Massive Boost For Power Plant Go-Ahead

The future of Dungarvan Energy Ltd's proposed Power Plant has received a massive boost as one of the major stumbling blocks towards its go ahead appears to be on the way to being removed.

County Manager Donal Connolly told last Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council that Bord Gais have written to the Council indicating that they may be in a position to provide a gas line to the plant.

The project, which it is estimated, will create 150 jobs in the construction phase of the £80 million project, appeared to have stalled in recent months over the cost of supplying a natural gas pipeline.

While a natural gas connection from either Clonmel or Middleton was expected last August no movement has since been made.

Clonmel was initially thought to be the favoured option but following Bord Gais's decision to lay a pipeline from Middleton to Youghal this route now appears the most likely.

Dungarvan Energy Ltd called for Government support and a meeting with Minister Martin Cullen quickly followed with a resolution to the issue now appearing to be on the cards.

Cllr. Billy Kyne who met with the power company along with Minister Cullen welcomed the announcement saying the power plant was needed now more than ever due to the economic downturn which will see job losses in Dungarvan Crystal and Stafford Millar.

The power plant, itself, would provide direct employment to over 20 people who would work on a 24 hour shift cover in what Cllr. Kyne described as "quality employment."

The plant, which would take one and a half to two years to construct, would be economically viable due to the recent increase in the price of energy to industry making a private source more attractive, Cllr. Kyne said.

"The vital component of this development is the pro-

vision of natural gas to Dungarvan which can, should, and now, more than ever must be assured," he said.

Dungarvan Energy, which is a consortium made up of Irish investors and the multi-national power company Rolls Royce Power Ventures, have already received planning permission and were due to start construction last month.

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Council To Take Legal Action Against Tournore Developer

The removal of nine trees during construction of a development in Tournore will lead to legal action being taken against the developer, County Manager Donal Connolly said at last Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council.

Trees, which were believed to have been over a hundred years old, were cut down by the developer despite conditions preventing this in the granting of planning permission.

However, the developer has said he wasn't aware of the conditions attached and claimed the trees were a danger to the public and people living in the area had complained about them.

There were doubts poured on this claim, though, by Mr. Connolly who said that developers in this position "quite often claim that".

The legal action will go ahead, though, which has been welcomed by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan.

"Developers are laughing at

us at the moment and unless we hit them hard in the pockets they will continue to laugh at us", he said.

He also asked for provisions to be put in place which would halt the development until the issue of trees was resolved.

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan described the fellings as sharp practice and said

"With any large developer the conditions should be made clear to them. In this case the person who was

The sale of work will begin at 2.30 p.m. and I would make a very special appeal to the public to support the event.

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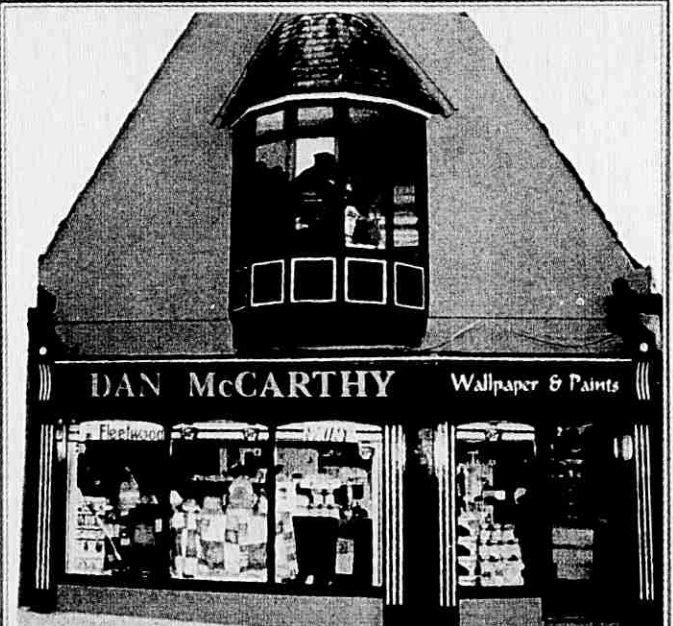

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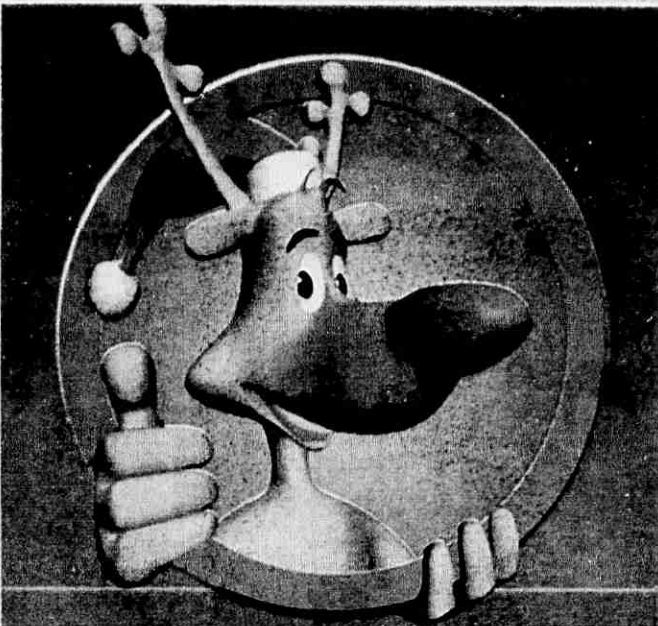
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The O'Briens of Déise

A new book which marks an important contribution to the history of County Waterford and is essential reading for anybody called O'Brien, will be launched in Dungarvan on Wednesday, 28 November, at the Park Hotel. The book *The O'Briens of Déise*, was written by Frank O'Brien, a native of Modeligo in West Waterford. The author is a retired consulting engineer who has devoted more than a decade to researching the history of the O'Brien's. Appropriately enough the launch will take place in the Déise Room at the Park Hotel.

The book traces the history of the O'Briens of Déise from the time of Brian Borumha, King of Munster and All-Ireland, down to the present day. After Brian the kings of Munster made various efforts to strengthen the defences of the province. As part of this process Murtagh Mór O'Brien in the 11th century sent his brother Diarmait to set up observation bases on the rivers Suir and Blackwater to monitor Viking incursions. The several families of O'Briens who live on the banks of the Suir at Gaultier and Portlaw and at Clashmore and Lismore on the banks of the Blackwater, originated from the observation posts.

A second migration of the O'Briens of Thomond to Deise took place about 1369 when Tirlagh Maol O'Brien the King of Thomond was de-throned by his nephew in an internecine battle at Monasterenagh near Croom in Co. Limerick. Tirlagh was given shelter by Garret Iarla, 3rd Earl of Desmond, who made him a grant of about 4500 acres of land in Deise country, south of the Comeragh mountains. In return Tirlagh paid a nominal rent and did court service to the Earl. O'Brien helped to strengthen the defences of Déise against the powerful Ormondes and Poers. Tirlagh and his brother Tadhg repaired to Comeragh and set up at Barnakill in the parish of Kilrossanty.

The O'Briens of Comeragh settled into their peaceful envi-

ronment and, in time, cooperated in the development of the manorial system of farming introduced to Ireland by the Anglo-Normans. The O'Briens built castles in the Norman tradition to defend their property, developed farming methods and built mills for the grinding of corn. They socialised widely and intermarried with the prominent families of the time, the Poers, Prendergasts, McGraths, Fitzgeralds, Hores, Rowes, Nugents and others. For about 150 years there was peace and progress in Deise. And then the Desmond wars began which lasted for about 100 years. The O'Briens of Comeragh, who had their own army, in compliance with their

duty of service, supported the Lord of Decies in his battle against the Earl of Desmond at Affane in 1565 where several hundred were killed.

In the Confederate war which took place in the following century, the O'Briens of Comeragh supported the Catholic cause and took part in many skirmishes and battles. The battle of Barnakill between the O'Briens of Comeragh and Inchiquin state forces under Vavasour was a particularly bloody event in which several hundred were massacred.

When Cromwell came to Ireland in 1649 at the end of the Confederate war, his objective was to subdue the remnants of the fragmented opposition and to complete the application of the Adventurers Act which stipulated the confiscation of the lands of the Irish Catholics and their allocation to English Adventurers. Cromwell spent the greater part of his term in Ireland in county Waterford and on his infamous retreat from Waterford City to Youghal, he is reputed to have raided Comeragh Castle and hanged four of Derby O'Briens sons.

The O'Brien's also had an involvement in the war of the two Kings a few decades later. After his defeat by King Billy at the Battle of the Boyne, King James retreated towards Kinsale where he sailed for the continent. On his way, he stayed at Barnakill Castle as a guest of Tirlagh O'Brien. After the departure of James King Billy completed the Cromwellian objective, confiscated the lands of the Irish Catholics and allocated them

to Adventurers and Cromwellian soldiers. The Catholics, whose lands were forfeit, were issued with certificates for transplantation to Connaught. Several O'Briens of Comeragh were listed in the inquisitions held to establish ownership of lands and in the certificates of transplantation.

Tirlagh O'Brien of Barnakill chose exile with the Wild Geese in Europe rather than submit to the King whom he considered a usurper of the English crown. The O'Brien lands were forfeit and were allocated to Adventurers, crown soldiers and the House of Dromana. Some O'Briens were transplanted in South Galway and East Clare. Many others moved quietly into West Waterford and took up tenancies in the parishes of Aglish, Ardmore, Ballinameela, Affane and Touraneena. The O'Brien families of Ardmore, Grallagh, Mongally, Dromore, Aglish, Kereen, Bewley, Canty and Graigue are the descendants of these displaced O'Brien families of Comeragh. The book traces the history of these families down to the present day.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Frank O'Brien, the author of *The O'Briens of Deise*, is a Waterford man who has made a generous contribution to cultural, infrastructural, environmental and sporting developments in Ireland over the years. Frank was born at Graigue in the parish of Modeligo and received his early education at the local national school and at Mount Melleray seminary. He won a scholarship to University College, Cork where he graduated with a degree in civil engineering in 1947. A keen sportsman he played football, hurling and handball and won a Sigerson Cup medal with UCC and league medals in Cork. In the late 1940s he represented Waterford in both hurling and football.

After graduation, Frank O'Brien spent some years with

the ESB in Waterford City and with Waterford County Council at Dungarvan. In 1955, he joined the firm of civil and structural consulting engineers, Thomas Garland and Partners in Dublin and served as managing partner for several years until his retirement in 1988.

He was involved in a number of major projects including the development of industrial estates at Shannon, Galway, Waterford, Wexford, Limerick, Thurles and Donegal as well as hospitals at Dundalk, Letterkenny, Waterford, the Coombe and Tallaght. He also worked on development projects at educational institutions, University College Dublin, Maynooth University, St. Colmans Col-

lege Newry, St. Patrick's College Kiltegan, the Franciscan College at Gormanston and at many army barracks throughout Ireland. He took part in the design and construction of many large industrial developments that included Burlington industries at Longford, Limerick and Tralee, Digital Industries at Galway and Clonmel and several factories for the Shannon Development Company.

Frank lives in Dublin with his wife Teresa. They have three sons and three daughters. When he retired, he felt a strong desire to contribute to the heritage of his native county and The O'Briens of Déise is the result.

CCTV Receives Support From Councillors

Close Circuit Television has come one step closer to becoming a reality in Dungarvan as Councillors gave it their unanimous support at last Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council.

The issue was raised by Cllr. John Deasy in response to some violent incidents which have occurred in the centre of the town over recent weekends.

Cllr. Deasy said the whole square would benefit from its implementation, making it useful in fighting crime and it would also be welcomed

by shopkeepers.

"You don't need to put camera's in all over the town", he said. "But they should be put in certain streets to prevent any incidents from occurring."

The camera's could also be used in prosecuting those who litter, he said, as the laws at the moment say that a person littering must be caught in the act.

Cllr. Lar Hart, who raised the issue initially four years ago, said introducing CCTV would not cost overly much as the town already has the wiring necessary for it.

"Casey's Cablevision have

wiring in nearly every premises so it would be only a matter of connecting up to those", he said.

In reply the County Manager Donal Connolly said that he had no doubt that Close Circuit Television was a useful measure towards the prevention of crime and he will get a price on the cost of its introduction.

"There is also the matter of monitoring the camera's", he said. "For that we would need the co-operation of the Gardai and I will be in discussion with the Gardai to see if we can achieve this."

granted the permission sold it on to the developer"

Meanwhile, a solution to the issue reoccurring was put forward by Cllr. Billy Kyne who believes a protocol needs to be put forward to stop this happening again.

"I would like the Senior Planner to meet with the developer", he said "and a sign clearly marking the trees not to be cut down should be put up in the future. This would be signed by the Senior Planner and by the developer".

If a developer failed to enter into this agreement, he said, the council could make his attempt to get planning permission very difficult.

However, the company found itself embroiled in a High Court battle when a local resident claimed that a substantial number of the thirteen planning conditions laid down had been breached by the company.

The charge was denied by Dungarvan Energy but an order was given that no further works were to proceed on the site until a final judgment is given. As yet this has not been forthcoming.

If the final go-ahead is given however the 100 megawatt plant will operate on a round the clock basis and will generate 800 million units of electricity annually.

Bord Gais, it is hoped, will supply the gas to the power plant and in turn will own the energy output which will be linked up with the ESB sub station on the Military Road near Radley Engineering.

The future of the other major development on the Glanbia site - Clancy Construction's proposed £300 million shopping complex, meanwhile, looks set to be decided in the next 5 weeks.

An Oral hearing into the shopping complex was held in August and a judgment has been held over since that time. However, Cllr. Kyne said that he has been assured that a judgment will be made before Christmas.

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Exempting Mobile Phone Masts From Planning An Act Of Cowardice Says Election Candidate

The decision to exempt mobile phone masts on public, commercial and industrial buildings from the planning process has been described as "a disgrace" by Fine Gael General Election Candidate Cllr. Maurice Cummins.

Cllr. Cummins, who is a member of Waterford Corporation, said the erection of these masts has generated opposition in many communities with many residents voicing serious health concerns.

"By introducing these proposed regulations", he said "the minister has capitulated to vested interests and ignored the wishes of ordinary people. It certainly makes a mockery of the democratic process to abolish any degree of scrutiny or control on the erection of these masts".

While saying the jury was still out on the health affects the erection of these masts could have Cllr. Cummins said he would certainly err on the side of caution.

In recent months local authorities have included major changes in their development plans to deal with the question of mobile phone mast and where they should be sited.

However, Cllr. Cummins said "the minister now proposes to muzzle and regulate against the expressed wishes or local representative and the communities they represent. It is certainly an act of cowardice".

INDUSTRIAL EUROPE

The industrial revolution began around 1770 and lasted for almost 100 years. It was a time of rapid exchange in the way things were made. Engineers invested big machines to mass-produce goods quickly and cheaply in factories.

At first, these new machines were designed only for spinning thread and weaving cloth, but they were soon used for making all kinds of useful things, such as shoes, paper, pottery and metal tools.

They were also used to produce large quantities of strong materials for construction, ship-building and weapons production, such as bricks, iron and steel.

The Industrial Revolution also brought many changes to the way people lived. Men, women and children working in huge factories replaced old-fashioned craftworkers, who used to make things at home, slowly and carefully by hand.

Karl Marx



Karl Marx (1818-1883) was a German writer living in London. In 1848, he published a book called 'The Communist Manifesto.' In it, he demanded political freedom and better pay and working conditions for ordinary people.

He called on workers to claim their rights "Workers of the world unite! You have nothing to lose but your chains!"



MINES

The owners of mines often employed children to work for them. They were very useful for crawling down tight tunnels, or squeezing in between huge machines. Many working children were killed in accidents with machinery, or died from illnesses caused by breathing coal dust, cotton fibres or chemical fumes.

Schools

In the early years of the Industrial Revolution, many children were forced to work long hours in dangerous conditions in factories and mines. But after around 1830, governments passed laws to protect child workers, and charities set up many more 'ragged' schools, where factory children could study after work and at weekends.

By the 1870s, European governments began to set up state-funded schools, where pupils under 12 received free, compulsory education. By around 1900, most factory workers could read and write.

RAILWAYS

Railways helped the Industrial Revolution by carrying goods made in factories to shops and markets far away. They also carried fresh food from the countryside to feed families who worked in factory towns.

The world's first passenger railway was opened by British inventor George Stephenson in 1825. Soon railways were built in many parts of Europe.

FARM MACHINERY

After around 1700, many people in Europe and America became fascinated by science. Farmers and estate-owners experimented with new ways of breeding animals and sowing crops.

Alongside industrial scientists, they began to invent new machines to make farming quicker and more profitable.

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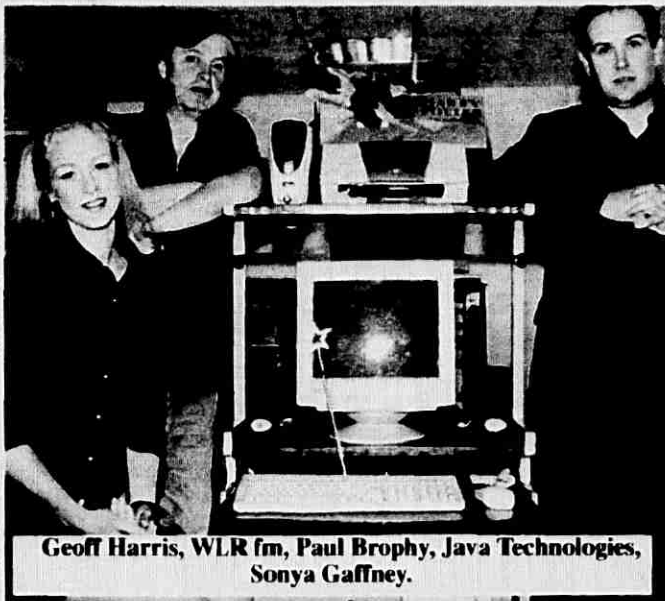

Is It A Good Time To Buy? YES SAYS DAVID REYNOLDS

For many people the decision to purchase their first home is one of the most important investment decisions they will ever make. It is a momentous and difficult one at any time. Over the past number of years, when prices were rising by 20% plus, many people must have felt pressurised to purchase sooner rather than later, fearing perhaps that they would be left behind in the housing boom. Today the pace of inflation has slowed significantly and such pressure has largely dissipated according to Estate Agent David Reynolds, Sherry FitzGerald Reynolds, Dungarvan who was speaking to a group of business people in Lismore.

As a result of this some people are beginning to play the waiting game, hoping that better value may be available if they delay their purchase decision. In my opinion, such an approach is foolhardy. Just as pushing oneself to buy ahead of an advancing market is a risky business, becoming overly complacent and anticipating a significant reduction in prices is equally unwise.

Firstly, the population of Ireland is growing, with this comes an increase in the demand for housing. Since 1996 we have seen the population of Ireland grow from 3.6 million to an estimated 3.8 million but this is by no means the end of the growth. Recent forecasts from the CSO suggest that the population of Ireland will increase to 4.2 million by 2011 and rise to 4.6 million in the subsequent 20 years. Translating this into housing requirements suggests national demand for over 400,000 houses in the period to 2011.

One of the principal reasons for the growth in population lies in the strength of net immigration. An estimated 46,200 immigrants came to live in Ireland in the year to April 2001 while 19,900 people emigrated, resulting in net migration of 26,300.

Secondly, despite the strength of house building activity in Waterford and Ireland we still have a dearth of housing supply. By the end of 2000, there were approximately 330 houses for every 1,000 people living in Ireland. This compared to countries such as the United Kingdom, Germany, Sweden and Denmark have been between 400 and 450 houses per 1,000 living in the country. Until this gap is breached there is no possibility of a real stabilisation in price inflation.

Furthermore, given the supply side constraints currently at play, particularly in the labour market, it is difficult to see a significant increase in construction activity in the medium term. Indeed recent forecasts for the construction industry federation suggest that output levels could fall this year.

Another reason to discount the views of those opting for the "wait and see" approach lies in the fact that in real terms houses are becoming more affordable. Since the end of 2000 interest rates have been reduced to 1% while we have also seen a significant reduction in the rate of personal taxes. Both of these have

positively impacted the cost of housing in real terms.

Finally, construction costs are still rising. A recent survey by the Society of Chartered Surveyors suggests that the cost of building a three-bedroom house has doubled in the past five years with evidence that construction costs are continuing to rise this year due largely to a backlog of work. While input costs continue to rise the pressure on price inflation will remain.

The gambler part of all of us would love to believe that we would be the "cute ones" who found the bargain, were prudent and won the prize however gambling on a significant reduction in prices is nothing short of reckless. Despite recent dramatic headline grabbing reports to the contrary there is absolutely no reason to believe that delaying the decision to purchase a property at the moment will result in any saving on price. In contrast, the strength of demand combined with a forecast reduction in supply will almost inevitably result in a return to rising prices next year. In short now is the time to buy! according to David Reynolds.

Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Authentic, Spicy and Never A Dhal Moment

THIS traditional Singhi dish will spice up any meal.

Ingredients:

- Serves 4
- 200g yellow lentils
- 50g fresh ginger
- 6 tomatoes
- 2 stalks curry leaves
- 1/4 x 5ml sp turmeric
- 4 x 15ml sp ghee or butter
- 1 x 15ml so garam masala

Method:

Wash the lentils and, if necessary, soak (according to instructions on the packaging). Give the ginger a whizz in the blender, then put the lentils, ginger, tomatoes, curry leaves, turmeric and a pinch of salt into a pan with enough water to cover. Bring to the boil, then turn down the heat and simmer for 20 minutes or until the lentils are soft. Remove from the heat, cool, remove curry leaves and purée until smooth. Reserve until required.

Just before serving, reheat the lentil purée gently until it starts to bubble. In a separate pan, heat the ghee or butter. Sprinkle the garam

masala on the dhal but do not stir. Pour the hot ghee or butter over the top and cover. Stir before serving.

Homemade Garam Masala

If you're not using mango chutney, squeeze 1 x 15ml sp lemon juice over the garam masala when added to the dhal.

- 1/2 x 5ml sp cumin seeds
 - 1/2 x 5ml sp coriander seeds
 - 1/2 x 5ml sp black peppercorns
 - 1/2 x 5ml sp ground turmeric
 - 1/2 x 5ml sp dried mango powder (optional)
- Grind the whole spices together, then mix with the ground spices. Sieve, then grind the residue and sieve again. Discard any residue remaining. Keep in an airtight jar for 6-8 weeks only



Salad Of Pepper and Artichoke

COLOURFUL and tasty – this pepper and artichoke salad is an excellent light lunch dish.

Ingredients:

- Serves 10 with other dishes
- 4 red peppers
- 2 yellow peppers
- 290g jar artichoke hearts, in oil, drained and sliced, oil reserved
- 1 x 15ml sp fresh lemon juice
- 1 x 5ml sp wholegrain mustard
- Salt and pepper
- Crisp lettuce leaves, such as cos or Webbs, to serve.

Method:

Preheat the grill to high. Quarter the peppers and remove the seeds and stems.

Place, skin-side up, on a grill pan and grill for five to seven minutes until blackened all over, then remove them from the heat.

Transfer to a plastic bag for 10 minutes to cool.

Pour the pepper juices into a bowl. Skin the peppers.

Cut the flesh into strips and mix with the artichokes in a separate bowl.

Add the lemon juice and mustard to the pepper juices, then gradually whisk in about five tablespoons of oil from the artichokes.

Season, toss with the salad and serve on a bed of lettuce leaves.

TIP: This salad recipe can be made up to two days ahead, but ensure it is covered and stored in the refrigerator.

Transport in a rigid container (pack the lettuce separately).

Bake Your Own Cheese Whirls

THESE cheesy whirl rolls are simple and yet effective as pre-appetiser bitesize snacks for your party guests or hassle-free hamper delights on a picnic.

Ingredients:

- Makes 12
- 145g packet pizza base mix
- 75g mature Cheddar cheese, finely grated
- 2 x 15ml sp fresh snipped chives

Method:

Stir 130ml water into the pizza base mix. Cover the dough and leave for about 20 minutes until the ball has doubled in size.

Knead the dough and then use a rolling pin to roll the dough into a thin 20x40cm rectangle.

Sprinkle the grated Cheddar

cheese and the chopped chives over the rectangle to within about 2cm of the edges.

Roll up the rectangle along the longer edge into one long roll and then cut into 12 small rolls.

Arrange the individual rolls in a buttered 16cm square tin.

Cover the tin with oiled clingfilm and leave the rolls to rise for around 30 minutes.

In this time, preheat the oven to 220°C/450°F/gas mark 7.

After the rolls have risen, bake them for 20 minutes or until the rolls are golden brown.

Serve your cheese whirl rolls while they are still warm.

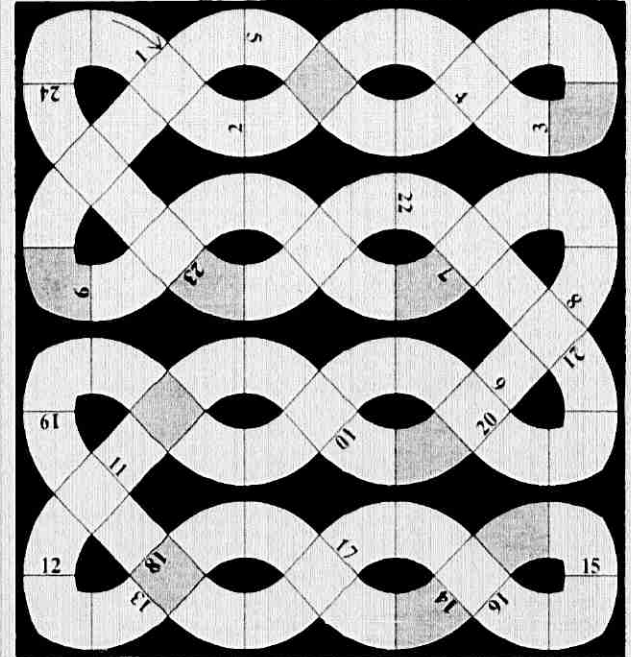

TAOISEACH URGED TO ACT FOR DUNGARVAN

The Taoiseach Bertie Ahern has been written to by a member of Waterford County Council, in an effort to establish when the decentralisation of a Government Department and resultant jobs are due for Dungarvan.

Labour member for the Dungarvan area, Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair says Bertie Ahern — both as Head of Government and as leader of Fianna Fáil — is in the best position to clarify an important matter that has, in Cllr. Ó Céilleachair's view, become a source of conflicting signals among Fianna Fáil's two party TDs in the Waterford constituency. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says it has been a continuing source of disappointment to people in the Dungarvan area that the Government has failed to act, in the county town's instance, on a promise first made in Finance Minister Charlie McCreevey's Budget speech of 1999 that up to 10,000 Gov-

ernment Department jobs would be decentralised to provincial locations.

Speaking at a Labour Party branch meeting in Dungarvan last week, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said: "It's over a year since Brendan Kenneally TD told the people of Dungarvan that a section of the OPW was on its way to the town. It's also over a year since his party and constituency colleague Martin Cullen TD — the Minister with responsibility for the OPW — denied that such a decision had yet been made. In the meantime, the decentralisation of administrative jobs in the Legal Aid Board and the Civil Defence for Cahirciveen in south Kerry and Roscrea in north Tipperary has been confirmed.

No one wants to see Dungarvan miss out and a lot of work has been put in to stressing its merits. I will await the Taoiseach's response with interest."

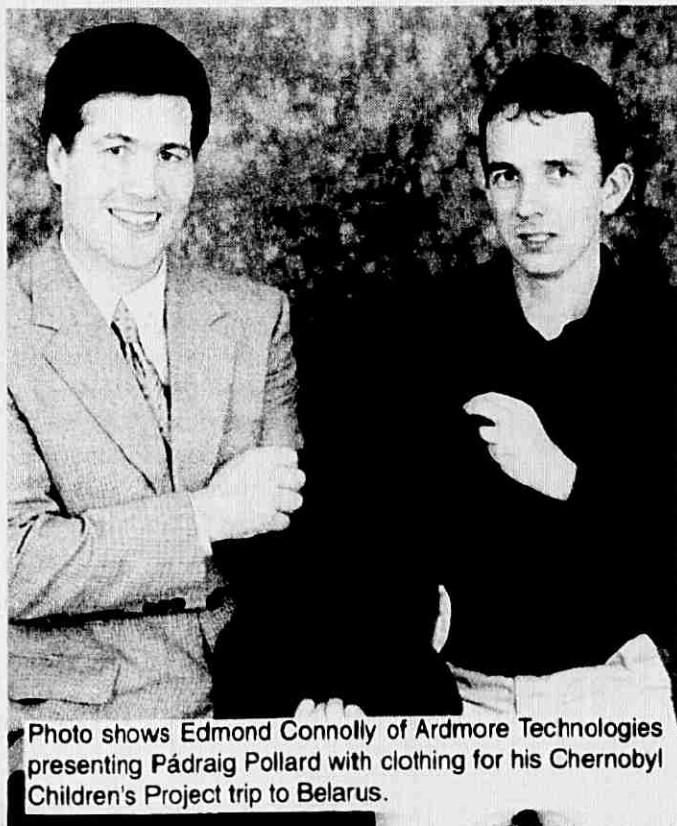

Dungarvan Museum Notes

MEMBERSHIP

This is a reminder that membership fees are now due. Fees are to be paid before the middle of January 2002. Amount due is £10.

NEW PUBLICATION

The museum was presented with a copy of a new publication: "Shipbuilding in Waterford 1820-1882, A Historical, technical and pictorial Study," by Waterford man Bill Irish. The book was officially launched at Waterford Treasures at the Granary in the presence of a large gathering. The book is very attractively produced by Wordwell and extensively illustrated with fascinating pictures. The author introduces the maritime history of Waterford and goes on to discuss the various trades associated with shipbuilding. He describes the influence of the Quaker families on commerce in Waterford.

The first dockland in Ferrybank was built in the early 19th Century by a Quaker, Thomas White. In 1856 they built the largest and finest sailing ship ever constructed in Waterford or possibly Ireland - 'The Merrie England' for a Liverpool merchant. They also built ships for Curran's of Dungarvan, the 'Mary Curran' in 1861 and 'The Island Queen' in 1862, which is featured in our museum display. This ship was involved in the South American trade. During the American Civil war the ship smuggled a consignment to New Orleans where it successfully ran the blockade

The last ship to be built by Whites was for Dungarvan shipowner, Bartholomew Kiely. This was called 'the Kate' (79 tons) and was finished in 1863. The boat was used in coastal and cross-channel trade. There is an entire chapter devoted to the remarkable Malcomson family.

In the introduction the au-

thor gives an extraordinary account of the percentage of ships built in Ireland. According to Lloyd's register of 1776, 40% of Irish built ships were built at Waterford and Dungarvan.

Plaque Unveiled To Memory Of The Men And Women of Co. Waterford Who Served in the Great War of 1914-1918

On Friday evening, 27th November at a moving ceremony in St. Carthage's Protestant Cathedral, Lismore, a plaque was unveiled dedicated to the memory of the men and women of County Waterford who served in the Great War of 1914-1918.

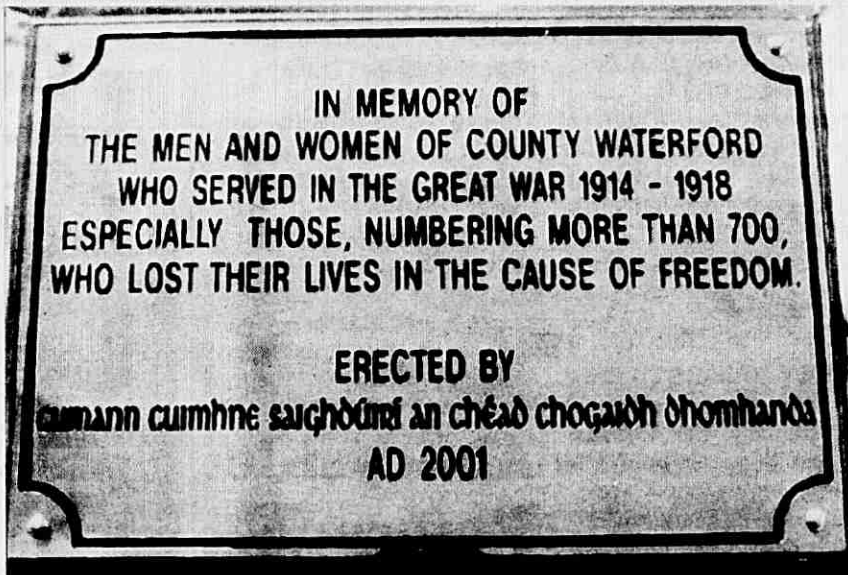
In his introduction to the proceedings, Dr. James Stacey said it was a long-standing ambition of the Cumann to erect this memorial plaque, and it is a sad fact that — to our knowledge — this is the first such recognition of the Waterford people who served so well, only to return home to less than a welcome.

Dr. Stacey then introduced the Very Rev. Mr. William Beare, the Dean of Lismore Cathedral, who thanked everyone present for attending and spoke of his pleasure in hosting the unveiling ceremony.

The congregation present on Friday night were mostly relatives of men who had seen action in W.W.1, and amongst them were James Shine of Abbeyside and Cyril Healy of Ballycoe who both gave a brief address.

James Shine spoke with great feeling of his three half-brothers who had all been killed in action: John during the Retreat from Mons, Hugh at Ypres, and James at Langemark. Although he had not known them, he had grown up with the knowledge of their supreme sacrifice.

Cyril Healy told the congregation of his pride in the memory of his uncle



Sgt. Michael Healy — awarded for gallantry on four different occasions — an incredible record.

Also present was Mr. Sean Murphy, Chairman of the Waterford Branch of the British Legion. He outlined the work done by his organisation in the past and at present on behalf of the families who had served in the forces. Finally, the Very Rev. Dean Beare came forward to commence the memorial service in honour of the men and women of County Waterford who had served in the Great War. This concluded with the congregation joining the Dean in reciting The Lord's Prayer, and Dr. Stacey calling on Sean Murphy to unveil the plaque. Unveiled at the same time was the

recently refurbished Lismore Parish Roll of Honour for 1914-1918 - listing the men of Lismore who lost their lives in the conflict. This had hung in the Cathedral for many years until it was damaged in the 1970's. It has been restored expertly by the Dean himself, and is now displayed alongside the new plaque on the east wall of the chapel of St. Columba, under the very fine bust of 2nd. Lt. Edmund Beecher killed at Bethune in July 1916.

Tea and coffee were provided by staff of the Cathedral, and the evening drew to a close with groups of people chatting together in the nave of the splendid and ancient Cathedral of Lismore.



Private Affordable Housing in County Waterford and the environs of Dungarvan

Under the "Affordable Housing Scheme" houses are made available to eligible applicants at cost price with mortgage finance being provided by Waterford County Council. In order to be eligible for consideration under the scheme, applicants must be:

1. Approved for local authority housing.
2. A local authority tenant or tenant purchaser who wishes to buy a new house and return their present house to the local authority.
3. A tenant of more than one year of a house provided by a voluntary body under the Rental Subsidy Scheme who wishes to buy a new house and return their present house to the voluntary body.
4. In need of housing with an income not exceeding the following:

Single Person Household £25,000
Two Income Household £62,500 if not exceeded by multiplying the principal earner's wage by 2.5 plus the income of the subsidiary (lesser) earner.

The income limit at (4) above does not apply to approved housing applicants, tenants or tenant purchasers of a local authority house or tenants of a voluntary body.

Waterford County Council now wishes to determine the level of interest, if any, for Affordable Housing in the County of Waterford and the environs of Dungarvan, **if such a development were to take place.**

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

Climber With Pretty Colour

THE sweet pea has long been a colourful favourite in gardens the length and breadth of Britain.

But less familiar are its stunning cousins – more than 160 easy-to-grow species of Lathyrus.

Many are on display at the National Lathyrus Collection in Cambridgeshire and up to 40 varieties are available through seed catalogues.

Closely related to culinary peas and lentils, the seeds of the Lathyrus are said to contain a stimulant.

Plants are annual and perennial and love to scramble upwards, often to several feet.

The majority originate from the warmer climates of southern and central Europe – around the Balkans and the Mediterranean – but they grow well in Britain.

Natural habitat ranges from marshy ground, stream sides and water-meadows to rocky slopes and ledges, so hardiness tends to be good although they do not like prolonged cold and wet spells.

They will thrive in any fertile, reasonably well-drained soil in sun or light shade. Garden compost or well-rotted manure added to the soil at planting

time is beneficial as is a low nitrogen fertilizer.

Plenty of water is needed in dry spells and all varieties appreciate support in the form of canes or other plants to scramble over.

Dead-heading will help to extend the flowering period over several weeks.

Propagation of Lathyrus varieties is by seed or division. Seeds can be sown in the autumn in a sheltered place or under cover, or in spring when seeds should be pre-soaked for 24 hours.

Varieties include the subtle pale pink L latifolius (pictured), which flowers from June to September and climbs to two metres. A native of southern Europe, it is now a familiar site in British verges and rail embankments.

There are also spring flowering varieties such as L vernus, the spring pea which grows in clumps and has bright purple flowers from March onwards.

Whatever your personal preference or the needs of your garden, if you want something with the colour and wild excitement of a sweet pea but a little more individual, the Lathyrus genus is certainly worth looking in to.

LATHYRUS INFORMATION

Lathyrus originate from all over the world and are closely related to the sweet pea and culinary pea

There are more than 160 species and 500 sub-species – but around 40 are currently available, mostly through seed catalogues and more adventurous nurseries

Annual and perennial varieties are available, climbing and clumping.

This week in the Garden

PICK AND STORE GRAPES

There is no longer any point in leaving grapes hanging on the vines. If you have a cool, dark and dry room to store them in, do – but they should be picked by now. Cut each bunch with about 23cm of the vine still attached. Put the vine end in a jar of clean water with a charcoal in it making sure the grapes are hanging freely outside the jar.

PRUNE THE VINES

By now the leaves of early or maincrop vines should have started to wilt or fall off. Outdoor vines can be pruned. The method for cutting both back is the same. Cut off the two nearest new shoots to dormant growth buds stemming from the main rod or spur. Tear off or remove all loose bark from the main rods and rub in Gishurst compound, made up of soap and sulphur. It kills bugs and parasites that live in the gnarly parts of the plant. When finished, remove any ties you have keeping the plant upright and lay it as close to parallel to the floor as possible. This will help encourage an even growth.

PLANTS IN FRAMES

From now until early spring, plants kept in frames will require very careful handling. Some, such as rooted viola, pansies, violet cuttings, sweet pea seedlings and violet clumps are quite hardy and only need protection from heavy frosts and beating rain. They also need ventilation. Lights should be placed on the frames when the sun sets. Plants such as pelargoniums, marguerites and choice fuchsias are likely to be damaged by the smallest amount of frost and need to be protected by sacks at night. Remove and burn any yellowing leaves and poke the soil around with a stick to aerate it.

Cauliflower protection

The curds of the cauliflower should be starting to form. To protect them from frost, bend some of the outer leaves over them.

Strong Public Response To Co. Council's Recycling Initiative As Proposed Charges Are Discussed

Waterford County Council says it has received a very favourable response from householders to the kerbside collection of dry recyclable material that began on November 5. Material collected from outside homes across the county in a new specially designated truck is being taken to a Material Recovery Facility (MRF) developed by Samshire Recycling Ltd. in Lismore.

The collections of recyclable materials are currently taking place once every four weeks but given the strong public response to the initiative, they may become fortnightly with the standard wheelie bin collections to take place on the remaining two out of four weeks.

Waterford County Council's Director of Services, Planning and Environment, Denis McCarthy said the local authority was particularly pleased with the response as this is the first time in Ireland that such an ambitious waste reduction project has been introduced across urban and rural areas. "The Council aims to cut the level of domestic or household waste being brought to the landfill sites at Dungarvan and Tramore by 35%. Domestic waste in County Waterford each year currently

amounts to 15,000 tonnes - posing a major disposal challenge to the local authority.

"In our first week with the new scheme in place, our crew in West Waterford collected an average of about 3 tonnes per day of dry recyclable materials. Then, on the first day of operations in Tramore - where there is obviously a far higher density of households - the team there collected seven tonnes while the average for the remainder of the East Waterford week was four tonnes per day.

"With the scheme operating for the first time in the Dungarvan Urban District Council administrative area this week, it is perhaps worth reminding householders what exactly can be placed in the clear plastic sacks that are currently in use. The type of materials that we are interested in include cardboard, newspapers, magazines, washed milk and juice cartons as well as all types of plastic including bottles, drink cans and food tins.

"If we are to reduce our traditional dependency on often unsightly landfill sites, recycling and waste reduction are of immense importance. We feel that this initiative is providing householders in County Waterford with a concrete opportunity to make a valu-

able contribution to environmental protection in their own area and it has been very heartening to see so many people availing of the opportunity." Mr McCarthy concluded.

Meanwhile, members of Waterford County Council are being asked to ratify proposals as part of the 2002 Estimates that would see charges for wheelie bin collections increase to 6 (IR£4.73) from January 1, 2002 and a charge of 3 (IR£2.36) introduced for the collection of dry recyclable materials.

"While we are always very conscious of the need to deliver value-for-money to our customers, it is clear that an increase in refuse collection charges is necessary as the cost of delivering our services continues to rise. We have striven to minimise the increase and estimate that over a 12-month period most householders will find that they are not actually spend-

ing any more on this service. Rather, they will reduce the amount of waste they place in their wheelie bins and so cut the number of times their bin needs to be collected in any particular month," remarked County Manager, Donal Connolly.

"We obviously hope that the 3 (IR£2.36) differential between the cost of a standard wheelie bin collection and the collection of dry recyclable materials will act as a further incentive to householders to maximise the portion of their household waste that they put forward for recycling. The response to the scheme to date has been very encouraging but it is vital that we build in 2002 on the solid foundations now being put in place," added Mr Connolly.

MESSAGE TO

LANDOWNERS / OCCUPIERS

Owners or occupiers of land are obliged under the Roads Act, 1993, to take all, necessary care to ensure that trees, shrubs, hedges or any other vegetation on their land is not, or could not be a danger to those using a public road or to somebody carrying out maintenance or improvement work on the road.

HEDGE MAINTENANCE

Where labour is available the most friendly method of hedge maintenance is by hand tools:

- A reciprocation cutting bar is very suitable for hedges which are in good condition.
- A flail cutter is suitable for hedge growth of not more than 2-3 years and has the added advantage of mulching the cut materials. A flail cutter should never be used on heavy, woody growth.
- A circular saw should be used on heavy growth and is ideal for shaping up overgrown hedges.

THE BEST TIME TO CUT

- Trim during winter to fill slack periods of farm work.
- Avoid disturbing nesting birds by not trimming during Spring or early Summer, Autumn trimming can destroy birds winter food supplies.
- Trimming can take place from September to February with minimum wildlife disturbance.

Where a landowner/occupier fails to meet his/her obligation under the Roads Act 1993, a Notice will be served by Waterford County Council requiring him/her to take whatever remedial action is considered necessary to ensure public safety. Remedial action may range from felling to trimming, lopping of branches or preservation. It is an offence not to comply with the terms of such a Notice. If you have not already done so, it is in your own interest to attend to hedge trimming on public roads immediately.

THREE WORLD RECORDS FOR CLASHMORE MAN

Three world records for Clashmore man Eddie Mulcahy at the Hibernian Games held in Castleisland over the weekend of October 20/21. When 18 of the best throwers from Ireland, England and Germany took part. The records broken were ones created by the man himself at Rochester, Kent last year and again improved on all this year on his own home ground of Castleisland competing in over 65 category he holds the world record of the 56lbs distance 6.45 metres and the 56lbs height he holds at 3.58 metres. He threw with the 35lbs for distance landed on new ground 8.19 metres and continued to throw the 35lbs 4.55 metres for height and would have done better had the bar not been at its limit skyward. AWARD WINNERS ANNOUNCED

At a very well attended seminar in Dungarvan last week David and Nora Fitzgerald, Newtown, Modeligo and Robert Power, Ballyhussa, Kilmacthomas were presented with the County Waterford Good Farming Practice Award 2001 in the dairy and drystock/tillage categories respectively. The award was promoted by IFI, Glanbia, ICMSA and Teagasc and was presented by Dr. Patrick Wall, Chief Executive of the Food Safety Authority.

Doctor Wall explained why traceability is so important to consumers now and how this requirement is being driven very strongly by the major supermarket chains. He gave examples of how partnerships have been developed between processors and the supermarkets to the benefit of both and suggested that the way forward in the future was for partnerships between farmers and processors.

John O'Sullivan, Senior Executive Engineer with Waterford Co. Council spoke of how the ground water quality, in terms of Nitrate levels is deteriorating in Co. Waterford. He suggested that a significant contributory factor is the spreading of slurry at a time when the crop cannot absorb the nitrates present. November and December are two critical months in this regard and slurry should not be spread at this time.

Brian Hilliard, Teagasc Adviser presented a slide show of the winning farms and there is no doubt that both farms were truly worthy of the recognition that they have received.

Dairying: CONDITION SCORE COWS AND HEIFERS

Why? Cows and heifers should be fed with due regard to their body condition. Thin cows at calving will have lower peak milk yields, lower animal yields, slower to come bulling (1 score results in a 12 day delay), lower conception rates etc. Fat cows at calving, a condition score (C.S.) of 3.8+, will have lower dry matter intakes for 7 to 14 days before calving and 1.5 to 2 Kgs less dry matter intake after calving. She now loses too much body condition which brings massive health problems, mainly fatty liver syndrome.

Fatty Liver Syndrome

Results when the cow is losing weight because body fat broken down to meet milk demands. This releases free fatty acids and they have to be converted in the liver.

When too much fatty acids are released the liver cannot keep pace resulting in the liver becoming too fat and this results in the following health problems:

Milk Fever, Ketosis, displaced abomasum, mastitis late ovulation, cystic ovaries, retained placenta, and depressed production.

She will peak earlier in milk yield but will not be able to sustain her yield.

A cow losing too much weight after calving will:

Have milk high in fat and low in protein for the first month of the lactation.

For the next month fat % will drop steeply and protein remain depressed. That is because body fat reserves have been depleted and the cow needs to take up all the energy from the ration.

Cows must calve down between 3 and 3.5 body score. Ideally they should be that at drying off.

If they are not they will have to be fed to gain extra weight.

Be careful not to over feed cows with a C.S. of 3.3 to 3.5 during the dry period.

If they are on 68%+ DMD silage, restrict them to 8 Kgs D.M. (40 Kgs fresh weight) per day.

Each condition score is 50 Kgs.

So a cow that is now 2.5 C.S. has to gain an extra 50 Kgs over the dry period say 8 weeks.

Therefore, she has to gain 0.8 Kgs extra weight per day. This will require the feeding of 1-2 Kgs of meal per day during the dry period with 68 to 70% DMD silage.

Cow condition should be scored every 4 weeks.

- This helps to confirm the progress being made with feeding.

Cows and heifers must now be divided up into fat, thin and correct condition cows.

Farmers frown on this advice but if we are to overcome the problems stated above then we must.

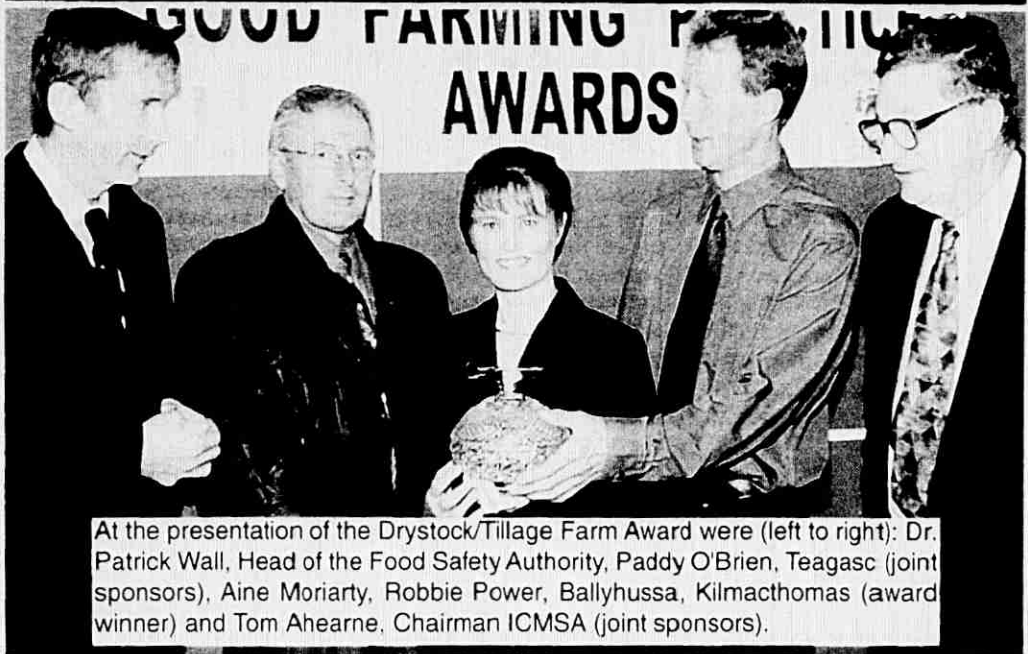

Glanbia Farm Awards

The inaugural Co. Waterford Good Farming Practice Awards were presented recently at a seminar in Dungarvan. The awards which are promoted by I.F.I. The awards were presented to two farmers who were judged to be following best practice in the areas of nutrient management and farm safety. When choosing the winners the judges also placed special emphasis on farms that had a good overall appearance and were pleasant places to work in and produce quality food.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES REQUIRED TO REPS SCHEME

"To date there are approximately 15,000 less farmers in REPS compared to the old scheme, leading to an under spending of about £57m of Government and EU funding. If ever there was proof for the need of a fundamental review of the Scheme to prevent farmers throughout the country turning their backs on REPS because of the excessive bureaucracy, this is it," said Mr. John O'Connor, Chairperson of ICMSA's Farm Services & Environment Committee.

ICMSA has proposed to the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Development that the REPS payments be increased to £100 per acre for the first fifty acres and £50 per acre on the next fifty acres. If this proposal is adopted, it will mean that a farmer on fifty acres would receive a payment of £5,000 per annum and a farmer on 100 acres would receive a payment of £7,500 per annum. Mr. O'Connor said: "This proposal would significantly increase the attractiveness of the Scheme for farmers and would have consequent benefits for the rural environment. Such a payment is needed to compensate farmers for the level of official procedure they must comply with".

ICMSA also believe that changes are required to the rules of the scheme to increase farmer participation in the Scheme. The ICMSA proposals would make REPS equally attractive to medium and large scale as well as small-scale farmers. With regard to small-scale farmers, there is at present 70,000 farmers under 50 acres; participation by this group in REPS is relatively low. The Associations proposal, if adopted, would address this problem.

"The Department must strive to develop Schemes such as REPS 2 and continue to work towards profitable and sustainable farming," Mr. O'Connor concluded.

DAIRY EXPORT REFUNDS MUST BE INCREASED

MANY CO-OPS HOLD MILK PRICE FOR OCTOBER

IFA National Dairy Committee Chairman Padraig Walsh has welcomed the decision by Glanbia, Town of Monaghan, Lakeland, the four West Cork Co-ops, Wexford and Arrabawn, to hold their price for milk delivered in October.

While acknowledging the current pressure on market returns for the main commodities, he said trade in SMP and Butter was seasonally quite low this time of year, as were volumes of milk produced, and called on co-ops to hold their nerve until Spring, at which point a more accurate reading of market trends can be taken. He also called on Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to insist on the urgent restoration of SMP export refunds.

"Many co-ops have winter milk commitments, and reviewing prices this time of year could have a disastrous impact

on winter producers. It would also exaggerate our seasonality curve, and create further peak-time capacity problems," Padraig Walsh said.

"Much of the weakness in commodity markets, especially skimmed milk powder, is due to the low level of export trade, which itself has been drastically affected by the absence of export refunds since July last," he added.

"Dairy export refunds are to be reviewed by the Commission at the meeting later this week of its Dairy Management Committee. This meeting is to be attended by representatives of the Department of Agriculture, and I call on Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh and his officials to insist on the urgent restoration of SMP export refunds, and the review of other dairy refunds, to improve market outlook going forward," he concluded.

TALLOW NOTES

Lismore Presentation Secondary School Notes

FIRST AID "A Breath of Life for T.Y"

The transition years of 2001 have just completed their twelve-hour module involving first aid. These skills were taught to them by Ann Tobin in their classroom every Monday. They learned what to do in a situation if someone was either injured or drowning. These situations are easily handled if you are taught what to do, and how to do it properly. In the twelve hours the students learned how to make a bandage and how to fit one to certain parts of the body. They learned to look for certain conditions e.g. symptoms such as shock, pneumonia etc. how to treat these ailments and how to perform C.P.R.

CAR MAINTENANCE

The transition years have completed their course on car maintenance. In this course the students of Lismore Presentation Secondary School learned simple but interesting and important facts about having a car. These lessons took place every Tuesday afternoon in Maurice Dunne's garage. On their first afternoon the class learned how to change a tyre. However, if you have a private pension it could mean the difference between having a basic amount of money to live on, to being able to afford a better standard of living and living a fuller life.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Question: I believe it is possible to get employment under the Social Economy Programme. Could you please give details on the type of work available and who is eligible?

Answer: The Social Economy Programme, which is operated by FAS, was launched in September 2000. It aims to support the development of social economy enterprises that benefit the economic and social regeneration of communities. Funding for the development of business plans, employee grants and other costs is available to enterprises that deliver services into disadvantaged communities and create job opportunities for long-term unemployed people. The enterprises are in a wide variety of services including community childcare, community waste services, community media, estate management, transport for the disabled, care for the elderly, traveller persons services, environment and landscaping services.

The Social Economy Programme provides support for up to three years for the employment of the long-term unemployed, people with disabilities, members of the traveller community and other disadvantaged persons. The eligibility criteria for grant supported employees is broadly the same as the eligibility criteria for the Community Employment Part-time Job Option.

Time spent on Community Employment, Job Initiative, a recognised training course or time spent in prison can count as part of the eligibility period. Ex-offenders need not be signing on the Live Register at time of recruitment. Casual workdays of up to 90 days, in the previous three years are allowed.

The work may be full or part-time and grant supported employees may be eligible for Family Income Supplement. Further information is available from your local FAS office and the Citizens Information Centre below.

Loan For Lismore Housing Development Approved

A loan for Cluid housing association who intend to build 14 houses and a community building at Fairfield, Lismore has been approved by Councillors.

The loan will come to the tune of £1,454,785 and will be repayable half yearly over a 30 year period with the condition attached that 75% of the dwellings are let to approved applicants for Local Authority housing.

A rental subsidy £320 per house will be paid to Cluid each year to enable them to meet the maintenance and management costs of the accommodation provided under the rental subsidy scheme. The full amount of the loan charges and subsidy will be recouped by the Dept. of the Environment.

Before the dwellings to be built under the scheme are let, Cluid must obtain

the approval of the council to the granting of each tenancy for which rental subsidy is sought. The same will apply to a change of tenants.

To fund the loan to Cluid it will be necessary to borrow a similar amount from the Housing Finance Agency. A proposal to borrow a sum of £1,454,785 from the Housing Agency is now being submitted to the council for approval.

The project was welcomed by Cllr. Willie McDonnell who said "it's great to see so many houses going up in any town and Lismore is doing exceptionally well. But we would all like to see other towns doing equally well".

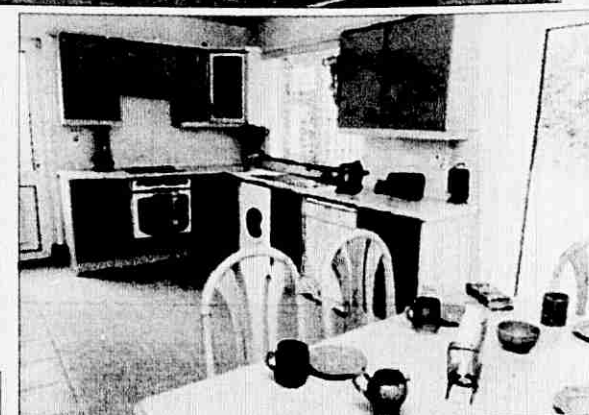

STRIKE AT HOSPITAL SUSPENDED

Any further industrial action by non-nursing staff at Saint Joseph's Hospital in Clonmel has been suspended by SIPTU following the latest commitment by the South Eastern Health Board to provide an additional fifteen acute medical beds by Monday 10th December. Those beds will be located in Saint Anthony's Unit on the Clonmel Healthcare Campus, a facility which the SEHB had planned to close down earlier this year. The SEHB and unions had been locked in negotiations for a number of months to agree on the date for the provision of the extra beds. The Union will hold the board to its commitment to provide these beds on the due date. There are a number of issues that still need to be ironed out but there will be close communication between unions and the SEHB before December 10th said Nicholas Parker Branch Secretary SIPTU. A threatened strike planned for last Tuesday has been called off after the SEHB's announcement of the date for extra beds. GP's have come out in support of the staff at Saint Joseph's and they have accused the SEHB of being too slow to act on the overcrowding. Former SEHB Chairman Cllr. Jackie Fahy said that he was disappointed at the adverse publicity generated by the industrial dispute in Clonmel. The Board he said must push ahead with its expansion plans for the hospital, and staff and patients will experience a certain amount of inconvenience. You can't have omelettes without breaking eggs, he said.

RESIDENTS OF BALLYBACON INTIMIDATED BY TRAVELLERS

South Tipperary members of the County Council have called for Government legislation to stop travellers and casual traders from camping in public areas, like beside Ballybacon Parish Church last summer. The travellers beside Ballybacon Parish Church had caravans, mobile homes, vans and on one day I counted 27 dogs and seven horses, they had gates, chainsaws, jack hammers and compressors thrown around every where claimed Councillor Mattie Maguire, he proposed at the November monthly meeting that the County Council formulate a policy to deal with the large scale and long term camping of traders, travellers and their animals on public and private property. They have obstructed people on their way to Mass, they obstructed people going about their own business. They created a public annoyance and a public nuisance. The County Council impounded their horses and they didn't even look for them back added Cllr. Maguire. They don't care about the gardai, they don't care about the Council. They haven't respect for anybody and they're giving all travellers a bad name. "I condemn people who buy goods off them because it might seem a bargain now, but there's a high price to pay in the long run", he concluded. Cllr. Matty McGrath, Newcastle added that the travellers spilled 40 gallons of high toxic, material on the public road in September and it had to be cleaned up by the County Council on the National Day of Mourning, September 14th.

I ASKED THE QUESTION

In Abbeyside Topics dated 5th October 2001 I posed the question if anyone knew how long "The Poor Man's Seat" was placed in its present location for the first time.

In the Parish Newsletter for November the Chairman of the Abbeyside Archive responded and attempted to put a time-frame on the question that was asked. The Newsletter refers to sections of a letter written in 1969 by Michael Burke of Yonkers, New York to his sister Crissie Allridge in London.

"My dear Cis Criss, hold a gathering of the Clan, come August. I love to meet up with ye there, but I guess I'm a little on the old side now. I'd hardly make from Ally Griffin's (a pub in Abbeyside) to the poor man's chair, much less hike with Ann Burke Butfoy from Ally's Corner to Mickey Devine's up at Kilgobnet".

Michael and Crissie lived in Slate Lane. Michael was born on the 25th May 1894 and emigrated to America in 1919. It is obvious from his comments that the Poor Man's Chair was in existence before he left.

This is very interesting material and local history like this should be written down, published and so preserved for future generations.

Other References

The Parish Newsletter for November also refers to the book 'Fifty Years of Abbeyside Scouting' which includes an excellent article by elder statesman of the village and Chairman of the Abbeyside Archive - Mr. Seamus O'Brien. He refers to the "Poorman's Chair" as being one of the prominent landmarks in the sparsely populated village of Abbeyside, and an extract from his article reads as follows:

"The Chair" as it was sometimes called, served as a resting place for shoppers en route from "Town" and men who were homeward-bound from Ally Griffin's, Lar Condon's, Minnie Fitzgerald's or Paddy O'Connor's pubs rested there while taking their "bearings" before proceeding south or eastwards, depending on which side of the village they lived. Before this period the area was famous as an assembly point for sailors and boatmen and many of the yarns told and retold there have lived on as classic stories of the cruel seas.

Now and again a sort of tribal warfare would erupt between the people in the different areas and the issues in contention would be settled with a sod-fight down the railway bank. Occasionally, a passenger or good train passing along the line between the fighting factions would add a touch of realism to the battle.

The above extract is proof that the "Chair" or "Seat" was in situ during the 1930's.

LOCAL HISTORY

The last visit of an Earl of Desmond to Dungarvan town was at the end of 1579. Sir Garret Fitzgerald of Dromana arrived with a large force to assert his authority in what he regarded as his territory. An army of 100 horse and 400 foot was sent to hinder Desmond but it failed to do so. It may have been at this time that Desmond recruited men from the town to fight in his service, some of whose names will be mentioned further. Already, four years earlier the Earl Garret had come to meet the Lord Deputy, Sir Henry Sidney, in the town. At that time Desmond pledged loyalty to the queen and promised to restrain male factors and rebels throughout his estates. It did nothing to halt the rebellion that was provoked and exacerbated by the incursions of government troops into Desmond territory to destroy the powerful earl in the years up to 1583.

The Desmond Rebellion

This great Desmond rebellion caused serious food shortages in Munster. In parts of Counties Limerick and Cork there was famine as the government forces destroyed all the crops and ravaged the countryside. On 10th September 1582 the captain of Dungarvan Castle, Anthony Deering, was authorised to transport grain to victual the town and the surrounding countryside, where a sufficiency of grain had not been produced. There was a severe manpower shortage also because of those men who had left the town to join the Desmond forces. When the harvest time came in many places elsewhere in Munster, there was no grain to harvest. The scorched earth method of reducing the Desmond rebellion had been too successful.

The great Desmond rebellion in Munster collapsed in 1583 and the Earl was murdered in County Kerry.

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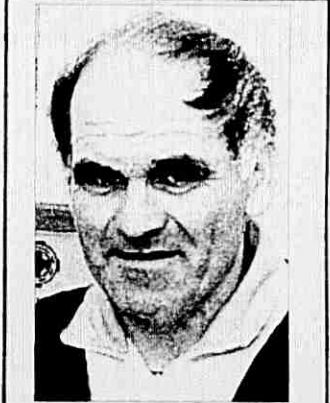

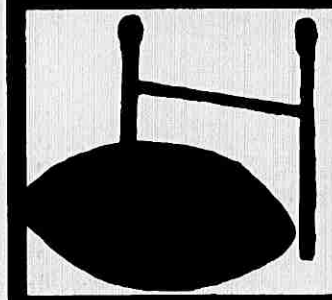

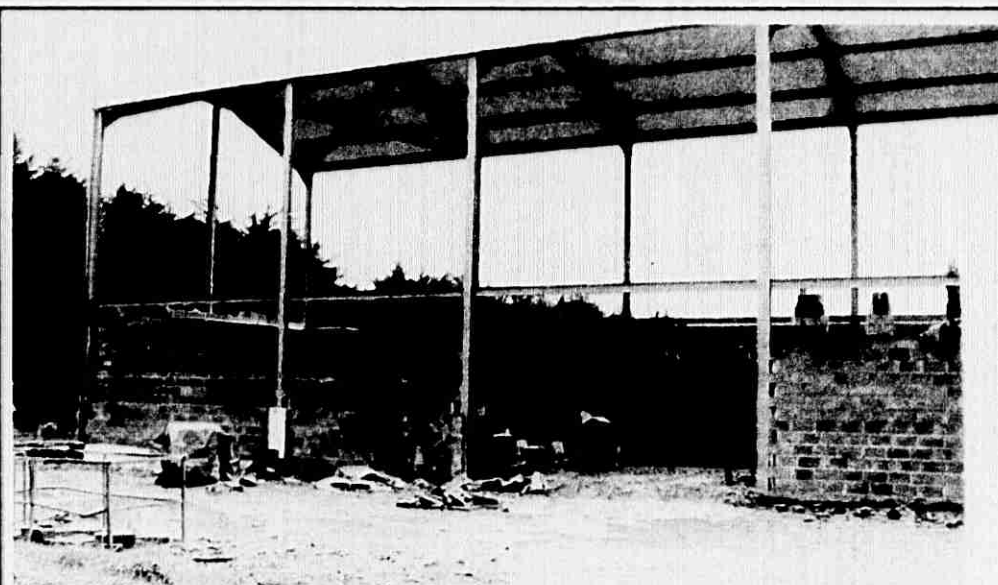

The Friary/Abbeyside/Ballinacourty Handball Club which caters for 160 Juvenile members, embarked on a major project on January 5th 2001 to provide a modern 60 x 30 Championship Handball Alley for Club and County. The Club itself only came into being in 1992 and in the intervening years has enjoyed spectacular success due in large measure to the vision, leadership and outstanding commitment of Bro. Finbar Spring O.S.A. It is now widely regarded as one of the most progressive handball Clubs in Ireland, particularly at Juvenile level and it has a noteworthy list of achievements to its credit.

8 individual holders of All-Ireland Championship medals in the Club.

26 Munster Championship Titles - 14 Munster College Titles.

2 All-Ireland winning teams.

2 All-Ireland College Title holders.

Played host for National Feile Na nGael Competitions 1996 and 1997.

Hosted European One Wall Championships 1999.

Hosted National Coaching Seminar 1999.

Club members selected as finalists for the Garda Pat Noctor Supreme Sports Star Award 97/98/99/2000.

1997 Club member selected as Handball's National Official of the Year.

February 2000 Park Hotel, sponsored Waterford Sports Award recipients.

December 2000, 2 Club members selected for Irish Team.

While the achievements listed may seem impressive, the development of the traditional 60 x 30 Handball game has been severely hampered by the lack of a Championship Court within County Waterford. This shortcoming imposed hardship in that juveniles had to be regularly transported to venues such as Clonmel, Ballyporeen and Cashel for training and Championship matches and always having to cede home venue to opposing teams.

Arising out of a most generous offer of a site by the Augustinian Order in Ireland, through the College Augustinian Community, a special meeting of the Club and supporters as well as representatives of other handball clubs within the County took place on 5th January 2001 in the existing 40x20 Handball Court. Decisions were taken and as a result a Project Management Committee was appointed under the Chairmanship of Ray Mc Andrew Ballinroad, to plan, fund and deliver a modern Championship hand-

ball alley. The following agreed to serve on the Project Management Committee:

Ray Mc Andrew Chairman, Michael Cass Vice Chairman, Pat Devereux Secretary, Bernie Keane Treasurer, Michael Hanrahan, P.J. Kindregan, Nancy Foley, Marie Fives, Bro. Finbar Spring O.S.A., Eddie Fitzpatrick and Pat Flynn.

The Project Management Committee has been working hard to achieve its brief and substantial progress has been made. The new handball alley with all its related facilities, including the provision of 3 one wall alleys, will cost £235,000. In seeking to progress matters, the Project Management Committee have been most impressed by the good will and ready assistance that has been forthcoming towards the project from various agencies and organisations both from within and outside the County. £100,000 of National Lottery funding has been allocated to this project by the Government and our Local Authority and Waterford GAA County Board have also given financial backing towards the project. Limited fundraising undertaken within the County to date has met with a very positive response and this is very much appreciated. As matters stand 2/3rds of the total cost has been raised. The building itself is progressing well and the confident expectation is that the 2002 handball season will see Waterford players practising and representing their County and hopefully achieving success at this new venue.

The Club itself is quietly confident that it will be selected to host the World One Wall Championships, part of the larger World Handball Championships destined to the held in Ireland in 2003 and the achievement of this would be a tremendous coup for not alone the Club but Waterford County.

A special information meeting open to all members of the public has been scheduled for next Friday night 23/11/01 at 8 pm in the 40 x 20 Handball Alley at St. Augustine's College. A full briefing will be given on progress to date and support sought for the final push to secure what will be a long lasting and most valuable asset for the Friary/Abbeyside/Ballinacourty Handball Club and Waterford County, a facility that potentially can cater for large numbers of players in decades to come, certainly if current interest is sustained and built upon. Thrilling U-21 'B' Hurling Final

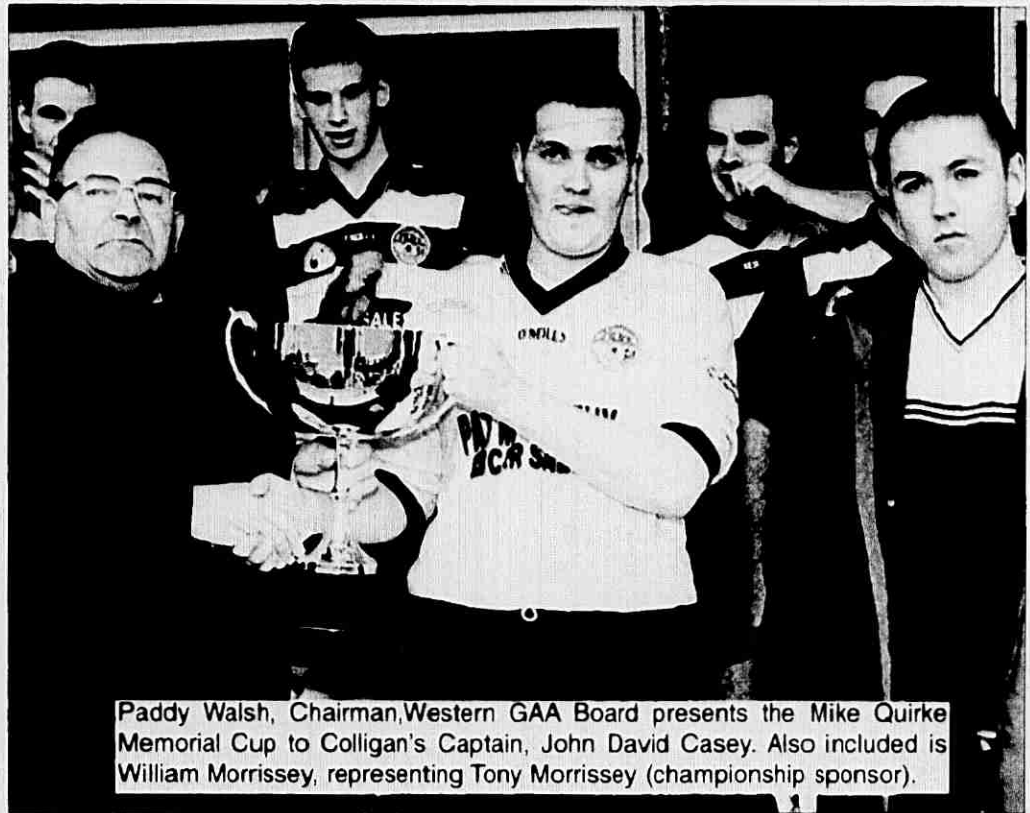
COLLIGAN 0-10 AN GAELTACHT 1-6

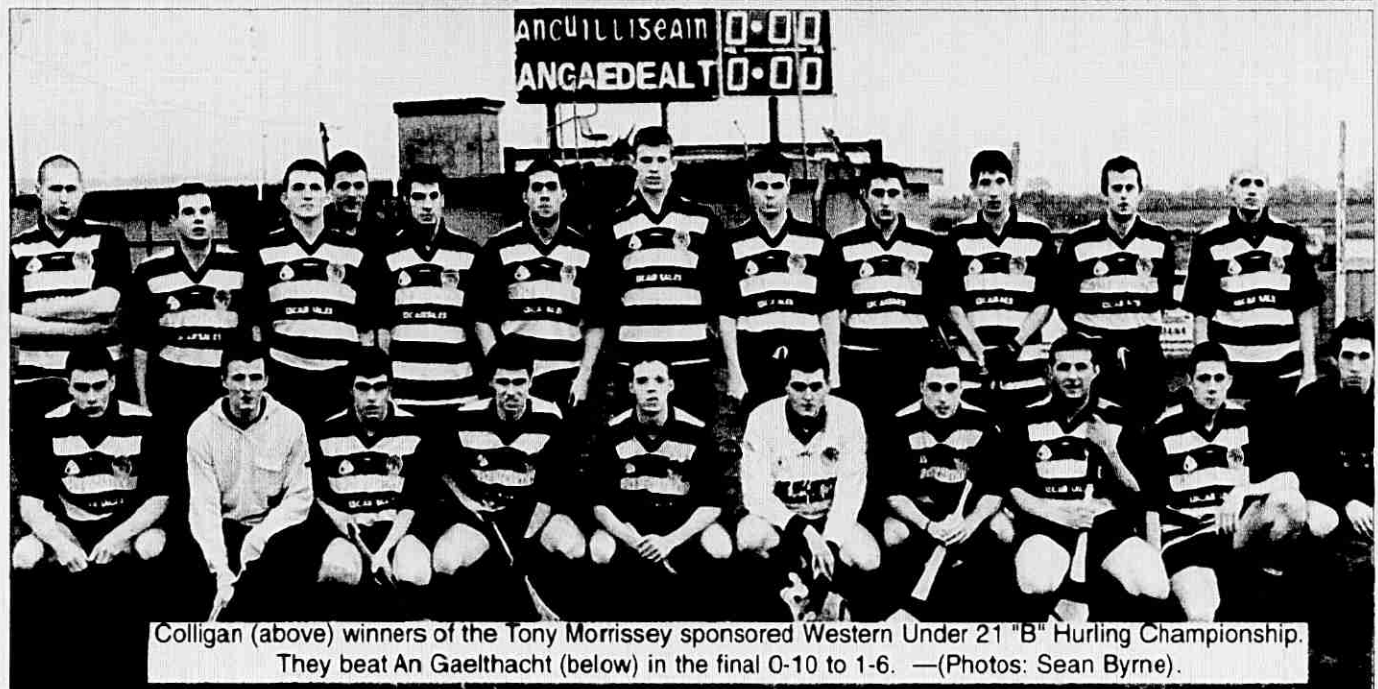
At half time only a single point separated the teams with Colligan leading 0-6 to 1-2.

MUNSTER CLUB HURLING SEMI-FINAL

Ballygunner and Toomevara Break Even In Thriller

BALLYGUNNER 0-12 TOOMEVARA 1-9

An explosive start that gave the Tipperary champions a 4 points lead within a minute of the opening rocked Ballygunner whose defence was run ragged for the John O'Brien goal that found the Waterford net after just 22 seconds of the throw in. It gave Ballygunner a lot of 'catching-up' to do and stopped them from ever hitting the front in this splendidly contested and tremendously exciting semi-final played at the Tipperary headquarters.

This early 4 points lead was matched to some extent by Ballygunner's great finish in which Toomevara were constantly on the defensive and unable to respond to the four scores all hit from frees by the accurate Paul Flynn in the closing eleven minutes.

Being kept scoreless for the final 17 minutes was a new, and, I suppose, a disappointing experience for the Tipperary champions, who seven days previously had won their 4th county senior hurling title in a row.

It will be recalled as a game in which each side lost scoring chances and in this regard, Ballygunner's brilliant keeper Ray Whitty denied Toomevara a couple of scores that seemed to have 'goal' written all over them. It was the Waterford champions who failed to make maximum use of the several splendid scoring chances, particularly towards the finish. Full forward Paul Foley got possession on a number of occasions but on each occasion he was smothered

away from any kind of freedom that would have allowed him to score or pass the ball.

In the overall, it did seem that Ballygunner were the unlucky side as they did have far more scoring chances towards the end of the game, which was enjoyed by a crowd of 5,340.

They both have it all to play for and must meet again to replay the game at Walsh Park on Saturday next to decide which club goes forward to play Blackrock in the Munster final on the following Sunday.

PLAY

The game opened with the 22 seconds goal being scored by young John O'Brien who broke through unmarked. It was followed with a Tommy Dunne point and strange to relate, this was the Tipperary team captain's only score of the game.

These early scores might have rocked the Gunners, but within minutes they had recovered their composure and hit back for points from frees in the 6th and 7th minutes by Paul Flynn.

Kenny Dunne and John O'Brien had points for Toomevara and the challengers responded with scores by team captain Billy O'Sullivan and Paul Flynn (free).

Ballygunner were now defending very well with centre back Fergal Hartley showing splendid leadership in the half line. Kenny Dunne hit two frees over to end their first half scoring before the Gunners came back for points by Mick Mahony, a great score from play and

two converted frees by Paul Flynn to leave the half time score at 1-5 to 0-7 in favour of the Tipp, champions.

SECOND HALF

A great score from play by Paul Flynn brought the teams level in the 33rd minute, but after this, and for the next 12 minutes, Toomevara took control and scored four times without reply.

Brian Duff scored a splendid point from play and this was followed with a great point by Kenny Dunne (also from play), before the same player hit over twice from placed balls. Dunne's 45th minute point was his sixth and his club's final score of the match.

The final quarter saw the Waterford champions do most of the attacking with Flynn scoring four points from frees and keeping the home team under severe pressure.

They were left to do it all over again on Saturday next.

By a majority of over 5 to 1, Rule 21, which has been in the Official Guide for a century, was removed at the Special Congress in Dublin on Saturday. Five of the Ulster counties spoke and voted against the motion which had been moved by the Association President Sean McCague.

By decision of the County Board in Dungarvan on Friday night, the Waterford delegates, Seamus Grant, Paddy Walsh, Anthony Walsh, Paddy Dunphy, Denis Hanrahan and John O'Leary, voted for the abolition as did the Central Council Delegate, S. O'Brien. It took the 301 delegates less than one hour to decide the issue.

NEW BOOKS

A number of GAA books have come on the market in recent weeks and a few more are due out before Christmas.

Kerry legend, Paudie O'Shea went on the Late Late Show to launch his biography three weeks ago. It was a surprise to many people to see him being entertained on a show which is not particularly in love with the promotion of anything connected with Gaelic games.

Some months ago I was amused to read on the Hogan Stand magazine that "If Jack Charlton's dog came to Dublin, Pat Kenny would have him on the Late Late Show. (Our Tallow GAA correspondent must have missed that one!)"

Ger Loughnane's book, "Under the Banner" is certainly causing something of a furore at the moment and many of the people who are named in the book are unhappy about the references made to them.

One of the major revelations in the book is that in the past seven years or so, there was only one hurling manager in Munster. The others, although high profile people, were 'flawed' in some respect. The great Ger was lord and master of every situation. Neither was his criticism confined to Munster and people in high places as well as sections of the media were not spared. Readers were also treated to an account of how things were in the Banner county before the arrival of the "messiah."

The Mount Sion story, which will be launched on Saturday night, will be eagerly looked forward to by readers of Gaelic activity, inside and outside the county.

Training tips - Weight control, performance.

Your weight is not that important. You need to know how much of you is muscle, how much is fat. Recording your weight does not tell you anything about the ratio of fat to lean muscle. Many riders actually gain weight when they start training, because muscular tissue is heavier than fatty tissue, and as you train you tend to exchange fat for muscle. As a result you could feel fitter, even look thinner, but weigh more. But it is difficult to assess your body fat levels without expensive tests; optimum weight in an individual matter, reducing your weight below your optimum can lead to loss of strength.

An effective weight is one with a healthy water balance, optimum muscle mass, and no excess body fat (although some body fat is essential to protect the vital organs and energy reserve). If these are out of balance you will experience a drop in your performance. You will find your own individual racing weight, the one at which you perform the best, from experience.

It's quite normal to put on weight during the off season, and provided the increase is not too great this variation can sometimes help the body to recover from the ravages of racing.

Final score Dungarvan 3 Ferrybank 1.

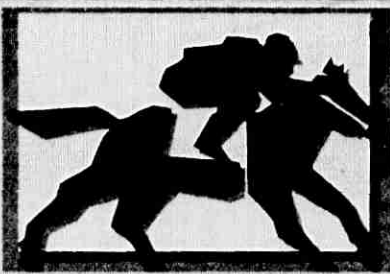

25TH ANNIVERSARY OF WATERFORD'S FIRST INTER COUNTY TEAM TITLE

Decies Day As Waterford's Runners Come of Age



An inspired performance by thirteen Decies runners lifted Waterford from the doldrums of athletics to the pinnacle of success when they won their first ever Irish Senior Cross Country team title at Ennis (1971). Gerry Deegan, second in last year's championship, ran the race of his life, leaving a string of Internationals in his wake as he surged to an incredible victory over the grueling 7 1/2 miles course. Waterford, with four men in the first six home, landed the General O'Duffy Perpetual Cup for the first time with a 65 points total, ousting the holders, mighty Cork, who amassed 102 points.

Deegan was always up with the huge field of almost 200 runners and he made his move with three miles to go. Entering the final mile he was ten seconds clear and he increased his advantage in the last lap to over one hundred yards with Limerick's Niall Cusack, winner of the Boston Marathon two years previously, in second spot.

Eighteen year old John Treacy, running over 7 1/2 miles for the first time finished third, his older brother Ray finished fourth and Tony Ryan finished sixth. All four Waterford runners are under 21 years of age. Roger Barron a product of the Waterford County Board Novice Cross Country leagues finished a very supportive 14th and Tramore born Mick Cullen, the veteran of the Waterford side at 30 years old proved himself a hero by filling the vital sixth scoring place in 37th position. Afterwards Cullen, who knew his county's hopes of the coveted team title rested on him said "I was afraid to stop running". Sunday was a just reward for a runner whose allegiance was always to his native county.

Cork, the holders, were never in with a chance as the Waterford men set about their task in a positive manner. After a mile, five of the white vested Decies' runners had managed to secure positions in the leading dozen

and thereafter ran as if their lives depended on the outcome.

The rest of the Waterford team were part of what was an all out team effort and the contribution of Robbie Walsh, Davy Browne, Tom Jordan, Paddy Fitzgerald, Richie Wallace and Joe Kelly will always be valued. The team selectors were Fr. Michael Enright, Jim Fitzgerald (Kinsalebeg) and Martin Halley (Waterford).

In attendance of Sunday were Co. Board Chairman Paddy Byrne and Co. Secretary Fintan Walsh who had moulded this team effort by introducing an underage policy in the county when BLE was formed in 1967. They organised the county's U-14 team that won the All Ireland Cross Country team title in 1969, Waterford's first team title ever and every year at under age level they and others furthered the cause of Waterford athletics, culminating in winning the Irish Senior "B" title last year and now the big one - the Irish Senior "A" title from the cream of Irish athletics.

The final contest of the night saw the Gavin Holman owned Tiernan Chun (Shanless Slippy-Cloondachun) run riot over the opposition in an excellent winning return of 29.06. Active Ocean showed up well to the first corner but coming away from the second turn Tiernan Chun had edged his way to the head of affairs. It proved all so easy for the leader from that point on as he powered clear for a five and a quarter lengths victory over Active Ocean.

The early paced Premiere Game appeared all set to make a winning debut in the first of two novice contests moving into a healthy lead on the back stretch from the chasing pack but with the leader tiring on the run to the winning line Ian Seymour's always prominent Gulliver Travels (Vintage Prince-Free Dreams) 6/4 stayed on best to record a half a length win over Premiere Game with Nabs Head Girl a short head further back in third spot.

The well bred Torbal Pate (Top Honcho-Genotin Laura) owned locally by Greyhound transporter John Croke was backed as if defeat was out of the question in the second novice event and going to traps as the 1/2 favourite "Torbal" recovered well from a moderate break as the fast starting Rightful Best made his bid to lead around the opening turn. It was the favourite however who produced that extra injection of pace to lead out of the first bend from Vigilant John and although Rightful Best rallied in the closing stages there was no catching Torbal Pate who went on to score by three and a half lengths in 29.61.

With the fancied Grove Ryan Lass losing her place around the opening turn in the fifth the John Murphy owned and Perry Aylward trained Ballybray Trade (Trade Exchange-Ballybray Sandie) 3/1 grabbed a first bend lead from Nice Nancy to motor clear for an easy three lengths win in a career best 29.40.

The vastly experienced Kilkuane Mike (Tullamore-Aspen Lady) 3/1 owned by Bill Shannon and trained by Mike O Donohue notched his eleventh career win in the sixth contest over 300 yards poking up the inside of Powerful Spice on the run to the first corner winning out by one and three quarter lengths from Majestic in 17.04.

Romantic Dilemma and Bailick Road were both well supported at 6/4 in the seventh and both dogs were bang in the firing line on the run to the first bend. "Romantic" appeared short of racing room at that point as the Barry Cotter owned and Eddie Wade trained Tinas Nephew (Spiral Nikita-Shes Okay) forged into the lead. Showing no signs of weakening Tinas Nephew stayed on well to beat Bailick Road by five and three quarter lengths in 29.68.

Fifth Wonder gave chase early on and although Castlekelly Gold made eye catching late headway Peter Come On deservedly won out by a length in 41.44.

The cleverly named Oceejaydee owned by Jimmy O Connor and John Doheny and trained by Paddy O Connor ran out a gutsy 30.29 winner of the sixth event over 550 yards. Making maximum use of his early pace Oceejaydee relished his stint at the head of affairs and this June 98 son of Spiral Nikita and Lady Ballydaniel had plenty in reserve to hold at bay the late challenge of Regal Wally who went down by half a length. The winner posting his sixteenth race victory has only finished out of the first three on ten occasions in fifty six outings.

A four runner eight contest produced an exciting finish. Young Thomas Foleys Active River (Douyougetit-Active Lynx) motored into a clear lead over Pearls Boy but the well supported Southlodge Louie made rapid late headway but failed to overhaul Active River by the minimum distance in 29.31. The winner now has an excellent strike rate of eight victories from twelve outings.

The dreaded trap six produced the winner of the ninth race as the Kathleen Beirne owned Beirns Tex (Thorgil Tex-Knockanore Lady) posted a very east 29.08 victory at odds of 2/1. Cockle Seller was first to break the line but the early pace of Beirns Tex saw him lead around the opening bends and maintaining a strong gallop at the head of affairs the Knockanore blue won out by four lengths from Pool Shark who came from a long way back to fill the runner up spot.

Matters ended with a 730 yard marathon in which Cree Rumble and Thompson Supreme shared favouritism at 6/4. 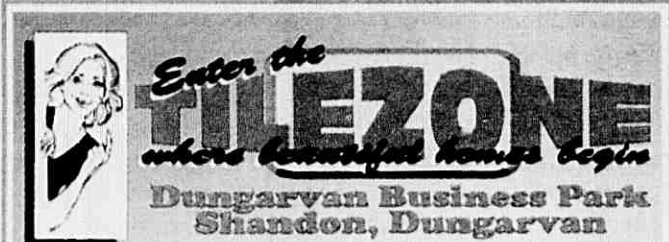

BUDGET CHANGES

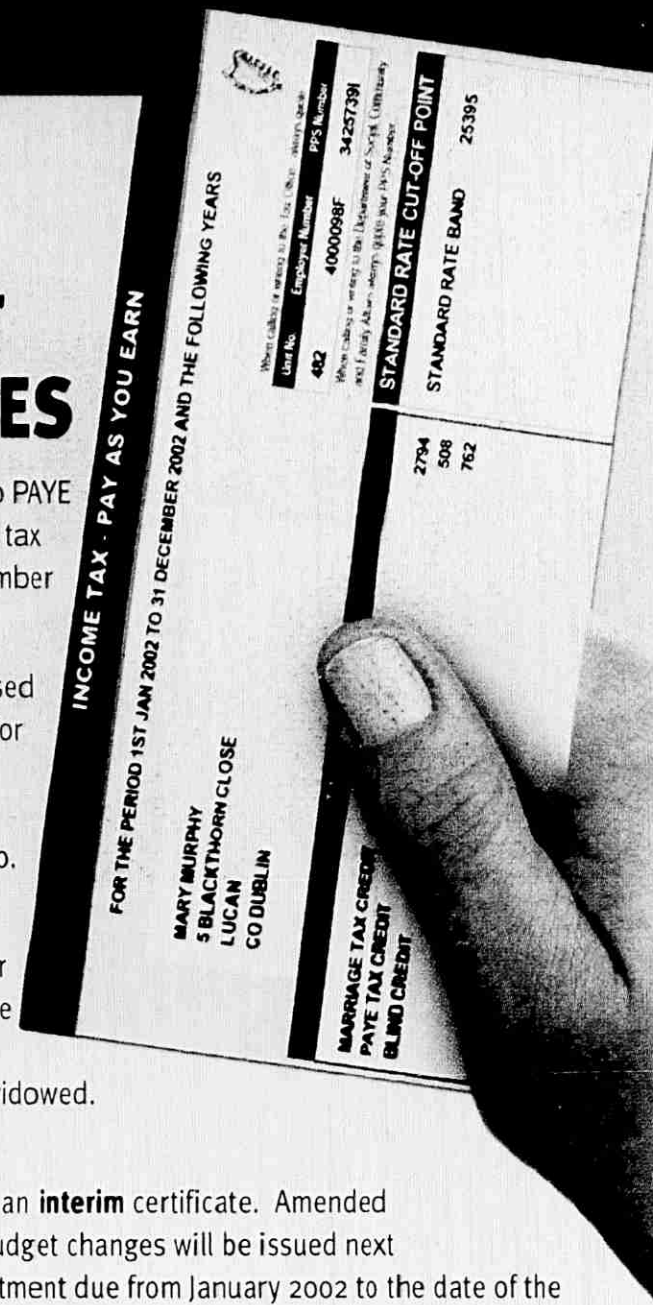

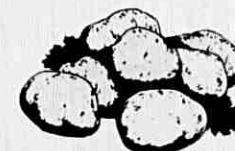
