Construction On Lismore Community School To Begin In Two Weeks

After years of delays, frustration and in some cases opposition to the project a date for the start of construction on a new community school in Lismore has finally been set for two weeks time.

In what has been hailed as huge educational development for the town the new £4.81 million school will see the amalgamation of CBS Lismore, Presentation Convent Lismore and St. Anne's in Cappoquin.

The Community School, itself, will be located on the site of the present CBS Lismore and will cater for 650 students and will be staffed by sixty teachers in a project to be constructed by McInerney Construction.

The first phase of the project will see the demolition of the Christian Brothers Primary School which has been unused since the CBS and Presentation primary schools amalgamated some time ago.

The Christian Brothers secondary school will also be eventually demolished to make way for what will eventually be a state of the art 3,481 square metre building. However while it was previously hoped that construction would be completed in time for the start of next years school year it now looks likely that the building won't be completed until

The Community Centre was first mooted 16 years ago but funding was not available at that time. Opposition was also raised to the project from some Cappoquin parents over the loss of secondary school status for the town.

Anthrax Alert Grips

An anthrax scare gripped Kil macthomas for most of Monday morning as a suspicious substance was discovered in the post office by one of the employees.

A white powdery substance was noticed in the post box by the employee at a quarter past six as she sorted through the post for delivery and she quickly alerted the

Gardai and fire services. The powder, itself, was later discovered to have been separate from the letters. which led Gardai to suspect tests and screening.

it had been poured through the box between Saturday afternoon and Sunday night.

The substance has not yet been formally identified, although anthrax - which had initially been feared - was quickly ruled out by health officials who were on the scene.

All safety measures had been carried out, however, to prevent any possible risk occurring and the employee who discovered the substance was brought to Waterford Regional Hospital for

Emergency services suspected the chances of the substance being anthrax was slight but said they were resolved not to allow any risks to health occurring.

Rural post offices have already been declared unlikely targets for an anthrax attack in guidelines recently issued in response to the possibility of an anthrax attack in Ire-

However, the emergency services along with specialist army personnel, were determined not to leave anything to chance

Numbers Of Caravans Staying In Sites To Be Curtailed

Deputy Austin Deasy has welcomed the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party's unanimous agreement that the numbers of caravans that can congregate on any one area should be curtailed.

He has now asked the Minister to curtail the number of caravans that can move from one halting site to another at any given time, and that strict sanctions be imposed on Local Authorities that fail to provide the requisite number of transient sites in their areas.

He is calling as well for local authorities and health boards to take stern action against transient travellers who park illegally on public or private property and who contravene the public health acts.

"Local Authorities will have to fulfil their obligations to provide sufficient halting sites, if they have not already done so," he said "and severe penalties must be imposed on travellers who move without a license and who disobey

laws which are stringently enforced on the settled communi-

The move follows the convergence on Dungarvan of a large convoy of traveller/traders in August and which caused the peo-

ple of the town to "live in fear", according to the Deputy.

Legislation to impose severe penalties on local authorities who fail to provide the adequate number of halting sites, if brought about, could have implications for Waterford County Council

Plans are already underway to set up a transient site a few miles out of Dungarvan and negotiations are believed to be on-going on the purchase of land. If these fail compulsory purchase orders may be imposed. County Manager Donal Connolly said previously.

Decision On Garrynagree Landfill Challenge May Be Known Within Month

A verdict on Lickey Concern Group's High Court challenge against the siting of a dump in Garrynagree may be given before the end of November, it has emerged.

Garrynagree was seen by Waterford County Council as the best location for a county landfill, but the decision was a controversial one and was soon appealed and brought to the High Court.

The action groups bid to block the dump was heard in May but judgment has been reserved since.

A verdict is seen all the more vital for the Council

following the Environmental Protection Agency's refusal to grant a license to allow refuse to be dumped in the current Ballinamuck landfill.

The EPA's move was appealed by County Manager Donal Connolly and a verdict

on this issue is pending.

Meanwhile, Mr. Connolly said the Council couldn't do anything in relation to the proposed Garrynagree landfill until the court case concluded and although he hoped a verdict would be given before now, he expected one in the next three

Redundancy **Notices Received** By Crystal Workers

A massive blow was issued nv announced that the plants to contract workers in Duntices which are due to take effect within a fortnight.

The workers involved are not permanent members of staff though some have been with the company for a number of years and would have hoped to gain permanent employment at the firm.

"Now we find ourselves heading for the unemployment scrap heap and to be brutally honest about it there is no guarantee in my book that we will be given a recall", one of the workers said.

Management of the company also said that its Waterford and Dungarvan plants were going on a three day working week as a direct result of the September 11th terrorist attacks.

of America. It consisted of only 13 states. They declared independence from Britain, which had ruled them as colonies for over 150 years.

During the 19th century, the USA grew rapidly as more states joined the Union. Some were purchased from other European powers; some were conquered in wars. Some were given away in peace treaties, and others were simply taken over by pioneer farmers, who settled on uncultivated

American industry and business grew rapidly after oil, coal and steel were discovered in the northwest, and valuable gold

Millions of migrants arrived from Europe, hoping to make their fortunes in the 'land of the free.' By 1900, the U.S.A. was so successful that it was the richest country in the world.

Wagon Trains

From around 1850, many families left Europe and East Asia to make a new life in America. Some settled in cities along the east coast, others trekked westwards to reach the Great Plains, the Rocky Mountains and California. Settlers travelled in 'trains' of covered wagons, pulled by oxen or

During the long and dangerous journey, many died from hunger, thirst and disease, or in fights with Native Americans. Life in new western ranches, farms and mining settlements

The Settlers and the Native

Americans When the first European settlers in the

1540s, North America was home to around 300 different Native peoples. Sometimes, Native Americans and European settlers arranged to live peacefully, side by side. They traded together, and occasionally helped one another with local information and offers of food.


But more often, there were quarrels between them, because the European settlers felt they had a God-given right to take over Native peoples lands.

As more and more settlers arrived in America from Europe and Asia, these quarrels turned into war. The Native peoples fought bravely, but settler troops and settlers had bigger, better weapons and drove most Native Americans from their homes. The last battle to defend Native peoples' land was fought in 1890 at Wounded Knee, South Dakota.


Railways were vitally important in the new United States of America. By 1890, over 260,000 kilometres of track had been laid. They linked northern industrial cities and east-coast ports with the vast ranches and farmlands of the west and south.

Building the railways was a great engineering achievement; lines had to be laid across mountains, deserts and swamps. In 1869, the first transcontinental railway line was completed. At a special ceremony the final sections of rail were joined together with a golden nail.





They also called on the government, health boards and other caring organisations to define a system of child care, staffed by fully trained staff, that would protect children from

those who may set out to abuse them.

The Association also called for: Government funding to health boards to be increased sufficently to allow them to provide care for older people. An increase in the living alone allowance to £10.00 per week. A substantial increase in the fuel allowance. That the injustice handed out to working widows who pay full PRSI and who only receive half benefit if she is in receipt of a full social welfare pension. They note with some concern, the statement

made by Minister Dermot Ahern, T.D., in respect to what may be expected in the 2002 Budget when he pointed out the need for a prudent budget in the context of the temporary downturn in the world and Irish economy. In the light of this somewhat pessimistic statement, we ask why not have a minibudget in the six months to follow. We wish to point out that his present policy is not acceptable to members of our Association who are put to the pin of their collar to survive.



Although Cllr. Nora Flynn said that ideally a school would be located in Cappoquin and described the loss of St. Anne's as very sad, she said "we have to be realistic and know that children need choice of subjects and facilities. We have to put the future of the children over all other concerns.

"The ideal situation would be to have top class facilities in the Lismore and Cappoquin schools but realistically speaking a community school is the only option available," Cllr. Flynn said.

However, St. Anne's school building may have a future, Cllr. Flynn said. They are now looking at locating a VEC run adult education school in the facility. Cllr. Flynn said they did previously have a VEC school in the town and they would be very interested in once again setting in place one again. The fate of the Presentation Covent in Lismore, is however, unclear.

The Community School will be equipped to cater for 650 pupils but there will also be some additional space if there is an increase in pupils, Lismore Town Commissioner Bernard Leddy has said.

He said the development of a Community School in Lismore is very welcome as "Lismore was at the centre of educational development in Ireland for many centuries but this will be the largest development in education for

I have always interpreted rule 21 as a form of sanction similar in many ways to the sporting sanctions imposed on the corrupt apartheid regime in South Africa. In the South African situation you had a corrupt unrepresentative government which discriminate against one section of the

Most countries broke off sporting links with S. Africa. Not to do so they felt would confer legitimacy and acceptance of the system that prevailed. When the apartheid government eventually succumbed to world pressure and internal struggle then and only then were the sporting sanctions lifted. The situation in the 6 counties has many parallels. Rules for Dry Cow Therapy

Billy Meaney, Teagasc, Moorepark advises dairy farmers to follow these rules at drying-off:

Select cows for drying-off

- Always clean teats with cotton wool soaked in methylated spirits before infusing dry cow products
- Read label instructions ensure product is for use in dry
- Infuse dry cow product infuse all quarters
- Massage into udder
- Teat dip or spray
- Keep accurate records of drying-off and expected calving

Feeding the Dry Cow

- The recommendations for nutrition and management of the
- To allow a 10-week dry period for heifers and 8 weeks for all other cows. If animals are in very poor condition coming towards the end of their lactation somewhat longer dry periods can be allowed.
- To attempt to dry off cows in the condition score desired for calving down (3.0 to 3.5 on the five-point scale).
- To restrict or supplement the silage, depending on its quality and the condition of the cow at drying-off, for the dry period lengths mentioned above. A dry cow mineral mix should be fed to all cows. A supplement of 12-14% crude protein is adequate with grass silage for dry cows.

Cattle

How much are Cattle worth?

Teagasc cattle budgets suggest that while most types of young and store cattle are somewhat overvalued at present, nevertheless there may be some value out there. These budgets assume (rather than predict) a sale price for the various categories of stock, allocate a reasonable margin, allow for costs and premia and calculate the price at which the appropriate animal needs to be bought in. Obviously, if the sale price assumption is wrong, the resulting purchase price also misses the mark, but some assumption must be made. Looked at in this way, Friesian, Hereford and Continental bullocks for winter finishing have a value of £97, £102 and £117 per 100 kgs respectively with spring price assumptions of £0.80 to £0.86 per pound. Translated into "mart speak", 500 kg stores would be worth £485, £510 and £585 per head for the three breed types to leave a margin of £56.

Continental store heifers at 430 kgs would need to be bought for £355 to leave £50 profit, while suckled weanling bulls are valued at £155 per 100 kgs for finishing as bulls, and at £144 per 100 kgs for 2 year old beef systems. £150 per 100 kgs is equivalent to £450 for a 300 kg weanling.

TAX WRITE-OFF ON QUOTA PURCHASES TO BENEFIT SMALL/ MEDIUM SIZE PRODUCERS -WALSHE

tee Chairman Pádraig Walshe said the announcement of the EU's green light allowing for the immediate implementation of the tax write-off on milk quota purchased since April 2000 vindicated his advice to farmers to go ahead and claim the tax relief. He said the measure, which will apply to all quota purchases, would benefit small and medium size producers first and foremost, as further to the reform of the milk quota regime which he was instrumental in bringing about in April 2000, new private leasing was no longer possible, and most quota transactions were now taking place through restructuring and the buying out of leases. In the last two years, small and medium size producers have purchased 88% of the quota reallocated through the 2000 and 2001 restructuring schemes, and accounted for an estimated 71% of all bought-out private leases, or 61% of the quota bought out in this way.

"I negotiated this tax relief in the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness, and had secured its inclusion in the 2001 Finance Act. I have always seen it as a vital part of the milk quota reform of April 2000, which I was instrumental in delivering. It is very much in line with the aim I pursued throughout my Chairmanship of the National Dairy Committee, namely to reduce the cost of quota for smaller active milk producers anxious to develop their enter-

ng

prise," Pádraig Walshe said.

"Going forward, this measure will be even more valuable to small and medium-size producers. Now that new private leases and sales are a thing of the past, more quota will become available through restructuring. at a decreasing price, to which priority category producers will have prime access. This tax relief will contribute to further reducing the cost to smaller producers, thereby further helping to take the chequebook out of milk quota acquisition." he

Dairy Partnerships

Minister Walsh has announced the introduction of partnership arrangements in the dairy sector. He said these arrangements will contribute to presenting farming as an attractive career, particularly for younger people. They can provide access to a viable career for younger farmers who might otherwise find it difficult to survive on a small quota. In addition, if operated well, these arrangements should enhance the profitability of milk production as well as improving the structure of the industry at production level.

The Minister also announced the introduction of a pilot scheme for the allocation of milk quota to suitably qualified farm managers. Up to ten farm managers will be allocated quota at the level of 70,000 litres, the same level as applies for new entrants. "I would hope that this pilot scheme would be seen as an incentive for committed young farm managers who wish to make their future in the sector. Their contribution in the years ahead could be very significant for the

industry," Minister Walsh said. Tax Concession on

Restructured Milk Quota Minister Walsh has announced that following clarification from the European Commission, the tax concessions on the purchase of milk quotas, agreed last year by the Minister for Finance, Mr Charlie McCreevy TD, would now go ahead. These taxation measnance Act, 2000.

He stated that this measure was a key element in the successful operation of the milk quota restructuring scheme. The restructuring scheme over the past two years had allowed for the transfer of over 80 million gallons of quota to active, committed producers, most of whom are in the small or medium size categories. The price of quota under the scheme, along with the favourable tax arrangements agreed by the Minister for Finance had made it possible for such producers to purchase additional quota at a reasonable cost.

Payments for Control of Farm Pollution

under the National Scheme for the Control of Farm Pollution will be paid immediately. Minister Walsh said this follows extensive negotiations between his Department and the European Commission to raise the ceiling for payments under this state-aided scheme from £15 million to £30 million.

When originally negotiated with the EU Commission, this ures were included in the Fi- scheme anticipated making grants to some 2,000 applicants. By the time the scheme closed, however, almost 6,000 applications had been received. and the eventual total grant-aid that will be paid out to farmers is likely to reach £30 million.

30-Day Holding Period

Minister Walsh announced that the 30-day holding period for purchases of susceptible animals is being extended to 31 December 2001. Under this rule an animal may not be sold or supplied onward within a period of 30 days from the date of purchase unless the buyer has received an exemption which is granted only in particular circumstances and subject to con-All outstanding payments ditions. Extension of the role of export refunds.

movement controls for a further two months would provide an additional safeguard in containment and control measures for Foot and Mouth Disease. The Minister reminded farmers that FMD 9 movement permits are still required for the movement of cattle from farm to farm. He warned that the severest action would be taken against operators who attempted to flout or manipulate this requirement.

Minister Walsh recently met U.S. Secretary for Agriculture, Ann Veneman in Washington. The meeting covered a range of issues including the question of the resumption of Irish pigmeat exports to the U.S., the potential threat to exports of casein and milk protein concentrate to the U.S. and this week's World Trade Organisation negotiations in Doha. In relation to the WTO talks, Minister Walsh emphasised the significance of the reforms to the CAP which the EU had already implemented and in this context he highlighted the case for the retention of the Blue Box payments and the

ABBEYSIDE SCOUT NOTES

LOCAL HISTORY

In much of the 16th century there was a strict curb on "illegal exports". The list of illegal exports is comprehensive and was an attempt to halt the cornering of certain commodities and thus leaving the country without essential supplies. It was a century of warfare, when food was often scarce in one part of the country or the other. The commodities mentioned were wheat and all kinds of grain, beef, lard, bacon and butter, tallow (the harder and less fusible fat of animals melted and separated from the fibrous or membranous matter), wax, wool, flocks (coarse woolen cloth) tanned leather, hawks, hobbies (ponies or light horses), horses and large quantities of gold and silver coined or in bullion.

The port of Dungarvan was one of the twelve principal ports of Ireland in 1566 where George Lodge was empowered by the government to search ships, which might be carrying illegal exports. His fee was one quarter of all that he confiscated. The object was to hold these items for "our garyson and fortes" as well as for the common good of the population who could be left without these goods due to the greed of some merchants. However, the total banning of all these basic items of field and workshop was also a brake on Irish commerce.

There is love, dislike (maybe even hatred) pioneering spirits, friendship, pacts, all there for the novelist to play with.

Prices begin at £26.99 and rise on to the Frapin Cognac Patrimoniale at £250.00 So you can buy a bottle of cognac from about £20 - but then the price goes sky-rocketing. You can pay as much as £1,200 for the Richard

Hennessy, that man who began it

all. That is the really, truly luxury end of the market Not really the sort of impulse buy — but when a great deal is made that's the time to get out the Hennessy.

And if you cannot reach to the Richard Hennessy then you can take a choice all the way through the price range – the VS costs about £19.60; VSOP. £31.49; XO - £80 and then the recent special Paradis at £150 - if you stall there and times are good then Richard Hennessy is your only man. WINENOTE

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question

My local shop is displaying its prices in both pounds (IR \mathfrak{L}) and euros Sometimes the price shown in euros is wrong. What should I do?

Answer

If you feel a price displayed in your shop has not been converted to euros correctly you should first of all bring it to the attention of the shopkeeper.

A National Code on Euro Changeover was launched last December. Suppliers of goods and services to the public who subscribe to the code or to similar codes of practice, drawn up by business organisations and approved by the Director of Consumer Affairs, commit to carrying out the changeover te the euro fairly using the six digit conversion rate (£ 1 = IR£0.787564).

To convert a pound amount to euros you divide it by the conversion rate and round the result to two decimal places i.e. to cents. Where the third figure after the decimal point is 4 or lower, the second figure after the decimal point remains unchanged (e.g. 3.174 rounds down to 3.17). Where the third figure is 5 or higher, the second figure after the decimal point is rounded up (e.g. 6.328 rounds up to 6.33).

Subscribers to the Code or similar approved code are entitled to display a logo devised by the Director of Consumer Affairs which indicates they are committed to carrying out the changeover fairly. If your local shop displays the logo and continues to display inaccurate eu,ro prices after you have brought them to their attention, you should contact the Office of the Director of Consumer Affairs. If the shop fails to take whatever remedial action it is directed to do, the Director can withdraw the shop's entitlement to display the logo and may also publicise the decision to do so.

If your local shop does not display the logo and continues to display inaccurate euro prices, you should take your business to a shop that does display the logo.



CLONMEL NURSES TO TAKE FURTHER **ACTION**

Nurses of St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel have embarked another work to rule in protest over the return of beds to corridors. On Wednesday morning last at 11 am nurses began their second work to rule protest during the month of October. A previous eleven day work to rule had been suspended when commitments were given to the I.N.O. that beds would remain off the corridors by the South Eastern Health Board. On Tuesday evening seven beds were placed on the hospital corridors. Management have broken all agreements reached, how now can they rebuild the working relationship that was there. The nurses had no option but to embark on another work to rule, said there spokesman Don Culliton.

During the work to rule nurses will not co-operate with the placing of beds on the corridors and will not carry out administration duties. Last week plans of the South Eastern Health Board to resolve the overcrowding problem at St. Joseph's Hospital received a major setback. Nursing staff of St. Anthony's long stay geriatric ward rejected by seven votes to two proposals to use a section of the unit for acute medical care beds that could not be accommodated in St. Joseph's. The S.E.H.B. regretted that the L.N.O. had reinstated the work to rule. This is in response to additional beds on the corridors on the night of the 30th October at the hospital. The board is available at all times to discuss the matter with the LN.O. and will continue to work to resolve the issue.

SUSPENDED DOCTOR **EMPLOYED AT CLONMEL HOSPITAL**

The South Eastern Health Board has confirmed that a suspended United Kingdom Psychiatrist was employed at St. Luke's Hospital in Clonmel for over three and a half months as a locum last year. Dr. John Harding - Price also worked at St. Canice's Psychiatric Hospital in Kilkenny form the 14th August to the 5th November. He was treating patients at St. Luke's Hospital, Clonmel from 17th April until the 31st July last year to cover staff holidays. He was suspended and not allowed to practice as a Psychiatrist by the British General Medical Council a month before he took up work at Clonmel Hospital.

Some two weeks after his work at St. Canice's Hospital ended, Dr. Harding-Price received an interim suspension from the British General Medical Council. Then on the following December he was found guilty of serious professional misconduct by the same council. The British General Medical Council hearing heard complaints form three female patients, the hearing told Dr. Harding-Price that his conduct had fallen seriously below the standard which patients are entitled to expect of registered practitioners and that his standard of practice represented a risk to the public.

A spokes person for the S.E.H.B. said the doctor was employed at the two hospitals following the S.E.H.B. usual advertisement and recruitment procedures. These include checking the registration status of any other doctor who is employed by the S.E.H.B. The Irish Medical Council had registered the doctor and a copy of his registration was forwarded to the S.E.H.B. as the Doctor had the necessary registration with the Irish Medical Council he was then appointed as a locum to the two hospitals to cover leave. The S.E.H.B. had they said never received any complaints from staff or patients about the doctors work. Dr. Harding-Price is appealing his suspension by the British General Medical Council to the Privy Council.

MISSION ALIVE - A LOCAL PERSPECTIVE

Modeligo priests who worked in New Orleans and the State of Louisiana at the beginning of the last century were: Fr. Richard Power, Carrigawn, Sleady, Fr. Thomas J. Fitzgerald, Glen, and Fr. Patrick B. Walsh, Farnane. Also serving in the area were Fr. John F .X . Walsh, Modeligo, Fr. C. Beston, Aglish and Fr Joseph Hanrahan from Cahir. All six studied in Mt. Melleray and in St. John's College, Waterford.

All men took on their administrations with great enthusiasm and worked hard to establish a religious society that continues to flourish, inspite of the commercial inroads which divest. Fr Power was made Parish Priest of St. Michael's Church, New Orleans in 1903 and suffered an untimely death at the age of 40 years in 1912. Fr Thomas Fitzgerald, a brave, courageous young Priest who walked into the line of fire to administer the Last Sacraments to dying men, after a crazed local had shot several people in

He died in 1910 at the age of 35 years, the youngest ever Parish Priest to die at his post. As there was a surplus of Priests in the Waterford diocese when Fr Patrick Walsh was ordained in 1901, so he was sent on loan to Liverpool diocese where he spent a few years. Then he joined Fr Power in Louisiana in 1910, where he served at many posts. He was appointed Pastor of St Rita's parish in 1921 where he remained until he died in 1938.



Minor Football Round Robin Again But with a difference this time round!

At their meeting last week the Munster Council decided on a motion from Waterford to play the minor football championship on a round robin involving all six counties next year. The top four will play off on a knock out arrangement with an open draw.

This will mean that all counties will play a minimum of five matches before the knock-out stage is reached. It will commence in March and run into April

Locally, there is sure to be concern about how all this will impact on the start of the championships, if as expected an effort will be made next year to get our underage championships underway in the March/April period.

RULE 21

The motion to abolish it is top of the agenda in all counties at the moment and with no intercounty activity to steal the attention, clubs as well as individuals are debating the pro's and con's of the matter which will be decided one way or another at City West Hotel on Saturday. November 17th at the special Congress.

When the issue was debated at the special congress called by Joe MacDonagh three years ago, most, or nearly all the counties in the Republic showed support for the six northern counties by deciding to vote their way. This resulted in the defeat of the motion.

Taking the same line on this occasion, counties will be seen to be 'opting out' and failing to 'stand up and be counted' as it were.

Circumstances have changed and in very many counties the mood has changed and a more favourable attitude towards the RUC is influenced by the acceptance of the Patton Report and the decision to take on Catholics in the force. It is known that very many Catholics intend to apply including people who are members of GAA clubs at the present time. If the rule remains, these players will not be legal to play Gaelic games.

WESTERN CONVENTION

Tomorrow (Thursday) is the final date for the acceptance of nominations and motions for the Western Convention which is due to take place on Thursday, December 6th in Modeligo Community Centre.

Although there are rumours, there is no definite news about contests as yet. But perhaps when the nominations are submitted, we will have an indication of 'how the wind is blowing.' There are likely to be motions about the running and timing of the championships and while convention cannot make decisions in this regard, the motions will reveal the thinking behind them.

County Convention

Nomination papers are now in the hands of county secretaries and these, along with any motions for consideration, must be back with the county secretary by November 18th. Clubs will have an additional name to consider this time round, since a county vice-chairman must be elected in accordance with Rule 59 passed at the Galway Congress two years ago. The county convention will take place at Lawlor's on Saturday, December 8th at 6.30 p.m.


