
While a decision to submit a new planning application may still be some time away, Clancy Construction are now giving clearer signals about this prospect and welcoming parts of the Inspectors re-

Despite these positive elements the development has still some way to go before reaching safe ground, and its future is dependant, to a large degree, on the on-going discussions between the developers, their planning advisors and the anchor tenant, Dunnes Stores.

Gandhi was shot dead the next year, by an Indian who disapproved of his support for religious toleration. He was given the 'Mahatma' name (Great Soul).




Fall Of The **Berlin Wall**

In 1961, a wall was built through Berlin in Germany to divide capitalist Western Europe from the communist


The wall came down in 1989, when the communist lost control of the USSR, and the cold war ended.

months ago - while objections are again likely should a new application be made.

The development was stalled for twelve months since permission was granted by Dungarvan Urban Council, with objections from the grocery and small retailers body RG-DATA, An Taisce, the Friends of the Environment along with a small number of local residents leading to the involvement of the appeals body, Bord Pleanala

Months of deliberation followed, including a four day oral August before a judgement was made public on New Years Day.

Amongst the reasons given, the 180 page report cites the projects failure to follow the principles in the towns development plan by failing to integrate with the rest of the commercial centre of the town. a failure to provide sufficient car-parking, its roads system and a lack of pedestrian links as its main problems.

The judgement expresses concern over the design and height of the building's in the development but more seriously for the projects future it describes the road system as "isolating".

It goes on to criticise the road plans for their failure to provide

provide enough car parking beyond the shopping complex's own needs.

This, the report says, "would militate against the integration of the development with the existing commercial centre of Dungaryan".

It also cites the outer road planned for the development as a danger to public safety due to the "excessive proximity" of parking spaces to the junction with Davitts Quay.

Finally, the report states that the planned construction of houses gabling onto Davis Street would "seriously injure the amenities of property in the vicinity and in particular those of the existing houses in Davis Street."

However, the report also points to a number of ways Clancy Construction could satisfy Bord Pleanala's criteria.

Among these are the redesigning of the buildings as well as the demolition of the former warehouse building which was intended to house the anchor store.

This would allow for the construction of a new building to house the anchor store and additional car parking above or below the anchor store build-

It also suggests that a planned mall beside the anchor store be

buildings around the boundary of the site to create a streetscape and that a clear and definite link to O'Connell Street is made.

Reacting to the outcome of Bord Pleanala's report County Manager Donal Connolly said that he was disappointed by the

"My initial reaction is that An Bord Pleanala clearly agree that this site is suitable for a major retail development and I am disappointed that they could not arrive at a positive decision". Mr. Connolly said.

The issuing of a refusal instead of putting conditions on the devlopment was also a source of concern for the County Manager but despite this, he added that he is satisfied that the inspectors concerns can be met in a new planning applica-

"I have had an initial discussion on the matter with Mr. Clancy, the developer, and he shares my view on the matter. I will be meeting him next week and I am confident that a new application to address the points raised by the descision of An Bord Pleanala can be with the Planning Authority within a reasonable time scale."

When the special meeting of the council is held I will be calling on the people of Abbeyside and Dungarvan to boycott the snops involved because these people don't want Dungarvan to develop at any cost," Cllr. O'Riordan said.

The Urban Councillor described the Oral Hearing into the development as a shambles. For the entire duration of the often detailed and technical hearing, Cllr. O'Riordan said, the Inspector took all his notes in long hand and had to work without either a tape recorder or a secretary

Labour Councillor Cllr. Billy Kyne also critcised the groups who objected to the decision saying that some businesses were using RGDA-TA as a flag of convenience to hide behind

"RGDATA is the main body

that mounted the objections", Cllr. Kyne said. "I was at public meetings where shopkeepers bravely and honestly supported this project and yet we have RGDATA at the forefront in holding up the needed development of this town."

Cllr. Kyne went on to call for RGDATA to reveal who the businesses from the town were that had mounted the challenge as he said the people of Dungarvan are entitled to know "the people who have sabotaged" this development.

However, Cllr. Kyne said he has been heartened by discussions he has had with Billy Clancy and County Manager Donal Connolly since the decision was made and is confident "that this project can be put back on the road".

Chamber of Commerce President David Reynolds, meanwhile, said he was shocked and disappointed with the outcome.

The Chamber, which represent's local businesses, had originally objected to the development on the grounds that the exit and entry roads into the site were not sufficent.

This objection was dropped, though, after a public meeting on the Glanbia development and Mr. Reynold's said he was particularly surpised given that agreement had been reached on these entry points.

"The Chamber of Commerce is fully supportive of this development", he added. "While businesses in the town have done well over the Christmas period, a number of people still go elsewhere to do their shopping."

The repercussions of the decision could be immense. Ratepayers look likely to be hit due to the failure to develop the Glanbia site. Currently the council is losing over E100,000 a year in rates which has led to a significant rise in rate charges since the Glanbia facility was closed in 1998.

Another concern that had initally been raised was that chances of decentralisation of a Government Department to Dungarvan would be hindered as the infrastructure would not be in place on the Glanbia site.

However, a spokesperson for the Office of Public Works, the Department involved, said that the situation had not changed either way since An Bord Pleanala's decision.

Leakage of business to other towns and cities across the South East and beyond has also been estimated at over E14m and some development of the Glanbia site, whether by Clancy Constructions proposal or other interests is seen as an imperative.

Ingredients:



PREHEAT the grill and remove all of the excess fat from the ham steaks. Slash the remaining fat at 1cm intervals otherwise the edges will curl up while cooking.

Mix together the dry mustard and brown sugar with the honey and ginger and add 2 tblspns of peach syrup from the can of peach halves. You can discard of the rest of the syrup as it is no longer needed.

Banana and Rum Yoghurt raam

AFTER bananas, the main ingredient is natural yoghurt. Great if you have a sweet tooth but enjoy a meal packed with natural goodness.

Ingredients:

(Serves 4-6)

- 350g bananas, mashed
- Juice of a lemon
- 4 tblspns rum
- 100g icing sugar 300ml plain yoghurt

60ml double cream, lightly whipped

50g plain chocolate

Take the banana and mix and mash it in with the lemon juice and rum.

Stir in all of the icing sugar and yoghurt and then gently fold in all of the double cream. Spoon the mixture into separate serving bowls and chill in a fridge for a minimum of 30 minutes.

For decoration when chilled, remove it from the fridge and use a cheese grater to create chocolate curls on top of the cream yogurt.

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: n/a

A GREAT and versatile relish which can be enjoyed with hot winter meals, meats and vegetables - as well as salads and vegetarian dish-

Ingredients:

(Serves 4)

- 1/2 cucumber
- 1 large peeled carrot
- Half a red chilli, finely diced 3 tblspns cider vinegar
- 1 tblspn honey
- 1 tblspn dark soy sauce

Using a cheese grater, coarsely grate all of the carrot and cucumber.

Mix together in a small serving bowl.

Combine the honey with the soy sauce, cider vinegar and half chilli in a small bowl and mix vigorously.

Pour the mixture in with the carrot and cucumber, and stir - making sure it is thoroughly mixed in.

Leave to marinate while you prepare the rest of the meal.

Serve as a side dish or as a relish to accompany meats.





He was a very keen sportsman with a love of many sports but his first love was Gaelic football. Playing at centre field he brought Touraneena its first ever title when Sliabh gCua won the 1936 Junior Football County Championship. At that time there was only Senior and Junior football with very little between them. A very fit and high fielding midfielder, Ned went on to give many more years of service to Sliabh gCua. After the demise of the great '36 team, the club went out of existence. The club was reformed in the sixties with Ned one of the leading lights in its reformation. In 1972 Ned was a member of the Sliabh gCua Set Dancing team, who together with Monnie Hallahan, brought Touraneena and Waterford its first All Ireland John Troy, Funeral Directors, Senior Scor title.

In later years Ned looked after the local cemetery and also helped out in the church. He was a deeply religious man who thoroughly enjoyed the time he spent working in St. Mary's Church.

LOCAL
PERSONALITIES
Dr. Michael F. Moloney

(1888-1934) — He was the son of Captain Moloney (of A. Moloney & Sons) merchant and shipowner of Priory House, Dungarvan. Dr. Moloney was educated at the Augustinian College, Dungarvan. He attended Clongowes from 1900-1905. He graduated MB, BCH, BAO from the National Hairman of Iran

MB, BCH, BAO from the National University of Ireland in 1911. In 1914 he was appointed Coroner for west Waterford. He had a keen interest in the Irish language and took an active interest in the Irish Independence movement. He was arrested and imprisoned in 1920. In his capaci-

ty as a doctor he was called on to attend the wounded republican leader, Liam Lynch. Dr. Moloney was also interested in fishing and hunting. He was President of the local St. Vincent de Paul. He qualified as a pharmacist in 1918 and he had a pharmacy attached to his surgery in Mary Street. In 1919 he wrote a book titled: 'Lulbh -Sheancas or Irish Ethno -Botany and the Evolution of Medicine in Ireland'. His name appears in Irish on the cover. The book deals with the use of native herbs by the hereditary physicians of the Irish clans. Dr. Moloney built his own house at the Youghal Road and had designed a herb garden. He died on 4 February 1934.

ORDER SEEDS AND SEED **POTATOES**

The very first task of January should be to compile a list of all the seeds you will need over the coming months. Get these ordered without delay. Many seeds cannot be sown after March or April. Later on producers are inundated with orders and even the biggest companies get bogged under. Set potato seeds in shallow trays as soon as they arrive eyed ends up, and place them in a light, frost-proof room.

BRING SHRUBS AND ROSES IN POTS TO THE GREENHOUSE

Roses well established in pots should be brought into the greenhouse now. Give them a light airy place preferably above ground level not too far from the glass. Water the soil regularly and spray them every morning with a little luke warm water. All the roses must be pruned and previous year's growth shortened to within an inch of the older wood.

PRUNE CLIMBERS IN THE GREENHOUSE

Several permanent climbers commonly grown in the greenhouse should have been pruned by now. These include plumbago capenis and the passion flower. The plumbago is pruned by cutting last year's growth back to 23cm.

CLG TULACH AN IARAINN Field Development Underway

Field Committee Chairman Liam Moroney outlined in some detail at our recent A.G.M. plans for development of our club facilities. Many smaller clubs throughout the county have upgraded their grounds which are a credit to them. To be honest our own set up is a bit of an embarrassment. We are a senior hurling club that has enjoyed remarkable success at every level down the decades. Our facilities hardly reflect this. It is an area that has been neglected for far too long but now at last is being seriously addressed. The clubs integrated plan will be completed over three phases. Phase I has already commenced

Phase 1: According to our engineers report the club has sufficient ground, with some realignment of the the present field, to encompass two full size pitches. Such are the very welcome demands on the grounds at the moment that a second playing field is now a necessity. Apart from our own adult teams we need to cater properly for juvenile teams, Tallow camogie club and Tallow girls football. All of us have a duty to provide recreational and sporting facilities for the youth of the parish. The undeveloped land at the back of the Brideside goal is being drained and will then be levelled and reseeded. Lighting system will be installed along the Loughnasolus (appropriately enough) side of the main field. New nets will be put up behind the roadside goals which should cut down on lost sliotars and help balance the books. This initial stage is to be completed this year.

Phase 2: The lights along the townside of the field will be completed in the second stage of development.By then we should be ready for our first hurling match under floodlights. The main pitch will be realigned, or turned slightly if you like, and the lower field (all going well with drainage and reseeding) will be brought into play. (This field has yet to be officially christened but we'll call it Fadas bog for now). Areas of the main pitch will also have to be levelled. This is a delicate enough process as it can be counterproductive if the sod is interfered with too much.

Phase 3: The final piece of the jig-saw will be the construction of modern dressing rooms and car park. Many people thought this would be a priority but the consensus among players and officials alike was that field should come first- quite right in my opinion. Planning restrictions with regard to sewage prohibit the development of dressing rooms on the present site. The new location will be at the town side and will be positioned to service both fields

There you have it. An ambitious programme but not before time. The speed with which it can be completed, and I think we should be on fast forward, will be determined by the funds at our disposal. To date we have received £30,000 from Lotto funding. The rest is being funded from your generous contributions to the Lotto and Deise draws. There will be a concerted effort by the club to 10crease our income from the Deise draw and we appeal for your support. At the end of the day it is the parish and particularly the youth of the parish who will benefit.

Ball Alley Ready To Go: The lights have been installed and we will be ready to hurl ball in the next week. Im gratified by the amount of interest shown by a number of our senior squad in using the alley to hone skills. That is what its all about. Some of these lads have had to drive out of town to avail of facilities we have here . I will be contacting players this week with more details. The voluntary efforts of the St. Patrick's Hall committee have made this possible and we thank them

IFA WELCOMED **EXTENSION OF** SPECIAL **PURCHASE** SCHEME

Waterford IFA new Live stock Committee Chairman Tom Leahy has welcomed the announcement from the Minister for Agriculture and EU Commission extending the SPS (Special Beef Premium) for cows to March 31st 2002.

Mr Leahy said the SPS is an essential market support and must be continued. Mr Bryan said the 40,000t quota limit imposed until the end of March is unacceptable and Minister Walsh must insist that flexibility is retained on both the volume of SPS and the final closing date.

The Waterford IFA livestock leader said the last four months have been extremely difficult with low cattle prices. He said a lot of farmers who sold over 30 month cattle had lost money. He said despite strong SPS support for cows which was very important, intervention for steers was useless and allowed over 30 month cattle prices fall to unacceptable loss making levels.

In addition, Mr Leahy said the ultimate failure to reopen our international markets was the single biggest problem on cattle prices which still remains to be resolved.

Irish Farmers Handbook 2002 Edition Launched

Since the launch of the first Irish Farmers Handbook in November 1993 there have been many changes in Irish Agriculture and for the country's farmers the Handbook has proven to be the means whereby they acquired an understanding of these changes to equip them for the administrative obstacle course that lay ahead. For example, 1993 saw the introduction of the 'cheque in the post' which heralded the beginning of what appears to have become an never ending paper trail. The Irish Farmers Handbook attempts each year to present the farmer with a readable, understandable working guide to all of the rules, regulations, schemes and opportunities that he or she faces on a day to day basis. The Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh T.D. has described the handbook as 'an essential source of information for farmers the length and breath of the country' and how true this is as each edition contains 370 pages of up to the minute information. In fact, when the Handbook is launched each year just a few days after the Budget and it contains full details of the tax changes for the year ahead as they affect farmers, that's how up to date it is. The 2002 edition contains a number of new or substantially revised sections that will be of interest to many farmers.





Dairying **GET READY!**

- Spend a few hours per day preparing for the busiest period of the year.
- In February/March you will be working 11-13 hours per

Plan and prepare now so that you can minimise the hardship and length of the day's work.

- Get the calving area ready now:
- You need 3-4 calving boxes for 50 cows.
- Secure gates in place now.
- A restraining gate is very useful.
- Make sure floors are non-slip.
- Whitewash the walls or at least power-wash and disin-
- Have you enough straw bedding?
- Set up your viewing camera.
- Have your calving jack, ropes, disinfectant, buckets. gloves etc. ready.
- Too few calving boxes can result in a lot of disease in calves and cows because enough time doesn't exist to clean out houses after each calving.
- This last point cannot be over emphasised.
- The seepage from the calving boxes must be collected separately and not let flow down the yard where other cows exercise.
- A "maternity ward", where cows within 7-10 days of calving are moved into, ensures the cows are easily observed for signs of calving and no unannounced calvings take place on the muck in cubicle houses.
- The calf house must be prepared so that the calf has a dry bed, fresh air and adequate lying space without any draughts:
- Urine must be removed fast as the calf gives back 80% of what he drinks
- Each calf required 0.75 sq.ft inlet and outlet area so as to have adequate air change.
- Young calves require 12-15 sq. ft floor area and more as they get bigger.
- Old calf houses must be power washed, disinfected and whitewashed
- You will need a few individual pens for sick calves.
- Calf rearing is taking 1.5 hours/day for 47 calves in March (Moorepark).
- To reduce this we must plan to minimise the use of buckets, carrying milk manually from the milking parlour to the calf house and taking out bedding with 4 pronged forks.
- Loose penning, allowing calves feed from teats or steel troughs has to be planned for if you are to reduce the labour requirement.
- Milk should be pumped from the dairy or transported by means of a mobile feeder to the calf house.
- Once per day feeding must be practised from 10-14 days old.
- Also plan to let calves out onto grass from the middle of March onwards, as this practice is working well.

Milking Machine:

- Get it serviced now by a qualified technician.
- Liners, worn rubber, diaphragms must be replaced.
- Vacuum pump should be washed out with diesel.
- Regulator should be cleaned with methylated spirits.
- Pulsators and relays must be checked.
- Draw hot water through the pulse tube, through the pulsators/relays and into the vacuum line to clean them
- As an alternative to a dump line use an old churn or milk bucket in the pit. This is being done but you have to lift this churn out of the pit (backache).
- My South Tipperary friend suggests leaving the churn in the dairy and using a long milk tube to attach onto the relevant unit.
- Consider the addition of a dump line, an automatic bulk tank and milking machine washer, if these chores are slowing you down in the parlour.
- If you are milking more than 8 cows per unit consider adding a few more units to your machine.
- These suggestions should be seriously considered if you are paying a lot of tax or if you are expanding.
- Some well-informed farmers could and do service their milking machines themselves.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I understand that in Budget 2002 it was announced that an income disregard is to be introduced for people receiving a disability payment who sell their home. Can you please give the details?

ANSWER

Since April 1990, where a person over 66 years of age receiving either Old Age Non-Contributory Pension, Widow's/Widower's Non-Contributory Pension or One-Parent Family Payment sold his/her principal residence, the gross amount of money received from the sale, up to a maximum of £150,000 (€190,460.71) (since July 2000), has not been counted as means. To avail of this exemption the house must have been sold to enable the person to purchase or rent alternative accommodation or to move into a private nursing home.

In Budget 2002 a new circumstance under which someone receiving Old Age Non-Contributory Pension might avail of the sale of residence disregard was announced. From April 2002, if the person sells his/her main residence in order to move in with a person who is caring for him/her and who is in receipt of a carer's payment or in order to move into sheltered or special housing, then he/she can avail of the £150,000 (€190,460,71) disregard.

Similarly, from April 2002 a person receiving Disability Allowance or Blind Person's Pension can avail of the disregard providing he/she is selling his home for the same purpose. If the person sells his/her residence in order purchase or rent alternative accommodation or to move into a private nursing home he/she will not be eligible for the sale of residence disregard.







LOCAL HISTORY

When the great nine years' war ended in 1603 the first Irish nationalist rebellion had been defeated. A pattern had been set. Henceforth, the new Irish nationalism was Catholic and looked abroad for aid to defend its people against future challenges to its property and its religion. Later still it depended on foreign aid to revolt against English rule. English politicians and business people on the other hand had long been convinced that to pacify and rule Ireland they needed to adopt a new policy of the confiscation of Irish land and subsequent plantation with English and Scottish settlers. This they saw as the only means to rule and pacify the country. Catholic estates should be confiscated and loyal settlers planted in their stead. In pursuance of this policy they ignored the loyalty of so many Catholic landowners during the rebellions. The Catholic religion was, as they saw it, the religion of those who were allies of their continental enemies, real or potential, and was a source of danger to the safety of the monarchy.

PULMONARY PROGRAMME WILL **SAVE LIVES**

Saint Joseph's Hospital in Clonmel became the first hospital in the South East and only the third in the country to set up a life-saving program for people with breathing difficulties. The pulmonary Rehabilitation Program which began in St. Joseph's Hospital at the end of last October is aimed at patients with chest conditions like chronic air way disease. The programme was originally set up in St. Michael's Dun-Laoghaire where statistics showed a 75% drop in admission of patients with chest conditions who had completed the programme. Co-ordinator of the programme in St. Joseph's Senior Chartered Physiotherapist Angela Radley said that six new patients will be enrolled into the program each month in the Physiotherapy Department of the hospital.

The first graduates of the program in St. Joseph's received their certificates last week. They are Michael Dolan, Clonmel. Patrick Coyne, Ballinamult. Jim Lawrence, Carrickon-Suir. Margaret O' Mahony, Clonmel.

The program consists of educational lectures by a psychologist, a pharmacist, a respiratory nurse, a physiotherapist, a dietician and a consultant physician. Patients also completed an exercise programme in breathing tests and relaxation techniques and will continue to be assessed every six weeks after they complete the program. Manager of St. Joseph's Hospital Breda Kavanagh presented the certificates to the graduates.



Kilkenny have again produced a delightful Year Book and apart from the numerous records, photographs and articles by leading GAA personalities, inside and outside the county, a generous amount of space is devoted to club activity, with every senior club in the county submitting reports. It is a very good read. A copy was handed on to me by a colleague.

Talso had a peep at the Dublin and Cork annuals and will likely see other county annuals in the weeks ahead.

I was delighted to be given a copy of the Handball Year Book, which is delightfully presented and gives a clear insight into the way in which the game is developing and progressing in most counties.

It is nice to see that quite an amount of space is devoted to the progress of the game in Portlairge and a very informative and well written article by Ray McAndrew puts our players well into the picture

For many years we have been reading about the achievements of such dedicated players as veterans. John Kiely, Declan Mulcahy, Mossy Butler and Martin Sandford, and all are still very much to the fore in the business according to the report. John Kiely, who has won so many honours in the game, is now home after a spell in hospital and his huge group of admirers will be delighted to hear that he is in very fine fettle and almost fully recovered.

In the juvenile section are the players who will hopefully lead the county at the game in the years ahead and under the photographs of Patrick Hurney, John Kindregan, Michael Brennan, Seamus Lavan, Jason O'Brien and company are the details of the championship titles won by them in 2001.

New Official Guide

All the many rule changes which have taken place over the past five years are listed in the new rule book, which was published a few months ago by Croke Park. Club officers throughout this county have obtained a copy and it is important that the book be studied to some extent, at least in order to ensure that they will be familiar with the changes which may effect them.

Among the many changes are the reduction of the term for lodging objections, appeals, etc. These are now halved, The Official Guide was on sale at all the conventions and purchased by every, or almost every club.

Strategic Review Report

This committee, with clearly defined terms of reference, was set up by Association President, Sean McCague over 18 months ago. It was intended that the recommendations of the committee (if subsequently approved by Annual Congress) would charter the policy and direction of the GAA for the next quarter of a century or so, as did the MacNamee report which was commissioned in 1971.

Like all such committees, there was a 'mole' or two included and when some of the proposed recommendations were leaked to the media, there was serious concern in some quarters about what was being proposed.

As a result of the leaks, it is expected that the proposals will have a far reaching effect on the whole Association. Whether or not these will be seen to be for the betterment of the association, is something we will have to wait and see.

The final report was due for publication before Christmas but for some reason had to be deferred.

The final meeting of the special committee took place at Croke Park on Saturday last so the long awaited report should be available shortly.

The amalgamation of some weaker counties for the purpose of fielding strong hurling teams in the championships, is believed to be one of the major proposals.

At Congress last year, Sean McCague expressed very serious concern about the state of the game of hurling and only last week, he reiterated this concern when speaking at the Royal College of Surgeons in Dublin. It will be interesting to see if the proposals from the committee will include the proper remedies to rescue the game. At present, only 8 or 9 counties are playing the game at a high standard. Maybe the restructured intercounty hurling championship to be introduced this year, will bring about some improvement, as it did in football last year.
