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Top Marks For Leaving Cert Students

Pay claims, disruptions, strikes and counter-strikes were all but forgotten on Wednesday last, as students received their Leaving Cert grades, having endured more than most during the past school year.

The points race and the scramble for college courses were not the only things the class of 2000-01 had to contend with. A long running pay dispute between the ASTI and the Government meant school closures, pickets and even student walkouts during the course of the year.

A small number of sixth year students from Ard Scoil na Deise found this out early in the year, and during one of the strike days attempted to enter the school and "demanded" to be supervised.

Demonstrations from students throughout the country increased in regularity as the school year drew to a close and ASTI strikes intensified.

This trend of student demonstrations was followed locally with St. Augustian students staging a peaceful walk-out and continued their protest at the gates of the school for a number of hours.


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
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Winner At RDS

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West Waterford's Postal Network To Be Crippled By Strikes?

Industrial action, which would ultimately involve West Waterford's postal network, looks on the cards, following an angry response by ostmasters to government plans to change the face of the rural postal service as we know it.

An overhaul of loss making An Post has already been recommended to the Government. The recommendation states that the rural post offices should move away from a fixed cost retainer model to an agency basis, which, in effect, would allow private company's to run this service.

These recommendations would affect the 10 rural post offices in the immediate West Waterford area and could, in the long term, see the closure of one or more of

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THE WAY WE LIVE: HISTORY

THE MUSLIM **EMPIRE**

The Prophet Muhammad was a religious leader who lived in Arabia from AD 570 to 632. Muhammad taught people to worship Allah (God) and to live good lives.

His teaching led to the growth of a major world religion, called Islam ('obedience to God'). It is still followed by millions of people today. In AD 622 Muhammad was forced by enemies to leave his home city, Mecca.

He went to Medina, an Arabian market town, where he and his companions developed a new lifestyle, based on their faith. They became known as 'Muslims' - the people of

Muhammad returned to Mecca with an army in AD 630, and captured it. Soon, Muslim soldiers took control of all Arabia, spreading their faith wherever they went. By AD 750 they had conquered a vast empire, stretching from southern Spain to the borders of China.


A Great Muslim City

The Muslim lands were ruled by princes called caliphs, and governed by Muslim laws. At first the caliphs' capital was at Medina, then at Damascus (in Syria), but they soon moved it to Baghdad, a magnificent new city (now in Iraqui.

Baghdad was founded by Caliph al-Mansur in AD 762. It was a circular city with a great mosque at the centre, and the caliph's palace nearby.

Within the city walls there were schools, hospitals, bath-houses, libraries, gardens, fountains, markets, shops, and an observatory for studying the stars.

In 1258, Baghdad was destroyed by invading Mongol armies.



The city of Mecca, in Arabia, was an ancient holy site. After AD 630, when the Prophet Muhammad and his soldiers captured Mecca, it became the holiest place in the Muslim world and an important centre of pilgrimage.

At the heart of the city stood the Kaaba ('cube'), a building housing a holy relic known as the Black Stone. Muhammad taught that the Jewish Prophet Abraham had worshiped God there, long ago.

Today, Muslim people aim to make a pilgrimage to Mecca at least once in their lives.

GENGHIS KHAN

During the 13th century, the Muslim lands were conquered by fierce Mongol armies.

The Mongols were nomads, who who lived in central Asia. In 1206, all the Mongol tribes joined together under the leadership of a soldier prince called Temujin, and set off to conquer new lands.

Temujin took the title 'Genghis Khan' (it means 'world ruler'). He united all the lands conquered by the Mongols into a mighty empire, made new laws and encouraged trade. When he died in 1227, he ruled all Asia. and half China, too.

Educational disadvantage remains a serious problem in this country and the burden of providing uniforms and footwear is a significant factor in the low participation rates of low income students in the education system. Government must take the lead in this endeavour and make a real commitment to assisting parents with the costs of putting their children through school."

PETER O'CONNOR

Peter O'Connor was born in Wicklow, around 1872, but spent most of his life in Waterford. He was a world athlete and commenced his athletic career in 1898. His first All-Ireland Championship competition was in

1899. He broke the world record for the long jump at this competition, and also broke records in the 200 yards race and the Hop, Skip and Jump (48 feet). In 1901 he set the world record in the long jump of 24 feet, 11.75 inches, in Dublin. This remained an international record for 25 years and an Irish record for 89 years. He was British long jump champi-on from 1901 to 1906. His best athletic years were between 1900 and 1904. He won the Gold Medal in the hop, skip and jump, and the Silver Medal in the long

jump at the Olympics of 1906 (tenth anniversary games at Athens). He was 34 years of age at this stage, which made his achievements all the more remarkable. At that time Irish athletes competed under the British flag. O'-Connor refused to wear British colours at the medal ceremony and insisted on waving a green flag to indicate his nationality.



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

GARDENING gives you the ideal opportunity to enjoy the great outdoors - right on your doorstep.

You don't need to travel, you don't need to plan, you don't even need to be kitted out with special equipment. You simply step outside the backdoor and you're ready to

But like all outdoor activities, there are a host of accessories that can make pursuing your hobby more convenient, more comfortable - and less vulnerable to the great British weather.

When you're gardening the chances are you'll be in the privacy of your own backyard and nobody will take a great deal of notice of your choice of clothing. You don't need to make a fashion statement and unlike walking or cycling, designer gear has made little impact on the world of gardening.

SOW SCHIZANTHUS FOR SPRING FLOWERING

Sow now in order to have really large schizanthus for spring decorations in the greenhouse or conservatory. Sow seeds thinly in well-drained seed boxes using a seed compost and germinate in a frame. The cooler the conditions the better.

SOW WINTER SPINACH AND SPINACH BEET

Choose a sheltered place and make a sowing of prickly-seeded spinach to stand the winter. Sow the seed thinly in drills 2.5cm deep and 30cm apart.

You can make a sowing of spinach beet now for use in winter and spring. This useful variety of beetroot is grown solely for its leaves, used as a spinach substitute.

START TO GATHER **MUSHROOMS FROM OUTDOOR BEDS**

If you were able to make a mushroom bed in the open in July you should examine it now for the first mushrooms. Gather the buttons (young mushrooms) as they form. The bed should continue well into the autumn.





Provision for Autumn Grass Must be Planned:

Maximising the provision of autumn grazing will result in considerable savings of winter feed as well as reducing the amount of labour and the quantity of slurry that has to be stored and handled. There are however a few precautions it is a mistake to be overzealous in trying to get every last blade of grass eaten before the end of the year. Avoid severe poaching and finish grazing by 1st November, all fields that are intended for grazing in March of next year. At this time of the year growth is slowing down so it takes longer to build up grass cover and at the same time the rate at which pasture matures and begins to decay is also slowing down so rotation periods between grazings can be lengthened considerably. **Build Up Grass Supply:-**

With the trend towards just one silage cut, it is easy to build up grass cover in July and August. In fact one of the grassland management problems with one silage cut is too much grass in July/August which often necessitates making surplus as baled silage or hay. With the whole farm available for grazing it should be possible to build up grass reserves between early mid August and mid September. After that, growth rates will be lower than the daily herd demand and reserves (grazing days ahead) will fall. To get satisfactory build-up of grass reserves, say 30 - 40 grazing days ahead by mid September, it is necessary to lengthen the rotation length up to 35 days. This is more easily achieved by keeping all the stock in one or two groups and having a large number of paddocks. Controlled rotational grazing allows the allocation of grass supply to stock requirements, reduces waste and extends the grazing season. Split up large silage fields with temporary fencing to get a better balance between daily supply and requirements.

Response to Nitrogen:-

In August a response of about 12 kg grass dry matter per kilo of nitrogen can be expected. The response declines to about 8 kg DM per kg N by mid September and about 5 kg DM/kg N by late September and early October. However, these are general guideline responses and there is considerable variation with weather, soil and sward types.

LISMORE CAPTURED IN POETRY

For a place to have a collection of poems written about it is the ultimate compliment. It happens only rarely, and often such works sink into mushy sentimentality. This is not the case in this excellent collection - Lismore. Poems in celebration by Eugene Dennis. Dennis has the advantage of belonging but not belonging to his objective correlative as it were. He sees with the real poet's detached eye and evaluates with a good writer's sympathy and sensibility. Such endeavour is about celebrating the immemorial (it doesn't stop at that); a task more crucial in an age of globalisation which is geared to homogenisation and may even get involved in suppressing the immemorial. In other words, only the expedient, the faddish current and the utili-

With my Deise connections, if not Lismore, I had great pleasure in reviewing some time back. The Lismoreian - A Millennial Miscellany which Dennis edited. The literary standard in that journal was quite outstanding hence my delight in receiving Dennis' poems for review. I've not been disappointing, and what is remarkable is the poetry's diversity in subject matter and indeed form - you get the lyric, the epic, and the dramatic. Aisling Last Forge in Lismore is a type of epic ballad in a novel aisling form (explained by Dennis in a footnote). It captures brilliantly the whole daleidoscopic world of that most crucial functionary, the blacksmith-cum-farrier, in particular the Vaughan family of Lismore. If poetry is essentially about the eternal verities it is too, about loss or potential loss whether the loss be because of natural wastage or decline. neglect or crass indifference. The blacksmith's decline is sad but not tragic. His genius has been transformed and it is imperative that he be suitably memorialised - himself, his work and culture, the forge and so on. Dennis celebrates this better than any one I know. We must know what we come from to become what we can.

There are nearly fifty poems in the collection. While most are Lismore connected there are poems set in Cappoquin, Melleray, Ring and the general Lismore (greater) area, with a few non-specific poems, for example, Another Final Solution, which explores quite penetratingly and humorously the art of writing poetry. I cannot recommend this collection highly enough. The poems have a clinically and arresting language and images I admire and are not over poeticised with, for example, a metaphor on every line and alliterative overkill. Though the poems are overall Lismore specific as noted they could be universalised to any place, nor are they merely time-bound. Many are realised by connections to recent Irish conditions, for example, Vocation Evocation, Springback Meditation and even the whimsical Fair Field. Wordsworth wrote about Lucy; Dennis' Kate Pender is as transferable as Lucy!

Finally, the book is a fine production and the two illustrations towards the end totally endearing. A real bargain at the give-away three pounds at the Lismore Heritage Centre, at least initially. Stocks are limited so get a copy by hook or by crook; as I wrote earlier, 'Even if you hate poetry you'll love this, indeed, the Intro by Dennis himself is a gem in itself - in prose!' 

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I have been called for jury service. I am working and I believe jury service can last for several weeks. Will I be paid when I am unable to work?

ANSWER

You will be paid but not by the court.

If you are called for jury service you must attend unless you are excused. The Juries Act 1976 requires an employee to be given time off to attend the court. Some groups such as doctors, nurses and members of religious orders are entitled to be excused from jury service as of right. If you are ill or for any other good reason you do not wish to serve, you can apply to the County Registrar to be excused.

When you are attending for jury service you will not be paid by the court, nor will you be paid expenses. Should you actually serve on a jury your lunch may be provided. However, you are entitled to be paid by your employer as you are considered to be in employment and you should not lose any other employment entitlements such as annual leave.

If your employer requests proof that you did attend court you can obtain a certificate of attendance from the jury office

As part of the Student Summer Job Scheme, the Council has also employed two teams of beach cleaners one for the East of the County and one for the west. Well done to both teams who have been working away all summer to make sure that our beaches are pleasant places to visit. This can be a mammoth task as some people show flagrant disregard for others and the law. On the Spot Fines await anyone seen casually walking away from their picnic remains or dirty nappies after a day at the seaside. It is an offence to leave litter in any public place, an offence punishable by a £50 on-the -spot fine.

Building sites are another thorn in the side of the Anti-Litter Supervisors. Nowadays, building materials come wrapped in layers of packaging and much of it can end up as litter. However, builders as owners or persons responsible for any place that can be seem from a public place are responsible for keeping that area litter free. They must also take steps to make sure that lunch-time wrappers and packaging such as plastic and aeroboard will not fly off in the wind and become litter somewhere else. Beware this offence is also punishable by a £50 on-the -spot fine. If convicted of a litter offence in court the fine could rise to £1,500 and clean-up and legal costs may be added to this sum.





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

James the 7th Earl of Desmond who died in 1468 sent his son, Sir Gerald Mor Fitzgerald, to the Decies to see to his interests there. He was described as Lord of the Decies and he lived in a castle towering over the River Blackwater at Dromana. Here he could command the great river highway of the western Decies, which linked it with the outside world. He lived until 1488 and was succeeded by his son John who saw the beginning of a great change in Ireland.

In 1513 a meeting was held in Dromana to form an alliance between Sir Pierce Butler, later Earl of Ormond and Donal McCarthy, described as Prince of Carbery. It was typical of the local alliances that were necessary to defend property at that time. They made peace and then made some arrangements for mutual aid if attacked by third parties. Arbitrators were appointed in case of disputes. Thadeus, Donal McKrath (McGrath), Margaret Fitzgerald, Maurice Omehynan and two others were the witnesses of a signed agreement between them. The second signature was that of the leader of the McGrath swordsmen and the first time that the name of one of the family appears on a legal document. By this time normal law and order had broken down and the local lords ruled their territories independently, so that each lord "made law and peace for himself".



A chara,

I refer to the coverage in your issue of August 17 of the Bord Pleanála oral hearing regarding the proposed development of the Glanbia site in Dungarvan. I was an appellant along with Michael Regan (and not Martin Regan, as reported by you) against the decision by Dungarvan Urban Council to grant permission to the plans prepared for the site by Clancy Construction. As we were both out of the

country, in line with arrangements made long before the date of the hearing was decided, we prepared an audiovisual presentation which was shown at the hearing on the afternoon of August 8. As your report presented the main points made in other submissions to the hearing, I would be glad of this opportunity to provide a brief synopsis of our presentation.

Michael Regan and I fully support the development of the Glanbia site, but this should be done according to the principles set out in the Draft Dungarvan Development Plan which was adopt-

ed by Dungarvan Urban Council last December. This Plan requires the redeveloped Glanbia site to be integrated with the existing historic town centre in terms of design, streetscape and interaction. We contend that, as a stand-alone suburban-type development, the shopping centre proposed for the site by Clancy Construction is not in compliance with these requirements. We also contend that the Clancy proposals do not provide a mix of residential and other non-retail functions in the shopping centre which forms the

core of the proposed development. As a result, the shopping centre and surrounding car parks will be a desert at night, or more likely a magnet for antisocial activ-

We also argue that the application submitted by Clancy Construction did not provide sufficient information to allow the planning authority to properly assess its planning implications. Our conclusion is that the applicants should be requested to go back to the drawing board and produce a new proposal in sympathy both with the Development Plan and with Dungarvan's outstanding architectural heritage.


PLAYERS IN THE U.S.A.



Forty eight hours of heavy rain made the sod on Dr. Cullen Park very slippery but, thankfully, the rain stopped at match time as the team that have become very familiar through the under-age ranks, tore into one another and Meath had a gilt-edged chance in the first minute, but Waterford keeper, Mary Hayes made a great save as Waterford weathered the early storm and a break downfield led to a free which Aoife Murphy

duly pointed.



Sliabh gCua Touraneena 2001 Eigse

Sliabh gCua 2001 Touraneena celebrates the past pupils of the local school and the priests and religious of the area in a weekend festival: "Fr. Jim Kiely Remembered."

In what must be one of the most unique projects of its kind, the people of Sliabh gCua have constructed a memorial to a well known Augustinian priest and in doing so have also brought attention to the work of Fr Jim and that of the many priests and religious who came out of that area and travelled to many different parts of the country and the world - wherever their vocations took them.

The friends of the late Fr Jim Kiely, OSA, in association with Cáirde Sliabh gCua have come together and erected a memorial to his memory and to the priests and religious who were born in Touraneena parish in County Waterford.

Sliabh gCua has strong religious traditions and over the years the area has given many sons and daughters to the religious life and many, as well as Fr Jim, have had much achievement and received wide acknowledgement in their chosen vocation

At the time of his death in 1995 Fr Jim was serving as Director of the Irish Bishops Chaplaincy Service in Great Britain, a position which Archbishop Cassidy of Tuam described as having responsibility equivalent to that of a Bishop. His funeral and memorial Masses in London, in Drogheda and in his native parish, drew massive attendances. In Hammersmith, church and state were represented and Cardinal Daly sent his special represen-

The erection of the memorial was part of the annual Eigse Sliabh gCua, an annual weekend festival to celebrate the many traditions of the area and this year, as well as constructing and unveiling the memorial, it included a reunion of the old Touraneena national school.

The week-end Eigse was formally opened by Waterford Co Council Chairman, Ollie Wilkinson, who praised the work of those involved in initiating and maintaining the festival and extended a céad mile fáilte to all visitors to Sliabh gCua and County Waterford. The memorial, which had been in planning since the millennium year 2000, was unveiled in the presence of a huge gathering by Sr. Ann Kiely, following an oration by local resident and former Waterford County Council Chairman Sean Whelan who gave a summary of the life and work of Fr Jim.

Project coordinator John Power described the memorial as the laities acknowledgement and tribute to Fr Jim and the religious of Sliabh gCua and said that Fr Jim is but one in a long line of priests and religious from the Sliabh gCua area who made a notable contribution to society through their vocations, many achieving high office in their ministries. He said that biographical details on all these will be listed in a booklet to be drawn up and published shortly on the basis of material available on all those concerned

The initiative for the memorial came from Cáirde Sliabh

It comprises a limestone frontage, an inscription and the names of Fr Jim and the deceased priests and other religious who were born in the area. It will serve as a haven of rest for parishioners to sit and talk (as Fr Jim often did at this site), and

be a focal point for local gath-

erings. The hallmark of the memorial is its simplicity.

Fr. Connie Kelleher P.P. blessed the memorial and a group of young dancers and musicians under the guidance of Monnie Hallahan provided Fleadh cheoil type street entertainment in the village of Touraneena which was decorated for the occasion, while hundreds of visitors admired the new memorial, including former Augustinian colleagues Fr. Ben O'Brien, OSA and Fr. Michael Leahy, OSA and friends and relatives of the priests and religious listed on the memorial. Fr Jim's sisters, Sr. Ann Kiely, Superior General of the Franciscan Missionaries, Sr. Angela Kiely and Sr. Marie Kiely, were present.

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





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
