New Planning Application For Glanbia Site Development

A new planning application for the multi-million euro development of a shopping complex on the 42 acre Glanbia site, will be submitted in a month to six weeks, it has emerged.

County Manager Donal Connolly made the announcement during last Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Town Council, following intense criticism of An Bord Pleanala's decision and the role of the objectors in bringing the project to a halt.

The local authority will deal with this new application "as expeditiously as possible", Mr. Connolly said.

"We would not be surprised if objections are made to the new planning application", Mr. Connolly added. "But if it does go to an appeal, I'm quite confident that An Bord Pleanala will not take as long to make a decision as they did with the last ruling".

The previous ruling by the appeals body took twelve months, a delay the County Manager described as "intolerable". But, he said, as a number of the objectors points were overruled by the Planning Inspector, Andrew Boylan, these will now, not have to be taken into account.

Mr. Connolly said he is confident the new application will be successful and Dungarvan Town Council's planning consultants are, at present, working with Clancy Construction's design team.

A number of problems with the proposed project were highlighted in the Planning Inspectors report. Included in these were Dungarvan Town Council's own Development Plan. However, Mr. Connolly said the plan didn't need to be changed, instead, he be-

lieved the Planning Inspector had "stuck too rigidly to the aspirations" that it sets out.

"I am confident that this development meets all the various Area Action plans",

he said. "It met the necessary entrance and exit points set out. It had access onto Grattan Square which was called for by the traders. It

CCTV To Be Located In Dungarvan

Close Circuit Television took a further step towards becoming a reality in Dungarvan, as Town Clerk Brian White revealed that the cost for the system could be raised on a fifty - fifty basis between the Council and Dungarvan Chamber of Commerce.

It is proposed that a state of the art Closed Circuit Television system with an estimated cost of E11,000 be installed at the bottom of Mary Street, facing into Grattan Square.

The quote from Kilgobinet based security firm, A-Tec Security, is for a single pelco fully functional dome camera which would allow up to 15 further cameras to be located around the town at a later stage, if needed.

The CCTV system would be connected up to Dungarvan Garda Station where it will be controlled and monitored allowing a quick response from Gardai to any crime.

The idea of a CCTV system for the town was raised by Cllr. John Deasy who said that violence in Dungarvan has reached unparalleled levels.

"I haven't experienced the levels of street violence in Dungarvan before, that I

have seen in the past few weeks," he said.

Listing the types of crimes that have occurred recently, Cllr. Deasy said, serious street violence, assaults as well as wanton vandalism have occurred frequently in the town.

"These are not isolated incidents and I don't believe we can ignore this kind of behaviour for much longer", the Fine Gael Councillor said.

Traders are also behind the scheme, he added, and are keen to get it up and running.

This was backed up by his

Spuds Do Well Under Plastic

THE humble potato is so versatile and forms the basis for so many standard meals it is hard to imagine what European diets were like before they were brought over from the New World.

Since then, potatoes have been the mainstay of the basic diet for most of northern Europe.

Potatoes are a cool season crop but neither plants nor tubers tolerate frost. They require a growing season of between 90 and 140 days.

They are divided into early, second early and main-crop groups.

Potatoes need to be grown in an open frost-free site and main-crop potatoes need plenty of watering.

But if you have never tried it before, why not try planting a crop of early potatoes under plastic this year.

PREPARING SEED POTATOES

To prepare your early seed potatoes, place them in a box or tray in a single

layer with the end of the potato containing the most eyes uppermost as early as January.

Store them in a light, frost-free place until the sprouts have grown to about 2cm in length.

If any of your seed potatoes are large and have sprouts at both ends, cut them in half and dip each cut half in soot before planting. This protects them from soil-borne pests and diseases.

PLANTING UNDER PLASTIC

Large sheets of black plastic can be obtained from garden centres.

Prepare the soil in the usual way bearing in mind it is best to plant potatoes in soil that grew another crop the previous year.

Spread out the plastic sheet on top of the soil and anchor it by burying the edges.

Make a cross-shaped cut in the plastic where each potato is to be planted then plant each potato about four inches deep in the soil under each cut.

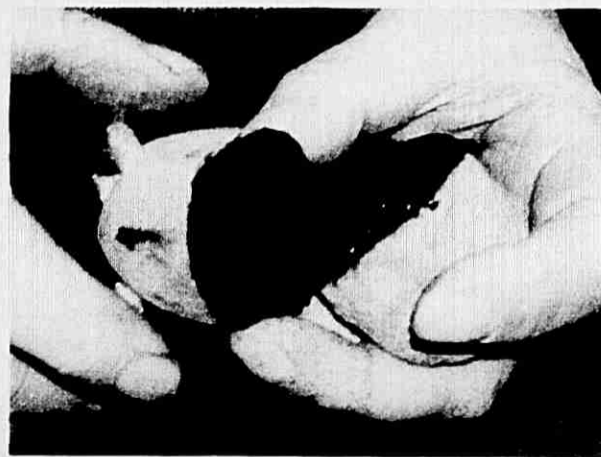
HARVESTING

After about three months, your potatoes will be ready for harvesting.

If you plant them at the end of March, your crop should be ready by the end of June.

When the time comes to harvest your potatoes, just cut off the stem, pull back the plastic and your crop of new potatoes will be lying on the surface.

Remember early potatoes should be harvested just before the flowers are due to open.



TOP TIP: If your seed potatoes are large with sprouts at each end, cut them in half and dip the cut side in soot to protect them from soil-borne pests and diseases.

Potato Facts

COOKING

The most popular ways to cook potatoes are:

Boiled — new potatoes with or without jackets — serve with shredded parsley and a knob of butter.

Mash — old potatoes boiled then mashed with a dash of milk and knob of butter.

Jacket Baked Potato — served with meat or savoury filling.

Chips and Fried Sliced Potatoes.

Oven Roast Potatoes — cooked in the oven in fat.

Croquette — mashed potato balls coated in breadcrumbs.

Saute — potatoes and onions dipped in hot fat then oven baked till golden brown.

Battered Chips or Scallops — slices of potato deep-fried in batter.

This week in the Garden

START EARLY HIPPEASTRUMS

You can start hippeastrums by bringing the bulbs in the pots in which they flowered the previous year into a temperature of around 16°C. Give them an increasing amount of water as winter progresses. If any bulbs that have been dormant since October start showing signs of life, choose these in preference to the others.

POT ON GREENHOUSE CALCEOLARIAS

It is time to move the greenhouse calceolarias into the pots they will flower in. The pots should be around 20cm in diameter. Plant them in high quality compost and place them in an airy place with lots of light. Water them carefully and maintain a steady temperature of around 13°C.

FORCE RHUBARB AND SEAKALE OUT-DOORS

This is probably the best time to start forcing rhubarb out of doors. There is no point in starting earlier as there will be little chance of generating enough heat to stimulate growth. You need complete darkness and an even temperature.

The roots must be covered with something like earthenware forcing pots. Place the pot over the top once the crowns have been covered with dead leaves or something similar for insulation. Remember that complete darkness is essential, so cover the whole plant.

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Waterford's Road Network To Receive 5% Increased Funding

Waterford's non-national road network is to receive an increase in road grant allocations of just over E400,000 this year with Dungarvan Town Council receiving an extra E30,000 for spending on roads over the previous year.

The grants are part of the 2000-2006 National Development Plan which will commit E2,430 million to Non-National Roads throughout the country in the plan period and was launched last week by Minister for the Environment and Local Government Noel Dempsey.

Waterford County County Council are to receive a total of E9.1m while Dungarvan Town Council is set to receive E240,000 when the plan is implemented.

Minister Dempsey said that he believed the Non-National roads will be one of the NDP's success stories "with significant expenditure bringing about major improvements to the network which will benefit all road users."

The main aim of the grant will be to provide assistance to local authorities where housing demand is at its highest as certain non-national roads support housing, industrial/commercial and other developments.

Welcoming the announcement Minister for State and Waterford TD Martin Cullen said: "These figures confirm what I have been saying over and over again. The non-national roads in Waterford will be restored. Today's announcement dispels the notion that the Government would not be meeting their commitment under the National Development Plan, we will in fact exceed the NDP expenditure targets. The outer Ring Road alone will receive E2.4m".

Minister Cullen went on to say that Urban Roads continue to be a priority for the Government and said he will ensure roads in Waterford are restored to cater for the increased volume of traffic.

THE WAY WE LIVE: THE LIVING WORLD

Animal Evolution

- Very rare fossils show that the first animals were probably simple, blob-like jellyfish and worms, in the sea more than 700 million years ago.
- By 500 million years ago, animals with hard body cases, such as trilobites and limpet-like shellfish, inhabited seas and lakes.
- Around 400 million years ago, the first animals followed early plants on to dry land. These first land-dwelling creatures were probably millipedes and small insects.
- By 350 million years ago, amphibians walked on dry land. Myriad fish, including sharks, swarmed in the seas.
- The first reptiles evolved about 300 million years ago.
- A great extinction about 250 million years ago killed off many types of amphibians and reptiles, and many types of sea creatures.
- Around 200 million years ago, reptiles called dinosaurs spread across the land. The first mammals, small and shrew-like, hid from them.
- Another great extinction 6.5 million years ago killed off dinosaurs and many other reptiles, as well as sea animals such as ammonites.

Animals from the past

The dinosaurs lived from about 210 to 6.5 million years ago. Using the remains of their bones, teeth, horns, claws and other body parts, preserved as fossils, we can make informed scientific proposals about how they looked and behaved in life. Their droppings also fossilised, showing what they ate. However, the fossils give no clue to the skin colour of dinosaurs.

60 Killed In Accidental Fires Last Year

THE HOME REMAINS MOST VULNERABLE TO FIRE LOSS

Following the tragic death, on Sunday, of a man in the second fatal house fire of the new year the National Safety Council is warning householders to check for fire hazards, install smoke alarms and plan an evacuation drill - today.

Total fire deaths rose to a sixteen-year-high of 60 last year, an increase of 23% from the previous year, according to the

National Safety Council. The home - the place where most feel the safest - accounted for 54 (90%) of all fire fatalities.

"The top three areas of origin for house fires remain the kitchen, the bedroom and living room/family room", commented Council Chief Executive Pat Costello. "Most fires occur in the dead of the night making smoke alarms an essential early

warning device.

We are asking people to make it a priority to check and if necessary replace smoke alarm batteries," Mr. Costello continued. 40% of fire deaths occurred during January, February and March of last year and older people, living alone in rural areas, accounted for the greatest number of victims.

With the current cold snap requiring the increased use of heat, light and cooking appliances the National Safety Council is fearful that unless people take the threat of house fires seriously then more people will die.

The National Safety Council offers the following smoke alarm safety tips -

Install new batteries in all alarms once a year or when the alarm 'chirps' to warn that the battery is dying. Replace old or faulty alarms with long-life smoke alarms. Ceiling-mounted alarms should be positioned four inches away from the nearest wall. Smoke alarms should be placed outside each sleeping area and on each level of the home. Test units at least weekly. Test the units using the test button. Clean the units, in accordance with the manufacturers' instructions.

All new homes are now required to have mains - powered smoke alarms fitted.

STUDY ON TRAFFIC CALMING MEASURES SOUGHT

A study on traffic calming measures, marking out priorities and feasibilities for residential areas of Dungarvan and Abbeyside, has been sought by Labour Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair.

Mainly concerned with the safety of children at play in estates around the town, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair feels local residents would be interested in being involved in such a process. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says intermittent consideration of individual cases should give way to the more strategic approach.

Expanding on representations he has made to the Town Council, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair added:

"The Council's assessment of the situation at Fr. Twomey's Rd. in Dungarvan, which led to a programme of ramping works to address local concerns, was a worthwhile venture and has been well received. Other areas, including Seapark in Abbeyside, could be looked at in the same context. Traffic calming measures cover a range of options: ramps, rumble strips, bollards, flashing lights, signposting, roadmarkings, extra pavements, pedestrian crossings and "fried egg" raised circles. I look forward to further consideration of this subject, which would compliment the existing traffic management plan in the Dungarvan urban area."

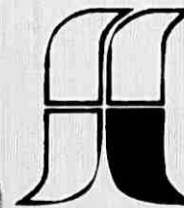
All in this age group should contact their doctor or student health service immediately.

COOKERY CORNER

Ideas For Roast Lamb

Roast lamb with cider and mustard glaze and bacon, cheese and mustard stuffing.

Ingredients:

- Lamb leg joint (allow 175-350g per person)
- 150ml cider
- 1 large sprig rosemary
- 2-3 cloves garlic, peeled and sliced

Stuffing:

- half small onion, chopped
- 75g back bacon, chopped
- 50g mushrooms, chopped
- 50g Gruyère cheese, grated
- 100g breadcrumbs
- 1 x 15ml sp wholegrain mustard
- 1 x 15ml sp fresh thyme
- Salt and black pepper

Glaze:

- Cider reserved from marinade
- 3 x 15ml sp honey
- 2 x 15ml sp wholegrain mustard

Method:

Marinate the leg of lamb



in cider for one hour.

Cut slits into the lamb and insert slivers of garlic and small sprigs of rosemary.

Retain marinade.

Weigh the joint and calculate the cooking time. Meanwhile make the stuffing.

In a large non-stick pan dry fry the onion, bacon and mushrooms for 3-4 minutes.

Stir in the remaining stuffing ingredients and season. Shape into 6-8 balls.

Place on a baking tray and cook for the last 15-20 minutes of roasting time.

Place the glaze ingredients in a saucepan and bring to the boil, simmer uncovered for 4-5 minutes.

15-20 minutes before the end of the calculated cooking time, remove the joint from the oven and brush the glaze over all surfaces.

Roast for the remaining cooking time.

Serve the roast lamb with the stuffing, roasted apples, parsnips, potatoes and a large portion of seasonal vegetables.

Tip:

□ To make carving easier let the joint stand for ten minutes.

□ Apple juice can be substituted for cider

Cooking Times

Medium -
25 minutes per 450g plus 25 minutes.

Well done -
30 minutes per 450g plus 30 minutes.

Easy, Crispy Potato Wedges

THESE oven baked potatoes make a tasty, low fat alternative to chips or roast potatoes.

Ingredients:

- Serves 4
- 4 baking potatoes, about 225g each
- vegetable oil, for greasing
- 2 x 15ml sp olive oil
- pinch of salt
- black pepper

Method:

Clean and scrub the potatoes thoroughly. Slice each potato into 8 equal sized wedges. Transfer into a large bowl. Fill the bowl with cold water until the potatoes are covered. Leave to stand for 15 minutes.

Preheat oven to 220°C/425°F/Gas mark 7. Lightly grease 2 baking sheets with vegetable oil. Drain the potatoes, then dry thoroughly on sheets of kitchen paper.

Put the potatoes back into the bowl. Add olive oil, salt and pepper. Toss gently until potatoes are evenly coated.

Transfer the potatoes to prepared baking sheets. Bake for 40 minutes or until soft in centre and crisp and browned on the outside. Swap baking sheets halfway through baking to ensure even browning. Serve wedges with a variety of dips and sauces or as an accompaniment to a main meal.

Original Black Forst Soufflé

THE delicious flavours of cherries and chocolate combine to make this tasty, original dessert.

Ingredients:

- (Serves 4)
- Knob of butter
- 50g caster sugar, plus extra for sprinkling
- 425g can pitted black cherries in syrup, drained
- 4 medium egg whites
- 8 x 5ml sp ready made custard
- 100g plain chocolate, melted
- 2-3 x 5ml sp plain chocolate, grated

Method:

Preheat oven to 220°C/425°F/ Gas Mark 7. Place a baking sheet in the oven to heat. With the butter,

lightly grease 4, 10cm ramekin dishes and sprinkle a layer of caster sugar in each.

Spoon cherries into the base of each dish. Whisk egg whites and 50g sugar until the mixture forms soft peaks - that's when the peaks start to bend over.

Mix custard with the melted chocolate. Fold one quarter of egg whites into the chocolate mixture, then fold in the remaining egg whites. Spoon mixture into ramekins until mixture comes to just below the rim and bake for 10-12 minutes.

Serve each soufflé sprinkled with grated chocolate, accompanied by vanilla, chocolate or cherry ice cream.

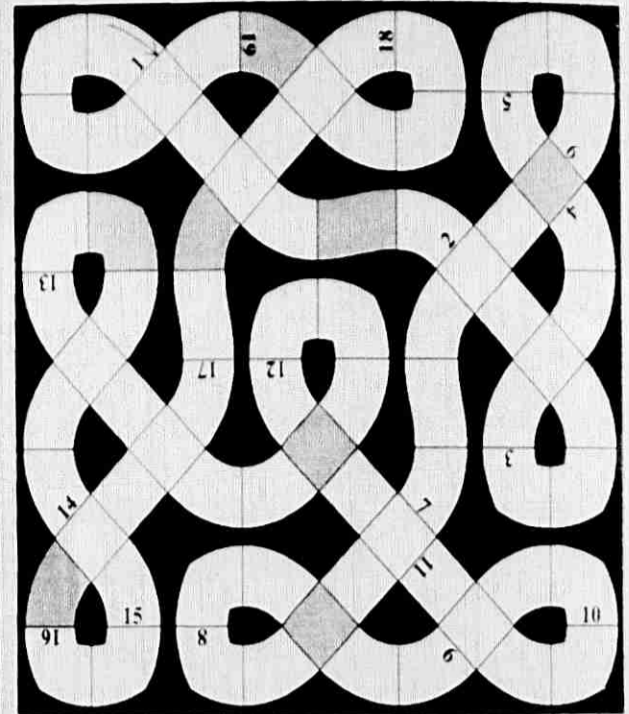

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VALUE IN TOWN**

First Solar Energy System In Dungarvan Installed In Main Street

The first Solar Energy System in Dungarvan was installed last Wednesday on the south facing roof of 21 Main Street. This building is a protected structure and eligible for funding through the Urban Renewal Scheme. Due to the desolate state of

the building, the interior had to be completely removed and is presently being replaced by state of the art materials and technologies, including a solar system, which will provide warm water for under floor heating and for warm water consumption.

Because the Irish climate is so mild, the temperature difference to be made up for heating purposes is rather low. So although there is not as much irradiant sunshine in Ireland as in more southern countries like Italy, the little amount we do get here is sufficient to provide heating for most of the heating period.

Solar hot water systems are particularly feasible when used for under floor heating and in combination with hot tap water generation.

The e-project was established in Dungarvan in 2000 and has since then been involved in many housing and residential projects in the area as well as other parts of Co. Waterford and Co. Cork and Cork City.

Their main interest in architecture lies in more environmentally friendly ways of building and running houses and in striving for excellent design solution.

KILMINION GRAVEYARD BADLY NEEDS ATTENTION

Concerned Abbeyside residents called our attention to the old Kilminion graveyard recently which is at the moment in a disgraceful condition. On visiting the graveyard we found the place in an absolutely terrible state, overgrown with long grass, briars and nettles.

Among the locals who have relatives buried there is Bella Beatty who resides in 61 Murphy Place. His mother who died in 1966 is buried there. Two sisters and two brothers are buried in the family plot. One of the brothers is a half twin to Bella. The family in this instance look after their own grave.

However, many of the families who had their last resting place in Kilminion must now be long dead and gone but that is no reason why the graveyard should be allowed to get into such a neglected state.

Another well known Abbeyside family who have a grave in Kilminion are the Organs. Matt Organ's grandfather and grandmother are buried there. Joe Organs name is inscribed on the tombstone and his son Michael is also buried there.

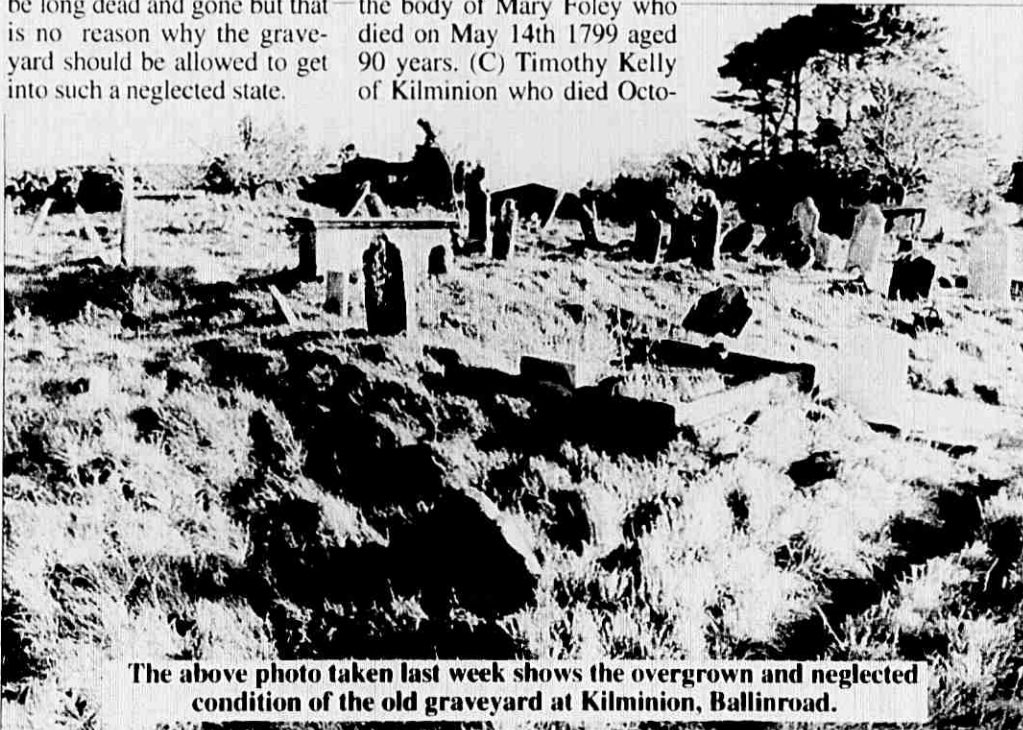
Who will ever forget Fears Army in GAA terms and his contribution to the County Senior Football Final win in 1978). Paudie, Frankie and Breda are brothers and sister to Michael.

Some other names that appear on the headstones are (a) Matthew Power, Kilminion who died on the 1st April 1919 aged 85 years. (B) Will Foley formerly of Culecomac who departed this life on May 24th 1802 aged 90 years. Also the body of Mary Foley who died on May 14th 1799 aged 90 years. (C) Timothy Kelly of Kilminion who died Octo-

ber 1st 1842, aged 84 years. His wife Ann Terry who died October 1st 1842, aged 84 years. Michael Kelly, Kilminion, died Aug. 5th 1970. He lived in an old thatched house on the Coast Road.

Nora Kelly, Kilminion (a sister of Michael) who died October 6th 1975. Her sister Margaret Kelly who died Aug. 4th 1977. Her sister Joan Kelly who died July 2nd 1993.

There are two tombs in the graveyard. One is dated 1817 but the rest of the inscriptions are illegible. At the rear of the graveyard there is a stile and this may be part of a Mass path which were common in country churches as many people walked through the fields to Mass.

The dimensions of the graveyard are 31 yards (28.34 metres) in length and 27 yards (24.68 metres) in width. The responsibility for cleaning the graveyard does not lie with the Parish of Abbeyside, Ballinroad and Garranbane but rather with the County Council.

Certainly the cost involved in a proper clean-up job would be minimal as a couple of men should be able to complete the work in a few hours.

TRAIN PROJECT RECEIVES CHARITY STATUS

Charity status has been granted to the Waterford and Suir Valley Railway Company by the Revenue Commissioners. This is another important milestone for the company.

The committee first came together in July 1997 with a mission to restore part of the rich railway history in Waterford. Having carried out a feasibility study firstly on the Tramore Line and later on the Waterford /Dungarvan line the 8km stretch from Kilmeadan to Waterford was identified as the most attractive option to develop.

This was decided because

- The track bed was in good repair
- The full line was available to Kilmeadan, making an 8 KM journey.
- Excellent Infrastructure opportunities available at the Station at Kilmeadan, River

Frontage, the Mount Congreve Estate, and many pockets of land suitable for additional halts and above all outstanding scenery.

The outcome was that the study clearly identified the potential involved in opening an 8km stretch of the route from Waterford South at Biliberry, site of the original 1878 station, to Kilmeadan along the scenic floor of the Suir Valley, as a community based heritage project, which would be an attractive amenity for both locals and tourists. Hence the group evolved from:

1997 - Steam Train Restoration Group

1998 - Waterford Tourism Railway Development Group

1999 - Waterford & Suir Valley Railway Project

2000 - Waterford & Suir Valley Railway Company Limited

2001 - The Company received Charitable Status Ref: CHY 13857

The Waterford and Suir Valley Railway Company is actively fundraising at the moment to get enough money to insure the facilities are ready to open to the public in Summer 2002. The most popular form of support is to become a "Friend" of the Waterford and Suir Valley Railway. This costs €32 for an individual and €45 for a family. 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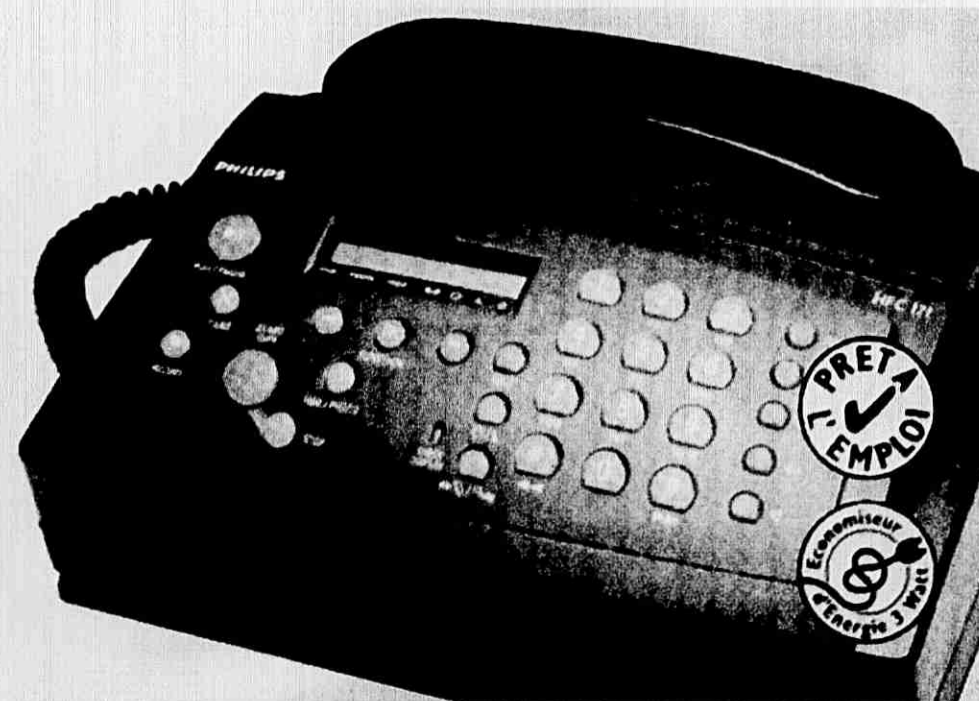

had vehicular and pedestrian access onto O'Connell Street, so it had all the connectivity necessary."

The design of the buildings in the original application was "quite in order", according to the County Manager, and it was not unusual for modern developments to be of a different design to the buildings around them.

While the Inspector was critical of the anchor store building because of its height, Mr. Connolly said any changes should have been set down in conditions.

Meanwhile, councillors also criticised the decision with Cllr. Billy Kyne saying the reports release on the 28th of December "smacked of attempting to bury it".

Cllr. Kyne then went on to question the affect of the Inspectors criticism of the Gas Fired Power Station "even though that particular project is not in his remit."

Criticism was also levelled at the objectors to the project with Cllr. Damien Geoghegan calling on those retailers in RGDATA "to come out of the bushes and admit who they are".

"In the week or two after the release of the report", the Fine Gael Councillor said, "people were keeping their heads down and denying they had made objections. If we were to believe all of them, it would mean RGDATA had taken it upon themselves to put in the appeal."

His party colleague Cllr. John Deasy, meanwhile, said the responsibility for the delays in making a decision lays squarely on the shoulders of the Minister for the Environment Noel Dempsey for failing to appoint staff to Bord Pleanala.

But he said that Dungarvan Town Council's consultants had also "failed miserably" and as Clancy Construction has hired a new design team, the council should respond in kind and appoint new consultants.

"We got it wrong once", Cllr. Deasy said. "We must make sure we don't get it wrong a second time."

Responding to the councillors comments the County Manager said "Councillor, I can tell you we won't get it wrong. We have to address the problems with the development and I am satisfied we are addressing those. But it is important that this is a private company's application and not the local authority's."

The E450m development was to include a shopping centre, a four screen Cineplex, a restaurant and a night-club and pub, in the original application.

But the Inspector stated that the proposed mall around the anchor store should be disposed of and instead shops should be set up on the boundary of the site. Inspector Boylan also said car-parking facilities should be set above or below the anchor store building.

Meanwhile, an individual planning application submitted by MacDonald's for a drive through restaurant near the entrance to the Glanbia site and the Civic Offices, has had one objection lodged against its go-ahead.

Drugs Seized In Dungarvan

Gardai in Dungarvan have seized a substantial quantity of drugs in West Waterford as part of the ongoing crack-down on drug distribution in the county.

The controlled drugs, which are estimated to have a street value of E13,000, were seized by the Drugs Unit late on Saturday.

Two people were arrested in relation to the seizure. The two, a man in his late twenties and a woman in her early twenties, were detained at Dungarvan Garda Station under Section Two of the Drug Trafficking Act but were later released without charge.

A file has been sent to the Director of Public Prosecutions.

Banks Put Onus On Public In Euro Changeover

Only one bank branch was open between Lismore, Cappoquin and Tallow after the Christmas period to deal with the changeover to the Euro, Cllr. Nora Flynn has said.

The Cappoquin councillor said the banks were defaulting on their responsibilities and leaving it to businesses to make the switch between the punt and the new European currency.

She also said ninety-nine per cent of people at the western end of the county did not receive their Euro Convertors. The convertors were meant to be delivered to each household in the country from the European Changeover Board but Cllr. Flynn said a shortage of convertors had prevented West Waterford people from receiving theirs.

Cllr. Flynn has now requested that the convertors be delivered to all those who had

not received them.

Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson backed the proposal and called for the council to row behind the proposal to bring convertors to every home in West Waterford.

Cllrs. Call For Tougher Action On Hedgecutting

Landowners who ignore warnings from the council about their failure to cut their hedgerows should be prosecuted according to Cllr. John Deasy.

Cllr. Deasy said landowners were ignoring notices sent out by the council even though they were given notice.

However, Cllr. James Tobin said the forestry service, Coillte were among the greatest offenders. He also said that in one instance they had cut hedges in such a way that they had left themselves open to be sued.

Cllr. Ciarán O Riain added that landowners did not have to cut their own hedges until recently as before the council had cut them. He said it wouldn't be long before people understood the rules more clearly and cut the hedges regularly.

Widespread Confusion Over Change Of Collection Dates

County Manager Donal Connolly said that despite advertisements about the change of dates for the collection of recyclables people still put out ordinary refuse at the start of this month.

Answering a question from Independent Councillor Betty Twomey, the County Manager said that they are now looking at new ways of notifying people including contacting them individually.

The confusion occurred due to the Councils change of date in preparation for the twice monthly collection of recyclables.

Cllr. Nora Flynn said she had received complaints from people about the confusion and others were disposing of recyclables in dumps, including glass.

Cllr. Billy Kyne also questioned whether the council's policies were stringent enough to prevent any illegal dumps.

The County Manager replied that the council was confident that illegal dumps weren't operating in the county and said "we will be keeping the situation under surveillance"

Faecal Coliform Contamination In 15 Schemes

The annual Environmental Protection Agency report into the quality of the counties drinking water has been released. The report indicates that the South Eastern Health Board took 548 samples from 95 public schemes in Waterford County.

A further 5 group schemes were also sampled. From this programme a total of 15 schemes had instances of faecal coliforms. High nitrates were found in the LCB scheme at Cappoquin and at Grange and in a group scheme at Ardnahoe. Despite this the EPA report states that the quality of water in Waterford was satisfactory throughout the period.

The EPA also states that Waterford County Council is faced with a more difficult situation in controlling their water supplies than any other county. It has four times the national average number of schemes in operation which requires more extensive and elaborate treatment, more supervision and monitoring.

However, while the EPA said drinking water under the control of Waterford County Council was satisfactory, independ-

ent or private group schemes were generally not satisfactory. Eamonn Mansfield of Sanitary Services revealed that the Council appear to have no legal right to take charge of the independent schemes without the consent of the members.

Cllr. Ger Barron said he was glad the EPA found the water quality in the county satisfactory and mentioned two schemes which had poor quality - Dunhill and Clonea.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham said there was bad discolouration to the water in Stradbally as well as a bad smell from it.

Mr. Mansfield said that more work will be carried out on the Springs in Clonea and said while there were problems with discolouration it wasn't a danger to health. However, he said they were now trying to address the situation and have contacted the EPA about it.

County May Elect Mayor In February

County Councils throughout Ireland are moving in the direction of appointing County Mayors and it is an option Waterford's local authority should look into, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said.

The option of a name change from Chairman to Mayor was brought in with last years Local Government Act.

The current Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Wilkinson would become the county's first Mayor if the council decides to opt for the title.

Other changes that have been brought in under the act have seen Urban Councils and Town Commissioners change to Town Councils while the County Manager will no longer have the sole responsibility of drawing up the estimates.

Instead, a representative group of councillors will be elected to a Corporate Policy Group and this group must be consulted in its preparation.

Councillors also asked just how many applications were granted and how many were refused over the past month.

The County Manager Donal Connolly said the planning situation was far from critical with 93 applications granted and just six refused during the month of December.

The issue of flooding came to the fore once again with the situation in Kilmurray raised by Cllr. John Deasy. The Fine Gael councillor said the residents in Kilmurray were concerned about floods each time it rained. He asked the County Engineer to urgently deal with the situation.

Urban & Town Renewal Schemes EXTENSION OF RESIDENTIAL INVESTOR RELIEFS



The Minister for Housing and Urban Renewal has announced the extension of residential investor (Section 23 type) tax relief (newbuild and refurbishment) to certain/sub-areas under both the Urban and Town Renewal Schemes.

The sites/sub-areas that have already been designated for the Residential (owner-occupier) incentive under the current schemes, will now in addition, qualify for the residential investor relief for expenditure incurred from 5th December 2001.

Properties qualifying for residential investor relief have been identified in the towns of Dungarvan, Portlaw, Tallow, Cappoquin and Kilmacthomas. Maps showing these properties are available for inspection at the Planning Department, Civic Offices, Dungarvan, Co. Waterford, Waterford County Council Area Office, Main St., Lismore, Public Library Lismore, Public Library Dungarvan and the Branch Libraries at Cappoquin and Portlaw (during normal opening hours).

To ensure that the benefits of this scheme are widely availed of, those concerned are requested to consult with the Local Authority.

ENVIRONMENT TODAY



LITTER FINE DOUBLED

The government's current anti-litter campaign involves a cinema advert and a poster campaign. The concept of the campaign is to highlight how people see you if you drop litter and involves the transformation of a glamorous girl into a pig! According to Minister Dan Wallace, who is the Minister of State with responsibility for litter, we have a scandalous litter problem. However, litter pollution is one of the most easily solvable forms of environmental damage – if people took more responsibility for their actions, there would be no problem.

The Minister took the opportunity of the launch of the campaign to remind people that the On-the-Spot Litter fine has been doubled from £50 to €125. Mr. Wallace said that "Doubling the fine further signals the Government's determination to put an end to the irresponsible behaviour that causes litter and increase public awareness of the environmental damage caused by litter pollution", concluded Minister Wallace.

The Litter Control Office at Waterford Co Co is working hard to eliminate the problem of litter pollution in the county and has already issued 24 of the new €125 on-the-spot fines. During 2001, 190 on-the-spot fines were issued and this was a 44% increase on the numbers issued in 2000. Typically these fines are issued for illegal dumping and throwing litter from cars. Fines are also issued for dog fouling, failing to keep a premises litter free or for dropping litter on the street.

PLASTIC BAGS

Plastic bags have again and again been singled out as an obvious and very visible source of litter. Also as we in

Ireland are using about 1.2 billion of them annually, they are also a waste of natural resources. Proposals for a plastic bag levy have been around for at least four years, but now the Minister for the Environment Noel Dempsey has signed the date for the introduction of the levy into law. The charge of 15c will be charged for all plastic bags at the point of sale on March 4th.

There are limited exemptions from the levy for plastic bags. Most interestingly for people taking part in Waterford County Council's recycling scheme, bags issued as rolls of refuse collection sacks. This is because they would not generally be considered to be "suitable for use by a customer at the point of sale". Exemptions have also been made for bags containing non-packaged fruit, vegetables, fresh meat, fish and poultry and for bags issued to passengers at ports and airports.

The new levy will have a number of benefits one is that it will reduce the amount of plastic bags littering our streets, trees and hedgerows, it may also get us all thinking and possible changing our behaviour to reduce waste by remembering to bring along a reusable shopping bag. Thirdly, revenues raised are "ring fenced" and are to be placed into an Environmental Fund. The Fund is to be used to provide grants to local authorities and other bodies for the development of waste management and other environmental initiatives.

Sucklers

CARE OF PREGNANT COWS

The dry suckler cow is not very demanding of time and labour. Once she is adequately fed there is little attention paid to her until a couple of weeks before calving when she starts to "spring". However, there are a few vital husbandry practices that should be attended to which could have a big influence on the health and vigour of the newborn calf.

FEEDING

The first item to check is feeding or more accurately the effects of feeding in terms of body condition score. The aim is to have cows in a fit forward condition of 2.5 to 3.0. If condition score is above 3.5, there is likely to be increased calving difficulty, unless an easy calving bull has been used. Very thin cows can also have above average calving difficulty but more common problems associated with low condition scores at calving are:

(i) an extended period before they return to heat after calving which results in failure to maintain a calving interval of 365 days. A slippage of 2 to 3 weeks in calving interval represents a loss of E25 to E40 per cow.

(ii) the production of poor quality biestings which can effect the calf's resistance to disease. Most herds will have a range of condition scores of about one score on either side of the herd average and this is acceptable if the herd average is 2.5 to 3.0. However, it is good practice segregate to thin cows (condition score 2.0 or less) and give them additional feed.

MINERALS

Pregnant suckler cows are not usually fed any concentrates and therefore do not get minerals as part of a balanced ration. Trace element deficiencies especially copper, selenium and iodine can lead to lowered resistance to scours, pneumonia and navel or joint ill. Other problems such as a higher incidence of stillbirths, peri-natal mortality and retained placenta can also arise. As a good management practice, suckler cows that are not being fed a balanced ration, should get about 100 grammes of a pre-calving mineral/vitamin supplement per day for the final six weeks of pregnancy.

Dr. Phil Rogers at Grange advises that the cheapest and most effective way to provide minerals to dry suckler cows is to sprinkle a loose mineral on the silage once or twice per day depending on whether the cows have ad lib or restricted access to silage. Mineral blocks are more expensive and the intake can be variable but they are convenient and may be the only feasible method where cows are out-wintered on rough grazing.

Grassland Management

SOIL TEST:

- This must be done every 5 years on each field. It only costs E21.50 per sample (4 hectare area).
- Teagasc Johnstown Castle research results show that 25% of farms are too low in P and another 25% are too high in P.
- You will not grow early grass if Phosphate levels are low. Total yield per year will also suffer.
- Lime is another input that farmers have forgotten about. With decreasing levels of Nitrogen use (REPS farms) lime levels become increasingly more important. There is no need to remind you that where lime is deficient that (a) ryegrass and clover die out quickly (b) pastures are unpalatable and have low feeding value (c) silage will also have poorer feeding qualities (d) grass yield will be reduced, particularly, at the beginning and end of the year.

Cullen Announces 70,000 euro Funding For Pairc Colmain, An tSean Phobail

This grant will be used to improve the general appearance of the Park and specifically for improving car-park facilities, security and lighting. Credit is due to the Committee for all the work and effort they have put into the Park to date", said Minister Cullen.

Cliff Top Drama At Ballyvoile

The ninety tonne crane, which had become spectacularly lodged on a cliff overlooking a beach at Ballyvoile, was lifted to safety on Monday last after a seven hour operation. The crane, which is owned by Southern Lifting, had become lodged on the edge of the cliff almost a week earlier, as repairs were being carried out to the sea wall.

The repairs to the sea wall required a skip filled with concrete to be lowered sixty feet below to the beach. But as the crane carried out the work it toppled and became lodged on the cliff's edge.

Miraculously, the driver escaped injury by jumping from the cab, while his two colleagues on the beach below also avoided injury.

Local resident Dan Dineen who witnessed the accident praised the driver for his quick thinking.

"The driver of the crane is a hero", he said. "He saved the lives of the men below by shouting at them to get away before the jib came down."

The area was cordoned off and a four mile stretch of roadway between Clonea cross to Durrus was closed with diversions in operation.



Early attempts to rescue the crane proved unsuccessful and the 100 tonne crane which was brought

in, was deemed unsafe to haul up the machine. Work was brought to a complete halt on Thursday last, as the National Health and Safety Inspector Mark Cullen, ordered the site to be cleared and all operations brought to a stop.

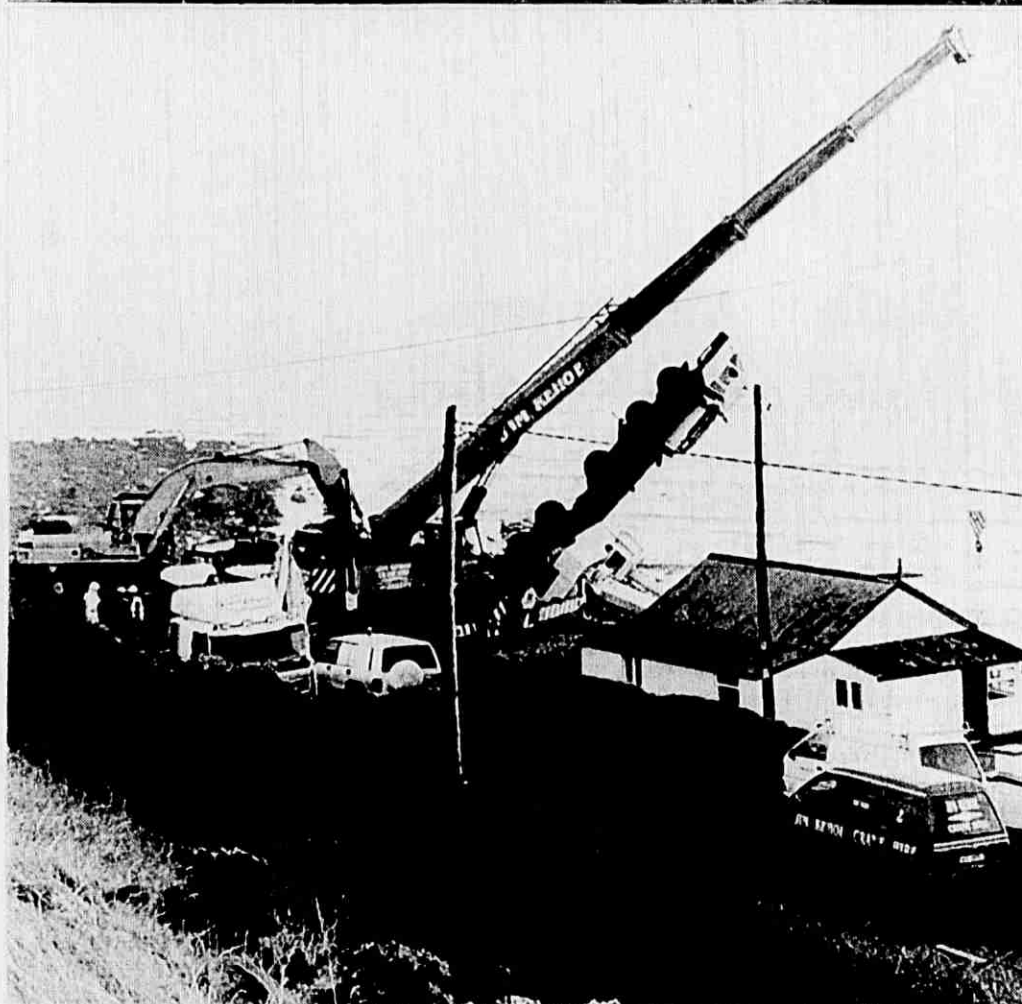
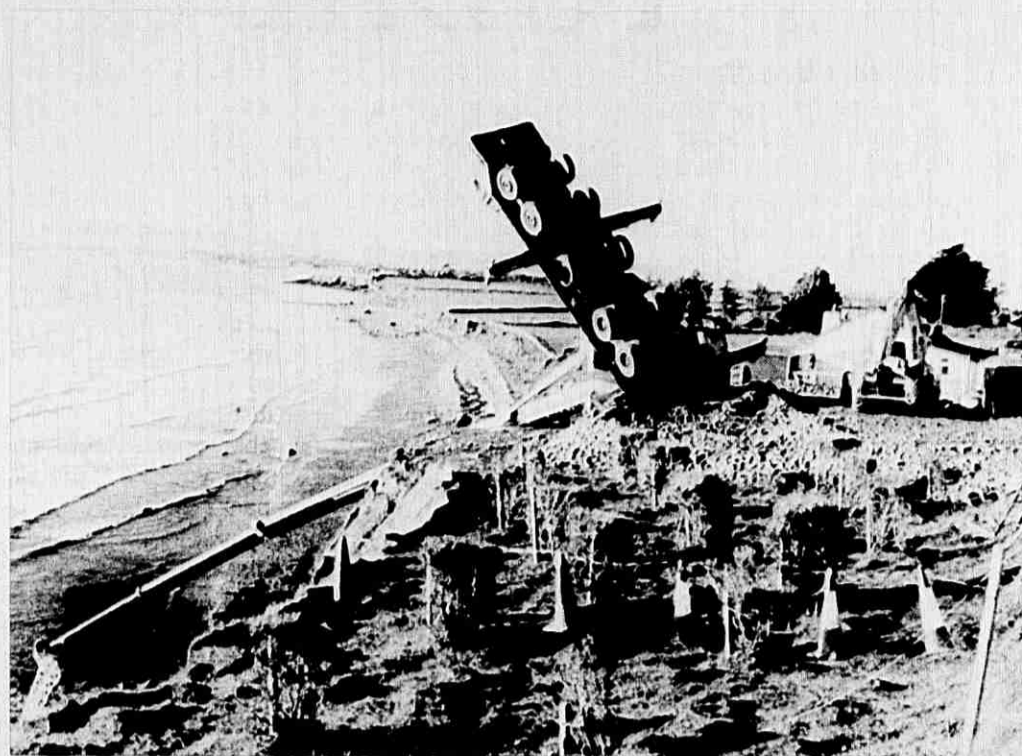
The salvage operation finally got underway on Monday, after two larger cranes, a 600 tonne and a 300 tonne were brought onto the site.

Work on the operation began shortly after one o'clock on Monday afternoon and continued, under floodlighting, until 8 o'clock that night.

The crane has remained on site but the four mile section of the Tramore Coastal Road has been reopened, although the entrance to the site where the accident occurred, has remained cordoned off.

Maurice Kiely, proprietor of Southern Lifting was happy with the salvage operation saying that everything went according to plan.

The crane, itself, has not been badly damaged. Mr. Kiely said "despite its precarious position on the edge of the cliff."

party colleague Cllr. Damien Geoghegan who said that he knew of twenty shop windows which were vandalised in recent months with two broken during Christmas week alone.

However, councillors were in agreement that a Close Circuit system alone would not solve all of Dungarvan's problems. Part of the reason for some of the trouble is due to 400-500 people being let out of "certain establishments in one go", Cllr. Billy Kyne said.

"It often seems like after a match when these establishments close on a Friday or Saturday night", he said.

But, he added that CCTV should be used in tandem with higher police numbers in the town.

Concurring with this view Cllr. Teresa Wright said she had also noticed "an upsurge" in violence around the town but said one camera alone "won't solve all our problems".

"But it could be used as part of an overall solution side by side with a greater police presence", the Labour Councillor said.

It looks unlikely, however, that the CCTV system will be introduced before 2003 with grants available from the Department of Justice allocated until next year. County Manager Donal Connolly said the council will be submitting an application for the grant scheme in the next few months.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

My sister and I pay a woman to care for an elderly aunt. Are we entitled to any tax relief because we employ a carer?

ANSWER

You may be entitled to claim a tax allowance if you employ a carer to care for an incapacitated family member who is totally incapacitated throughout the tax year. The carer may be employed on an individual basis or through an agency but does not have to be employed for the full year.

Before 1999, only the person being cared for or the person's spouse could claim this allowance. Since April 1999, any member of the wider family who engages a carer may claim the tax allowance. The wider family includes a blood relative, a relative by marriage or a legal guardian.

The tax allowance is claimed at your marginal tax rate. The amount of the relief is the cost of employing the carer less any amount recovered from a Health Board, Local Authority etc. Where two or more persons employ the carer the allowance may be shared between them. For the tax year 2002 the ceiling on the amount that can be claimed has been increased from €12,700 (£10,000) to €30,000 (£23,627).

To claim the allowance you should complete Form HK1. If you are a PAYE taxpayer, your tax-free allowance will be increased to include the relief due. If you pay tax under self assessment, the Form HK1 should be attached to the tax return and relief will be given in your Notice of Assessment.

The allowance is not conditional on you registering as an employer. However, as it is necessary for you to employ a person to qualify for the allowance you will have certain obligations as an employer including registering as an employer, and deducting PAYE/PRSI. In certain circumstances, where the carer is provided by an agency and the agency pays the carer directly, the agency will normally be responsible for deducting PAYE and PRSI. You will still be eligible for the allowance and should submit your claim on Form HK1 as usual.

FINANCIAL ABUSE

The Euro has been in circulation in Ireland for a few weeks and we are slowly but surely getting used to it. However, spare a thought for the older generation who may still be confused about their financial affairs.

While it is commendable that support is available from family and friends for an initial changeover period, be aware of someone taking over your loved ones financial affairs over a long period of time. Signs of financial abuse are not obvious and are very subtle. The victim may not even be aware of it until it is too late when all savings have been drained away. You can help your friend or relative get used to the Euro in the following ways:

Go with them to the shops and point out the dual pricing which is evident on some price tags.

Write out a £1 - £10 and 1p - 50p Euro equivalent chart for them.

Make sure that they have not kept any old Irish currency at home and double check receipts with them so they understand the exchange rate.

Once they have exchanged their old Irish currency for Euro - encourage them not to hoard it at home but open a Credit Union, Bank or Post Office Account.

If you think that someone you know is the victim of financial abuse look out for some clues which may help you.

Large withdrawals of cash or transfer of money from one account to another.

A person living well below their means, who is worried about bills.

Suspicious signatures on documents involving the transfer of cash or assets.

Sudden change in wills, whereby one person (relative or new best friend) in particular stands to gain substantially.

Finally if you suspect that someone you know is the victim of financial abuse, be aware that there is help and support available.

ANNUAL CLASSIC TASTING

Friday November 16th last saw the anticipated climax to the year's monthly tastings. As per normal, membership funds were pooled together and the resultant wines which were purchased were greeted with much enthusiasm and approval.

The venue this year for our classic tasting and meal was the excellent Mill Restaurant in the centre of town. This proved to be a very popular choice as it was very central to everyone's needs and indeed so good was the wine, food and craic that no one left till well after 1 am.

On arrival, members were greeted by our hosts for the night, Mike and Gillian, Vinnie and Suzzi Pettite.

Alcoholic beverages of the non-wine types were consumed to get the taste buds

working. During this time the hard working girls in The Mill set about us dishing out fantastic canopies of smoked Salmon, Pate, cheeses and vol-au-vents filled with seafood which were my particular favourite.

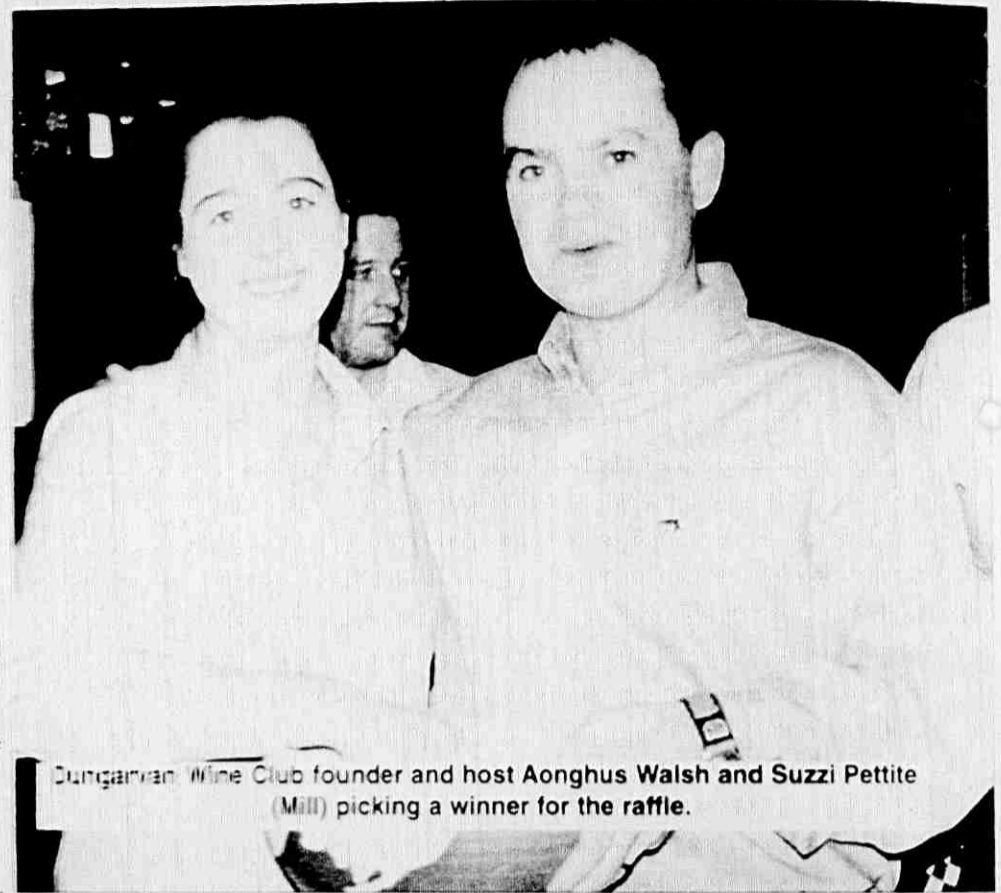
When everyone was seated I launched into the introduction speech welcoming everyone and guests to the meal and after a few words we had our toast to the wine club and our first wine of the night. This was Heidsieck Monopole blue top Champagne. A flagship Champagne made from Pinot Noir and Chardonnay grapes in the Brut (dry) style with wonderful acidity and a fresh creamy mousse. This was ideal with our starter which is the now famous Mill Combination starter which consisted of hot starters of Prawns, served with organic tossed salad and a selection of oriental dips, excellent!

While orders were being taken for the main courses we had our soup which was served in a small cup consisting of salmon, tomato and basil. For one don't particularly like tomato and basil but this changed my mind on the spot as it was just perfect, and just the right amount as not to fill you up.

Three wines were picked to go with our main courses, which consisted of Sirloin Steak, Fillet Steak, Breaded Chicken fillet, Cajun seasoned Bass and a roast vegetable tourte. The white wine was Petaluma 1999 Chardonnay from the Piddadilly Valley in South Australia. £18.00 - £22.85. A classic chardonnay with creamy vanilla flavours, crispy acidity and very fruity, yet almost burgundian in style because it's not overly oaked and quite subtle. It made an excellent accompaniment for the chicken, Sea-Bass and vegetarian dishes.

Two red wines were chosen to go with the Steaks. The first was Yalumba 1996, the signature limited release £26.00 - £33.00. A classic Australian blend of Cabernet Sauvignon and Shiraz. This wine was aged for over 28 months in American Oak and has immense structure and aging ability due to firm tannins and great fruit from the Cabernet and a velvety smooth spicy finish courtesy of the Shiraz blend. Needless to say, it was fantastic and ideal with the steak. The second red wine was Kendall Jackson 1996 Cabernet Sauvignon grand reserve £40.00 - £50.80. This was the most expensive wine of the night and it showed. A huge Cabernet with classic cigar and cedar aromas quite typical of classic Californian cabernets. On the palate, it was dry with very austere tannins which gives it tremendous aging ability. If anything it was possibly still too young. However, as with most wines of this quality, their toughness is always reduced when had with food as proved to be the case. It may be worth trying again next year when it is more mature. It too was quite superb with the fillet Steak!

Last but not least came dessert. These consisted of a

choice of three; warm Chocolate Fudge Cake, Winter Berry Pie and Banana and Caramel Pavlova. To accompany these we thought long and hard and eventually came up with a German Dessert wine called, wait for it "Heppenheimer Schlobberg Rulander Beerenauslese 1993" £25.00 - £31.75 for a half bottle!! A much sought after wine and extremely expensive. At only 9% Alc. volume it was liquid gold not clogging at all and still displayed amazing acidity which was refreshingly well received by all our members. In years past we've always finished with Vintage Port which was always fantastic but a little heavy for our already full and tired members, so it was a very exciting and pleasant change. Again it matched all desserts very well.

After all this, we lazed about with our freshly brewed tea and coffee and chatted away. Then a Guinness tasting promptly started and the Connusairs rose to the forefront and stayed to an unearthly hour thanks mainly to Vincent. All in all a wonderful evening and again a special thanks to Mke and everyone in the Mill for a splendid meal and wonderful setting and fantastic service. 



Gemma Is All-Ireland Champion

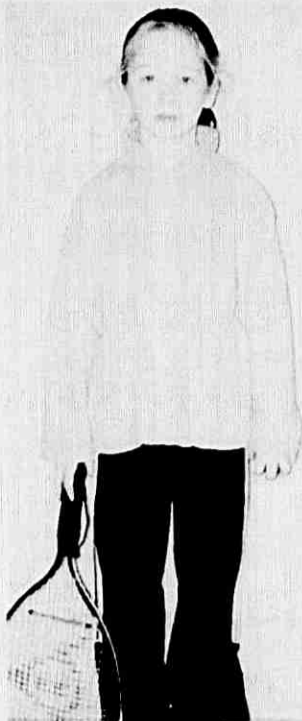

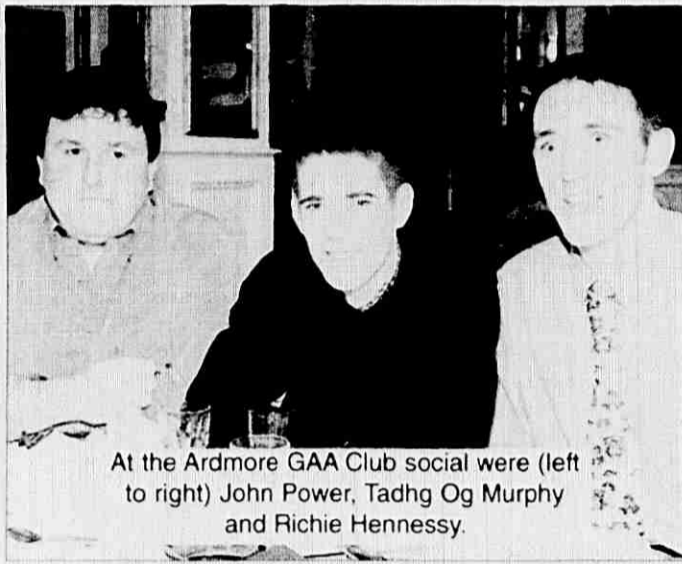

WESTERN BOARD MEETING

Paddy Walsh, chairman, presided at the first meeting of the Divisional board which was held at Lawlor's hotel on Thursday night of last week. The meeting was only for accepting affiliations, dealing with transfers, regradings, group teams and electing sub committees. **SYMPATHY** At the outset, votes of sympathy were moved and it was noted that a surprisingly large number of former club men and players had passed away since the last meeting. The chairman paid a short tribute to the late Billy McGrath, who had served the board as referee for almost 20 years.

AFFILIATIONS The big surprise here was the announcement that Eire Og club will not be affiliating to the board for 2002. A letter from the chairman, Tom Drummy explained that because of lack of numbers the club would find it impossible to field a team this year, but that all going well, Eire Og would be back again next year. **GROUPINGS** All the regular groupings for under 21 and minor were approved. There was an amount of discussion on the applications from Ardmore

and Lismore to have players from the clubs assist each other. Ardmore submitted that they will not be able to field a minor hurling team this year because of lack of numbers (they conceded a walk-over to Abbeyside last year) and they applied for permission for a number of their minor hurlers to assist Lismore in the coming championship season. Lismore, likewise, submitted that because of the lack of numbers of minors interested in playing football, they would be unable to field a minor football team this coming season and consequently sought permission for their 4/5 players to assist Ardmore in minor football. It was pointed out that Lismore are already grouped with Ballysaggart in minor. Concern was expressed about the impact that such a strong grouping would have against other teams in the championships, but when the matter was put to the floor, no formal objection was voiced and the applications were approved. Effectively, the situation at minor level in the Division shows that Dungarvan, Ballyduff, Abbeyside and Stradbally are the only independent minor clubs.

TRANSFERS A total of 18 players transferred to other clubs. While this number was a little below average, it did not pass without comment that 'poaching' of players by certain individuals on behalf of clubs was being practised again around the division. Kieran Curran, Dungarvan asked if there is a board policy which outlawed this practice. Tony Mansfield, Abbeyside/Ballinacourty also condemned the practice and said that those involved should be named. Another delegate remarked that 'poaching' of players was a regular practice and was going on for a very very long time. The chairman said that while it was an undesirable practice, the board were powerless to do anything about it. **START OF CHAMPIONSHIPS** The Secretary, Anthony Walsh in reply to a question said it was the intention of the officer board to commence the under 21 football championship on the St. Patrick's weekend and hopefully to conclude the competition at the Easter weekend. He further reported that clubs will be asked for agreement to play extra time in all first rounds in order to facilitate

the progress of the championship (under 21 only). Some delegates said they would wish to consult their clubs before deciding on this. A vote on the proposition will be taken at the second meeting of the board when championships generally are being discussed and decided. Tony Mansfield asked if the officers had a date in mind for the commencement of the under 21 hurling championship. He said it was important that clubs should know when they were playing. The secretary, Anthony Walsh said they had no date in mind as of yet, but they would take a look at it at their next meeting. **DISCIPLINARY COMMITTEE** The following were approved as the members of the Disciplinary Committee: Matty Fahy, Noel Fleming, Tom Browne, Michael Mernin, Breda Kiely, Sean Tobin and Tom Drummy. **FIXTURES COMMITTEE** It was unanimously agreed to reappoint the elected officers to look after fixtures, dates, venues, etc. **NEXT MEETING** It was agreed that the second meeting of the board will take place at Lawlor's Hotel on Monday, February 11th.

Anthony Walsh, Paddy Walsh, secretary and chairman of the Western Board with Pat Moore of the Referees committee, were in Adare, Co.Limerick last week at a regional seminar on refereeing at all levels.

The seminar was organised by the National Referee's body in Croke Park and chaired by Dan McCartan, Down.

There were very strong emphasis on referee abuse, sideline interference and other problems relating to the presentation of games. Much more discipline inside the grounds is demanded and all units have been instructed to cut down on abuses from the start of the championships this year.

It is now pretty certain that they will change from their black uniform and wear coloured dress when refereeing this year.

The new style of attire has been approved by the national referees committee and Central Council are likely to give approval at their next meeting.

Popular Shamrocks club chairman, James Tobin who is a regular attendee at board meetings, has stepped down as a club selector after an unbroken period of 30 years.

During his time as a selector Shamrocks won titles at county and divisional level in hurling and football and I'm sure that James's input was a big factor in bringing about their many successes during those years.

Tallow club will be paying a flying visit to America over the Easter period. The adventure is becoming a reality after a lot of planning. The trip will last for about a week and the club are happy about the support for the venture.

Admission prices to all games from here on will be in Euro and while there may be an 'up and down' adjustment, the cost to the patron will generally remain the same in the overall.

Limerick county board have embarked on an 8 million Euro development at their county grounds. To help with the cost, a massive fund-raising scheme is being launched. They will also receive Lotto grants as well as Munster and Central Council monies.

When completed it will follow the example of Kerry, Cork, Clare and Tipperary putting seasonal (one year) and Term (3 to 5 year) tickets on sale.

For a number of reasons we cannot have a similar facility from the Munster Council (because of our geographical location we do not attract crowd pulling intercounty matches, etc.), so we lose out in a big way.

It was a great start for new manager Denis Walsh and his fellow selector Sean Guiry and it was a splendid start to the season for our beleaguered footballers who have languished at the bottom of the ladder for so very long. Also, there was no fluke about the manner in which it was achieved and this too should help to increase the confidence of the players when they meet Clare in the final on Sunday next.

This game will be their final trial before they open their league campaign v. Wexford at Dungarvan on the following Sunday, Feb. 3rd.

Tipperary went into an early lead when their centre half forward, Nial Kelly kicked over a 20 seconds point. Within minutes, Waterford were back and points by Connie Power and John Hennessy and a spectacular goal after a 45 metre solo by Frannie Halpin.

Tipperary hit back with scores to leave the state of play at 1-2 to 0-4 after about 15 minutes.

The visitors exerted pressure, but it was Waterford who continued to dominate and scores by Gary Hurney (2), Richie and Connie Power gave them a comfortable and deserved 5 points half time lead, 1-6 to 0-4.

SECOND HALF

Brendan Cummins was introduced for Tipperary and justified his recall by scoring three good points. However this was not enough against a very determined Waterford fifteen who were not going to release their grip on the game. A Connie Power point entering the final quarter was followed with a delightful goal by Ger Power who had

been supplied by Shane Walsh almost on the 50th minute. At this point, Tipperary's fate was sealed and Waterford were in the final.

It is a very long time since a Waterford senior football side had a 6 points winning margin and it must have been the first time in our history that the county was managed by just two selectors. I wonder if there is a message of some kind in this?

STRATEGIC REVIEW COMMITTEE REPORT

The long awaited launch of the report, which took 20 months to compile, took place before more than 100 delegates to Croke Park on Sunday last. The immediate impact was that the proposals were far more radical and provocative than had been anticipated and if finally accepted will result in drastic changes throughout the Association at all levels.

The changes (if accepted) will considerably change the structures of Divisional and County Boards, Provincial Councils County Central Council and Management Committee.

Whether for good or bad, the five year limitation on all elected positions from Divisional Boards upwards, is bound to create a major upheaval.

County chairmen, who will have a five year limit to their term of office, will take over the role of Central Council representatives, but without the privilege of being eligible for membership of the Man-

agement or Games Administration Committees.

The five year term will also apply to every elected officer and it is proposed to introduce a 65 years age limit, making it compulsory for all officers at every level in the GAA, to retire at the Civil Service age.

All Counties will have an Administrative Officer (Paid) who will carry out the duties currently being done by the County Secretary. The secretary post will be maintained and he will act as a recorder of minutes, calling meetings, etc. The Administrator will take over the role of one of the two Provincial Council delegates.

If an elected officer retiring after his/her five year term wishes to contest the post again, he/she can only do so after a period of 3 years have elapsed.

NATIONAL ASPECT

Dividing Dublin (population 1,056,021) into 2 Counties, South Liffey and North Liffey for football purposes

and having a special board for the development of hurling (with massive funding) is one of the major elements of the proposals.

The plan to help the 6/8 unsuccessful hurling counties by funding, etc. is another proposal that may be accepted. Waterford and the other hurling counties who have not won the McCarthy Cup since 1971 (30 years) will come into this category.

SOCCER/RUGBY IN CROKE PARK

It will become a reality (once unthinkable), if the proposals are accepted and Central Council give the nod to an application from the soccer or rugby authorities.

There are other elements of the package (265 pages) that may be of interest to readers and I will publish those later.

The whole matter of how the proposals will be put to Congress or a special Congress later this year, will be decided by Central Council when they meet again on Saturday of next week, Feb.2nd.

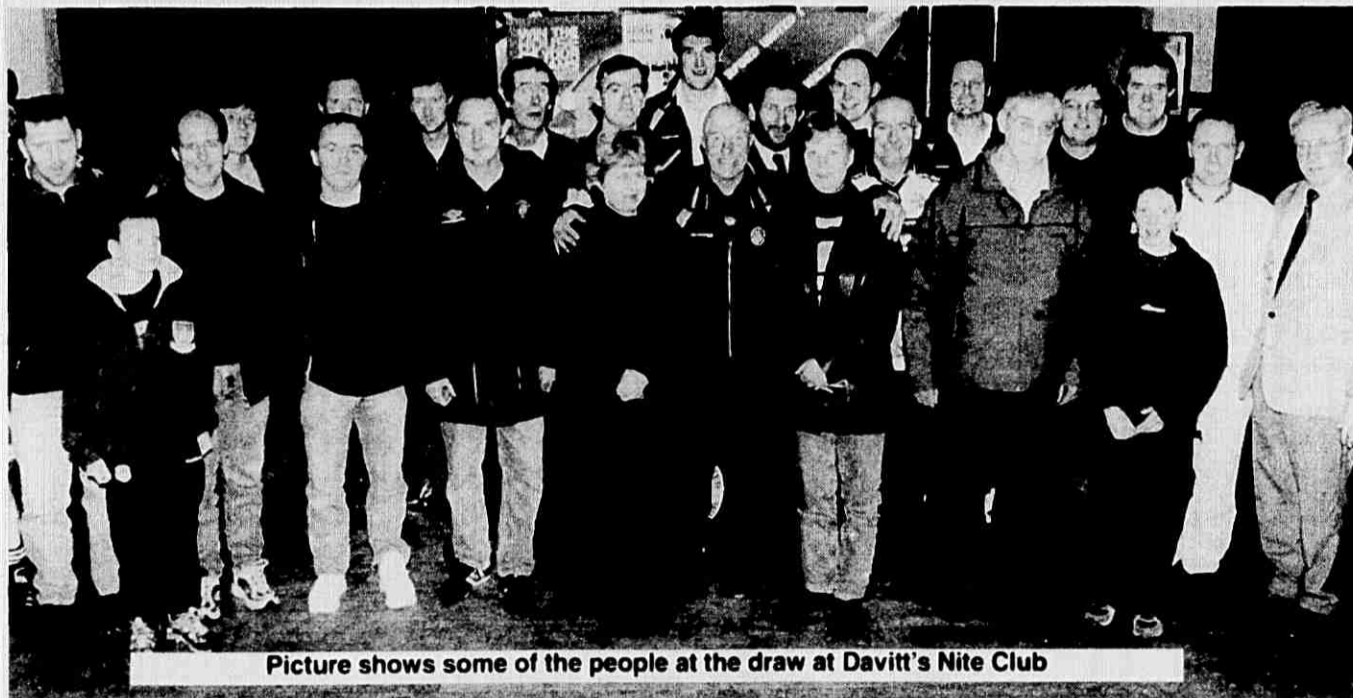

FRIENDS OF WEST WATERFORD CUPS

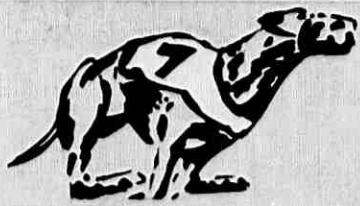

The Moore family from Carrigeen in South Kilkenny who bred Irish Greyhound Derby winner Eyeman were in double winning form at their local track last Tuesday night recording a nice priced double with Minglers Express and Minglers Victory both winners being members of the May 2000 litter by Top Honcho out of Minglers Mist. Making her debut in a novice sprint the Madge Moore owned Minglers Express 3/1 did well to hold her position on the rails at the first turn from the well backed Honey Wolf and Ciaras Chaser. As the latter two runners came in contact the early paced Minglers Mist scampered clear to run out a two and a quarter lengths winner over Ciaras Chaser in 16.84.

Minglers Victory owned by James Moore was despatched as the 7/4 favourite to capture the eight race and while he worked hard for his initial success the favourite won with something to spare in the finish. Ballingown Hill set the early gallop from Sunset Venus but staying wide and out of trouble Minglers Victory gradually wore down the leaders staying on strongly up the home stretch to deny Ballingown Hill by two and a half lengths in 29.58.

Speaking of Derby winner Eyeman his former trainer Eddie Wade was also among the winners sending out the debutante Smart Sam (Staplers Jo-Costly Trip) to an eye catching 16.47 sprint victory.

Despite drifting in the market out to 4/1 Smart Sam put some useful sprinters firmly in their place with an authoritative win Magic Spice came away in front from trap six but it didn't take long for Smart Sam to strike the front. A slow starting evens favourite Lemon Post mounted her challenge at that point but Smart Sam forged clear for a polished two and a half lengths win.

Racing commenced with an impressive display of front running by the strapping eighty pounder Four Kings who justified odds of 6/4 with an easy win in 29.60. Owned by Kevin Foley and trained by William Toomey Four Kings barged his way past the front running pair of Buckfast Flyer and Ballymarket Ally around the opening turn to race clear for a six lengths win over a running on Under The Thump. The winner is a July 00 son of Thorgil Tex and Kilcaroon Angel and while his dam is bred on pure coursing lines she recently whelped a ten strong litter to Cool Performance.

Homer Jay made the best of his way home in the second race but the leader was done no favours off the home turn by the always prominent but wide running Birdy Must Fly as 5/1 outsider Paddys Fellow (Powsheen Paddy -Valais Girl) came through up the rails to open his account by three quarters of a length over On Stage Nina in 29.92. The winner is trained by Niall O Dwyer for joint owners Michael Veale and Thomas McCarthy.

In a graded sprint Bantes Magic was out in front for much of the trip but the previously unraced Llamedos (Liffy Mills Quiet Grand) 4/1 owned by Dorothy Forrest and trained by Michael Delahunty stayed on the stronger on the run to the winning line to triumph by three quarters of a length in 16.98.

In the fourth event the layers bet 4/1 the field bar the John Healy owned Byrneville Woody (Dungarvan Merlin-Byrneville Trix) and this 6/4 favourite duly romped to an all the way 29.93 win. The winner was quickly into his stride to lead from a close attending Foxcover Jakki but shooting clear down the back the Dungarvan dog drew clear to win out by three and a quarter lengths.

The money came late for the Kevin Barry owned Sign Of Life (Eyeman-Goldstar Laura) 5/4 to 4/6 in the sixth contest and outpacing his rivals from the outset the jolly quickly built up a healthy early lead over the chasing pack before winning unchallenged by six lengths from Ragagtag Billy in 29.81.

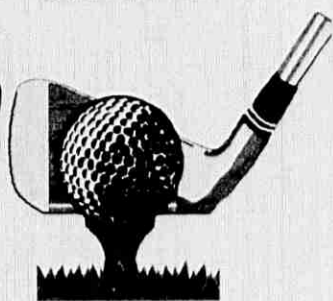
DEISE DRAW

Des Cahill To Announce 11th Park Hotel Award Winner

As the sun begins to set on the month of January and memories of Christmas drift further in our wake, thoughts once more turn to the Park Hotel Sports Stars Awards, that annual acknowledgement of all that is best in Waterford sport.

This year, the supreme accolade in Waterford sport will be accorded on Saturday night, 26th January at the Gala Banquet in The Park, when RTE personality, Des Cahill makes a welcome return to set the scene and interview the nominees in his own easy inimitable style.

As usual, the field is wide open with several of the nominees staking a special claim on the basis of both a nomination-winning performance and a consistently good season otherwise.

It would be very wrong to categorise this important event as merely an award for the foremost sportsperson of the year, for over the last 132 months, many sportspeople, representing diverse disciplines, have had their moment of glory which was enshrined in a monthly award and a nomination to the final assessment at the end of the year.

If the Park Hotel Sports Stars Awards night is about anything in particular, it is about achievement and consistency, and it is hardly surprising that each year the list of accolades includes not only the athletes at the pinnacle of their particular sports, but also those up and coming young pretenders, who have achieved remarkable results in their formative years.

The winner of the first ever Annual Park Hotel Award, Seán Kelly is representative of the former, while last year's winner, fifteen year old Jockey Tom Queally shows just how young one can be and still annihilate all opposition from the newest to the most experienced.

The stature of this award remains at the very highest and is still the most coveted cross-sporting award in Waterford today. Each year has its unique points and 2001 is no different. Billy O'Sullivan - one of three nominees from hurling - can look back eleven years to the very first Park Awards for his first nomination and proves just how durable a player he is. Pat Fitzgerald made his mark in the Fitzgibbon Cup to take the April award and, hardly surprisingly, former winner, Paul Flynn is also back.

Ladies soccer made its appearance this year for the first occasion courtesy of Irish captain, Ciara Grant, who helped Arsenal to a clean sweep of all the major honours, League Cup, League Title and laid on the winning goal in FA Cup Final 2001.

Wildcats Catriona White and Bausch and Lomb's Jillian Hayes ensured Basketball was well represented and Paul Power's masterminding of the revival of Waterford United's good run in the Cup campaign, kept the men's game in touch.

Hilton Hincks (Motorcycling) led the Irish team to victory in the Celtic Match Races over Wales and Scotland, while Gavin McNeill (Golf) captured the Irish Amateur Close Championship at Rosses Point.

November's nominee, David Casey (Horse Racing) had eleven winners, including the Charlie Hall Chase at Wetherby, the Cork National, Munster National and £100,000 John Nickelson Chase.

And so, the scene is set for an exciting night as we wait for the final announcement. Before that will be the superb catering of the Park's kitchens, which are renowned for the finest food. When Des Cahill finally opens that envelope to announce the winner, only the five judges will know what name to expect. It is the most closely guarded secret in Waterford sport and no one has yet pierced the defences.

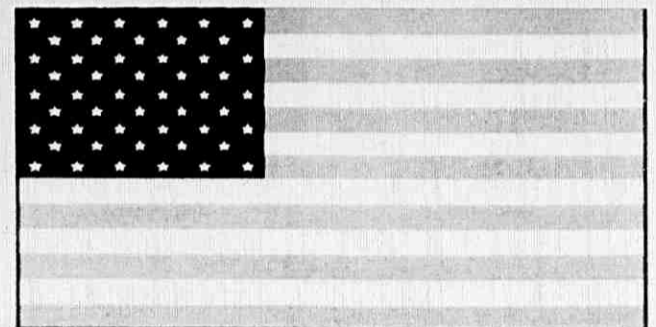
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
