Christmas Spending On The Rise As Shoppers Prepare For Euro

Businesses in West Waterford saw a Christmas "spending frenzy" as people cleared out stashes of coins and punts in preparation for the dawn of a new currency.

As Lady Lavery and the other figures of Irish history depicted on the punts are consigned to the past, a flood of coins, which were stashed away in jars and bottles, have been taken out and spent, before the Euro becomes the countries new currency.

Although a dual currency will be in operation for the month of January, shoppers in Dungarvan and other towns in West Waterford, have driven up sales in shops throughout the region as they

prepare for the changeover.

Local Department Store, Shaws have reported their best Christmas to date, with the number of cash transactions showing a steady increase and sales showing a significant rise over previous years.

Manager of Shaws John Nee said that this comes despite the effects of foot and mouth early in the year and the media hype regarding the economic impact after September 11th. This, it was feared, would have a bearing on spending in the town this Christmas, but Mr. Nee said this hasn't been the case.

Supervalu Store Herlihy's in O'Connell Street, have also sounded an extremely positive note on the levels of sales

Manager Tim Foley attributed this to a number of factors including the newly extended store, the introduction of a Santa's Grotto and the spending of punts before the Euro is introduced on January 1st. This has all led to sales being "well up" on the previous year, Mr. Foley said

Garvey's Supervalu on the Quay in Dungarvan were also happy with how their sales went this Christmas with all the traditional Christmas merchandise selling well.

busiest nights of the year for pubs and nightclubs in the town, it was little surprise that it was also the busiest of the Christmas period for the Gardai.


The majority of the public order offences occurred on St. Stephen's night but Sergeant O'Driscoll again wanted to make it clear that these were of a minor nature.



Efforts On-Going For CCTV

Discussions are on-going with the Gardai about the possibility of putting in CCTV cameras in Dungarvan and County Manager Donal Connolly is also getting a price on the cost of the operation.

In reply to a question from Cllr. John Deasy, the County Manager said that agreement would also have to be reached with the Department of Justice who would have to give the ultimate go-ahead.

He said the Department has given the green light for close circuit televisions in ten areas already next year and a further six towns will be included after this.

The County Manager said that the Gardai in the town and the Urban Council will make a submission for CCTV in Dungarvan when the six areas come up for discussion.





SWEET DISH: Grow your own sweet potatoes

This week in the Garden

PRUNE CLEMATIS JACKMANII

Clematis of the jackmanii and viticella kinds may be pruned. The work must be completed by the end of February or you may damage the plant. Once the plant is pruned back it will grow to look much tidier and presentable.

There are two methods of pruning the plant. If you cut the plant back to within 30 centimetres of the ground every year it will keep it small and tidy, or allow a framework of longer side growths to grow then cut them back one joint annually.

START TO PROPAGATE

Carnation cuttings may be taken from now until the end of March. They are best if taken from side shoots produced a little way up the flowering stem. Shoots are ideal if they are around eight centimetres in length, but should not be used if they were taken from near the top or bottom of the stem.

Remove the shoots by pulling gently down and away from the plant. They should be inserted about 2.5 centimetres deep in pure silver sand or an equal mixture of good loam and silver sand. They need to be watered frequently and be kept at around 10-16 degrees.

CONTINUE TO PRUNE CHRYSANTHEMUMS AND ROSES

Continue to cut back the later chrysanthemums as soon as they finish flowering and continue to prune and cut back all rose bushes and standard roses.

Euro conversion of privately owned electricity prepayment meters

If you have a privately owned electricity payment meter (coin/electronic token) please note the following information regarding changeover to euro and the introduction of euro currency.

In most cases, the meter owner is your landlord and you should make contact with your landlord or the landlord's agent to ensure that arrangements have been made for the conversion and recalibration of the meter for use with euro currency.

If your landlord has made these arrangments then you may not need to take further action.

If no such arrangments have been made so far, you should contact your landlord immediately and request clarification of the position from January 2002 when euro currency will be introduced.

Landlords are advised to contact the meter manufacturer or supplier for advice on euro conversion and recalibration.



225g small broccoli florets

75g frozen peas

FOR THE SAUCE: 40g butter 40g plain flour 450ml semi-skimmed

100g half-fat double Gloucester, coarsely grated 2 x 21/2ml sp Dijon mustard

1/4 x 21/2ml sp salt

black pepper

Cook carrots in boiling water for 3 minutes. Add cauliflower, broccoli and peas.

Cook for 3-5 minutes, or until vegetables are just tender. Drain well. Put vegetables in large, flame proof dish, cover and keep warm.

For the sauce, melt the better in a pan. Add flour and cook, stirring, for 1 minute.

Remove from the heat and gradually stir in the milk. Return to the heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in three-quarters of the cheese, the mustard and the seasoning.

Pour the sauce over the vegetables and stir to coat. Sprinkle over remaining cheese. Grill under a medium heat for five minutes, or until cheese is bubbling. Serve immediately.

2001 proved to be a year full of delays and legal action with Clancy Constructions multi-million pound development subject to an appeal to An Bord Pleanala, the Power Plant held up in a High Court Challenge and the Garrynagree landfill site also in the High Court. It was a year that a terrorist attack on the Twin Towers in New York and on the Pentagon in Washington shook the world to its foundations, making not just international but national headlines as well. The Global economic affects that followed hit West Waterford hard with Waterford Crystal and Cadena in Tallow two of the worst affected. Overall it was a disappointing year on the jobs front with tourism affected early in the year by the scourge of Foot and Mouth and later by American Tourists reluctance to travel. Even before the September attacks occurred, Stafford Miller suffered from Glaxo-SmithKline's decision to move its operations for the manufacture of toothpaste over to England.









Planning permission was granted to Clancy Construction for their £300 million development of a 42 acre site in Dungarvan in what was to be just the beginning of a saga that would re-surface many times over the year.

Health issues once again surfaced in January with £80,000 granted by the Minister of Health Michael Martin for an extension of the Alzheimers Dayroom. Meanwhile, staff of the local hospital celebrated the 100th birthday of Nora Kirby of

Also celebrating was Clfr. Ciaran O Riain who was honoured by Fianna Fail for his 47 years of service as a member of Waterford County Council.

Cllr. John Deasy led a claim that planning staff were doing "nixers" and claimed there was no public confidence in this department.

New developments, albeit on a totally different scale were said to be in store for the Motor Taxation Office as Cllr. Fi-







The Town Renewal Scheme whose aim is to rejuvenate Tallow, Cappoquin and Kilmacthomas was deemed a big disappointment with criticism of the areas that were left out of the scheme.

Ardmore suffered from adverse publicity about its water when it was revealed that the EPA refused its nomination for a blue flag because sewerage was seeping into the sea water.

A dark cloud of gloom descended on Dungarvan when it was announced that 104 jobs were lost at the successful drug and health care product factory, Stafford Miller, as a result of the companies transfer of its Sensodine brand to Maidenhead, England.

The EPA announced that dumping in Dungarvan's landfill would have to stop - a decision which County Manager

Dungarvan's plans to become a host town for the Special Olympics was revealed and a committee - headed by Cllr. Michael O'Riordan - was selected.

The sacred relics of St. Therese visited the Carmelite Monastery in Tallow as thousands of people lined the street to catch a glimpse of her casket.

A new radiology unit at Dungarvan District Hospital costing over £100,000 was officially opened. The provision of the unit meant that the results of an x-ray would be on the radiologists desk within minutes.

Cappoquin celebrated the life and exploits of one of its most famous sons, Michael Cavanagh with a hectic schedule of historical events. Cavanagh earned a place in history for the quality of his poetry and his contribution to Celtic Studies.

A new taxi fare structure was finally implemented by Dungarvan Urban Council with an increase for the minimum fare up to one mile rising by £1.

An investment of £7 million was funnelled

into the counties three Vocational Colleges Dungarvan Technical College, Mean Scoil San Nicholas in Ring and St. Declan's Community College in Ring - to carry out building work

The privately owned seating at Davitts Quay was ordered to be removed by the Urban Council after disturbances when an English yacht sailed into the harbour.



Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson was elected as chairman of Waterford County Council. The election of the former West Waterford County Board

Chairman marked the third occasion in four years that a candidate from the west has been elevated to the position. Cllr. Teresa Wright became UDC chairperson.

A 13th to 14th century Anglo-Norman settlement was discovered in Shandon following preparatory work on the development of 87 houses in the area.

An Urban and Village Renewal Scheme was unveiled which saw £400,000 allocated to projects in Dungarvan, £100,000 to Kilmacthomas and £200,000 to Lismore

A wind farm which was to include 12 wind turbines and had received planning permission had that permission overturned by An Bord Pleanala.

The permission had been granted to DP Energy Ltd - a Cork based group of former environmental activists but strong opposition was shown by the local community.

Developments were announced to be in store for Tallow library and the Library Headquarters in Lismore with a quarter of a million investment.

The County Manager Donal Connolly attempted to withdraw an undertaking he gave to the High Court. The undertaking stated that Waterford County Council would not apply for a waste licence for the proposed landfill at Garrynagree until legal proceedings brought by a local resident had been determined.

It was announced that Waterford Co Co were to be charged an additional £450,000 waste bill as part of a countryside landfill levy passed by the Dail

The levy which is to be enforced in January would see the Government charge 15 euros on every tonne of waste the Co Co distributed in the landfill. It also said Waterford County Council would have to recoup these

The 7th Annual Dungarvan Bay sponsored swim in aid of the RNLI Helvick Head Lifeboat took place and was a great success according to all those involved.

The plan allows for land zoned for 3 to 8 houses to be built in area per acre which lead to fears by locals that housing estates would be formed.

Glencairn Inn, Tallow was awarded the prestigious Cesar Award for the Irish Inn of the year after a survey of visitors to the Inn by the Good Hotel Guide.

Seventeen special needs children who attend St. John's Special school were denied speech therapy following a decision by the South Eastern Health Board to withdraw this service due to staff shortages. The decision

was described by Principal Anna Kirwan as a "disaster" for the school

A bid to charge the headquarter of the traveller support group, Pavee Point, for the cost of the clean up of the Youghal Road failed following a vote on the issue by members of the Urban Council.

The first step in the development of a new fire station for Tallow was given the goahead by the Minister for the Environment Noel Dempsey.

The RNLI once again came to the rescue when they assisted a pleasure craft whose engine had stalled.

Shaws of Dungarvan, one of Ireland's longest established chain of department stores, celebrated its 25th birthday this month

The devastating September 11th terrorist attacks on New York and Washington had a very local impact after a group from Glanbia had a narrow escape as they were due at a meeting in the Capital building in Washington just yards away from where a plane was directed into the Pentagon

A week later saw a global recession hit with one of the first victims being workers in Dungarvan Crystal where it was announced the plant would close for two one week pe riods





Hundreds of children, parents and well-wishers, flocked to a sun drenched Walton's Park to play their part in the official opening of Walton's Park playground.

There was a tense stand-off between a group of traveller/traders and the owners of a commercial site in Shandon which eventually saw the convoy of 12 caravans leave two days after first arriving.

Two Dungarvan men were rescued by Helvick Head Lifeboat after their boat was found drifting out from Dungarvan Harbour. Friends of the boys ashore watched helplessly as the boat was swept out before the rescue service successfully brought them back to shore in safety.

The proposed development of the Glanbia site by Clancy Construction of a shopping complex met with intense scrutiny at An Bord Pleanala's oral hearing. Three day's of submissions were heard after which the Inspector Andrew Boylan set about formulating a recommendation.

A sigh of relief was felt all over Dungarvan after the traveller convoy on the Youghal Road finally left but this was tempered when the extent of the rubbish they left behind was made clear. Sofas, armchairs and an assortment of other

furniture as well as refuse was left strewn all over the site Dungarvan Dramatic Club celebrated their sixteenth an-

niversary with an exhibition of photographs, drama workshops and pub theatre project while renowned writer and performance artist Donal O'Kelly performed "Catalpa" Lismore suffered a spate of vandalistic attacks when in one

night, a number of windows were broken with the main victims of the attacks the two sports facilities in the town - the GAA Clubhouse and the Cricket pavilion.

Cappoquin finally got a new doctor for the area after a wait of 17 months during which patients from Ballinameela had to travel as far as Conna to then be referred to Ardkeen.

Pay claims, disruptions, strikes and counter strikes were all but forgotten towards the end of the month as the Leaving Cert results were announced with local schools said to be delighted with the results achieved by their students.

Dungarvan Urban Council and Waterford County Council honoured the Waterford Minor Ladies team after they won the only county title to come to the county this year.

Intense speculation surrounded the possibility of a Government Department locating in Dungarvan after a statement from Minister Martin Cullen appearing to state the town was at the forefront as far as a bid was concerned.

The number of people signing on in Dungarvan showed another increase rising from 891 to 922 over the period of July to August. This did not take into account the loss of 104 Stafford Miller employees.

America was accused of treating the ordinary people of Afghanistan like battery chickens being fed up for the slaughter by Cllr. Tom Higgins as the reprisals for the Sept. 11 attacks got underway.

Discussions were said to be ongoing for a new hospital in Dungarvan after Deputy Austin Deasy announced that a project team was appointed for the project.

Joan Sandford-Kiby launched her second book entitled "My Lovely Years" which tells the simple, funny sad and poignant tales of her life in the town.

Ring Musician, Ciaran O Gealbhain, was honoured at TG4 Irish Traditional Music Awards.

The announcement of the closure of Cadena Ireland with the loss of 68 jobs sent shock waves throughout the community in Tallow and was greeted with dismay by employees. The company announced a worldwide restricturing of its manufacturing and supply

structuring of its manufacturing and supply chain operations which ultimately resulted in the closure of Cadena in Tallow.

Floods ravaged parts of West Waterford as three feet of water blocked roads and damaged houses following a downpour of proportions not seen in the area for twenty five years.

A vault in the historical Affane graveyard was discovered to be desecrated after its lid was pried open and the coffin was smashed while other graves were robbed of urns and marble plaques.

A new £40 million residential development and hotel which may create 250 jobs was announced for the Burgery, Dungarvan. The development will be set on 21 acres of land, and will comprise of 133 houses and a four/five star hotel.

The first kerbside collection of recyclable by a local authority in Ireland began in West Waterford with materials collected on a once a month basis. This is to change sometime in the New Year to twice monthly collections.

Construction work on Lismore Community School began on the new £4.81 facility.

An anthrax scare gripped Kilmacthomas as a suspicious substance was discovered in the Post Office by one of the employees. Ultimately as was expected the scare proved to be a hoax.

Redundancy notices were issued to eighty contract workers in Dungarvan Crystal.

Six potential routes were selected for the £40 million Dungarvan outer by-pass which will connect the Pike and the N25 and will, it is hoped, radically reduce traffic on the current by-pass.

Dungarvan's Old Market house Arts Centre received the thirdquarter nomination for the 2001 WLR Fm/ Waterford Crystal Arts and Entertainment Awards.

A new scheme was launched recently in the Park hotel which will see the planting of wood-

lands in green areas around Dungarvan and the construction of a new walkway near Fr. Twomey's Road.

Hotels in West Waterford were said to be getting through the tourism crisis that resulted from the September 11th terrorist attacks due to good marketing, Regional Director of the Hotel trade announced.

Waterford County council's recycling scheme gain impetuous and support along the way as well, as it attracted ringing endorsements across the political spectrum with Minister Dempsey and Labour spokesman Eamonn Gilmore both showing support.

John Barry who was chairman of the Waterford Leader Partnership for over seven years stepped down from the position with a ceremony held in his honour.

The future of Dungarvan's Energy Power Plant looked more assured as the County Manager revealed that Bord Gais indicated that they may be in a position to provide a gas line to the plant.

Legal action was announced against a developer who felled nine trees during construction of a housing development in Tournore.

Close Circuit television came one step closer to becoming a reality in Dungarvan after Urban Councillors gave it their unanimous support.

West Waterford hotel's and restaurants received a massive vote of confidence after one of Ireland's leading food critics

John McKenna described the area as a "food lovers paradise in the renowned Bridgestone Food Lovers Guide to Ireland.

The newest Book of local interest to hit the shelves was launched in November by Frank O'Brien who wrote a history of the O'Brien family in Co. Waterford down through the ages. Appropriately enough the launch took place in the Desie Room in the Park Hotel.



The retirement of Deputy Principal of St. Augustians College, Abbeyside Seamus McGrath was marked by a dinner and presentation in his honour from his colleagues in the Dungarvan ASTI Branch.

The decision to exempt mobile phone masts on public, commercial and industrial buildings from the planning process has been described as "a disgrace" by Fine Gael General Election Candidate Cllr. Maurice Cummins.

A moving ceremony was held in St. Carthage's Protestant Cathedral, Lismore as a plaque was unveiled dedicated to the memory of the men and women from Co. Waterford who served in World War 1.

Waterford County Council's estimates were passed on a 19-4 vote which saw householders hit with a 57% increase in the cost of ordinary waste collections and a 7.5% increase in rates.

This photograph was taken in April 1953 at Dungarvan Railway Station and shows Joe Organ of Abbeyside, and his son Pat (better known as Paudie), taking delivery of three boxes of fish from Dublin.

associated with the fish trade for going on thirty five years. The idea of bringing fish from Dublin to Dungarvan! - a town that had been for generations recognised as one of Ireland's best known fishing ports - appeared most unusual; in fact absolutely amazing.

Joe's explanation was simple. There was no fish to be got around the local coastline, for there was little or no fish there. He alleged that between trawlers and other fishing craft, they swept even the shrimps off the seabed of the Waterford Coastline. At the time Joe had no beating around the bush when he suggested that the plundering that had been done on the famed NYMPH BANK and, for that matter, all over the area, would for years to come make fishing a poor proposition in the area. Whether that was right or wrong was open to discussion according to Joe.

We now know he was correct as to this day the fishing grounds in the area have not recovered.

Paudie told me that he had to stay home from school every Friday in order to help his father deliver the fish to the houses in the locality.



An Bord Pleanala Refuses To Sive Date For Glanbia Judgment

An Bord Pleanala have refused to give a date for a judgment on the Oral Hearing into the Glanbia development other than to say that a decision is imminent, County Manager Donal Connolly said.

Previously a proposal to contact the Ombudsman and the Minister for Local Government Noel Dempsey as well as An Bord Pleanala themselves was made by Cllr. John Deasy and a decision to do this was deferred to the December meeting.

But, Cllr. Damien Dillon, who is also a Dungarvan based architect, revealed that he had been informed that the Ombudsman will not look into planning issues.



Cllr. Billy Kyne added that every councillor has made contact with An Bord Pleanala and said that he was sure that last Friday was the day that a judgment would be made.

"The least we're entitled to is a date when the judgment will be made", Cllr. Kyne said. "If we got a date we could stand over that"

The County Manager replied that the council will make contact with Minister Dempsey as he appoints An Bord.

Boreenatra **Road Plan To Be Discussed** With Residents

The Urban Council discussed ways to improve the roadway at Boreenatra. The road in that area is just five metres wide and is scarcely wide enough to allow a line of parked cars and two-way traffic.

Councillors were also told that when two cars meet on the road they must drive onto the green to pass out.

To improve the situation, Town Engineer Joe Brennan said, they have two options. The first would provide for kerbing of the existing green area and the introduction of one way traffic flow which would cost £4,000.

The second option is to widen the road to eight metres to allow two way traffic at all times and this would cost £10,000.





Waterford Links to Acclaimed 18th Century Poet Are Celebrated

thread in the life of renowned 18th Century poet Tadhg Gaelach Ó Súilleabháin is celebrated in a new biography - copies of which have been presented to the library at Waterford Institute of Technology and to the public libraries in the South East. An Cantaire Siúlach (The Wandering Minstrel) by Una Nic Enrí, an academic from the University of Limerick's Mary Immaculate College, traces the poet's life from his birth in 1715 through to his death at the Cathedral of the Most Holy Trinity in Waterford 80 years later.

The author of the new tome attended a reception at the Waterford Institute of Technology library on Friday (December 7), during which she handed over copies of the book to the Institute and to librarians attached to local authorities across the region.

"During his lifetime, Tadhg Gaelach Ó Súilleabháin spent a considerable period of time living and writing in Youghal, Cappoquin and Dungarvan with much of his poetry alluding to people and places he came across in these areas. Having died at the Cathedral in Waterford where his memory is preserved by a wall-mounted plaque, he was laid to rest in Ballylaneen, near Kilmacthomas. As East Cork and West Waterford are areas that we draw a considerable portion of our student population from, it was particularly fitting that the library at the Waterford Institute received one of the first copies of this new publication," remarked Institute director, Professor Kieran R Byrne.

"Tadhg Gaelach was a noted literary figure in his day and his work and life were not devoid of controversy. This book from the scholarly pen of Una Nic



Indeed, many of Tadhg Gaelach's poems were subsequently sung as hymns - making his legacy all the richer.

"From the Waterford Institute's point of view, we are delighted to have facilitated

sometimes overlooked achievements. This latest event at the Institute's library is another tangible expression of the way in which we are seeking to represent the culture and history of Waterford and, in particular, the Irish-speaking area in the West of the county. We must be careful going forward as an Institute not to forget to reflect this region's rich history and its wide inheritance in learning, literature and language.

"On a more general note, it may be recalled that the Min-

ment of Arts, Heritage. Gaeltacht and the Islands, Mary Coughlan TD visited the Waterford Institute last month. At that stage, we briefed the Minister on plans we have to more fully integrate the Irish language into Institute life. 

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I believe the scheme of tax relief on interest payable on home mortgages is about to be changed. I have a mortgage but I am not liable for tax. Will I be able to benefit from the change?

ANSWER

Yes. Under the Tax Relief at Source scheme for home mortgage interest the tax relief which you currently cannot avail of can be extended to you.

From 1st January 2002 tax relief on interest payable on new and existing mortgages will no longer be given through the tax system but at source. This means that the tax relief element will be "built into" the monthly mortgage repayment. Your mortgage repayment will be reduced by the amount of the tax credit. For example, if the interest element of your mortgage is IR£100 per month, your mortgage lender will reduce your monthly mortgage payment by IR£20 per month starting from January 2002. This reduction is the same as giving tax relief at the standard rate (20%) through the tax system. It will no longer be necessary to claim tax relief in the annual tax return. Earlier this year those who are already claiming mortgage interest relief should have been written to by Revenue. If you have been claiming mortgage interest relief since before July 2001 but you were not written to, you should phone Revenue at LoCall 1890 463626. Those taking out new mortgages since July 2001 should have completed form TRS 1 which would have been available from their mortgage lender

If you have an existing home mortgage but could not claim tax relief as you were not liable for tax you should complete form TRS 1 which is available from your mortgage lender or any Revenue office in order to avail of the relief

SHOPPING ON THE NET

All shopping is not without risk, but this is especially true for On Line shopping. The following guidelines may help you to shop safely online.

Order only on a secure server: This will be evident by an unbroken key or padlock at the bottom of your screen. If you are in such a site and want to enter another one, a message will come up on screen i.e. 'you are now leaving a secure site"

Protect your privacy: Provide the most basic personal information and make sure that you know how it is going to be used

Paying by Credit Card: Again make sure that only the secure site is used. Use different passwords when you are making a purchase than you use to log on to your home computer.

Post and Packing: Make sure that when you are calculating the cost of your goods that you take into account postage and packing. It can add greatly to the cost. If you are unsure, try putting all the items that you want into the 'shopping basket'. Then before you give your payment option i.e. by credit card it should automatically add up your purchase (incl. postage and packing) which will in turn give you a final total. If you are not happy do not proceed any further.

Fortnightly Collections Of Recyclable Materials

HOUSEHOLDERS URGED TO 'THINK GREEN' IN 2002

Householders in County Waterford are being urged to 'think green' for the New Year as Waterford County Council prepares to step up its collections of dry recyclaary onwards.

The local authority continresponse from householders to their recycling initiative that has seen dry recyclable materials collected from outside residences right across the county since November.

The Council's Environmental Education Officer, Celine Horner, has outlined details of revised arrangements for the Council's kerbside collections.

From January onwards. the recyclable materials will be collected every second week - an acknowledgement that has traditionally been placed in wheelie bins and taken to landfill sites. This should also mean that householders aren't left storing any waste materials in or around their homes for unacceptable lengths of time.

To take the period immediately after Christmas, dry recyclable materials will be collected in the County Council's administrative area (East and West Waterford, excluding the City and Dungaryan) during the week commencing December 31 with standard wheelie bin collections in the week beginning January 7. subsequent weeks." Ms Horner continued.

Again, this routine will then ues to report an impressive simply switch over in subsequent weeks - making it easier for householders to know when the next collection of a particular type of waste is due to take place.

"There will be a further economic incentive to row in behind the recycling initiative when the new charges regime begins on January 1, 2002 with a price of just 3 to be paid for every four clear plastic sacks left out for recycling. At the same time, it will cost 6 to have a wheelie that this waste forms a major bin collected. As is currently portion of all the material the case, the sacks and wheelie bin tags will be available from local retailers.

Waterford County Council is also asking householders to take particular care to recycle their seasonal packaging waste and help make it a less environmentally damaging Christmas.

Each household in County Waterford generates an average of 80lbs of waste each Christmas - including everything from cardboard and plastic toy boxes to drinks cans and glass bottles. We would encourage people to recycle the packaging element of that waste by separating it This will then alternate in and - where appropriate placing it in their clear plastic sacks for subsequent colleced Ms Horner.

"While we have had excelinitiative to date, it is perhaps worth reminding householders of the particular materials that can be placed in the sacks for collection. These include cardboard, newspapers, magazines, washed milk and juice cartons, all types of plastic including bottles, drinks cans and food tins. Any other packaging waste as well as glass bottles can be taken to bring centres that the Council operates right across the county.

Recycling this Christmas will be easier than ever and it is to be hoped that householders will bear in mind the role that they can play in preserving the environment for future generations. Recycling and waste reduction are key planks of this Council's ongoing environmental protection efforts and the continued support of householders is crucially important. The excellent response that people have given to the recycling initiative so far gives us great confidence that householders will continue to back our efforts in 2002 and beyond.

Impressive Debut By Droopys Queenie

Making her debut on this graded eleven race card the Sean Dunphy owned Droopys Queenie (Top Honcho-Droopys Kylie) 4/5 displayed all the right qualities posting an impressive 28.72 front running sucess. Quickly into her stride this June 00 whelp led by a couple of lengths around the first turn from Seskin Princess but moving up a gear down the back stretch the favourite opened up a significant lead which extended to fourteen and a half lengths at the winning line.

In the opening novice race all the money was for Slipaway Sue 4/6 but she was badly hampered throughout and basically got no run. Indeed the winner Knockenduff Hill (Droopys Merson-Naughty Nellie) 5/2 owned by Ann Flanagan endured her fair of hardship rounding the first bend before sprinting past Famous Express for a runaway fourteen lengths win over Slipaway Sue in 29.54.

The second race confined to novice sprinters saw the Sean Carroll and Senan Walsh owned Upper Star (Upper Spark-Romantic Sunset) 2/1 make all the running from trap six and when a closing Sparta Harry lost ground on the opening bends Upper Star raced on to a four lengths win over "Sparta" in 16.76.

In an open looking fourth contest the Autumn Syndicate owned and Killian Power trained Autumn Thorgil (Thorgil Tex-Miss Piggy) 5/2 made all the running to oblige in 30.26. Clash Womble closed right up on the leader running down to the penultimate turn but "Autumn" kicked again going clear for a handy five lengths victory.

The fifth contest confined to novice sprinters saw local publican John DeBromhead team up with trainer Peter Brady as 2/1 shot Man Of Lamancha a January 2000 son of Spiral Nikita and Pretty Michelle overcame a slow start to win out in a promising 16.48. Minglers Honcho displayed nice early pace to lead from Faros Art but with the leader keeping wide on the run to the first bend Man Of Lamancha cleverly switched his challenge to the rails sweeping into the lead to score by two and a quarter lengths.

Showing huge improvement from her first race outing the Anthony Donnelly owned Shes A Keeper (He Knows-Jeffys Fawn) 3/1 ran away from her opponents in the sixth race to score in 29.40. Breaking in front of Kilmeaden Jenny Shes A Keeper remained at the head of affairs throughout and maintaining a steady gallop up front won going away by ten lengths from Kilmeaden Jenny

A costly failure for connections in his previous outing over this circuit the George Roche owned Rosetown Best (Powerful Flash-Lisnakill Connie) 1/1 came good in the seventh contest overhauling the early leader Seans Choice to triumph by one length from a running on Smart Tip in 16.88.

The bookmakers bet 5/2 the field in the eight event where the fast starting duo of Fairbrook Penny and Rightful Best had this event to themselves a long way from home. The pair raced neck and neck down the back stretch but in the closing stages the Tony Kinsella owned Fairbrook Penny (Mountleader Peer-Sadlers Surprise) asserted her superiority to quicken clear for a three lengths win in 29.63.

In the ninth race Has Blocks cut an early dash from trap four but he was joined in the lead over the final two bends by Hilldun Tex. Just as this pair were settling down to scrap it out up the home stretch the Eric O Mahoney owned Kilbunny Cosy (Druids Wally-Kilbunny Honey) 4/1 made sound late headway up the rails to beat Hilldun Tex by the minimum distance in 29.88.

It was tight up front throughout the tenth race with Ger O Connors Trish Valais (Droopys Fintan-Valais For Sure) 2/1 and Doms Choice having their own private duel, On the run to the winning line however the Wexford entry Trish Valais found that bit extra to score by half a length in 29.96.

In the eleventh and final contest the Michael Forbes Gallagher owned and Donncha O Sullivan trained lckledo Bart (Lenson Lad-Deerfield Mist) 5/1 posted back to back victories in 29.88.Carried wide off the second bend by Tingle Girl Ickledo Bart gave away his early lead to Taghmon Moll before renewing his challenge in the closing stages to triumph by a short head.

Ballybray Jasper Made All The Running

Waterford track took the added precaution of salting the all sand racing surface to protect it from the artic conditions and this action allowed the ten race card to go ahead as planned. The nap of the night for the punters came in the shape of the John Murphy owned and R Leahy trained Ballybray Jasper (Vintage Prince-Lone Sady) and this 2/5 duly delivered the goods in style in the first semi final of the Christmas Cracker 29.60 stake making all of the running to oblige in 29.27. Quickly into his stride from trap one Ballybray Jasper led early on from Ranger Elite and That's The Finest and in a one sided event the favourite came home five and a half lengths clear of Ranger Elite with a fast finishing Nice Nancy a short head away in third.

Valentia Topper and Captain Mackey shared favourtism at 6/4 in the second semi final but it was the two outsiders Truleigh Jewel 6/1 and Law Law 5/1 who dominated matters from the outset. Law Law (Deep Decision-Senahel Trade) took over in the lead over the opening two bends and was never subsequently headed breezing in two lengths clear of Truleigh Jewel in 29.66. The winner is owned by Ger Ryan and Lauren Fitzgerald from Limerick.

In the first graded race the Pat Hally owned Mersons Cheeta (Droopys Merson-Garranlea Flyer) 5/4 ran on strongly over the final two bends to strike the front from the early pacesetter Sheeraghs Eily before proving a length to good for Texas Tess. Time 29.82.

The second race run off over the 300 yard sprint trip saw the Walter Sames owned Hopeful Stapler (Staplers Jo-Villiers Lady) 3/1 score in 16.94. The winners task was made easier at the opening bend when a challenging Fast Ceili was struck into from behind by Cullinane Ranger. Hopeful Stapler was left in the clear at that point to defeat the slow starting but fast finishing Crack Off Padge by a length.

The consistent Crokers Nikita justified 4/5 favourtism with an easy 29.61 winning return in the third. Owned by Jim Treacy and trained locally by Davy Power the well drawn Crokers Nikita (Spiral Nikita-Honey Vixen) packed to much early pace for his rivals as he sailed into the lead on the fence and despite the best efforts of Bohemian Crokers Nikita won a shade cleverly by three and a half lengths.




Waterford's Senior Ladies fared little better in football when they slumped to defeat against Longford in the third round of the National League.

PROPOSED GRADINGS MADE OUT

The offices of Bord na n-Og Port Läirge Thiar met recently to look at the grading's for this years championships. All club secretaries should by now have got a copy of these gradings.

The gradings decided upon by the officers are not as yet official until a full delegate meeting takes place on January 15. Clubs are asked to look carefully at their grading and to come back to the meeting and to only ask to come down if they are 100% certain that they will not cope in the division that they are in.

The grading's made out by the Bord are as follows:

UNDER-16 FOOTBALL

Division 1 - Dungarvan, Balurty, Brickeys, St. Olivers Ballyduff and Kilrossanty. Division 2 - Affane, Nire, Clashmore, An Gaeltacht and Stradbally, Division 3 — Naomh Brid, Cois Bhride, Lismore, Ardmore and Kilgobinet.

AFFILIATION

With the new currency now in operation, the Bord has decided to look at the affiliation prices for 2002. It has been decided that to register a club will cost 13 Euros. For each under 14 and 16 hurling and football teams the cost will also be 13 Euros. It has also been decided to charge clubs 6 Euros to enter the various under 11, 12 and 13 tournaments run by the Bord.

REFEREES

It has been well documented that there is a serious shortage of referees within the division and the county. It has been pointed out on a number of occasions recently that some referees are doing up to eight games a week between underage and adult championships.

Over half the clubs in the division do not supply a referee to our Bord to take charge of games. If we were to get ten new referees it would eliminate a lot of hassle and it would almost assure that there would be a referee free to turn up for every fixture.

All clubs have players who no longer play and who still want to be involved in some way. If clubs were to approach these ex players (male as well as female) they may be only too willing to take up refereeing.

If new referees can be found the Bord could arrange a venue where these men and women can get instruction

Although it has only just arrived, the speculators are already at work and making predictions about what may happen not only on the playing front, but also on the political and administrative side of the association.

Many changes are certain and these include the election and installation of a President Elect at Congress in April. The new incumbent of the office will come from a list which includes Kerry's Sean Kelly, and Clare's Noel Walsh, Seamus Allridge, Albert Fallow, who was runner up to Sean McCague last time round, and P. J. Mc-Connaght Council Chairman. There can still be a dark horse or two, but this is un-

Another certainty is the opening of the fully developed Croke Park with an 82,000 capacity (and admitting 79,500 only because of planning restrictions).

Giving Central Council the ther when the matter will be aired at Congress and probably voted on by secret ballot. I can see Congress deciding to agree with the proposal in the not too distant future, but I cannot see Central Council (in its present form) agreeing. I say in its present form because proposals to change the style and format of Central Council are ready for submission to Congress in April next and if approved then the present members of Central Council will be replaced by the 32 County Board Chairmen.

The proposals also state that County Board Chairmen

can hold office in their own counties for a maximum of five consecutive years. Other proposals are embodied in the package and I will deal with those in the months ahead.

Recognition of the Gaelic Players Association and the subsequent adoption of a 'Pay for Play" scheme will certainly figure in the headlines during the season ahead, but I cannot see it becoming a reality, just yet (and I mean 'just yet.') I have no doubt but that 'pay for play' will eventually come. The demands will likely grow in line with the Grath, Mayo and former increase in gate receipts and the increase in sponsorship.

WHAT I WOULD LIKE TO SEE

I would like to see Development grants considerably reduced by Central and Provincial Councils and the consequent savings directed towards paying a much bigger share of the Property, authority to allow other Public Liability Insurance games to be played in Croke and the Accident Scheme. In Park may be taken a step furthis, all clubs in the country would share equally. At present the Development money goes in the main to the bigger venues and the bigger clubs.

I would like to see an indepth and urgent examination of the whole club structure, nationally, as whether or not we care to admit it, clubs are beginning to wither out of existence. A very large proportion of our clubs exist in name only. The two contributory factors are finance or the lack of it and having to fund raise for most of the year and the other problem is in the recruitment of people who are prepared to service the clubs.

It is an undeniable fact tha clubs all over the country are losing their vitality and the sooner that this is realised and something positive done about it the better.

I would like to see much improved presentation of ou games at all levels, beginning at the top. I would see it as an improvement in this direction if the President and the captain of the winning teams in the All

Ireland finals were not al lowed to make speeches tha bore everyone and give at undignified appearance to the presentation of the trophy.

I would like to have the same at provincial, county and divisional level and al for the same reasons.

Staying on the playing ground, I would like to see team managers, selectors and others in their camps barred from sidelines at All Ireland provincial and at county fi nals in counties. I would like to have a 'runner' on field to execute the instructions o managers/selectors. It could operate in all venues where there is a stand.

I cannot end without saying that I would like to see club taking the matter of the re cruitment of referees more seriously.

And on a final bore and also on the subject of referee ing, I would like to find ref erees taking mor appropriate action agains their abusers and players and sideline people who use fou language during games.

Not being a super optimist I do not expect all (or an maybe) of these wishes to become a reality, but in being honest, I feel that one day they will.



Touraneena News Ardmore G.A.A. Notes

LATE NED BURKE

On the morning of the 21st December 2001 the sad news that Ned Burke had passed away spread throughout the village of Tourancena and later to all parts of the county. The reaction was one of great sadness to have lost a great gentleman, a true sportsman and a great friend to the many people who knew him well.

Ned was born in 1913 and being the eldest of a large family had to learn fast how to make a living. He learned well from his father and mother who were most industrious people who reared their big family very well in tough times.

Ned worked his school leaving years with the Cullinane family in Touraneena and later joined the county council in their road making and maintenance section for the best part of forty years. He was a renowned worker. He met and married Alice Grant from Ballymacarbry more than fifty seven years ago and reared a wonderful family of five girls and two boys.

Ned was a most devoted husband and a loving and proud father and credit to his family they reciprocated that love to the highest degree.

Ned was well known in the area as one of the team who brought honour and glory to Sliabh gCua in 1936 by winning the county junior football championship wearing the No 9 jersey. Ned was chairman of the Touraneena GAA club during the eighties when they brought five county championships to the

He was also the selector and close mentor to the teams during this golden era for Sliabh Gua. Ned with his wife Alice were very valued members of the Sliabh gCua set dancing team that brought clu agus cail to Touraneena by winning the All-Ireland set dancing championships for the first time in 1972.

Ned's involvement with the church in Touraneena will never be forgotten as he worked out so many roles over the years. He kept the church grounds in great condition all on his own when the work was really hard, briars and grass had to be cut with the bill hook. When the lawn mower came it was such a revolution.

Ned helped out his wife Alice who has been the sacristan for the past thirty seven years opening, closing, cleaning and decorating the church day after day, week after week for not too much reward.

Ned was the main collector in the church for years and was a familiar sight going about his business in that area of the church which to him and his friends was always seen to be as privileged place to hear Mass from. Ned took his roles in the church

always in a very serious vein none more than that of ringing the ball, half an hour before Mass a quarter of an hour before Mass for funerals, the angelus at twelve and again at six. When Ned was getting tired with the weight of years he trained and coached Larry Cliffe to take his place and by all accounts Larry has been an apt pupil.

Ned was very much an all round man and showed this by his participation in so much of the activity outside the church and the G.A.A. He was a member of the Darts club, the Gun Club, the former Athletic Club and helped to build the now defunct hand ball alley

Ned is being missed naturally by his family but will be missed very much by the whole community and by all those who knew him.

Memories and very good memories of him will live on in the folklore of the parish of Touraneena. The removal of Ned from his residence and the funeral Mass for the repose of his soul will be remembered for many a year, a fitting tribute ato very good man.

The Touraneena choir were in full voice celebrating his life as indeed were all who took part in a very fitting tribute to one who was so dear to the community. As his coffin was being led down the church making its way to the burial plot where Ned was to join his beloved daughter Teresa,

Paddy O' Brien of international fame sang a beautiful refrain. The undertaker John Troy of Lismore a son-in-law of Ned's laid out the grave in a manner fit for a king, never was the likes of it seen beagain seldom has the likes of Ned lived among us.

Aistoiri an tSean Phobail present "Sive"

The first production of John B. Keane's play, "Sive", was in Listowel in 1959. I was fifteen at the time and a student at the College of Technology in Dublin, in a world different from Sive, filled with mathematics and science, the excitement of the space age, the wild evolving world of rock and roll, movies such as "Jazz on a Summers Day" and "Lolita"

But there was a connection. My friend and classmate was from Listowel. He would talk to me about John B. Keane, the Listowel Amateur Drama Group (which seemed to involve everyone in Listowel one way or another). Brian McMahon and Joan Denise Moriarty. I found it hard to understand his preoccupation, he talked like a whole new universe was being created in his small town.

A couple of years later, I was invited to his home for the Easter weekend and set off on my motorbike, a 110cc single cylinder Moto Guzzi, sold under the exotic name "Gigolo". It was a slow journey across Ireland and well dark before I got near my destination. The beam of the headlight confined my chilled world to a short strip of tarmac and an enclosing hedge each side of the narrow road. Somewhere at the limits of the headlamp beam, I saw an eerie, strange shape move in the road. I had thoughts of ghosts, banshees and God knows what as I slammed on the brakes. I came to halt a little way short of a black and white cow.

My visit to Listowel is still memorable. It was new to see, at one remove, the kind of tension that seems inevitably to exist between father and teenage son. Another tension seemed to run through the main street of the town past John B. Keane's pub and on to the square and the church. Then there was my friend's sister who was a few years younger. To paraphrase John B's great poem of exile, she "stole my heart away". But at seventeen, I was too old. Forty years later, I am in Old Parish and sitting around a blazing fire in Sheila and Paddy Joe Mahoney's house one winters evening. I'm there because Declan Terry has gone unusually mad and thinks I might be good in the part of Carthalawn in his production of Sive. The fact that I have never seen the play, never had anything to do with theatre (apart from enjoying it as one of the audience), that I never sing in public and also can't play the Bodhrain all my protestations in other words, seems to leave him unworried. So the assembled group start to read through Sive and right away it is I who am impressed. Sheila, who is only reading the part for the night, has it off perfectly! By the second rehearsal, in the upper room of Kiely's Cross Pub, the acting is electrifying. The cast have their lines almost perfect and the tension in the play is ripping through the small room. Now I'm certain that I'm out of my depth. Declan seems to get the same idea, my repeated suggestions that he can surely find someone better for Carthalawn are at last graciously accepted! So what is John B's play all these years later, does it stand up, this strange, emotionally violent and brutal play about what must surely be a long gone Ireland? When Declan gave me a copy, the things that struck me on first reading were largely negative and questioning ones. I thought the matchmaker, Thomasheen, might have done nicely as a prospective TD, probably making it to Government Minister. John B. shows him with all the qualifications which

seem most essential (for some at least) he is single-minded, looking to the short term objective, knows how to manipulate people and keeps his eye on making the deal. A plausible character, drawn without

I didn't like his portrayal of the old farmer Sean Dota. This character is presented without any depth, understanding and certainly with no sympathy for his predicament. You could also accuse John B. of "Ageism" - I'm older now and very hot of this aspect of political correctness! Picasso was fathering children at about the same time as the play was written and in roughly the same age bracket as Sean Dota, but have you ever heard anyone express outright disgust about Picasso? Of course, unlike Sean Dota, Picasso had the advantage not just of money, but also genius, an education, lots of charm with women, lots of women. And John B's notion of love versus sexual desire, as put forward here through the character of the young lover, Liam Scuab, is also question-

John B. like all good story tellers, concentrates on the main protagonists in the drama, those who carry it forward. Both Sean Dota and Liam Scuab are almost peripheral to what is going on, but both are central to the story. The portrayal of the old man and the young man as being totally different is pushed to extremes by John B. in contrasting sexual desire without love and romantic love. Surely romantic love is based on sexual desire, they don't really separate.

So is the play simply about some notion of

true love denied, that between Liam Scuab and Sive? Yet John B. uses the character Mike to suggest that even this may not be as uncomplicated as it first seems. Is the play about the desire for money, on the part of Thomasheen and Mena - an understandable enough idea as the play is set, brutal though it seems. Does the play have any meaning at all for us in this post-celtic-tiger, multi-cultural country of ours where the events portrayed seem so totally alien? In essence, John B. Keane uses his shocking story to examine the whole problem of what love should be and to say how the young should not be traded for sex or money. And before you say this is banal and obvious, just look around you at the world we have constructed. Young people are sold on the lifestyle of sex without love. Where are the voices for romantic love?

We need to pay attention to this play, it gives us a message through an extremely brutal and shocking story which sits uncomfortably in the so-called liberal, enlightened world of today. No, you can't dismiss this as a play confined to a rural Ireland that is long dead and gone - it is here to haunt us as we look about us and see what we have done. It is surely one of the marks of a work of genius, that it can speak to us forty years after it was written. Take the opportunity to see this play, you will see an electrifying performance which will leave you breathless with its passion and astounded by its professional quality. 
