Dungarvan Harbour Left Out In The Cold By Marine Body

A strategy for the development of Waterford's harbours was severely rebuked by Dungarvan based councillors at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council for being dismissive of the towns harbour.

The 46 page report, which was commissioned by the Marine Institute of Ireland, includes just 3 lines about the towns harbour stating that while there are proposals to dredge it, no facilities are planned to be devel-

The strategy will see £6 million invested in Waterford's Harbours in an attempt to tap into the lucrative leisure craft industry. But, Cllr. Billy Kyne said he was concerned that Dungarvan was being "left out in the cold" by the Ma-



rine Institute as they had "shown a complete lack of interest" in the town.

While Tramore Harbour, which has similar facilities to Dungarvan, is to get substan-CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

Councillors have "missed the boat" for improving rural roads, County Engineer John O'Flynn told Waterford County Council, after criticism of delays and inaction.


The remark came after Tallow Councillor Willie Mc-Donnell claimed councillors had faced intense criticism for the poor state of rural roads in the area.

Cllr. McDonnell contended that after a day of severe flooding in Tallow, which he said prevented many of the

residents of Woodview Park from leaving or entering their homes, roads had been severely damaged.

But, while residents were critical of councillors in the area, Cllr. McDonnell said there was very little they could do and instead laid the blame squarely on the doorstep of council officials. He said that he was aware

that there is a road improvement scheme in operation but was unhappy at the delays involved and also CONTINUED ON PAGE 5

The restoration of mortgage interest relief together with the amendment to the rate of stamp duty for investors, as outlined by Minister Charlie McCreevy in the budget, were warmly welcomed today by estate agents Sherry FitzGerald Reynolds in Dungarvan. on the Commenting David amendments Reynolds stated "this announcement is very good news for both the Irish economy and property market alike"

David Reynolds continued:

over the past three years the Government had introduced several initiatives aimed at curbing demand in the residential market. tial investment, the importance of Dungarvan's harbour and the achievements in upgrading its facilities on a limited budget were being ignored, Cllr. Billy Kyne said.

He also questioned whether the consultants had visited Dungarvan or even spoken to Dungarvan Urban Council or the sailing club "because this report does not reflect what we are attempting to do on a limited budget"

Agreeing with this assessment Cllr. Tom Higgins said Dungarvan has had a long maritime history not unlike Tramore but "suddenly they want to develop Tramore".

"I'm very disappointed at the lack of interest they have shown in Dungarvan", he said. "Dungarvan Harbour has great potential with about 30 moorings in and around Ballinacourty and others going into Ballinagoul."

He also contrasted Dungarvan with Helvick, which is to get funding to the tune of £800,000 in the next few years saying that "a lot of the leisure boats don't go near Helvick".

While he said that the funding for harbours in the east of the county was to be welcomed he pointed out the success Co. Cork had in cornering the marine leisure market.

They achieved this, he said, by developing small harbours all along the coastline and putting marina's in place.

"That's what we need to do because we could get into this industry very easily", he said. Meanwhile, Cllr. Tom Cronin

Meanwhile, Cllr. Tom Cronin questioned whether it would be possible for Waterford County Council to claim some of the £6 million investment and develop harbours such as Ardmore.

To do this, County Manager Donal Connolly said, an agreement would have to be reached with the Departments involved and a percentage of costs would have to be arranged.

Mr. Connolly went on to say that for Dungarvan harbour to develop, more substantial dredging would have to carried out and a foreshore licence would be needed.

claimed that roads he had put forward were not being improved.

Cllr. McDonnell claimed as well that rural people had to wait ten years for any work to be carried out on the roads and said councillors had come in for "terrible criticism".

The solution to this he believed was for the council to take on extra staff, a call he has been making for a number of years.

Funding was also an issue, with increases this year and last for county roads but despite these funds being made available, Cllr. McDonnell believed little work had been carried out.

"I am aware that the council has received extra funds but we still see very little improvement", Cllr McDonnell said.

The Fine Gael councillor added that there are a number of roads in Tallow, Lismore and Knockanore which are just six feet wide and in need of being widened.

However, County Engineer John O'Flynn said that councillors had numerous opportunities to get road projects into the new four year road improvement scheme.

"If any road was an issue or a concern with councillors that was the time to have them included because all councillors were asked for their input", Mr. O'Flynn said.

He added that there had also been an opportunity for funding in the estimates but "unfortunately that boat has now past"

Addressing the problem of Woodview, the County Engineer replied that the flooding in Tallow was widespread and didn't believe any drainage system would be capable of dealing with the volume of water involved.

"In hindsight", Mr. O'Flynn said "maybe houses shouldn't have been built in Woodview at all and instead should have been built on higher ground."

Funding For National Scout Centre At Mount Melleray Approved



Funding to the tune of £150,000 has been approved by the Minister for Finance Charlie McCreevy for a major refurbishment project at the National Scout Centre at Mount Melleray.

Deputy Kenneally who had lobbied both Minister McCreevy and the Taoiseach Bertie Ahern on the issue said that the works at the West Waterford facility were badly needed.

"Scouting is one of the most constructive pursuits open to young people and indeed to their adult leaders. I was made aware some time ago that the centre operated by the scouting movement in Mount Melleray was in need of significant improvements to bring it up to 21st Century standards", remarked the Waterford TD.

"Having brought the matter to the attention of the Taoiseach and Minister McCreevy my party colleagues undertook to identify a funding source and I am delighted that this has now been done. The funding is also especially timely as 2002 marks the 75th anniversary of the foundation of the then Catholic Boy Scouts of Ireland."

Deputy Kenneally went on to say that the National Scouting Centre at Mount Melleray draws visitors to the area from throughout the 32 counties as well as Britain and mainland Europe.

"I would also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the excellent work done on a voluntary basis by so many in scout troops throughout Waterford and elsewhere. I have no doubt that many young people would have went down a very different road had they not come under the benign influence of the scouting movement at an important time in their lives", Deputy Kenneally concluded.

In 1936, civil war broke out in Spain. It was fought between Republicans (who wanted the people to have the right to choose the government) and Fascists (who supported a dictator who would keep citizens firmly under control).

Young people from all over Europe travelled to Spain to fight for the Republicans, but many European governments supported the Fascists. The Fascist leader, General Franco, became the ruler of Spain in 1939, and stayed in power until 1975.

The Spanish Civil War saw the first-ever bombing raid from the air on unarmed civilians, at the Republican town of Guernica in 1938.



Many poor Spanish farmers supported the Republicans during the Civil War. They became guerrillas, hiding in wild countryside to attack the Fascist soldiers, and creeping out at night to raid Fascist camps and weapons stores.

1 1/4 cups uncooked rice



Sprinkle with icing sugar before serving.



Incineration Included In New Waste Plan

The controversial topic of incineration looks set to return to the local agenda following the drawing up of a new Waste Management Plan which includes thermal units as one of its key components.

The proposed plan for the South East region has been drawn up for the six local authorities in the region including Waterford County Council and was launched in Clonmel

The Waste Strategy includes a number of areas which are

Waterford County Council area including the collection of recyclables.

However, one area which is likely to cause some opposition is incineration, which is proposed to be run on a public private partnership basis. This partnership, would in effect, leave the decision of where to locate an incinerator, to a contracted company.

The thermal unit (incinerator) is proposed to be set on six acres of lands and would be limited to taking in around

already up and running in the 150,000 tonnes of non-recyclable waste every year. However, no decision has been taken on where to locate this unit and the plan is not expected to come to fruition for another seven years at the earliest.

But, there have been some doubts already cast over the disposing of the toxic ash that will be produced by the incinerator.

Waterford County Councillor Ger Barron said that this was a question which wasn't satisfactorily answered at the

Currently, it is planned to ship the ash abroad to salt mines where it can been harnessed to good effect.

Problems could arise, however, if other regions and local authorities around the country come on stream with incineration which would result in a surplus of ash making it difficult to dispose of.

But, Cllr. Barron said some parts of the plan were progressive and would see recycling become the most important part of waste management and would help reduce local authorities reliance on landfills.

The strategy hopes a significant leap in recycled waste is made over Waterford County Council's projected figure of 35%. If the plan is introduced this will see it rise to 57%.

However, of the half a million tonnes of waste being generated in the South East 146,000 tonnes will go into thermal units making incineration a vital component of the plan.

To bring the plan into action each local authority will be required to vote on its adoption with its overall adoption dependant on all the authorities voting in favour. There will also be public consultation on the plan with its public display continuing to March of next year.

This week in the Garden

BEGIN TAKING CHRYSANTHEMUM CUTTINGS

Some enthusiastic gardeners will ake their cuttings a lot earlier than this, but now is the time for amateur gardeners to start taking cuttings from their chrysanthemum plants.

Start on those varieties that are grown for second crown buds and particularly on November incurves and singles.

The best shoots to cut are ones that rise directly from the soil from the root below.

These should be severed just below soil level when they are a couple of inches or so in length.

Cut off all the lower with a very sharp knife and trim off the base cleanly just below a joint. Then place them half an inch deep in sandy soil.

It does not matter whether they are in boxes, pots, or directly in a bed made up on the staging in the greenhouse - so long as there is ample

Regular watering is necessary and they need enough heat in a greenhouse to protect them from winter

frosts. They can be sprayed every morn-

ing with tepid water. BRING SOME MORE BULBS INTO THE GREENHOUSE

Bring in further batches of bulbs from the outdoor bed and frame them. This will enable you to make a good crop next year.

Minister Says Delay Involved In Providing **Welfare Office Due To SEHB**

The Minister for Health and Children Michael Martin has laid the blame for the delay in providing new suitable accommodation to replace the Community Welfare Office in Mary's Street, squarely at the doorstep of the South Eastern Health Board.

Minister Martin who was replying to a question tabled by Deputy Austin Deasy said that the provision of accommodation to meet the needs of local communities, including accommodation for Community Welfare Services, within its functional area is a matter for each health board.

"In the case of Dungarvan this responsibility rest with the South Eastern Health Board", he said. "As with each of the other boards the South Eastern Health Board

has been notified of the annual indicative funding available under the National Development Plan(NDP) for the period of 2001 to 2006 to facilitate the financing of capital projects including the provision of new accommodation."

The identification and prioritisation of these projects, he said, is a matter for the health board.

"In the circumstances my Department has asked the Chief Executive Officer of the South Eastern Health Board to reply directly to the Deputy as a matter of ur-gency", Minister Martin concluded.

CAROL FESTIVAL IN TERPORE CATHEDRAL

Through the years the annual Carol Festival in St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore, has become a tradition. This year it will take place on Sunday 13th December at 3.30 pm.

The Festival combines carol singing with readings about the events celebrated in this time of the year. The events themselves happened thousands of years ago. The way they are celebrated today combines pagan traditions (Christmas trees and candlelight at the time of the Midwinter solstice) with the wish of the Christian Church to celebrate the birthday of Jesus. Churches do so in a more formal way. They do not sing "Happy Birthday" or anything like it, but Christmas Carols and Hymns, some of them going back to early Christianity.

Today a frequently used form of Carol singing is the "Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols", drawn up in 1880 by the then Bishop of Truro. It was based on ancient sources and the bishop wanted to use it on Christmas Eve in the wooden shed which served as his cathedral. This form of celebrating Christmas became wider known once it was adopted for use in the chapel of King's College in Cambridge. Nowadays, this Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols is celebrated in many cathedrals and churches all over the world. It has become practice that the lessons in this festival are read by persons from all strata of church and community life.

The Lismore Festival on Sunday 13th December is part of this tradition. Many familiar carols will be sung. In addition, St. Carthage's Singers will sing Christmas music from earlier and recent times. They will be joined by the Very Revd. William Beare, Dean of Lismore, who not only will read the Gospel, but also will take part in the singing as a baritone soloist. Jan Van Putten, Choirmaster and Organist of the Cathedral, will play some French and German Christmas music for Organ. (Jan recently took part in the RTE Church Music Competition. He reached the finals with three of his compositions. These were broadcast live on 25th November. One of his shortlisted compositions, St. Carthage's Mass, will be performed next Spring in Lismore Cathedral).

SUGAR BEET DEAL WORTH 12m EUROS -Parlon IFA President Tom Parlon

recently signalled the end of the 24-day old sugar beet dispute with Greencore. Mr Parlon said the deal will result in an immediate price increase of 1.50 euro per tonne for this years' crop and a further half euro per tonne next year.

He said the deal was for four years, including the crop in dispute and would be worth 12m euros to beet growers. Mr Parlon said: "It has been a time of great hardship for the countries 3,800 beet growers in a dispute that should have been resolved earlier through negotiation.

He said a very important principle has been retained in the final settlement, which was the right of growers to negotiate beet price with Irish Sugar. "The Government has a national interest in the beet quota and the Minister for Agriculture has given a commitment that his department would play an active role in balancing the relationship between the company and the agreement, Irish Sugar and he expected beet delivergrowers in the future".



SOUTH EAST ICMSA NEWS

ICMSA OUTSTANDING ISSUES FOR ROAD DEVELOPMENTS

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA, said: 'ICMSA have fundamental problems with the draft proposals for the acquisition of lands for road developments put forward by the Minister for the Environment and Local Government. The proposals are inadequate and incomplete"

The main issues still to be resolved are:

1 Fixed Payment of £5,000: The fixed payment and before any agreement must be paid as part of compensation entitlement and not conditional on the landowner foregoing his rights by way of unreasonable demands for access or to agree a final settlement.

2. Start-up Date for New Compensation Arrangements: Under the proposals, the Department is proposing 10 December 2001 as the start-up date. Given that this is a PPF commitment, ICMSA is proposing that the agreement should be made retrospective to 1 January 2000. This would allow those farmers who agreed compensation before now to benefit from the increased payments.

3. Arbitration: ICMSA is fundamentally concerned that where a farmer is not happy with the decision of the Independent Assessor and decides to go for the current will lose the proposed fixed ICMSA.

4. Independent Assessor's Decision: The NRA and Local Authorities should be contractually, if not by law, jointly bound by the decision of the Independent Assessor.

5. NRA Code of Practice: The proposed Code is not in place as of yet. This is a major issue for landowners can be reached with landowners, the Code of Practice must be in place. The Science of Farming and Food NEW TEAGASC ADVISORY SERVICES

Teagasc has announced a new advisory initiative aimed at securing a highly competitive Irish farming sector and maintaining the viability of rural areas.

The new initiative involves the provision of two specialised services - the Technology and Business Service and the Rural Viability Service · focused on the needs of two distinct groups of farmers. It involves a fundamental restructuring of Teagasc's advisory resources and focusing of expertise towards the key challenges facing farmers and rural Ireland over the coming decade.

TECHNOLOGY AND BUSINESS SERVICE

The new Technology and Business Service will be staffed by advisers specialised in the key farming enterprises, whose job will be to ensure that the best production technology and business management practices are implemented by farmers.

The service will be backed-up by Teagasc researchers thereby ensuring that all new technology is made available to farmers. There will also be close collaboration with industry through the provision of joint Teagasc/industry development programmes. This will ensure that services are fully reflective of industry and consumer needs and that the combined resources of the state and industry are used to the best effect.

RURAL VIABILITY

The second service, the Rural Viability Service, will be directed towards farmers whose viability is under threat and who are not capable of making an adequate household income from farming alone. A critical component of this new service will be a specially developed Opportunities for Farm Families Programme where farm families will be given expert confidential assistance in assessing their current position, examining the on-farm and off-farm options open to them and identifying the best opportunities to boost household income and improve quality of family life. Cattle

FINISHING CATTLE

Winter finishing is no longer a question of getting cattle to slaughter weight efficiently by the Spring. Factors to be considered are finishing condition, weight and age at finish, premium eligibility and of course feed costs. All these factors have to be juggled to get the "right" combination to leave a bit of profit on the operation. Examine your premia position for 2001 and likely applications in 2002. Is there some unused stocking density left for basic premium and extensification to apply on eligible animals before the end of this year. If so it will help keep stocking density lower in 2002 both in the case of basic premium and extensification. If the more forward cattle have reached 20 months they can be submitted for the second stage and beef premium which allows them to be sold in February. The only downside to this is that the beef premium rate increases in 2002 from £107 to £118 per head and extensification rates increase by £5.50 and £11.00 for the low and high

Group animals by condition and/or age. Check the ages of all finishing cattle from the passports to determine the appropriate date of finish either keeping under 24 months for forward cattle so as to stay at the 0.6 LU per head or below the 30 months in the case with less intensive systems.

Avoid overfatness. Too many cattle are still grading at fat score 4H & 5. This is wasteful. It may be due to waiting to get a load ready, waiting for a price rise or a poor appreciation of correct level of finish (fat score 3 to 4L).

Animal performance in relation to winter feed costs is crucial. In recent years the value of carcass gain per day just about covers daily feed and interest charges in efficient wintering units.

For example, the daily feed cost of a 600 kg steer on silage plus 6 kg concentrates comes to an estimated 118p per day (silage @ 40p and concentrates @ 78p). Adding about 9p/day for interest brings the cost to 127p/day. Assuming a daily carcass gain of 0.65 kg provides an increase in value of £1.25 which does not guite break even with daily feed and interest costs. Therefore the winter feeding period should not last longer than is necessary to get all the premia payments and to produce a carcass of desirable grading quality.

SUCKLER COW PREMIUM - HEIFER REQUIREMENT

In 2002 at least 15% of the animals for which suckler cow application is made must be dry heifers in the case of applications 4 cows or more. Urv neiters are terr age that do not calve during the retention period which is 6 months from the date the application is lodged.

Farmers have the option to use up to 40% heifers as part of the application but must maintain a minimum of 15% for the duration of the retention period. Therefore, if a heifer within the 15% complement calves, dies or is sold she must be replaced by an uncalved heifer. Heifers above the 15% (i.e. between 15% and 40% of the total application) can calf during the retention period or be replaced by a cow or another heifer during

•Farmers with less than 14 cows have the option to apply on heifers up to a maximum of 40% of the total number of animals for which premium is requested.

●The application period for 2002 will run from 2 January until 28 June 2002.

■A top-up payment will be made on "dry" heifers submitted for suckler cow premium up to a maximum of 15% of the number of qualifying animals on the 2002 application. Details of the top up are being currently finalised.

Charlie McCreevy's recent Budget will seem like a mixed blessing. Tax credits have been increased, the old age pension goes up by £12.71 per week and parents will be glad to see that Child Benefit is increased by £31.89 per month for the first and second child while the third and subsequent children get an additional £38.10 per month. The weekly increase of £10.17 in Social Welfare rates comes into effect in January 2002. The other side of the coin is that duty on petrol rises by £0.06 per litre and the price of a packet of 20 cigarettes has already risen by £0.13

Just as a Finance Minister has to balance the overall budget of a country, each person has to balance his/her own personal budget. Even though it's near to Christmas, after the national budget, it is wise to take out pen and paper and look at what effect it will have on your personal budget.

Full details on the budget changes are widely available (particularly on the internet). Low income families/individuals may seem to gain this time around, but work out for yourself how you will work out in reality.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

An uncle of mine has never had a bank account and prefers to keep his money at home. Will he be able to convert his money to euro in a bank next year following the changeover to the euro?

ANSWER

He will be able to get his money converted to euro but he may have to pay conversion charges.

On 1st January 2002 euro notes and coins will be introduced. From then until 9th February 2002 (dual circulation period) you will be able to use both euro and Irish pounds in shops, however you will receive your change in euro only. You will also be able to exchange your Irish money for euro in banks and post offices.

Under a Code of Practice on Bank Charges for Conversion to Euro and Dual Display of Amounts to which banks and building societies have agreed, during this dual circulation period banks will exchange "household amounts" of Irish pound notes and coin for euro up to an overall total of at least IR£500 free of charge. However, you may be charged by the bank for amounts above that. How much you will be charged may vary between the various banks. After 9th February 2002 it may still be possible to exchange Irish currency for euro free of charge but it may vary between banks as to how long they will provide this facility.

They have also agreed to a once-off conversion of accounts to euro free of a conversion charge. Therefore if you have your money in a bank account you will not be charged for converting it to euro.

If your uncle is holding more than the "household amount" of IR£500 you should encourage him to open an account and lodge his money with a bank or some other financial institution such as a building society or credit union. It is not safe to hold large sums of money at home as he may be robbed. If he has an account he can earn interest on his money and in addition he will avoid the possibility of having to pay conversion charges.

PADDY CULLIGAN

And they buried Paddy Culligan last Thursday week in Waterford - I heard he got a great send off from the patients and staff at St. Patrick's Hospital and his many friends from various organisations in Waterford. They had a lovely Mass with a lovely singer and a choir of girls from the Ursuline School on Thursday morning and also on Wednesday night. And at the Novena Mass in Dungarvan on Friday night his name was called and a Nun from the Presentation went up to the altar to light a candle for him. I wonder how she knew him or what was the connection. Sure Paddy was in institutions nearly all of his life. As a young child he was in the orphanage in Cappoquin. Then he was in St. Joseph's in Clonmel, from there to St. John of Gods in Dublin, then back to the County Home in Dungarvan. Then, about 25 years ago he was transferred to Waterford and ended up in St. Patrick's Hospital more than 20 years ago.

Along the way he spent about 4 years in Mount Melleray, making rosary beads, and almost all of his life using rosary beads praying for everybody who crossed his path. Paddy was confined to a wheelchair for nearly all of his life, but with the help of his friends he had a happy social life in Waterford.

But why was the nun from the Presentation lighting the candle on Friday night? But wait a minute, wasn't there a story about the time Paddy was in the County Home in Dungarvan? It was a time when many first class people were travelling through life as second class citizen and ended up in the County Home. They had no income and would not have until they reached the OAP age of 70. In the meantime their only "comfort" was a jot of tobacco or 10 Woodbines per week from the hospital.

Paddy was one asked what he did with his tobacco as he did not smoke. His reply was he sold it for a shilling and when asked what he did with the shilling he replied that he gave it for the non-stop draw for the Presentation School Building Fund.

It's like the story told by a great friend of Paddy's about 2000 years ago about the Widow's Mite and that was only a parable — the story about Paddy actually happened.

But this man who had the least, and gave it all away. So here concludes my tales so true, and now you know I prav.

It isn't what you got that counts, it's what you give

So now I have it — that must have been why the nun from the Presentation was lighting the candle for Paddy in the Parish Church in Dungarvan last Friday night week.



DR. P. J. O'CONNOR (1848-1929)

Dr. O'Connor was born in Clonea on Christmas Day 1848. He had only one brother who was also a priest. He was educated by the Christian Brothers in Dungarvan and at 'All Hallows', where he was ordained for Armidale, New South Wales, Australia, on 15 September 1875. O'Connor sailed for Australia on St. Patrick's day 1876. In 1882 he was made Dean and Vicar General, and in May 1903 he was appointed Bishop of Armidale.

According to a newspaper edition he was described as 'a young man who i a fine specimen of the Irish type of athlete, b ing about 6 ft. tall and weig, ing about 200 lbs., well built, with a fine head, well po sed on a pair of broad shoulders; his unassuming, kindly manner wins everyone.'

Some time afterwards Dr. O'Connor returned home on a visit. His aunt, Mother Mary Francis was Superior of the Presentation nuns in Lismore at that time. From Ireland he set sail for New York and then on to San Francisco from where he travelled to Honolulu, New Zealand and finally Australia. He was held in high regard by both Catholics and Protestants. Dr. O'Connor died in Armidale in 1929.



£30m. RESCUE PLAN TO SAVE **CLONMEL TOWN** FROM FLOODING

The flooding nightmare of Clonmel is being tackled with the largest urban flood relief scheme ever taken on in this country at a cost of £30 m. Minister Martin Cullen launched the most expensive flood relief plan in the country at Clonmel Town Hall on Monday 3rd December, Minister Cullen warned that it would not be completed until the year 2005. This scheme, one of the largest in the EU will cover the River Suir from Grennane above the Convent Bridge in the town down to the River Anner at Two-Mile-Bridge. The scheme will also include works along nine tributaries of the River Suir. The works include the upgrading of River banks and River walls, the building of new walls. construction of embankbypass channel through open Clonmel Library.

ground in the Old Bridge area, under pinning of bridges, dredging parts of the channel and the laying of a network of storm drains along the River front on the towns left bank. The Dungarvan road from Drohan's to the Convent Bridge is to be raised to ensure access to Clonmel from that area was still possible during flooding. The material collected in the dredging process would have to be deposited on lands in County Waterford in the Kilganey area, which would be temporarily acquired. The soil would be stripped back and the lands raised with the material, and it would be covered over before being handed back to the landowners who would be compensated. After Mass as the December rain came down over Sliabh gCua one of its favourite sons was laid to rest in the plot with his dear wife Peggy who predeceased him by three weeks. Fr. Kelleher P.P. assisted by Fr. Walsh officiated at the graveside in the presence of another large concourse of mourners paying their final respects to a Christian friend whose memory they will long cherish.



No Decentralisation **Commitments** In McCreevy's Budget Speech Waterford Labour Party

Deputy Brian O'Shea has stated his grave concern that the Minister for Finance, Charlie McCreevy TD made no reference in his Budget speech to the planned programme of dencentralisation despite stating his intention to decentralise department two years ago.

In answer to a Dail question tabled by Deputy O'Shea and Deputy Austin Deasy about decentralisation to Dungarvan and Waterford, Minister McCreevy stated that he is determined that decisions in relation to a new programme of decentralisation should be taken only after proper deliberation.

"There are no immediate plans to transfer any further staff of the Land Registry to either Waterford or Dungarvan", Minister McCreevy said. "The issue of the further relocation of staff is one which may be considered in the context of the ongoing deliberations in relation to a new programme of decentralisation."

In response Deputy O'Shea expressed his growing concern that no decentralisation programme is going to emerge during the lifetime of this government and that consequently Waterford City as regards the dencentralisation of the entire land registry and Dungarvan as regards dentralisation of part of the OPW will once again be failed by this FF/PD Government.

Dungarvan finished strongly with late points from Shane Nugent and David Hickey to snatch victory.



For the last eight years The Irish Schools' Athletic Association in conjunction with NES-TLE (Ireland) Ltd. have hosted an award ceremony to honour those who have made a significant contribution to the development of the Tailteann 'Ideal' in Irish Schools athletics. Those it has honoured in the past have made their contribution as athletes, administrators, coaches, media, and in other capacities. The one thing that distinguished them was that their contribution was made over a long number of years.

This year in particular has been a difficult but also a rewarding one for the Association. It has been a year when we have had to face many challenges. We believe that we have come through these difficulties stronger and more united than ever and better prepared to face the future.

In this regard we were delighted to honour at a special celebration banquet in Dublin recently, five people who through their dedicated service have made an outstanding contribution to Irish Schools' Athletics, and in particular to Nestle Junior Tailteann Athletics, they are:

A - Mr. Eamon Harvey, Ulster. B - Mr. Cashel Riordan, -Munster. C - Mr. Michael Roche, Connacht. D - Dr. Cyril White, Leinster. E - Mr. Sean Nyhan, - Munster.

The presentations were performed by Mr. Ronnie Delaney, 1956 - 1500 m Olympic Cham-

Cashel Riordan - Our second recipient tonight has given a lifetime to athletics, both at schools and national level. He

is Cashel Riordan.

Cashel's involvement in athletics commenced in C.B.C. Cork in the mid 1950's. It was here that he began his career which was to bring him many Honours and which still sees him playing an important role in the sport.

In 1955 he took the Intermediate 100 and 220 yards titles at the Munster Schools' Championships and was second in both in the Irish Schools' Championships. In 1957 he was placed second in the Irish Schools' Senior 220 yards and was a member of the victorious Munster Schools' Senior Relay

In a long athletics career, Cashel won numerous Cork County, Irish and Intervarsity titles at 220, 300 and 440 yards. He has also held records at each of these distances.

He has won Inter-club National Championship Relay medals with University College, Cork and St. Finbarr's Athletic Club together with similar awards with Birchfield Harriers and Toronto Striders.

In 1967 when the formation of BLE afforded all athletes the opportunity to represent their country, he competed in the Europa Cup in the 4 x 100m and 4 x 400m relays.

Cashel has been official starter of the Cork City Sports for many years. He has given a long and outstanding service to Irish Schools' Athletics - acting as starter at South Munster and Munster Schools' levels since 1969 and starter or track referee at Irish Schools' Championships and Schools' Internationals since 1971. For this we are extremely grateful

and wish to make this award for services rendered.

Sean Nyhan - Our final award tonight goes to one of our longest serving officials. His contribution to Irish Schools' athletics has been immense, being a member of both the Irish Schools' and Munster Schools' executives since 1969. During that time he has been a part of the greatest changes that have taken place in schools' athletics. He is our Hon. Secretary, Sean Nyhan.

Born and reared in Castledonovan, Dromollaguk, Co. Cork he was an only child and

spoiled rotten" by his parents, John and Mollie. He attended the local school and then won a scholarship along with two classmates, Denis and Donal O'Sullivan to St. Finbarr's College, Farranferris, Cork. From there he went to UCC and graduated in 1963. Havin completed his H. Dip he went to work as a teacher in Newtown School, Waterford. Although happy there he always desired to return to his alma mater and so it was no surprise when in 1966 he returned to St. Firibarr's College, Farrenferris as a teacher and has remained there

Sean was always extremely interested in all forms of sport, especially hurling, Gaelic football and athletics. So when Canon Michael O'Brien asked him to go to the South Munster Colleges AGM in 1969 he ended up as the Hon. Secretary, and has been ever since. Proving the adage that it is dangerous for a young, opinionated teacher to go to AGM's Sean ended up as Hon Secretary of the Munster- and Irish Schools' shorty afterwards.

In his roles as Hon Secretary he has been involved in some

of the biggest changes in Irish Schools' athletics. One of the earliest of these changes was the uniting of the girls and boys associations in Munster, they being one of the first of our associations to unite.

The 1970's and 1980's saw the ISAA go from strength to strength with funding coming from the Department of Sport for the first time and sponsorship from Esso, Ulster Bank and Nestle. All of this meant that the Association had to adapt to these changing times. The numbers participating increased dramatically, our fixture list continued to expand and we are now competing in four internationals every year. Through all of this the one constant has been Sean Nyhan, who has now reached the stage of elder statesman in the Association. His advice is often sought and highly respected.


For his set-vice to Irish Schools' athletics which has been above and beyond what one would normally expect from a dedicated official he surely deserves this honour.
