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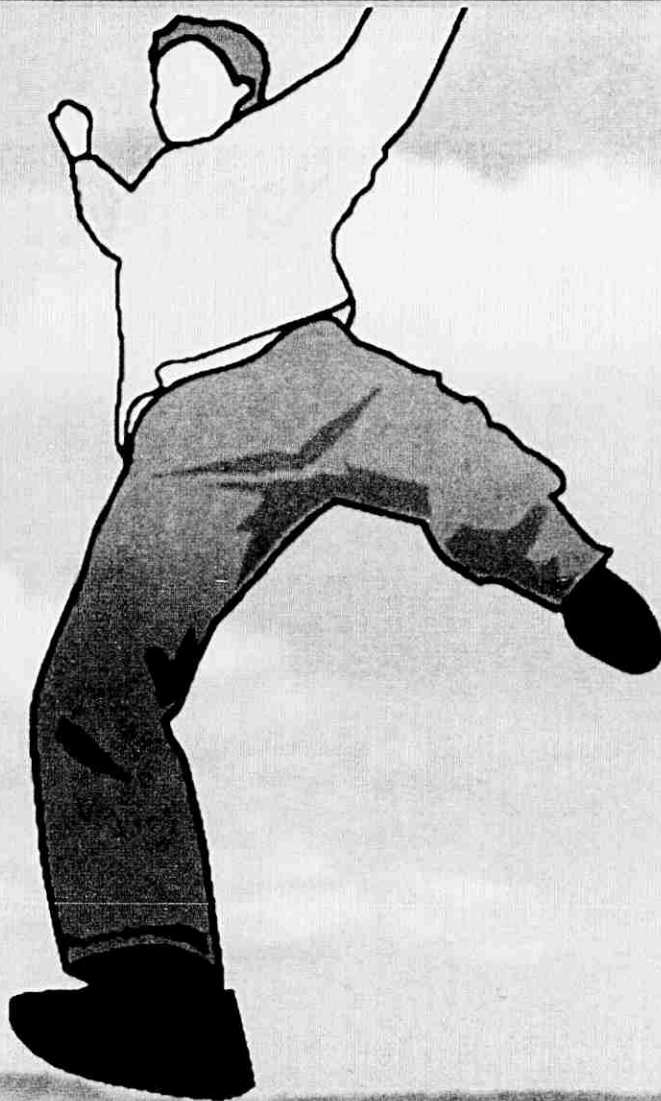

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Recycling Schemes To Begin In November

The first kerbside collection of recyclables to be undertaken by a local authority in Ireland will begin on November 9th in West Waterford and November 19th in Dungarvan, with the aim of

cutting the level of waste going to landfill in Dungarvan and Tramore by 35%.

The scheme will include the collection of dry recyclable material from households in the councils administrative area once every four weeks with ordinary collections to take place on the other three weeks.

The first two months will be held on a trial basis to see what the level of uptake on the scheme is. Celine Horner, Environmental Officer at Waterford County Council said. If the level is sufficient, then a fortnightly collection may take place in January.

Collections of recyclables from hotels and shops, meanwhile, is likely to take place fortnightly from November.

There will be no charge on the recyclable collections for

the first two months but January may see the introduction of a charge, although, Ms. Horner said, these charges will be at a lower rate than ordinary collections.

The dry recyclable material to be collected will include cardboard, newspapers, magazines, washed milk and juice cartons and all types of plastic including bottles, drink cans and food tins.

The material will then be brought to Lismore where Samshire Recycling will take delivery and the waste will be separated and baled then sold onto agencies for recycling.

This will include newspapers and magazines which will be used as animal bedding while plastics will be

recycled as shopping bags and garden furniture.

It is also hoped that Lismore will now have an industry surrounding recycling, County Manager Donal Connolly has said. Already Samshire have hired eight extra staff as a direct result of their contract with Waterford County Council.

Collections of recyclables, meanwhile, will be taken up in clear plastic bags and the Council has already delivered five plastic bags to the public along with a calendar of do's and don'ts involved in recycling.

After this the public will have to buy their bags from shops at a nominal sum - roughly the same as a roll of black refuse sacks, according to the County Manager.

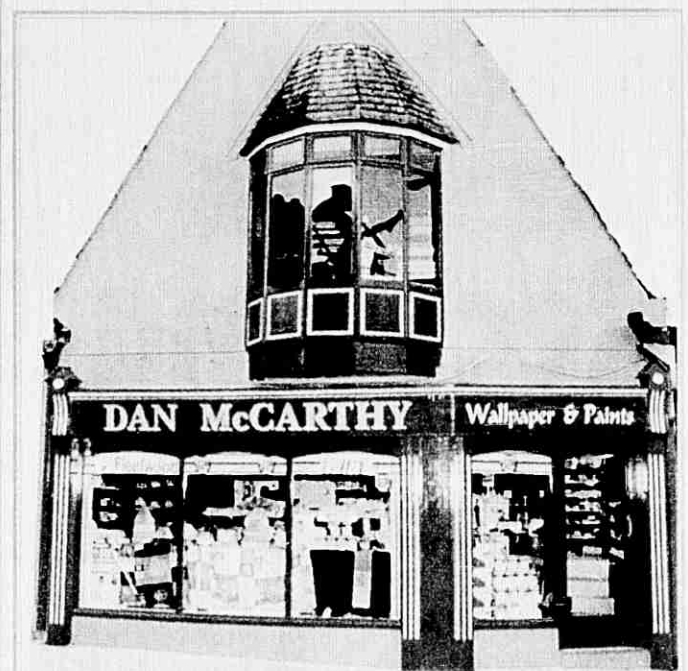
SATURDAY 3RD/ SUNDAY 4TH NOV.

West Waterford Hotels Faring Well Despite Fall In American Tourism

Hotels in West Waterford are getting through the current tourism crisis relatively unscathed despite the September 11th attacks on America, due to good marketing. Clonea Hotel manager and Regional Director Mark Knowles has said.

Mr. Knowles said that because Clonea Hotel is in the three star market they will not be adversely affected. Instead the main businesses that will suffer are four and five star hotels which the American market mainly deals with.

"The only affect on the three star market would be American bus tour groups", he said. "However we take very few of these bookings because they are at the cheapest end of the market and only stay for one or two nights. So the net affect on us would be very slight."

The main drop suffered by Clonea has been advance bookings by internet which has seen a significant reduction.

"The whole of that market though would probably account for three to five percent of overall business", Mr. Knowles said "Whereas in a four or five star hotel you would be talking of anything from 20% to 40%."

Mr. Knowles said that with Irish people less inclined to fly to foreign countries hotel chains in Ireland should make up their losses and possibly even improve on previous years.

"People will go on more domestic short breaks and take more short holidays in Ireland", he said "So instead of going to America for three weeks they will holiday in Ireland for three or four short breaks."

Meanwhile, Mr. Knowles was critical of the Government's decision to retain the taxes gained from the double time businesses paid employees on the National Day of mourning.

"The only people the National Day of mourning affected", he said "were the small businesses and hotels. The Government was

the net beneficiary of the tax off the double time. We lobbied the Tanaiste to donate the taxation created off it and give it to the America fund. But the Government has no intention of doing this."

Overall the Government has netted an estimated £90 million extra in taxes from the Day of Mourning, Mr. Knowles said.

He also did not believe that it would solve anything for the Hotel industry to ask the Government for help in promoting the industry.

"It's up to each individual to get out there and promote

themselves. There's no point in the Government marketing Ireland, it's up to each individual operator to market themselves."

Another Dungarvan hotel has also indicated it's resilience to the September 11th attacks. Lawlors hotel manager Willie Buckley said that while two tours were cancelled in the immediate aftermath of the terrorist attacks they have not been impacted in any other ways since then.

"We've got through these kinds of situations before and the hotel sector survived", Mr. Buckley said.

New Scheme To Rejuvenate Dungarvan's Green Areas

A new scheme was been launched recently in the Park Hotel which will see the planting of woodlands in green areas around Dungarvan and the construction of a new walkway near Fr. Twomey's Road.

The three areas to be involved in the scheme will be the green areas near Springfield, the old Railway track in Abbeyside and the Cuts.

The neighbourhoods scheme aims to improve the

landscape and amenity value of the existing greens for public enjoyment and recreation and to conserve the existing habitats and develop new habitat types.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan has welcomed the initiative which he said will provide "a direct and beneficial effect on the lives of the people of the area. The developed and planted areas will provide a very welcome and worthwhile amenity for everyone."

There have been some concerns however about the plans with fear growing that the woodlands will suffer from vandalism and car tipping.

In order to avoid this it is proposed that a woodland be designed with safety and security considerations in mind and which will see the involvement of the community.

Cllr. O'Riordan said that "traditionally, trees and planting have been a prime target of vandals. I have no doubt that these will be too."

The independent councillor has now appealed to the community near where the trees are due to be planted not to turn a blind eye.

"We must recover our amenity areas from the vandals and drunks and preserve them for the benefit of us all."

The project was funded by the Dept of the Marine and Natural Resources and will be managed by the Tree Council of Ireland.

One concern expressed by Urban Councillor Lar Hart is that there may be health hazards in holding onto the ordinary waste during the recycling week. This will in effect mean that these will be kept for two full weeks.

Instead, Cllr. Hart believes that the council should collect ordinary waste for the four weeks and set aside one week where recyclables are collected as well.

However, the fact that ordinary waste will be stored in wheelie bins, Ms. Horner said, will prevent any prob-

lems being caused on this front.

Meanwhile, Council Cathaoirleach, Councillor Ollie Wilkinson urged householders to make full use of the recycling scheme from the outset rather than adopting a wait and see approach.

"It is vital that all of us liv-

ing in Co. Waterford get behind the project from the start," he said. "All that we are required to do is to take a little time when disposing of waste to decide if it is suitable for recycling - something that can be confirmed by using the at-a-glance card distributed to each house by the Council".

Speech Therapy For Dungarvan's Special School Needs To Be Resumed Says Deputy

Speech and Language Services need to be reintroduced to St. John's School for Children with Special Needs as soon as possible, according to Fine Gael TD Austin Deasy.

The problem arose last month when the South Eastern Health Board announced that due to a shortage of Speech and Language therapists it was to suspend this service at St. John's.

Deputy Deasy said that it is necessary for the Minister for Health to ensure "that a far greater number of Speech and Language Therapists are trained to fill these vacancies".

In response to these points the Minister for Health and Children Michael Martin said the Principal Speech and Language Therapist has met with representatives of the school to discuss this issue and in the meantime a therapist based in the clinic will deal with any queries.

The Board, Minister Martin said, is also actively working

to fill the vacancy which was advertised in the national Sunday papers already on the 23rd of September.

The SEHB has also informed the Dept. of Health, that this service will be resumed once a second Speech and Language Therapist is recruited for the Dungarvan area.

The Department of Health also commissioned a report on the current and future supply of professional therapists.

"The report concludes that a major expansion is essential in the number of therapy professionals over the next fifteen years including a fourfold increase in speech and language therapists," Minister Martin said.

To achieve these greater number of therapists it is recommended that there is an annual increase of 75 course places for speech and language therapy.

The Minister said he is working closely with the Minister for Education and Science to ensure the rapid provision of the additional places as an un-

THE WAY WE LIVE: HISTORY: PACIFIC

AUSTRALIAN SETTLERS

It took nine months for sailing ships to travel from Europe to Australia. That was one of the main reasons why, in 1788, the British government decided to send convicted criminals there. Once in Australia, there was little chance that they would ever return to cause trouble.

But Australia was a vast, exciting country which offered many opportunities, and before long the convict settlers were joined by willing migrants from Europe.

Over 342,000 arrived between 1852 and 1861, some of the peak years for migration. Settlers hoped to make their fortunes as farmers, sheep-ranchers or gold-diggers.



EASTER ISLAND

Some time between AD 1100 and 1450, the people who lived on remote Easter Island carved 600 strange stone heads, almost 10 metres tall.

The statues probably represented ancestors, gods or kings. But because the entire population of Easter Island died out soon after 1500, no one knows for sure!

Historians also do not know why Easter Island became deserted. Possibly, an environmental disaster struck after the inhabitants had cut down all the trees for building and firewood.

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Waterford County Council Recycling Initiative Attracts Unprecedented Cross-party Support

Waterford County Council's ambitious new recycling initiative has attracted ringing endorsements from the Minister for the Environment and Local Government, Noel Dempsey TD; the Fine Gael Spokesperson on Environmental and Consumer Protection, Deirdre Clune TD and the Labour Spokesperson on the Environment and Local Government, Eamon Gilmore TD.

One of the main strands of the recycling and waste reduction drive will see Waterford County Council's refuse collection crews gathering dry recyclable material in clear plastic sacks from households across the county once every four weeks from the beginning of next month. The materials that can be placed in the sacks include cardboard, newspapers, magazines, washed milk and juice cartons, all types of plastic including bottles, drink cans and food tins.

Responding to the initiative, Minister Dempsey said he was delighted to unequivocally endorse the ambitious and innovative recycling programme being undertaken by Waterford County Council.

"This scheme will deliver enormous benefits to the county in return for what will be only minimal efforts in each household. Recycling is one of the key weapons in tackling Ireland's waste mountain and the pay-off is twofold.

"Firstly, it enables valuable materials to be reused – but more importantly, from the public's viewpoint, it reduces the amount of waste which must be ultimately disposed of, thereby extending the life of existing landfill sites," continued Minister Dempsey.

"The type of initiative being promoted by Waterford County Council must be replicated right across the country and similar programmes will be initiated with increasing regularity in the coming months as local authorities implement their waste management plans. It is vital that every man, woman and child in the country makes full use of recycling both now and into the future. To the people of County Waterford, I would say 'the future is literally in your hands'."

Echoing Minister Dempsey's sentiments, Deputy Deirdre Clune congratulated Waterford County Council on the initiative they have shown in developing a process whereby recycling can become a reality for Waterford.

"I believe there is a genuine desire among householders to become involved in recycling and to do their bit for the environment. However, for many, the facilities are simply not available. This means much of our domestic recycling is dependent on the goodwill and voluntary initiative of people who take their waste to a bring centre.

"This ambitious programme will allow householders to address their desire to recycle with a minimum of inconvenience. Ireland has one of the lowest rates of recycling in Europe with only three per cent of our domestic waste segregated for recycling. There is no doubt that Waterford County Council will now increase this rate very significantly in their administrative area.

"I wish Waterford County Council every success with their programme and hope it will provide the spur for other local authorities to follow suit."

Labour's Eamon Gilmore added, "Everybody agrees that recycling has to be a central component in modern waste management. However, for recycling to work, local authorities have to provide the collection service and facilities have to be provided for the actual recycling activity – something that will now happen in County Waterford.

"Following on from that, all of us as householders have to be willing to co-operate in separating our waste and presenting it in a way which is suitable for recycling. The bad old days of putting all our waste in a plastic bag and then dumping it in a landfill site are over. It is time to get serious about recycling."

Welcoming the backing from Minister Dempsey and Deputies Clune and Gilmore for the recycling project, County Manager Donal Connolly expressed the hope that householders would get behind the scheme from the start.

"We are devoting considerable energies to this recycling and waste reduction drive and I would ask those living right across County Waterford to do their bit for the environment by considering whether or not waste in their homes is suitable for recycling under this scheme. If it is, they will simply be required to put it into one of the clear plastic sacks that the Council will subsequently collect on a day that the householder will have been notified of in advance. As a further carrot to encourage people to get involved, households are getting an initial set of these bags free of charge – providing them with an opportunity to save money they would otherwise have spent on wheelie bin tags."

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Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

A Meaty Alternative

A Hungarian goulash dish made at home in your English kitchen.

Cooking time: 1 1/2 to 2 hrs.

Ingredients:

(Serves 3-4)

450g lean beef, lamb or pork, cubed
400g can chopped tomatoes
300ml stock
150ml red wine
1 onion, sliced
2 x 15ml sp tomato puree
1 x 15ml sp paprika
1 x 21/2ml sp caraway seeds

Dumplings:

100g self raising flour
50g beef suet
1 x 21/2ml sp caraway seeds
Salt and black pepper
Water to bind

METHOD:

In a large casserole dish place the meat and sauce ingredients. Season and stir.

Transfer to preheated oven (Gas mark 3,

170°C, 325°F) and cook until the meat is tender.

Meanwhile, make the dumplings. Mix the flour, suet and caraway seeds and season. Add cold water and mix into a soft dough.

Twenty minutes before the end of cooking time, divide the dumpling dough into 4-6 pieces and drop into the casserole. Return to the oven, uncovered for the final 20 minutes.

Serve with mashed potato, sprouts and leeks.

Suitable cuts:

Beef – braising cubes; chuck, blade
– stewing cubes; shin, leg

Lamb – braising cubes; shoulder, leg
Pork – braising cubes; shoulder, leg

Tips:

■ For convenience, dumplings can be bought ready made, frozen or in a packet.

■ All stock can be used instead of red wine.

■ Dried mixed herbs can be substituted for caraway seeds.



Cheesy Topped Vegetables

GIVE plain vegetables an exciting twist by serving them with a tasty cheese sauce.

Ingredients:

(Serves 6)

3 carrots, peeled and sliced
1 cauliflower, divided into florets
225g small broccoli florets
75g frozen peas

FOR THE SAUCE:

40g butter
40g plain flour
450ml semi-skimmed milk
100g half-fat double Gloucester, coarsely grated
2 x 21/2ml sp Dijon mustard
1/4 x 21/2ml sp salt
black pepper

METHOD:

Cook carrots in boiling water for 3 minutes. Add cauliflower, broccoli and peas. Cook for 3-5 minutes, or until vegetables are just tender. Drain well. Put vegetables in large, flame-proof dish, cover and keep warm.

For the sauce, melt the butter in a pan. Add flour and cook, stirring, for 1 minute.

Remove from the heat and gradually stir in the milk. Return to the heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened.

Stir in three-quarters of the cheese, the mustard and the seasoning.

Pour the sauce over the vegetables and stir to coat. Sprinkle over remaining cheese. Grill under a medium heat for five minutes, or until cheese is bubbling. Serve immediately.

Chocolate Angel Torte - It's Simple

Make this impressive cake for a special celebration.

Ingredients:

165g plain flour
25g cornflour
10 egg whites
1/4 x 21/2ml sp cream of tartar
275g caster sugar
2 x 21/2ml sp vanilla essence
175g plain chocolate
200ml soured cream
2 x 21/2ml sp orange juice
225ml double cream
150g low fat natural yogurt
25g plain chocolate curls
8 raspberries

METHOD:

Preheat oven to 180°C/350°F/ Gas Mark 4. Grease and flour a deep, 23cm ring tin. Sift together the flour and cornflour. Whisk the egg whites and cream of

tartar until soft peaks form. Gradually whisk in sugar. Fold in flour mixture and vanilla with a metal spoon. Pour into tin. Stand tin on a baking sheet. Bake for 35-40 mins. Invert tin on to a wire rack. Allow cake to cool in tin. For the filling, break up the chocolate and melt in a heat-proof bowl over a pan of simmering water. Remove from the heat. Stir in soured cream and orange juice. Cool for 10 minutes.

Turn out the cake. Cut into three layers. Sandwich together the layers with filling. Put on a serving plate. For the icing, whip together cream and yogurt until soft peaks form. Spread over cake. Chill for 1 hour. Decorate with chocolate curls and raspberries.

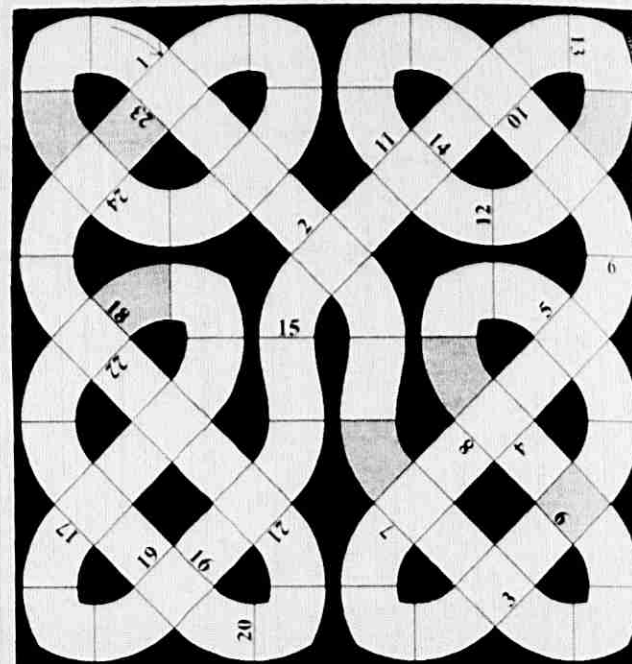

Workers Must Be Involved In Decisions On Future

—LABOUR CLLR.

As the economic impact of the terrorist atrocity of September 11th starts to bite - with several firms throughout Co. Waterford already affected - a Labour Party Councillor has said its as important as ever that employers share information and involve workers in decisions on their future.

Dungarvan area Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair adds that the slow down in our own economic growth towards 5.6

per cent of GNP per year, which was already taking place, can prove manageable. This, said Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, was the growth rate envisaged when the current Programme for Prosperity and Fairness (PPF) was negotiated and was greatly exceeded last year. Our public finances and company profits, according to Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, are sufficiently healthy to allow Government and employers to

honour the general commitments in the PPF.

Expanding on his views of the current situation, Cllr. Céilleachair remarked:

"We cannot, however, pretend that the calamity of September 11 will not impinge on Ireland's economic fortunes, at least in the short term. There is a responsibility to sustain the economy and protect jobs. That

responsibility can only be exercised in

a spirit of genuine partnership at both national level and at the level of individual companies and organisations."

"At company level, workers and their unions should be informed at the earliest possible opportunity about all the implications for their organisation of changes in the economic environment. There must be full consultation and involvement

in policy decisions that will impact on the company and its work force. As the most important stake-holders in the organisation, workers have a vital interest in its welfare."

"Growing economic pressures will test the value of partnership and the level of commitment that employers and Government have to the process. This in turn will have a very big influence on the prospects for partnership in the future.

Workers are looking for evidence that employers are committed to the broader principles of partnership and not just to the relative wage certainty that the process delivers."

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair concluded by saying that we have a much better chance of overcoming the current difficulties by working together rather than by fighting isolated localised battles.

It also allows the full monthly meeting of mem-

bers better scope to consider matters of policy general to local authority and the environment."

"My successful motion on this issue also sought for the Area Committee agenda's to cover matters relating to roads, sewerage, housing and water. This practice has proven to be successful in several counties around the country. I look forward to regular opportunities to sit down with my Dungarvan Electoral Area colleagues to address in greater detail issues we have a keen knowledge of."

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair concluded by saying he was committed to the Labour Party's policy of putting forward initiatives aimed at widening and deepening local democracy.

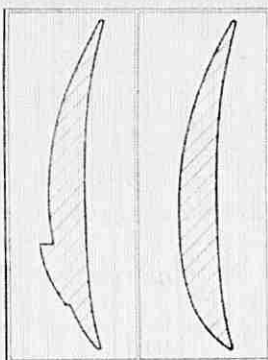

Section through a varifocal lens showing the prescriptions blended subtly without division.



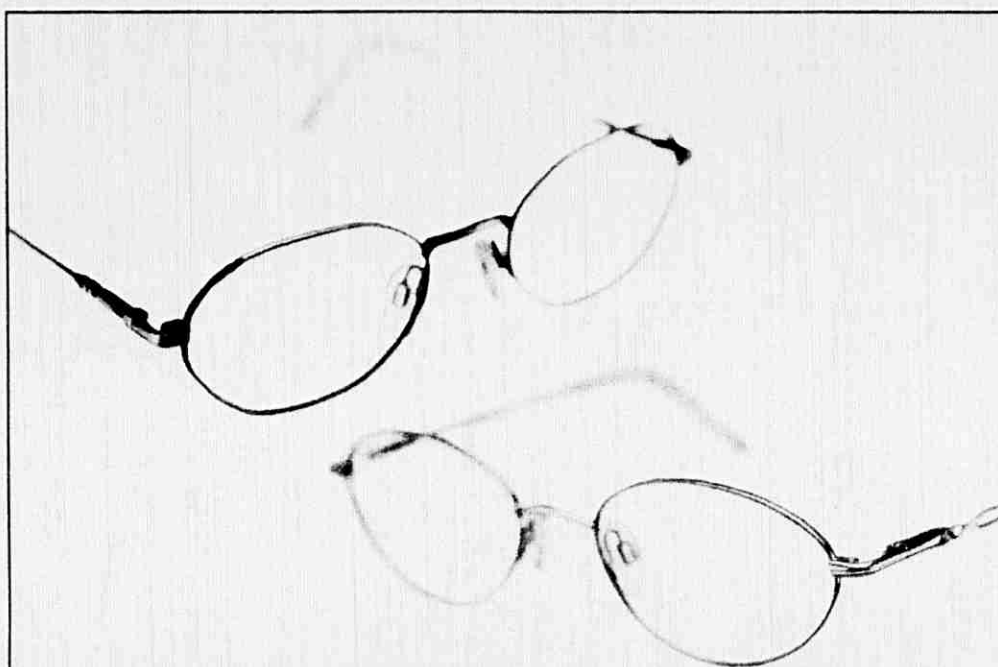

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

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YOU grow vegetables to harvest and eat. Flowers add colour and fragrance to your garden. But herbs – they can do both.

Not surprisingly herb gardening is going through a revival after years of neglect.

A century ago every well-equipped kitchen garden would be stocked with parsley, mint, basil, rosemary and thyme.

The advent of processed food

and gardening for pleasure rather than to feed the family changed all that.

But thankfully our tastes have turned full circle and herbs are once again appearing in the gardens of Britain – often for ornamental effect, but in many cases to add fresh flavour to the household cooking.

Herbs can be grown in traditional formal beds, in containers – or even left to ramble in informal borders.

An ideal location is beside a patio, where herbs such as sage, thyme, lavender and rosemary will spread across the edge of the slabs, giving off a wonderful aroma when you sit out on a warm summer evening.

Most are fairly prolific and, if left unchecked, are likely to ramble out of control.

Mint in particular is often planted in a container to stop it spreading – the container

may then be buried in a border.

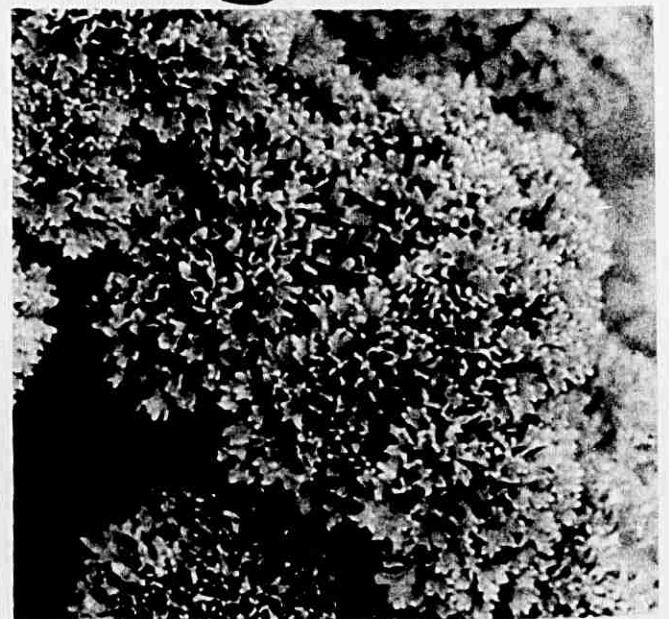
May and June are an ideal time to buy ready-grown herbs from a garden centre, as they are at their best and most aromatic over the following couple of months.

Before planting out they should be placed in the shade and well watered – although you must avoid splashing the foliage.

In containers they must have good drainage, so use a loam-based compost mixed with plenty of grit and line the base with old crocks.

Herbs must be regularly watered – in containers that can mean twice a day during the summer, more often if the weather is really hot.

New plants should be allowed to establish for a fortnight before harvesting – and even then you should be careful not to overpick.

Herbs: A Brief Guide

Basil – the herb of Mediterranean holiday memories, used in pizzas and pesto sauces and scattered on tomato and mozzarella salads.

Basil is a short-lived perennial which should be planted out in June or July – after risk of frost or cold spells is over. It must not be allowed to go through the night with damp foliage or wet compost.

Thyme – comes in upright and creeping forms and provides aromatic leaves ideal for bouquet garni, stuffings, in salads or to flavour oils

and vinegar.

It is an evergreen mini-shrub with small, round leaves and clusters of tiny white, mauve or pink flowers which can also be used in cooking. Grow in full sun in well-drained soil and cut it back after flowering.

Lemon verbena – ideal for use in pot pourri or to add flavour to tea. This herb is lemon-scented and has clusters of small, white and purple flowers – with long leaves containing a lemon flavour.

It can also be used to flavour oils and vinegars and scatter on salads as well as on fruit

salads and desserts. It should be grown in a container so it can be taken in during the winter.

Parsley – a must for every herb garden, a strong-growing plant with dark green, curled foliage ideal for marinades and for all types of cooking – especially fish.

Oregano – A bushy, perennial plant that grows up to 50cm tall with oval leaves which attract butterflies. Can prove difficult to grow away from full sun, but ideal for flavouring meat dishes, pizzas and omelettes.

COVER ALPINES WITH GLASS

Some alpine plants suffer in the winter because of the excess water in the air. The water works its way into the leaves and makes them rot. To protect from rain keep them covered

by sheets of glass kept aloft with sticks or bent wire but leave the sides of the shelter open as air circulation is essential.

DIG UP EARLY CHRYSANTHEMUMS

Border chrysanthemums are quite hardy during the winter, but

they can rot and die.

To avoid losing them take a couple of examples of each variety and pack them in a box with some light soil, cut off the stems 5-8cm above soil level and leave in a greenhouse.

Waterford Institute of Technology wins the right to award its own National Certificates and National Diplomas

The Higher Education and Training Awards Council (HETAC) has granted Waterford Institute of Technology (WIT) the authority to award its own National Certificates and National Diplomas – marking a significant new phase in higher education in the south east region.

HETAC is the qualifications awarding body for third-level educational and training institutions outside the university sector and was formally established in June of this year as the legal successor to the National Council for Educational Awards (NCEA). The delegation of powers to WIT results from a process that began in 1998 with the establishment of an Interim Review Group by the Minister for Education and Science.

Speaking during a visit to the WIT campus where the official order was signed on Monday evening, the Chairperson of HETAC, Professor Ciaran Murphy congratulated the Institute on what he described as a landmark achievement. "This is an exciting development and the Council is pleased to be devolving authority to the Institute in respect of both National Certificates and National Diplomas in a move which acknowledges that WIT has been maturing in its academic achievements over the past 30 years.

"The establishment of HETAC earlier this year marked a new phase and a new challenge. The challenge for us is to maintain and develop the standard,

quality and integrity of our higher education system. In relation to WIT, I would commend the Institute for its substantial contribution to Irish higher education in general and to its region and local community in particular. Indeed, it was fitting that this was the first Institute of Technology to which these additional powers were delegated.

"HETAC sees this delegation of authority as an important step in the evolutionary process – recognising as it does the need for third level institutions to take ownership of quality assurance. It also remains vital that they achieve and maintain the highest academic standards going forward with the Council reviewing performance on a regular basis.

"I expect that it will not be long before Waterford Institute of Technology applies for and – subject to meeting the relevant criteria – receives degree-awarding status. While congratulations are due to all those who have worked to make this day possible, this is just the beginning and I haven't the slightest doubt that WIT will continue to challenge HETAC with its ideas and proposals."

According to WIT Director, Dr Kieran Byrne, the agreement reached with HETAC represents another milestone in the Institute's ongoing development. "We are obviously pleased to have won the entitlement to award National Certificates and National Diplomas in our own right

for existing HETAC-approved programmes. It is another step forward for this Institute and is welcome news for the wider community in the region that we serve. I can also confirm that we will be moving forward swiftly with our application for authority to award our own degrees. We are happy to take additional accountability along with the extra responsibility.

"One of our key goals at WIT is very much in line with a HETAC aspiration as the Council is keen to contribute to national economic prosperity by ensuring the supply of people with the right qualifications at the right time. This supply-demand match is obviously going to become even more important in the years ahead and WIT is very well placed to work in partnership with outside bodies to ensure we meet their requirements.

"It is particularly pleasing that the awards made to 62% of the graduates being conferred at WIT on Thursday and Friday next (October 18-19) will be the first in the State to be made under delegated authority," concluded Dr Byrne.

Noel Richards, Chairperson of the Institute's Governing Body and Institute Registrar, PJ Downey, accompanied the Institute Director at the order signing ceremony which was also attended by many of the Institute's senior academics. Chairperson, Professor Ciaran Murphy as well as Chief Executive Séamus Puirseil represented HETAC.

LATE PATRICK J. CUMMINS



Wednesday, October 10th was drawing to a close when we learned with shock, disbelief and great profound sadness of the unexpected passing at his residence of Paddy Cummins, Grange House, Dungarvan who was very well known and held in high esteem. Son of Mary and the late James (1980) Paddy was one of a family of ten (3 boys, 7 girls). Educated at Tullogher N.S., Co. Kilkenny, he continued his secondary education at the Carmelite College, Castle-martyr. A top drawer leaving certificate saw Paddy embark on a University Cork College Cork dairy science course. He graduated with outstanding results which saw him take up a position with Dungarvan Creamery or Waterford Co. Op. For the next thirty five years, Paddy gave of his best and won admirable praise for his vision, professionalism and dili-

gence to his most responsible duties. Over those three decades Paddy became one of the most foremost marketers in the South East of Ireland. He led the launch of Yoplait and brought the agri industry from product commodity driven to branding and consumer products thus increasing profitability. He was a valuable jewel in the crown of the Co-op, Yoplait is still by far the number one selling yogurt in this country. He was also deeply involved in Yop and Petit Filous, Kilmeaden Fillet of Cheddar and as head of the dairy trading division for a period he launched the Gain Animals Feed brand logo design which was another of Paddy's many talents.

He played a major role in the development of the Waterford Co-op logo and Waterford Foods logo. Paddy had reached the position of deputy chief executive under Stephen O'Connor and later Matt Walsh before his eventual retirement in 1999. Much of Paddy's work would also see him overseas. What a wonderful ambassador he proved to be. His jovial disposition and outgoing personality made him a great favourite. He was a great friend to the very many who called and wrote for sponsorships. The work completed at Waterford Foods by Paddy Cummins was much admired and will always be spoken of in glowing terms. His dedication often way beyond the call of duty saw Paddy Cummins play a pivot role in the commercial life of our town. We are most grateful and

deeply appreciative for his untiring efforts.

A native of Tullogher, Co. Kilkenny aged 59 years, Paddy being a true 'black and amber' man loved his hurling and enjoyed no small success himself on the field of play.

He was a former player, chairman, trustee and one of the founder members of Dungarvan Rugby club. As a fundraiser he had few equals, his organisational skills saw him greatly assist with the construction of the new grounds and pavilion at Ballyrandle, how fitting, therefore that a club jersey was placed on Paddy's coffin in tribute. He was an avid reader, who loved history and poetry. He was an expert on fine wines and a meal was not complete without a cheese board selection at the end of it, as he introduced friends and acquaintances to the latest cheese.

The untimely departure of Paddy Cummins from the stage of life has left us all the poorer, life simply won't be the same. The best of company and a wonderful conversationalist, Paddy could turn his mind to many subjects and discuss same with authority. Solid counsel when given by Paddy was always listened to as he was a man of substance. Married to Miriam (nee Power) and brother-in-law to Eleanor Power, father to David, Morgan, Amanda and Leahanne we offer our deepest sympathies to all at this difficult time. We also remember in our thoughts and prayers and extend our condolences to the Cummins family in Tullogher, mother Mary, his brothers James and John, sisters Margaret, Alice, Mary, Eileen, Breda, Theresa and Carmel and other relatives which include brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, nephews, nieces and many friends, all are bereaved by the demise of Paddy.

Reposing at the family residence on Thursday and Friday until midday on Saturday, Paddy's remains were transferred to the Kiely Funeral Home in Shandon. Later that evening Fr. O'Riordan C.C. was joined by a huge concourse of mourners in prayers and rosary. The funeral cortege travelled via O'Connell Street pausing at Stephen St. where Paddy and Miriam first resided and at Ger Wyley's which in former times was the location of the well known Power family Garage. CONCENTRATE AND FERTILISER USAGE

- Two out of three Monitor Farmers fed concentrates during September. The average concentrate feeding level during September was 35 kg, this works out at 1 kg per cow per day.
- On average 438 kg concentrates have been fed per cow to the end of September (range 251 - 561 kg). This works out at a cost of £67 per cow (range £35 - 92 per cow) or 1.45 pence per litre (6.6 pence per gallon).
- On average 15 kg N per Ha was spread during September and 234 kg N per Ha has been spread to the end of September. Total fertiliser cost to the end of September is, on average, £131/ha or 1.35 pence per litre (6.1 pence per gallon).

WINTER FEEDING

A daily live-weight gain of about 1.0 kg is considered excellent on silage based diets, with finishing steers over a 130 - 150 day finishing period. It is difficult to get much of this level of gain apart from short periods of about 80 days, even where supplementation with concentrates is high. High quality silage of 72% to 75% DMD will give this level performance with about 4.0 kg concentrates per day. Each 3 units drop in DMD requires an extra 1.0kg concentrates per day. At current prices of £14 per tonne for silage and £130 per tonne for concentrates a saving in feed costs of about £25 per animal finished over a 140 day period, is possible with silage of 75% DMD rather than silage of 65% DMD.

RESPONSE TO MEAL

Using silage as the basic diet the response to supplementary concentrates declines as the quantity of concentrate fed is increased, as silage intake and quality improves, and as the level of finish (fat cover) increases. Also, bulls give a better response than steers which in turn give somewhat better response than heifers. As the quantity of meal fed is raised, the animals eat less silage but total feed intake increases up to a point. At about 3kg meal per day, 1/3 of a kilo of silage dry matter is saved per kg of meal fed, at 7 kg meal per day about 2/3 of a kilo of silage dry matter is saved per kg of meal fed. At a current meal price of £130 per tonne and an expected beef price of 210p/kg (95p/lb) a supplementation level of up to 7 kg/day is justified for finishing steers.

World Trade Decisions Will Affect the Future of Irish Agriculture

BACKGROUND

Recently the Chairmen of all IFA's County Executives spent a few days in Geneva, where the Headquarters of the World Trade Organisation (WTO) is located, in order to get an understanding of the potential importance of the WTO negotiations for the future of Irish agriculture. I found this very worthwhile and it brought home to me that many of the decisions which will affect our futures as farmers will be made on the world stage and not just within the EU.

We had meetings with the Director-General of the WTO, Mike Moore, a New Zealander, and with leading negotiators for the three most powerful players in the WTO, which are the US, the European Union, and the Cairns Group. This is a group of 18 agricultural exporting countries, including Australia, New Zealand, Canada, and a number of South American and Asian countries.

IMPACT OF LAST TRADE AGREEMENT

The previous world trade round was agreed in 1993, which for the first time brought agricultural trade fully within the rules of the WTO. Two Irish men played leading roles at that time. Peter Sutherland was the Director-General, and of course Ray Mac Sharry as EU Commissioner for Agriculture led the EU negotiations. The terms of that agreement were phased-in between 1995 and 2001.

The outcome was that the EU

agreed to reduce its protection and support for agriculture under three headings: import tariffs reduced by 36%; internal supports reduced by 20%; export subsidies reduced in volume by 21% and in budget terms by 36%. However an important achievement by the EU was that the CAP reform Direct Payments were granted a special status known as "blue box" which exempted them from WTO cuts.

There is a close interlinkage between decisions taken in the WTO and CAP Reform. The 1992 CAP reform was in preparation for the last trade round. The 1999 reform of CAP agreed at Berlin anticipated to some extent the next WTO round. But depending on how much the EU concedes, or is forced to concede in the upcoming negotiations, we may be faced with further CAP reform in the next few years.

IFA CONCERNS

A major concern for all EU farmers is that reducing protection and support for agriculture makes farmers more exposed to market forces, at a time when other forces within EU society are demanding that agriculture must become more responsive to environment, food traceability and animal welfare demands.

Also, the maintenance of the family farm structure and the viable rural economy and society is a stated objective of governments in many EU countries, but clearly this depends on farming being profitable in the first instance.

The policy position of IFA is that the EU should negotiate in the WTO only within the parameters of the CAP reform II decisions agreed in Berlin.

Irish agriculture is particularly vulnerable to future WTO cuts because of our dependence on both export refunds to support the market and direct payments to support farmers' incomes. It is clear that the EU negotiators are giving their highest priority to the protection of the CAP direct payments system. However, support for the retention of

export refunds has weakened around the Council of Ministers table since the last GATT round. The Irish Government needs to

lobby hard in Europe to build support for the retention of a reasonable level of refunds for beef and dairy products.

BOVINE TB AND BRUCellosis ERADICATION SCHEMES 2001/2002 HARDSHIP GRANT

1. The 2001/2002 Hardship Grant eligibility period will commence on 1 November 2001. It is designed to alleviate the costs difficulty of some herd owners whose holdings are restricted on foot of a herd re-test and where animals are retained and fed during periods of restriction. Potentially eligible herd owners must meet certain conditions including requirements that they (i) must not have any income from milk sales, and (ii) must not have any off farm income. The Grant may provide eligible herd owners with a payment of up to £200 (€253.95) per month for a period not exceeding 4 months within the period 1 November 2001 to 30 April, 2002.
2. The specific eligibility criteria attaching to the Hardship Grant are outlined in the terms and conditions document which will accompany the application form ER 97. Potentially eligible herd owners will be issued with the terms and conditions document, important notice and application form ER 97 by the District Veterinary Office. Supplies of the relevant documentation will also be available at District Veterinary Offices.
3. The onus is on potentially eligible herd owners whose holdings are or may be restricted at a re-test at 1 November, 2001 or during the period 1 November, 2001 to 30 April, 2002 to ensure that they obtain and familiarise themselves with the terms and conditions document and application form ER 97.


The onus is on the herd owner to apply for a Hardship Grant.

But he's a hard thief with a mad mind for women breaking out through him like a tether with no cure for it. What matter if he is as grey as a goat. There is many a young man after a year of marriage losing his heart for the lovmaking. This man have the temper, he would swim the Shannon for a young wife. He would spoil her. I tell you, there is good reward for all concerned in it.

This is to be a commercial transaction. Many matchmakers were not motivated by avarice; Thomasheen Sean Rua is. He offers Mena, Sive's cold hearted aunt '200 sovereigns for you if the girl will consent'. Like all those of low principles,

she is quick to be suspicious. No doubt some young women and men, like the unfortunate Sive were at times treated harshly, when economic interests out weighed any consideration of compatibility - for example in age - never mind romance.

On the other hand, made matches were often the only way that people past the first flush of youth could be put in touch with a suitable partner. The shy bachelor from the remote hilly farm who waited until he was forty five and the death of his mother had made space for another woman in the house.

John B. Keane's classic play "Sive" comes to life on the Lismore stage from the 8th to the 11th November. The play is produced by James Lehane who also plays the gentleman tinker, Pat Bocoek. It's difficult in the extreme to pen a tribute that would be adequate and fitting to Paddy Cummins, whose untimely and unexpected death two weeks ago shocked, stunned and deeply saddened the entire local community.

Although he was a native son of Tullogher, Co. Kilkenny, Paddy lived most of his adult life in Dungarvan, having been appointed to a key post at the then Waterford Foods in the early 1960's. He fell in love with, and subsequently married, Miriam Power who is a member of an esteemed local family, and their marriage was blessed with four children of which they were justifiably very proud. Two sons David and Morgan, and two daughters, Amanda and Leahanne will doubtless continue the legacy of their illustrious Dad.



Paddy Cummins was a man made to measure individual as far as company management was concerned. Waterford Co-Op and subsequently Waterford Foods provided him with the ideal platform from which to display his vast array of managerial skills, and it was no surprise at all that he steadily climbed the managerial ladder until eventually he assumed the key role of deputy chief executive of Waterford Foods before its eventual merger with neighbours, Avonmore, to form a new dairy co-op giant in Glanbia.

His input into the development of Waterford Foods can be summarised in one simplistic, yet telling, word: Immense. He headed up the consumer division as its general manager and he was the one to pioneer the launch of Yoplait in Ireland and to quickly establish it as the country's brand leader.

The one-time threat to the future of Kilmeaden cheese factory was eliminated as Paddy utilised his managerial skills to successfully promote both nationally and internationally the Kilmeaden fillet of cheddar, and, of course as head of the trading division he was the one primarily responsible for the launch of the GAIN feeds logo.

For me, personally, however, the most abiding memories will be of Paddy Cummins the man. A true and sincere friend, an individual whose company it was more of a privilege than a pleasure to share. He was an impeccable husband and father, and it is impossible to know the hurt his family are now feeling at the loss of one who meant so much to them.

For nigh on four decades I had befriended Paddy Cummins, and at first hand could evaluate everything and anything about the man. His breed are a rare commodity, and not only has his wife and family been left to carry a great loss but the entire community will find difficulty for a long time in coming to terms with his tragically sudden passing.

Paddy Cummins' legacy is, however, a rich one and I have no doubt the host of delightful memories he has left behind will defy the passage of time. To those nearest and dearest to him the column extends its heartfelt sympathy on their incalculable loss.

Letter To The Editor

RESIDENTS' CONCERN OVER MAST

Dear Editor,

We would like to express our concerns about the proposed erection of a mobile communications mast, Planning Ref. No. 01/577, at Carrigmoorna, Leamybrien, by Meteor Mobile Communications, through the medium of your newspaper. Our objections are as follows:

1 The proposed development is in an area of high scenic amenity along the route of the Comeragh Drive. This area has been cited in the County Waterford Development Plan as an area of

natural beauty, the preservation and improvement of which is seen as necessary for the successful and sustainable economic, social and tourist development of the county. Surely the erection of the proposed mast would be contrary to this objective, as it would pose a serious threat to the tourist economy of the region, so well supported by all local agencies, both public and private sector. Once in place we feel the mast would cause a serious visual intrusion on the immediate and surrounding landscape.

2 In light of the fact that a mast is already located within a short distance of the proposed location, on even higher ground at Crohaun, we would query the need for a second mast in this area. Would it not make better sense to co-locate?

3 As yet no definitive scientific evidence exists to indicate whether microwave radiation poses a serious risk to public health or not. In view of this we would reserve judgment until such evidence does exist and as such regard claims that our objec-

tions are absurd as irresponsible.

We would urge anyone who shares our concerns to put them in writing and lodge it with the Planning Department at the Civic Offices in Dungarvan as soon as possible, and attend a public meeting in St. Brigid's Hall, Kilrossanty on Monday night 22nd October at 8.30 pm.

FRIARY GRAVEYARD AGAIN DESECRATED

An appeal for the burial grounds which surround the Franciscan Friary in Carrick-On-Suir overtaken by large numbers of youths every weekend, to be added to the list of areas included in the by-laws introduced to curb public drinking in the town has been made. At the weekend Masses celebrated at the Friary in Carrickbeg, the upset friars spoke of the continued desecration of the graveyard, after cleaning up vomit from the church door and

the collecting of whiskey bottles, beer and cider cans and many other containers from the church grounds. Cllr. Liam O'Dwyer has this week called on the Urban Council to include the graveyard in the areas listed under the by law introduced to eliminate public drinking in the town.

The Friars are he said at breaking point, they are close to tears about the whole thing and who can blame them. The people of the town with rela-

tives buried there just cannot take it any longer.

This community should not have to tolerate such loutish, mindless and outrageous behaviour he said. An inspection of the sacred burial grounds after Mass Cllr. O'Dwyer said he found a number of graves disrupted, flower pots broken and scattered around the place and the surface gravel on the graves kicked around. The Friars are taking an awful grueling at the moment. This is

going on for months and months.

Up to twenty youths gather there every night at the weekends to drink. They have no respect for the dead. What do their parents do when they see and hear them coming in at four in the morning in such a condition? asked Cllr. O'Dwyer. This he said has to be stopped now, the Friars and the public cannot put up with it any longer. Members agreed to hold a meeting with the Gardai.

A SETBACK TO HOSPITAL OVERCROWDING

South Eastern Health Board plans to resolve the overcrowding crisis at Saint Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel, received a set back on Monday 22nd October when nursing staff rejected a proposal for the use of a section of Saint Anthony's ward on a temporary basis. By 17 votes 2 nursing staff at Saint Anthony's rejected the SEHB plan to use part of that long stay geriatric ward as a temporary acute medical unit from the 12th November.

The SEHB had hoped nurses would have given the green light to the proposal which was seen as a means of addressing the overcrowding crisis at Saint Joseph's Hospital where a recent eleven day work to rule by nurses was suspended on condition that beds did not return to the corridors at the hospital. This is now a huge setback to the whole process and now the membership will have to consider all the options open to them said Don Culliton INO spokesman.

It is now understood from a source close to the nursing staff at Saint Anthony's that a contributory factor to the vote may have been what was seen as an attempt by management to send an acute care medical patient directly from Saint Joseph's to Saint Anthony's prior to agreement being reached.

The vote against the proposal increases the possibility of further industrial action by nurses with the proposed solution to the overcrowding problem yet to be implemented.

Teagasc Concern Over Milk Production Trends

A Teagasc dairy expert has warned about the likelihood of milk payment schemes being introduced in order to encourage increased production in the early and later months of the year. These payment schemes could involve a reduced milk price in the peak production months of May and June.

Speaking at the Teagasc/Connacht Gold Dairy Conference in Ballina, Dermot McCarthy, Chief Dairy Adviser with Teagasc, said the use by dairy farmers of Teagasc grass production technology to extremes combined with emphasis on labour efficiency has led to a big increase in peak milk production in May and June, resulting in milk processing capacity being pushed to the limit.

"The new trend involves a big reduction in the milking period of spring calving herds. A growing number of

dairy farmers are milking cows from March to October - a lactation period of 240 days compared with the traditional lactation of 280 - 300 days".

"The introduction of bonus payments for milk produced in February/March and October/November could boost milk prices and profitability for dairy herds with lactations of around 280 days", he said.

The Teagasc blueprint for profitable milk production, developed by researchers at Moorepark, involves a lactation of 280 days plus and maximising output from grass. Some farmers are calving cows too late in spring and drying off too early in autumn. This results in farmers having too many cows in order to fill their milk quota.

"A reduction in cow numbers, longer lactations and a reduction in peak milk supply is in the best long-term

interests of dairy farmers and the dairy industry", said Dermot McCarthy.

Dermot McCarthy also urged milk producers in western counties to purchase or lease as much milk quota as possible over the coming years.

"Substantial quantities of quota will become available to western farmers and, with the reduced prices, purchased quota can be repaid over three years. While the level of quota available to dairy farmers in the rest of the country will be substantially less, the amounts will increase in 2002 when the needs of priority farmers have been met", he said.

"Any dairy farmer with a quota of 30,000 gallons or more has the capacity to generate a reasonable income for the future, provided development and expansion opportunities are grasped as they arise", he said.

Post Offices Awarded ESB Bill Payment Facilities

The ESB has announced that from March 2001, its 1.6 million customers will be able to pay their bills at the 1900 post offices throughout the country. The ESB has also awarded the bill payment contract to the PayPoint network, which will initially offer the facility in 100 outlets around the country.

The Minister for Public Enterprise, Mary O'Rourke TD, today welcomed the announcement by the ESB. She said "This announcement is a crucial vote of confidence in the post office network. It is vital that communities support the bill payment facilities now available in the post office network nationwide."

"The ESB contract widens the already extensive range of bill payments which can be made over post office counters", the Minister stated.

The Minister added that she was "satisfied that the ESB contract represents just the latest in a list of new business areas moving to the post offices nationally. The Government will do its part to ensure that public services are easily accessible at these post offices".

Local History

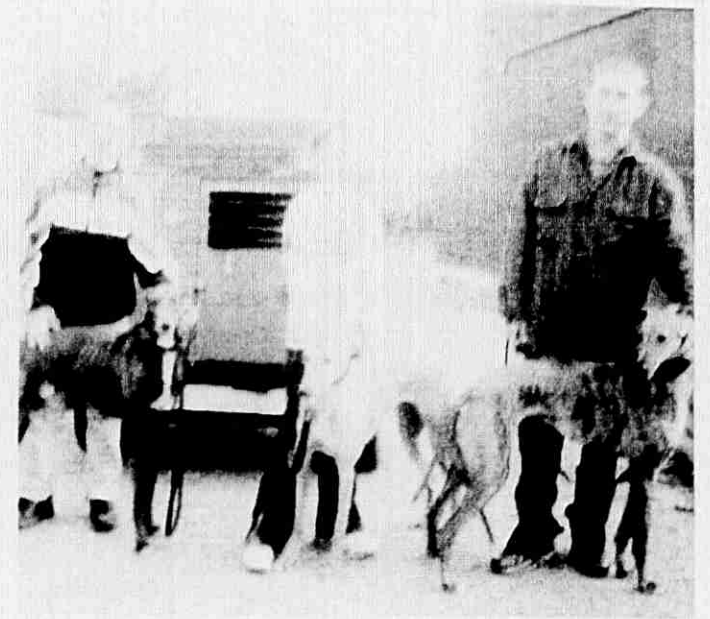
There was no Vicar in Ring until 1615 and neither was there one in Whitechurch until 1591 when Randal Clayton was appointed, who was also Vicar of Dungarvan. In Lisgenan in 1615 Richard Browne was vicar but there had been no vicar there in 1591. In Ballymacart there was no vicar in any of these years but in Colligan the incumbent was Nicholas Kellihin. In Kilgobnet there was no cleric in 1588 and 1591 and Clonea, Dungarvan, had no cleric after one Thomas Baker died.

PROTESTANT CLERICS

It should be stated that these appointments were of Protestant clerics. However, the line was sometimes very thin between a cleric who might sometimes act as a Catholic priest and at other times a Protestant.

For example, in 1591 Daniel McGrath a layman and local magnate at Mountain Castle, Modeligo, was rector but there is no name given for the man who acted as vicar. Almost certainly he was a Catholic priest. He was described as being "contumacious", that is, wilfully disobedient to the law.

It is now obvious that there is not the same interest as before in this tournament and this is another 'fall-out' from all the changes that have taken place on the intercounty scene.

Clare originally were to come here but then decided that they could not field a team, so Limerick obliged. Then Limerick found that they were too far behind with their club championships and that they could not travel, and Clare came back to replace them. The game should be interesting and enjoyable if the weather holds up.



Substitution Rules

In a number of matches this year extra time had to be played after normal time failed to decide the outcome of a game.

In a couple of cases, the number of substitutes allowed for extra time gave rise to arguments and it was amazing how many different opinions were voiced in this matter.

The rule is very specific in the matter and states as follows: Rule 2.4 (i): A maximum of 5 substitutions shall be allowed. A substitution is not allowed in the case of a player sent off;

(ii) For extra time, a further three (3) substitutions shall be

allowed.

A player ordered off, in any circumstances, during a drawn game, may not play in extra time but may be replaced.

Special Congress For Rule 21

Another effort is to be made to abolish Rule 21 which forbids members of the RUC from joining the GAA, and Central Council at their meeting on Saturday, decided that the time is right for the holding of a Special Congress to have the matter debated.

All counties will now meet to discuss the issue and will send a full delegation to Dublin on Saturday, November 17th to debate the issue and vote.

It is known that there is a clear change of attitude to the rule since the special Congress two years ago, turned down a motion from the then president, Joe McDonagh, to have the rule abolished.

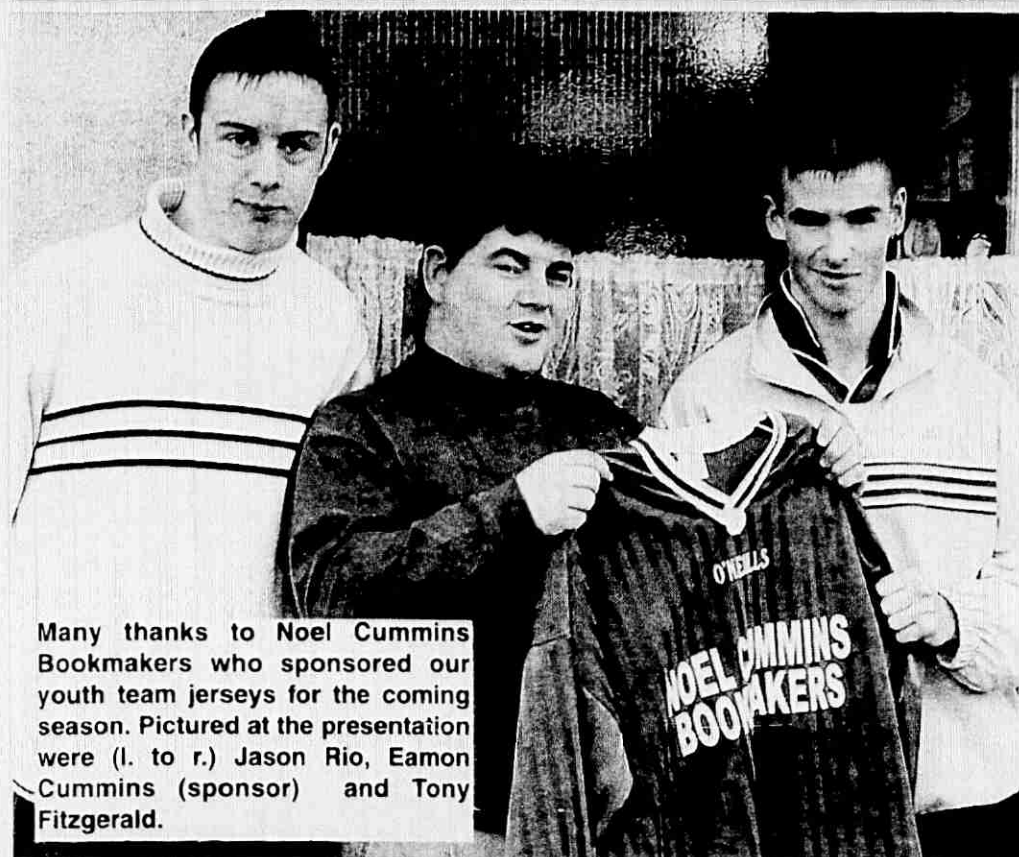

You don't have to travel to the top sporting facilities in the country, get all wired up and start pounding the treadmill nor do you have to eat two raw eggs and start running up the steps of the nearest cathedral. What do you do? Check and see if there is fluff in your bellybutton! Yes, it's as simple as that, if fluff has found a safe haven in your bellybutton, unlikely to ever be discovered and dislodged, then it's time to start running folks. Consistent running at a controlled and sociable pace is still the best way to lose weight and to get fit!

The 9th Annual Allrounder Sports Shop sponsored West Waterford A.C. Winter Road Running League will commence at the Dungarvan Crystal Sports Centre on Wednesday, November 7th at 7.30 p.m. (entries from 6.45 p.m.) and it

will continue every Wednesday until the end of February when the presentation of prizes will be made during the legendary end of league Mystery Tour night out.

From a modest entry back in 1993 to a record 171 runners last year, the organisers are bracing themselves for an onslaught of runners, cars, pounds and euros this winter while on a serious note the club is very conscious of the safety measures that will have to be applied, with so many runners moving around the outskirts of the town on dark winter nights.

LEAGUE SYSTEM

The Winter League is run on a system that gives every participant, irrelevant of standard of fitness an equal opportunity of overall success. Following a mass start on stage one, runners start the run each night at different intervals depending on their best finishing time from any stage during the league. The slowest runner starts the run first and the fastest runner is the last to begin. The challenge for the faster runner is to catch all ahead of him or her. Lowest points totals are best and anyone who missed any of the fifteen stage nights collects a penalty points total of the amount of runners present on that particular night plus one. The league is divid-

ed into the required amount of division in the new year to maintain everyone's interest right throughout.

The competition is not too serious with a good element of fun and controversy (hopefully) involved. The league over the years has not been won by more than one or two of the household names of Waterford athletics (sorry lads, just getting the idea of the league across). Previous winners were:

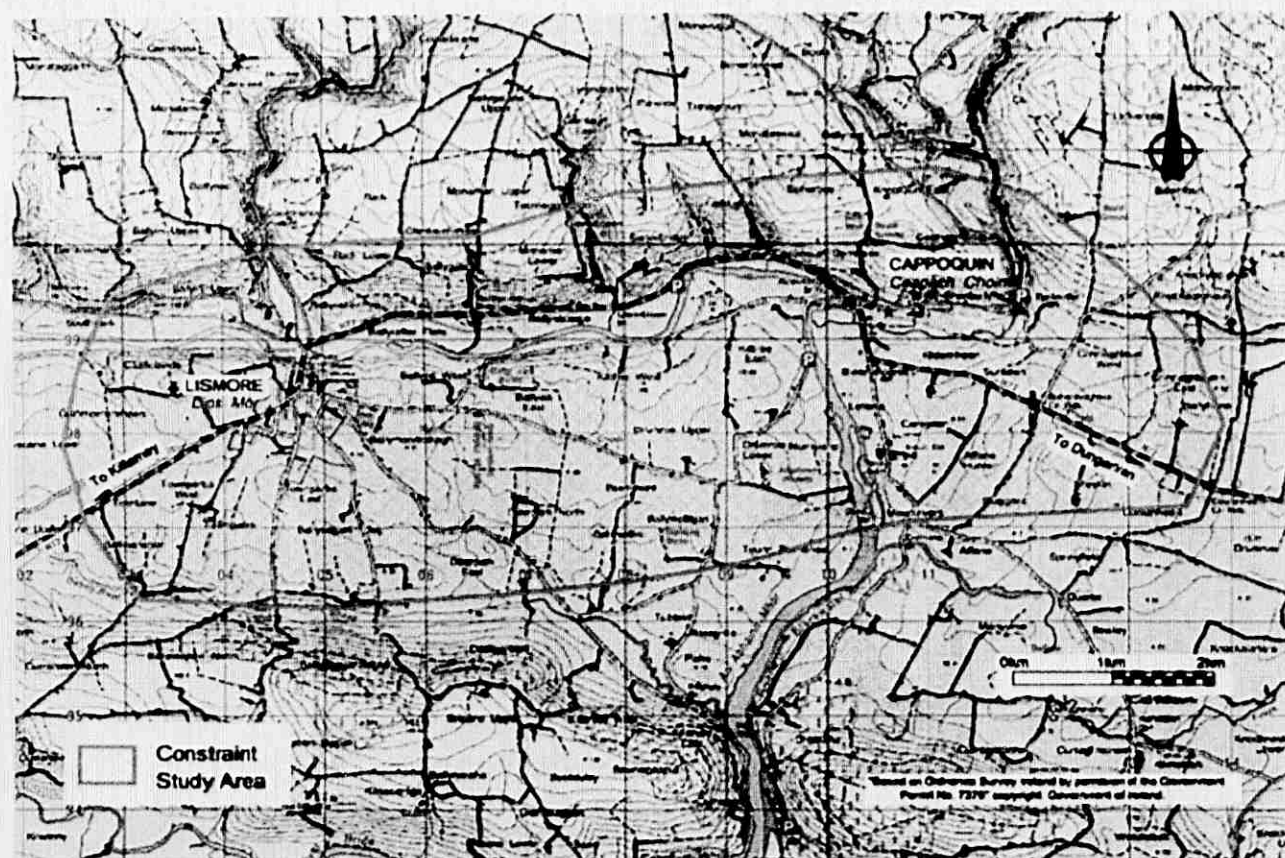

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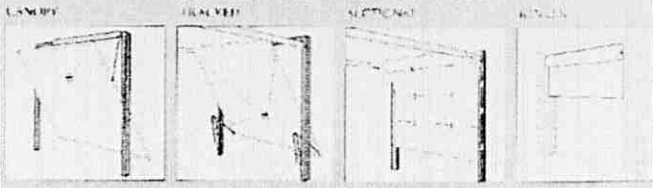
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
