The area in Coolbeggan West, Knockanore was selected by the consultants hired by the local authority, Fehily Waste Consultations as the "next best" option for a landfill behind Garrynagree in the Lickey Valley.

The controversial selection of the Garrynagree site for a landfill serving the entire county has led to a High Court challenge. A judgement is still pending but should the challenge be upheld the council may be forced to look to Knock-

sion for a dwelling and entrance on part of this site has been refused with the possible dangers to the groundwater supply given as one of the main reasons.

The groundwater feeds into Youghal's water supply and the report drawn up by the planning department states the site is zoned as highly vulnerable to pollution.

It goes on to say "the proposed development would be seen as militating against the proper planning and development of the area by reason of the risk of contamination to groundwater in the area."

The situation was brought

Councillor James Tobin who queried now the consultants could justify proposing a landfill when just putting down a septic tank for a house would endanger the local water.

"I had little faith in the consultants before", he said "but I have less faith in them





Mary Elizabeth Blake, **Boston**

Mary Elizabeth McGrath was born in Dungarvan in 1840. In 1849 her family emigrated to Quincy, Massachusetts where her father set up a marble works. He was described as 'a man of scholarly tastes and extensive reading. Mary Elizabeth was educated at home as a young girl. She attended the Quincy High School and George B. Emerson's private school in Boston. She studied music and languages at the Academy of the Sacred Heart, Manhattanville New York. In 1865 she married Dr. John G. Blake of Boston. They had

eleven children.

As a teenager her poems and stories were published in The Pilot under the pen name 'Marie'. Later on she contributed work to the Boston Gazette and other Boston dailies. She was often commissioned to write special commemorative poems. As well as articles published in numerous papers and periodicals she also wrote the following books: - 'Poems' in 1882, 'On the Wing' in 1883, 'The Merry Months All' 1885, 'Youth in Twelve Centuries', 1886. She coauthored 'Mexico: Picturesque, Political, Progressive', in 1888 with Margaret F. Sullivan of Chicago. They also published a book on their travels in Europe.

Mary Elizabeth died on 26 February 1907.



The night of Thursday, January 10 was cold. I was sitting in my winter coat in Halla Naomh Colmain in the midst of considerable chaos. But the heating was on, the stage and set were up and Aisteoiri an tSean Phobail were about to have their first dress rehearsal of Declan Terry's production of Sive. This would be my first time to see the play. My contribution, organising the programme, was complete and I had collected the print run that afternoon. So I relaxed as the last minute discussions and arrangements went on in this improvised theatre. And then they started. I had read the script, but seeing the play was entirely different. I sat transfixed, caught up and carried away in the powerful drama. What I hadn't expected from the script was the wit and the colour and depth of language which was now in full flight. I was happy for them all and particularly for Declan Terry. I felt sure the audience would love it.

Late Friday afternoon and the hall was alive with armies of busy ants, each with a specialist function, all striving to get everything ready for that night. Last minute alterations and additions to the set, the strong smell of spray paint as Joe Reed adds the final touches, Declan Terry is hanging off a ladder as he fixes an ancient scythe above the stage, Maurice Power is pushing seating into place, Cait Keating is working on the kitchen arrangements for the interval refreshments and Norah Terry is everywhere. It seemed the entire community was in action and Margaret Costin is telling us the show is booked out to-night and Sunday and what will she do with any others who turn up!

People came enormous distances to see the play, from Tralee, from the Midlands and they even arrived from overseas. Despite the well announced arrangements for seating, those who hadn't booked queued in hope. We squashed in as many as we could, standing them at the back of the hall. The lights dimmed and right from then they loved it. It was astonishing to see the young children enthralled in the play. Like the adults, they were transfixed by the drama, laughter and applause breaking out during each of the two acts. At the end, there was a stunned silence which seemed to go on forever. Then the hall erupted like a volcano.

On Sunday they queued again for another performance despite the complete capacity booking. This audience was different, at first they seemed to take longer to react and show their involvement. I wondered if something was wrong. Yet the play was running even more smoothly, the actors interacting even better with each other and giving their performances even more depth. But there was no need to have worried, the audience was captivated as the play progressed and showed their appreciation in their applause. And at the end, again a stunned total silence. After a little while, the audience came back to earth, then arose in a standing ovation!

Now that I've seen the play in performance, I am sure that John B. Keane created a timeless masterpiece in his play Sive. His rich use of language as he unfolds his terrible tale amidst laughter, only serves to heighten the shock of the climax. I am awestruck by the fluidity of his writing and his skill as a dramatist. He spins a wonderfully entertaining tale, full of humour. Then he punches hard, leaving you feeling hurt and outraged at romantic love and innocence betrayed.

I am also sure that everyone who has been fortunate enough to see Declan Terry's production and the performance of Aisteoiri an tSean Phobail knows they have been a part of world class theatre. With the support of the community, he and his wonderful cast have produced a performance that would credit any stage anywhere.

If you have already seen it, you may want to see it again and find new treasures in this remarkable play. But specially for all those who could not be accommodated in the first two performances, Aisteoiri an tSean Phobail have agreed to put on an extra performance on Sunday, January 20 at 8.00pm in An Halla Naomh Colmain, Old Parish. As production became progressively more professional, guest artistes were sometimes introduced. 

Earthquakes and **Volcanoes**

The fireworks of a volcano and the trembling of the earth during an earthquake are two of the most dramatic and terrifying happenings on our planet. They are both caused by the slow movement of the plates of the Earth's crust.

A volcano is a place where molten rock, called magma, comes to the surface. On land, volcanoes from where rocks have been melted underground as two plates are forced together. When such a volcano erupts, magma is pushed out of it, together with tonnes of ash. Once it is above ground, magma is called lava. It flows down the side of the volcano, devastating the land.



Earthquakes are powerful vibra- The tectronic plates of the Earth's crust move slowly (a few centimetres per year), but where they collide or rub against each other, they do so. Volcanoes and earthquakes occur most often along the boundary between in the Earth's crust. Most tremors with enormous force. When one plate is forced against another, vibrations are too slight to feel, but a large are set up (imagine the noise of rubbing two heavy stones together). These massive vibrations are earthquakes and can cause great damage.





The INTO report suggested that many primary schools have inadequate toilet or washing facilities, inadequate heating systems and problems with drinking water, worn doors and windows and insufficient - or even dangerous - conditions in the playground. Claims of Celtic Tiger prosperity delivering a better education system, or indeed notions of good Government, are undermined by the publication of such a verifiable report. New Waste Collection Tags along with an increased collection service, new recycling and wheelie bin tags have been introduced for customers on County Council collection routes. From now on the charge for up to 4 sacks of recyclables is £3 and the charge for each wheel bin collection is £6. The change is necessary because of the increasing costs of waste management. Since the £3 tag was introduced in 2000, the cost of waste management has increased 100% to approximately 1.1 million pounds per annum. These costs provide for Ireland's increased standards in relation to environmental protection in relation to waste management, the provision of Ireland's first urban and rural recycling scheme, provision and upgrading of extra recycling bring centres, provision of extra collection vehicles, the home composting scheme, and the provision of new transfer stations.

Under the old charging system, the maximum a householder could have paid by putting the wheel bin out every week was 198 (£156). Under the new charging system, if recycling and refuse is put out every alternate week, the maximum a householder could pay is 234 (£184). This represents an increase of 18% if households use every available collection. However, for households that are recycling and composting as much as possible the charges will not represent much of an increase because the wheel bin need not be put out for every collection. New calendars will be issued shortly to explain these charges and to give helpful hints on how to reduce the amount of waste your household produces and save your-

Recycling in Ireland is an expensive business. Because of the lack of an indigenous recycling industry and high transport costs. Ireland is at a disadvantage when it comes to recycling. The profits from selling the recyclable material alone cannot cover the costs of their recovery. So even though the environmental benefits of recycling are obvious, the financial costs are high. This is one of the reasons why we have been so far behind other European countries in terms of recycling.

In order to make recycling in Co Waterford feasible, Samshire Recycling in Lismore receives subsidies from the Council, who collect household recyclables, and from Repak, who represent the companies that produce packaging waste. Samshire then sorts and ships the materials to markets, mostly in the UK, where prices can vary month to month. For example this month's price per tonne for paper can vary from a cost of £10 for mixed paper to a profit of £30 for white office paper. The profits this month for a tonne of plastic can vary from £15 for low-grade plastic to £155 for clear plastic bottles. Collection Dates

The collection of recyclables has been changed from a monthly to a fortnightly collection. This has caused some confusion for which Waterford County Council would like to apologise. We hope to have calendars in all of the local shops by the end of this week. For this week (beginning the 14th of January) recyclables will be collected from households on the County Council collection routes and refuse will be collected from Dungarvan UDC customers. This will be reversed the following week. This increase in the collection of recyclable has been introduced with the new tag system and will provide a better service to our customers.

Is the Recycling Scheme Working? The good news is that for the first 2 months of the scheme, a total of 426 tonnes of recyclables has been collected from households and bring centres in the county. This represents a 50% increase on the amount of recyclables collected from bring centres in the county for the whole of last year. Please remember to sort your recyclables and do not include non recyclables in your clear plastic sacks. Congratulations to everyone for taking part in the scheme and keep up the good work!





This week in the Garden

SOW BEGONIAS, GLOXINIAS AND OTHER PLANTS

Sowings in a warm greenhouse should be carried out on begonias gloxinias, streptocarpus, canna, verbe na, antirrhinium and scarlet salvia With the exception of canna, all can be kept in a temperature of around 18 c.

Canna needs 24°c. These plants will be quite big by May, when most plants can be put back into the garden once more, there should be lots of high quality flowers

PLANT POTATOES IN FRAMES

Potatoes in frames and pots are not difficult to grow, but they do take up quite a bit of space. This is the time to start though if you want them. Plant one well sprouted tuber per 20cm pot full of compost or plant them in rows 30cm apart.

MULCH ASPARAGUS BEDS

If possible get hold of some well rotted farmvard manure and break it up well. Spread it a couple of inches thick over the asparagus beds. This will really improve the quality of the shoots

Protect cauliflowers

The curds of the cauliflowers will need protecting as they start to form. Bend the outer leaves over the curds and cover as much as possible from the harsh weather.

But Fine Gael Councillor Paudie Coffey pointed out that no work has been carried out up to now and believed incentives for developers should have been offered from the outset. "People around the county said this scheme would fail without proper incentives. It's a year and a half later and no development has taken place", he said.

His party colleague Cllr. Willie McDonnell was also critical and described the plans as "badly drawn up".

"I'm glad there has been some improvement to the scheme", Cllr. McDonnell said "but I still wonder if this is going to make any difference to the four towns involved".

However Chairman of the Council, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said councillors were too quick to knock the Renewal Scheme and accused some representatives of condemning it from day one

Disputing Cllr. Coffey's statement that no development has taken place Cllr. Wilkinson went on to say he knew of places where they have taken place and were not included in the report. Meanwhile, the council report blames the slow participation on property owners not making proposals for redevelopment.

"As the Town Renewal Scheme is specific to identified properties", the report says, "the Council is reliant on these property owners coming forward with proposals for the development and upgrading of their properties".

It also blames the delay in commencing the commercial and industrial tax incentive package on the lack of interest

The deadline for qualification of the tax incentives has now been extended from the end of this year until the 31st of December 2004 and Waterford County Council will be advertising the details in the coming weeks.

vidual decision on an application for planning permission without looking at the other reasons as well", Mr. Connolly said. "The reality is the particular person in question already had two permissions granted.'

Defending the consultants report the County Manager said he believed it was "quite right" and was based on investigations they had carried out.

Yes there is a locally important aquifer but it's locally important not a regionally important one."

He said the site also met with the Environmental Protection Agency's requirements for a landfill while there were other reasons for the refusal of planning permission for the house.

The second reason laid down for the refusal of permission deals with the County Development Plan. This states that the building of a house on the Knockanore site would be contrary to the Development Plan as it would be a ribbon development.

This was not accepted by Cllr Tobin who described the decision to allow the possibility of a dump in the area but not houses as "stupid and ridiculous"

The decision to refuse permission for the construction of houses on the site is already being viewed as a means of "leaving the door open" should the siting of a dump in Garrynagree fail its final High Court hurdle.

Bowlers running into protected area. This protected area starts 5ft in front of the popping crease and is 2ft wide ie. (1ft either side of a line joining 2 middle stumps) Warning to bowler or batsman. Possible 5 run penalty.

Delivery bouncing 3 times or more No Ball.

Delivery which rolls along the ground before reaching

popping crease No Ball.

Delivery coming to rest before reaching batsman also No Ball but the batsman no longer has any right to hit it. Once umpire calls No Ball he will also call Dead Ball.

Bouncer. Delivery which bounces and goes over the head of the batsman standing upright at the crease No Ball. Not a wide. Still No Ball even if batsman hits it.

Full toss (Beamer). Fast delivery ball reaching batsman waist high when he is standing upright at the crease No Ball. Full toss (Beamer) Slow delivery Shoulder Height when batsman standing upright No Ball.

Both types, bouncer or beamer will attract the relevant part of the cautionary procedure which can lead to the

bowler being taken off.

Batsman. The timed out law has changed dramatically. At the fall of wicket the incoming now has 3 mins in which to be in a position to either take guard or if nonstricker be ready for his partner to receive next delivery. There is no room for excuses - the batting captain should ensure the next man in is fully kitted out and ready. Incoming and outgoing batsmen should cross on the field of play. Any protracted delay could lead to the game being awarded to the fielding side, without an appeal being made.

A catch - a batsman can now be caught if the ball touches any part of the glove on the hand which is holding the bat.

Wide Ball. The ball no longer has to be "Out of reach of the striker" to be wide. If it is not close enough for him to hit it "by means of a normal cricket stroke" it will be called wide.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I bought a jacket that was reduced in the January sales. discovered a problem with the lining and I am wondering if I have any rights since the jacket was reduced in the

ANSWER

You have the same consumer rights when you buy goods in a sale as you would normally have i.e. they must be of merchantable quality, fit for their purpose and as described. Even if a retailer displays a notice refusing to exchange or refund you still have rights under consumer law. Your rights are governed by the Sale of Goods and Supply of Services Act 1980.

You should return the jacket as soon as possible to the retailer as your rights are against the retailer (not the manufacturer). Leave the jacket lining as it is because tampering or attempting to repair it may affect your claim. Make sure you have your receipt or some other proof of

In some cases a shop may offer a credit note. You do not have to accept a credit note. Indeed, taking this option means that you cannot later demand a refund

In general consumers have a wide range of rights in relation to goods and services purchased, but the extent of the rights can vary depending on the sales contract. Further information is available from:

The use of a Laser Card can be an economic and quick way to getting cash. Some banks do not charge any account fees to customers who maintain credit balance on their accounts. Other banks offer this incentive exclusively to customers who maintain a certain minimum credit balance on their accounts.

Banking online is a facility which gives you control over your accounts via the Internet. Contact your local bank who will set up this facility for you by way of passwords etc. It will enable you to pay bills, check the balance on your credit card, and transfer funds from one account to another.

It may take a while to change your habit of banking, but once your first Bank Statement comes with little or no charges, it gives you the encouragement you need to keep on managing your finances better.



Motion Calling For Release Of Suspected Terrorists Backed By Council

A motion calling for the release of three suspected terrorists, arrested for allegedly training Marxist Guerrilla's in South America, was backed by Waterford County Council at last Monday's monthly meeting.

The three Irish citizens, all of whom were previously members of Sinn Fein, were arrested after being tracked in the non-militarised jungle zone in Columbia. It is alleged that the three men, one of whom had been a member of Sinn Fein's executive and another the parties spokesperson in Cuba, were aiding FARC guerrilla's in the development of their bombmaking expertise.

While a tentative peace process has existed in the South American state for some time United States authorities still list FARC second only to Al Queda as potential terrorist threats and have poured millions into the Colombian Governments war efforts.

With the arrest of the three Irishmen, the fragile Colombian peace process has begun to unravel. Recently the Colombian Government issued an ultimatum demanding FARC leave the non-militarised zone and have amassed troops at the edge of the territory to win the land ceded to the Guerrilla's - as part of the peace settlement - back.

Against this backdrop, Waterford County Council adopted a Shannon Town Commission motion, calling on Irish Council's to row behind a high profile campaign for the release of the three Irishmen

the three Irishmen.

The motion was proposed by Fine Gael Councillor Tom Higgins who believed this call was justified as "the Colombian Government is corrupt and supported by a group of drug

barons".

Cllr. Higgins, a Dungarvan based doctor, had previously made controversial comments about foreign policy. At a previous meeting he supported a motion condemning the American bombing of Afghanistan. At that time he described the bombing as "schizophrenic attacks, first dropping food and then dropping bombs".

However, his Fine Gael colleague Cllr. Paudie Coffey, described the motion as irrelevant as it wouldn't change the Colombian authorities minds but could be viewed by some in the current climate as supporting international terrorism.

This point was rejected though by Ardmore representative Cllr Tom Cronin.

"Since when did these men become terrorists?" he asked. "They haven't been convicted of anything and they haven't gone to trial. They surely have to be viewed as innocent at this

But Cllr. Coffey retorted that the men were found carrying false passports. "At the very least they are guilty of that and I don't believe they were out there for the sightseeing or their health".

A vote on the motion was held with nine councillors supporting the release of the men and six objecting including Cllr. Billy Kyne and Cllr. Ger Barron of Labour, Cllr. Paudie Coffey and Cllr. John Deasy of Fine Gael and Independent Cllrs. Betty Twomey and Lola O'Sullivan.

Deasy Questions Salmon Policy

Cllr. John Deasy has questioned the government's policy on salmon fishing which rules out any buy-out of commercial netting. The policy would introduce quotas on a district basis to achieve catch reductions.

Deasy said, "Salmon stocks are severely depleted around the country and conservation measures are necessary. However fishermen around the country were given the understanding that a government funded buy-out of commercial netting would be available. That doesn't seem to have materialized."

Minister of the Marine, Frank Fahey has said that his department would continue to support set-aside schemes in local catchments, subject to Exchequer funding. Deasy described this comment as "strange to say the least. The salmon fishing industry has been massively downsized in the county over the years and inshore fishermen had expected a buy-out option. This has now been rejected and judging from the Minister's comments there is no guarantee tion will be forthcoming. The Minister must lobby harder for the organizations he is supposed to represent and demand decent Exchequer funding for fishermen."

Deasy continued, "There is a social issue at stake here as well. Many salmon fishermen have seen their incomes crumbling and a way of life is disappearing as a result. We have to conserve salmon but we also have to conserve the livelihoods of people who make their living from fishing. That requires providing proper compensation and a Minister who is willing to fight his corner at Cabinet level."

He also tasted All-Ireland senior hurling glory in 1986. playing at left half-back on the team which beat Galway in the final. He won a Munster Senior football championship in 1987 and played at left full-back on the team which lost to Meath in the All-Ireland final. He was at full-back again a year later when Cork drew with Meath in the All-Ireland football final but was replaced by Stephen O'Brien for the replay, which Cork lost. He was on the subs bench when Cork won consecutive All-Ireland football finals in 1989-90.

A player of great poise, Walsh proved himself to be an extremely valuable asset to both the Cork hurling and football squads for a number of years. He won a football National League medal as a sub in 1989 and added a hurling league medal to his trophy cabinet in 1993.

MEMBERSHIP Membership fees at club level will be paid in euro

coinage this year and in most, if not all cases, the fee will show an increase to keep pace with inflation and rising cost for club survival.

CLUB

Speaking to club officers at a function quite recently, I was amazed to hear that many players in all clubs do not purchase club membership cards This situation would not be tolerated in any other sport where members not having paid their annual fee before the stipulated date would be told to pack their bags and move on.

A person who does not pay his membership fee is an unworthy member of a club and is probably unworthy in other respects as well.

This year a registration fee of 2 euro must be paid to Croke Park in respect of every registered member and unfortunately this will also have to be paid in respect of people who have not paid the club fee.

Personal **Accident Scheme**

The special voluntary Insurance scheme for players which was introduced two years ago, is to continue for another year and will be put on a more permanent basis, if more players decide to avail of it. When introduced it attracted a very small number of Waterford players, but having become aware of the advantages of the scheme, this number increased last year when a total of 123 adults and 8 youths joined. The overall figure for the country was 14,749, with Waterford being the third lowest.

The scheme provides cover for 50 weeks and the benefits can become quite generous as the 'out of work' period lengthens. The scheme is a personal matter and clubs cannot become involved on behalf of players.

The senior hurling panel is currently availing of the lighting at the Clashmore ground and this is to be the venue for their twice weekly (Tuesdays and Thursday)

The county board have expressed their appreciation of the cooperation of the Clashmore club in making this facility available to the players.

NEW DEISE DRAW




