## Marina Could Become Reality

A window of opportunity for the development of a marina in Dungarvan has been opened, after the launching of a new tourism and leisure initiative, according to County Manager Donal Connolly.

The new scheme, which was launched on Monday last by Minister for the Marine Frank Fahy, will see an estimated E7.62m of grant aid made available for eight counties in the South and East.

The grant aid will be distributed to local authorities who submit successful marine projects in their areas.

As part of this scheme, Mr. Connolly said, Waterford County Council will be applying for the aid for two harbour projects - Dungarvan and Helvick.

The grant aid will provide fifty percent of the development costs with Waterford County Council providing the remaining funding.

"It's too early to put an es-

imate on the cost of developing a marina in Dungarvan", Mr. Connolly said, "but it would be significant."

It's now hoped that the pre-sale of a number of berths would raise a significant portion of the local authorities costs.

But, Mr. Connolly added, selling too many berths at the proposed marina could lead to financial problems in the long term.

"We would have to be careful on the numbers we sell", he said. "Maintenance of a marina is a future cost and renting berths would go some way towards paying for that. So we have to balance that up".

This balance was already reached in a previous marina development in Co. Waterford with the successful development of Dunmore East, the County Manager said.

A significant amount of dredging would also have to be carried out before a mari-

na is developed in Dungarvan while a smaller scale dredging operation is envisaged for Helvick.

The benefits of a marina in Dungarvan are obvious, according to Dungarvan Town Councillor Damien Dillon.

"People generally are attracted to water and harbours by road. But we would also attract sailors and anglers by sea to the benefit of our tourism take."

Cllr. Dillon added that "There is little doubt, but the number of users has increased in recent years. This will accelerate with the introduction of a marina with benefit to tourism, trade, employment, safety and amenity".

He also pointed out that the council spent a considerable sum stabilising structure of the sea wall last year, which has added to the present value of the harbour.

Meanwhile, Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club's

Commodore, Clare Morrissey said the club would welcome any development of the harbour and described the area as ideally located with good shops and hotels to attract marine tourists should the marina go ahead.

Ms. Morrissey said the Sailing Club is now looking forward to seeing details of

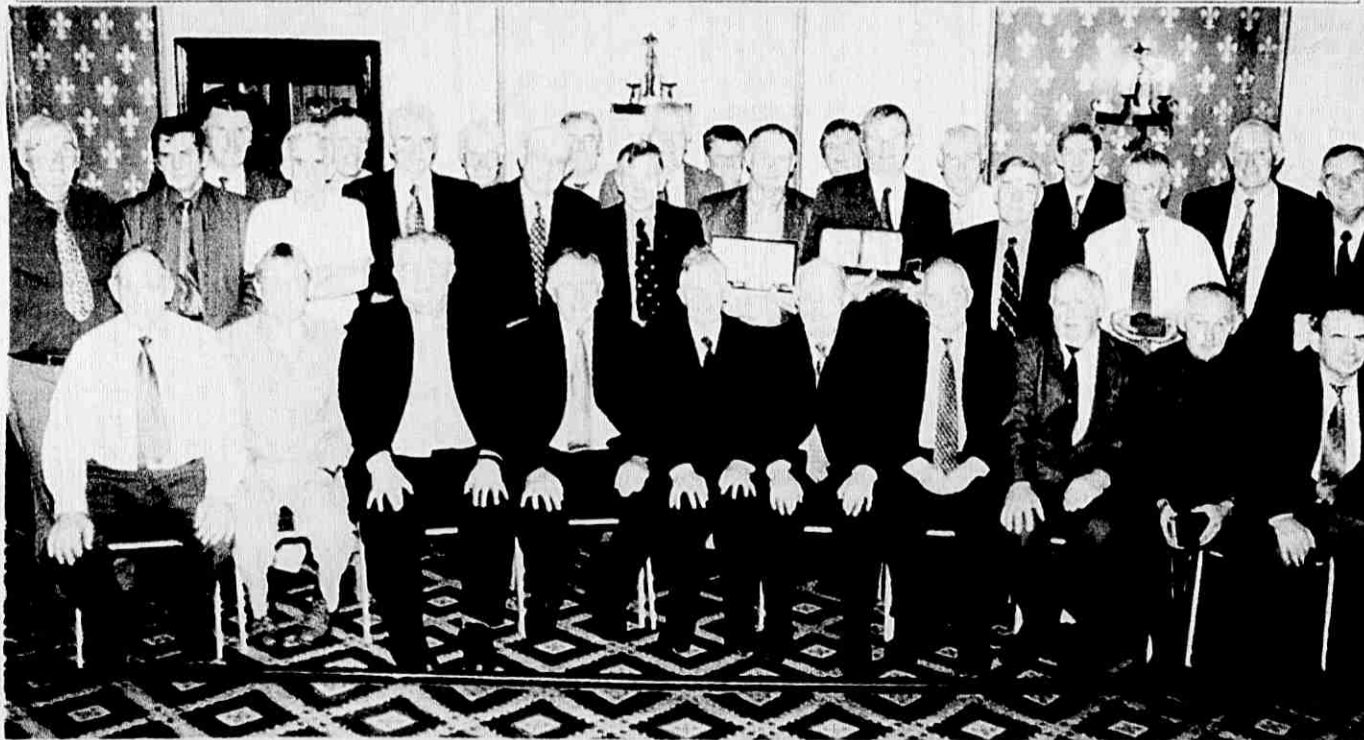

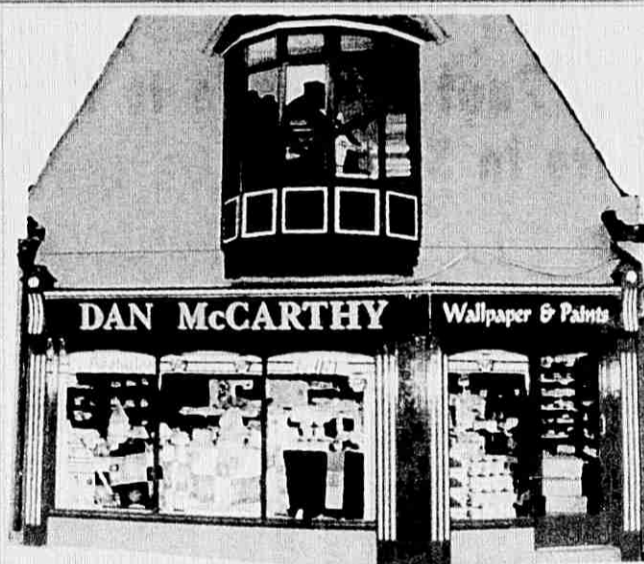

There was a very full attendance at the Dungarvan Toastmasters meeting in The Park Hotel recently. Toastmaster for the evening was Sadie Moynihan who kept things running smoothly throughout with the help of club president, Marion de Burca.

Jimmy Kirwan, who is our newest member, was first up to the podium to do his "ice breaker". A very courageous step indeed, as this was just his second meeting. Jimmy told us about himself and he captured our attention from beginning to end with his natural turn of phrase, friendly manner and lovely smile. Keep up the good work, Jimmy, we are eagerly awaiting your next speech.

In Toastmasters, the 'ice breaker' is a club member's first speech. This can be a bit nerve wracking for the person standing in front of an audience for perhaps, the first time in their lives. The advantages of taking this step as a member of Toastmasters are enormous, as it is done in a warm, friendly

environment, with the support and encouragement of other members who have all gone through the experience and were helped to move on to the next stage at their own pace.

## What's A Gospel Choir?

Whoppi Goldberg has a lot to answer for. Five years ago plans for a graduation Mass at St. Joseph's of Stanhope Street in Dublin almost unravelled when a number of sixth years said they didn't want to sing solemn hymns during the service.

The move surprised Capuchin Franciscan friars who teach religion at the school. What sort of music did the pupils have in mind? Something to get into, said the girls, referring to "Sister Act", a feel good hit comedy in which the ever-cheerful Whoopi, a singing nun, dusts down a rustic convent with some bone-shaking gospel music. And so sparked the beginnings of American gospel music in Dublin.

Positive reaction to a lively choir of nine singers prompted Brother Richard Hendrick and John Nugent to take it further. They brought in a five-piece band and assembled 'A night of soul' an evening show mixing prayers, poetry, dance and gospel music.

A young crowd estimated at 800 people packed into St. Mary's of the Angels on Church Street near Smithfield and the seed was planted. "I think the girls wanted something richer spiritually to brighten up dull celebrations," reflects John Nugent, who conducts the choir. "I was always interested in gospel music. It has along, long history, coming from slaves on the plantations, working the railroads. Because they were illiterate they remembered what they heard at service on Sundays and sang it to give them hope." "Usually when you say the word 'choir' to anyone they tend to run but it's not a folk group or a religious group or a prayer group," explains Jennifer Ka-

vanagh, one of the original members. "It's a group of people who come down and enjoy singing - and it's a social outlet as well." "When I saw them singing the first time I thought it was amazing," agrees Paula Finlay, a more recent arrival. "I really wanted to get involved. Like most people into the choir I had been in musicals, been in the Billie Barry Kids, done tap dancing, but this is better than what I expected," she enthuses.

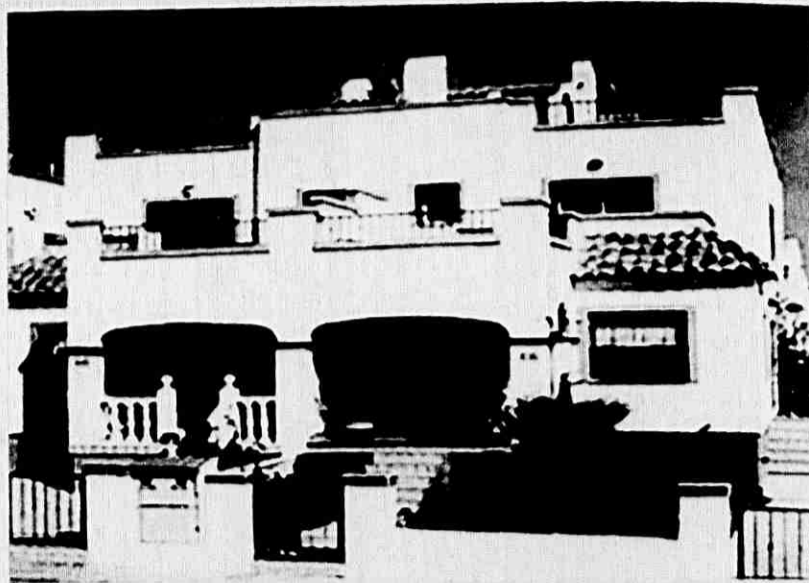
### THE MUSIC HAS GOT TO HAVE MEANING

"Sometimes people who come to see us think we're going to be healing and preaching and giving it loads," says Mary Cardiff, another recent recruit. "But it's completely different. I love gospel music, R&B, soul, any music with meaning. It's all about the music and being involved with a group that loves doing what you love." Nugent moved to Coolemine Community School but when the girls pushed to make the St. Mary's choir a regular fixture, he rounded up a few volunteers in Coolemine. Choir boys, however, don't come quietly. Eoin McGloughlin got roped in when his sister's friend dragged him along for an audition four years ago. "I thought, y'know, choir practice?! What are you like!" he laughs, fingering the ring in his eyebrow. "I was a bit apprehensive but thought I'd keep my mind open on it. There was a good bunch from school going over and that's the way it went. Some fellas play football. I put on weight and joined the choir." You'd hear it now and be proud to be in it.

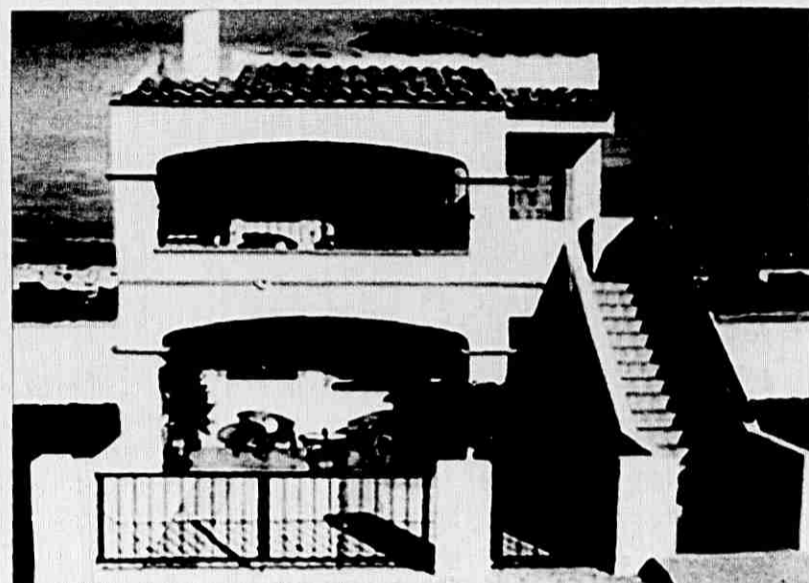

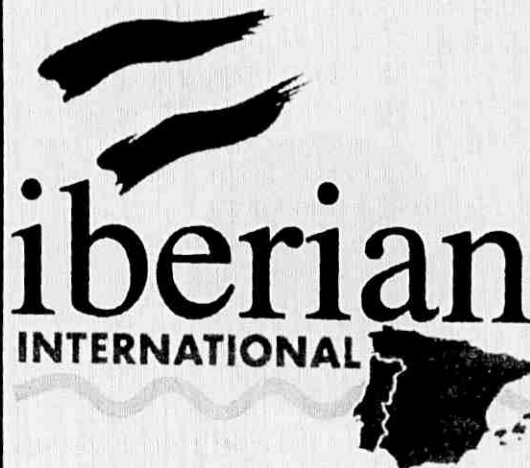

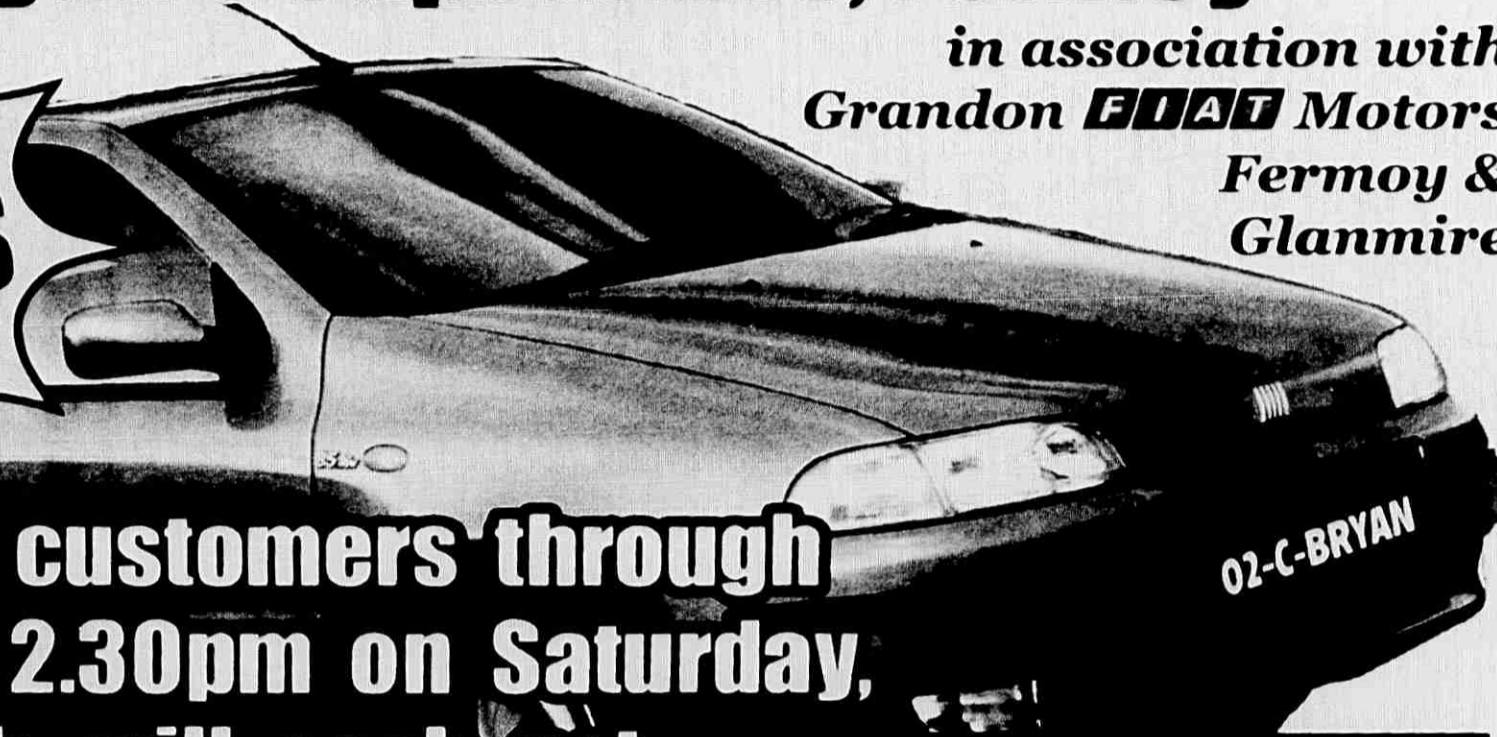

# JOURNEY THROUGH AFRICA: EGYPT

## The City of Cairo Bazaar

Cairo is famous for bazaars (Arabic markets) and Khan El Khalili is one of the biggest and best in the world. Weaving through the maze of alleys you can bargain with traders for anything from shoes to copper



to spices to souvenirs.

Keep a special look out for craftsmen making beautiful jewellery or useful pots.

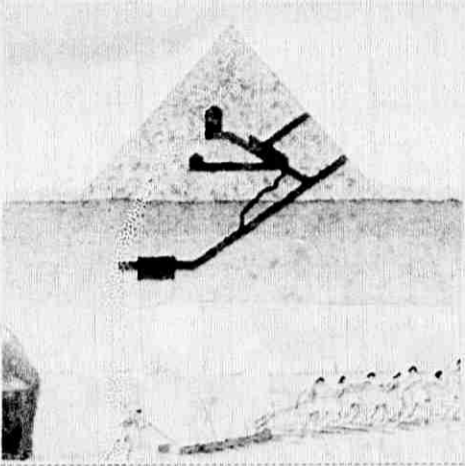
In the 'Streets of Gold' you will find many traditional craftsmen hammering and polishing gold, silver, and semi-precious stones. You can explore the bazaar for hours — but try not to get lost!

## The Pyramids at Giza

The pyramids at Giza were built between 2550 and 2470 BC. They are made of stone blocks weighing up to 15 tonnes each. The blocks were cut by hand and transported over long distances, perhaps using ropes and rollers.

Building the pyramids involved balancing the blocks so they held each other in place, then encasing them in smooth stone.

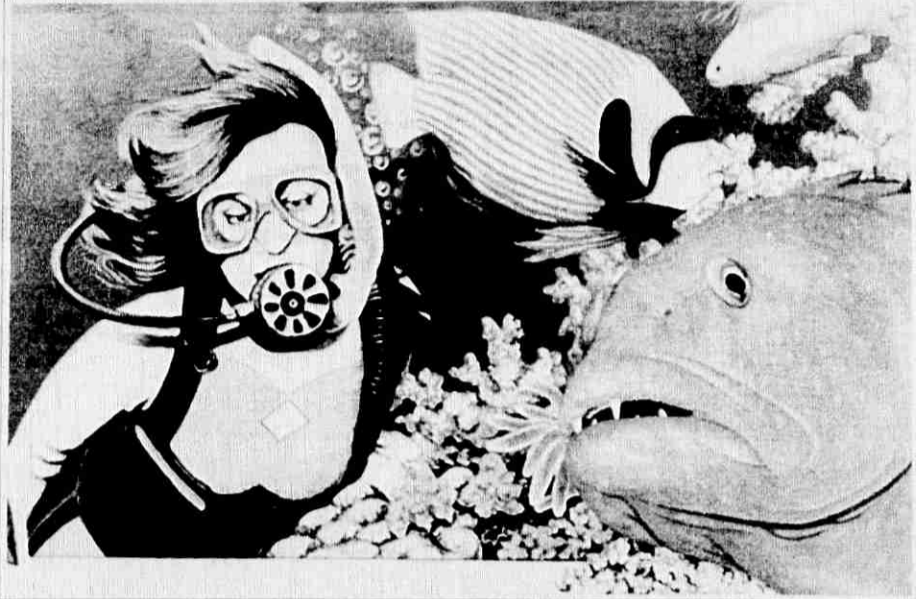
Burial chambers for the dead pharaohs (rulers) and tunnels were built both inside and under the pyramids.



## Hurghada and the Coral Reefs

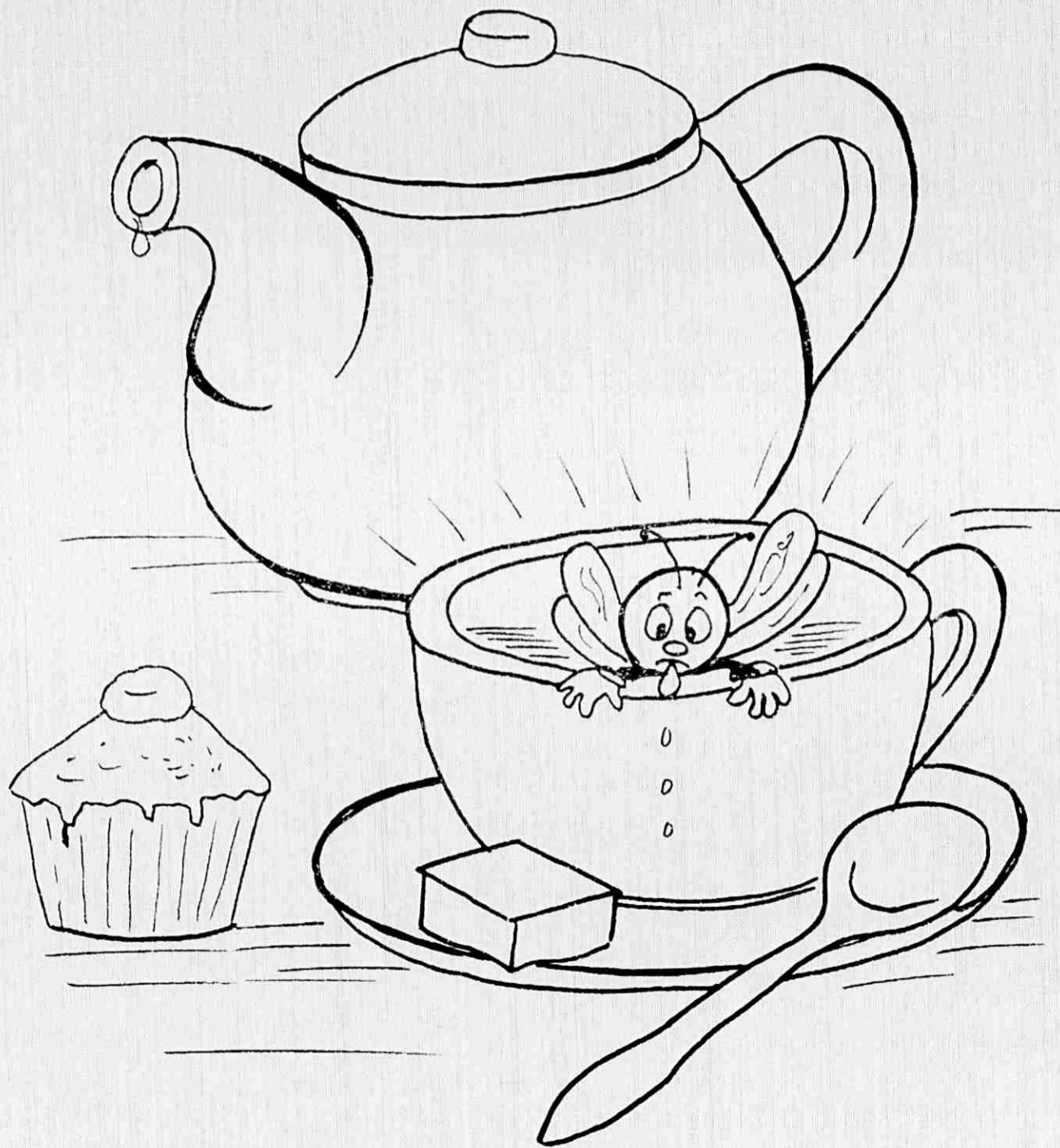
Hurghada on the Red Sea coast has some of the best coral reefs in the world, with hundreds of fish of all shapes, colours and sizes living around them. Some, like the angelfish, are beautiful. Others, like the grouper, look rather fierce.

The coral is built by tiny animals called polyps, which deposit a stony skeleton around them. When they die, other polyps grow on the skeletons that are left behind. The coral is very fragile and divers must be careful not to damage it as they explore.

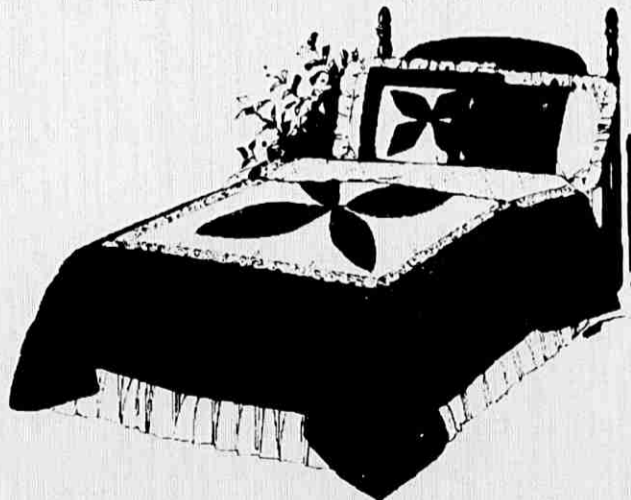

# COOKERY CORNER

## Veal With Mushrooms

Preparation: 30 mins  
Cooking: 45 hours

A DELICIOUSLY rich meat course – ideal for dinner parties.

**INGREDIENTS:**

- (serves 4)
- 4 veal chops, cut to 3cm thick
- 250g button mushrooms
- 1tblspn lemon juice
- 60g butter or margarine
- 1 small onion, finely sliced
- 1 clove garlic, crushed
- 2 tblspns plain flour
- salt and pepper
- 1 1/4 cups beef stock
- 1/3 cup dry white wine
- 1/2 tspn dried tarragon leaves
- 2 tspns snipped chives

Trim off any excess fat from the chops. Roll up the tail ends of the chops and secure with toothpicks. Slice mushrooms and sprinkle with lemon juice.

Heat the butter or margarine in a heatproof casserole or heavy-based pan and fry chops until brown on both sides.

Remove the chops and add mushrooms, onion and garlic to the pan.

Cook gently for 5 mins until golden. Lift out vegetables with slotted spoon and set aside with the chops.

Add flour, salt and pepper to pan and stir over medium heat for 2 mins.

Add stock, wine, tarragon and half the snipped chives. Bring to



the boil, stirring now and then.

Return the chops and the vegetables to the pan, lower the heat and simmer

covered for approximately 30 mins or until chops are tender. Season to taste,

adding salt and pepper as necessary.

Remove the toothpicks and sprinkle the chops with the remaining chives before serving. Creamy mashed potatoes make an ideal accompaniment.

### White Chocolate Mousse

Preparation: 10 mins  
Cooking: 10 mins

CHOCOLATE mousse with chocolate sauce. Ideal with fruit or whipped cream.

**INGREDIENTS:**

- (serves 6-8)
- 275g white chocolate
- 2 tblspns liquid glucose (available from chemists)
- 1 pint (600ml) double cream

**Topping:**

- 100g plain chocolate
- 120ml double cream
- 15g butter

Break up the white chocolate and place in an

oven-proof bowl with the liquid glucose and one table-spoon of water.

Carefully heat the bowl over a pan of warm-hot water and stir until the chocolate has melted.

Remove from heat.

Whip the cream until thickened and fold into the melted mixture.

Pour into serving dishes or wine glasses and put into the fridge until it sets.

**For the topping:** Carefully melt the plain chocolate with cream in a bowl using the same method as before.

Cool the sauce and pour over mousse to serve. Ideal with seasonal fruits.

### Stuffed Baked Tomatoes

Preparation: 15 mins  
Cooking: 20 mins

THIS is a very simple but tasty and effective dish that makes a perfect meal or hot snack for vegetarians. Quick and easy to prepare, this dish can be served as part of a main meal or as a light midday snack.

To make a low calorie meal of stuffed baked tomatoes, serve with a fresh, tasty green salad or fruit

**INGREDIENTS:**

- (serves 6)
- 6 beef steak tomatoes
- 420g can mixed beans in

- mild chilli sauce
- 2 sticks celery, chopped
- 2 spring onions, sliced
- freshly chopped coriander

Slice the tops off the tomatoes, then scoop out and discard the seeds.

Stir together all the beans, celery pieces, spring onion slices and coriander.

Divide the mixture between the tomatoes and sit them evenly in a roasting tin.

Bake for 10 mins without the lids on.

Replace the lids of the tomatoes and bake for a further 10 mins.

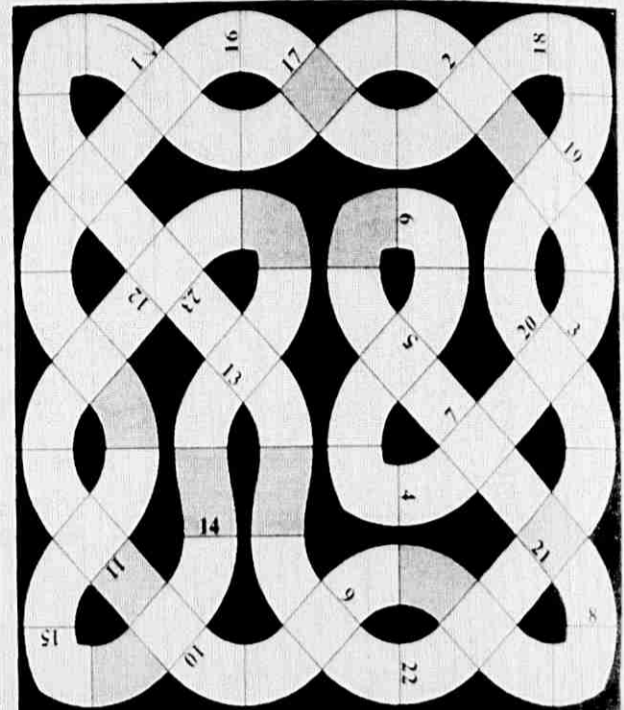

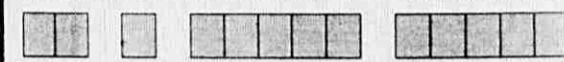

## Helvick Cliffe Road To Be Re-Enforced Against Coastal Erosion

Dungarvan electoral area councillors have passed a €130,782 road improvement grant for road works throughout the area, with strengthening works on Helvick Cliffe topping the bill at €63,000.

Helvick Cliff has seen significant coastal erosion in the past few years and the sum spent is seen as a necessity to

prevent further erosion.

The three Dungarvan area councillors present at the committee meeting on Thursday last - Councillor Tom Cronin, Councillor Nuala Ryan and Councillor Tom Higgins - also passed improvement work to the R671 Clashmore road at a cost of €19,046.

Local roads will also see

significant spending with the restoration of a car park in Cllr. Cronin's base of Ardmore, coming to €22,855, while strengthening work to Deelish Bridge will come to €12,697.

The removal of a dangerous bend at Kilnafrehan will be carried out at a cost of €12,697 - a cost significantly reduced by the donating of

the land involved to the County Council by the landowner.

A total of thirty kilometres will be re-surfaced under the programme, with roads in Aglish and Dungarvan receiving the most attention, with roads in Ardmore, Ring and Whitechurch also to be re-surfaced.

Aglish will get the added benefit of having the regional roads in the area re-surfaced as well. A total of 8,600m on the four roads will be carried out under the programme.

The programme is part of the 2000 - 2006 National Development Plan, which will see a half a million euros spent on improvement works.

Cllr. Tom Cronin welcomed the funding but called for an additional three or four roads to be included in each area, or a doubling of the mileage to be re-surfaced.

"It's great to see these roads included in this programme", Cllr. Cronin said. "But it's a pity there wasn't an increase in manpower to look after the roads which is something I would have liked to see."

## Labour TD Criticises Government's Failure On Decentralisation

Waterford's Labour Party Deputy, Brian O'Shea has said that it is now clear the Fianna Fail/PD Government will not be announcing any decision on decentralisation before the next General Election.

# Population Surge In Dungarvan Predicted In New Report

Kilkenny and Dungarvan will be just a half-hour commute from Waterford within a decade and Wexford just a 40-minute drive, according to a Government task force, appointed to examine Waterford's relatively poor recent economic performance.

By then, the population in the economic zone covering the main cities and towns will have grown to 300,000, and have the knock on effect of producing up to 18,000 new jobs, a recently released statement by the focus group claims.

The strategy which was

formally presented to An Tanaiste, Mary Harney TD, in Waterford recently predicts that Dungarvan along with six other towns of a similar size in the South East would have an 18 per cent increase in population by 2031.

Without the intervention of this new strategy, the Government group states, the South East would only grow by less than one per cent in the next twenty years.

The report of the Waterford based task-force set up by An Tanaiste last year, proposes that Clonmel, Dungar-

van, Kilkenny and Wexford be developed as regional "hubs" with Waterford as the "gateway" city.

The growth and development of the hubs would in turn benefit the smaller towns in the "Waterford Economic Zone".

Launching the report the Tanaiste congratulated the Group on their hard work and commitment.

"They have produced a strategy that can benefit not just Waterford but the entire South East region and at the same time make a positive contribution towards bal-

anced national development.

The Tanaiste added that "the report rightly acknowledges the fact that effective development requires a strong local commitment combined with positive co-operation on the part of regional and national authorities."

To create 18,000 new jobs, Waterford is to embark on an ambitious programme for the provision of mass retraining opportunities, which will allow it to boast of having the "best trained workforce in Europe", the group have claimed.

## DUNGARVAN WOMAN TO TAKE PART IN GOOD WILL MISSION TO ASIA

Siobhan Fennell from Cloncoskeran, Dungarvan is among the crew of the Irish Navy vessel the L.E. Niamh which departed Cork Harbour on a good will voyage to Asia on Monday.

The unique and historic trip will be the longest and most comprehensive overseas good will mission ever undertaken by the Navy.

The mission under the command of Lt Commander Gerard O'Flynn will see the ship route across the Mediterranean before transiting the Suez Canal into the Red Sea.

The LE Niamh will then make an important re-supply call to the port of Masawa before carrying on through the Gulf of Aden, cross the Indian Ocean and into the South China Sea. The round trip is approximately 22,500 nautical miles and will take one hundred days to complete.

The ship will host a large number of promotional events designed to support the export efforts of individual Irish companies and promotional work of the State Development Agencies.

It is anticipated that up to 5000 business contacts will be fostered by the mission while the Asian mission will provide an important training opportunity for the navy personnel. Siobhan is to be one of 44 navy men and women taking part in the mission.

## St. Patrick's Day Committee Bows Out

The Dungarvan St. Patrick's Day Parade Committee has decided to bow out after twenty-five years at the helm of the Holiday celebrations in Dungarvan. A statement from the organising committee this week tells of their difficulties in trying to make the arrangements for this year and how few resources they have with which to work.

The statement says that it is with regret that the Committee of the Pipe Band announces that they will not be organising a St. Patrick's Day Parade this year. "For some time past," it continues, "and in common with many other voluntary organisations, we have been experiencing difficulties in recruitment and do not have either the personnel or resources to take on the mammoth task of running what has become one of the biggest cultural events in West Waterford."

Chairman of the Parade Committee, Jim Veale said this week that having tried to get the task of organising the Parade in motion, they had to concede that they no longer had enough interested people to assist in drawing the many strands of the operation together.

"We have fulfilled our duty for the last twenty-five years," he said, "and it must now fall to others to take over where we leave off. It has not been easy and the demands of security and safety are growing each year, not to mention the financial commitment. We have had to run the Parade on a shoestring for many years, but it looks as if we have to finally draw the event to a close."

He said that while the much depleted present Committee would not be in action this year, they hoped that some other group or body would emerge to take up the torch.

"Anyone who continues the tradition we started will have our blessing and support," he says, "and it would be a pity to see the tradition and the event die for want of workers."

He thanked the many individuals and organisations who had helped them over the years in a wide variety of roles. "Without their help and willing support, which was always much appreciated, we could not have had a successful parade for twenty-five years."

This brings to a close - for the moment at least - the tradition of twenty-five years. The Pipe Band and the St. Patrick's Day Parade have been synonymous for a quarter of a century, but those days are now past. It is the earnest hope of the Committee that the Parade should continue, but who, if anyone, will emerge to continue the good work remains to be seen.

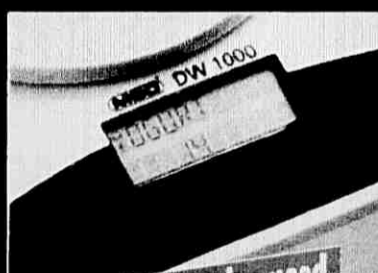

# Noel Brennan's Asian Adventure

### BACKGROUND TO THE TRIP

Following the breakup of Communism the Tajik people found themselves in a poor state and one of their priorities was the development of the education system. Teachers were very badly paid and the majority especially the better teachers left Tajikistan to work in Russia. The priority for those who stayed at home was to work in the fields to sustain themselves. Still the future of their children remained uppermost in their minds as they understood the importance of a top class educational system. Hence the need to train teachers who would in turn train other teachers. This is where Noel and his two colleagues became vital as they organised a crash course for thirty local teachers in the skills of how to train other teachers. During the five weeks involved they gave local trainees plenty of opportunity to practise their skills.

### THE PROGRAMME

Week 1: Needs Analysis. Week 2 Training 30 local facilitators. Week 3 Curricular Areas. Week 4 Culture of the school - relationships with children - collaboration among staff - child protection - bullying. Week 5 The facilitators concentrated on special needs. It involved identification of special needs and the education of children with special needs.

Week 6 Writing a report with recommendations for future training.

### HOMeward BOUND

The course was followed by 3 days rest and relaxation in the neighbouring Kyrgystan before flying home on the 20th August. Noel previously has done similar work in Namibia (SW Africa) in 1998 and South Africa in 1997 with the Irish Agency APSO. He hopes to undertake another project in South America next year.

# Divine Dahlias

**DAHLIAS are beautiful plants which flower in every colour under the sun - except blue.**

The dahlia has 30 species, but well over 20,000 cultivars. They are tuberous-rooted perennials from the mountainous areas of Mexico and Central America. They have mid to dark green leaves, long, usually pinnate and toothed, but they are grown for their flowerheads and cultivated in a variety of forms.

They flower from mid-summer through to autumn, and are very susceptible to the cold.

Dahlias are informally divided into types - tall growing "border" and low growing "bedding". All are good for display and cutting.

Dahlias do very well if sown in the third week of February to be put in a greenhouse. They germinate in a temperature of 13 to 16°C (55 to 60°F). Use a peat based seed compost in clean seed boxes or trays. Prepare the trays the day

before you sow the seeds, give the soil a thorough watering and drain.

Sow the seeds thinly and evenly, cover lightly with soil and place a sheet of glass over each tray then cover the lot with brown paper. Watering should be done either from a can with a fine rose or by holding the pan almost to its rim in a tub of water.

If you do not have a greenhouse, you can sow in the third week of March on a frame in a sheltered place with soil-warming cables installed. Seeds can be sown directly in the frame or from boxes or trays. The latter makes handling easier later on.

If you are unable to start dahlias in a greenhouse or heated frame, then you can do so in the third week of April on an unheated frame. Arrange close together and cover lightly in soil. Water moderately but increase supplies as growth commences. Cover the frame every night with sacks and remove them in the morning.

Dahlias introduced into the greenhouse in the third week of February should start making a growth by the third week of

March, so you can obtain the first batch of cuttings. Sever roots just above the tuber, when they are about 5cm (2in) long, leaving a tiny stump still attached. This stump will send out two or three new shoots which in turn can be taken as cuttings. Prepare the cuttings by trimming just below a joint, remove lower leaves and insert 2cm deep in sandy soil in a propagating case at 16 to 21°C (60 to 70°F). Water freely. Take cuttings as they become available. Dahlia cuttings should be potted in April, directly they are rooted. They should be potted in 8cm pots, unless you previously inserted them singly, in which case no move is needed.

During early May, bedding plants in frames must be given as much ventilation as possible, but still do not expose them to any frost. It is advisable to do this up until the end of May. If the weather appears settled, plant out dahlias from frames or greenhouses in the first week of June. Plant with a trowel, giving the roots plenty of room and firm the soil around them. Water liberally if the soil is dry.

If for exhibition, dahlias must be thinned out in July. Good strong

plants of the large flowered variety must carry three stems and no more. Remove others, keeping only the sturdiest. If grown only for garden decoration, they can be left to grow naturally. All will benefit from liberal soakings with weak liquid manure every few days.

Throughout July and August, remove dead flowers.

Plants that have been growing out of doors must be lifted to frost-proof quarters in October just as soon as their foliage is blackened by frost. Cut off dead growth and store for winter.

## This week in the Garden

### PLANT ANEMONES AND RANUNCULUSES

Suitable anemones to be planted now are St Brigid, de caen and fulgens types. The anemones should be about 8cm deep and the ranunculuses about 5cm deep.

The ranunculuses are weird looking things like dried up claws. The claws should be planted downwards. Both the anemones and the ranunculuses should be planted around 15cm apart.

### SOW PARSNIPS

If the weather is looking good do not hesitate to sow the parsnips outside. However, there is no sense in planting outside if the ground looks frozen or sodden.

Sow about 3cm deep and 23cm apart in rows. If you want to grow for exhibition force a metal pole down about two feet and fill with very soft soil. Place the seed in at the same depth and cover with original top soil. The tap root grows deep down through the soft soil to make the parsnip longer.

### LIFT AND STORE PARSNIPS

If you don't want last year's parsnips left in the ground to start growing again lift them now and store against a north wall covered with a little soil.

### TALKING MONEY

From now on farmers will be receiving their end of year accounts from the accountant. In many cases the accounts are used solely to calculate tax liability and get very little attention beyond this. This is unfortunate as the accounts contain a lot of information which will assist you to run your business more profitably. Teagasc has recently updated its booklet, "Talking Money" which helps farmers to get maximum benefit from the information in the farm accounts. The booklet is available free of charge from Teagasc Offices.

Over the next three weeks I will feature extracts from this booklet in this column.

### LOOKING AT THE BROAD PICTURE.

To understand and control your finances you must first know the overall financial situation. Basically you should know:

- What profit the business generates?
- Whether you are better off financially at the end of each year?
- How efficiently the business is being run?

Most of this information is contained in the two principle financial statements, the:

- Profit and loss account.
- Balance sheet.

Examination and analysis of these statements is not very difficult or time consuming and will answer the big questions about your financial affairs.

### THE PROFIT/LOSS ACCOUNT

As the name implies, this statement shows the profit/income for the accounting year. The level of profit determines the standard of living, capacity to invest inside or outside the farm, borrowing capacity, etc. As profit can vary from year to year, depending on price and weather, the first question you need to ask yourself is: is it a once-off or is this the income that can reasonably be expected for the future?

With this information you can cut the cloth to suit the circumstances and not wait for one to two years to discover that income cannot support the level of private spending engaged in.

While the layout of the profit/loss account may vary between accountants, the basic data is standard.

The successes and failures of Farmer A in 2000 are summarised in this financial statement. The profit and loss account shows income of 32,451.

### QUESTIONS:

1. Is this enough to meet principal repayments on loans, income tax, personal drawings, new investments, etc?
2. Is it good or bad for the size and system of farming involved?

### INDICATORS

Income per hectare is 649 which is about average for this system, thus, there is scope for improvement. Whether total income is sufficient or not will be clear from the balance sheet.

A good guide to general efficiency is the Ratio of Cash Expenses (excl. depreciation) to Sales or Gross Output. Here the ratio is 69.393 or 58% 118,947

This ration can vary from about 40% for very efficient specialised dairy farmers up to 70% plus for inefficient mixed dairy/cattle farms. Now examine the major cost items of the business.

- Meal/fodder - does the figure of 16,050 look high for the livestock numbers and output involved?
  - Fertiliser (inc. lime 635) - compare cost per hectare with stocking rate [ 192/ha (excl. lime) vs.S.R. of 2.1 L.U./ha] Is this good or bad?
  - Veterinary/Al, etc. ( 6,930 looks high on this farm)
  - Machinery costs (operating costs and contractor = 11,297) Over 155 to 190/hectare is too high for grassland farms.
  - General miscellaneous - can the present level be afforded?
- On the sales side is it only possible to get from the profit & loss account a broad outline of the output. It should however be possible to calculate milk sales/yield per cow, gross output of cattle and sheep/L.U., change in inventories, etc. In this example milk sales are 1,624 per cow while cattle/sheep receipts are 674 per livestock unit indicating that output is quite good overall.

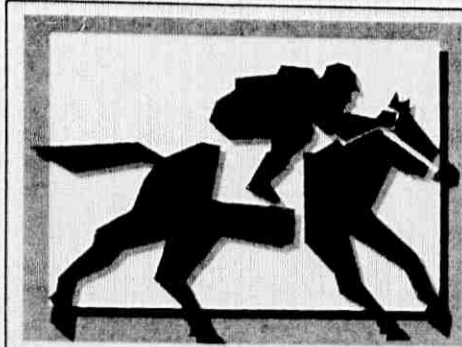

## Know Your Rights

**QUESTION**

What are the new Medical Card income guidelines for 2002?

**ANSWER**

The Medical Card income guidelines are updated in January each year. The new income guidelines, effective from 1st January 2002, are as follows:

Medical Card income Guidelines from 1st January 2002  
Weekly income limit (gross less PRSI deductions)

Age	Single Person Living Alone	Single Person Living with Family	Married Couple
Up to 66 years	€132.00	€117.00	€190.50
66-69 years	€144.00	€124.00	€214.00
70-79 years	€285.00	€246.50	€427.00
80 years or over	€300.50	€258.00	€449.00

Allowance for each child under 16 24.00

Allowance for other dependents 25.00

Allowance for (rent, mortgage) excess over 24.00 per week

Allowance for cost of travelling to work in excess of 21.00 per week

For the year 2002 the guidelines have been increased by approximately 3.8% in all categories. For example, for a single person living alone, aged less than 66, this means an increase of €5.03 and for the age group 66-69 years an increase of €5.60. Similarly, for a married couple the increases are €7.02 and €8.30 respectively.

All persons aged 70 and over normally resident in Ireland are entitled to a Medical Card irrespective of income. This medical card is not means tested and covers the cardholder only. It does not cover their spouse/dependents.

The Eucharist that has nourished hundreds of million, the body and blood of Christ that is the core of our Christian belief, is recalled and represented for us during the season of Lent.

The victory of Christ over death, the words of Christ reminding us that he is the resurrection and the life and that we will share in His victory and life, these are the lessons and teachings of Lent.



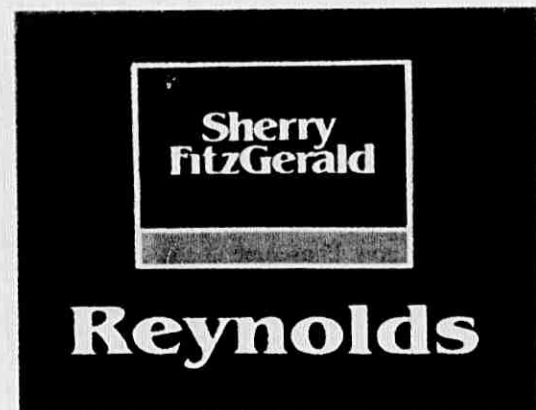

## Feast Of St. Blaise

On Sunday last 3rd February the people celebrated the feast of Saint Blaise a bishop and martyr.

Saint Blaise devoted the earlier years of his life to the study of philosophy, and afterwards became a physician. In the practise of his profession he saw so much of the miseries of life and the hollowness of worldly pleasures, that he resolved to spend the rest of his days in the service of God, and from being a healer of bodily ailments to become a physician of souls. The bishop of Sebaste, in Armenia, having died, our saint, much to the gratification of the inhabitants of that City, was appointed to succeed him. Saint Blaise at once began to instruct his people as much by his example as by his words, and the great virtues and sanctity of this servant of God were affected by many miracles. From all parts the people came flocking to him for the cure of bodily and spiritual ills. Agricolaus, governor of Cappadocia and the Lesser Armenia having begun a persecution by order of the Emperor Licinius, our Saint was seized and hurried off to prison. While on his way there, a distracted mother, whose only child was dying of a throat disease, threw herself at the feet of Saint Blaise and implored his intercession. Being touched at her grief, the Saint offered up his prayers, and the child was cured. And since that time his aid has often been effectually solicited in cases of a similar disease. Refusing to worship the false Gods of the heathens, Saint Blaise was first scourged; his body was then torn with hooks, and finally he was beheaded in the year 316.

## NEW HOME FOR HOSPITAL CAT SCAN

Health authorities hope to expand the ongoing development at Saint Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel to provide accommodation for the hospitals new Cat Scan. The South Eastern Health Board has applied for planning permission to site the vital diagnostic equipment in the hospital as part one of the multi million pound hospital upgrading. It is now hoped to provide a temporary home for the Cat Scan at the hospital until the new development is complete. The completion date which was expected to be November this year, it now may have to be extended until 2003. The people responded with incredible generosity in South Tipperary/North West Waterford to the appeal to help fund the Cat Scan and provide one of the vital pieces of equipment to the hospital. The target was £300,000 but the fundraisers took in £400,000 which more than met the public's commitment to part-fund the unit. Phase one of the development of Saint Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel, includes the provision of an Accident and Emergency department, Radiology, Intensive Care Unit, Surgical and medical wards, operating theatres, physiotherapy department, an Education Centre and consultation rooms. It is now hoped to expand that development to include the Cat-Scan next to the Radiology department. The hospital project manager Marie McEvilly said it would be a wonderful facility to have the unit included in the new hospital. In the meantime a temporary home will be provided for the Cat Scan to allow for its early commissioning.

I was relating to David about a certain Brian 'Tonker' Taylor, captain and wicketkeeper of Essex. Now Tonker was a strict disciplinarian who marched his side out like they were in the army, but this particular time I can recall the team decided to stay put, when Taylor arrived at the middle he found he was by himself much to the amusement of the crowd! Rest assured it never happened again. Now where was that I mused? I couldn't remember, on arriving home I decided to check in Dickie Birds book 'Whitecap and Bails'. Although the incident was mentioned no ground was named.

Another happening I can remember is the goings on when Essex were playing outside Chelmsford they took with them the scoreboard. Dickies book recalls they also took the advertising boards and seating in an operation similar to the moving of Billy Smarts Circus! They were the only county ever to do it.

Going back to Brian Taylor

briefly, he was the one who brought on all the top Essex youngsters Graham Gooch, John Lever, Neil Foster, David Acfield and David and Ray East.

Another Essex player was Trevor Bailey, who had this unfortunate nickname 'The Boil', how ever did he get it? Once again Dickies book comes to the rescue. Trevor played soccer for Walthamstow (with whom he won an FA Amateur Cup winners medal) and with the crowd cheering him on, the cockney words, 'Come on Bailey' sounded more like 'Come on Boiley'.

Keith Fletcher a more recent Essex captain had another strange nickname which puzzled me. 'The Gnome'. Meeting him for the first time since the late sixties at the Mardyke some years ago, I asked him how he got it. "From the winklepicker shoes we all wore then, mine always turned up at the toes".

**COACHING**

Extract from Gerry McDonnell's Secretaries report to the AGM of the Munster Council of Cumann na mBunscol recently. "There are many coaching schemes now in operation

throughout Munster in schools, clubs etc. Teachers have been to the forefront in introducing these schemes into schools - supervising activities, arranging suitable time-tables, organising supplies of equipment etc. They

are to be congratulated. County Boards organising and financing these vital coaching schemes are to be congratulated also for commitment and foresight. However, any coaching scheme that does not ensure weekly or fortnightly visits to schools is of dubious benefit.

The time has now arrived for counties to adopt appropriate, successful modules. The Tipperary coaching scheme should be looked at closely by all Co. Boards.

The suitably qualified coach visits the schools regularly. The Co. Boards and local club finance the scheme. The local club and the local school supervise the selection of coaching personnel and the implementation of the scheme. Co. Board, local club and local school are all involved.

There are many other successful coaching schemes in operation. Coiste Naisiunta earlier in the year asked all county secretaries of Cumann na mBunscol for details of these schemes. I look forward to publication of these details, as I accept opinions regarding these schemes are many and varied.

Note: The coaching structure recently put in place in Ardmore and Grange schools with the full support of the Club and the County Board is the role model to be looked at for all schools and clubs in Condae Portlairaige.

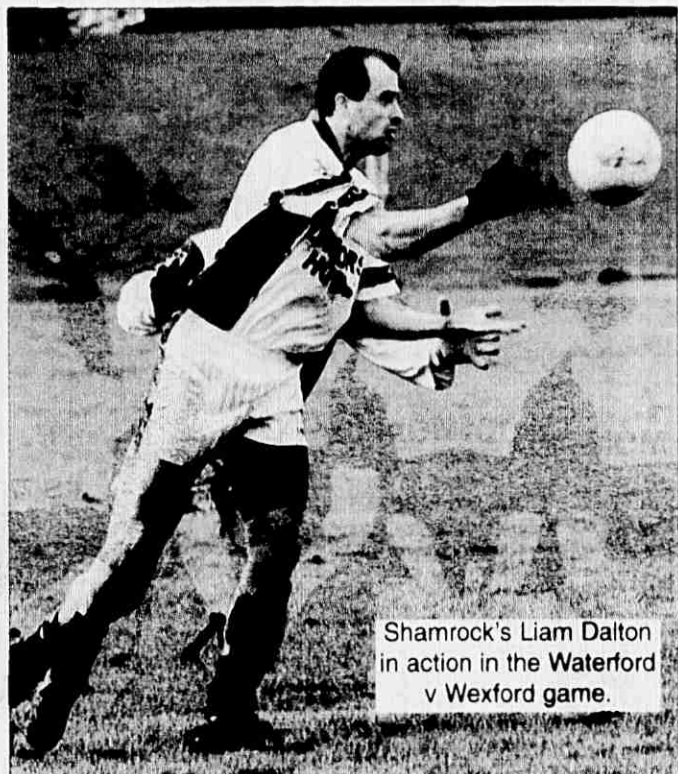
It is expected that the lineout will include players from the 20 who played here.

# Mark Beecher Joins Pat Noctor Roll Of Honour

**Amid enthusiastic and sustained applause, the Ninth Pat Noctor Young Sports Stars Award for 2001 was conferred on Tallow Equestrian, Mark Beecher in the Assembly Hall of Árd Scoil na nDéise on Friday night last. Mark becomes the ninth member of this Hall of Fame, which also contains the name of his sister Diane, who won the overall award in 1995, again for equestrian achievement.**

In truth, after listening to the citations of the full twelve member panel, any one of them would have made a worthy winner of the award and in many another county, any one of them would have taken the overall award as well.

The sixty minute ceremony, noted for its punctuality and brevity was attended by Mrs. Judy Noctor and Ian Noctor, Cathaoirleach of Dungarvan Town Council, Cllr. Teresa Wright; Chairman of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson and Chairman of Lismore Town Council, Cllr David Whelan.

The Gardai were represented by Supt. Ml. Blake, Garda Síochána, Dungarvan; Sergeants Michael Leacy and John Molloy as well as many other Gardai from the District. The individual commemorative scrolls were presented by one of Waterford's great hurlers and former GAA All Star, Detective Mossie Walsh. Also in attendance were Mr. John O'Flynn, Director of Services, Waterford County Council; the Principals and teachers of the Second Level schools of the area as well as representatives of many sporting and social organisations of the County.

#### CONGRATULATED

Each of the three public representatives congratulated the young sportspeople on their achievements as well as those who supported them including their parents and families as well as teachers and coaches. These included not only the twelve finalists, but also the twenty-three other nominees, who did not make the final cut.

They spoke of the stature of the Award, and how it has become the premier youth award in West Waterford, a prize which is coveted by those in the upper echelons of Waterford sport.

The attendance was welcomed by Sergt. Leacy who told the packed assembly hall how proud and pleased the Gardai of the District were to see the Award, which was set up to commemorate one of the best known and respected members of the force, Garda Pat Noctor, not only maintain its position in the sporting field, but grow in stature each

year.

Supt. Ml. Blake, who has been a consistent supporter and promoter of the Award said that hand in hand with their role as Garda Officers, they fully recognise the importance of sport and the fostering of sport in schools where teachers are playing a hugely influential role.

"We are all well aware of the problems and pressures on young people today," he said, "and familiar with the bad press which some young people have had. Hopefully through these awards we can see the positive side, through commitment, dedication and achievement of these young people to sport."

#### NEW INITIATIVE

He spoke also of the new initiative which the Dungarvan gardai have set up in the past twelve months, to target and intercept young people who are at risk in our society. "A full time youth officer is now employed in Dungarvan, in co-operation with Waterford Youth Service to serve their needs," he said.

Ian Noctor, speaking on behalf of the Noctor family paid tribute to the young sportspeople on their many and impressive achievements, as well as to all those who had worked to make the Annual Award and the evening a success.

Garda Eddie Fitzpatrick, non-voting Chairman of the adjudicating panel, declared Mark Beecher the winner of the 2001 award, a decision which seemed to gain universal approval.

In his interview with Kieran O'Connor, who was his usual competent and businesslike self as MC, Mark paid tribute to the contribution his parents and family have made to his success.

"We had two months off last Spring as a result of the Foot and Mouth restrictions," he said, "and my father and I set out for the year what we were going to do." He said that they had achieved what they set out to do and international success as well. Mark was in fact the only Munster representative on the Irish team.

#### WHAT I LOOK FORWARD TO

He said that the demanding season saw them travel regularly all over the country, but that in the end the major effort was worth it all. In the future, Mark sees the completion of his studies for the Leaving Cert as his first priority, but obviously, the call of the ponies and horses is very strong for him.

"It's what I do when I get up to in the morning and when I come home from school in the evening," he said, "and it's what I look forward to every day."

Amongst the honours which impressed the adjudicators were his winning the individual honours at the Italian International Championships as well as a Team Silver Medal. In France he won the Power and Speed Competition and was the only Irish competitor to qualify for the Grand Prix on board his pony "Loughnatusa Gold Touch", in which he finished a highly creditable third. He was also a member of the Irish team which had a fourth placing in the Nations Cup.

He subsequently went on to represent the Irish Pony Team at the European Championship in Spain, the ultimate honour for any pony and rider. Here, he was leading Irish rider, finishing in 6th place overall.

He also added a Bronze team medal from the British International Horse Show as well as many victories at home, despite the Foot and Mouth restrictions. His final show of the season, which effectively brought the curtain down on his pony riding career, saw him win the 148 Novice Championship as well as the 148 Grand Prix at Ballyrafter.

Before the ceremony, Dungarvan Brass Band entertained the audience and played the fanfare for each of the nominees as they walked to the stage.

#### PROFESSIONAL PRESENTATION

Huge credit is due to the members of the Dungarvan District Gardai under Supt. Blake, who first conceived the idea of honouring successful young sportspeople and who, with a succession of young athletes have built the Award into the coveted prize it is today. Special acknowledgement was made to the work of Junior Liaison Officer, Eddie Fitzpatrick and Mrs Nuala Condon, who make the comprehensive and effective preparations for the prestigious event each year.

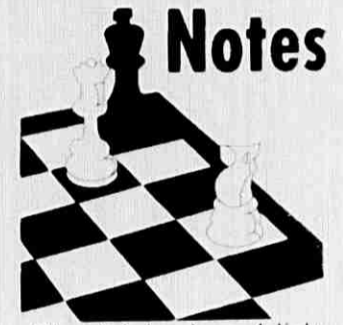

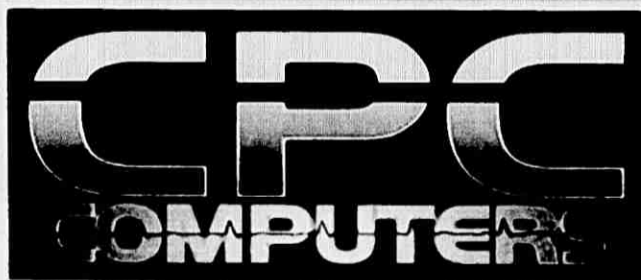

# Bord Gais Pipeline Dependant On Power Plants Go-Ahead

Bord Gais have indicated that a natural gas pipeline to Dungarvan would go ahead, once Dungarvan Energy Ltd instruct them to proceed with construction.

The provision of a gas supply, which is a vital component for the E76m Power Plant proposed for part of the Glanbia site, has been stalled due to High Court challenge against the plant lodged in February of last year.

However, Bord Gais, in a statement issued to Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea earlier this week, said they are "committed to extending the natural gas network to as many towns in Ireland as possible"

"In order to extend the net-

work to a new area", the statement goes on to say, "Bord Gais must first establish that it is economically feasible to do so, as per the strict economic criteria laid down by the Government".

A power station in the town, "such as that planned by Dungarvan Energy Ltd, would help to secure a gas supply to the town of Dungarvan".

The statement adds that Bord Gais has actively supported DEL in the extension of a pipeline to the town.

This pipeline would "facilitate the power plant and also, of course, supply other customers in the Dungarvan area."

Preliminary engineering work has already been carried out along with a budget

for the extension of the required network after DEL first approached the gas supply board.

Dungarvan Energy, were then advised of the "connection costs", and an agreement was signed to allow construction of the network proceed.

However, they were subsequently requested to suspend work on the project and to await further instruction from DEL. The instruction to proceed, however, has not yet been given due to the high court challenge.

Deputy Brian O'Shea commenting on the statement said he is "most anxious that the natural gas pipeline is extended to Dungarvan as speedily as possible."

This pipeline should be

provided not just for the benefit of Dungarvan Energy, he said, but also for the other industrial customers and domestic customers.

The Labour TD said he has written to Dungarvan Energy and is seeking when the company intends to give further instruction to Bord Gais.

If the final go-ahead is given for the project to proceed the 100 megawatt plant will operate on a round the clock basis and will generate 800 million units of electricity annually.

Dungarvan Energy - a business consortium which includes Rolls Royce Power Ventures - estimate direct employment to over twenty people and a further 150 jobs in the construction phase.

the proposed marina.

Waterford County Council will be applying for grant aid in the next two or three weeks and this along with the applications from the other seven local authorities will be vetted by representatives from the Dept. of the Marine, Bord Fáilte and the Marine Institute.

Minister Fahy, outlining the approach which will be adopted in considering applications, said they "will focus on developing high quality, integrated water-based tourism and leisure "clusters" at a targeted number of sites which are properly integrated with the mainstream tourism product, ideally with the accommodation services and other tourist activities in the area".

## MUSEUM NOTES

The following is an extract taken from the Monthly Illustrated Journal, 1883, March issue.

### THE LEGEND OF KNOCKMAUN

"The following tradition preserved in the parish of Kilgobnet...and would seem to point to the former existence on the Comeragh Mountains of red deer:-"In the days of Cromwell there lived at Knockmaun, near Mount Odell, a woman called the Maun, who was the terror of her neighbours for miles around. She had a sister, the Ille Ruadh, ...who was the owner of considerable property at Deelis, Kilnafrehan, Coolnasmea, &c. She was accustomed to visit her estates annually...On these occasions she visited every part of her property, remaining a day in every townland, where she was entertained by her tenantry, who were obliged to provide a red deer for the feast. On her arrival at Ballyknock, she and her eight sons were entertained by Thomas Towhill, who, either for want of the means or the inclination to procure venison, had a black sheep from his little flock slaughtered, and its flesh prepared for the occasion. The sons, not aware of the trick honest Towhill had played, were loud in their praise of the 'venison'; but their sturdy mother, who had seen a little more of the world was undeceived.

The Ille Ruadh, who like her sister, the Maun or Mawn, carried matters with a high hand against her weaker neighbours, was besieged in her Castle, at Deelis, by Cromwell, and lost her life there. The Maun shared the same fate, as the shattered fragments of her keep at Knockmaun testify."

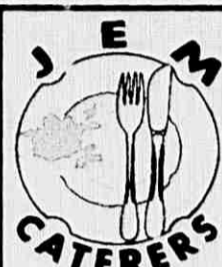

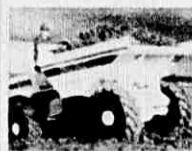

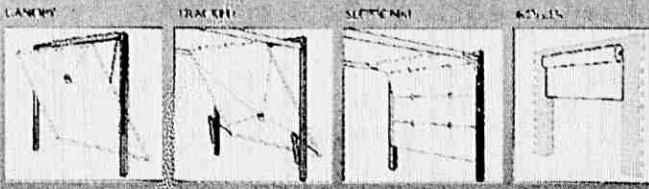
