Residents in Fairfield, Lismore have expressed their dismay at learning that fourteen houses in an uncompleted part of their estate have been earmarked for sale to the social housing association, Cluid.

The newly developed estate, which has twenty completed houses on the 50 house site, was advertised in brochures as being "exclu-

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WATERFORD TEL. 051-373030 sive", residents have said.

But, their concerns mounted when they learned of Waterford County Council's decision late last year to make an application for a loan to the Housing Finance Department on Cluids behalf.

The Housing Finance loan would enable Cluid to purchase the fourteen houses at a cost of £1.4 million from the estates developers, Tier-

That decision left residents feeling "hood-winked", according to Lismore Town Councillor John Campion as they were not informed by County Councillors that the issue was being raised.

A public meeting was held in response last week, at which, some concerns were expressed that social housing may attract travellers, asylum seekers or people with a history of anti-social behaviour.

However, Chief Executive of Cluid, Brian O'Gorman said it is not in their interest to house people who would



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

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Dumping Close To Cruachan Condemned By Cllr. Kyne

Cllr. Billy Kyne has expressed his disgust at the dumping of cars on a forest access road close to Cruachan mountain, at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council.

"These two cars were dumped by my reckoning between November and mid December in an area used by many hill walkers," Cllr. Kyne said.

"I call on the council not only to remove these cars but to liaise with Coillte and other state agencies to make this area more secure", the Labour representative added.

Cllr. Kyne is now calling on the council "to do everything to trace the owners and while I accept the legal owner may not ultimately have dumped the cars, every effort must be made to get on the trail of the source of the dumping.

The dumping of cars in the scenic location has been described by Cllr. Kyne as showing a reckless disregard for the county and he went on to call on the council to respond and protect this area.

Another instance of illegal car scrapping and unauthorised camping at the old Railway line at Ballinard, Ballinacourty was also highlighted by Cllr. Kyne.

The Labour councillor originally raised this local concern at the November and December meetings of the council and said that a number of assurances have now been issued.

These would include the cordoning off of the area and allowing access to just one key holder.

Cllr. Kyne accepted the Council's response but said that a significant improvement is expected now in this area.


He also said that as pressure comes on other counties and large Urban areas on unauthorised dumping County Waterford must be more vigilant than ever before.

Replying to Cllr. Kyne on the possibility of unauthorised dumping sites across the county, the County Manager Donal Connally said that everyone had to be vigilant in this regard.

JOURNEY THROUGH AFRICA

The Pyramids and Sphinx

We start our journey in the exciting and colourful city of Cairo. With over 15 million people, it is Africa's biggest city, and it sits in a unique position at the cross-roads of Africa, Asia and Europe



The Cairo Tower provides a bird's eye view of the bursting city ISRAEL from a balcony 187 metres high. To one side are the alleys and bazaars of the old city and to the other the office blocks, banks, hotels, and wide streets of the new city. The pyramids at Giza dominate the view to the west.

Our first stop is the Egyptian Museum. If you looked carefully you would see this next to the chaotic bus station to the east of the tower.

A Visit To The **Pyramids**

The pyramids at Giza are considered one of the Seven Wonders of the World. The Great Pyramid of Cheops is the biggest, standing 137 metres high and made from over 2,000,000 giant stone blocks.

You can climb inside along steep tunnels and find ancient burial chambers - some big enough to hold a double-decker bus!

A camel ride takes you to the sphinx (a lion's body with a human head) guards the way to one of the pyramids.



Museum Stop: Egyptian Antiquities

Egyptian Antiquities holds over 100,000 exhibits. It would take over nine months to see all of them if you looked at each for just one minute.

Walking through the treasure-filled rooms. lined with sphinxes and statues of ancient Egyptian gods, you can imagine you have travelled back in time.

The treasures of the boy-king, Tutankhamun, are the highlight of the museum. They include his gold funeral mask inlaid with blue gemstones. Tutankhamun reigned from c. 1333 BC for only about nine

different than if the estate was entirely private.

"If these houses were bought by someone who then lets them out for private rental, they could be going to anybody anyway and they would still remain rented", Mr. O'Gorman said.

However, Chairman of the Residents Association, Marie Prendergast talking on a National Radio programme last week, said that long term rental agreements would not give people a chance to buy their own homes in Fairfield.

She said the Cluid proposal was, in fact, preventing people from acquiring social affordable homes, as the completed houses were bought for £75,000 to £94,000 but Cluid was paying almost £10,000 more for each house.

"This isn't about social affordable housing", she said.
"This is about Waterford County Council making a decision about the estate without even telling us what was going on"

Mr. O'Gorman admitted that the scheme had got off on the wrong footing which he said was "regrettable"

However, attempting to allay the fears of some residents, he said that Cluid take pride in being good managers of housing schemes.

"A huge priority for us is to make sure the people who move in, integrate with the wider community. We're only interested in housing people who are settling and who want to make a go of it", Mr. O'Gorman added.

Meanwhile, Lismore Town Cllr. Bernard Leddy has described the developers of Fairfield as the one "villain of the piece"

"We had a public meeting last week and it appears that the developer had been in contact with Cluid for about a year and was at the same time providing houses in what people who bought them thought was a private estate", Cllr. Leddy said.

The Labour representative said he sympathised with residents and understood their fears.

"But I couldn't possibly speak against social housing initiatives like the one Cluid is proposing", Cllr. Leddy added. "So I'd sympathise with the residents who bought houses at top price, but at the same time we were assured that all the people in the proposed Cluid Development will be taken off the existing council housing list."

Fellow Lismore Town Councillor John Campion said the residents in Fairfield felt "hood-winked" by Waterford County Council's decision to apply for the loan on Cluid's behalf.

Cllr. Campion added that affordable housing was already being provided in Fairfield and the developers intention to sell houses to Cluid for long-term rental agreements was removing that possibility.

"The residents feel their homes will be de-valued". Cllr. Campion said. "They are not biased or bigoted. They saved to buy these homes for twenty years and now they fear that they will lose some of their value.'

Replying to criticisms of the council's decision County Manager Donal Connolly said Waterford County Council has worked closely in the past with Cluid in advancing affordable and voluntary housing in Waterford.

'We didn't hood wink the public or anybody. The matter came to the council by way of an application from Cluid and it was on the agenda for a council meeting and it was approved at a council meeting", Mr. Connolly said.

A finalised deal between Cluid and the developers, Tierside, has not yet been struck and the social housing association have indicated that if the price and other conditions are not suitable they may yet withdraw their

Town Council To Let Public Decide On Title Change

Dungarvan Town Council has deferred a decision on a title change for the town's first citizen from Cathaoirleach to Mayor until after the public have been consulted on the matter.

The title change is allowed under the Local Government Act, which has already seen a name change of the council itself from Urban to Town Council, and the payment of local authority representatives.

While some of the provisions are mandatory including the changes to planning regulations, the bill gives councillors lee-way to opt for a change of title for the Cathaoirleach if they vote to

The prospect of a title change led to three different proposals and criticisms from one councillor at what he believes is the council's inability to make decisions.

Cllr. John Deasy said councillors were elected by the people of the town to make decisions. But, he added, "members who aren't prepared to make a simple decision such as that, shouldn't be in the Town Council." "I think we should leave the people of Dungarvan alone", he said. "They've enough to worry about, without making up the minds of the very people they elected"

Cllr. Deasy had supported a name change saying that he welcomed anything that elevates the office and catches the public imagination.'

He also believed that a higher profile for the council would in turn attract more candidates to run for the position of Town Councillor.

However, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan proposed that the Irish name of Cathoirleach be kept while a third proposal came in from Cllr. Billy Kyne asking for a deferral until the public was consulted.

Cllr. Kyne said the public should be informed about the option before they take any decisions on this matter - a suggestion that Independent Councillor Damien Dillon was in full agreement with.

The title change, itself, was not the greatest concern, Cllr. Teresa Wright said. The current Chairperson and the public representative who would become the first Mayor of Dungarvan - if the title was opted for - said that her concern was the "erosion of local authority functions under the Local Government Act."

The proposal to defer was criticised by Cllr. Deasy but the suggestion that the council was unable to make tough decisions was rejected by Cllr. Kyne who pointed to the passing of the estimates as an example of decisions being made.

A vote was taken on a deferral with six councillors voting for postponing a decision and three against.

The debate looks set to come before Councillors again at the February meeting of the Town Council

This may be done by allocating the Glencairn service to Lismore but, Ms. MacHugh said "there is no question of Tallow losing jobs or delivery posts.'

"If volumes in a certain area have risen significantly", she added, "we might look at assigning part of that delivery to a neighbouring office".

However, Ms. MacHugh wished to make it clear that nothing has been decided as yet and the matter is under consideration.



ENVIRONMENT COMMISSIONER VISITS IRELAND

Ireland's environment had a high profile last week because of the official visit to Ireland of the EU Environment Commissioner, Margot Walstrom. Ms Walstrom's presence highlighted the launch of the EPA's Water Quality Report and Ireland's waste management

WATER QUALITY IN IRELAND

The new EPA report, Water Quality in Ireland 1998-2000 showed that for the first time since national surveys commenced in the 1971, that Irish river water quality has improved. Seventy per cent of river channel length monitored in 1998-2000 is now classified as unpolluted, an improvement of three per cent since 1995-1997. This means that almost 400 km of river channel, previously polluted, is now in satisfactory condition.

Improvements have been seen especially in catchment areas where anti-pollution measures such as nutrient management programmes, and phosphorus removal from sewage treatment plants have been put in place. Ms Walstrom recognised the improvements, but stressed that need to implement further controls on agricultural pollution. The EPA's report noted that groundwaters have an unacceptably high level of contamination, with 38 per cent of samples showed faecal coliform contamination. The EPA is advising anyone with a private well to disinfect or sterilise water before using it for consumption. Irish bathing waters continued to show a generally very high standard during the period and they compare very favourably with the rest of Europe in terms of quality.

WASTE MANAGEMENT

At a public meeting the Commissioner acknowledged that waste was the dominating issue for Ireland at the

moment. She said that Ireland needs to put in place an entire structure for waste disposal. This refers to the waste management plans for the various regions of the country that are currently at various stages of preparation. The Draft Waste Management Plan for the South-East Region was launched on the 7th of December and is available for consultation in Co Co Offices and Libraries. Submissions from the public on the content of the plan

Ms Walstrom said that Europe prefers "material recovery before energy recovery but that we also put incineration before landfill". This reinforces the EU waste management hierarchy, which details the EU preference for dealing with waste. The order of preference is: waste minimisation / prevention, reduction, reuse, recycle, energy recovery (incineration) and least of all landfill.

The commissioner emphasised the need for every citizen to participate in the solutions for Ireland's waste crisis. SUSTAINABLE ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION AND

The task force set up to help find a replacement industry for Tallow, was unable to meet with Tanaiste, Mary Harney, due to her heavy schedule.

The Tanaiste, who is also the Minister for Enterprise, Trade and Employment, was in Waterford City last week to launch Strategy Waterford, which promises to deliver 18,000 jobs for the South East region by 2031.

However, she expressed her regret at being unable to attend a meeting with the taskforce called for by Council

The taskforce was set up to find a replacement industry for the vacant Flare Plastics Factory and employment for the 68 former employees at Cadena. The taskforce is chaired by County Manager Donal Connolly and has trade union, public representative and community group in-

However, the Junior Minister at the Department of Enterprise Tom Kitt, when questioned by Deputy Austin Deasy in the Dail late last year, stated that a taskforce would only duplicate the efforts already being made and undermine work being carried out.'

Meanwhile, the former Flare Plastics and Cadena plants are being advertised on the property market by Lisney and Co. with a guide price of E1.8 million each. The 65,000 sq ft Flare Plastics and 35,000 sq. ft Cadena facilities are also open to leasing.




Lismore Choir presents cheque in aid of Conna Sheltered Homes Initiative

This week in the Garden

SOW BEGONIAS, GLOXINIAS AND OTHER PLANTS

Sowings in a warm greenhouse should be carried out on begonias, gloxinias, streptocarpus, canna, verbena, antirrhinium and scarlet salvia. With the exception of canna all can be kept in a temperature of around

Canna needs 24°c. These plants will be quite big by May, when most plants can be put back into the garden once more, there should be lots of high quality flowers.

PLANT POTATOES IN FRAMES

Potatoes in frames and pots are not dir cult to grow, but they do take up quite a bit of space. This is the time to start though if you want them. Plant one well sprouted tuber per 20cm pot full of compost or plant them in rows 30cm apart.

MULCH ASPARAGUS BEDS

If possible get hold of some well rotted farmyard manure and break it up well. Spread it a couple of inches thick over the asparagus beds. This will really improve the quality of the shoots later on.

PROTECT FRUIT TREES FROM BIRDS

From now onwards, birds are very likely to try and attack buds on fruit trees. The best way to protect them is by building a fruit cage over the tree. Pear and plum trees can be protected by passing black string from branch to branch which will stop the birds landing. The best way of protecting trees and bushes is to buy Scaraweb. you place it over the tree and it decomposes over a period of time.

ESB Invited To Respond To Criticisms

Cllr. Lar Hart has said that the lighting situation in Dungarvan is getting worse with public lighting frequently going out.

Cllr. Hart said that when he contacted the ESB they said the problem was with the cables. But, the Labour councillor said, if the fault is with the cables it is the ESB's business to resolve the problem.

"They have to fix those cables", he said "unless they want to leave the town in total darkness. It's a disgraceful situation".

Town Clerk Brian White responded by saying that a representative of the ESB agreed to come to next month's meeting but with certain conditions Clir. Lar Hart attached. The representative told the Town Clerk that problems would have to be set out before he attended the meeting so he could look into the situation

Cllr. Hart responded by saying "if the ESB don't know what's going on, it doesn't say much for them."

Far-Reaching Changes To Planning Procedures

The recent Government changes to the planning regulations could have far reaching effects, including changes to planning applications, the introduction of fees and the issuing of licences for crowds at public events that attract over 5,000 people.

The changes to the licensing arrangements for public events could affect public Ryan events such as Feile na nDeise, Cllr. Nuala Ryan said But she said where the 5,000 crowd do not converge on one area but are spread out, the issue could prove problematic to define.

The major changes to planning applications include that developers are entitled as of right to pre planning consultations with the council and details must be recorded on the planning file. The time limit has been changed, from 2 months to 8 weeks, and the two months for dealing with further information is reduced to 4 weeks.

Third parties who wish to make observations or submissions on planning applications must do so within 5 weeks and must pay a fee of E20.


Should the Local Authority wish to carry out an enforcement notice on unauthorised developments meanwhile the Council must first issue a warning notice within 6 weeks and allow 4 weeks for written submissions.

Pre-Sale Of Berths At Proposed Marina

While the Council has put a call out for proposals for the development of a marina and have contacted the Department of the Marine about dredging the harbour, County Manager Donal Connolly said.

Mr. Connolly said that he will be in a position to provide more information on a marina at next months meeting but said "it is around 25 years since a major dredging of the har-

bour took place." Answering Cllr. Dillon's concerns about the lack of movement in developing a marina, the County Manager

Permission Granted For Extension Of Civic Offices

The County Manager Donal Connolly refused to be drawn on how long the Civic Offices would be suitable as a council building after being granted the go-ahead for an extension

Planning Permission was granted by the Council for the extension to its headquarters on Davitts Quays to construct a third floor office extension over the roof of the existing 3 storey block and the construction of an internal bridge link between two of the blocks on the third floor.

When questioned how long the extended building would be suitable for the council's needs by Cllr. John Deasy, the County Manager replied that he saw the extension as being the last large changes to the Civic Offices for the foreseeable future.

Cllr. Deasy continued to press the matter and asked the County Manager to state the length of time.

"For as long as I can see", the County Manager replied.

The extension is to be started this year and the 315 sq feet extension is to cost €1.5 million to facilitate the thirty extra staff needed in the planning and sanitary services sections under the Better Local Government Act.

The €1.5 million project will be provided entirely out of Waterford County Council's coffers at a cost of €127,000 a year. The Civic Offices were officially opened just 3 years ago in 1999.

Council Considers Twinning With Italian Town

The County Manager, Donal Connolly made the announcement after a question raised by Independent Cllr. Michael O'Riordan. Cllr. O'Riordan asked when the grave stone, which he said was originally placed on the site in 1984, would be put

He also asked that a wall be put around the gravestone, which is presently being restored to its original state.

Kamps Meeded on Friars Walk Extra ramps should be put in place at Friars Walk, according to Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, as speeding is becoming a real danger in the area. Cllr. O'Riordan said that cars are travelling at speeds of 40-50mph down this road and dangers of accidents have become very real. The Independent Councillor went on to say that residents want two ramps to be put in place on this road. The County Manager Donal Connolly said he will investigate the situation.

Less time to eat. sleep and socialise (if any); Greater chances that you will be irritable, stressed out and impatient.; You will be more likely to suffer adverse health, or have a farm accident You may not do things as well as they should be done (have not time) and consequently more mistakes will be made.: You may make bad management decisions, this at a time when most major management decisions are made
- . What can you do in early February to minimise the long hours of work? - All necessary maintenance work on buildings must be done; Most fertiliser must be spread Make your calf rearing system simple; If you think you need extra help look around the neighbourhood and employ a man for a few days per week; The Farm Relief Service will be your main source of back up help: Spreading slurry, feeding cattle, spreading fertiliser, dehorning calves etc. are time consuming but they could be done by a contractor; Use nitrile or neoprene gloves at calving and for other infectious jobs; Use a mask when working in a dusty atmosphere
- In summary, write down all the major chores you will have to do in March, make a plan as to how you can minimise the time spent at each.

MEAT FEEDING - SOME COMMON QUESTIONS

Meal to mid season ewes is fed over a 6 - 8 week period starting now. Feeding the wrong quantity can give rise to problems. Here are some common feeding questions.

Unborn lambs weigh only 15% of their final birth weight 8 weeks from lambing. Therefore a ewe with two lambs must be fed to grow the lambs (about 9 kg in total), produce body fluids and develop the udder. Underfeeding may not effect lamb birth weight too much but will seriously reduce colostrum, ewe body condition and subsequent milk yield. In most situations this requires meal feeding where hay, silage or straw is fed.

WHEN?

About 7 weeks from lambing is the most suitable time to meal feed twin bearing ewes

Delay feeding singles until 4 weeks out. These ewes are capable of eating more roughage and produce less lamb live weight. A good single will weigh about 5.5kg. Feeding extra meal may increase lamb birth weight and lambing difficulty.

HOW MUCH? If you had good spring grass there would be no requirement for meals. But March lambing ewes will not have this grass. they are fed either hay or silage. These are poorer in quality and ewes simply cannot eat enough to satisfy their needs. Meal needs to be fed. As a guideline, start feeding ewes 0.1 kg meal about 7 weeks from lambing, building up to 0.7 kg at lambing. This assumes good quality hay (June saved) or good silage (May cut or 68 DMD+). A total of 20 kg of meal is fed in this situation. Suppose your roughage is poorer than above. It may be perfectly preserved but very stemmy. Ewes on this feed will get less energy and must receive higher lev-

els of meal. ONCE A DAY?

Some farms use a different approach to meal feeding. They feed a fixed rate once a day. It is a simplified system, which reduces labour. Twin bearing ewes are given 0.4 kg each day in one feed starting 6-7 weeks out. Again about 20 kg meal is fed pre-lambing. Singles start about 4 weeks out at 0.3 kg/day, whereas triplets get 0.6 kg/day for 7 weeks. A word of caution - this feeding programme is only successful where ewes are in good body condition and roughage quality is good.



IFA SAYS DOG ATTACKS ON SHEEP MUST BE STOPPED

With the national sheep heartbreaking. flock of 4.3 million ewes about to lamb down, Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman Michael Looby has said the continuing problem of marauding dogs. attacking sheep flocks must be addressed and stopped.

Mr. Looby said over the last number of weeks IFA has numerous reports of severe dog attacks on sheep flocks.

The Waterford IFA sheep farmers leader called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to immediately re-introduce the successful dog control advertisements on TV and radio which operated in previous years. He said "this will alert dog owners of the dangers associated with their pets running free in the countryside and particularly the high risk at lambing time for sheep flocks."

The Waterford IFA sheep farmers leader said that in addition to the major financial losses endured by sheep farmers from dog attacks. the hardship and cruelty inflicted on the animals was

Mr. Looby also called on the Minister for the Environment Mr. Noel Dempsey to introduce a new package of control measures for stray dogs, similar to that which was successfully introduced to control wild horses a number of years ago. He said this should involve micro-chipping of all dogs so as to have a fool proof identification system which in turn would identify dog owners.

The IFA man issued a strong warning to all dog owners to keep full control of their pets at all times. He said it is the responsibility of dog owners to make sure their pets are under full control at all times and particularly locked in at night

Mr. Looby said he was opposed to a huge increase in the dog licence fee which was recently proposed in the media. He said the critical issue was to support Dog Wardens through having more dogs licensed rather than increasing the licence



IMPORTANT NOTICE TO BEEF PRODUCERS **EXTENSIFICATION PREMIUM 2002**

All registered herdowners should receive an Extensification Premium EXPR.1 Form and explanatory letter by post in the coming days.

The EXPR.1 Form allows farmers to indicate if they are interested in participating in Extensification Premium for 2002 and if so, whether they wish to opt for the Simplified System or the Census System for the purposes of determining eligibility. If opting for the Simplified System, it also allows them to indicate the stocking density limit that they will observe for each and every day of 2002.

Any farmer who wishes to participate in Extensification Premium but who does not receive an EXPR.1 Form and letter by Tuesday, 5th February 2002 should request these documents from his/her local District Livestock Office.

The closing date for receipt of completed EXPR.1 Forms in District Livestock Offices is Friday, 1st March 2002.

DID YOU KNOW THAT

In 1882 Australia recorded their first test match victory the Kensington Oval, London. One spectator died from citement. It was this victory which started the Ashes follow ing a mock obituary which appeared in the Sporting Time-The obituary read 'In affectionate remembrance of English Cricket which died at the Oval 29th August 1882. Deeply lamented by a large circle of sorrowing friends and ac quaintances, R.I.P. N.B. the body will be cremated and the ashes sent to Australia. The following year England won a tree match rubber in Australia. This promoted a number of Melbourne ladies to burn a bail and presented the ashes in a urn to the English team The Ashes series was born!

In 1868 a team of Australian aborigines under the management of a Mr. Charles Lawrence arrived in London.

In 1844 the first match between the USA and Canada this match saw the first known century scored in North America. 120 by J. Turner. In 1822 a certain bowler John Willes was 'no-balled' for throwing the first recorded instance.

Sheffield Utd F.C.'s ground Bramall Lane, was the original home of Yorkshire cricket club. It was opened as a cricket ground 1855 but closed its doors to cricket in 1973. It was the venue of one test match England lost to Australia

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

My car was registered in 1997 and I believe it will have to be tested before I can renew my motor tax. Will I be notified when my test is due?

ANSWER

If your car is due to be tested, you should be notified by mail approximately 6 to 8 weeks before the anniversary date of first registration of your car. If you do not have a valid Test Certificate you will not be able to tax your car.

The National Car Test came into operation on the 4th January 2000. The testing of private cars (including second hand imports) has been phased in as follows:

- For the year 2000 it applied to cars first registered before 1st January 1992
- In 2001 it applied to cars first registered between 1992 and
- For the year 2002 and onwards it applies to all 4 year old cars and eligible older cars i.e. pre-92 registered cars tested in the year 2000 will be eligible for testing again in year 2002 because testing is every 2 years.

All cars must be tested up to 8 weeks before the anniversary date of first registration of their car whether this registration was in Ireland or abroad. There is no link with motor tax or insurance expiry date. Cars classified as vintage cars for motor tax purposes and cars permanently based on islands not connected to the mainland by road or roll on-roll off ferry are exempt from the test.

The National Car Testing Service (NCTS) contacts owners of eligible motor vehicles based on official vehicle records. However, there are a number of reasons why notification may not be sent e.g. the car has been out of tax for a number of months.

If you are not notified and your car is eligible for testing you should contact NCTS via email at bookings@ncts.ie or by phone at their LoCall booking line, 1890 412413. If you are not notified and you are unable to renew your car tax you should contact their booking department and they will be able to give you a priority booking

DISABILITY AWARENESS

ARTHRITIS

Arthritis is not a single disorder but rather the name for joint disease from a number of causes. Arthritic disability causes painful inflammation of one or several joints, with the inflammation destroying the cartilage in the joints. The most common forms of arthritis are Osteoarthritis and Rheumatoid Arthritis.

Osteoarthritis:

Also known as degenerative joint disability. Osteoarthritis is the most common arthritic disability. Osteoarthritis develops when cartilage (a slippery tissue that coats the ends of the bones) in a joint deteriorates. As the disease progresses, the cartilage loses elasticity and becomes increasingly prone to damage due to wear and tear, leaving the ends of the bone within the joint unprotected. Unlike some other types of arthritis, such as rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis does not spread through the entire body but instead concentrates in one or several joints, usually the fingers, feet, knees, hips and spine.

Although it is most common in the elderly, it is not just a result of the ageing process, as osteoarthritic carweakness and obesity may all contribute to the development of the disability. Up to 50% of people over 60 have some degree of this "wear and tear" arthritis.

Rheumatoid:

Rheumatoid arthritis is the most severe type of inflammatory joint disability. There is a theory that the disease is caused by an infection, but this is still under debate. Although it usually begins between the ages of 30 and 40 it can occur in older people for the first time. It occurs more commonly in women than in men. Genetic factors may be involved.

Symptoms of Arthritis:

Pain in the joints, which may be accompanied by feelings of weakness and fatigue. The joints most likely to be affected will vary depending on the type of arthritis present. The joints usually swell and become red, stiff and sore. Discomfort and stiffness are usually worse early in the day and are eased by moving around.

Arthritis is an unpredictable disability and treatment can be difficult. The approach and success will vary according to the type of arthritis being treated. Therapies are available that can ease the pain and slow down the spread of the disability.

Medications

The choice of medications available will depend on the type of arthritis. In osteoarthritis, the effectiveness of simple painkillers is often underrated and anti-inflammatory medications are frequently overused. They are best reserved to treat acute flare-ups. Long-term, continuous use may cause serious side effects such as bleeding from the stomach or bowel.

In rheumatoid arthritis simple painkillers and anti-inflammatory drugs are also tilage is chemically different widely used. In addition, from normal aged cartilage. there is a number of disease Genetic factors, muscle modifying drugs available. Your GP or consultant will advise on which is most suitable for you. Occasionally steroid tablets will be prescribed. Joint injections and joint replacements are other treatment options.

There are many types and degrees of severity in arthritis, but it is not usually a crippling disability, particularly if diagnosed and treated early. Recent advances in drug therapy will also help some sufferers.

Alternative medicine has become very popular over the last few years, especially for the relief of arthritic complaints, and it has been sug-

gested that exercise and a good diet also can help.

DISABILITY BILL 2001

Dear Editor — The Waterford Disability Network welcomes the long-awaited Disability Bill published 3 days before Christmas.

The key elements of the Bill are as follows:

- Any person with a disability will be guaranteed an assessment of need if they so wish from January 2003.
- All taxis and most buses to be fully accessible by 2010. and all rail services to be accessible by 2020 with interim deadlines. This timeframe is forever too long, as it covers two generations.
- An advocacy service to represent people with disabilities who cannot represent themselves from January 2006. This service should be implemented immediately.
- A moratorium on genetic testing for commercial purposes from January 2003 to 2009.
- Videophone-link interpretation service for the deaf to be available from 2006. Why wait when the technology is available at present?
- Significant new powers to the National Disability Authority to include inspection and enforcement. This can be seen as a move in the right direction.
- Government policy on mainstreaming public services for people with disabilities to be fully implemented in
- The creation of a Centre of Excellence in Universal Design, all goods and services will provide for the inclusion of people with disabilities at the outset of 2006. this is also very welcome.

The Disability Bill is expected to be debated in the Dail during February where we hope a lot of amendments will be made to the Bill as it stands. The Assessment of Need section as proposed at the moment is totally unacceptable to people with disabilities. You have to apply to the Health Board for an assessment. If you are not happy with the assessment you have to complain to a complaints officer from the Health Board and to make things worse the Health Board will be the Service Provider. However the Bill does not provide a statutory right to a Service from the Service Provider. So it still will be a dependency culture and the good will of the Health Board.

What's needed is simple: Constitutional and statutory reform, which is based unequivocally on the inalienable rights of the human person. Other countries have legislation, which is needs based, person-centred and enforceable, it's not going to work otherwise. Why can't we have similar legislation in this country?



THE STRATEGIC

As this report will hold centre stage in all discussions throughout the GAA, until after a special Congress has dealt with it, it will remain a hot topic in every forum in the weeks and months ahead.

To fully understand all that is involved, one must read the 264 page book which is published and which will be issued to every club throughout the Association within the next two weeks. Waterford clubs will receive a copy at the end of the county board meeting next Monday.

MAIN OBJECTION

One of the chief objections is the proposal to compel all elected people to retire from office at the age of 65 years. This will apply at all levels from Club up to Central Council. The general feeling about this element of the report is that dedicated people, many of whom will be life long members and who are working in a voluntary capacity and giving the benefit of their experience to whatever committee or club to which they are attached, should not be given the 'boot' just because they have reached the age of 65. If someone is to retire it should be his/her own decision or the decision of the members of the club or board, etc.

The declared purpose of this policy is to attract younger people into the administrative side of the Association. Personally I believe that the members of the committee who believe that young people are waiting on the wings to take over administrative responsibilities are very much out of touch with the reality of the situation.

Seven years ago a rule was introduced making it obligatory for counties to include an under 21 player on Congress delegations. Experience has now brought about a change of mind on this requirement as the Strategic Committee, now having found that these young players have no interest, are now recommending that in future a player be brought in place of the youth member.

Another very contentious element of the report is the recommendation that Central Council be given authority to allow soccer/rugby to be played in Croke Park (this was defeated by a single vote 2 years ago at the annual congress).

What will be interesting from our point of view will be the contributions from delegates to county board at the March meeting.



Kiely Monumental Colligan Cup This Sunday

All roads lead to Colligan wood this Sunday, 3rd February, for the 14th Annual Kiely Colligan Cup runs for adults and juveniles. The five-mile adult run will start at 2p.m. and it will be preceded by the juvenile event over a distance of 2km at 1.30p.m. The Colligan Cup also heralds the beginning of the Michael Roche Carpets Spring Series and entries for this four-race event will also be taken on Sunday.

The same system is in place for the juvenile run. Entry Fee to the juvenile run is 2 euro. This run is also open to beginners of any age. Distance one lap (2km).

At the time of his death Pat Noctor was the Garda Juvenile Liaison Officer within the Dungarvan Garda District. No more fitting or appropriate a way then could there be to honour him by the setting up of this sports star awards scheme confined exclusively to those aged under 18. I have no doubt it is a project that would have Pat's clear and unequivocal approval.

An Irish Olympian last year, Jamie Costin was the inaugural winner of the Supreme Young Sport Star accolade and he has been followed by Derek Hayes of Abbeyside whose athletic and footballing exploits speak for themselves, one of the great show jumping stars of the future Diane Beecher from Tallow, amateur boxer James Keohan also from Abbeyside, another athletics prodigy Eibhlis Ahearne from

Touraneena and the 2000 winner and finalist again in 2001 jockey sensation Tom Queally of Cappagh. When the adjudicating team of Irish Examiner journalist John A. Murphy, WLR Fm's Gaelic games correspondent Jim Landers, Glanbia's Kieran O' Connor and Ard Scoil na nDeise teacher and avid sports enthusiast Mary Ashe met last November to get the administrative side of the scheme under way they eventually sent out in the region of forty nominations. Subsequently however came the real work deciding who the final twelve nominees should be. This time as in all past years the standard was extraordinarily high and it was only after hours of deliberations that the final twelve contenders were finalised. Now the excitement and expectancy is steadily building up to Friday night when the Ard Scoil na nDeise venue is certain to be packed to the rafters. Intending patrons should note that the starting time will be 8.00 and for those early comers the Dungarvan Brass Band as always will be on hand to entertain.

In the context of administration the organising of the Pat Noctor Awards scheme is nothing less than a mammoth undertaking. And while many hands inevitably make light work there is no way it would be the spectacular success it is today without the key input of Garda Eddie Fitzpatrick who succeeded the late Garda Noctor as Juvenile Liaison Officer. From the first day the scheme was launched Eddie has been the real driving force, giving hours of total commitment to ensuring that come the final night everything is ship shape in terms of organisation. Major thought his input undoubtedly is, he would I'm sure, be the first to acknowledge the important contributions of others. Most notable among them Nuala Condon who is a member of the clerical staff at Dungarvan Garda Station and Sgt. Michael Leacy in his role

as chairman of the Garda Social Club.

As always there will be a bevy of invited guests at Friday nights eagerly awaited event. Among them the Chairperson of Dungarvan Town Council Cllr. Teresa Wright and her Waterford County Council counterpart Ollie Wilkinson. County Manager Donal Connolly, Town Clerk Brian White and members of the clergy will be among the other invitees. Senior Garda officers will include Supt. Michael Blake and Inspector Tom O' Grady, who brilliantly lead the Garda team not just in Dungarvan but throughout the entire sprawling Garda district. As always of course the very special guest of honour will be the late Garda Noctor's wife Judy and to her the signal honour of presenting the magnificent trophy to the winner will be given. Other members of the Noctor family will also be present. A momentous night is in prospect and only when Eddie Fitzpatrick make the official announcement will we know who is the Pat Noctor Supreme Sports Star Award winner for 2001. What we do know however is that whoever the adjudicators have chosen from twelve worthy finalists will be well deserving of the accolade.

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
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
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
