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Work Expected To Begin On New Lismore School

Work is expected to begin before the end of the year on

a new £4.81million school that will see the amalgamation of the Presentation Con-

vent Lismore, Lismore CBS and St. Anne's in Cappoquin.

The school, which will be built on the site of the present Christian Brothers school in Lismore, will cater for 650 students and will be constructed by McInerney Construction Ltd.

Sixty teaching and administrative personnel will staff the school, with any redundancies likely to be volun-

tary, according to principal of Lismore CBS, Maurice Geary.

The position of headmaster at the new school, itself, has not yet been confirmed and Mr. Geary said the position will have to go through "advertisement and interview," before the appointment will be made.

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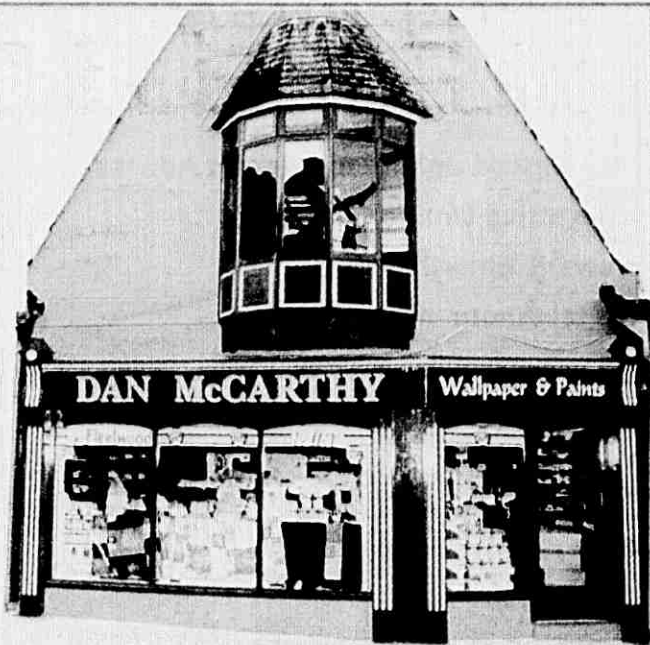
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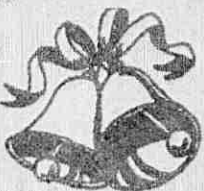

New Section Of Dungarvan To Youghal Road May Begin Next Year

A two kilometre stretch of land, from Piltown to Youghal, may be subject to a Compulsory Purchase Order in the next year if passed during the next meeting of Waterford County Council.

The land due to be compulsorily purchased is needed for a new section of the Dungarvan to Youghal road be-

tween Piltown and Youghal. Progress on the road had been delayed earlier in the year as an environmental study - carried out by Duchas - found an area around Piltown cross to be a protected wildlife habitat.

Vincent O'Connor from the Main Roads Grants Section of Waterford County Council said "because of these find-

ings the design had to be changed around Piltown cross and what was agreed with Duchas was that a compensation site was to be created."

This in effect meant another wetlands area beside the one originally found had to be formed. This was done to compensate for the area affected by the new section of road at Piltown cross.

However, Mr. O'Connor said that "all the Compulsory Purchase Order maps have been completed. And they will now go to Waterford County Council for their approval."

If approval is given, this will start the CPO procedure. Members of Waterford County Council will vote on the area selected, and if approved, the land to be compulsorily purchased will be advertised and submissions invited.

"Hopefully", Mr. O'Connor said "the whole thing will be sorted out in six months time. If this happens we will then be looking for funding from the NRA (National Roads Authority) and it may go to tender next year."

Waterford Deputy Brian O'Shea, welcomed the progress "on this very important section of the Dungarvan/Cork road" and said he will be "pursuing the matter

of having this project brought to conclusion at the earliest possible stage".

In all, it is expected that the 2km stretch will cost approximately £4 million to carry out with work expected to take in the region of one year to complete. A contractor may be on site by the middle of next summer.

THE WAY WE LIVE: HISTORY

EARLY CHINA AND JAPAN

Chinese people called their nation the 'Middle Kingdom.' They believed it was the centre of the world. From AD 618 to 1279, under the Tang and Song dynasties (families of emperors), China was one of the richest and most advanced civilisations on Earth.

The Chinese built huge, splendid cities, and developed new and better varieties of rice. The population increased rapidly, and the army conquered many large areas of land.

Chinese scientists made many important inventions and discoveries, such as printing, paper-making, gunpowder, rockets and clockwork. Chinese craft-workers made silk cloth and porcelain (which we call 'china'), that were highly prized in Europe, Africa and Asia.

FOOD GROWING

In warm South China and sheltered lowland Japan, rice grew very well. In cold North China and the Japanese mountains, wheat and barley were the usual crops.

THE GREAT WALL OF CHINA

For centuries, China was divided into many separate states, which were often at war. In 221 BC, Prince Cheng from the state of Qin, conquered all the others and united them. He became China's first emperor, and reigned until 210 BC.

Cheng was a formidable ruler. He imprisoned or killed all his enemies, burned books he did not agree with, passed new laws, built roads and canals, and introduced a new system of coins, weights and measures. He also rebuilt earlier, small-scale earthworks to create a huge Great Wall to defend his empire from enemy attack.

CHINESE CITIES

Chinese cities were administered by government officials. They collected taxes and made sure the laws were obeyed.



SAMURAI WARRIORS

Samurai fought with swords, bows and arrows, and were expert horse-riders. They wore strong but light-weight armour, made of leather and wicker (woven bamboo). Their helmets were often decorated with splendid crests.



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Dungarvan Technical College's "Forward-Looking" Proposal Secures Guidance Counsellor

new Guidance Counsellor for the school.

The scheme was launched last Wednesday, by Education and Science Minister Dr. Michael Woods, who gave an assurance that the positions would be permanent.

Dungarvan Technical College Principal Pat Buckley welcomed the announcement and stated that "it will be of major benefit to the students in the college in that it will allow the career guidance teacher to liaise more with local industries."

Mr. Buckley concluded by thanking the Department of Education "for this very important new initiative which will be of major benefit to students and employers".

Launching the initiative Minister Woods said that the availability of Guidance Counsellors to second level students, "will greatly enhance the education and training of many of our young people".

The new posts are being

allocated to schools who are in the course of developing innovative ways of enhancing guidance for students, especially those in disadvantaged areas, and to promote links between schools, businesses, voluntary organisations and state agencies, the Minister said.

"All second level schools were invited to submit proposals on the actions they would take to enhance guidance initiatives in schools. Almost 500 proposals were received", Dr. Woods said.

A panel of assessors from the National Council for Guidance in education, external experts and the Department of Education and Science ranked the proposals and a decision was made on this basis.

Dungarvan Technical College was one of just five schools in Waterford to be selected, and the only one to receive a full post, the others - based in Waterford City - will share Guidance Counsellors.

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Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Spicy Chicken Kebab

THIS delicious and warming meal is best served with rice and salad.

Preparation: 3 hours
Cooking: 25 mins

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

1.5kg chicken pieces
2 onions, finely chopped
50ml oil
1 x 5ml sp dried thyme
1 bay leaf
1/2 x 5ml sp paprika
freshly ground black pepper
4 small courgettes
4 small tomatoes

REMOVE skin and bone from chicken pieces, using a small sharp knife.

Cut meat into 2cm pieces. Place in a bowl with onions, oil, thyme, crumbled bay leaf, paprika, salt and pepper. Wash courgettes, trim ends and cut into 1cm pieces. Add to marinade and marinate for two to three hours.



Preheat grill. Drain chicken and courgettes, reserving marinade.

Peel tomatoes and cut in half, remove the seeds. Thread pieces of tomato,

chicken and courgette alternatively onto four skewers, dividing ingredients evenly between them.

Place on grill rack, brush liberally with marinade.

Sprinkle with a little paprika. Grill for 20 minutes or until chicken is well cooked, lowering heat to moderate after five minutes and turning skewers to cook evenly.

Mussel In On This Moules Marinieres

THERE are several versions of this recipe for mussels but this is the easiest to prepare.

Preparation: 30 mins
Cooking: 10 mins

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

4 pints mussels
1 small onion
3-4 x 15ml sp dry white wine
25g butter
1 x 5ml sp plain flour
1 x 5ml sp chopped parsley

WASH the mussels in cold water, scrub shells and rinse to remove all grit. Pull away the beards. Discard any mussels with broken shells and any which remain open when tapped.

Thoroughly butter the inside of a large saucepan.

Peel and finely chop the onion put in saucepan with wine.

Place all mussels in the pan at once and cover with a lid.

Cook over high heat and shake pan for three to five minutes until all the mussels have opened.

Take pan from the heat and lift out the mussels, discarding any that have not opened. Remove the empty half shell from each mussel and place the other half with the mussel attached in individual soup plates. Keep hot.

Cream butter and flour together and blend into the liquid in pan.

Stir the sauce over a low heat until it has thickened and is boiling. Add the parsley and pour over the mussels. Serve at once.

Marrow Casserole – Firm and Tasty

MARROW has such a high water content that it loses most of its flavour if steamed or cooked in water. Check out the recipe below, and serve up firm, tasty marrows on your dinner table.

Preparation: 10 mins
Cooking: 30 mins

Ingredients:

(Serves 4-6)

1 young marrow
50 g butter
2 tx 15ml sp mixed fresh herbs – tarragon, mint, parsley and chives
Salt and black pepper

Method:

CUT the marrow into

2.5cm thick slices.

Peel and cut them into rough chunks, discarding all the seeds as you do so.

Butter an oven proof dish thoroughly.

Add the marrow with the remaining butter cut into small knobs and sprinkle it with the mixture of fresh, finely chopped herbs.

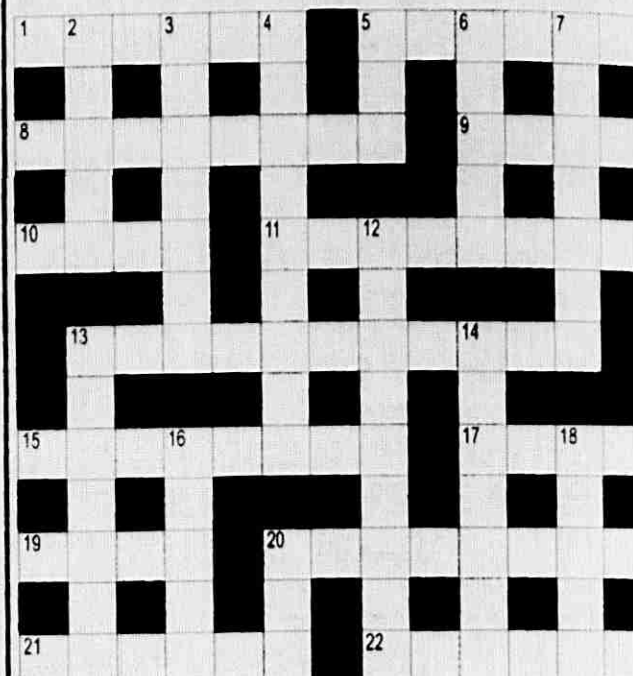
Season with salt and freshly ground pepper.

Cover the dish with a lid or foil and bake it in the centre of a preheated oven at approximately 180°C until just tender – after about 30 mins.

Be careful not to overcook. Serve the marrow at once, straight from the dish.

Heritage Week

As part of the museum society's contribution to Heritage Week, a display

marking the anniversary of Dungarvan Dramatic Club which was founded in 1941 is currently on view.

Rev. James Vincent Cleary D.D.

He was born in Dungarvan on 18 September 1828, son of Thomas Cleary (1792- 1871) a merchant of Main Street and Margaret O'Brien (1800-1858). They had four other sons, Matthew, Michael, John and

Rev. Patrick Cleary. James Vincent was educated at Salamanca and Rome. After his ordination in 1851 he obtained a degree of Doctor of Sacred Theology in 1862. He returned to Ireland where he was appointed professor of Dogmatic Theology and Biblical Exposition in St John's College Waterford. In 1872 he was made President of the College. He was made Vicar General of the Diocese

of Waterford in 1875. Father Cleary was appointed Dungarvan parish priest on 13 February 1876 and it was he who initiated the improvements to the Parish Church. Little had been done to the church since it had been built 48 years earlier in 1828. In October 1880 he was appointed Bishop of Kingston and was consecrated in Rome on 21 November 1880 by Cardinal Simeoni assisted by Dr. Croke, Bishop of Cashel, and Bishop George Butler of Limerick.

Cleary left Ireland on 16 March 1881 to take up his new appointment: From the time of his arrival in Kingston Bishop Cleary stood out as one of the great intellects of his time in Canada.

He rebuilt the Cathedral in Kingston and ordered a set of stained glass windows from the same company who supplied those for Dungarvan Parish Church. He died on 24 February 1898 aged 70 and was buried in a vault in the St. James Memorial Chapel. In his will dated 18 February 1898, he bequeathed \$30,000 for the endowment of 3 chairs at Regiopolis College and \$5,000 for a Scholarship Fund.

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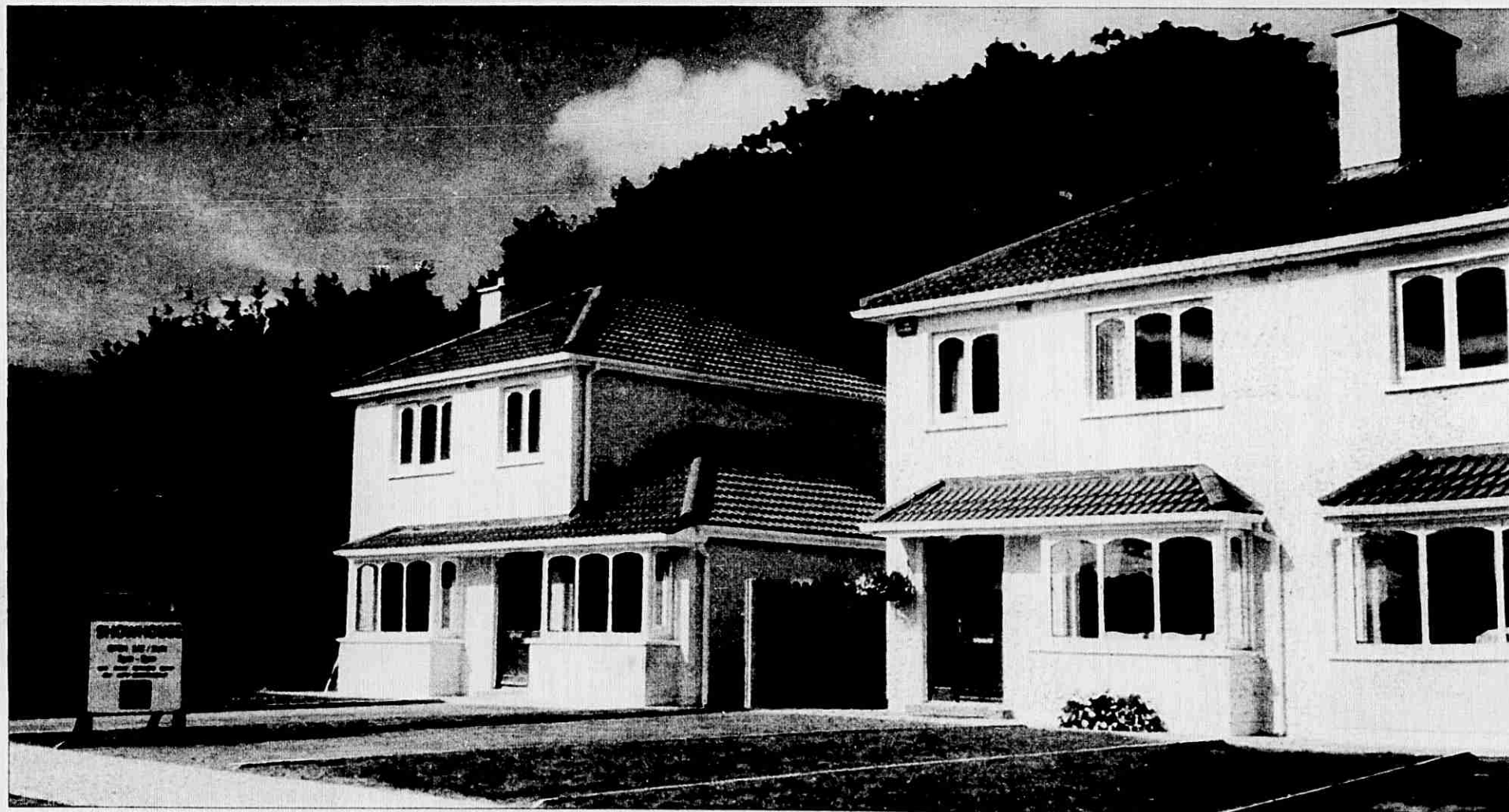
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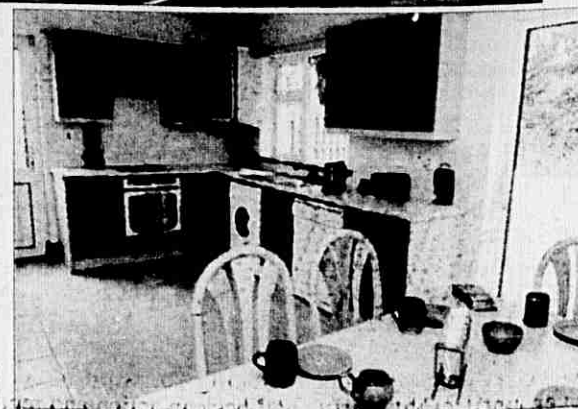

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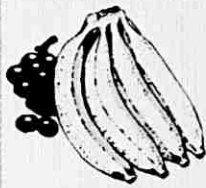

Reflections on the Narcissus

THERE are some flowers even the most uninterested non-gardener recognises immediately. Daffodils are one of the select band of universally popular plants.

Contrary to popular belief there is no difference between a daffodil and a narcissus.

The botanical name narcissus is used for both plants and the separation into narcissus and daffodil is an entirely artificial one created by gardeners.

Narcissi thrive best in a strong, fertile, well-drained soil. They do not appreciate being planted in soil dressed with fresh farmyard manure and once established, the flowering of the bulbs will be improved by an annual feed with a complete fertiliser at 56g per square metre, each February.

PLANTING

Bulbs are best planted in August or early September, if possible, so the roots are well established by the time

growth stops at the onset of the cold weather.

Depth of planting depends on the bulb size; smaller species 5 to 8cm deep, larger flowered species and hybrids 10 to 15cm deep in bare soil, 10 to 20cm deep under the lawn.

LEAVES

A common practice is to knot the leaves so they look tidy after they have flowered, but it is not a wise one. The bulb needs its green foliage after flowering in order to replace the energy spent on the bloom. It recharges its botanical batteries by exposing green leaves to the sunlight.

If you bundle the leaves up, you reduce their surface area and so reduce their sun-trapping efficiency.

You will also split and distort the tissues that transport nutrients and moisture down the bulb.

However, knotting the leaves is certainly better than cutting them off completely.

But for the health of the bulb and of next sea-

son's flowers, it is much better to let the foliage die down naturally. If you must knot for tidiness, at least wait until the leaves start to fade and the tips become limp.



DIVIDING

As long as a clump of daffodils is bursting with colour, you need not disturb it. The simple rule is to divide when a mass of tightly packed foliage produces only a scattering of flowers.

How often you will need to divide the clumps depends upon the variety of daffodil, but as a rough guide it will generally be no more than once every five or six years.

Lift the clump when the foliage has died, and separate the bulbs. Replant the bulbs as soon as possible as daffodils do not benefit from being out of the ground unlike some other bulbs.

Growing Ornamental Shrubs

ORNAMENTAL shrubs are more popular today than they have ever been - even the smallest balcony can easily accommodate one.

But for the serious gardener the growing of ornamental shrubs can be a very satisfying and rewarding hobby.

Many ornamental shrubs are tender plants that prefer sheltered sites or dry or moist shade. But others can be hardy and thrive even in the most exposed conditions.

These hardy shrubs are perhaps the best kind for the beginner to grow. But because they are hardy does not mean they cannot be beautiful, and some of the best of the blooming shrubs can thrive in bleak and windy sites, although some are not suitable for coastal areas.

However, it is important to make sure you have the right kind of soil and it is important to make heavy soils more open and free-draining. Many shrubs like moist soil types, while broom and lavender thrive on well-drained soils. Rhododendrons and other ericaceous plants prefer acid soil, while others such as hypericum and philadelphus do well on alkaline soils.

Shrubs may be planted in boxes or containers or in open ground. Many gardeners like to design a shrub garden in advance. But remember, small shrubs can grow into large ones!

Autumn is the main period for planting shrubs in containers but it is important to ensure you select a container that is the right size for the plant.

Established shrubs are easy to care for and need watering only during periods of prolonged drought. But most shrubs do benefit from regular applications of fertiliser.

Flowering shrubs including rhododendron and lilac benefit if fading flowerheads are promptly removed.

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FARMING LEADER

10,000 JOBS AT STAKE IN FARMING

The ICMSA has predicted unprecedented job-losses in farming due to an impending disaster in the beef sector. The President of the Association, Mr. Pat O'Rourke who will today lead a demonstration outside the Department of Agriculture in Dublin said: "Losses of £170 million will be borne by all 135,000 farmers with cattle. However, 15,000 full-time farmers who are totally dependent on beef face into the winter with no income".

The Association is predicting the biggest job losses ever in the sector, as 10,000 farmers will cease to farm unless the beef crisis can be resolved. Coming after years of very low income, these farmers will not continue full time in beef production. ICMSA believe the

Government, even at this late stage, should be gravely concerned with this unfolding catastrophe for farming and rural Ireland.

Mr. O'Rourke said: "The Government may have been indifferent when the roar of the Celtic Tiger would have drowned out the concerns and the call for help from rural Ireland. However, with the slowing of economic growth and job losses, employment in farming and the food sector is as least as valuable as employment in any other part of the economy".

"If the loss of up to 10,000 full time jobs in farming with no readily available replacement employment, together with up to £170 million being taken out of the rural economy does not register as a crisis with the Government,

they must be out of touch with reality on the ground".

Furthermore, Mr. O'Rourke said: "The Government have

rightly reacted to recent job losses by establishing task forces for the areas concerned. I am today calling for the same level of Government intervention to address the cattle crisis and potential job losses in farming".

IFA Farm Forestry Conference To Address Forestry Issues

—AN ECONOMIC RETURN FROM THE MARKET PLACE?

The IFA is hosting a National Farm Forestry Conference on Wednesday 12th September in the Bloomfield House Hotel, Mullingar, Co. Westmeath.

The Conference theme Farm Forestry: An Economic Return From the Market Place? will be addressed under a number of headings by key forest industry speakers.

IFA President Tom Parlon will open the day followed by Minister of State Hugh Byrne who will give the keynote address.

IFA Farm Forestry Chairman Pat Lehane said "the Conference will be in three sessions with the first addressing the economics of

early thinnings and the logistics of small plantation harvest management Speakers will include Pat Hanrahan of Coillte and Traolach Layton of Palfab.

"Session two will deal with the role of research in improving the financial return from farm forestry and the international trends in the use of Timber and Wood Products. Speakers on these topics will be Eugene Hendrick, CO-FORD and Fergal Mulloy of the European Forest Institute.

"The concluding session will address the farmer / sawmiller perspective of farm forestry and product and market development and its importance in farm

forestry. Speakers for this session will be Tom Stan-

dish, Standish Sawmills and Sean Wilely of Enterprise Ireland," said the IFA Chairman.

Teagasc Announces IT Training Courses

Over 50 IT training courses are being run by Teagasc in every county this autumn.

The courses are aimed at giving farmers the competence in IT and in the use of the various software packages which are a growing feature of farm business management.

They are being held in response to a huge demand from farm families who wish to acquire computer skills.

Last year, over 2,500 farmers participated in Teagasc IT courses and many courses were over-subscribed.

This year's courses involve partnerships between Teagasc, second level schools, third level institutes and private trainers. Two levels of training are being provided – a Beginners Course and an Advanced Course.

The Beginners Course involves an introduction to computers and familiarisation with the software packages available. The Advanced Course is aimed at providing farmers with the expertise in using packages such as Breeding Charts, Farm Account Keeping and VAT Recording and Returns.

The courses will typically involve an outside tutor and a Teagasc advisory/training specialist thereby ensuring a blend of IT and farming expertise.

Courses will total 25 hours, involving 2-2.5 hours per session over a 6-10 week period.

Over 50 course have already been scheduled, starting from September onwards. Further courses in counties not already covered in the schedule will be added later.

PREVENTING ACCIDENTS TO YOUNG PEOPLE ON FARMS

Young People Operating Machinery:-

There are certain types of machine which have a high level of risk due to the components involved, complex control systems, the substances used in them or the specialist knowledge required to operate them safely. Because of this, young persons under 18 years, should be prohibited from driving, or operating, the following:

- Towed/self-propelled harvesters and processing machines (except those machines designed for operation by people. In addition to the driver, and the young person is on the operating platform and under the supervision of an adult).
- Trailers and towed machinery with built-in conveying, loading or spreading mechanisms
- Power-driven machines incorporating cutting, splitting, grinding or crushing mechanisms (including chain-saws).
- Chemical applicators of any sort, including hand-held equipment.
- Machines incorporating power-driven soil engaging parts
- Ditching and drainage machinery
- Material handlers including skid steer loaders, lift trucks and track-laying vehicles
- Slurry tankers
- Powered feed-preparation equipment

NB:- The list above is not exhaustive

In addition, minors should not be allowed to help in maintenance or cleaning operations on such machines.

GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT

35 TO 45 Day Rotation:-

● Grass growth rate in September is only 40 Kgs DM/Ha. This will only feed 2.2 cows (or livestock units) per hectare, or 1.14 acres of grazing is needed for each cow. If the stocking rate is higher than this then the farm will run out of grass very quickly, probably early to mid October.

● The rotation length tells all: If it is not 35-45 days then you are not growing enough grass to sustain the stocking rate. The target grass cover in September for the whole farm should be 1200 kgs DM/Ha for a stocking rate of 2.5 cows /Ha (1ac/cow).

● The strongest grass (next paddock) should not be greater than 2500 kgs DM/Ha. High covers result in: Over 30% of this grass will be decaying, resulting in very poor feed. Animals will have to spend too long grazing out the paddock resulting in poaching damage. It will be harder to graze out dung pads and lower stem. Grass regrowth recovery will be very poor.

● The secret to grass "build-up" is having reasonable grass cover. Grass grows grass Bare - too bare means less grass.

● How many grazing acres do animals need in September? Each cow needs 0.90 acres. One acre will feed 650 kgs of cattle. One acre will feed 3 calves. From this you can calculate the number of grazing acres required.

● If you are stocked too heavily to let grass build up, what can you do? You must reduce the demand for grass. Sell off cattle now instead of in November. Dry off some cows, particularly thin cows or heifers, if you are over quota. Feed some good quality baled silage. Meal, (cheap), should be considered for some animals, small weanlings, incalf heifers and milking cows if under quota. These are good decisions because they allow your grass to grow faster at this time of year.

● Nitrogen makes sense to grow more grass: Therefore, apply 20-40 units of Nitrogen on "cold" farms up to 10th September. And on dry, light farms up to 20th - 25th September. Late Nitrogen will be lost to groundwater if there isn't adequate growth, so think carefully. Silage ground and new reseeds respond best to N at this time.

ABBEYSIDE MINORS TRIUMPH

Abbeyside players, mentors and supporters took nothing for granted in their approach to this minor hurling championship game played at the Fraher Field on Wednesday evening last. Colligan had a lot of work done and with inter-county players in their side the country lads would be no pushover.

Deckie Fives goal gave us a great start. Seanie Kiely added two points and the locals were flying. Two Colligan points did not upset them for Patrick Lynch and John Hurney also pointed. Two points from frees by John Wall ended their scoring in the first half whereas Abbeyside proceeded to score one goal and four points.

THE REFORMATION AND TUDOR RE-CONQUEST

One of the most momentous events in Irish history took place after 1536, when in that year the Irish Parliament passed the Act of Supremacy declaring Henry VIII head of the church.

This was followed by the confiscation by the Crown of all monasteries, abbeys, friaries and nunneries. In Dungarvan town and district there was only the Augustinian Friary in Abbeyside to be closed and sold. The term "abbey" in the place-name is not correct and seems to have been used only since the 16th century when the name "Abbeyside" appeared for the first time on documents.

AUGUSTINIAN PROPERTY

The property of the Friary in Dungarvan town was then described. It comprised 38 tenements, that is habitations and gardens in the area from which John Fitzwilliam, prior and inquisitor, "paid the friary" the sum of 46 shillings and two pence yearly. This looks as if he had some temporary lease of this property since the dissolution. There were three parks (open fields) or closes (enclosed fields) which covered 6.75 acres, with three gardens of 2 acres nearby worth twelve shillings. There were also three gardens which covered 2 1/2 acres near Allaphas worth 12 shillings.

VALUE OF THE PROPERTY TODAY

There was a room, presumably in the old friary buildings, occupied by John McWilliam (Fitzwilliam) at twenty shillings a year. As well as this there were rents and farms that yielded seventy-eight shillings and two pence. Nicholas Browne, an occupier of the Friary buildings, owed seventeen pounds five shillings and four pence in arrears.

The total income of the friary yearly with the last item included came to £27 19s 10d. To understand the value of these payments the following should be borne in mind. At the prices of the time a good horse could be bought for about a pound, a cow fourteen shillings and a sheep for one shilling. Since twenty shillings was a pound, 27 horses, 1 cow and 15 sheep could be bought with this money.

Work Expected To Begin On New Lismore School

ary school for the area was first raised in 1984. Initially, though, there was some opposition from parents in Cappoquin at the loss of the town's secondary school.

However, this opposition has "been resolved and everyone accepts now that the school is going to be built in Lismore and is going to be an extremely welcome educational facility", according to Lismore Town Commissioner Bernard Leddy.

This resolution has come in part due to the fall in school numbers in Cappoquin and Lismore, which has seen students choosing to go to Dungarvan and Fermoy. But, Commissioner Leddy believes that "this top class facility" will halt this trend.

To facilitate the building of the new school, the Christian Brothers Primary School will first be demolished and the new school will be built on that site. When the 3,481 square metre school is constructed, the existing secondary school will be demolished also. It has not yet been confirmed what the fate of the other two schools will be.

Despite the loss of Cappoquin's secondary school, principal of St. Anne's, Dr. Orison Carlisle welcomed the move.

"It'll be sad to be closing St. Anne's", Dr. Carlisle said "but the advantages that it will bring are very significant. There will be more subject choice such as metalwork, a fantastic gymnasium, with an international size basketball court and badminton courts."

Also welcoming the school,

principal of Lismore's Presentation Convent, Ann Fitzgerald stated that she was "delighted" with the outcome.

"It's going to be a huge boost to education in West Waterford", Mrs. Fitzgerald said.

Meanwhile, Waterford TD Brendan Kenneally, stated that he was "delighted with this news as it represents a further leap forward in the provision of second level ed-

ucation in the west of the county".

Deputy Kenneally also commented on the efforts of the present schools staff which, he said "have served the young people of this area well down through the years."

However, Deputy Kenneally believed "that there is a proven case for developing a centre of excellence in Lismore".

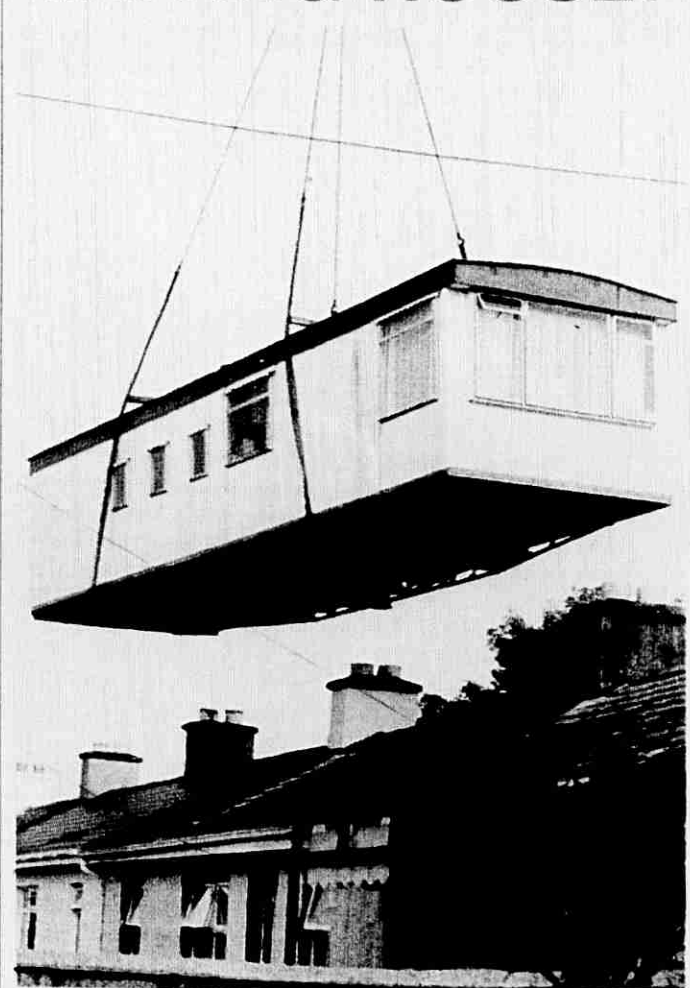

Official Opening Of New Stretch Of N25 at Kilmacthomas

The new 8.4km outer bypass at Kilmacthomas, constructed at a cost of £20 million, was officially opened on Tuesday last by

the Minister for the Environment and Local Government, Noel Dempsey. Speaking at the official opening Minister Dempsey

said "the Kilmacthomas Bypass aims to improve the quality of life, facilitate economic growth and - perhaps most vitally - improve road safety."

The Minister forecasted economic spinoffs arising from the project, locally as well as nationally.

"In terms of economic spin-off from this project it will clearly improve access from Rosslare Harbour to the city and county of Cork. It will also make tourists spots more accessible and so create opportunities to further develop the tourism potential that exists in the south of the county."

Minister Dempsey took the opportunity to acknowledge the work of the companies and organisations involved in the construction of the roadway, complimenting "the fine work done jointly by BEC Freres of France and Priority Construction Ltd of Ireland."

Also commenting on the project the Chairman of Waterford County Council Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said the scheme was "identified as a backlog section of the N25 Rosslare-Cork route in 1998 National Road Needs Study and it is very gratifying to join Minister Dempsey at today's official opening".

Complimenting the workmanship carried out on the new stretch of roadway Cllr. Wilkinson said "full credit must go to all of those who have been involved, right through from design phase with this massive project that has left us with an excellent stretch of new roadway."

The new roadway was the first national road project to be tendered as a design and build contract, with the contract awarded to joint Irish-French venture, BEC Priority Ltd, in December 1999.

"This Irish-French partnership has done a hugely impressive job with the scale of this undertaking shown by the estimated cost of the project, which is £20.5 million," Cllr. Wilkinson said.

"As well as its positive implications for those travelling between Dungarvan and Waterford", the Councillor said, "the bypass is a welcome development for the community right around Kilmacthomas".

After the official opening, a reception was held at Kilmacthomas Community Hall, while a dinner was later staged at the Park Hotel in Dungarvan to mark the occasion of the visit of the Minister for the Environment and Local Government.

COUNTY DEVELOPMENT BOARD MEMBER PROFILES

Pat Howley is one of two community representatives on Waterford County Development Board (CDB). Along with Seán Tobin from Tallow, Pat was elected onto the CDB at a meeting of voluntary organisations from throughout the county approx. 18 months ago.

The CDB process to date has been an eye-opener for Pat Howley, who says, "My involvement with the CDB has given me more of an understanding of where organisations are coming from—you can see first hand the workings of the State on a small, local level. As a community representative this has given me a better knowledge of how things work."

Pat Howley, originally from Mooncoin, Co Kilkenny now lives in Portlaw with his wife Jo and three children - Grace, Ruth and Una. He is an architect by profession and works with TTA Architects in King's Channel, Waterford.

PORTLAW COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT GROUP

Pat's membership of Waterford CDB stems from his involvement with Portlaw Community Development Group, which was set up seven years ago in response to plans to demolish part of an old school building in the town. Following a number of local meetings a sub-committee was set up to prevent demolition of the building. This group eventually became Portlaw Community Development Group (PCDG). They renovated the building in question with assistance from the Leader Programme and the building now houses two small craft units as well as a computer room and meeting room. Computer courses are run here in winter, as are night courses with the help of the Vocational Education Committee (VEC) and a VTOS Scheme has been in operation in the building with the last four years or so, also with the assistance of the VEC. These are just some of the activities organised by PCDG. According to Pat, the Group is committed to community development in Portlaw, "We run the Centre for the benefit of the community and any funds generated from the Centre through rents etc is ploughed straight back into development initiatives for the good of the community."

COMMUNITY REPRESENTATION

Pat Howley feels that his membership of the CDB is for the benefit of community groups all over the county. "Even though I have a voice for Portlaw on the Board, the CDB is bigger than that. We are concerned with strategic planning for the county as a whole". Pat also feels that, "the mixture of community and organisation representation on the Board encourages a two-way process in terms of understanding between the communities themselves and organisations working for the benefit of those communities. However, I feel that there is not enough community representation on the CDB. The number of community representatives should be at least doubled. Not only would this give communities a stronger voice, it would also share out the workload."

Pat also feels that the Community Forum process in Co Waterford is in need of substantial development to bring it up to speed with other counties. "Up to now, community

representatives in Co Waterford take part in the Community Forum process as individuals, not as a co-ordinated body as is the case in South Tipperary for example, which has its own county-based Community Platform. As community groups we are trying to organise ourselves into a pillar for all the community through an Interim Executive. We are starting from a low base in Co Waterford. However, we aim to establish a co-ordinated body to represent all community development groups in the county. Until we can achieve this our voice and our capabilities will be very limited."contd/...

One of the most surprising things that struck Pat about the CDB, was the opportunity his membership gives him to express views and opinions on a broad range of issues. "I found it surprising to be given an opportunity to speak on such a wide range of issues. I was amazed how often my own personal opinion on a particular topic was similar to that of what you might call 'industry experts', even though I would have no particular background or expertise in that specific area. As a community representative on the Board, I can express opinions on all manner of things that effect me as a citizen living in Co Waterford. It is great to have the opportunity to do this."

Pat is also impressed by the commitment being displayed, not only by the Board members, but by all of the organisations involved in the process. "Everybody seems to be committed to the principles involved here and all participants are working hard to produce the goods that will ensure that the strategy is whole and complete and relevant to the needs of the county. For example, the South Eastern Health Board, which operates on a regional basis, is very involved and has already submitted it's Position Paper to the Board."

As to what will become of the 10-year strategy once it is published, Pat feels that "If the Plan is realistic, then the participants are committed enough to implement the recommendations. If everyone signs up to the Plan, I see no reason why it cannot be implemented successfully. Of course, community development organisations intend to play a major role in this implementation."

Seán Tobin and Pat Howley are both committed to the CDB until the next local elections at least. Pat says that once the strategy is published, "the CDB must continue on as it has to oversee the implementation of the strategy. Certain benchmarks have to be laid down and followed and we as a Board must operate as a watchdog, if you like, to ensure that all players co-operate."

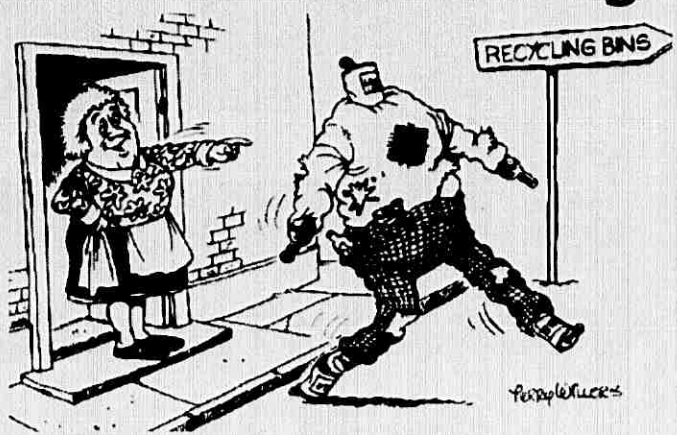

WHO INVENTED WASTE?

Did it ever occur to you that waste is a human invention? There is no such thing as waste in the natural world. Think of it, a fox dies, the scavengers move in, nutrients are released and then taken up by the closest growing plant. An amazingly efficient cycle that reuses and recycles resources endlessly. Humans were part of this natural system, but as our lifestyles have become more sophisticated so have our waste materials and natural systems can no longer cope. Because of this our waste accumulates, much of it in old fashioned landfills that are becoming increasingly difficult to ignore. Landfilling waste puts resources out of reach so we are forced to produce materials from new raw materials each time. This is unsustainable.

SUSTAINABILITY

Extracting resources, making one-off products and disposing of them is a formula that has become prevalent in developed countries. This straight-line formula leaves an excess of waste to be disposed of and depletes our finite natural resources and is therefore unsustainable. According to a 1987 report called "Our Common Future", sustainable development is that which satisfies the needs of current generations without compromising the possibility for future generations to satisfy theirs. In other words we need to mimic natural systems that constantly cycle resources without producing waste instead of using a straight-line formula that depletes resources and produces ever-increasing amounts of waste.



GET INTO RECYCLING

Recycling is an example of how we can mimic natural systems by reprocessing resources that would otherwise be considered waste. Recycling makes sense from lots of different aspects.

- It saves energy. Recycling of aluminium cans could achieve a saving of 95% of the energy required to produce aluminium from bauxite ore!
- It saves raw materials
- It saves you on waste disposal costs
- Reduces import bills
- Saves Trees
- Reduces the need for Landfill sites
- It reduces litter and protects the environment.
- Recycling can also create jobs!

So change the way you look at your bin. Is there stuff in there that is really a valuable resource in disguise. Much of what we throw away still has many of the properties that we considered desirable when it was purchased. Reuse what you can and recycle your glass bottles, jars and drink cans. Repak are currently running a campaign to increase recycling rates. For every extra tonnes of glass

collected this year they will donate £10 to St. Vincent de Paul. This could be a significant sum if current trends in recycling are continued. There was an increase of 172 tonnes in glass collected in Co. Waterford between 1999 and 2000. What can we do when we really put our minds to it?

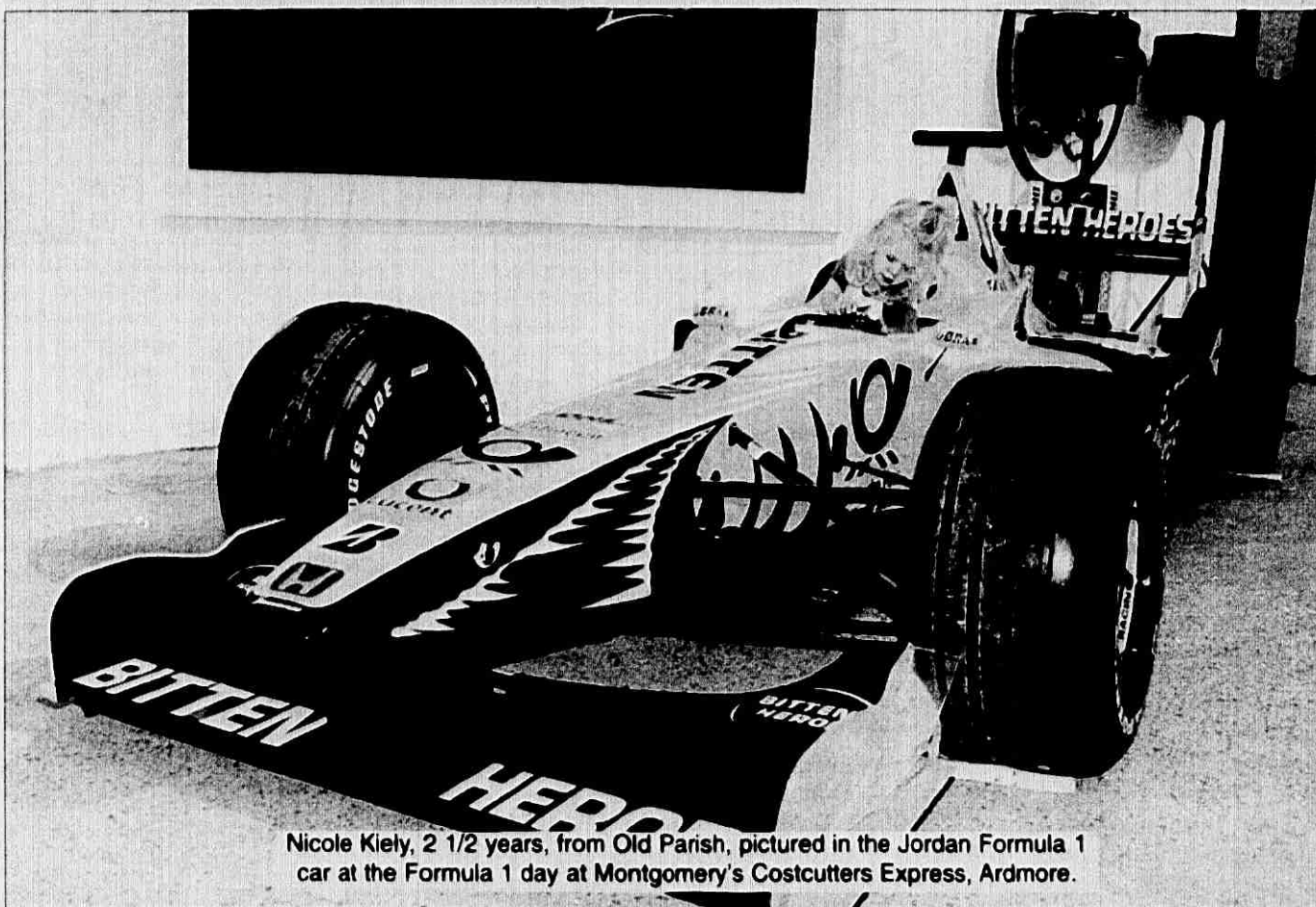

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am on long-term Unemployment Assistance and I am receiving a Child Dependant Allowance for my 17-year-old son who will be doing the Leaving Certificate next summer. Can I still claim the allowance for my son when he has completed the Leaving Certificate?

ANSWER

You are entitled to the Child Dependant Allowance as long as he is under 18 years of age. After this it depends on when your son reaches 18 and whether he continues on in full-time education.

If he reaches 18 before he leaves school you will be required by the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs to get his school to certify that he is attending full-time education. You will then be entitled to claim the allowance for three months after he completes the Leaving Certificate. If you do not provide the certification the Child Dependant Allowance will only be paid to the end of the school year.

However, it is a different situation if his 18th birthday does not occur until after he has completed the Leaving Certificate and left school, e.g. July. You will lose your entitlement to the allowance immediately, as he is not in full-time education. Your son will not be able to claim Unemployment Assistance in his own right until three months after he leaves school even if you are no longer receiving the Child Dependant Allowance for him.

Should your son continue on in full-time education, you are entitled to the allowance until he reaches 22 years of age.

For those on short-term Unemployment Assistance the allowance stops at 18 years of age, regardless of whether the child continues in full-time education or not.

THE COST OF COLLEGE

It will enable them to see the real cost of what it takes to put them through Third Level. This in turn will get them into the routine of saving for something in the future. It may be an invaluable budgeting lesson for them as they grow into their adult years.

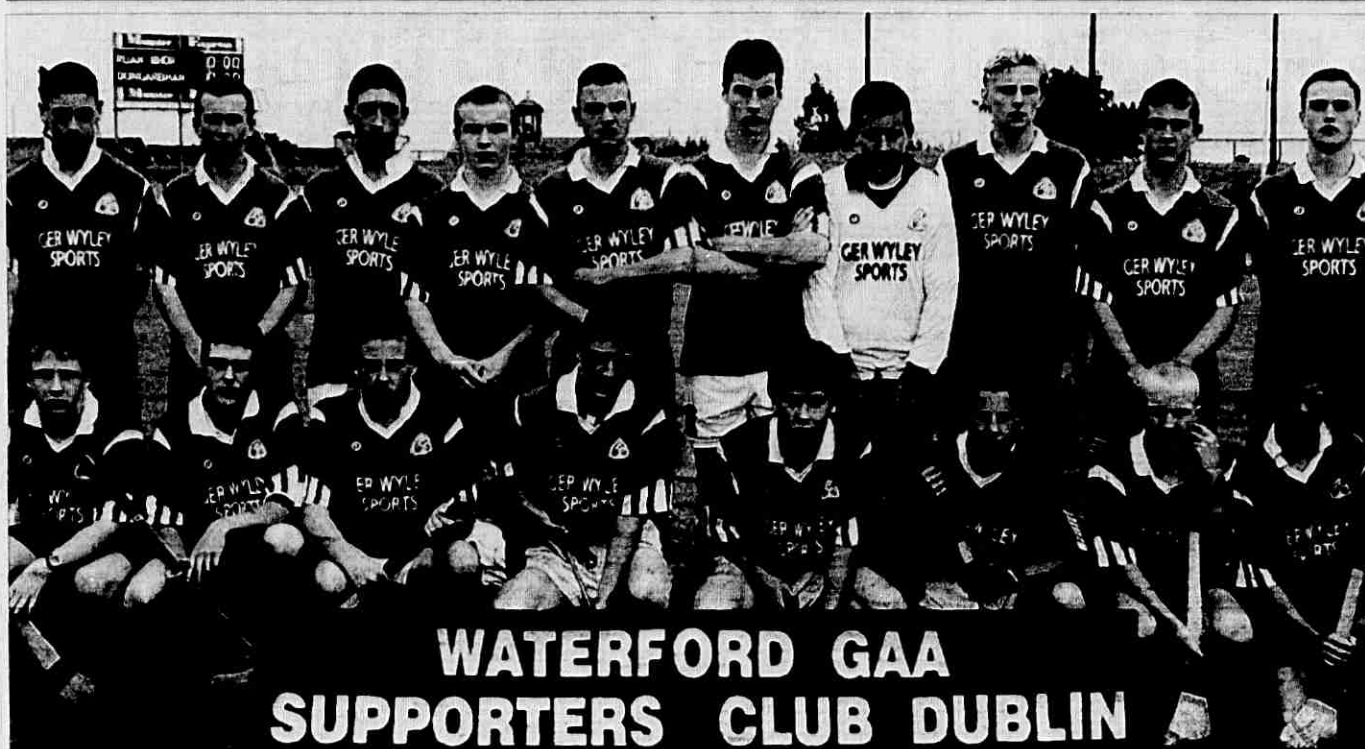

There are a few other very attractive fixtures as well, but are overshadowed to a great extent by this eagerly awaited clash. The meeting of

local rivals, Dungarvan and Abbeyside in the 'losers group' final of the intermediate hurling championship and the second intermediate foot-

ball semi-final involving Ring and Geraldines are matches that will also command an amount of support.

Ardmore's three match saga with county champions, Nire brought them very much into prominence this year and when they were drawn for a semi-final meeting with the winners of the losers group, there was great anticipation about the identity of their opponents.

Now championship contenders, Stradbally, who, having suffered a first round defeat by Rathgormack, survived a very testing campaign against some high profile clubs in the losers group. Their opponents included Tramore, whom they defeated in a replay, St. Savours and then the champions, the Nire.

Both clubs have some splendid scoring forwards who are able to snatch chances that come their way and both have experienced defenders.

Today in this championship their scoring averages

are quite similar. Stradbally from 5 matches have notched up 4-53 while Ardmore have a total of 3-52 from 4 games.

Interestingly, both teams defeated the county champions, the Nire, in their last matches, Ardmore by 1-11 to 1-6 and Stradbally by 1-11 to 1-8 and while there may be no significance in this, some will see it as an

evenness in standards. I think it will be another game with a very close finish, if it is not going to end in stalemate.

If there is to be a winner I think the odds will favour Stradbally because their matches in the lead up to this semi-final have all been against quality opposition which will have conditioned

them for a grandstand finish to their whole championship campaign.

Ardmore, realistically, have played only two clubs, Kilrossanty (who were totally unprepared for their first round match and scored just one point in each half), and the Nire, whom, in my opinion, never produced last season's form.

ABBEYSIDE V. DUNGARVAN AT FRAHER FIELD

This losers group final looks to be quite an open affair and it could provide a close and exciting finish. Both were first round losers with Dungarvan having to fight a drawn match and replay with Fourmilewater. In the losers section they defeated Ballysaggart in Cappoquin before beating Ring here in Fraher Field two weeks ago. They have shown improvement in every match and may be the side to win another crack at Fourmilewater, who are drawn to play the winners of this losers group tie.

Abbeyside were beaten by St. Marys in the first round after leading at the three quarter stage and then luckily drew with Clashmore. looked like going out of this intermediate championship until bouncing back late in their match against Affane three weeks ago.

I believe that their senior championship experience will be the deciding factor here.

There were times during this epic when I wondered what sympathetic headlines I might compose to try to take the sting out of a Lismore defeat.

Although they were never more than 5 points in arrears and always they fought back to level or take a narrow lead, I had the feeling all through, that Mount Sion, true to record and reputation, would come through by snatching the late, late scores to balance the issue in their favour. How many times in the past have the famed Monastery club snatched victory from the jaws of defeat?

But in a year of shocks and surprises, this was all going to change and for brave and battling Lismore, September 1st certainly became a night to remember and set them up as very worthy challengers for the county title.

I was not over excited about the standard of hurl-

ing, but as a contest this one had few equals here for a very long time and after surviving this 90 minute saga, Lismore, whatever the near future holds for them, have certainly won themselves a very high profile here in Waterford.

Seldom have we seen such tremendous fighting spirit displayed by both contestants and Mount Sion, although the vanquished in this case, must be given their fair measure of credit for their contribution to a most enjoyable contest that was enjoyed by about 3,000 hurling supporters.

When the game ended on a level keel after 60 minutes it was thought that falling darkness would send the replay to a third meeting, but referee Pat Moore decided to proceed with extra time and did manage to get the game finished in failing light.

COUNTY FINAL

Representation of that magnitude from the far West would be another record.

PLAY

Both sides showed changes from the programme. Lismore fielded without the injured Dave Barry who was replaced by Peter Howard. Shane Kearney came on at corner back and David O'Gorman replaced Michael O'Sullivan who moved to left corner back in place of Anthony Whelan.

For Mount Sion, Tony Browne came on for Pádraigh Fanning and there were a number of switches.

A shower shortly before the throw-in made the surface greasy, but the rain stayed off for the entire match.

Tony Browne opened for play for Mount Sion and Willie Cunningham, playing in his regular wing position and rarely featured in the scoring, soloed down field for

an opening score for Lismore.

In the 7th minute, Ian Power had a goal for Mount Sion and in the 9th Sean Daly had Lismore's second point. Eoin Kelly from play, Tony Browne from a free and Jamie O'Meara from play gave the champions a 1-4 to 0-2 lead by the end of the first quarter.

Strangely, the champions were not to score again in this half and back came Lismore with a great point by David Howard and two converted frees by Dave Bennett to leave the halftime score at 1-4 to 0-5 in favour of Mount Sion.

SECOND HALF

Ken McGrath opened from play for the champions but within 30 seconds Dan Shanahan replied for Lismore. Dave Bennett from a '65' and Eoin Kelly all the way from a sideline, exchanged points to leave just 2 points between them before Sean Ryan had a Mount Sion goal in the 38th minute.

But within six magical minutes, Lismore were back on level terms after Dave Bennett struck for his side's first goal from a 21 metre free and added a point as did Dan Shanahan within minutes to gear the excitement to boiling again.

Eoin Kelly from a '65' and Dave Bennett from a free, left the situation in stalemate

once again and when Pádraigh Fanning pointed from play for the champions and sent them into the lead in the 52nd minute the situation looked 'dicey' for the challengers but in the 59th minute a Sean Daly 'special' brought a thousand Lismore supporters to their feet and the game was into extra time.

EXTRA TIME

The fading light was a worry but Pat Moore decided to proceed and the game took off once more in a welter of excitement.

Dave Bennett and Seamus Ryan exchanged points. Dan Shanahan and Sean Daly added two more before Ken McGrath and Sean Daly exchanged minors, and coming up to the end of the first quarter of extra time Dave Bennett scored twice to leave Lismore 4 points clear at 1-17 to 2-10.

THE LAST QUARTER

Ken McGrath had two splendid scores to bring Mount Sion back strongly into the game, but tenacious Lismore were maintaining their blistering pace and were not going to relinquish their grip. Dave Bennett pointed a free and brother Eoin (who returned after being substituted) smashed home a vital goal in the 5th minute of this period. This put them 6 points clear but back came Mount Sion's top scorer Sean

Ryan for his second goal.

With 5 minutes remaining, Ken McGrath pointed Mount Sion's final score of 2001 but a goal and a point by Daly and a goal by Eoin Bennett in response put the final seal on a wonderful team triumph for a very gallant Lismore, who fully deserved a place in the county final, about which we'll be writing next week.

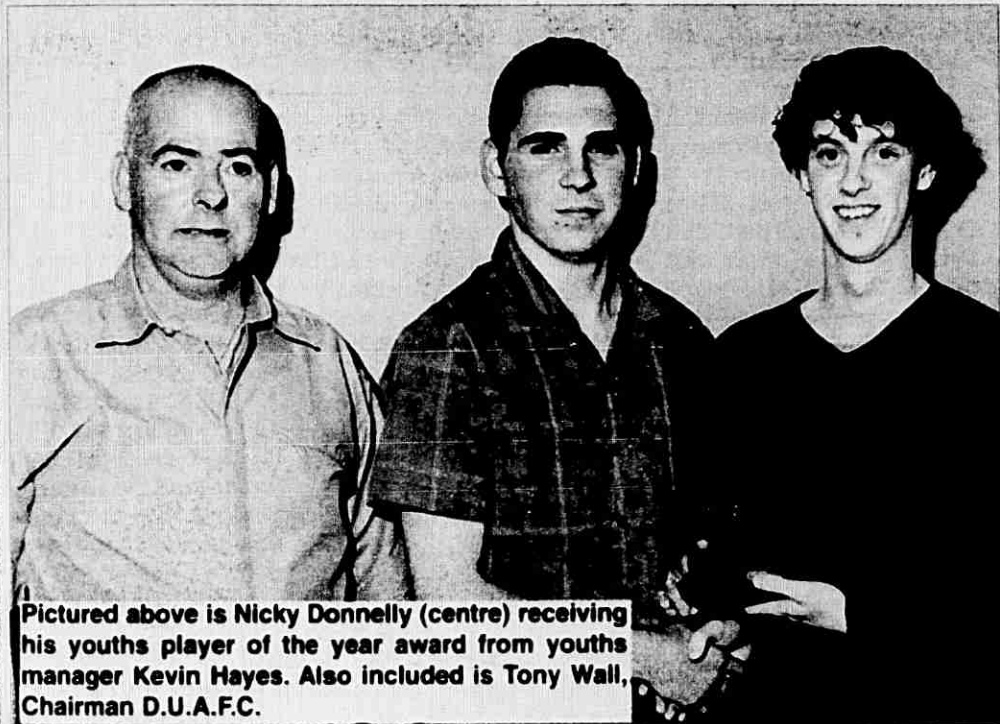

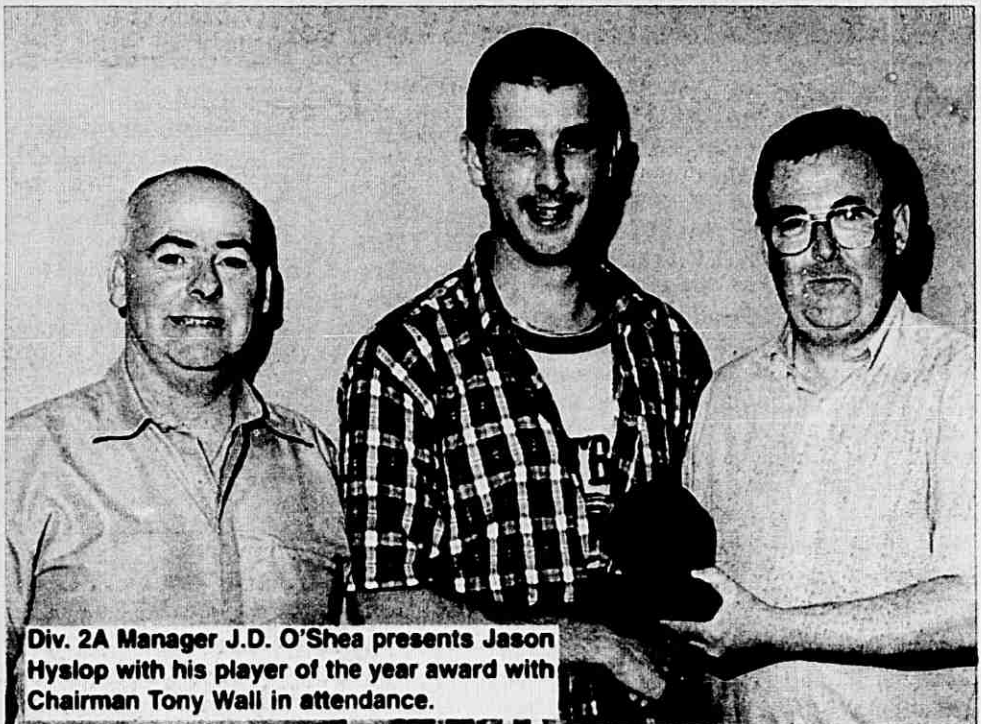

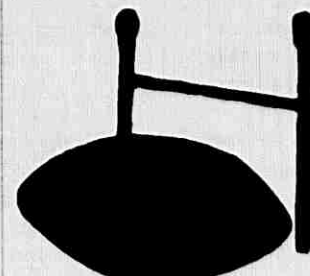
