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Proposed Glanbio Development Under Scrutiny

Intense scrutiny and a dissection of all the relevant facts, figures and plans for the proposed development of a shopping complex on the former Glanbia site, were the order of the day, at An Bord Pleanala's oral hearing into the project last week.

Three days of submissions were heard - initially from the three sets of objectors then by Clancy Construction and Dungarvan Urban Council, followed by the deep probing of the evidence given, during cross examina-

The appellants to the £300 million project - which, it is estimated, will bring in excess of 1,000 jobs to the town - were made up of the retailers representative group RGDATA and conservationists Irish Friends of the Envi-

Martin O'Regan and Prionsias Breathnach as well as An Taisce, were due to be part of the hearing but the two individuals - who were previously part of the Chamber of Commerce's appeal before that was withdrawn -

were unable to attend. An Taisce, meanwhile, have already processed their appeal.

Representing An Bord Pleanala was Inspector Andrew Boylan while speaking on behalf of Irish Friends of the Environment were Colette O'Connell and her husband who introduced himself as Mr. O'Mahoney. Also giving a submission on behalf of this grouping was Peter Sweetman and a former Chief Fire Officer John Connolly.

This group made varying claims including a sensational submission from Mr. Connolly that the power plant did not need a fire certificate and that the multi-screen cineplex which is included in the scheme could cause a fire hazard.

SHADES OF STARDUST

Mr. Connolly claimed that, in particular, the multi-screen cineplex had inadequate fire escape facilities especially towards the rear of the building "which is virtually a corridor" . Mr. Connolly described this "as having shades of Stardust".

The anchor tenant shopping unit came in for criticism, as well, from the former Chief Fire Officer. He said this

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Relief Felt By Residents And Businesses At Travellers Departure

A great sigh of relief was undoubtedly heaved by the residents of Dungarvan as, on Monday last, the traveller convoy camped on the Youghal Road finally left the town almost a week after they had first undertaken to do so.

However, the relief felt,

quickly turned to anger, as the full extent of the debris left behind was revealed. Sofa's, armchairs and an assortment of other furniture, as well as domestic refuse, plastic bags, cardboard boxes and an collection of other items were strewn from the sea's edge up to the walls of

However, the cost of the clean-up operation is expected to be surprisingly low, ranging from just over £500 to £1,000, and, in an unexpected gesture, the travellers have left the Urban Council half the costs of the clean up operation and the provision of skips on the site.

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

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

building "will need to be massively re-designed."

Meanwhile, Mr. Sweetman alleged, amid a lengthy submission, that some of the relevant documentation was not on the planning file. This, he claimed, was a fundamental flaw in the planning application.

"Is the planning department deliberately setting out to deceive the public", Mr. Sweetman said. He continued by saying that the site of the proposed development is listed nationally as a Specially Protected Area (SPA)

300 EXTRA CARS ON QUIET ROAD

This was followed by a submission from Mr. O'Mahoney who said that Davis Street - where an access onto the site is planned - is far too narrow for the traffic, which it is proposed, will use this road. He claimed that phase 1 of the project would put 300 extra cars onto a normally quiet

Mr. O'Mahoney then went on to say that he had reason to believe that the opening onto Davis Street will result in the Urban Council compulsorily purchasing a number of properties on this street to widen it for the access road.

Another claim put forward by Mr. O'Mahoney was that the ground where the development is due to be sited is contaminated. Part of the Glanbia site was used as a municipal dump up until 1968 and was used to dump contaminated hides of cattle from the leather factory during this time, Mr. O'Mahoney said.

The other appellant present - RGDATA - was represented by Fergal MacCabe.

Mr. MacCabe claimed that a multi-storey car park was needed rather than surface level parking to enable the local authority to develop Grattan Square to its potential.

He also claimed that the development would take a significant amount of trade from the town, especially those shops at the opposite side of the town from the proposed development.

MASSIVE LEAKAGE

Later, he went on to question the affect the development would have on the small retail outlets a few miles outside Dungarvan. However, Neil Bannon - a chartered surveyor representing Clancy Construction - said there was already massive leakage out of Dungarvan.

Mr. Bannon said that even after the centre is up and running there would still be an annual leakage of business from Dungarvan in the region of £14 million.

"However, that must be compared with the much more significant £32 million loss of business the town is currently experiencing for its entire catchment area", Mr. Bannon said.

In a rejection of a claim by RGDATA that the multi-million pound project would have an adverse impact on existing business Mr. Bannon also said "It will just be bringing back the natural retail business to Dungarvan which is currently being lost because of the absence of the facilities the developer is proposing to provide. Neither will it affect business in neighbouring towns and villages as has been as-

Also appearing on behalf of Clancy Construction was Bernard McHugh. He told the hearing that the development would, instead of prejudicing Grattan Square, allow the Urban Council to develop it to its potential. This will happen as a result of pressure of car parking being taken off the square, Mr. McHugh said.

Rejecting the use of a multi-storey car park, Mr. McHugh said that at the present time, it would not be economically viable to provide this

TOTAL MONOPOLY

The complex itself, he said, will provide an extension of Dungarvan and will also improve rather than damage the

"Today Dungarvan is not a major retail centre", Mr. McHugh said "There is a total monopoly by the Supervalue Stores with no other major retail outlet in the town.

The proposed shopping centre, he contends, will provide diversification and additional choice for the public.

Ann McCrone of Dungarvan Urban Council said that the development of the Glanbia site was seen - at planning permission stage - as vital for the economy of Dungarvan and the remainder of the town centre.

"The development strategy extends the town centre and seeks to integrate both the present square with the proposed development", Mrs. McCrone said during the Urban Council's submission.

Referring to the development of the power plant, she said, this was seen as necessary to serve Dungarvan and would be vital in the town becoming a regional gateway.

The Inspector, Andrew Boylan, will now formulate a recommendation and this will be made to An Bord Pleanala in the coming weeks. An Bord Pleanala may use this recommendation as part of their overall decision on the site.

Travellers Finally Leave Youghal Road Site

Joe O'Flaherty, in an attempt The clean up operation, itself, was begun by the Urban council almost immediately after the convoy left. The operation is currently being undertaken by a JCB and a number of Council workers.

There was some speculation in the area that truck loads of soil brought into the site was also part of this operation. However it will in fact, be used to landscape the entrance of the scenic walkway planned between Quanns and the Youghal Road.

The traveller issue flared up initially last Saturday week when a convoy of 60 caravans moved onto the site along with the same number of vans, cars and trailers.

Following the travellers entry onto the Urban Council property a number of approaches were quickly made by the acting Town Clerk,

to secure an undertaking from them, as to their departure date. First, the travellers set a date for Wednesday of last week but when the convoy did not leave by 2pm that day, the Urban Council decided on a "get tough" strategy. As part of this strategy a truck load of boulders was brought on to the site escorted by four Gardai.

However, according to one of the chief negotiators towards an eventual settlement, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, the travellers then gave an undertaking to leave on Friday. But, once again, the travellers failed to leave on time with only a handful of caravans departing the site over the weekend.

The presence of large numbers of travellers in the town sparked fears that trouble would be caused and publicans and hoteliers had a large number of security staff on their doors. At least one other pub did not open its doors at all over the weekend. However according to Gardai in Dungarvan, no incidents were reported in the town involving the travellers camped on the Youghal Road.

Meanwhile, Cllr. Billy Kyne has slammed, what he called, the "softly, softly approach to traveller encampments.'

Cllr. Kyne said that "the most recent influx of travellers to the Youghal Road has confirmed what has been obvious for sometime, that Dungarvan is a soft touch for this type of community in-

This is not only an inci-

dent of forced entry but also could well be worse." clearly an attitude of aggression, total disrespect to the public generally and to the residents directly affected, who faced appalling mess and noise.'

He also described the "siege mentality" felt in the town over the weekend "with pub doors closed and tension in the air."

The councillor contrasted as well the different measures used to treat those who are prosecuted for speeding and dumping with the "impunity" given to the travellers who he said, in this case, broke into private property, vandalised it and left a "disgusting mess behind" without any prosecution taking place.

Cllr. Kyne concluded by saying "the softly, softly approach is not working. Dungarvan now through its Council and the rule of law and order must effectively intervene. The alternative is not only what has happened at the Youghal Road but


Dungarvan based Deputy, Austin Deasy, meanwhile, has called for a new strategy to deal with the "problem being experienced by travellers and being generated by them.

Deputy Deasy is "calling on the Government to designate a Cabinet Minister to oversee a National Policy which will address the situation, which has gotten out of hand".

The deputy would like to see an up to date survey of the number of travellers in the country, the number of caravans they possess, and an assessment of those who wished to be housed and those who wish to remain on the road.

In a completely separate incident, travellers who were camped in Abbeyside were involved in a disturbance between factions within one traveller family, which resulted in one man suffering injuries to his arm. The matter is now currently under investigation.

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
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
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THE WAY WE LIVE: HISTORY





Richard John Ussher 1841 - 1913

Richard was born at Cappagh House on 6 April 1841, the only surviving child of Richard Kelly Ussher (17781854) and Isabella Grant (d.1881). He is said to have lived abroad for many years returning to Cappagh in the early 1860's. In 1863 he was appointed a Justice of the Peace for Co. Waterford. On 20 January 1866 he married Elizabeth, daughter of John William Flnlay of Corkagh House, Co Dublin, They had four boys and a girl.

four boys and a girl.
In 1875 he built a new house at Cappagh just above the old one which still survives. The new house was designed by James Otway and Robert Watt, railway engineers. He developed an interest in ornithology and became obsessed with collecting bird's eggs. He later joined the Irish Society for the Protection of birds. He began to study rare bird species and also explored caves for fossil remains of birds. He is said too have found remains of the Great Auk in the sand dunes at Tramore. In 1906 he was the co-author of an important book - Birds of Ireland, Towards the end of his life he spent much time excavating caves in Waterford, Cork, Sligo and Clare. His excavation results were published in various archaeological and natural history journals.

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
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

For the less experienced among us, it is a question of looking carefully at the location, seeking advice from a garden centre, reading up on plant types - and drawing a detailed plan before you even start planting.

Lift spring-sown onions

Onions sown in January under glass and March outdoors should have completed their growth, and there is no point in leaving them in the ground any longer. Lift them carefully with a fork and spread them out on the surface to dry. After a few days, shake any soil from the bulbs and store them, either on shelves or in shallow boxes, in a dry, frostproof shed or room - or strung together in ropes.

Sow onions

This is the time to sow onions, both for use as small salading in the spring and to provide early bulbs before the spring sown crop. Select a fairly sheltered place and ground that has been well cultivated. but not recently manured.

Perfect borders: top tips

Here are some essential tips for creating a perfect herbaceous border:

- 1. Dig well-rotted manure or plant. compost into the soil during the autumn.
- 2. To shape a curved border, lay a garden hose along your chosen line and cut into the ground with an edging tool before digging the
- 3. Plant in the spring according to the conditions:
- Sandy soil plant early so roots become established before the warm weather.
- Clay soil plant in the late spring. If you plant too early the cold, wet soil will cause rot and may kill the
- 4. Container-grown plants can be 4. Container-grown plants can be planted in the summer but must be red and blue. White can be added watered constantly for the first couple of months.
- 5. Put tall plants at the back of the flowering season or pick a blend border, shorter ones at the front.
- **6.** Put several plants of the same variety together in irregular clusters.
- 7. The colour scheme is a matter of personal choice - and may depend on other aspects of the garden. Put the strongest colours in the fore-
- ground and the paler colours fur-
- 8. Good colour blends include soft blues, pinks and purples: to all combinations.



HISTORY

In 1463 Thomas, 7th Earl of Desmond was appointed Lord Deputy and he held a parliament in Wexford in the month of October. An act of Parliament stated that the seignory of lordship of Dungarvan was a great and ancient honour belonging to the King of England. It had for the most part been destroyed, it was stated because of the warfare over the years and the neglect of proper government there. The town government was to be given extra powers and to enjoy all kinds of free grants, liberies privileges and customs as the town and mand England had been. The town authority was to be composed of a porteeve and the general community who were the property owners or burgesses. They were to have authority to charge all kinds of duties and taxes on merchandise that was bought and sold within the town just as the custom in Bristol was. The dues and taxes collected by the town were to be used to repair and maintain the defences of Dungarvan.

Charters, privileges, liberties and the like were given to cities and towns to protect them against the impositions of the manorlords. The feudal dues and taxes of these lords interfered with the business of these town merchants. The choice of Clare and Bristol was apposite. Bristol was a seaport and Clare was an inland town in Suffolk where the Clare family had given to the burgesses freedom from feudal dues.

In the Wexford Parliament the Earl of Desmond received for himself and for his successors the fee - farm or tenancy of the manor of Dungarvan from the Crown, just as his ancestors had. It should not be forgotten that the Crown since its foundation had held town and manor in fee.

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FARMING LEADER

IFA CAMPAIGN SECURES INCREASE IN PRE'99 PREMIUMS

bring pre-1999 forestry premium levels into line with current rates has finally secured a Government commitment on funding, which will directly benefit over 10,000 farmers.

An intensive IFA lobbing campaign over the past year culminated in IFA President Tom Parlon heading up a recent delegation of key industry leaders to make a strong case for the premium increase to Marine and Natural Resources Minister Frank Fahey.

Mr. Parlon told the Minister that the premium increase was a "make or break issue for farmer foresters and the industry as a whole".

Responding to the Government's confirmation of the premium increase, the IFA President said "this move will restore confidence among farmer foresters for future investments because it demonstrates a serious Government commitment to the industry".

Forestry industry leaders, who attended the meeting with Minister Fahey organised by IFA, included Coillte, IFIC (Irish Forest Industry Chain) and representatives from the contracting companies, nurseries and the processing sector.

IFA Farm Forestry Chairman Pat Lehane said "IFA's campaign to secure an increase in the pre '99 forestry premiums began in the Spring of 2000 when the EU approved the 30% increase in premiums, but refused to fund existing plantations. At the stroke of a Brussels pen, 10,000 farmer foresters who had pioneered private forestry in this country were deprived of the premium increase and saw their investments downgraded".

Mr. Lehane said "IFA immediately pressed for Government funding and the initial response from Government Ministers was positive. Farmers were therefore devastated last May to hear the shock Dáil announcement refusing to fund the increase.

This month's confirmation from Minister Byrne of a change of heart by the Government on the issue is a critically important boost for the forestry sector and will be welcomed

£3.4m per year to over 10,000 farmers on whom the industry depends so much for future investment.

Commenting Waterford IFA Farm Forestry Chairman, Patrick Trihy said "having previously raised expectations on this increase, by committed farmer foresters we must expect that the Gov-

DAIRYING

Dairy problems:

- More mastitis than ever around!
- Co-ops have higher than ever SCC's.
- A lot of clinical cases suggests:
- Chronic cows (cannot be cured).
- Milking machine problems (pulsation, poor reserve, bad liners etc.)
- Poor milking routine (too rough with cows and taking off clusters too early).
- Stress (examine all aspects).
- High herd SCC's suggests.
- Old herd of cows.
- All the problems listed for clinical cases.
- Stray electricity (have this checked out).
- Sorting out the problem involves:
- Identifying the extent of the problem.
- Identifying the cause of the problem.
- Not enough, nobody in fact, who has a problem, keeps records of mastitis.
- You must fill the clinical mastitis record card.
- This records the date a cow gets mastitis, the quarter and the type (all vital information).
- This is vital if you have employed staff or a relief milk-
- You must get, at least 3 somatic tests done for each cow in the herd every year.
- High SCC cows can be managed differently or culled if justified.
- Get these tests done now, 3 weeks apart if you have a problem
- Discard the first few squirts of milk onto the aground when taking a sample because it is high in bacteria.
- Use a jug to take a sample from each teat and then fill the small bottle from the jug.
- A sensitivity test may have merit in identifying the type of bug causing the problem.
- But sampling must be done very hygienically.
- Cows must not have been treated with antibiotic (only fresh cases).
- Some would argue that this is a wasted exercise because 70-80% of the bugs causing problems during lactation are Staph. Aureus and they are hard to kill.
- Get the milking machine tested again.
- Little things do make huge changes.
- The correct milking routine is as follows:
- Draw the foremilk to identify clinical cases in time and prevent mastitic milk getting into the bulk tank.
- Stimulate milk let-down by gentle rubbing of the udder.
- Wash teats if dirty.
- Put on and take off cluster gently because airblast cause serious problems.
- Teat dip afterwards.
- Some farmers are suffering serious financial losses due to high SCC's at present:
- 3p to 6p per gallon.
- Refusal by the Co-Op results when your milk has 400,000 bugs per ml. (imagine months.
- The simple solution to avoid the latter scenario is to suckle or cull very high SCC cows (its amazing what damage 2 or 3 high cows can do).
- Change your milk liners now:
- Gives more milk.
- Less liner slip and so less mastitis.
- Use Teagasc recommended ones.
- Lameness is also an issue:
- Repair roadways.
- Get the farm relief Service to attend to lame cows
- Cow condition must be near 3 now:
- Very thin cows should have their health status examined and corrective action taken.
- Remedial action must be taken now before it is too late. - It may mean more meals to these animals or early dry-

It is with deep regret that we record the death of Owen Geary. Lyrenagloch, Ballyduff who passed away peacefully in the loving care of his family in the early hours of Saturday July 28th. Deceased who had celebrated his ninetieth birthday last February was a member of the farming community until his retirement some years ago. He was an avid reader and had great powers of recall and he loved the game of 45. On arrival in the village, the cortege was met by a guard of honour formed by members of the GAA and from the community. The coffin was draped in the red and white flag of the club along with the No. 7 jersey he wore with such pride and distinction and was received and blessed by Rev. Fr. Ml. Cullinan P.P. The interment took place on Monday afternoon in St. Michael's Cemetery following concelebrated Mass in the presence of a large and representative concourse of mourners. A number of visiting clergy joined Rev. Fr. Cullinan P.P. in officiating at the graveside. Again, members of the GAA Club along with friends and neighbours formed a guard of honour as Owen made his final journey to his resting place.

Sherry FitzGerald Call For a Reduction in the Rate of Stamp Duty

Sherry FitzGerald, Ireland's largest estate agents called today (Wednesday) for the Government to reduce the rate of stamp duty applicable to both owner-occupiers and investors in the residential

property market.

Commenting on the results of a recent survey on the property market, Marian Finnegan Economist, Sherry FitzGerald Group noted. "The significant and miscal-

culated Government intervention in the market over the past three years culminating in the introduction of penalising rates of stamp duty in June 2000 has resulted in the diminution of investor demand in the residential market.

Investors purchased only 8% of all properties traded during the first six months of 2001, compared to in excess of 30% of property traded in the months prior to the publication of the first Bacon Report. The demise in the level of investor demand has been the catalyst in fuelling the strength of rental inflation particularly in the past twelve months when the pace of rental inflation has significantly exceeded that of asset price inflation.

selling existing properties has also increased considerably in recent months. An analysis of properties traded during the first six months of 2001 reveals that 16% of properties sold were investment properties. This compares to 10% in 1999. This combined with the reduction in investor demand is likely to place further upward pressure on rental inflation in the months ahead.

Commenting Finnegan noted that investors' are a vital ingredisolve the problems of one market".

section of society the Government have however unwittingly worsened the plight of another less fortunate proportion of our community, those who cannot afford to buy a house.

Ms. Finnegan called on the Government to "reassess their approach to investor interest in the residential market by reducing the rate of stamp duty and/or re-introducing mortgage interest relief. If we are to really stabilise the residential market we require a healthy supply of both owner occupied and rented property. Any effort to thwart investor demand will only serve to delay a long-term solution to the housing crisis".

Ms. Finnegan suggested that the rates of stamp duty The proportion of investors applicable to owner-occupiers also need to be reviewed. "Current rates of stamp duty penalise anyone who wishes to buy residential property. The significant deceleration in the rate of asset price inflation has also served to exacerbate the situation - with asset price inflation now less than 5% per annum, stamp duty rates appear even more penalising. Therefore in the interest of a free market environment it is essential that a complete review of the rates of stamp duty be completed if we are ent in the performance of a to encourage investor interest properly functioning proper- and restore confidence in ty market. I would call on any community group that wishes to make a contribution to attend public meetings/workshops organised by the Board and to get involved in the process."

Through his involvement in the CDB, Seán Tobin is a living example of the contribution community leaders can make to the development process in Co Waterford. He is passionately committed to his work both locally in Tallow and as a CDB member. In Sean's own words the County Development Board Strategy "must come from the bottom up" and he intends to do his very best to ensure that this happens.

SENSELESS VANDALISM IN LISMORE

In a night of senseless vandalism, a number of windows were broken in Lismore, with main victims of the damage being two sports facilities in the town - the GAA clubhouse and the Cricket Pavilion.

Summer Concert by St. Carthage's Singers In Lismore Cathedral

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Lovers of choral music are promised an enjoyable evening on Wednesday 22nd August in Lismore Cathedral when St. Carthage's Singers present themselves with a programme spanning nearly five centuries. St. Carthage's Singers are the Choir-in

Residence of Lismore Cathedral, the 22 members contribute regularly to the services in the Cathedral and in other Churches throughout the country. Every year they add to their repertoire. On 22nd August they wish to share their music with a wider audience.

Some of the new additions to the repertoire are very interesting from a musical point of view, for instance 'Haec est Dies' (This is the Day the Lord has made) by the Slovenian composer Jakob Handl (15509 - 1591). It is in fact a piece for two four-part choirs so in order to sing this piece, the Choir will divide itself in two smaller four part choirs. Composing for double choir was very common four centuries ago.

Another highlight will be 'Abendied' (Evening Hymn) by the German composer Josef Rheinberger who died 100 years ago. It is written in 6 parts (SSATTB) and is counted among Rheinberger's most beautiful choral works. Jan van Putten, the Conductor of

St. Carthage's Singers wrote a short piece in 7 parts for a female choir based on the Beatitudes. This composition will be sung by the fourteen ladies of St. Carthage's Singers.

Bonfires as a method of disposing of waste date back to medieval times when fires were used as a means of disposing of animal bones, hence the term bonfire. It is estimated that approximately 16,200 tonnes of household waste is burned annually across the country. Many people who burn their rubbish think that they are doing their bit for the environment by looking after their own waste. The fact of the matter is that bonfires cause air pollution. smoke and fumes and are the source of frequent complaints from disgruntled neighbours to Waterford County Council. Although the material in bonfires nowadays may not be as grisly as the bonfires of yore, they do still cause air pollution and annoy your neighbours by: ruining their washing, disturbing the enjoyment of their gardens and preventing them from opening their windows. Bonfires are controlled by the Air Pollution Act of 1987, under which it is illegal to cause a nuisance. This includes smoke, dust, aerosols and odours emitted in such a quantity 'as to be liable to be injurious to public health, or have a deleterious effect on flora and fauna or damage property or impair / interfere with amenities or the environment'.

Even if your bonfire isn't a cause of annoyance to your neighbours, they do cause air pollution. This is because the types of waste burned such as plastics; rubber; treated timber and timber products, such as formica, chipboard and plywood create an unpleasant odour when burned but also produce a range of toxic fumes. In high concentrations these poisonous compounds can have damaging health effects but if exposure to bonfire smoke is short lived, serious harm is unlikely.

Research by the USEPA has shown that burning of waste in uncontrolled conditions, such as bonfires, is a significant source of dioxins. Dioxins are chemical compounds containing chlorine that are produced as a by-product of combustion processes that reach temperatures of 250-500°C in the presence of a halogen such as chlorine. They have been found to be toxic and adverse to human health, furthermore, once released they are persistent in the environment.

Dioxins have received much attention in relation to arguments for and against the installation of incineration plants in Ireland. But have you ever thought that your own bonfire could produce more dioxins than you are ever likely to encounter due to a municipal incineration plant. Governments in Switzerland and Denmark are concerned about the contribution of uncontrolled burning of household waste to background dioxin levels and are taking action to control household burning of rubbish and to remove items such as plastic milk cartons and printed matter out of stoves and fireplaces. There are other disposal options for materials that you might be tempted to put onto your garden bonfire. Most garden and kitchen waste can be recycled into a use-

ful soil conditioner.

Composting units are available from Waterford County Council at a cost of £20. Phone 058-22000. For this you will get a kitchen caddy, or bucket with a lid, that you can use to store your kitchen scraps and all the information you need to get going. The Council's Anti-Litter Supervisors frequently organise collections of large items such as old furniture, mattresses, and white goods from the county's towns villages and rural areas. Some voluntary groups, charities and second hand shops may also take items you no longer need. Waste that is of no further use can be taken to your nearest

The Inter-Community Litter Challenge has finally come to an end after seven weeks of hard work on the part of all our communities and indeed the judges who have put a lot of time into the event. For those of you who aren't familiar with the challenge, the Inter-Community Litter Challenge is a league that is set up amongst the participating villages and towns. The communities compete against each other on a weekly basis and are given scores on the basis of how free their area is of litter. Great credit is due to all those involved who have not only improved their local environment but have also made us all more aware of the problem of litter and reminded us all that we have a part to play if we want to live in a litter-free

Unfortunately there can only be one winner in each section, but sincere thanks are due to all communities involved, you really have made a difference. However Congratulations are due to Lismore, the winner of the towns competition, and Ballyduff Upper, the winner of the villages competition. There will be a presentation of prizes at the County Environment Awards Evening, which will take place at the end of the year.

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New Doctor For Cappoquin Health Centre

Cappoquin finally looks set to get a new doctor for its health centre - well over a year after Dr. Pat Hill resigned from the post.

One doctor is already in the town, Dr. Ben Murphy and a locum GP has been standing in while the vacancy existed for the past 17 months.

The long running saga begun with the resignation of Dr. Pat Hill from his General Medical Services (GMS) post in Cappoquin in February 2000, with the vacancy being advertised by the South Eastern Health Board and a series of interviews held.

Only one doctor was successful at this stage and he informed the Health Board that he intended to take up the post. However, just a week before he was due to do so, this doctor notified the

interested in the vacancy. As he was the only successful candidate at interview the vacancy had to be advertised once more.

Another series of interviews were held by the Health Board and the successful doctor was due to take up the post in January of this year. Again, shortly before this doctor was due to take up duty, he turned down the post.

For the third time the post was advertised in January of this year and interviews were held. Once again, the candidate who was successful told the Health Board that he would not take up the post. The doctor, however, had a change of heart, as in mid-July, he advised the Board that he would, indeed, be taking up the GMS post in Cappoquin which has been left

Board that he was no longer vacant for almost two years.

The reason for the failure of the post to be filled up until this time, appears more to do with the perceived small practice available to doctors in the town compared to larger urban centres.

One difficulty, which is likely to remain even after the filling of the vacant post is the "after-hours" service provided by the doctors which has been brought to the attention of Cllr. Nora

On Monday's and Tuesday's, Cllr. Flynn said that no real problem exists as a 1:3 rota is taken by doctors where the three doctors based in Cappoquin and Lismore take turns to deal with out of hours patients.

The problem arises, during after hours on Wednesday's through to Friday's and again all day Saturday and Sunday. Doctors then operate on a 1:6 rota with doctors in Conna, Co. Cork, Tallow and Ballyduff Upper added to those in Cappoquin/Lismore.

This results, in a few cases, in patients travelling from Ballinameela to as far away as Conna, to then be referred on to Ardkeen - which is an 80 mile round trip.

Cllr. Flynn said she was in no way criticising doctors and said "nobody can work all the hours God gave them especially not doctors who have such an important job"

Instead, she would like a central call-out system in place, which would operate with a driver, and would be beneficial to both doctors and patients. Alternatively, Cllr. Flynn said that the area where this 1:6 rota operates could be reduced in size and so allow patients to be closer

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I have a disability and I am interested in doing a vocational training course with FAS. Will I keep my Disability Allowance while attending the course?

ANSWER

Up to July 2001 you would have retained your Disability Allowance while on the training course. However, from the 2nd July 2001 FAS are introducing new arrangements for people with disabilities in vocational training.

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If you are getting Disability Allowance or Blind Person's Pension it will be suspended while you are on the course, but you will keep your secondary benefits such as medical card, travel pass etc. You will be paid a FAS training allowance of £85.50 or an amount equal to your social welfare payment, whichever is the greater. You will also receive a training bonus of £25.00 per week.

If you are unable to complete the course or do not have a job at the end of the course, your entitlement to your social welfare payment will be restored.

However, those in receipt of Disability Benefit or Invalidity Pension will retain their social welfare payment as well as their secondary benefits while on a training course. They will also receive the standard FAS training allowance of £85.50 but they will not be paid the £25 training bonus. Further information is available from your local FAS office or the Citizens Information Centre below.

POST LEAVING CERTIFICATE **COURSES AT DUNGARVAN** TECHNICAL COLLEGE

N.C.V.A Level II in Community and Health Services

In previous years, Dungarvan Technical College has successfully run both a Health Science (pre-nursing) and a Childcare course. However, from September 2001, the most important elements of both courses will be combined into a new course entitled Community and Health Services. This course will be run under the auspices of the National Council for Vocational Awards and will include modules such as:

- Anatomy and Physiology ● ☆ntroduction to Nursing
- Child Development
- Early Childhood Education
- Psychology
- Health, Hygiene and Safety

Another important element of the course is work experience, which will be organised on a continual basis throughout the year. As such, students will be accommodated in placements which are appropriate to their future career choices. In addition to normal classes, external speakers will visit students to cover a wide range of topics relevant to their coursework.

The Community and Health Services course is expected

will be of benefit to students who wish to follow a career in Nursing, Childcare or Social Studies.

Nursing

Course co-ordinator Antoinette O'Brien points out that the course is suitable for those considering nursing as a career, particularly if they are interested in applying for a nursing course in the United Kingdom as the NCVA Level II award is recognised for entry into nursing programmes there. "Even for students with their hearts set on gaining a place in Ireland, the research skills and experience developed as a result with their studies."

She points out that the course is particularly beneficial for those who have little experience in nursing and provides excellent preparation for those considering a career in this area.

She states:

"Every September, we meet students who, while they have a genuine interest in nursing, don't really understand what the profession involves. By the end of the year they have grown in confidence and maturity. Many students who in the past have not initially considered nursing in the United

there".

In the past, there has been a very high placement of students from the course nursing programmes in the U.K. This is of particular relevance to students this year as for the first time, application to nursing in Ireland will be through the C.A.0 system. High demand for places will have a corresponding effect on points, placing the option out of reach for many students who would make ideal nurses. As nursing programmes in the United Kingdom accept the NCVA Level II qualification for entry, this course provides an alternaof their coursework helps tive route to the career of their choice.

However, the course is not only relevant to those interested in pursuing a career in nursing, as it also serves as a qualification in Childcare. Ms. O'Brien points out that: "while some modules might intimidate potential childcare students, the broader curriculum allows for a more rounded and successful student."

Those who have completed the course in the past have successfully gained employment in childcare facilities throughout the country.

Social Studies

Another major advantage of Kingdom have applied for the course is that it can act as

to have a wide appeal as it and been offered places a stepping stone to further education at 3rd level. Through the Higher Education Links Scheme, students interested in pursuing courses in Social Studies in Institutes of Technology can access these programmes using their NCVA Level II qualification.

Mature Students

The course may also appeal to those mature students interested in returning to education. Ms. O'Brien adds that more and more mature students are returning to nursing. "For those with little experience, it is a great way of getting their feet wet, as it were, as they can brush up on their research skills and get back in the swing of bonus is that mature students (that is, anyone over 23 years of age) will still be interviewed for a nursing place in Ireland, and a course such as this prepares them for that".

As can be seen therefore, the course in Community and Health Services has a broad appeal. Interested applicants may obtain a prospectus and application form by phoning Dungarvan Technical College at 058 41184. Closing date for application forms is 31st August 2001. There are no tuition fees and students maybe eligible for maintenance grants.

Teaching Your Child To Budget

The spending habits of children are being watched by some of the world's largest corporations. Why is this so? Firstly, the children of today will be the consumers of tomorrow. Secondly, this group of the population has the largest amount of disposable income. As the economy continues its strong growth rate and incomes continue to rise, parents are giving their children more money to

It is important that parents teach their children basic financial concepts when they are young. If this is not done these same children may fall victim to believing that money is an ever present item, even without forward planning.

So how do you teach your children the concepts of money management?

As soon as your child begins to understand the importance of money, explain the purpose of it, i.e. you need if for groceries, car, clothes, toys etc.

It may be a good idea to give your child money to give to the cashier at the checkout when out shopping. Ask the cashier to hand the change to your child. (If your child is old enough, have them count the change received). Play money games with your children at home.

Teach them the purpose of writing a cheque and where the money comes from. Older children could also open their own Cashsave Account and be shown how to use it. Open a saving account at your local credit union. Bring your child with you when doing this and explain how the Credit union works.

Teach your child how to use credit cards responsibly. Many children believe that credit cards are a way to get "free" money and so must be helped to understand that the bill must be paid. Show them the receipts when your purchase something and when the Statement comes show them the corresponding amount on it. This will allow them to make the mental leap from buying the goods in the store and seeing the credit card bill at the end of the month.

Remember most importantly your child needs to know that money does not grow on trees.

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

IRISH TRADITIONAL **FIELD ARCHERY** SOCIETY'S ANNUAL **CHAMPIONSHIPS**

The August bank holiday weekend saw the Deise Archery Club make its first appearance at the Irish Traditional Field Archery Soci-National

Championships. This took place in Glannagh, Co. Longford, and was hosted with great professionalism and goodwill by the Warriors of Queen Maeve traditional field archery club.

Five contestants represented the Deise Archery Club; Michael Power (Gents Hunting Tackle) Kevin Power (Gents Longbow) Geraldine Swayne-Power (Ladies Hunting Tackle) Jeddy Walsh (Gents Flatbow) John O' Rourke (Gents Flatbow).

The weekend started on Friday 3rd August when Ciaran Mullooly and a cameraman from RTE came to the 'Queen Maeve' club in Co. Longford to film a sequence about the sport of traditional field archery. Pip Bickerstaffe and Richard Whittern gave very good accounts of the sport to Ciaran and they, with other club members, did some good acting shooting at some of the targets; rumour has it that we have a good chance of an "Oscar" next year! There is no news yet as to when it will be televised.

The championships proper started the following day, Saturday, with the excellent number of archers who came from Holland and the "Charnwood Archers" club of Nottingham in the UK as well from around Ireland making a total of 40 in all. Before the shooting started there was, what is becoming a tradition, the reenactment of the "olde tyme" custom of tying ladies' favours on to the bows of the archers. In this, the bowmen line up with their bows "presented" while the ladies line up opposite showing their favours.

Each bowman then accepts the favour of his chosen lady and the favour is tied on to the end of his bow. For the longbow-men the favours were coloured bow men --- knickers! All in good fun!

We started shooting in the woods at about 11 o'clock. The course was a very good and challenging one set by the very experienced people from Charnwood; some of the ranges were long and the target situations tricky. We shot the first 16 targets in good weather and in woods, new to the club, that



It is time for everybody in the game to realise that no expense is being spared in the coaching and development of our games

The referee is now the poor relation. They must be given, at least, the same recognition and rewards and pandering as the players. Many matches are televised and local matches video-taped. Refs would benefit from match analysis of these tapes in the company of other referees and maybe the opposing coaches or captains or some such format.

Until some such format is introduced, our games will be at a disadvantage and so will our refs. Put them on the same level as the players and train them properly and look after them as we should. This will help the recruitment campaign.

G.A.A. NOTES

Now that the dust is beginning to settle after all the furore over the appointment of Justin McCarthy, Colm Bonner and Seamie Hannon the focus will will be on the appointment of a football manager in the next few weeks. Already, the people with their ears to the ground are hearing rumours (supposed to be well founded) of the appointment of a high profile outside football coach who will undertake the mammoth task of trying to transform the county panel of footballers into a team with worthwhile prospects of making progress.

Being a new man and most of all being an outsider, I have no doubt but that the many 'high profile' players who have not been putting their shoulders to the wheel, so to speak in recent years, will take a fresh look at things and make whatever effort that is needed to mount a serious challenge in the national league.

I must confess to having absolutely no hope of winning a Munster championship while the present provincial set-up continues. If we set our sights on trying to win our division of the league involving the lower 8 counties and if we give it our best shot, then progress is

possible. While we continue to lose and lose and lose, outside counties will begin to regard us as an inferior breed of footballers. What makes all this even worse is the feeling that they might be right.

On the hurling front, things will now begin to move on and Justin, Colm and Seamie will assess the quality of player performances in the concluding matches of the championship. The outgoing panel is now disbanded and over the several weeks ahead the recruitment will continue on a gradual basis to form the new panel. There are no guarantees of places.

I'm sure the selectors will be greatly disappointed to hear of the efforts to play the full leagues within the calendar year. Playing hurling in the month of February (as is proposed) when pitches are normally sodden and muddy and patrons in no mood to sit it out on cold stands and embankments, is just not on. Also the many counties with duel players will find that the non-stop action and switching from one code to the other over the ten weeks of the February to May schedule will put them under abnormal pressure.

October/November is an ideal time for getting the leagues off the ground as then the weather and conditions are way more suitable. Of course it might be a problem for counties with players on the Australian Rules panel. For us, with a new team of selectors, an October start would be a big help in assessing the quality of players before the pressures of the new year get

The minor hurling selection committee is already named and approved and it is expected that the other committees will be named at the county board meeting on September 10th.

It has been suggested to me that a different approach should be adopted for the appointment of selectors for junior football and intermediate hurling. Those two championships are no big deal and will very likely be dispensed with in time. In the present climate these championships are hardly worth the pressures they cause or the expense that they incur.

The approach which was suggested is that the county intermediate hurling champions with a third selector from the county junior champions, be given charge and management of the county intermediate team and a similar system to apply for junior football
