



'It seems like a policy of state agencies to deny applications for organisations who have invested already, and give funding to those who haven't spent a penny". Cllr. Heneghan added.

Fianna Fail Cllr. Jimmy O'Gorman said a lot of effort went in from the club in drawing up the applications.

We spent six hours drawing it up. But, when the time came, we were told that we didn't have enough money in the kitty. To my knowledge, some of the clubs who received funding don't even have a site to build on"

Twig Bog Urged As Location for Cappoquin Playground

The trojan-work of Cappoquin Playground Committee must be rewarded and their favoured site for the proposed playground allocated, Cllr. Nora Flynn told this months meeting of Waterford County Council.

The playground committee has fund-raised and campaigned for the playground, she said, adding that the Director of Services, Peter Carey, previously met with the playground committee and a site was more or less agreed on, for Twig Bog.

But, Cllr. Flynn went on to they've achieved" say, the council thought that Barrack Street would be a better site, and the playground looks likely to be sited there.

However, she said a number of problems surround the Barrack Street site, including that people would think that it is part of the estate. Adding that a playground in Twig Bog would enhance the area, Cllr. Flynn urged the council to consider allocating the site to "this hard-working group in appreciation of what

Mayor of Waterford County Council, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson said the playground committee also approached him, but commented that there are concerns over the proximity of the water to the Twig Bog site.

Although complimenting the Playground Committee on their achievements, Peter Carey said that while Twig Bog would be an attractive location, the issue would have to be discussed with the insurers over the proximity to the river.


OURNEY THROUGH AFRICA

The Serengeti Safari

wanza is a busy port. Here people and goods from all over Tanzania travel to other ports on the shores of Lake Victoria. It is also the main settlement of the Wasukuma people -Tanzania's largest tribal group. For our first stop we will visit a museum that celebrates their culture.

Next we venture into the Serengeti National Park, one of the best game viewing parks in the world. Then we head towards the Ngorongoro Crater, which was once a gigantic volcano. Today it is home to wildlife and to the Maasai herders, whose cattle share the rich grasses with the zebras and antelopes.

We visit a village for our last stop and meet the Maasai people. They have been living in this area since long before the first travellers arrived. Sadly, their way of life and special culture are now threatened as Tanzania's population and wildlife conservation efforts take over their



famous Serengeti National Park is at the other end of the great wildebeest migration we saw in the Kenyan Maasai Mara. In fact the two parks join across the border to form one enormous wildlife sanctuary. Apart from the 1.4 million wildebeest, you will also see millions of other herbivores (plant-eaters) such as zebras and giraffes slowly munching through the


If they all run at once they may be trying to flee from one of the carnivores (meat-eaters), such as the lions, leopards an cheetahs, that prey on them. It is quite unusual to see such a chase as people have hunted the big cats for many years and their numbers have sadly dwindled.

MUSEUM

brings us to the Sukuma Museum where we learn how the local Wasakuma tribal group used to

They are still the biggest of over 100 tribal groups in Tanzania today and are well known for their drums made of animal skin stretched over hollowed out timber. The different sized drums produce different sounds.

The museum also puts on a display of traditional music and danc-



ishes with the Sukuma Snake Dance called the bugobogobo. which involves a live python.

MAASAI VILLAGE

The Maasai people have lived for hundreds of years throughout the lands of Kenya and Tanzania. They are herders and move their cattle around the region in search

You may have seen a few of them in the Ngorongoro Crater, as they are still allowed to graze their animals there. In many other places, however, modern life styles are forcing them to settle in villages and abandon their traditional



NGORONGOGO CRATER

Ngorongoro was once a large volcano, but the centre collapsed inwards over two million years ago to form a giant crater over 20 kilometres across. The towering 600 metre walls of the crater enclose over 30,000 animals, from dikdiks (tiny deer) to the mighty elephant. The bottom of the cater is so big you could fit the city of Paris into it!

Co. Mayor Challenged **Over Handling** Of Meetings

Criticism was levelled at the County Mayor for "muzzling some councillors and leaving others talk at length", last months meeting of Waterford County Council heard.

Opening the meeting, Cllr. Wilkinson said that it is his policy to give everyone their say. But, he said, some councillors had been abusing this, and warned that they had to

limit themselves on the length of speeches.

He said he was aware of criicism recently that he was muzzling some councillors and leaving others talk at length.

The issue arose over the length of the March meeting of the council, which failed to address any of the notices of motion put forward by the councillors.

This month's agenda fea-

tured twenty-two notices. which Cllr. James Tobin said are the bread and butter of councillors work and are in response to concerns put forward by their constituents.

Proposing a suspension of standing orders to discuss the lengthy agenda before them, Cllr. Tobin said "you talk of muzzling councillors. If we're all to shut up, we'll just stay at home."

Long-standing Cllr. Ciaran O Riain agreed with this statement saying the vast majority of the notices of motion were in connection with local issues which people want answers to.

The problem, he claimed, was being caused by "irrelevant" presentations at Council meetings, which, he added, were taking up and wasting hours of the council's time.

"We should stay here until six o'clock if need be to get through the full agenda," he

However, Cllr. Wilkinson pointed out that last month was the first occasion the council had failed to get through the entire agenda. Replying to Cllr. O Riain, he added, "I'm willing to stay until 7 or 8 o'clock, if that's what the councillors want".

Later, all of the agenda's 22 notices were got through and Cllr. Billy Kyne wanted it on the record at the end that "the very people who had complained didn't stay until the end of the meeting."

Presentation Of FAS National Crafts Certificates


The Director General of FAS Roddy Molloy presented the Na tional Craft Certificates to 384 craftspeople to mark the success ful completion of their apprenticeship training.

Since 1996 the number of people entering apprenticeship ha increased dramatically from 4,000 in 1996 to 8,555 in the las twelve months. At present there are approximately 25,699 ap prentices receiving training. The Director General paid particular attention to the fact that the Irish Apprenticeship system is now recognised at home and abroad for its quality.

An example of the standards achieved by the apprentices was the success obtained by the Irish Team at the World Skills Competition in Seoul, South Korea in June 2001 where young Irish Apprentices competed with those from all over the world. At the end of the competition the Irish team took fifth overall position.

Speaking at the presentation the Director General said "One of the most important features of apprenticeship is that the attainment of agreed standards is now compulsory and each of you who successfully complete your apprenticeship are awarded the National Craft Certificate. The social partners have agreed that to be recognised as a craftsperson the National Craft Certificate will be a compulsory requirement. This is not the end of your career development but only the beginning. Learning is for life and I would encourage each of you to think about your future skill needs and "plan for the future".

Apprenticeship is a recognised success story with an ever-increasing demand for apprentices in the Irish economy and

Segment the oranges and place on a baking tray. Sprinkle with caster sugar and place under a very hot grill for three to four minutes until caramelised.

To serve, dip the base of each ramekin in hot water and turn out putting onto a plate. Arrange the orange segments around and decorate with mint.



THIS WEEK IN THE **GARDEN**

STOP EARLY-FLOWERING CHRYSANTHEMUMS

From time to time during this month the growing tips of rooted cuttings should be pinched out.

The ideal moment is when the cuttings are well rooted, growing freely and about six-inches high.

This should only be done to those plants being grown specifically to produce a lot of flowers, the objective being to produce a number of sprays or branches on each.

With this in mind, the plants should be stopped again in June. Plants intended for individual flowers, perhaps for display purposes, use a different method and they should not be stopped now.

SOW FRENCH BEANS UNDER GLASS

For a supply of tender young beans in July, sow now in seed

The latter method has the benefit of avoiding any root disturbance later.

Place one seed in each pot, cover with a little soil and put to germinate in a greenhouse or heated frame. The ideal temperature is about 13°C but no harm will be done if it falls a little below this occasionally. Frost will kill the bean, however, so don't be too anxious to harden off until late May.

Place early tomatoes in final pots

Tomatoes from a January sowing should be ready for final potting.

Alternatively, they can be grown in boxes or planted directly into a border of compost prepared on staging or even on the ground if the greenhouse is a light one with low walls or glass to ground level. Choose a suitable compost.

THIN OUT OVERGROWN WATER PLANTS

Pond maintenance can include thinning out some of the more overgrown water plants, but to avoid this problem in future try less-invasive types such as water iris and marsh marigold.







Council Paid Firm Of Archaeologists Over A Million Euros

While raising a Notice of Motion about the lack of a Speech Therapist, Cllr. James Tobin said, after listening to Cllr. Tom Higgins in a radio interview on the subject, he did not hold out much hope.

Raising Loan For €6m Passed

Following a review of the Council's Treasury Management Strategy, the Co. Manager proposed to raise a loan of 6 million euros repayable over 20 years to fund a number of projects.

Over the years, the County Manager Donal Connolly said, the council has funded a number of capital projects and in other cases provided matching funds for state

"We have been liquidating some of these debit bal ances through the transfer of monies from the Revenue account to the Capital Account as our financial position required."

During the current year the Council will extend the Civic Offices, the Tramore Area Office and the Regional Design Office in Tramore and work will be completed on the records centre.

"This strategy will improve the council's liquidity and ensure that we will be in a position to provide matching funds for any state grants that become avail-

able for projects like Coast Protection at the Cunnigar and Ballyvoile and further improvements to Ardmore Pier", he said

The proposal to apply for the loan was proposed by Cllr. Billy Kyne and passed unanimously without any debate taking place.



After the meeting Cllr. Kyne said in proposing the loan he was Cllr. Billy work on the conscious that

Cunnigar "can now hopefully get sanction from the Dept. of the Marine".

"It is vital that this work is done during the summer and autumn as to wait another winter would be dangerous and would undermine the value of the €1m earmarked for this project".

He said by any judgement the Cunnigar now is in its worse state ever and this welcome advance now has to be maximised by getting started this summer in advance of winter storms.


Lighting Problems Spark Debate With ESB

A number of concerns over the ESB's service in the county were expressed to representatives of the Board, Andy Kerwick and Terry Byrne.



Cllr. Nora Flynn said that during Christmas Eve, Cappoquin was left in darkness but despite her repeated calls to the ESB, no one was sent out until St. Stephen's Day. Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair added that while the ESB is still one of the most dependable bodies, the real issue was that the service in some parts of West Waterford needed more investment in the network.

Operations manager with the ESB in Waterford, Terry Byrne, said they are trying to

improve the level of feed-back they receive from the public. Part of this he said may be done through putting up 1850 numbers on one in five ESB poles, which they were hopeful of doing by Autumn.

They are also working on a website where complaints could be lodged and dealt with as quickly as possible, he added.

In regard to Tallow, Mr. Byrne said "I doubt we're not doing our job, if we came out ten times to fix the light," although he admitted they were having a lot of "fun and games in correcting that particular light".

Mr. Kerwick, answering the complaint about Cappoquin's lighting said that they had endeavoured to get it fixed quickly "but can you imagine having to send people out on Christmas Day".

"The Gardai invariably ring when there's a serious problem with a number of lights. And we always respond to them, although we're not contractually obliged to respond to a problem before ten days.

Many of them must be going through nothing less than grief, and in spite of their faith in Christ, their human nature and human feelings can lead to their being very downhearted. Moreover, if a priest has a personal grief - because of the death of a parent of brother or sister or friend or, perhaps, because he has been diagnosed as suffering from some illness, or even because he has the flu, his spirits may be at a very low ebb indeed.

All who follow Jesus Christ and name his name in their prayers belong together and it is only common sense that we all should stand by each other and support one another.

While I am perfectly sure that many, if not all of you, have come to the same way of thinking, may I ask you and call on you to offer all the human support and all the spiritual support in your prayers you possibly can to these brothers of ours in Christ. My words have been about parochial clergy, but I must not overlook the members of teaching, nursing and enclosed orders, men and women. Keep them in mind as well. The occasional handshake, the odd phone call, the pot of tea or coffee shared, the exchange of chat about ordinary things; offer them whenever the opportunity arises.... and, whatever you do, don't omit them from your prayers.

May God the Holy Spirit, the Comforter, The Encourager, give them the grace to 'keep the faith'.

STRADBALLY WATER SUPPLY

In the month of April last year the Stradbally notes dealt with the issue of the poor quality of water coming from taps in Stradbally village, and the many complaints by residents to the County Council and Health Board. While tests carried out by Waterford County Council and the South Eastern Health Board at that time deemed the water to be safe to drink, it was accepted that the colour, smell and gritty content was unsatisfactory.

A statement was issued last April by Conor Foley, Sanitary Department of Waterford County Council, to the effect that the Council were having great difficulty getting the clarification tanks made and the man-power to transport them.

The notes contacted the M.D. of the firm involved at that time, Mr. James Murphy E.P.S., who confirmed (6th April 2001) that as soon as the County Council gave them the go-ahead that they

lation of the tanks, assuring the people of Stradbally that they would then get water of the highest quality.

Since a year has now passed the Notes contacted Mr. Mansfield Waterford County Council for an update (28/03/02). He said that the company E.P.S. had received the formal order from the Council and that as he understood the situation the job was 'substantially completed'.

This week (16/04/02) the Notes sought status on the position again and was told that the relevant engineer John O'Sullivan was out sick. As soon as he was back the current developments could be ascertained.

The Notes have contacted the contracted company E.P.S. to inquire as to the delivery and installation date to improve the water quality in Stradbally and will report back next week.

Drivers May Be Forced To Abandon **Taxi Licenses**

accessible by the end of 2003. However, the law does not cover Hackney cars, it emerged.

Cllr. Dillon said there is a very real concern that making laws too severe on Taxi drivers could see a number of drivers changing back to hackney's next year.

"It seems a bit unequal to me. Some drivers who just bought a car last year will have to spend almost 30,000 on fitting it out again. If hackney's are not covered under the law, obviously, drivers will be tempted to revert back.

Cllr. Billy Kyne was also critical of the law; saying that it's unreasonable to expect all taxi's to begin work on changing over to wheelchair accessible cars next year. Proposing a draft be sent to the Government with changes to the law, he said, it would be more logical to operate a phased change.

"My view, would be that changing all taxi's may be punitive and an unfair burden on existing taxi owners. So, I would propose that we seek an exemption until such a time as the present vehicle is either replaced or certified unsuitable by the NCT Service", he said.

He commented that this would give drivers more leeway, but still encourage a move towards wheelchair accessible use.

"Lets not bring this measure in on top of taxi drivers any quicker than reality allows", Cllr Kyne urged.

However, Mayor of Dungarvan, Cllr. Teresa Wright was concerned that the Town Council would be seen as preventing measures being brought in for the disabled.

Arguing that the draft measures would give an opportunity to avoiding the law, Cllr. Wright said the council must be seen to encourage the changeover.

"We seem to be leaving the draft too open", she said. "We' re leaving it up to taxi drivers to sort out the change in their own time. We should be actively encouraging

Cllr. Wright suggested that the council send the drivers a reminder coming up to the 31st December start date.

"I don't want to be part of a council that's not seen as encouraging a move benefiting wheelchair users. The onus is on Dungarvan Town Council to help bring about and move forward the provision of wheelchair accessible cars."

Asking for the draft to be amended, Cllr. Wright said the council has already done a lot for wheelchair accessibility and believed the draft would be a step backwards.

when Cllr. Billy Kyne put a compromise wording forward, which was accepted by his Labour colleague Cllr. Wright.

The wording, which will be sent along with six other points that the Town Council wants to be taken into consideration will encourage drivers and have a provision in it that changes won't happen until the car is replaced.

However, Cllr. Michael O'Riordan said the draft is unlikely to make much difference to the laws, adding that Minister Noel Dempsey has rarely changed his mind in the past.

County Manager Donal Connolly, said that the Council was asked for its view on the legislation and the points will be taken into consideration. However, he confirmed that wheelchair accessibility has already passed into law for Taxi's.

He added that a range of other points have been put forward, including that the taxi boundaries don't take into account the development of the town outwards, and that the Town Council should have the power to declare fixed price fares for taxi rides to suburban villages or facilities.

Mayor Outlines County's Investment **Needs To** Taoiseach

County Mayor Ollie Wilkinson made a formal presentation of the concerns felt in County Waterford to the Taoiseach Bertie Ahern recently.

Included in the matters brought by Mayor Wilkinson were the following

ROADS AND TRANSPORT

1. The funding of the Waterford City Ring Road including Kilmeaden By-pass and second bridge on the Suir at Waterford. 2. Approval of the CPO on the N25 from Piltown Cross to Youghal. 3. Continued Government Funding for the non-national roads. 4. Continued Government support for Waterford Regional Airport.

WATER SUPPLY AND SEWERAGE

1 Approval to go to tender for Dungarvan and Tramore Waste Water Treatment Plants. 2 Approval for new sewerge treament plants for Ardmore, Tallow, Cappoquin. Kilmacthomas, Stadbally, Ballyduff, Kilmeaden and Dunmore East under a design, build operate scheme and also for Cheekpoint. 3 Water Supply improvement schemes for Ring/Helvick and Deelish/ Ballinacourty. 4 West Waterford Regional Water Scheme.

Dungarvan Energies Ltd - a subsidiary of Rolls Royce Energies have a major proposal of a combined heat and power plant in Dungarvan to convert natural gas to electricity and to bring natural gas to Dungarvan. Detailed negotiations have taken place between the company and Bord Gais your assistance is now required to ensure that Bord Gais agrees on a reasonable contribution from the company towards the cost of the pipeline to Dungarvan and that SEBI agree on a minimum 10-year contract for off-take of the electricity. Natural gas will bring significant benefits to Dungarvan in addition to the electricity proposal. It will improve competitiveness of existing industries, Waterford Crystal in particular, and it will also make the area more attractive for further investment.

COAST PROTECTION

Coast Protection is a major issue for the County and currently we have contract documents with the Dept's of the Marine and Natural Resources for Coastal protection works at the Cunnigar in Dungarvan at a cost of E1m. We also have proposals with the Dept for coastal works at Ballyvoile and Dungarvan. It is essential that these works proceed in the current year.

HARBOUR DEVELOPMENT

Waterford is a maritime county with a long tradition in fishing. The fishing industry has suffered serious decline in recent years. In order to maintain employment in the traditional fishing harbours of Dunmore East and Helvick. major investment is required in the infrastructure of the harbours to ensure they can accommodate the modern fishing fleet. This investment would also facilitate the development of marinas at these locations and a marina is proposed for funding in Dungarvan.

DECENTRALISATION

A very strong case for decentralisation of a Government Department to Dungarvan was presented to the Government. I wish to acknowledge the role that Minister Martin Cullen has played in advancing the case for Dungarvan. I am aware of the issues that have arisen nationally and have resulted in significant delays in implementing your Governments plan for decentralisation. hope that a decision regarding Decentralisation can be reached quickly as decentralisation of a significant number of public servants to the town will have a tremendous influence on the social and economic life of Dungarvan. Mayor of County Waterford, Cllr. Ollie Wilkinson also raised the issue of Dungarvan Theatre, which he hoped would find a mechanism to provide funding for assistance and Radiotherapy adding his support to the call for a unit.

"I read some rubbish that ublic transport was in place for rural areas. That's just nonsense. There is a total lack of services in rural towns and villages. So I don't know how people are going to get to these new offices.

Going on to say that there has never been as many houses built in the countryside or as many people living in rural areas, Cllr Tobin added that it was vital for both urban and rural based councillors to group together, and put pressure on An Post to re-think its strategy.

SEAN KELLY IS ELECTED WITH HUGE MAJORITY

Former Munster Chairman Kelly became the first ever Kerryman to be elected to the highest office in the Association and while the bookies had installed him as an odds-on favourite, the winning margin over the other three candidates was something of a shock.

Apart from the vote on the opening up of Croke Park to other games, this was the event which overshadowed all other congress matters. The first and only vote was: Sean Kelly 195, Seamus Allridge 52, Albert Fallon 44, P.J. McGrath, 23.

On the eve of the election there was a rumour circulating around the Burlington hotel that Sean Kelly's stance on the Rule 21 issue at the special congress last year had won him the support of the nine Ulster counties. That alone would have guaranteed him victory.

In his comparatively short acceptance speech, the Munster man promised to do the best possible job during his term in office and said that while he might consult with the president and Liam Mulvihill, it would be his prerogative to do what he considered best for the Association.

After Congress he thanked Waterford for their solid support and said that he is looking forward to visiting the county shortly.

CROKE PARK ISSUE

The debate was more 'low key' than expected and after the motion had been put by former Munster Council Chairman, Noel Walsh, less than a dozen speakers gave views, mostly against the proposal to allow Central Council authority to give permission for other sports to be played there.

The final vote was 197 against and 103 for the motion. This was a massive turnabout from the result of the vote at last year's Congress. About ten of those who voted in the presidential election abstained. But the vote against is sufficient to allow the issue to come before the Special congress or any other Congress in the future. Had the proposal received less than one third, it could not again be submitted for a prescribed number of years. It did receive 5 votes more than one third and therefore may (but unlikely) be submitted for the special congress on October 26/27th.

Eleven of the 22 motions were approved and among other things will mean that-

In extra time in all drawn matches will be ten, rather than 15 minutes aside, with a five minutes interval.

Extra time will be played in under 21 intercounty championship and other specified competitions including the qualifier rounds' of the hurling and football champi-

The Referee Administrator in each county will in future be a member of the county committee with the right to attend meetings of the regular meeting of that body.

The "backdoor" as it applies for minor hurling championships will now also apply in minor football.

The two-season experiment in the football All-Ireland championships will be extended for a third year in order to come in line with the new intercounty experiment..

Other decisions of a minor nature mostly relating to administration were approved.

The SR Report motion from Mayo was withdrawn and now all the 105 recommendations in the document will go before the special congress on the last weekend in October. This will be a two day event and it is not certain if all the expected motions and amendments will be dealt with






