

Closure Of Cadena Sends Shock Waves Through Tallow KEVIN KIRRANE

The announcement of the closure of Cadena Ireland Ltd, with the loss of 68 jobs, has sent shock waves throughout the community in Tallow and has been greeted with dismay by employees.

On Tuesday last, the company announced a world-wide restructuring of its manufacturing and supply chain operations which ultimately resulted in the closure of Cadena in Tallow.

The company has yet to agree a redundancy package with the workforce and Enterprise Ireland are now

scheduled to meet with the staff to find alternative employment.

The decision by Cadena, which was part of the Imperial Tobacco group, was not wholely unexpected as while it had been trading competively in its earliest stages with employment growing from 62 in 1997 to a peak of 150 in June 1999, Cadena lost a significant order that year and fifty staff were made redundant.

The company never made up the lost ground and the numbers employed have continued to slip, eventually falling to sixty-eight.

In the past year, Imperial Tobacco invested in excess of £1 million in the plant, hoping for additional productivity and to set up new products but the plant remained unprofitable due to a declining market for own brand eigars in Holland.

PWAI Should Be Exempt From Objection Charge Claims Cllr.

The Government may bring in a charge for each objection made to a planning application, Cllr. Mary Green revealed. To combat this, she said, a system should be put in place where some organisations should not be charged at the same rate.

Cllr. Green said the Waterford network of People With Disabilities Ireland - a voluntary organisation - made 40 objections to planning applications last year.

Cllr. Green said she was aware that introduction of a fee was hoped to reduce the number of "malicious" objections. However for organisations such as People with Disability Ireland, she said, the charge should be waved.

HOW DO YOU CREATE BETTER SLIDE PRESENTATIONS?

In the September edition of The Toastmaster magazine, Linda Adams gives a number of suggestions to help you shine during your next presentation.

Colour is a powerful tool. A simple colour, whether it's text or a graphic, can instantly convey a message far more effectively than simply writing out the same information. For example, you have a chart that displays profit and loss for several fiscal years. Numbers in Red will clearly tell the audience that there is a loss for that

The content of your speech should enhance your speech. You want your audience to glance at the slides, and then return their attention to you.

The winter season sees The more time they have to read the slide, the greater their chance of losing focus on your speech. Don't put too much detail on your slide. If you are shrinking text to fit on the slide you have too much detail. Make sure your font size is large enough - at least 24 points so that everyone in the room can clearly see the slides.

Graphics and animation are a very effective way to enhance your presentation. A picture can be used to evoke emotion and illustrate a point. Images used, should relate to the slide content. Don't use a graphic to just fill space. The colours of images used should blend with the over all colour scheme and content of the presenta-





THE BRITISH IN INDIA

Britain took control of India after Indian soldiers working for the British East India Company rebelled in 1857. In the following years, many British government officials, doctors, engineers, tea planters and estate managers went to live and work in India. Often, their families accompanied them.

The British community in India lived sheltered, privileged lives, looked after by Indian servants. They became known as the "British Raj" (ruling class).

Magnificent Mughal Architecture

Many people think that the Taj Mahal (above), near Agra, in India, is one of the most beautiful buildings in the world. It is made of gleaming white marble, decorated with delicate flower patterns made of semi-precious stones. It was built by Mughal, emperor Shah Jahan (ruled 1627-1658) as a tomb for his wife, Mumtaz Mahal. She died giving birth to their fourteenth child.

Merchant Shipping

European merchant ships were built with huge wide hulls, to carry the maximum amount of cargo. Because of the strong monsoon winds blowing across the Indian Ocean, they could make the long voyage from England to India only once or twice a year.



Cllr. O Céilleachair says the £10.8 million project is now in its fifth year of planning stages and remains eagerly awaited in the locality.

"Initially, a substantial finan-

cial contribution from the Avonmore/Waterford group was envisaged as part of the equation. I'm pleased that the collapse of that offer was overcome and that the approval from the Dept. of the Environment was forthcoming."

"The public consultation phase has now been completed. The ground investigation contract for the pipelines connecting Dungarvan and the Ballinacourty plant - featuring a stretch of the old railway track - has also been finalised. A "design, build and operate" contract has been advertised for expressions of interest. Interviews have been held and I understand that a number of contractors have been shortlisted for the tender process. Land acquisition and wayleave arrangements are under negotiation. I believe a sludge plan strategy relating to the Harbour was agreed with consultants in June of this year and a draft plan has been received by the Council."

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair feels that the sooner the better, what he refers to as an "outdated" sewerage treatment system in Dungarvan, is replaced with a modern and comprehensive network. He says he will continue to encourage all parties to the project to bring it to fruition.

Boulangere

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 1 hour 20 mins

A DIFFERENT and delicious way to roast your Sunday leg of

INGREDIENTS

(Serves 6)

1.5kg leg of lamb

30 g butter

1 tblspn olive oil 500g onions, sliced

1kg potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced

salt and black pepper

2 cloves garlic, thinly sliced

1 beef stock cube

1 cup hot water

parsley

Heat the butter and oil in a frying pan. Add the onions and cook gently until softened and just starting to colour. Place the potato slices in the bottom of a roasting pan. Spoon the onions over them. Season with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

Make small incisions around the bone and under the skin of the leg of lamb and insert the garlic slices. Place the lamb on a rack over the potatoes and onions. Season it with plenty of salt and freshly ground pepper. Dissolve the beef stock cube in the cup of hot water and pour over the potatoes and onions.

Roast the lamb in a hot oven (220C) for the first 20 minutes and then lower the oven temperature to moderate (180C) and cook for another hour.

The lamb may be cut in thick slices, arranged on the bed of potatoes and onions, sprinkled with chopped parsley and served in the dish it was cooked



Spaghetti Carbonara

Preparation: 5 mins Cooking: 20 mins (approx)

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 4-5)

2 tblspns olive oil 3 cloves of garlic, crushed

25g butter 175g bacon in 5mm strips

Half glass of white wine 350g quick-cooking

spaghetti

3 egg yolks 75g freshly grated

Parmesan or

mature Cheddar cheese 150ml single cream salt and ground black pep-

Heat oil in a pan, saute garlic, remove and discard. Add butter and bacon and cook until bacon starts to go crisp. Pour in wine, boil rapidly to reduce. Remove from heat. Cook

While cooking take a warm bowl and mix in egg yolks, cheese and cream. Season with salt and pepper. When pasta is cooked, drain and toss in the bowl with egg mixture. Quickly reheat bacon and add to the pasta. Toss together (heat from the pasta should cook the eggs to form a coating). Serve immediately.

American Carrot

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 45-50 mins

THIS healthy cake has become extremely popular in recent years. Try this delicious American-style recipe for a change.

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 8)

280g self raising flour 1 tspn baking powder

50g pecan nuts, chopped

175g soft light brown sugar 2 medium bananas, mashed 175g carrots, scrubbed and

3 medium eggs, beaten 175ml sunflower oil

Preheat the oven to 180C. Sift the flour with the baking powder, then stir in nuts and sugar.

Beat together the bananas, carrots, eggs and oil and stir into the flour mixture.

Spoon into a base-lined 20.5cm cake tin and bake for 45-50 minutes.



Clarification Sought On Route Selection Process For New Dungarvan Road

Cllr. Billy Kyne sought clarification on the selection of a route for the Dungarvan Outer By-Pass from the Council.

He wished it to be publicly known that a full consultative process for the selection of a route must be gone through before any one road is selected.

At present, he said, five possible routes were being proposed and there were some fears that these were the routes - Clir. Billy Kyne that were going to selected

County Engineer John O'Flynn said that the reason for the new outer bypass was because the traffic management study for the town highlighted that the present bypass couldn't cope with the amount of the traffic and had essentially just become a inner link road.

He went on to say that the only stage of the process the Council had so far gone through was the constraints study to look any problems with developing the road in a particular area.

The present stage the Council is now in is the drawing up of possible routes. He said these are not definite routes and are likely to change substantially once submissions from the public are made.

Development is likely to begin on the road after 2006, the County Engineer concluded.

Cllr. Tom Higgins pointed out that the Council would end up paying £2 million interest on the loan for the extension of the Civic Offices.

The loan of £1.2 million from the financial institutions will be paid back at £100,000 over 20

Cllr. Higgins welcomed the extension but said that as a mark of protest over the new ATM banking system to be used by the Bank of Ireland, this bank should not be dealt with.

The new system, which would mean that all personal accounts will take place by using the new ATM machine recently installed, he said, was an "unadulterated assault on the ordinary person" and will "ostracise them outside the bank'

The stopping of personal transactions, Cllr Higgins said, will also have an adverse affect on old age pensioners and those with

Cllr. Billy Kyne said that in recent weeks many people had written letters of protest to the Bank of Ireland and said that the County Manager Donal Connolly should write to the local branch manager in protest also.

"What is proposed by the Bank of Ireland is wrong for any customer", he said "but at a time fraud is at its highest at ATMS I think this is a cavalier attitude from the Bank of Ireland.'

He said if Banks continue in this mode "where they charge you for your own money it's time the Government clamped down on it".

Cllr. Nuala Ryan said she had received similar complaints from pensioners in particular. She now believes "that people will vote with their feet".

However, County Manager Donal Connolly said that the Council will secure the loan from the bank which offers the best terms and most competitive rates although he said that the AIB were the ac-

Teagasc are responsible for providing advice to farmers and other landowners who are interested in forestry as a land use option, or for those who have planted, to help them to get the best possible crop through good management techniques.

The Teagasc forestry advisory and training service is a completely free service. Paddy Bruton is the Teagasc Forestry Adviser for Co. Waterford. He is based in Kildalton.

Introduction to Forestry

A short course for those considering planting or who have recently planted will be held in the Teagasc office in Dungarvan commencing on Thursday 25th October at 8pm (See advertisement).

It is also planned to hold a number of forest walks in the near future in the County and these will be timed to coincide with the various operations necessary in the management of young plantations. It is essential for Forest owners to attend these events as they will be the main method of demonstrating good management techniques.

Timely Management Hints for your Plantation **Vegetation Control**

As trees have stopped growing now, there is no point in carrying out any weed control, apart perhaps from some emergency manual cleaning if trees are being smothered. On certain sites, however, it may be worth considering an application of Glyphosate now. Autumn applications of Glyphosate can give good control of certain vegetation, especially grasses on fertile sites, which can continue well into the following Spring. Therefore, if you are worried that you may not be able to get all your Glyphosate spraying completed in the early Spring it is worth considering getting some suitable areas completed now.

Scrub Control

Furze (whins) and briars can be a major problem on young plantations. The Autumn is a good time to spray scrub and briars with Tricolopyr. This herbicide can be applied over the top of many conifers as long as they have hardened off but the leaders should be avoided.

Filling-In

From now on, it is time to be planning what trees need to be replaced in your young plantation. Early filling-in is a good idea so agree a plan with your Forester now. Trees should be available from the forest nurseries from November on, weather permitting, and ideally should be ordered now. Remember the Forest Service requires a minimum of 90% of original stocking at year 4 with no gaps.

Cattle

Census Return for Extensification

Have you returned you CEN.1 form to your local district livestock office? The deadline was Friday 5th October for farmers using the census system to determine eligibility for extensification. The census dates for 2001 were Sunday 11th March, Sunday 13th May and Sunday 5th August.

Note that the reduction co-efficient of 0.8 for the first two census dates (due to foot and mouth restrictions) applies to cattle only (not sheep) and this will be applied by DAFRD automatically. Actual cattle number held on both dates should be declared as normal on the CEN.1 form.

Suckler Weanlings

Respiratory disease can be a major problem with suckler weanlings in Autumn due to exposure to a range of stress factors including abrupt weaning, extra handling, dosing, mixing, transport to and from sale, dehorning, castration and housing. Careful planning before and after weaning can minimise some or all of the stress factors and greatly reduce the risk of ill health, poor subsequent performance and mortality. Weanling sellers should have calves on creep grazing and/or creep meals before sale. Weaning and vaccination pre sale is an option where direct farm to farm sale is organised and the purchaser is prepared to pay extra to cover the costs. Direct farm to farm sales (using the mart as the agent for security and weighing) can greatly reduce stress and suit both buyer and seller once a pricing system is agreed.

Teagasc Autumn Sheep Seminar.

Earlier this year Teagasc, Athenry established on-farm trials around the country to establish the levels and causes of lameness problems in sheep. Some of those farms co-operating in the trial are located in Co. Waterford.

At a Teagasc seminar in the Teagasc Centre, Dungarvan at 8.00 p.m. on Tuesday 23rd October (see separate advertisement) Barbara Goode, a researcher on sheep from Teagasc, Athenry and Pat Clarke, Teagasc Sheep Specialist will speak about the initial results from these trials and the implications for Co. Waterford Sheep farms. In addition Paddy O'Brien, Teagasc Adviser, will give up to date advice on meal feeding

This seminar offers a unique opportunity for all sheep farmers in Co. Waterford to get a full update in preparation for the new sheep production year.

Live Valuation System must be introduced for all says Macra

Following a recent meeting between the Department of Agriculture and the farm organisations, Waterford Macra na Feirme's agricultural spokesperson Ken Murphy (Clonea Power), said the Government must deliver on its commitment to introduce a live valuation system for all TB and Brucellosis breakdown cases as a matter of urgency. At present the live valuation system is only an option for those farmers with 6 or more reactors and those with pedigree reactor animals, he said.

Mr. Murphy said the commitment to introduce a live valuation system was one of the key farming elements stipulated in the PPF (Programme for Prosperity and Fairness), which was agreed in February 2000.

"The current situation is totally unacceptable with more than 80% of farmers having no access to live valuation, despite the scheme having been operational for the past nine months. "Macra will not stand by and allow more young farmers to suffer because of the departments failure to deliver on its commitment," concluded Mr. Murphy.

Disaster For **Tallow Town**

Yes this past week has been a very sad one for the people of Tallow and surrounding areas who were shocked to learn of the closing of Cadena Cigar Factory in the town with the loss of 68 jobs. The factory will close the end of November. With Flair Plastics already closed with about two years (also vacant) we now find ourselves with two terrific factories now vacant in the

WHO CARES?

I ask however who really cares. Sometime ago there was a chance of getting a Fish Plant in Tallow but because of objections to this plant which would have employed 50 people to begin with, we lost this to West Cork.

WAKE UP TIME

About a year and a half ago we were about to write about Tallow a booming town. Well at that time people wanted to build houses in many different parts of the town. Builders wanted to build in Tallow because I suppose of its central location between many of our big neighbouring towns and of course being so close to Cork City. What happens? Little or nothing. We have fourteen council houses being built but because we have a sewerage scheme totally outdated and not able to cater for any more houses everything has grounded to a halt. This would not be tolerated anywhere else but in Tallow. Houses have been built in every town and village surrounding our town but we have problems. We praise the council when they deserve it but with the stiff laws and regulations they laid down for the fish plant which forced it to go elsewhere and now the shooting down of planning (although one scheme now seems to be ok even if it looks like the boom is now gone) for so many houses. We ask why Tallow? We do not begrudge our neighbours of getting whatever they can, we here in Tallow cannot get a wall finished on the entrance to the town from the Tallow bridge side. Not alone should this be finished but lighting (three on four would do) should be put in place on this very popular walking area for the local people. I also believe that another local employer is putting some of his staff on short time beginning this week. While we will now be told that all of this is due to what happened on September 11th in America, it started in Tallow before this however. Perhaps it's now wake up time in Tallow, lets put pressure on our politicians to take up our just cause. The facts are there for everyone to see around fourteen businesses have closed in our town in the last eight years. The second factory now about to lie dormant beside the other. Its time to fight back before we became the first ghost town in the West. Maybe then somebody would make a film!

THE BATTLE OF AFFANE

Last week we wrote about a party of O'Connors who came as refugees to West Waterford. When Sir Maurice Fitzgerald determined to expel the O'Connors, the Earl of Desmond travelled to West Waterford to enforce Maurice's orders. Maurice sent a message for aid to their family's ancestral foe, Thomas Earl of Ormond, who was now an adult and had returned to Ireland. He came with a small army of Tipperarymen across the old road from Newcastle on the 1st of February 1565. Years ago this was known as the Bothar Garbh, the rough road.

There is a contemporary description of the Earl of Desmond with Thomas of Desmond and certain "captains". They included 'Rory McSheane McGrath, captain'. They went to Ballinacourty, Bewley, Ballinameela, Cappagh, Whitechurch and other lands belonging to Maurice of Dromana from Affane to Ardmore. Here they led the refugees fighting men as they burned and looted the countryside. This McGrath and his men were the swordsmen of the Desmonds, but the head of the family at Mountain Castle. Philip the builder of the towerhouse at Abbeyside, took no art in the coming conflict. He was a shrewd man. He left the leadership of his fighting men to Rory who led the Mc-Grath contingent among the 1,000 armed retainer of Desmond. Thus whoever won the conflict, the leading McGrath was available to profit by it for the whole family.

A battle took place between the Fitzgeralds and the Butlers which raged back forth as far as Whitechurch until the Earl of Desmond was captured. His horse was shot from under him and he was then led away a prisoner to Clonmel and eventually became a prisoner in the Tower of London.

None of the McGraths is named as a casualty or prisoner. This battle in County Waterford was the last battle which fought on Irish soil "with banners displayed". Queen Elizabeth was furious with the two Earls but Ormond went unpunished while Desmond spent some years in the Tower because he had employed "proclaimed traitors", who were the O'Connors.

THE STREETS OF ABBEYSIDE INTRODUCTION

This compilation of photographs of the streets of Abbeyside is a visual record of the changes and development of our village over the past century.

Supermarkets, Petrol Filling Stations and modern business houses have replaced the blacksmith's forge, the cobbler's shop, the livery stable and the wheelwright's shed. The white-washed walls of houses give way to brightly coloured plaster work and modern houses stand side by side with the renovated older buildings. Today, new Estates have transformed the silence of green fields into lively thoroughfares where traffic is constant and the din of children's voices familiar.

The older photographs in black and white give us glimpses into the simple life of the people of Abbeyside during the period of the train, the "meithdeal" and the Fair Day. One can picture the sailor going off to sea, his bag on his back, humping it across the Causeway; the woman clad in long flowing dress, shawl about her shoulders, filling her pail at the street pump or children running about the gas lamp-post.

The Streets of Abbeyside were never paved with gold, but the camera has clicked over and over recording these visual nuggets. Looking at them, the mind's eye can also click into focus and open windows into the past, for us now and also for future generations when their turn comes to peruse them.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

The Social Insurance contribution and tax year will only be 9 months this year, rather than a full 12 months. I am working at present but I wonder how will this affect my eligibility for a Social Insurance benefit in the future?

ANSWER

Moving the start of the tax year from April to January resulting in a short tax or contribution year this year should not affect your eligibility. For most Social Insurance benefits you must satisfy two conditions:

You must first have a minimum number of weeks of Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contributions paid since you first started work. Secondly, you must have a minimum number of weeks of PRSI contributions paid and/or credited in the Relevant Tax Year.

As this is a short year, you will be automatically awarded 14 additional contributions giving you a total of 52 contributions as in other years.

Currently, the Relevant Tax Year is the last complete tax year before the Benefit Year in which you make a claim for a benefit. The Benefit Year is almost the same as the calendar year and starts on the first Monday in January. However, from 2003 the Relevant Tax Year will be 2 years before the Benefit Year as follows:

HOME INSURANCE

A house or apartment is the largest asset owned by most people. Therefore it is important that all steps are taken to protect this asset in case of fire, flood and storm damage. House insurance is necessary and it is vital that it is up to date and is covered for the correct amount.

It is relevant to note that many people assume that it is the market value that a house should be insured for. This may lead to inflated premiums and over insurance. If you wish to insure your house it should be insured for the replacement and not the market value. With this in mind it is well worth taking a fresh look at your house insurance every now and then take reassess the value you have been putting on the house itself. House prices have been very much in the news of late. Building costs, however, have not been rising as fast as house prices so it still costs far less to reinstate a house than buy a new one.

It will pay to shop around as there can be great differences in some quotes, discounts may be given i.e. for smoke detectors and alarms and in some cases Community Alert areas. Senior Citizens also benefit from discounts from some areas. Senior Citizens also benefit from discounts from some insurers. It will pay therefore if you shop around or to get a broker to do it for you.

If you rent your house/apartment, your landlord may have the building itself insured, but it is important that you check out this information. However, in rented accommodation, it is your responsibility to insure the contents. If you are a homeowner you should make sure that you are covered for: Damage or loss of the house itself.

Damage for loss of contents i.e. furniture, electrical goods. Liability for damage to third parties arising out of defects in the building.

All risks insurance for specific items i.e. Jewellery etc. For the sake of a relatively small premium involved it is not worth taking the risk of not insuring your house. Make sure that your home is adequately insured but do not be rushed into over insuring your house by the spiraling rise in house prices.

A tremendous amount of work has been undertaken in the village and great credit is due to all concerned. In this connection it is gratifying to read that you have the co-operation of Waterford County Council, FAS. ESB, Telecom Eireann and Schools. THE BUILT **ENVIRONMENT**

WILDLIFE AND **NATURAL AMENITIES**

This is a wonderful historic facility to have and is obviously a major focal point in the village. Do however give some consideration to the provision of a wildlife facility such as a bird sanctuary. Your river area would be a natural site for this. In this respect the Tidy Towns Handbook would be useful and the Irish Wildbird Conservancy are always available to give advice. Such a project would also earn additional marks for you in the competition

LITTER CONTROL

The village was practically litter-free on adjudication day. Congratulations are again due made under this heading last to all concerned. This is an important aspect of the Competition which needs constant vigilance. In fact work in this respect was observed by the adjudicator during the visit.

TIDINESS

ROADS, STREETS AND **BACK AREAS**

Road and street surfaces are very good and pavements are being well maintained. New paving was noted. As already mentioned, much overhead wiring has disappeared and the provision of new lamp standards is noted. Approach roads were reasonably well presented.

GENERAL IMPRESSION

Continue to extend your plan on a year-to-year basis. Liaise closely with the various agencies and try to do as much as you can from one year to the next, within your physical and financial resources. Do not try to do it all together as otherwise it becomes frustrating. The

overall impression of Aglish is one of a community very concerned about their environment and its preservation and this is reflected in the way that the village was presented for the competition this year. Well done to all concerned.

SECOND ADJUDICATION (11/08/01)

Aglish looked very well again for second adjudication. Litter control continues to be good and the village was tidy. The site on which the large trailers etc. are being located did present a problem however. Road surfaces and footpaths are excellent as are verges of approach roads. Some buildings, including the church are a little weather stained and would benefit from cleaning. A few gable walls could also be improved. A number of low corrugated roofs could be upgraded as they are quite visible being only a little above eye level, these include two stone buildings, the Hair Salon and the property located behind the thatched cottage near the church. The problem is not serious, but at your level in the competition it is important.
























VANDALISM OF DUNGARVAN DAY CENTRE

Application by Meteor Mobile Communications to creet a 20 metre mobile telephone mast and base station at Carrigmorna, Learnybrien.

Our objections to the planning application are as follows:

1 We are extremely concerned by the proposed development fearing that exposure to microwave radiation will pose a serious health risk particularly to young children.

2 As there is an existing telecommunications mast on Croughaun already providing adequate coverage to the area there is no requirement for an additional mast on Carrigmorna.

3 The proposed mast location at Carrigmorna would be a very dominant feature on the sky line due to the already significant lowering of the former broad leafed wood by the harvesting and re-planting programme currently underway at the site.

4 The proposed mast development at Carrigmorna would have a very negative impact on the value of property in the area.

5 The proposed location is in an area of high scenic amenity and would have a very negative impact on tourism in the area.

The Ball Alley, built at the end of the nineteenth century, is part of the fabric of Lismore, and is an integral part of Church Lane. Surely the Council is not going to pull it down for want of the will and funds to restore it? I strongly support any moves to retain the Alley and urge the Council to reconsider.



The installation of a MRI scanner is a huge development for clinical services in the South East. People who require a MRI scan will no longer have to wait so long or have to travel such long distances, thereby reducing stress for patients and for families. The new MRI scanner will ensure

that local people have access to the best services possible. The Health Board are proud to support this development by providing the additional funding required to purchase the scanner, building a new unit to house the scanner and making available the ongoing funding for the staff and supplies required to run the service.

The Siemens Magnetom Symphony 1.5 Tesla MRI scanner will provide more information than CT about head and neck, spinal and musculoskeletal disorders because of its high contrast sensitivity and multiplanar imaging capability. MRI has emerged as the diagnostic imaging of choice for

the brain and the spine. MRI has one of its greatest impacts in the region of the central nervous system and because it uses magnetic fields rather than x-rays there is no radiation exposure which means it is safer for the patient.

The equipment is now on order and will be built specially for Waterford. The completion of the buildings, installation and commissioning can now proceed with an expected opening date in the spring of 2002. The enabling works for the construction have commenced on 3rd September 2001 and a contract will be awarded for the main construction project in the next few weeks.



Dungarvan Caters Poorly For The Needs Of The Disabled

On September 29th last, seven postgraduate students of Geography at the National University of Ireland, Maynooth conducted a preliminary survey on how "userfriendly" public facilities and amenities in Dungarvan are for people with physical disabilities. Particular attention was paid to wheelchair accessibility and the availability of facilities for the blind or partially sighted and those with hearing difficulties. Note was also taken of the difficulties that may be encountered by the elderly, and persons managing children in buggies.

In general, it was found that, like many other towns and villages in Ireland, Dungarvan is a potentially difficult place to negotiate for people with disabilities. Pathways are frequently damaged and cracked. The height of kerbs is variable and unpredictable. Kerbs at pedestrian crossings are seldom dished and flush with the roadway and are therefore unsuitable for most forms of wheelchair use. In several cases where dishing was found on one side of a crossing, this was not the case on the other

Tactile paving (which alerts the unsighted to the presence of a crossing) is non-existent at most crossings. At Grattan Square the new pedestrian crossing at the Bridge Street entrance only had tactile paving on one side, and this was poorly designed in terms of providing guidance for the unsighted.

Signal-controlled pedestrian crossings are rare. Where they were found, the audio function was operative on only one side at each junction observed. The signal to cross generally allowed a very short interval for those with impaired mobility.

Belisha beacons at the at the

square were not functioning and thus of little use to those of limited sight as they would not easily be recognised. Some supermarkets are

equipped with automatic doors. However, parking for the disabled and pathways to the doors are typically poorly connected. Lips at doorways are very common, making safe manoeuvring of a wheelchair difficult and creating trip factors for the blind or partially sighted. Floor tiling in the shops frequently sat a half-inch to an inch above the outside pavement level. Inside the shops, clutter was observed in many premises, with many obstacles placed in the aisles. Alignment of shelving and cabinets along the aisles and the height of shelves were also often poor. However, a good home delivery service was available in most supermarkets if desired. Many other retail outlets were too small to be negotiated by wheelchairs as many have narrow doorways, steps up to doorways and narrow aisles.

Education facilities in the town were closed as it was Saturday, but from what could be ascertained, facilities that were user-friendly to wheelchair students were available. However, in some cases access routes to the schools were hazardous and inimical to independent movement, due mainly to poor footpath surfaces or the complete absence of footpaths. The local FAS Centre, which has responsibility for training disabled persons toward employment, sadly is inaccessible to many of the disabled due to its narrow doorway and poor layout with-

Similarly, places of entertainment and leisure, such as the pubs, nite clubs, restaurants, take-aways, cinema, museum and tennis courts and even walking along the coastline are

new zebra crossing in the not user friendly to the wheelchair-bound. Local churches appear inaccessible without considerable aid to the disabled visitor. Health services, we believe, would prove difficult to access. Dentists, doctors,

opticians and physiotherapists are typically located on upper floors. One surgery did have a ramp and open parking but one would need assistance to negotiate the steepness of the ramp and there was a lack of a platform at the top to allow for the safe opening of the door. Similarly, facilities at the local hospital would not allow for independent access of persons with disabilities.

Good news is to be had at some of the newer buildings and facilities in the town. The Library, the Credit Union, the Arts Centre and ATMs are accessible to all. Toilets for the disabled are available in these newer, well laid out, buildings, though not well signposted from the street. One automatic toilet is available at the bridge on the quayside but again pathways and poor finish has left problem dips and lips in the tarmac. Information on parking for the disabled was available at the library along with internet and computer access. All facilities here are user-friendly and the Arts Centre also has a lift to upper floors.

For the younger persons in the community a purpose-built playground has been developed at Walton Park. Many features here are excellent with wellcushioned ground beneath the apparatus. However, openbacked ladders in some areas and lack of a safety rail at the rope climb could be potential hazards for the less mobile. As with so many amenities in the town, again access was very poor. Children and parents/carers must cross a car park and bumpy uneven wasteland to enter the playground. Carparking spaces block the route for the user and this could also make it difficult for an ambulance to access the grounds if required. No toilet facilities are available in the area, necessitating crossing a rather dangerous bridge should the children require the facilities of the public toilet at the quay.

Dungarvan is probably no worse than similar towns elsewhere in terms of how well it caters for people with disabilities, and in some respects is possibly better. The survey indicated a general lack of awareness of how the environment could be made better to include all members of the community. Street clutter, such as sandwich boards, cars parked on pavements or in disabled spaces, bicycles propped against walls blocking the pavements, deliveries left in the street, skips placed in the path without netting to warn the blind person using a cane, these all create transient problems that could be improved with a little thoughtfulness. Unfinished work was in evidence all around the town, creating unnecessary hazards. It was also clear that the needs of the disabled were not high in the priorities of the local authority, as indicated by the poor condition of footpaths, and poor design and maintenance of pedestrian crossings.

These are common problems all over Ireland, which performs poorly by comparison with other European countries in terms of how well we cater for the needs of those with disabilities. A general public awareness campaign is needed, backed up by active application of legislation and regulations. Hopefully this brief report will make some small contribution in this direction.





This is a very attractive football programme arranged for Fraher Field on Sunday and after the Saturday programme t will be interesting to see how standards compare.

Meeting Arranged On Future Of Multi-Million **Power Plant**

Unemployment Issues Discussed With Tanai

By Kevin Kirrane

A meeting will take place between County Manager, Donal Connolly and Dungarvan Energy Ltd on Tuesday next where a definite time-frame for construction of the gas-fired power plant as well as the energy companies current difficulties will be discussed.

Dungarvan Energy Ltd, an

Irish business consortium, which includes Rolls Royce Power Ventures, was due to begin construction of the country's first gas-fired power sta-

tion this month However, although the £80 million power plant was granted planning permission last year, a High Court appeal by a local resident has delayed this date.

One of the instigators of the meeting with Dungarvan Energy, Cllr. Billy Kyne has said that "to advance Dungarvan and respond to the recent job losses across West Waterford, the Government must fully investigate the potential of the Dungarvan Energy project, and work with all the players to bring it to a successful conclu-

There have been some doubts about the ability of Dungarvan Energy Ltd to connect with the national grid because of what they have described as the unrealistic cost on the link by Bord Gais.

This delay and uncertainty, Cllr. Kyne said was unhelpful and counterproductive. "The dividend from natural gas for Dungarvan is obvious," he said 'and is in my view attainable."

Plant, Cllr. Kyne said is of vital importance, as despite Century Homes and Microbrush, Waterford Foods has not been effectively replaced. Along with this, the IDA has failed to introduce an industry in Dungaryan since 1985, he said.

This failure was highlighted to Tanaiste Mary Harney during a twenty minute meeting with Dungarvan Urban Councillors on Friday last, by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan.

"There are currently 922 signing on in Dungarvan", he told the Tanaiste "there will be another 104 laid off by Stafford Miller bringing unemployment of a population of 7,000. This training centre here".

rate of unemployment is unacceptable by any standards"

A possible tenant for the Advance factory was also discussed and speaking later to the Dungarvan Leader, the Tanaiste said "a lot of possible tenants have come and looked at the Advance Factory but they haven't invested."

However, she said it is difficult to attract outside investors to the advance factory as they are not inclined to set up in smaller towns. "But I am optimistic that we will get a tenant for the factory. It has just taken longer than we would have wished", she said.

The possible tenants she has in mind are engineering and technology firms, which she hopes will locate on the IDA site "in the not too distant future".

The Tanaiste also advised the The go-ahead of the Power Urban Council to invite Enterprise Ireland to a future meeting and Cllr. O'Riordan said that this is likely to happen in November when it is hoped some advances are made.

This meeting as well as the setting up of a Work Group, which would involve all sections of the community, should happen along with the foundation of a FAS training centre in the town, according to the Chairperson of the Urban Council Cllr. Teresa Wright.

"I've been working with FAS for the past few years", she said "and I believe they would be interested in coming to Dungarin the town to almost 1,100 out van and having an on-going

No Stradbally Crime Spree Despite Loss Of Garda Station Says Chief Supt.

Fears that Stradbally has been neglected by An Garda Stochana following the loss of a Garda Sergeant in the town appear to be unfounded, according to the Chief Superintendent John O'Halloran.

The issue originally came to a head earlier this year when the resident Garda Sergeant in Stradbally retired and was not replaced, but when contacted by Deputy Austin Deasy, the Chief Superintendent said that there has been no noticeable increase in crime in the area.

The area is receiving attention from Gardai in Kilmacthomas under Sergeant O' Sullivan, in Kill under Garda Halpin and particularly by Garda Sweeney in Leamybrien, who has specific responsibility for the area", he said.

Chief Superintendent John O'Halloran also said that Superintendent Howard has ongoing contact with local people in Stradbally.


