

Tragedy Strikes West Waterford Community

AND SOUTHERN DEMOCRAT

West Waterford remained in a state of shock after the tragic double murder of Clashmore publican, Mossie Curran, and Kinsalebeg mother-of-three Joan Power, in separate incidents in the early hours of Saturday morning last.

The enormity of the tragedy, which has befallen the two close knit neighbouring parishes was emphasised by the vast crowds, which turned out for the burials amid harrowing scenes of emotion and grief, yesterday (Tuesday).

The burials, which followed Requiem Masses, took place one hour apart, in Ardmore for Joan Power and just fives miles away in Clashmore as Mossie Curran was laid to rest.

Last Sunday 46-year old Declan Power, Bawnacomera, Kinsalebeg, Ardmore was charged with the murder of his wife, Joan Power and Mr. Curran at a Special Sitting of Dungarvan District Court.

Mr. Power was escorted into court in the custody of two Garda officers, with his




head and face covered by a dark anorak.

Bespectacled and wearing a smartly cut dark suit, he sat silently throughout the nine-minute hearing before Judge David Riordan. His face was slumped in his right hand, and his head bowed throughout the proceedings.

Evidence of arrest, charge and caution was given by Sergeant Jack Gaine of Youghal and Sergeant Michael Lacy of Dungarvan.

Sergeant Jack Gaine gave evidence of arresting Mr. Power at Ardoe, Ardmore at 11 am on Saturday afternoon, and charged him with the unlawful possession of a



He released Power on that charge on Sunday evening, but immediately re-arrested him on the charge of murdering his wife, Joan.

Sergeant Gaine said that having cautioned Power, the accused man replied "I am very sorry".

Sergeant Lacy said when he charged Power with the murder of Mossie Curran the accused said, "I want to express how awfully sorry I feel for his wife and family".

An application for free legal aid was made to the court by Power's solicitor Patrick Gordon, and was granted by Judge Riordan.

Supt. Michael Blake, Dun-




garvan, who is heading up the double murder investigation, made an application to have Power remanded in custody to a sitting of Dungarvan District Court today (Wednesday).

During the brief hearing, members and relatives of all the families directly involved in the double tragedy were in the court. Before he was taken into Garda custody, members of the Power family hugged the accused in what were very emotional





Green - the colour universally associated with Ireland and St. Patrick. There have been many opinions as to what the traditional and historical colour should be - gold, blue, saffron - but the green has become the popular choice.

Colour psychologists tell us that this delightful colour projects cheerfulness - creating a mood of freshness and a yearning for that eternal spring. It inspires hope, tranquillity and the longing for spiritual birth. No more delightful colour to honour St. Patrick and Ireland.

There are many interesting tales and legends about the actual origin of the connection of green with Ireland. Most renowned is the story of St. Patrick's use of the little green shamrock to symbolise the Trinity. It is known too that it was a special ritual in ancient Ireland - the inclusion of green buds with old brambles to light the spring bonfires. With the wild March winds, the ash residue would be scattered over the soft earth, which would make the fields and pastures greener and lush.

The Emerald - that precious gem of purest beauty and clarity has inspired many of Ireland's poets and writers to refer to her as the "Emerald Isle". A noted Irish dramatist Dion Boucisault, made the stirring street ballad "The Wearing of the Green" famous

"When laws can stop the blades of green From growing as they grow
And when the leaves in summer time
Their colours dare not show
Then I will change the colour too
I wear in my caubeen
But till that day - please God
I'll stick to "Wearing the Green".

Wine And Dine

With Winter just going and Spring coming fast, it's time to ditch those heavy body warming red wines and start to think about light, fresh, crisp wines for those balmy Summer evenings we all hope and wish for yet rarely achieve. Most wines that fall into this category will indeed be white yet there are a certain few red wines which shouldn't be excluded and we are going to examine a number of them, just to give you an option should you not like white wine.

Italy gives us a number of wines which are usually always reliable in this category. Made in dry styles with light red fruits and great red cherry, zippy acidity which can put many white wines to shame. Chianti, Valpolicella and Bardolino instantly spring to mind. However with every wine the temperature for serving should be correct as indeed what most often happens is it is served too cold and light wines will always show up rather more sharper than which is ideal.

16 - 18°C is normal for these wines. Try them and be pleasantly surprised. Indeed Bolla Valpolicella Classico got best value wine in the best of wine in Ireland, not a bad achievement out of 1500 wines tasted. Price 11.45 euro - £8.99.

If you like a fruitier red wine why not try Brown Brothers tarrango from Australia which has instant fruit appeal and believe it or not shows up pretty well when slightly chilled. This got a very favourable reaction when tasted recently at our Dungarvan Wine Club in January.

However if you just plain don't like red wine I've just got the much sought after Pewesy Vale Eden Valley riesling from Australia 12.70 euro. Wonderfully refreshing with brilliant crisp acidity and limey mineral chudertones. A great summer wine should we dare hope for these balmy evenings.

Back To Nature At The Old Market House Arts Centre, Dungarvan

There are three new exhibitions on show in The Old Market House Arts Centre, Lower Main Street, Dungarvan. All the exhibitions explore an element of nature and have an environmental basis.

Local artist, Lisa Dolan from Ardmore, who has an Earth Science degree in Applied Ecology, displays large stunning images in her 'Native Wildflowers of County Waterford', complete with live planting in the gallery.

Dublin based artist, Deirdre McCarthy, reflects on rural Irish landscape in her 'Line on Landscape' show. These exhibitions continue until Saturday 6th April, 2002.

Upstairs in Scomra de Paor, Knockanore National School exhibits 'By Bride & Blackwater' an exploration of their environment under the guidance of fibre artist Rita Scannell.

This project was devised and funded under the Art Tutor in Schools Scheme by Waterford County Council's Arts Office. This exhibition closes on Thursday 4th April, 2002.

Final Push Underway By Dungarvan Parade Committee

The interim-committee behind this years St. Patrick's Day parade are making "one final push" to guarantee the successful running of the parade in the town with the March 17th date looming closer.

Some businesses have come forward to back the event, raising a total of E1,400 while a further E300 has been guaranteed by Dungarvan Town Council towards the estimated running cost of E3,000.

However, sponsorship will be sought from the vintners and traders in the town to gain support for an event that attracts around 20,000 people into the town and produces a massive boon for businesses in Dungarvan.

But, the committee are still confident that the event will get off without a hitch. Added to this, the entry of a number of floats from businesses who previously did not take part, along with the regular floats, should produce one of the best parades in many years, committee spokesman Tom Keith said.

A Town Council float is also currently being worked on, with the aid of Carriglea, while there are said to be hopes that Dungarvan Parade will be on RTE rota for broadcasting highlights of the event on their Six O'-Clock News Slot.


A blow to the parade was received, though, by the news that a roadcaster from WLR FM will not be present, although the event will be covered in some form. The local broadcaster has said that covering the event would be logistically impossible and not financially viable.

Volunteers to marshall the parade are still being sought although the numbers needed have been substantially reduced by the involvement of the Civil Defence.

In terms of policing the event, the St. Patrick's Day Committee were informed by Supt. Michael Blake that all the attractions in the square itself should be on one side.

As the interim committee are planning to have two stages in operation - one with officials and the other with musicians - it is now planned that the stages will be side by side. It is also understood that the musicians will start shortly before the parade, continue during silent gaps and remain after the parade completes it's circuit

Our first stop is Sambaru National Reserve, which stands as a fertile refuge in the otherwise dry landscape.


Following that, prepare for a change of climate as we take a challenging trek up Mount Kenya

snow-capped peak you will notice the vegetation changing. and due to its position on the equator, you may spot unique plants growing on its slopes.


Despite its position on the equator, Mount Kenya gets very cold at night and it often rains or even snows at higher altitudes. means you have to carry proper equipment, which nay slow you

Abortion Referendum Waterford joined nineteen other constituencies in opposing the

recent Abortion Referendum with the majority 50.84% NO vote almost mirroring the overall national majority on the contentious


The referendum, which if it had been passed, would have seen the rolling back of the X case judgment, saw a turnout of 44.41% in Waterford - almost 2% over the national average. Out of a total electorate of 72,772 there was a valid poll of

32,159 with the total number of invalid papers in Waterford coming to 158. The No vote had a majority of four hundred and thirteen with the result breaking down as NO - 16,286, YES - 15,873 in the Waterford Constituency.

The referendum nationally produced a rural-urban divide, with all the city constituencies opposing the amendment. Along with Waterford; all the Dublin wards voted No along with Limerick East, Cork's two city wards, Galway East, Kildare North and South and Wicklow.

In Munster the overall majority of 8.51% voted Yes while there was a total turnout of 42%; down almost 28% from the previous referendum on the issue in 1992.

Nationally almost six out ten eligible voters didn't vote with the amendment defeated by 50.42% to 49.48%.



decision not to award Government Departments to regions until after the election as another example of "Charlie Mc-Creevy biting off more than he "Fianna Fail had promised

that the remainder of the Land Registry would come to Waterford city", Deputy O'Shea said, "and part of the OPW would go to Dungarvan". However, their decision not to do so, he said, "is a clear example of the Fianna Fail/PD Government failing the Waterford Constituency".

The Tramore based TD went on to call for extra support for unemployment hit towns in Waterford. In particular, he said, Youghal Carpets decision to close recently would once again hit Tallow and the West Waterford area in general, which have already suffered seriously in terms of employment.

He also warned against "the threat that exists to democracy by various actions of groups in our society" and claimed these groups have attempted to "ab-

rogate unto themselves the democratic state".

The Labour TD said Irish society had become accustomed to punishment beatings carried out by paramilitaries and "this barbaric parallel system of justice no longer shocks us".

He went on to say vigilantism and the alleged passing on of bomb-making expertise in a country with ties to international drug smuggling could even-tually "lead on to the setting up of a fascist regime".

"Because, at the end of the day, if the principle of might is right takes hold then the principle of all political power coming out of the ballot box is endangered", he claimed.

Eve's Tempting **Apple** Pudding

Preparation: 10 min Cooking: 40-45 min

THIS old fashioned and traditional desert is very simple to make.

Although this recipe is based on apples you can use different types of fruit to make it different each time

Whatever fruit you use, it will certainly make a delightful treat.

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 4)

450g cooking apples, peeled, cored and sliced 100g soft brown sugar Grated rind and juice of one lemon 50g butter 100g self-raising flour 1 egg, size 2 Butter for greasing dish

Preheat the oven to around 200C. Grease a large, shallow oven proof dish.

Mix the sliced apples with approximately half of the brown sugar and arrange over the bottom of the dish.

Place the remaining sugar, together with the lemon rind. lemon juice, butter, egg and flour in a bowl or blender and mix until smooth.

Spoon the mixture over the apples and smooth over.

Place in the preheated oven and bake for 40-45 minutes, until the sponge appears golden brown on top.

Serve the pudding immediately with lashings of custard, cream or ice cream depending on the weather.

Chocolate

Chocolate gingers Preparation: Chilling: 30 minutes

THIS rich desert can be prepared the day before, you will need ramekins or glass dishes with a serving capacity of 150ml.

INGREDIENTS (serves 4)

125g continental dark chocolate 400ml single cream To decorate 4 pieces stem ginger

thick double cream

Method:

Add 2.5-5 cm of water to a saucepan and place it over a medium heat.

Break the chocolate into pieces and place in a glass bowl which fits snugly on top of the saucepan.

Simmer the water in the saucepan but do not let it

boil up into the bowl. Leave the chocolate to melt.

Put the single cream in a small saucepan and bring it to the boil. Simmer for one minute, then use a sieve to strain it into a jug

When the chocolate melts turn off the heat under the saucepan and gradually stir the boiled cream into the chocolate until you have a thick, smooth chocolate sauce.

Chop the stem ginger finely, and add to the chocolate, stirring until the ginger is evenly distributed throughout the mixture.

Ladle the chocolate mixture into small dishes and place them in the refrigerator to set (this will take as little as 30 minutes).

Finely chop the piece of stem ginger for decoration. Place a dollop of cream on top of each pot and sprinkle with the chopped



Bord Pleanala "Appear To Be Living In Ivory Towers"

An Bord Pleanala appear to be living in Ivory Towers according to Cllr. Pat Daly who was speaking at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council

Cllr. Daly was among a trio of Fianna Fail Councillors who strongly criticised the planning board after its decision to overturn planning permission, originally granted by Waterford County Council, for an 18-house development in Ring recently.

While the County Development Plan originally allowed for the construction of eight houses per acre, this was eventually brought down to three houses per acre in a redrafted area action plan.

Cllr. Pat Daly said Waterford County Council had together an area for Ring.

But, he said, "Bord Pleanala at the moment appear to be living in Ivory Towers and are not going along with what our County Development Plan says."

"The planning office of Waterford County Council, as far as I'm concerned, do an excellent job", Cllr. Daly said. "They don't always get their own way, but they are very fair in the overall decisions they make."

However, the Fianna Fail Councillor said that despite discussing the plans in detail over a number of months it appears "our County Development Plan should be put in

the bin and we should get An Bord Pleanala to draw it up, because they seem to know everything about it".



His colleague, Cllr. James meetings over a number of Tobin, who described the months in an attempt to put board as a "faceless body" and called for Pleanala representative to be requested to attend a meeting of Waterford County Council, supported this assessment. "I think this faceless body should be requested to send somebody to sit up here so we can have a look at them", Cllr. Tobin said. "I've a project in Tallow at the moment, as you all know, and there's an appeal to An Bord Pleanala."

But, Cllr. Tobin questioned whether the hearing would be held as "by the time they'll hear it the developer will be well and truly gone."

Cllr. Tom Cronin made up the trio of Fianna Fail Councillors who were angered by

Cllr. Cronin said councillors and planning staff had put a lot of effort into the area action plan.

However, the Ardmore based representative said that this time had been wasted, despite having reduced the zoning.

He said he visited Ring-Old Parish 25-30 times in connection with the development plan and added that it was his opinion "that An Bord Pleanala should go away and draft the next plan themselves".

However, caution was urged at the levels of criticism, by Labour Cllr. Billy Kyne. Cllr. Kyne said Bord Pleanala has a difficult brief, which they must deal with, on limited resources and staff levels.

"I don't think we should consider bringing them down here on a witch-hunt", he said. "They are a reasonably



the planning board's recent the state and I really think they are a check and a balance in the planning system that we should support"

He went on to say that councillors shouldn't open up public dialogue with ridicule or paint them as the problem in a complicated planning process.

Gaeltacht Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair said that the Councillors who were critical of the recent decision in Ring may not have been in the past when the board held up the Council's judgements.

While accepting that there were justifiable criticisms of the Board, Cllr. O Ceilleachair questioned the levels of Government funding given to the planning appeals board.

Bord Pleanala quite rightly pointed out that the type of development planned, would cause problems for the infrastructure, the rural environment and cultural aspects in the Ring area", the councillor

However, he added, that the judgement does not impinge on small-scale development in the area, of which, he said he was in favour.

Director of Services. Denis MacCarthy said while the Board may make judgement's that are not to the council's liking they are an independent body who must adjudicate when people disagree with a decision of the planning authority.

However, he said that he is "entirely satisfied that the decisions we made are consistent with the County Development Plan and the Area Action Plan adopted by this council".

INTRODUCTION:

On the 3rd Sunday of Lent it is fitting that we remind ourselves of the invitation which Lent issues, the invitation from God which calls us "come back to me." It is an invitation to put God first in our lives. We all know the Ten Commandments. The first has always been "You shall have no other besides me." But just as our ancestors stumbled into false worship, so too do we.

Material wealth, power, academic achievement, success, fame, are among the many idols. But they are idols which do not satisfy. Today's world is strewn with hungry hearts and thirsty souls. The human condition is one of searching. Always, we are in pursuit of more and more — more to eat, more to drink, more to wear, more to play with, more to entertain us, more holidays.

Jesus warns us not to get caught up in all of that. "Take care," he says, "be on your guard against all kinds of greed; one's life is not about abundance of possessions." What Jesus says is true. True riches are not in the material things of this world but in our spiritual communion with God. As St. Augustine put it, "our hearts are restless until they rest in Thee." Like St. Augustine, we can experience total commitment, fulfilment, deep inner peace, if we accept God's invitation. "Come Back To Me."

REFLECTION

To live deeply, to live a new life means letting go of our grasp on the world. Riches, success, all that the world has to offer cannot measure up to the fulness we find in God. Nothing can fill the emptiness of the absence in our lives, neither abundant material wealth, nor power and success. They may prove attractive for a time but ultimately they leave a void in the heart and soul. In today's gospel Jesus met the woman at the well. She was thirsty for things beyond the water which the well contained. Lovingly, Jesus offered her a drink which would ensure that she would never be thirsty again. He offers us the same drink. "Those who drink of the water that I give them, will never be thirsty," he says.

Our thirst is quenched when we accept Jesus's offer, when, instead of rushing and racing about doing one job after another and acquiring possession upon possession, we stop and pause and make quiet time. We need more quiet time like this where we can be at one with Jesus, talk to Him, listen to Him, get to know Him better, essentially time when we come home to Him with all our

earts.

One Stop-Shop Social Services Earmarked for Convent Site

A Homeless Action Plan, which proposes a one-stop shop of social services on the former Presentation Convent site in Dungarvan, was unanimously supported by members of Waterford County Council at last Monday's meeting.

The Action Plan, which was drawn up by the Homeless Forum, will provide accommodation for the full range of homeless categories, according to the re-

This will consist of a central complex made up of 5 family units and 5 single units for short to medium stay as well as 6 family and 6 single transitional short

stay rooms. A one-stop shop of social services will be provided in the central Dungarvan complex, which will include care support and training services for the homeless, in addition to facilities for childcare and other social and voluntary organisations.

The Homeless Forum, which is made up of a large number of agencies, including the SEHB, St. Vincent de

Paul, church groups and tant as the accommodation training agencies, also recommended that an out of hours emergency contact service is established.

Cllr. John Deasy, who chairs the Housing SP Committee, which endorsed the plan, said that at present there is a difficulty in the county, in the sense that the hostel on the Youghal Road is not operational anymore."

Forty-five people were found to be homeless at the time of the initial study he said, while the report states that 24 of these are under the age of forty, including four under eighteen years of age, while Cllr. Deasy added that there were various causes for their plight.

"There's two aspects in the action plan", he said. "It's not just an accommodation aspect, the treatment aspect has to go with it. We're not just housing people who have become homeless. The idea here is to treat the problems that have led to homelessness.

He said the one stop shop of social services "that we're trying to incorporate into the homeless plan is as imporaspect".

Cllr. Billy Kyne also welcomed the "concept of developing the multi-strand response to the housing prob-

"I would also support the strategy discussed in relation to the potential of the Presentation Convent site, which has strong public support", he said. "I think it's something we have to take on board as a matter of urgency"

Cllr. Kyne said that for a number of years, the council has depended soiely on rented accommodation, which at the same time as costing the state money allows little resources for building local authority houses to alleviate the problem.

Director of Services Peter Carey said that he was very pleased that such a large group of agencies had an input into the homeless action plan and thanked those who contributed to it. The Homeless Action Plan for 2002-2004 was proposed by Cllr. John Deasy and seconded by Cllr. Tom Higgins and was passed unopposed.

Grant Assistance Available For "Relatively Small" CCTV Schemes

Relatively small CCTV schemes, which are not regarded as a national Garda priority, will qualify for grant assistance if they meet certain minimum standards, the Minister for Justice, John O'Donoghue said in reply to a Dail Question by Deputy Austin Deasy.

Ardmore Fire Station **Proceeds To** Tender Stage

A proposed new purposebuilt Fire Station for Ardmore was given the green light to proceed to tender stage by the Minister for the Environment, Noel Dempsey on Friday last.

The new station is proposed to be built on a half-acre of a green field site on the Youghal Road. The new station is also likely to greatly improve facilities for fire personnel, in what is planned to be a two bay station.

Co. Mayor, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said it was a necessary step and a great addition to the county's fire service. He also said that he hoped the new station in Ardmore was just part of what's to come for the service around the county.

Cllr. Wilkinson went on to pay credit to Ardmore representative Cllr. Tom Cronin who has pushed for a new Station and secured a guarantee from Minister Dempsey

Minister Dempsey has also sanctioned funding to allow Waterford County Council to invite tenders for a new fire appliance.

The approval comes under the Fire Services Capital Programme and has been warmwelcomed by Minister of State Martin Cullen.

This Week in the Garden

PLANT GLADIOLI

Now is the first possible time of the year to plant gladioli, but do not plant all the corms at once. It is much better to spread the planting over a period of four to six weeks. Cover the corms with about eight centimetres of soil.

The smaller varieties can be planted eight centimetres apart but the bigger plants need at least a 15cm gap.

START CANNAS AND DAHLIAS

Cannas and dahlias can be started into growth in slightly heated greenhouses, in frames with soil warming or in well-built sheltered frames. Beware of frames which let in a draft or the water.

The roots can be planted side by side with just enough soil to cover them. Canna roots can be planted singularly in 15cm pots in potting compost or a peat based mix.

TAKE DAHLIA CUTTINGS

Pre-prepared dahlias which were potted in February and are now in the greenhouse can be used for cuttings. Sever the firm young shoots when they are about five centimetres long - these in turn will produce around three more shoots which can also be used for cut-

Trim the base just below a joint and remove any leaves (if there are any). Insert one cutting about two centimetres deep in a 6.5cm pot full of sandy soil. They need to be rooted in a propagating case at between 16°C and 21°C. Water freely. Cuttings could be treated with a root forming hormone before insertion into the sandy soil.

SOW CARROTS AND LEEKS OUTDOORS

If the soil is workable, a sowing of carrots can be made. It is essential to find a well-sheltered place. Sow thinly in rows 23cm apart and cover with half a centimetre of soil.

The best leeks are raised under glass, but it is possible for them to be planted outdoors. Sow in rows 30cm apart and cover with half a centimetre of soil.

I have just finished reading a highly amusing book written by the ex-Middlesex and Durham player, Simon Hughes. The book 'A lot of hard Yacca' describes the life of the average cricketer on the arduous county cricket circuit, along with his own experiences through the years. As I said, it is highly amusing and would recommend it to anyone.

From his early days with Middlesex to the final days with Durham, every page tells a story. He tells of the formidable tea lady at Lords (I am sure she was from Cork), she was 'as Billy Bremner - 5ft 4 ins of barbed wire'

He goes on about John Emburey (Middlesex) and Graham Gooch (Essex), best of mates since school days. They shared many characteristics - a working class discipline, a phlegmatic temperament, a slightly thin speech habitually laced with expletives'. 'Emburey was referred by Gooch as 'Emie' or 'Knuckle', Gooch as 'Gray' or 'Zap'. Because of their unique friendship and unintelligible language, Ian Botham called them Mork and Mindy'

He recalls a trip to the Australian outback while on an England tour. About one ground. 'Where the sun bakes the skin to the texture of crocodile hide, and vipers are hiding in the grass'. Of another 'The club plays on red ant dirt in the middle of greyhound track. The temperatures 40c with irritating flies and drinks are served by a rusty tap'.

He also discloses some of the players nicknames, some are obvious like Allan "Legga" Lamb, or John 'Creepy' Crawley and, 'Paddles' Hadlee - he has flat feet.

I met a Hampshire player two years ago at the Mardyke, Kenyan, Rajesh Maru, better known as the 'Rat'. I often wondered how the poor fellow got such a nickname. Hughes provided the answer, back in the days when Maru played for Middlesex, he had this knack of collecting vital information on the opposition.

And so it goes on page after page of hilarious stories of his and other players experiences. Good times, bad times, language used, in fact everything.

Federation paid tribute to Mossie Curran, and extended votes of sympathy to the families of both deceased.

Joan Power, who was married with three children, was also a highly thought of and much respected member of the community in Kinsalebeg and the surrounding areas. She was a keen supporter of local musical groups and worked in Dungarvan and had previously been employed by Mossie Curran at the Decies Bar in Clashmore.

Declan Power is due to appear again today (Wednesday) at Dungarvan district Court and it is expected that the State will seek a further remand in custody of the accused.

ICMSA NOT OPPOSED TO ENTRALISED PAINENT

ICMSA has responded with dismay at the decision of West Cork Vets to refuse to operate the Dairy Herd Cert or the new National Beef Assurance Scheme Cert.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of the ICMSA said: "I hope that Veterinary Ireland at national level will not follow the actions of vets in West Cork which could potentially throw the whole agricultural and food sector into chaos. ICMSA and Veterinary Ireland has constructively approached problems in the past and their joint efforts have demonstrated the benefits of co-operation rather than confrontation".

Mr. O'Rourke pointed out today that a joint Veterinary Ireland/ICMSA Protocol on the Dairy Herd Cert is in operation and was a critical factor in ensuring the full certification of all dairy herds in Ireland.

The Minister for Agriculture, Food & Rural Development cannot isolate himself from the emerging problem. Mr. O'Rourke emphasised that he secured a commitment in the PPF that there would be no extra costs on farmers and the Taoiseach assured him that this would be taken account of in the legislation on the National Beef Assurance Scheme.

ICMSA's position is quite clear - the operation of the new Beef Assurance Scheme must not impose any additional cost on farmers. Against this background and with a view to getting the National Beef Assurance Scheme fully operational, ICMSA are not opposed to centralised payment to vets provided that this does not lead directly or indirectly to extra costs or charges on farmers. However, the Dairy Herd Cert and the National Beef Assurance Scheme are two separate issues even though they will be carried out on the same day as the herd test.

CALF HEALTH

Spring is a busy enough time on farms without the added complication of a breakdown in herd health. The financial aspect of a scour outbreak in calves is serious without adding to the labour demand.

Infective agents such as Rotavirus, Coronavirus, Crytosporidia, Salmonella and E Coli are generally to blame. E Coli is most prevalent in the first five days after birth of the calf. The remainder occur generally from day 3-5 upwards. with the main challenge in the first 3-4 weeks of the calves life. So how do you minimise the risk?

Look at: 1) Maximising the calf's immunity; 2) Reducing the calf's exposure to infection

MAXIMISING IMMUNITY

 Boosting calf immunity really begins with having the cow well fed and on pre calver minerals before calving. Where there has been an outbreak of scour on a farm previously cows may be vaccinated to help boost immunity of the calf.

 Adequate Colostrum / Biestings to the newborn calf can not be over emphasised! A 40kg calf should get 4 litres of colostrum in two feeds in the first 6 hours otherwise its immunity will be reduced. Calves that have a prolonged or difficult calving will be slow to rise and need particular at-

Having colostrum stored is particularly important.

• Where there is a problem, vaccinating the later calving cows may be an option, which should be discussed with

REDUCING EXPOSURE

 Keep calving and creep areas clean and well bedded. A spring born calf will require 1m2 and an Autumn born calf 1.8m2 of creep area.

Have sheds well ventilated but draught free.

 Open herds where replacements and calves are bought in are at greater risk. Some farmers through bitter experience have decided not to buy in calves to put on cows that have lost a calf because of the disease risk. Keep bought in animals isolated from your own stock.

• If there is an outbreak you may have to change the calving area to an alternative calving area. Or look to move cows and calves outside if conditions are suitable as quickly as possible after calving.

 Group calves of similar ages together (3-4 weeks). Avoid mixing young calves with older calves.

• Control of scour is often done through use of electrolytes to stop the animals becoming dehydrated. Remember not to withdraw milk from the calf for prolonged periods because it is the main energy source for the calf. Electrolytes are predominantly mineral/salt based.

LAMBING - SCARCE LABOUR

Lambing is a stressful time and where 24 hour supervision is not practicable consider the following options

• Leave twin ewes outdoors to lamb. Works best where grass supply is adequate and weather is good. Singles and triplets have more room indoors and these are the ewes likely to give more lambing problems.

Increase the number of lambing divisions overnight to

prevent mis-mothering.

 Triplets - Allow strong ewes to rear their three lambs. Keep separate indoors and at grass. Feed meal to ewes for 4-5 weeks after lambing and offer creep to lambs from one week of age

THE NEWBORN LAMB

Newborn lambs have very little reserves of body fat. Without an early feed the lamb will slip into a negative energy balance leading to hypothermia. Colostrum is extremely high in energy and an early feed of it is vital. It is over 40% dry matter.

Colostrum also supplies antibodies to the lamb. At birth the lamb has no protection against the diseases it meets in the lambing environment. The ewe, particularly if she is vaccinated against specific diseases, will have produced many antibodies, which are present in the colostrum. When the lamb suckles it will immediately gain the merits of these antibodies in fighting of diseases.

HOW MUCH? As a guide, a lamb born indoors needs 210 ml of colostrum per kilogram live weight in the first 24 hours of

Table 1. Colostrum Requirement for the first day of life:

Lamb Birth Weight	Colostrum in First Day
4kg	850 mls (1.5 pints)
5.5kg	1100 mls (1.9 pints)

A typical twin lamb, 4.5kg at birth, will require 950 mls (1.6 pints) in the first 24 hours. If the lamb is not suckling it should be fed in 4-5 feeds over the day. Lambs born outdoors need more colostrum than lambs born indoors.

FARMING LEADER

IFA TO ADDRESS ISSUE OF 'INVISIBLE WOMEN' IN IRISH **AGRICULTURE**

Speaking to mark International Women's Day (Friday 8th). IFA's new equality officer, Mary Carroll, said IFA was now embarking on a new programme to recognise the role of women in agriculture, which up to now has often been seen as invisible.

She said: "One striking feature of farming as an occupation is that there are few women who farm in their own right. Because of the traditional inter-generational transfers of farms through the male line, women rarely inherit land, and as definitions of farm work focus on the work of the owner, the work of women on farms goes unnamed and unrecognised"

She said: "IFA through its new equality programme is setting out to recognise the huge role of women in Irish agriculture, where most of the farms are family owned and operated."

Women work on farms:

- Almost 40,000 women contributing an 1,800 hour working year to the farm enterprise according to the 1991 Census of Agriculture

- They carry out the bulk of management and administrative tasks associated with farming

- They are at the forefront of new farming related business opportunities

They are very involved in

livestock care - They are the main carers and

household managers Counting this work, valuing it and supporting it is vital.

Recent Teagasc statistics show that many women now have to seek work outside the household to supplement falling farm incomes. This role in itself has enabled many farm families to maintain their enterprises. However, it may also be a reflection of the lack of recognition and status for women as workers on the farm.

Mary Carroll said that one of the most pressing problems facing farm women is that the work carried out by a farm spouse is not covered for social insurance purposes as a self-employed person, or as an employee. Many women after spending a life working on farms have no record of any employment and are not entitled to a contributory old age pension. IFA formally raised this issue with Government at a PPF meeting in Octo-2000, and inter-departmental group is currently exploring the issue. IFA will be keeping the issue of PRSI for farm spouses on the table.

She said the fact that women are very under-represented in farming organisations and in the politics of farming, can make it more difficult to get such issues to the forefront. A key aim of the IFA Programme, which is cofunded by the Equality for Women Measure in the NDP, is to bring the resources of women into all levels of the organisa-

75% OF **PROPERTY** OWNERS **AFFECTED** BY CPO'S LOOK TO IFA FOR HELP

Following the launch of IFA's CPO Support Service, Harvey Jones Infrastructural Developments Executive said after analysing the number of property owners affected by compulsory acquisition of land for roads some 75 % of them have looked to the IFA for

support.
Mr Jones said: "The whole compulsory purchase order process can be very daunting for property owners, especially, if it is their first encounter with a CPO. Generally there is a shortage of information and up until now there was no support service in place"

IFA recently held a national meeting with representation from IFA's twelve regional offices to officially launch the IFA / CPO support service.

Speaking at the launch Mr Jones said: "IFA's new CPO Support Service will give property owners the opportunity to engage a professional in the field of compulsory acquisitions of lands and property, who will be able to advise on accommodation works and will be supported by regular local meetings and clinics, guiding property owners through the many complex and practical issues that they will encounter"

He added: "This is a unique service and shows IFA's commitment to farmers and country dwellers"

The IFA negotiated the acquisition of lands for roads with the DoE and reached agreement in December 2001, which ensures fair compensation and puts in place fair procedures. The Association has kept the agreement under close review and will continue to monitor its implementation on the ground.

South East ICMSA News

MINISTER MUST OPPOSE ADDITIONAL THIRD COUNTRY BEEF IMPORTS

Mr. John O'Leary, Chairperson of ICMSA's Beef & Cattle Committee said that the Minister for Agriculture, Food & Rural Development must strongly resist any proposal to allow any additional imports in to the EU. Farmers cannot afford any additional imports at this time.

Mr. O'Leary said: "It is absolutely ridiculous that the EU Commission is proposing to allow increased Argentinian beef imports into the EU when beef prices are still so depressed"

"Ireland's traditional main market, Egypt, still has not taken beef but yet the EU sees fit to allow more imports in to under-

Mr. O'Leary concluded: "There could be no justification why prices paid to British farmers were 37 cent per kg. (13.2p per lb.) higher than Irish beef producer prices. Furthermore, prices in Northern Ireland are 28 cent per kg. (10 Ir. pence per lb.) higher than prices in the Republic. How can these price gaps be

justified given that the same markets are being supplied. MINISTER AND VETS MUST FINALISE NATIONAL **BEEF ASSURANCE SCHEME**

ICMSA has sought full assurances from Minister Walsh that he has made full arrangements to ensure that the Dairy Herd and the National Beef Assurance Certs will be signed on the day of the annual TB test.

This was stated by Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA addressing a farmer meeting in Donegal recently.

"If the Minister cannot ensure that the two Certs are signed by the vet on the day of the annual herd test as required by the Minister, then the Minister will have to suspend the annual round herd test until he has completed the arrangements with the vets to ensure that farmers can obtain the two Certs on the day of the annual herd test", continued Mr. O'Rourke.

" I am very concerned that efforts are being made to unravel the arrangements for the Dairy Herd Cert. There is absolutely no justification for any change in the established arrangements for the carrying out of the Dairy Herd Cert", stated Mr. O'Rourke.

"With regard to the National Beef Assurance Scheme, I repeat the ICMSA policy that this Scheme must be carried out without any increased cost to farmers. If arrangements between the Minister and the vets are such that full agreement

has not been reached for the commencement of the National Beef Assurance Scheme, then the failure to commence the National Beef Assurance Scheme will rest on both the Minister and Veterinary Ireland", stated Mr. O'Rourke.

"The Minister must not underestimate the very strong resistance among farmers to pay additional costs and charges to comply with new rules at a time when their income particularly in the beef sector is declining rapidly", concluded Mr. O'Rourke.

LOCAL HISTORY

1867) was one of the best loved priests in the Augustinian Friary in Abbeyside at the time. Fr. Toomy spent almost 40 years of his priestly life in Abbeyside and Dungarvan.

He came here shortly after the opening of the new church and set to work to reduce the debt. He was appointed prior for the first time in 1835 and soon became well known as a zealous priest and devoted confessor.

He was a great source of comfort to the people of the area in the dark days of the Famine, when so many fell victim to the dread scourge of cholera.

A strong local tradition says that while the victims of the cholera were being brought out

Fr. Patrick Toomy (1799 - unconfined from the old workhouse, he stood for hours every day at the gateway (now bricked up), blessed each corpse with water from the "Holy Well" and recited the prayers for the dead.

The victims were then laid on common carts and conveyed to 'Reilig a' tSle' where they were buried in a mass grave. (Reilig a' tSle' is on the Main Dungarvan/Youghal Road on the left hand side before you come to the Seanachai).

The Famine made an indeliable impression on Fr. Toomey and for the remainder of his life he gave his heart and soul to ministering to the poor and needy. He encouraged people to go to the holy well for curative purposes and indeed the waters of the well gave relief from many infirmities to those who made a pilgrimage of faith

The then Abbot of Melleray Dom Fitzpatrick, said of Fr. Toomy - "He was an ornament to the Church and a very learned man" or half-grey coat wearing an ordinary collar and tie, "from which fact" says Fr. Williams " I inferred that the fear of the priest - hunter was still in his heart. After his death in 1867 a monument was raised over his grave.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

We are fostering a child with a disability and are considering having our car adapted. Will we be eligible for the Disabled Drivers and Disabled Passengers Tax Relief

ANSWER

Providing the child meets the medical criteria and you are fostering him/her on a long-term basis you should be eligible for the tax relief.

People with a physical disability who have a Primary Medical Certificate from their health board and who use a specially adapted motor vehicle, either as a driver or as a passenger, are entitled to claim exemption from paying Vehicle Registration Tax (VRT) and Value Added Tax (VAT) on their vehicles up to a maximum of 9,525 euros if they are claiming as a driver and 15,875 if they are claiming as a passenger. They may also get a repayment of the duty on petrol or diesel they have used up to a maximum of 600 gallons a year.

A family member who is responsible for the transport of a disabled passenger is also entitled to claim the relief providing the person is living with him/her. Where the passenger is a child who is in residential care or medical care on a part-time or occasional basis but who spends a significant part of his time at home, such as every weekend and holidays, the family member may still be eligible for the relief.

Vehicles for which relief on VRT and VAT have been granted can not be disposed of for at least two years. Therefore to avail of the relief the foster placement with you must be long-term. You will require a letter from the health board stating that the placement is long-term. Providing you can verify the nature of the foster placement and a Primary Medical Certificate can be obtained for the child you should be able to claim the relief.

This is a very interesting play which deals in a light way with an interesting subject. There are plenty of comic moments and the production holds appeal for all.



BUYING A CAR

Already there are quite a few 2002 cars on the road, leaving many good second hand cars on the garage forecourt. Prices on used cars come down at this time of year so this may be a very good time to look around if you are considering changing your car. The following points may help

Do considerable research - don't rush out and buy the first car that appeals to you. Compare and contrast prices from various garages and through local newspapers.

Always buy from a reputable dealer who may offer a warranty between three months and one year.

If you are unsure any aspect of a car ask a friend who has an interest in cars to accompany you. If you are still unsure get a mechanic to give the car a once over.

Take the car for a test drive to make sure that it handles well on the road.

When assessing your budget, take into account tax and insurance, which will add considerably to you expendi-

If you are taking out a finance deal with a garage or bank, read all the small print. Do not waive your 10 day cooling off period which enables you to change your mind within that time frame. Some people sign away their right to speed up their credit approval, but beware you may live to regret it! Make sure that the agreement shows the APR, the number of monthly repayments, additional charges and any balloon payment at the end. If any of these are absent the agreement may be invalid.

In a finance be aware what type of agreement it is - is it a hire-purchase deal, or lease? Remember ownership never passes to you in a lease agreement and in hire purchase ownership passes to you on the last payment of your finance agreement.


MIKE BYRNE

Mike Byrne was a member of Dungarvan Urban District also on the Board of Council between 1908 and 1918. He was Guardians at the Work house between 1913 and 1917. The workhouses eventually became County homes. Byrne set about improving the conditions suffered by the inmates. Breakfast consisted of porridge or "stirabout", and dry bread was generally the main meal of the day. Meat was served only on very rare occasions. The inmates had the "pauper" branded on the backs of their garments. Byrne successfully campaigned to have this brand removed. This step was followed local authorities all over the country. He also introduced an ounce of tobacco for the men every week and an ounce of snuff for the women. This initiative was also commended throughout the country. A memorial plaque was erected on the front of the Town Hall, St. Augustine Street. It reads: "Councillor Michael Byrne, R.I.P. Member of Dungarvan Urban District Council 1908-1918 and Board of Guardians 1913-1917. In grateful remembrance of his untiring and successful efforts to secure concessions and comforts for the inmates of the institutions under the control of the Board. He spent his public life fighting for the interests of his fellow workers. Ar Dheis Dé go raibh a Anam. Erected by the Dungarvan Council of Trade Unions.'

Tax Back Available n Refuse Collections

Cllr. John Campion asked that Waterford County Council inform the public that they can get tax back from the charges on refuse collections.

Cllr. Heneghan said of special importance is that Waterford County Councillors who are also members of the Health Board are invited. At present Town Clerk Eric Flynn said two County Councillors, including Dungarvan's Dr. Tom Higgins are members of the board.

"We are one of the few Town Council's looking for a Day Care Centre", he said, "and we have to keep the issue at the top of the South Eastern Health Board's agenda."

Lismore Town Council Backs Radio Therapy Unit

Cllr. Bernard Leddy said he wanted it on the record that Lismore Town Council is supporting the call from Waterford City Council for a radiotherapy Unit to be located in Waterford Regional Hospital.

The Labour Councillor said Lismore Town Council wants to show its support for a unit in the South East. The decision follows similar moves by Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Town Council in recent weeks.

Town Clerk Eric Flynn said that books of support for the radiotherapy unit are located in both Dungarvan's Civic Office's and Lismore's new area offices in the former Christian Brothers monastery.

First Mayor Of Lismore

Cllr. Davy Whelan gained another notch on a list of distinctions by becoming the first Mayor of Lismore. Cllr. Whelan was the last Chairman of Lismore Town Commissioners, the first and the last Chairman of the newly named Town Council and now has become the first Mayor of Lismore after the council unanimously opted to choose the title.

Provisions in the Local Government Act allowed for the changes to the titles of both the council and chairman and having been proposed by Cllr. Peter Ahern, the role of Mayor was selected unopposed, having been deferred on a close vote last month.

One of the reasons stated for deferring the selection at the previous meeting was the absence of Cllr. Jimmy O'Gorman. However, Cllr. O'Gorman said that when only one member of the council is absent the issue should be voted on.

Cllr. Bernard Leddy congratulated the new Mayor, and added that Cllr. Whelan has played a large role in raising the profile of the town and council.

Deep Resentment At Loss Of Local **Authority Power**

A meeting of the representative body of local authorities across Ireland - AMAI - was reported on by Clir. Mark Khan, who claimed there was widespread anger among councillors who attended, at the provisions in the Local Government Act.

Part of this, Cllr. Khan said, was a feeling of "deep anger and resentment" and a fear that the long term aim of the act is to ultimately "get rid of local authorities".

Cllr. Khan said the Government should attempt to have as close links with people as possible and the weakening of local authorities would see this link also weak-

The Co. Engineer John O'Flynn made a presentation to Lismore Town Council to mark their move into the new of-





Muscular Dystrophy What is Muscular Dystrophy?

Muscular Dystrophy (MD) is a group of genetic disabiliies, which are characterised by a progressive weakness and degeneration of the skeletal or voluntary muscles, which control movement. The main forms of Muscular Dystrophy are as follows:

Myotonic, Duchenne, Becker, Limb-girdle, facioscapulohumeral, congenital, oculopharyngeal, distal and Emery-Dreifuss. One of the most common of these forms of Muscular Dystrophy is Duchenne, which only affects males and is more common in children. And Myotonic Muscular Dystrophy is another common form affecting adults, both males and females. This disability can affect people of all ages.

What causes this disability?

Muscular Dystrophy is a disability, which is caused by a defect in the gene, which makes up the muscles. The defect can be inherited, the person with the disability can pass it on to their child or the child could be a carrier of the gene, but may never be affected by the disability themselves. It is also known to occur where there is no family history. Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy occurs because of a defect in a single significant protein in muscles called dystrophin.

Symptoms and Diagnoses of Muscular Dystrophy

The symptoms of MD vary considerably, depending on which kind of MD the person suffers from. Muscle weakness is the most common symptom, and this also varies according to the kind of Muscular Dystrophy the person has. Diagnosis of the disability can be carried out by genetic testing, this will establish if the person carries the defective gene. There is no specific treatment for any of the forms of MD. Physical therapy to prevent contractures (a condition in which shortened muscles around joints cause abnormal and sometimes painful positioning of the joints), there are also orthopaedic appliances used for support. In the later stages of MD respiratory problems may occur, and chest infections should be treated immediately.

What is the Prognosis?

Because Muscular Dystrophy is a group of genetic conditions, the prognosis varies according to the type of MD and the progression of the disability. Some cases may be mild and over a normal lifespan, while other cases may have severe muscle weakness, functional disability with the loss of ability to walk and move around. Life expectancy may depend on the degree of progression. Research is being carried out to make Muscular Dystrophy better understood and to develop therapies that will hopefully help to prevent and cure the disability in the future. ELECTRICALLY ASSISTED PEDAL CYCLE - 'PEDELEC' - NOT LIABLE FOR MOTOR TAX

The Minister for the Environment and Local Government, Mr. Noel Dempsey, T.D., last week announced the outcome of a review undertaken by his Department on the status of electrically assisted cycles under Road Traffic law. The Minister indicated that for the purposes of Road Traffic law his Department is satisfied that the pedelec is not a mechanically propelled vehicle.

This is because the electric power of a pedelec only assists the pedalling effort and is not a source of propulsion in its own right. On this basis, pedelecs are not subject to the legal requirements relating to compulsory insurance

and road tax.

The Minister said that users of pedelecs are of course expected to ride safely, with consideration for others and he reminded pedelec users of their obligations with regard to brakes, lights and an audible signal on their machines. He also pointed out that it was very much in the rider's interests to wear a cycle helmet when using a pedelec. The Minister also advised any person who had road taxed a pedelec to contact their local motor tax office for a refund.

The Minister's Department is writing to motor tax offices to inform them of the position.

Friday night next sees the premier of "Ali the Movie" in the Ormond Cinema Dungarvan, the proceeds are going to the local boxing club. The movie tells the story of possibly the greatest boxer of all times. "Muhammad Ali" the title role is played by Will Smith and is proving to be a Box Office success all over the country.

Ali was born Cassius Marcellus Clay in Louisville Kentucky in 1942 (his ancestors came from Ennis, Co. Clare), he became a professional boxer after winning a gold medal at light heavy weight in the 1960 Olympic Games. He also became the first heavy weight champion to win the World Title four times. He first became champion in 1964 when he knocked out Sonny Liston. The W.B.A. stripped him of his World Title over a contract dispute, he regained his title again in 1967 by defeating Ernie Terrell, later the same year his title was removed again this time because he was convicted on charges of refusing induction into the U.S. army. After his conviction Ali did not box for three and a half years.

In 1971 he suffered his first defeat in thirty two professional fights to Joe Frazier. Later that same year the Supreme Court reversed Ali's conviction.

Ali won the World title for the third time in 1974 by knocking out George Foreman, in 1978 he lost the title again to Leon Spinks, in what was the greatest upset in boxing history, later the same year he won the World Title for the fourth time defeating Spinks in a Fifteen round decision.

Although in later years Ali has suffered from Parkinson's disease and no longer moves like a "Butterfly" he can still sting like a "Bee". With his marvellous wit and humour Muhammad Ali has become the best known and best loved sportsman of all times. "He is the greatest".

Ray McConnell Represents Ireland In **Australia**

On Monday 8th April the day after the Dungarvan 10k Road Race when our local runners will be recovering from their efforts, Ray McConnell (West Waterford A.C.) will just be starting his own odyssey of discomfort. Not in this green and pleasant land but in the hot cauldron of central Australia where the temperatures can reach 50°C. Ray, together with nine other runners from around the world, has been invited to compete has



been invited to compete in a five day stage race across the Simpson Desert. The race covers 238 miles (averaging 48 miles a day) along a trail that climbs and descends over 1100 sand dunes for which this desert is famous. An aerial photograph of this place looks like natures blueprint for corrugated tin sheets, and true to all of Murphy's Laws the route crosses these ridges at right angles rather than running parallel with them. These dunes are 500 metres apart and range from 10 metres to 40 metres in height. Strong quads and flexible hamstrings, controlled by patience gained from experience, with a touch of stubbornness thrown in are the qualities that are needed in this race. Sylvia, Ray's wife, says he has quantities with excess of the last characteristic!!

Ray was selected to run in last years race across Australia, a gigantic mega-marathon of ninety days, but was unable to compete because of lack of sponsorship from this hemisphere. The Irish Ozzies down-under raised quite a lot of money to bring Ray to Australia, but it wasn't enough to cover the cost of three months away from home. This year they have pre-empted Ray's financial situation and are providing him with a vehicle and support crew, plus covering all his food and accommodation costs. They want Ireland to be represented in their races.

The other countries to contest the battle in the Simpson Desert are Russia, Hungary, Ukraine, Japan, U.S.A., Australia, France, Czech Republic and Italy. Ray needs to test himself occasionally against the Big Boys in the world of uitra Long Distance running and in Australia he will cer tainly be swimming with the Great White Sharks of this

Lack of Public Consultation on 20ft Wheat Stalks Claims Kilmac Councillor

Strong criticism was made, by Cllr. Ger Barron, at the lack of public consultation with the residents of Kilmacthomas on the selection of 20ft sculpture of a 40 stalks of wheat near Mahon Bridge, at last Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council.

The public art scheme, which will see funding to the tune of E58,000 for the sculpture, was selected by a Council picked committee, which included the Co. Arts Officer and the Manager of the Co. Arts Centre.

In all eighteen art pieces were submitted from around the country for the public art project, which is planned to be located on the N-25 realignment at Kilmacthomas.

The committee whittled these down to a short-list of seven art pieces, which went on public display at the Old Market Arts Centre, with Dublin artist Colm Brennan's entry "Golden Harvest" given the final nod.

The art piece contains 40 stalks of wheat made of copper and bronze coloured stainless steel, and will stand 20ft high and is expected to be completed in the next six

However, while Cllr. Barron said he was initially delighted at the idea of a piece of art for the N25 he added that he was "appalled at the method used in the selection process."

Cllr. Barron said that the

piece of art may well turn out to be very popular in the area, but the "selection process employed in this smacks of the worst form of centralised bureaucracy."

"What use is it setting up community forums", Cllr. Barron asked "if we turn around and make decisions behind closed doors with hand-picked committees that have no local involvement committees who are making decisions that affect communities?"

The Labour Councillor. who first raised the issue twelve months ago said he had been promised public consultation at that time. However he said no such involvement was ever made although he repeatedly raised the issue.

"I asked that at the very least the exhibition be moved to Kilmacthomas for a week, so the people of the area would have some say in the final decision".

He went on to say that his was not the only voice raising these concerns, and that a Community Development Group made themselves available to offer ideas and submissions.

However, this offer was never taken up despite having a reputation second to none, Cllr. Barron said.

"Local involvement in the area has been ignored in this case and that sends out the wrong signal. That nothing has changed and decisions are still made by Civil Ser-

However, County Mayor, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said there was public consultation and that "the seven chosen pieces were on display in the Old Market House Arts Centre for quite some time".

He added that a number of comments and submissions had been made on the art pieces and these were taken into account when the final decision was made.

However, Cllr. Barron called into questioned the accessibility of the Old Market Arts Centre, for people from Kilmacthomas.

"Not one person from the area as far as I know, was consulted or was asked for ideas on the art piece", Cllr. Barron said.

Cllr. Tom Cunningham, said that first issue that should be addressed was the problem with signage. He said he had spoken to a number of people in the area about the issue and "they'd rather see proper signage going up than this art thing".

County Manager Donal Connolly replying to the concerns raised by Cllr. Barron said that the difficulty with bringing the display to Kilmacthomas had to do with problems with insurance and security for the seven art pieces.

He also refuted Cllr. Barron's claims that the final piece was selected by Civil Servants and said with art "a committee who have knowledge in that particular area", must be set up.

However, he said in the future, the council will look at the possibility of displaying art pieces in the locality.

A proposal was forwarded by Cllr. Barron to postpone supporting the 20ft Wheat art piece for Kilmacthomas until after public consultation was carried out with the people of the area.

A second proposal supporting the Public Arts Scheme was made by Cllr. John Leahy. With 12 supporting the Arts project and ten voting for deferral, the selection of the 20ft Wheat Stalk sculpture, Golden Harvest was passed.







