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Senseless Vandalism On Day Care Centre

Following the latest vandalistic attack on Dungarvan's Day Care Centre, there are increasing fears that management may be forced to close it down permanently.

The centre, which provides a "meals on wheels" service for the elderly in the town and surrounding areas, and doubles as a social centre where pongo, cards, and other activities are pursued, was extensively vandalised last weekend in what has been described as the mindless action of thugs. Gardai are carrying out a full scale investigation into the incident, and while a number of youths have been questioned in connection with the incident no charges have been preferred at the time of going to press.

In last weekend's incident, the latest in a series of attacks on the centre, virtually all of the windows were broken and the steel plates used for the meals were thrown out onto the roadway. Some other internal damage was also caused.

Four local youths found in the nearby disused former Presentation Convent building were taken into custody by the Gardai for questioning but were subsequently released without charge.

A director of the Day Care Centre, former Waterford County Council secretary Brian McNally, said they may now be forced to close the premises in the wake of the ongoing vandalistic at-

"We will have to seriously assess the situation", said Mr. McNally, "and ask if there is any point in replacing the broken windows to have them vandalised

Mr. McNally said the centre has had a happy atmosphere and is a delightful place for the elderly to come to. However after last weekend's attack it is more like Alcatraz than the friendly place it should be for the elderly.


One of the volunteer members of staff at the centre told local radio yesterday that the place has been a lifeline for the old folk throughout the eight years it has been open. "Not only is it catering for the elderly in Dungarvan but also from many surrounding areas including Colligan, Kilbrien and Ballinroad", she said.

She claimed there are people who know those who perpetrated last weekend's attack but for whatever reason they are not coming forward to identify them.

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



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
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









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Daniel Calls On Dungarvan To Have Some Fun!



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Forestry Events Highlight New Opportunities

The impact of the increased premium payments on forestry planting will be one of the featured highlights at five national demonstrations being run by Teagasc and the Forest Service over the next two weeks.

The demonstrations which get underway at Bodyke, Co Clare on Monday, October 8th are aimed at bringing the most up to date information on the economics, planting and management of forestry to farmers.

Announcing details, Jim Reidy, National Forestry Development Officer with Teagasc said the increase in the forestry premium for all farmers who planted since 1993 demonstrates a long-term government

commitment to forestry. "Current income figures show

that over 35,000 dry stock farmers make less than £80 per acre. The same land could earn more than £125 per acre taxfree from forestry. The majority of these farmers could convert a portion of their farms to forestry and substantially boost income", he said.

The demonstrations will have expert advice from Teagasc for farmers contemplating forestry. They will also feature live demonstrations by Teagase and Forest Service specialists on planting and management in the early years. Separate demonstrations will also be mounted on the management and thinning of older forests.

with 12,000 neople having planted trees in the last decade forestry has become a mainstream farming enterprise. Like all other enterprises, it must be carefully planned and expertly managed. The demonstrations will enable existing and prospective growers get objective financial information and see the latest technology", said Jim Reidy.

NORTH AFRICA



Trade and Wealth

Between around AD 700 and 1600, merchants from the rich Muslim lands of North Africa led camel trains laden with salt on long journeys across the Sahara to trade with people living in the powerful West African kingdoms of Mali, Ghana and Songhay.

In return, they carried back cargoes of gold, leather and slaves. West African rulers used this wealth from trade to build fine palaces, mosques, schools and universities in cities on the edge of the desert, such as Jenne and Timbuktu


TABLE QUIZ

Unemployment On The Rise In Dungarvan Area

The number of people signing on in Dungarvan has shown a steady increase over the past few months with the most recent increase, from 891 to 922, recorded over the period of July to August.

The recent rise does not take into account the loss of 104 jobs in Stafford Miller which are due to go sometime next year, following the decision to transfer the manufacture of the company's blue ribbon product, Sensodine toothpaste, to England.

Even before the decision to scale back production at Stafford Miller was made, members of Dungarvan Urban Council had been calling for assistance from the IDA and Tanaiste Mary Harney to attract a major new industry to

The Urban Council has already bought land for the IDA, while a meeting with Pat Loftus of the development agency was also held. However, during that meeting Mr. Loftus described the problems the IDA had with attracting businesses to smaller centres of population like Dungarvan.

The Urban Council has called for a meeting with the Tanaiste Mary Harney as well, but a recent letter from her private secretary stated that commitments would prevent her from meeting with a deputation of councillors.

Local Urban Councillor Damien Dillon was angered by the Tanaiste's refusal to meet

councillors and said "she probably doesn't expect to get a candidate elected in the constituency and certainly couldn't with a letter like that".

Trade Unionist Tony Mansfield also believes that the loss of quality jobs in Waterford Foods and in Stafford Miller needs to be addressed by the Government but believes Waterford needs a senior Minister to deliver investment.

Waterford Crystal, Stafford Miller and SmithKline Beecham were all attracted to the town through Government incentives and "Dungarvan is an ideal area for an industry as it has had an excellent record in industrial relations," Mr. Mansfield said.

While Dungarvan's unemployment rate has steadily increased over the last few months Waterford City has seen a steady decrease in the numbers signing on. Indeed, it recorded the highest drop in unemployment in the South East.

The reason for this disparity, Cllr. Dillon said is due to the setting up of the Waterford Strategy group, whose aim is to attract investment into the

However, all the representatives on this group are from Waterford City, according to the councillor.

Cllr. Dillon said he hasn't heard anything from Waterford Strategy since it was set up and doubted their level of commitment to attracting industry to Dungarvan. "If they are doing anything it's purely for their own selfish gain in Waterford City", he said.

The development of the former Glanbia site has been hailed as a means to providing a large number of jobs in construction and in the large number of businesses setting up on the multi-million pound development.

However, in the construction phase, Cllr. Dillon said it is likely that the majority of positions will be held by Clancy Constructions own permanent staff.

Meanwhile, the proposed shopping complex on the former Glanbia site is likely to provide numerous opportunities for the areas workforce but concerns have been raised over the length of time it will take to get approval. A decision may take as long as four months due to the issues complexity, while a rejection would lead to a redesign of the plan, resubmission and possibly another objection and ap-

"In other words", Cllr. Dillon said "it depends on the decision and whether any changes would suit the devel-

He is concerned, as well, that once the shopping centre is up and running, it may not result in an increase in the number of shops in the town but a movement of retailers onto the Glanbia site instead.

Judge Pays Tribute To Late Paddy Lavan

Before the commencement of business at last Thursday's sitting of Youghal District Court, Judge David Riordan, paid generous tribute to the late Youghal based solicitor, Paddy Lavan, formerly of Dungarvan.

"Before we commence the business of the Court this morning I believe it is appropriate we pay tribute to the memory of Paddy Lavan who died recently", Judge Riordan said.

He went on to say that Paddy Lavan was known far and wide in Cork and Waterford as a gentleman of the law. He recalled that when he first came on circuit to Youghal in 1977, the lists in the Circuit Court were full with P.J. Lavan & Co in almost every case. He said Patrick Lavan used to brief the late Sean Brosnan before the late Judge Fawsett and these cases were an education for anybody with fancy ideas about the law and workings.

"In the District Court, Paddy Lavan, always presented and defended his clients with forensic accuracy and pleaded his cases for leniency with great effect. This was a tribute to his lawyerly skills and his very positive human qualities", the judge said.

Concluding he added that Patrick Lavan's passing is a significant milestone for the legal profession and the town of Youghal. Judge Riordan extended the courts sympathies, particularly to Patrick's son, John, who continues his father's practice and his brother Joe, a solicitor in Dungarvan, and offered his deepest sympadescribed the latest attack as "an outrage", while Cllr. Damien Dillon said it is an incident perpetrated by mindless thugs and one that is to condemned outright.

Cllr. Geoghegan in welcoming the support for his motion stated that "the provision of this footpath will certainly result in an increase in pedestrian safety, and should also lead to a reduction in the speed at which vehicles travel along this section of roadway due to the narrowing of the roadway."

Cllr. Geoghegan said he feels it is important that it be carried out as soon as possible before the onset of winter and the town engineer stated that this work could be completed during the month of October.



The Science of Farming and Food LARGE ATTENDANCE AT TEAGASC SUCKLER **BREEDING DEMONSTRATION**

The main sales ring at Dungarvan Mart was packed to capacity last Wednesday evening for the Teagasc, Suckler Breeding Demonstration. There were about 60 top class animals on display and the reaction of the audience afterwards was that it was very interesting and informative.

Tom Egan, Teagasc, Moorepark, explained the BLUP Systems of scoring bulls and emphasised that it is essential that when purchasing a stock bull producers use these figures in making their choice of bull as it is far more accurate than visual assessment alone. In compiling a BLUP figure for a bull not only his own performance is taken into consideration but the performance of siblings, ancestors and other relations as well. Tom used Simmental, Charolais and Limousin bulls to demonstrate animals that had a BLUP score.

Tony Petit, Kildalton demonstrated the type of replacement heifer that producers should be bringing into their herds in order to have good quality breeding stock. The target must be to produce U grade animals for slaughter and in order to achieve this the cow must be a minimum of an R grade herself. When breeding replacements from within a suckler herd they should be 75% continental. The final sire used to produce the slaughter animals should then be of a different continental breed in order to continue to gain from hybrid vigour.

Ger Ryan, Dairygold Al, demonstrated the type of top quality stock which can be produced by using AI in suckler herds. In order to facilitate the use of Al in suckler herds as many cows as possible should be inseminated while still indoors. Synchronisation and fixed time Al should be considered. He also demonstrated how a chinball on a vasectomised bull is a very effective means of heat detection. Dairying

PREVENT TROUBLE

Poor housing/facilities will lead to problems for cows/cattle.

Lameness will be a problem if floors and slats are rough and patchy.

Viruses (now very common) will be a problem if ventilation is poor or draughts exist.

Broken shoots/downpipes will make work for you spreading more watery slurry.

Broken gates, cubicles, walls with rough edges can cause a lot of physical damage to animals.

Stress, leading to many health problems, will result if animals are overcrowded in houses.

Adequate feeding space is required

To avoid health problems during housing now is the last chance you will get to fix up those things that are broken. Each cow needs 2 sq.ft inlet and outlet area. Each calf needs 0.8 sq. ft inlet and outlet area.

FORCED COURT ACTION ON PPF

"Farmers - and the other Social Partners - expect Government commitments under the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness to be fully honoured. To-date, despite the passing of legislation, the Government has refused to introduce tax relief for essential investment by dairy farmers. ICMSA, having exhausted all political avenues, has been forced to take court action to convince the Government to implement a major PPF commitment for farmers"

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of the ICMSA, stated, as he detailed the Associations court action against the Minister for Finance and Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development for failing to implement a tax measure for milk quota

Mr. O'Rourke said "as part of the PPF agreement, ICMSA negotiated a firm commitment that income tax relief would be granted for milk quota purchase and this commitment was fully honoured by Dail Eireann, by the inclusion of a specific section in the Finance Act 2000. However, the Minister for Finance has to-date refused to sign the necessary Ministerial Order to bring this section into operation"

Over 22,000 farmers are directly affected by this refusal and are now exposed to both a tax liability and uncertainty in relation to tax planning. As far as ICMSA is concerned, Dail Eireann alone should set tax law for Ireland. If it is a case that the Government or the EU Commission can unilaterally refuse to operate or set aside tax measures approved by Dail Eireann, it has major implications for farmers and all other

Mr. O'Rourke said: "over £100 million in 2000 was invested by farmers in milk quotas on the recommendation of the Minister for Agriculture and on the basis that this income tax relief would apply. No other Social Partner would tolerate such a blatant breach of the PPF".

'ICMSA is determined to seek justice for dairy farmers and I am calling for the support of other Social Partners, given that this issue goes to the very heart of the PPF," concluded Mr. O'Rourke

MINISTER'S **ANNOUNCEMENT ON** PREMIUM

"ICMSA welcome the announcement by the Minister for Agriculture, Food and Rural Development that all farmers who applied for Suckler Cow Premiums in 2001 will receive their advance payment commencing on 16 October 2001". said Mr. Liam Heverin, Chairman of ICMSA's Beef and Cattle Committee.

"I am pleased that the Minister has taken on board ICMSA proposals on this issue, which will ensure that farmers will now receive their suckler cow premium when they expected to and not many months later. This represents a reasonable approach and I would like to compliment the Minister on same",

said Mr. Heverin.

With regard to future years, ICMSA believe that such a system should also apply and the Association can see no reason why the Minister's announcement could not be made permanent.

'Given the exceptional year for beef farmers this year, we believe the Minister should increase the advance payment from 60% to 80%. Many farm families are having problems meeting bills and if this measure was implemented, it would go some way to relieving this pressure", concluded Mr. Heverin.

Why Agriculture Is Different To Other Industries

The frustrations of running the Common Agriculture Policy must be aggravated considerably when you realise that half the people of the European Union have never heard of the

Dr Franz Fischler, Commissioner for Agriculture, was obviously reeling a certain degree of this frustration when he spoke recently to the European Consumer Committee in Brussels. He is trying to encourage debate on a number of agriculture issues because, as he put it, there is a big gap between interest and knowledge about agriculture among European citizens. He cited the results of the latest Eurobarometer survey which show that, although 90 per cent of Europeans consider agriculture to be important, only 50 per cent have actually heard of the CAP. Be that as it may, he said, everyone has strong views on where we have to go in food production and agriculture in the fu-

Dr Fischler was somewhat philosophical when he ad-

dressed the committee members, who represent consumer organisations from throughout the Union. He made an attempt at answering a question that consumers everywhere often ask - what is so special about

Well, for one thing, although we all refer to it as an industry, in Dr Fischier's analysis ne it was obvious that agriculture is not an industry like any other. He answered the question by setting out how we should best spend the agricultural budget of the EU in order to satisfy the expectations that society has from the agricultural "industry." In doing so, he relied on what Agenda 2000 has set out to do, in clearly defining the objectives of the European Model of Agriculture. "We want the agricultural sector to be competitive," he said, "we want production methods that deliver food safety and environmental compatibility and provide the quality food demanded by consumers, we want stable incomes for those working in agriculture, we want to integrate environmental goals into the Common Agriculture Policy and we want to simplify agricultural policy and share responsibility between the Commission and Member

As a definition of the aspirations of modern agriculture in the European Union, this had a completeness about it that is hard to beat. It is a statement that he has been repeating frequently in recent months as he addresses an ongoing series of Round Table discussions on agriculture and food that have been arranged in various Member States by himself and his

colleague, Food Safety Commissioner David Byrne.

His audience in Brussels should have felt reassured that, whatever debates are going on within the agricultural sector itself, there is no danger that consumers' fears and concerns are going to be ignored. Taking the example of the debate concerning organic production versus conventional production, he said simply that it was not necessary to have endless discussions on the issue as to v method of production was better. "Let the consumer choose!" he declared, adding the message that it was merely the duty of the agricultural industry to guarantee that the consumer had that choice.

BRIDIE **MUL'S SHOP**

On the site of the Eurospar Supermarket run by Enrights once stood a wooden structure where Bridie "Mul" carried on a trade selling newspapers, cigarettes, groceries and sweets. By and large, it was the newspapers that attracted people into Bridie Mul's premises and any other items were bought as incidentals.

One often remembers being dispatched to "Bridies" for a pan loaf. I always tried to procure a pan with a real fresh crusty top and on the way home I would eat a section of the crust by gnawing at it with my teeth. There mustn't have been anything to feel guilty about with this defacement of the pan loaf as I can never remember being scolded for my indiscretion.

Bridie herself liked a flutter on the horses and often on entering the shop one was immediately dispatched to the bookies office in town with a few silver coins wrapped in a piece of brown paper on which would be written the names of the horses she wished to back. A bar of dairy milk chocolate would often be our reward for providing such a service.

Of course these secret going's on were never mentioned to my parents for fear a stop would be put on my expeditions across the Causeway.

DISPOSAL OF LAND AT CAUSEWAY PARK

At their last meeting the Urban District Council voted to dispose of 2,000 square foot of land adjacent to Eurospar at Causeway Park, Strandside North, Abbeyside. The portion of land will be sold to Mr. Ger Enright of Enright's Eurospar for £90,000. The portion of land will be used to provide additional car parking at the supermarket. The Town Clerk assured the councillors that the sale will not effect access to the nearby tennis courts.

THE REFORMATION

Dungarvan people to this day call their town 'The Old Boro' that is, the old parliamentary borough or constituency. However, it appears that the name of the first known members of Parliament were Henry Stafford Esq. and John Challoner gentleman of Lambay Island, Dublin, who represented the town in 1560.

This parliament, the first convened by Queen Elizabeth I had a large catholic majority but yet passed all the anticatholic legislation that the queen desired. Some said that the legislation was put on the statute book after the members departed home. However, it was accepted as law and there were no protests against it. Among those who were appointed to administer the Oath of Supremacy and to 'correct heresies" in County Waterford were Henry Stafford and Sir Maurice Fitzgerald of Dromana.

DISTRIBUTION OF LAND

The reformation in Ireland simply meant the closing of the religious houses and the distribution of lands not only to Protestants but even more so to catholic landowners. The latter did not have an objection to putting their lands on such property and neither had they any compunction in passing the Acts of Parliament that Queen Elizabeth desired. The doctrines of the reformation were seldom and little preached and they were less practised outside of Dublin and the Pale at this time.

MARTIAL LAW

Henry Stafford was appointed constable of the castle in Dungarvan in 1558 when he was also appointed to execute martial law in the County Waterford. He was empowered to punish by death or otherwise all felons or enemies who did not have twenty shillings a year income or £20 worth of property.

Stafford rigorously carried out martial law in his area of the county. So energetically did he do so that he was granted a royal pardon for any execution committed without malice during the execution of martial law. During Stafford's time in Dungarvan the lawlessness in the countryside was such that there was a shortage of grain and he was permitted to buy 200 quarters (2,550 kg.) of grain to provide food for the town.

Imagine how much greater that could be with just a little extra effort! Well done to those who did trojan work along with the tidy towns committee over the past season. The over all results for the village where as follows:

PROGRESS REPORT FOR CLONMEL CO. WATERFORD

Overall development approach. Thank you for all the information sent with the entry form and for the map which was most useful on adjudication day. In connection with the letter and as mentioned last year perhaps a larger scale map would be more beneficial on which you could mark projects which have taken place since last year so that the adjudicator

there's a chance to win can have sight of them. Its is gratifying to read that you have the support of the Waterford County Council and FAS for your activities but somewhat disappointing to note that there is no support coming to you by way of sponsorship. Your committee must be very hard working and are to be congratulated on the appearance of the village. You received an in-depth report from last years adjudicator. The following should be read in tandem with it and are comments on further progress to date.

THE BUILD **ENVIRONMENT**

The church and school looked exceptionally well this year and the distillery which is the most prominent building in the village, is being exceptionally well maintained. Work on your Heritage Centre was progressing on adjudication day. The outside has been beautifully restored an work was progressing inside. The surrounding cemetery is also being well maintained. Business premises again looked very well and very colourful and congratulations are due to

LANDSCAPING

The Grotto and other landscaped areas looked extremely well as indeed did the many hanging baskets and tubs of flowers which are prominent throughout the village. The river walk is being very well maintained as indeed is the seating, some of which is being painted on adjudication day. The river area in the vicinity of the distillery is a delight and is greatly enhanced by the tubs of flowers at The Old Still.

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

There is not mention of a wildlife project on your entry form perhaps this is an area where your committee might consider some suitable project - the obvious site for it being the river. In this connection the Tidy Towns Hand boat will be helpful and the Irish Wildlife Conservancy are available to give advice. Such a project would also gain you extra marks in the future. In the meantime the mark received last year will be repeated. The map beside the grotto is a very useful addition to local facili-

LITTER CONTROL

Clashmore was practically litter free on adjudication day. There was however a minor intrusion on this as there was some litter to be seen thrown

over the bridge in the river and minor littering in the Main Street. This is an important aspect of the competition and one which need constant monitoring

TIDINESS

The village was presented in a neat and tidy manner and in this respect, great credit is due to your residents who are obviously very conscious of their environment.

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

The housing estate at the top of the hill was well presented. However there is a big open space which was completely overgrown. While some landscaping has taken place, nevertheless the area should be cut and planked which would greatly enhance that part of the village. The new housing estate looks very well and will be a great addition to you next year. Individual houses were very well presented. Some with wonderful gardens which were in full bloom on adjudication day. This type of individual presentation is very important in the Tidy Towns Competition. You cannot succeed without it. Congratulations to all concerned.

ROADS, STREETS AND BACK AREAS

Approach roads were well presented. This too is an important aspect of the competition. Approach roads tend to set the tone for the rest of the village and verges need to be cut regularly. Adjudication normally takes place from the village name plates or the speed limits signs whichever you opted for. There are some suggestions in the Tidy Towns Handbook regarding the cutting of verges and the need for the propagation of wild flow-

GENERAL **IMPRESSION**

Clashmore is a lovely village and is making exceptional progress in the Tidy Towns Competition. Further progress however will depend on the planning and attention n to detail. In this respect you should draw up in conjunction with your local Authority and other agencies a 3 to 5 year plan and in the process identifying what can be done on a year to year basis within your physical and financial resources. Do not try to do everything in one year. On going work will get you ongoing marks which over the years will improve your position in the competition. In the meantime keep up the good

In one village, a peasant had a very obstinate donkey. The moment it was loaded up, it sat down and refused to move. It would not respond to threats, beatings or cajoling. Even when a carrot was jangled in front of its nose, this donkey wouldn't budge.

The wizard arrived in the village, and you can guess who was first in the queue. They agreed terms quickly, for the peasant was in no mood to haggle. The wizard walked slowly round the animal, examining it carefully. The villagers watched closely. If he could make this donkey obey orders, then he could truly work wonders. The wizard appeared to be giving the matter a lot of thought. Than he made up his mind, rummaged in his bag and took out a large wooden mallet and without hesitation hit the donkey between the eyes.

The owner protested. I don't want him killed. It's the only donkey I've got and I heard that all you have to do is talk to him.'

"Then you heard right, my friend", replied the wizard, but first I have to get his attention.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I heard that there have been some changes to the National Fuel Scheme. Has there been any change to the means

ANSWER

Yes, the income threshold has been increased and the period for which the scheme operates has also increased. However, the amount of the allowance remains the same.

The National Fuel Scheme is intended to help people who are dependent on long term social welfare or health board payments as their sole income and who are unable to meet their heating needs.

Under the scheme people who qualify for the Fuel Allowance receive an extra £5.00 (E6.35) per week. If you qualify for the basic Fuel Allowance you may also qualify for an extra £3.00 (E3.81) per week for smokeless fuel, but only if you live in an area where there is a ban on smoky

In order to qualify for the Fuel Allowance you must satisfy a means test. From October 2001 you and the members of your household cannot have more than £40 (E50.79) (was £30) per week in combined income over the appropriate maximum Irish contributory pension rate or savings/capital of £30,000 (E38,092.14) or more to qualify. For example, someone without any savings receiving a Widow's or Widower's Contributory Pension of £89.10 (E113.13) per week should qualify if his/her weekly income does not exceed £89.10 plus £40.00 i.e. £120.10 (£152.50).

However, if you are already on a means tested payment you will not be subject to another means test for the Fuel Allowance. Where two or more people living in the same household would qualify for the allowance, only one allowance will be paid.


The allowance is paid for 29 weeks (was 26 weeks) from early October to mid-April.

It's easy to make a difference



Water is Life-Don't waste a drop

The water in our homes is a precious commodity. It has to go through a very expensive treatment process before we get it. We have an insatiable demand for fresh clean water and a stunning ability to discharge equal amounts of contaminated water. All water discharged from our houses has to go back to get treated

To value our water supply, just stop to think how bleak your morning would be without that all important first flush, shower or cup of tea. To stop wasting it, just stop and think. Don't run the tap to get a cold glass of water, fill a jug and put it in the fridge. Don't run the water down the drain when you are brushing your teeth, and don't flush the loo for a hankie, it's not worth those 9-10 litters.

It costs about £3,256,000 to produce all the water used in Waterford County and City each year. This cost includes treatment of the water so it's fit for consumption and piping it to commercial and domestic users. This is just a production cost, it does not take into account depreciation of water treatment plants or maintenance of pipes. To include these costs an additional £3,450,000 per year is required. This extra money is vital to save the 30-40 % of treated water that is lost every year in transit through pipes between water treatment plants and users. The treatment of ever increasing amounts of water has an environmental as well as a financial cost. Great amounts of energy are used to transport, heat and treat water. This uses up fossil fuels and contributes to air pollution

The European Union promotes a policy called the "Polluter Pays Principle". This means that the individual responsible for a negative impact on the environment should pay for the clean-up costs. This is a principle that Europe wants to see enforced not only on factories and industries, but also to individuals like you and me. It is European poli-

cy that households should areas where water supply is pay for the water they use and this would then provide an incentive to use this commodity more sparingly. However in Ireland of the rain showers, where water and water quality have always been taken for granted, Dáil seats have perished on the rock of water charges.

The combined influence of individual efforts is effective. It is well known that there is a surge in demand for electricity as the kettle is put on during ad breaks for popular TV programmes. Also, it was the combined influence of individual consumers that forced manufacturers of aerosols to stop using CFC gases, which harm the ozone layer. So, it is with water saving initiatives in the home. Your efforts to save water do make a difference especially in fordcoco.ie

Initiative To Promote Road Safety **Amongst Waterford Students** Launched By Tom Murphy Car Sales In Co-operation With An Garda Siochana

An iniative designed to encourage transition year students in second level colleges throughout Waterford City and County to come forward with ideas that will help to promote and communicate the road safety message amongst their peers has been launched by Volkswagen main dealer Tom Murphy Cars Sales in cooperation with An Garda Siochana in Waterford. 

POSITIVE NEWS FOR ICF

The federation with the support of both the Irish and UK Sports Councils has continued its pro-active approach that competitive cycling in Ireland is a drug free sport.

In the first annual report issued by the Anti-Doping Unit of the Irish Sports Council it was indicated that of the 332 tests carried out in competition in 2000 cycling had the 3rd highest number of tests ie 48. And in out of competition testing cycling again had the 3rd highest number of tests with 18 tests out of the total of 289

Overall out of the 621 tests carried out under the auspices of the ISC the Federation had just over 10% of these ie 66.

Tests were carried out on 22 Olympic Sports under ISC Control.

In addition to this another 10 tests were carried out under UKSC auspices giving a total number of 76 tests. Of which 2 indicated the presence of banned substances. On of these was covered by prior medical exemption as it was an asthmatic treatment whilst the other case was dealt with under the Federations Anti-Doping rules and a suspension of 3 months form competitive cycling was handed down.

To date in 2001 there were 24 tests at the FBD/Milk Ras, 4 at the Tour of Ulster, 5 at the Men and Women's National Road Race Championships and 5 out of competition tests. This is 38 tests so far and with the exception of the Road Bace Championships from which results are still awaited there have been no positive results to-

However the Federation would gain reiterate that if it is necessary to take medication advise your Doctor and your Chemist that you do compete in a sport where anti-doping tests are conducted and let them see the list of banned substances which is contained in the Federation handboo'k.

Alternatively advice can be sought from the Anti-Doping Unit of the I.S.C. or from its website.

More care should be exercised in the purchase of herbal and or dietary supplements. Insist on seeing the contents of such preparations and again seek professional advice from a reliable source before taking these.

Continuing on the Anti-Doping theme Ireland was recently visited by two representatives from the Council of Europe who wished to discover at first hand the progress made in Ireland by the Sports Councils Anti Doping unit in its first full year of operation. Both representatives had a strong background in Anti-Doping.

Sports Council invited four National Governing Bodies to meet the two representatives to give either views on how the S.C.'s Anti-Doping Unit satisfied the expectations of the Governing Bodies. Cycling was one of the four invited N.G.B.'s along with Rugby, Athletics and Wheel Chair sports and was represented by the Federations Secretary, Jack Watson who is also the Federations Anti-Doping Officer.

Following this meeting a very useful workshop was held by Sports Council to which all N.G.B.'s were invited. The theme of the workshop was the conduct of Anti-Doping Disciplinary matters both at disciplinary and appeal level. The whole approach to the subject is now detailed in a handbook produced by the S.C.'s Anti-Doping Unit with the assistance of Beau Champs Solicitors and issued to all N.G.B.'s. The Federation was represented by the Chief Executive Eamon Duffy, PRO, Ciaran McKenna and Jack Watson.

Gary Rice from the solicitors and who had been directly involved in the production of the handbook took the delegates through page by page. This of course was theatrical. However to emphasise the hands on aspects of handling a positive find both Rugby and Cycling gave short presentations at the end of the workshop.

Jack Watson on behalf of Cycling emphasised that N.G.B.'s should have acceptable and transparent procedures in place based on both the International Federation rules and the Contents of the handbook (is sued on the night. Irrespectable of happenings these procedures should be strictly adhered to so if ultimately there is a legal challenge it will be more difficult to sustain if procedures are adhered to rather than the N.G.B. acting out a



panic scenario and doing what some individual member thinks is right.

Following the workshop the I.S.C. has been praised for including both Rugby and by Cycling who were able to give the workshop the benefit of their practical experiences rather than just presenting the handbook which had been produced by a solicitor who may have had no practical experience of actually dealing with a positive result.

The inclusion of Cycling in these two I.S.C. initiatives indicates that we are viewed by S.C. as having our house in order relative to Anti-Doping controls and procedures within our control.

TRAINING TIPS Sprint Work - Speed re-

lates to your muscular ability to spin the cranks (cadence), or foot speed. Leg speed is very important at the start of a race. Maximum leg turnover combined with strength gives you rocket speed out of the blocks. Speed is determined mainly by the ratio of fast-twitch muscle fibres in the main movers, such as gluteus, quads and hamstrings. Sprinting capability is a combination of the neuromuscular and ATP-PC chemical system in your muscles. Sprinting is therefore best trained for by doing repeated, maximal (that means absolute total) efforts of 10 to 30 seconds followed by total recovery (at least three minutes of extremely light or no activity). 'Spinervals', can be done during any ride by either riding above the comfortable cadence zone and concentrating on form, or by doing repeated upit!! starts in a smaller than normal gear with total recovery between spinervals. Do one sprint for every five minutes of time allocated for sprint work. Each sprint should last 10 to 15 seconds with the remainder of the five minutes being used for recovery. Concentrate on form and try not to bounce around on the saddle.

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























BALLYDUFF 2-15 ERIN'S OWN 3-7

A late goal scored by Liam MacNamara ensured Ballyduff's place in next years Waterford SHC campaign. In a terrific contest between these two great rivals at Cappoquin on Sunday afternoon. It was a game that could have gone either way. Shamrock's playing with the assistance of a cross wind made the better start with two Eoin Murphy points in the opening six minutes. Brendan Hannon opened Ballyduff's account with a point in the 9th minute and he added a goal five minutes later to give his side the lead. It was a lead they held for only 5 mins. as Seanie Murphy goaled to put Shamrock's back in front. Goalkeeper Liam Murphy converted a 90 mt free for Shamrock's to restore their lead in the 19th min. after Brendan Hannon had put the sides level. Shamrock's went in leading at the break by a single point on the score of 1-5 to 1-4. Brendan Hannon equalised and Alan Martin gave Ballyduff the lead inside three minutes of the restart. Keeper Murphy converted another 90 mt free, this time against the wind to again tie the scores before Tom Feeney from a long range free restored Ballyduff's lead. Three points from Brendan Hannon in a nine minute spell between the 41st and 49th mins with Eoin Murphy (free) pulling one back for Shamrocks saw Ballyduff lead by 1-10 to 1-7 with nine minutes remaining. Two points from frees per Eoin Murphy in the 51st and 58th min saw Ballyduff's lead cut to the minimum while a Kieran O'Keeffe effort from a free came back off the crossbar and cleared for a fruitless "65". The game was on a knife edge as both sides strove majestically for victory and it was Ballyduff who secured it with MacNamara's goal in the final minute after good work by Ml. Molumphy and Ml. Walsh.

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
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
