O'Brien in his own home in the late 1850's. O'Brien had escaped from prison and was fleeing to America. The two met up in Boston 30 years later when they acted as pallbearers for the body of John Boyle O'Reilly.

In 1862 Cashman married his wife Catherine. They had three sons and two daughters. By this time he was working as a law clerk with the firm Dobbyn & Tandy in Waterford. He was arrested in 1867, by which time he had risen to the rank of Centre of the Waterford Circle, i.e. he had the power to enlist and swear in new members to the movement. By 1864 or 1865 Cashman was living at 5 Preston Street, Dublin. While in Dublin he met Dr. Edward Power, James Stephens and other leaders of the movement.

He was arrested on 12 January 1867, was convicted Fenian membership and sentenced to seven years penal servitude in Freemantle, Australia. They sailed on board the Hougoumont where Cashman compiled a diary of his voyage.

Cashman was pardoned in 1869 and went to San Francisco. He made his way to Boston where he was reunited with his wife and one of his children. He became involved in journalism, amongst other occupations. He wrote articles in support of the Nationalist cause, including a biography of Michael Davitt.

Cashman died at his home in Boston in 1897.

A book has just been published by Wolfhound Press, entitled: Fenian Diary, Denis B. Cashman on board the Hougoumont 1867-1868, edited by C. W. Sullivan 111. This includes poems by Cashman, John Boyle, John Flood and other Fenians written on board the transport ship.

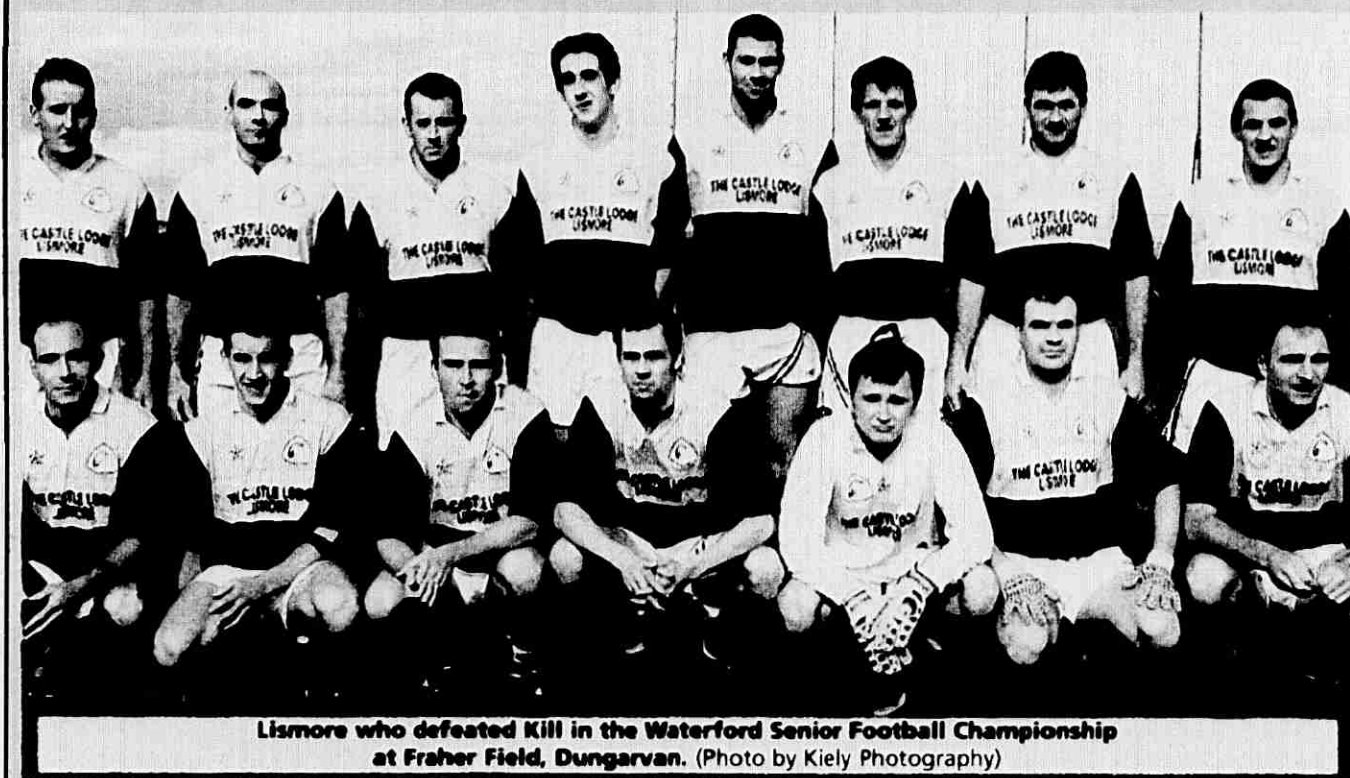

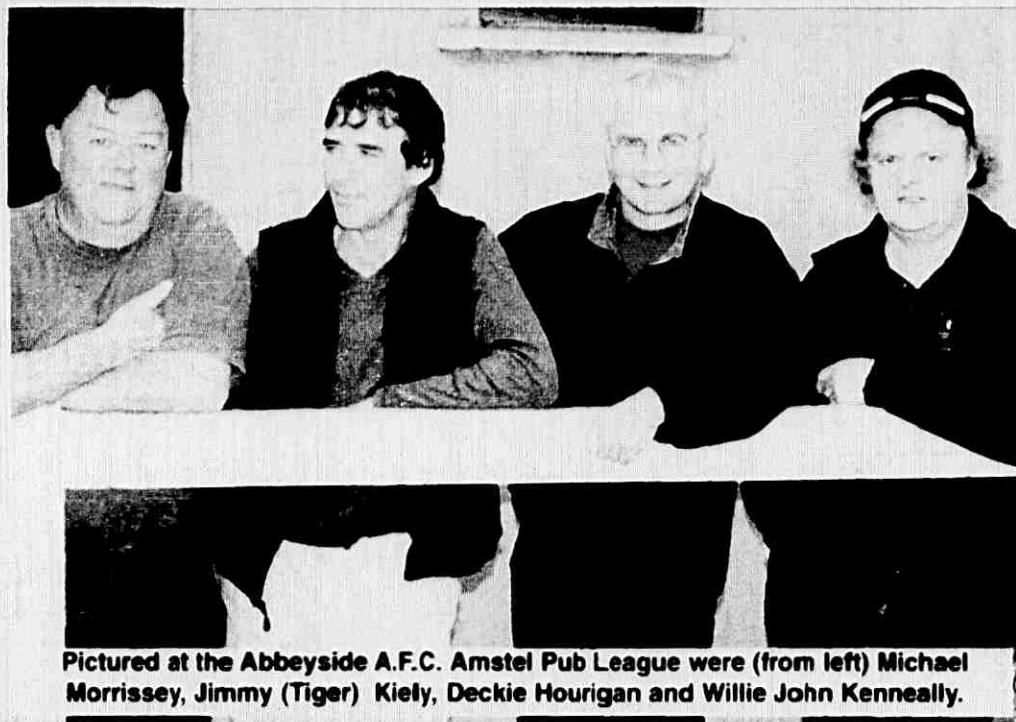

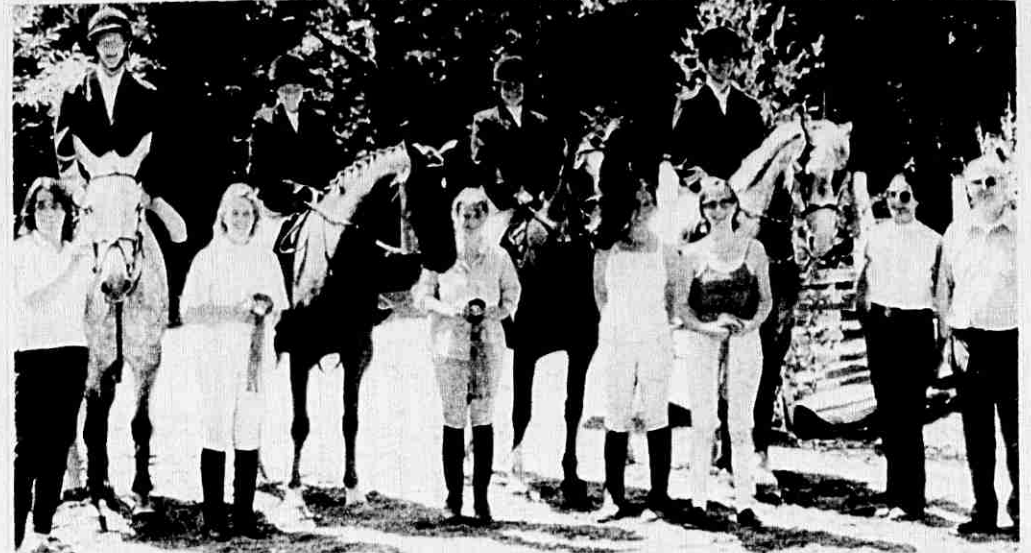
The Ballyrafter Centre, Lismore

GlaxoSmithKline Event Benefits Alzheimers Unit

The eighth race in the Ger Wyley Sports Summer Road Racing Series, in association with Fila, was an outstanding success last Friday evening when over 230 people raised £2,200 for the Alzheimers Unit at St. Joseph's Hospital, Dungarvan. This was a real community effort led by Michael Dwyer and his team at GlaxoSmithKline and it was a grand sight to see so many people on the route around the area on a night which was ideal for running and walking.

All sorts of records were broken last week and the most notable of these were new course records in the mens and womens events and the highest entry ever in the 58 race history of the Summer Series which started back in 1995. The mens race up front certainly gave hope for the future of Waterford athletics when three fine young runners all under twenty years of age threw the gauntlet down to one another over a super fast and ideally selected route. It was refreshing to see this clash as in some parts top runners avoid one another which takes from the sport one has to agree.

Friday's race was one of William Harty's finest runs as he judged his effort to perfection to come home a clear winner from Robert Wade, who had beaten William in Dundrum the previous week, with Robert's club mate Shane Power (Waterford A.C.) in third position. William's time of 24.47 was a new course record as was Sinead Cummins time of 29.32 in the ladies race. The standard in the ladies event equalled that of the mens with Marcellus Hynes and Ann Sullivan both finishing on the thirty minute mark.

LATE PADDY JOE DELANEY RIP

The description of Paddy Joe in the local papers last week as "most inoffensive and someone who was held in the highest of esteem" was certainly very accurate and one which everybody who became acquainted with him during his twenty years of involvement in the local athletic scene would definitely agree with.

When word was spoken of his tragic drowning in the Quay last week it just didn't seem real as he was involved with all of us for so long and we expected him to be there for a long time to come.

Paddy Joe was a product of the running boom of the early 1980's along with his brother Mickey and John Havens and for many years they enjoyed the benefits of running, training regularly "abroad at the college" as Paddy Joe used to say about the facilities at St. Augustine's in Dicksfoot. He would cycle out there, run his laps or his road circuit and then cycle back into town. When training for the Dublin marathon you could meet him on a Sunday at 10 am cycling up Mary St., having completed a 15 mile plus run in the Friary. He was an early bird so to speak, a trait he maintained to the end of his life.

Paddy Joe supported all the races but his favourites, without doubt, were the Dublin marathon and the Ballycotton 10' to which he travelled to either as a runner or as a supporter every year. When Paddy Joe stopped running about ten years ago he planned his annual trip to Dublin always bringing his camera with him and he usually returned with some lovely photos of the local runners, the day's programme and other race items which he always passed around. Ballycotton was another favourite of his, he loved this event so much. He arrived early and he wasn't the first to leave. He always brought the race video which he gave you the opportunity to watch, like Duffy's Circus "for one night and one night only" as he wanted to pass it around to someone else. He also loved watching the videos of all the local races.

No mention of Paddy Joe would be complete without word of the friendship he enjoyed with his great companion Tom Meehan. If you saw one of them at races you saw the other and it is true to say that their attendance at past race activities ensured a good night out. Tom has lost a good and loyal friend. Anytime we'll see Tom at a race from now on we'll surely be mentioning Paddy Joe. Paul Keating, Anthony Dwyer and others in the running scene also enjoyed warm friendships with this great character.

Once Paddy Joe retired from running he became the reliable helper. He was a regular steward at cross roads, he helped before hand, he tidied up afterwards, and he was very courteous to any runner who asked him to help out while the race was on. "Anything new Sham?" was often Paddy Joe's way of saying hello, referring to how the running scene was going as he maintained a deep interest all ways.

How good of a runner was Paddy Joe, you might ask. Well, his times were as follows. He ran 37.40 in the Dungarvan 10k in 1988. In 1986 he ran his best Ballycotton five miles time of 30.22 and the following year in 1987 he ran his best Ballycotton ten miles time at 62.17. In 1988, Paddy Joe ran the Dublin Millennium Marathon in 3 hrs 13 mins 31 secs. Anybody who can run these times at present are rated highly on the local running scene so you can see that Paddy Joe was well able to run in his day.

West Waterford A.C. sympathises with his mother and family on their sad loss. A large number of club members formed a guard of honour at his funeral on the Tuesday night and a minutes silence was observed before the GlaxoSmithKline race last Friday night as a mark of respect for a man who will always be thought of with great affection by local runners. May he rest in peace.

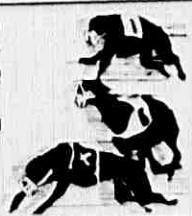

The bookmakers bet 3/1 the field in the final of the Summertime 525. Bewitching Floss broke smartly from trap five but she was joined throughout by Lobnamna Sampson. In a ding dong struggle which went all the way to the wire the Bernard Moran owned Bewitching Floss (Destiny Fox-Bewitching Gypsy) dug deep when it mattered most to score by a neck from Official Machine with Lobnamna Sampson the same distance away in third. Time 29.68.

Powerful Spice was sent off the 6/4 favourite in a novice sprint but she failed to match the early pace of the Larry Sheehan owned Saluki Snow (Thorgil Tex-Colour Spin) this 3/1 chance making all the running for a two and a half lengths victory over the favourite in 16.72.

Me And Dan led to the second bend in the second race but the leader soon gave way to the Nite And Day Syndicate owned Fast Transit (Smooth Rumble-Aoifes Pal). This well supported evens favourite was never in any subsequent danger dishing out a six and three quarter lengths beating to a running on Ballybrazil Sam in a speedy 29.24.

The third race was declared void when the clear leader Vigorous Tom pulled up on the back stretch having been distracted by the skin cloth coming loose from the mechanical lure. Make no mistake about it the first three dogs over the winning line Jamaican Cole, Vigorous Tom and Marshals Suzie are all certain future winners.

Track newcomer Natural Amber cut an early dash from trap four in the fourth race but with the winning line in view Natural Amber was caught close home by the Leonard Foley owned and Michael Power trained Whistlers Pal (Droopys Merson-Sayedati) this 2/1 shot steaming home to score by a length in 29.65.

The Billy Roche owned dual purpose greyhound Marshals Magic (In The Horrors-Marshalls Image) proved the easiest winner of the night capturing the fifth event a 300 yard sprint with ridiculous ease in 16.61. Sent off at odds of 3/1 Marshalls Magic soon had his rivals in trouble and leaving first bend trouble in his wake Marshalls Image scampered clear for a eleven lengths win over a slow starting Cousin Kate.

Bagneistown trainer Brendan Murphy has his runners in tremendous form at present and he recorded a sixth and eleventh race double courtesy of the John Lennon and Paul Corcoran owned Silver Harry (Metric Prince-Crandaniel Milly) 5/2 and the Cootes Bar Syndicate owned Donore Picture (Some Picture-Garryglass Queen) 5/2. In a six bend marathon Silver Harry found himself well adrift of the leaders early on as Fahee Donna led from a wide running Rightful Dual but staying on dourly Silver Harry came through the field to register a length win over Fahee Donna in 41.54. In complete contrast to his kennel companion Donore Picture made a speedy exit from trap two in his contest and despite late headway by The Other Boola "Donore" won a shade cleverly by a length and a half.

Jamie John was the medium of some tasty wagers in a graded sprint but he lost early ground at the break and was then

badly baulked at the first bend Jumbos Legend and Gantons Vintage fought out the finish here with Niall Corcoran's Jumbos Legend (Grading Legend-Jumbos Jess) 5/1 proving the stronger on the run to the winning line to triumph by three quarters of a length in 16.79.

The Seamus and Cathail O Neill owned Fahee Emma (Some Picture -Fahee Lantern) 7/4 produced a brave front running performance in the tenth race making every post a winning one beating the 6/4 favourite Kittys Height by five lengths in 29.80.

In the final race of the session the Angela Bailey owned Lomonds Lucy (Lomond -I Love Lucy) 2/1 held the upper hand throughout for trainer Paul Kervick and despite the persistent challenge of Octagonal Lomonds Lucy kept going all the way to the winning line to triumph by two lengths in 29.65.

Murt Knows Best

Marathon runners were well catered for on last Saturday nights twelve race card where four first round heats and two semi finals of the Cyril O Regan sponsored Riverside TV Marathon events were run off.

Heat one saw the Hugh Faulkner owned Giglis Fame (Minnies Phantom-Tipps Quest) break her duck this evens favourite getting the better of a dour struggle with Aristotle obliging by the minimum distance in 42.30.

The Keith Freer owned Farronrory Maid (Autumn Blaze -Horton Maid) was sent off the 5/4 favourite in heat two and while she took some time to warm to the task in hand the market leader finished full of running to outstay the long time leader Spartica by three lengths in 41.60.

Heat three produced an impressive winner in the shape of the Martin O Meara owned Murt Knows this March 2000 son of He Knows and Molls Line doing the business in an eye catching 40.97. A fast starting Jack The Bushman made a brave effort to make all the running but he gave way to Murt Knows near the fifth bend as "Murt" bounded clear for a seven lengths success.

The Steve Parker owned Farronrory Bob (Iceni Regent-Now Go) 3/1 ran an unusual race to capture heat four in 41.92. Looking comfortable at the head of affairs in this three runner qualifier Farronrory Bob allowed the 1/1 favourite Uppergrange Risk to do some of the donkey work over the final two bends before renewing his challenge close home for a short head win.

In the first semi final of a second marathon stake the Barry Cullinane owned and Christy Coady trained Cullinane Kate (Treasury Tag-Kincarrig Hill) 2/1 proved full value for a well deserved 40.93 victory. Storming into an early lead over Mind The Way Cullinane Kate was never in any danger of losing her lead staying on strongly to defeat Mind The Way by three lengths.

The well bred Blackrock Border (Spiral Nikita-Bodies Lisa) 6/4 owned by Noel Germaine and James Geoghegan from Dublin made every post a winning one in the second qualifier scoring in 41.61. After surviving an early challenge by Gentle Venture Blackrock Border eased clear for a three lengths win over Bolivian Mate.

County Waterford trainer Declan Byrne made his mark capturing the opening two races on the card and indeed the same trainer was a little unlucky not to have a treble. His first winner arrived courtesy of the well backed Minor Record (Mustang Jack-Minor Lady) this 1/2 chance poking up on the inside of the field to lead out of the first turn from Sparta Homer before winning unchallenged by four and a half lengths from Sparta Homer in 29.31. Thw winner is owned in partnership by Mary O Connor and well known Rathkeale horse trainer Michael Hourigan whose horses are in top form at present.

Another owner with horsey connections captured the second race a three hundred yard dash as the Damien Gleeson owned Goat Is-

land (Larkhill Jo-Rockys Whisper) 4/5 ran away from the opposition in a creditable 16.33. Flans Mobile broke well from trap three but in a matter of strides Goat Island surged clear and leaving first bend crowding in his wake the favourite coasted to a nine and three quarter lengths win over Yucatan.

Given that he had performed so well from an outside draw the previous week it was hard to understand how Due More Luck was allowed take his chance from trap one in the third contest. As it happened Due More Luck carried a number of the runners off the first bend including the well positioned Autumn Jo Jo. The Gerard Kirwan owned and Jimmy Frisby trained Arrigle Awesome (Phantom Flash-Arrigle Misty) 2/1 reacted quickly and switched his challenge to the inside. This was the turning point of the race as "Arrigle" galloped on his merry way to beat Autumn Jo Jo by two and a half lengths in 29.04.

The John Lynch owned and Ian Seymour trained Scotias Grave (Pepes Dilemma-Scotias Glen) got back on the winning trail at evens taking a 550 yard contest in 30.37. Once again events on the first bend had a major bearing on the outcome of this race. Minor River started sprightly but drifted wide on the run up. Just as Minor River was getting back on an even keel he was badly hampered by Beirns Tex. This left Scotias Grave in the clear and he duly romped to a two and a quarter lengths win over Beirns Tex in 30.37.

Lilac Basher came in for some good support in the tenth but he was disappointed after running third early on. Catsrock Stam and Sparta Icon had this contest to themselves a long way from home with the Myles Lavery owned and Nicky Grace trained Catsrock Stam (Powerful Flash-Catsrock Breeze) 2/1 utilising the rails to good effect scoring by two lengths in 29.22.

Despite staying wide throughout the twelfth contest the Frances O Donnell owned Toss Suzy (Batties Rocket-The Other Daisy) 2/1 packed too much early back straight pace for the front running Premiere Quest before beating a fast finishing Regal Honey by two and a quarter lengths in 29.18.
