Burgery Development Set For Late June Start

An end of June target date has been set for work to start on the first phase of a multi-million residential, hotel and retail development in the Burgery, Dungarvan.

The project team behind the development are due to

have a series of meetings about the direction of the project, with an initial priority of constructing a retirement village.

The village which is to be made up of 25 single storey bungalows, 18 apartments, and a sixty-bed nursing

home, is to be tied in with the South Eastern Health Board.

News of the developments go ahead has been universally welcomed, and follows fears that the project had run into difficulties in recent weeks. Concerns had been raised for the future of the

project after it emerged that an appeal was made to An Bord Pleanala.

However, following discussions between members of the development team and the appellant a resolution to the technical detail involved in the appeal was found, and the appeal was subsequently withdrawn last week.

Cllr. Billy Kyne, who has been supportive of the development throughout the planning process confirmed that the project can now proceed.

"I always believed that the objection was to do with procedural detail that required clarification between the various parties involved. In my view it was not an objection in principal against the proj-

new focal attraction

A new focal attraction for the Heritage Town of Lismore, the towns Millennium Park, was officially opened at a ceremony on Tuesday last by Town Mayor, Davy Whelan.

The Park, which is located on Church Avenue on a oneacre site acquired by Waterford County Council on a long-term lease, was described by Mayor Whelan as a little oasis in the heart of the town.

"The Park owes its origin from a proposal first mooted by the Lismore MoChuda Development Group. This proposal was enthusiastically received by our own County Manager Donal Connolly, who made the necessary funding available to enable the project commence", he said.

"This park will add in no inconsiderable way to Lismore as a visitor attraction and to the wonderful work being done by our own Heritage Company", Mayor Whelan went on to say.

Completed at a cost of

£85,000, with £10,000 contributed towards this by the Lismore MoChuda Group, the park was designed by Area Engineer, Noel Healy and Town Clerk, Eric Flynn whose work the Town Mayor praised.





MUSEUM NOTES

Currently on display in Museum is a photographic section, showing various cameras used at different periods. Local photographers such as Tom Tobin, Edward Brenan and Edmond Keohan are featured. There is a section showing a large number of old photos. Also on display is a short history of shipping and ship building in Dungarvan. Memorabilia from some of Dungarvan's older factories and shops can be seen by visitors e.g. Power's Brewery, the Leather Factory, Creameries. Sports items ranging from the late Donal Whelan's hurley to The Four Miles Bicycle Race cup can be seen in the museum collection. There is a short feature on the Famine in Dungarvan. All visitors are welcome. Student groups are also wel-

Maurice Lenin (1811-1895) Maurice Lenihan was born in Waterford on 5 February 1811. He was educated at Saint Patrick's College, Carlow. His first job was as reporter with the Tipperary Free Press in 1831, and in 1833, he became editor of the Waterford Chronicle. Between 1841 and 1843 he was editor of the Limerick Reporter. Lenihan was friends with O'-Connell, Shiel, Father Mathew, amongst other public figures. In 1844 O'Connell encouraged Lenihan to found the Tipperary Vindicator in Nenagh. Their aim was to advocate repeal and disestablishment. Five years later Lenihan bought the Limerick Reporter and amalgamated both papers under the two names. He was now living in Limerick. In 1866 he published his own work, entitled Limerick: Its History and Antiquities. Lenihan was elected Member of Royal Irish Academy in 1869 and also mayor of Limerick between 1883 and 1885. He died in Limerick on Christmas Day 1895.







provided. The area of the Park is relatively small but the planning and the design of the park has been such that there will be something in it for everyone."

Adding that the park's appeal lies in the fact that it is centrally located, but remains a "haven of tranquillity and soli-tude", Mayor Whelan went on to thank the council workforce for their huge input.

"The construction of the park was indeed unique in that it was constructed by the direct labour force of Waterford County Council. I would like to pay tribute to the Council workforce on their imagination, craftsmanship and indeed their ability in completing such a project, while at the same time looking after the other needs of this area", he

The central feature of the new park is a main water feature in the middle of a concourse. The feature is cast metal, has ornate figures on top of three bowls, forming a ripple effect into a main pool. Rings of water gushers are also provided in the pool itself along with underwater light-


One of the most unique fea-

tures of the park is the location of an Ice House in the grounds. Following the lines of the historic structures, which have been discovered locally, the Ice House has decking, and lighting to allow the visitor to see the complexities of the building. Historically, Ice Houses, were built to store salmon caught in the local River Blackwater prior to export, and three have been found in the area.

Other features of the park are; a bridge and waterfall; a Gazebo of Victorian design and a ten foot tall Obelisk surrounded by seating and paving to commemorate the millenni-

Mayor Whelan, who was present along with other dignitaries including County Mayor Ollie Wilkinson and the Very Rev Dean William Beare, concluded the official opening by expressing the wish that the project will serve the town long into the future.

"Today we are opening a wonderful facility for the people of Lismore and surrounding area and it would be my wish that everyone who comes into this park would leave it as they found it and that this park will go on to serve the community for many generations to

He added that it was reasonable that the extra requirement looked for by the appellant was formally resolved and said the only way to do this was by raising a formal objection.

The Labour Councillor, went on to welcome the resolution and said that a development of the size of the one proposed for the Burgery would be a boost to the town after the delays surrounding the development of the Glan-

The €50m development of the twenty-acre site, which would generate 250 jobs, was first proposed last October by Dan Lordan, a former Clonakilty Urban Councillor.

The lynchpin of the project, a 114-bedroom hotel, is due to begin construction before the end of the year and is also understood to have attracted the interest of an, as yet, undisclosed major hotel group.

It is also proposed for the site to be developed in two segments, with 127 low cost

starter homes for the affordable housing market included in the 133 house planning application. The low cost starter homes are all planned to be three bedroom and 900 sq metres in size.

The remaining 6 houses proposed, are single bedroom houses reserved for the elderly or the disabled, and in total, the residential aspect of the development would cover 10 acres of the site.

Also proposed in the planning application is a two storey, 8,000 sq ft neighbourhood commercial centre consisting of a grocery store, eight retail outlets, medical services and a drop in crèche.

JOURNEY THROUGH AFRICA

The Victoria Falls

hen you step off the train at Victoria Falls station you know you have arrived somewhere special. Facing you is the grand Victoria Falls Hotel, built in 1914 for the wealthy colonial settlers. The small town of Victoria Falls has grown almost entirely because of tourism.

The dramatic waterfalls and the exciting adventure sports attract tourists from all over the world. The money spent by the tourists provides an important income for local people.

Victoria Falls, one of the natural wonders of the world, is our first stop. After seeing the Zimbabwe side, you could cross the railway bridge to the Zambian side and see daring tourists doing bunjee jumps 111 metres into the Zambezi Gorge below!

Back on firmer ground we visit the statue of the explorer David Livingstone, and learn how the falls were formed, before heading for adventure ourselves on the frothy white waters of the Zambezi.

The Victoria Falls

Approaching the Victoria Falls you hear the almighty rumble of the cascading water and see plumes of spray dancing in the air, long before you arrive. It is easy to understand why the local people call the falls Mosi-oa-Tunya which means 'the smoke that thunders.' Livingstone gave them the name 'Victoria,' after Queen Victoria.

The falls stretch 1.7 kilometres across the Zambezi gorge and plunge 100 metres to the fierce water below causing a permanent mist with beautiful rainbows. The mist has provided enough moisture for a small forest to grow nearby. This forest of mahogany, ebony and fig trees is home to monkeys and small buck.

The forest and the falls are protected and lie within the boundaries of a national park. Tourists often spend several hours exploring the falls but they also get very wet from the spray! To stay dry you can always take a helicopter, aeroplane or microlight flight over the



THE ZAMBEZI RIVER

The Zambezi river is 2,700 kilometres long and flows from northern Zambia through Namibia Botswana, Zimbabwe and Mozambique before entering the Indian Ocean.

The river is normally wide and slow, but after tumbling over the Victoria Falls into the Zambezi gorge it becomes wild and frothy as it rushes over rocks and bounces off the edges of the gorge

These waters, known as rapids, are good for exciting outdoor sports like white-water rafting. Joining a group that has all the right equipment is the easiest and safest way to experience the rapids, which have been given such names as Big Eddy Muncher, and Stairway to Heaven.



However, with the retire-

van, Deputy Austin Deasy and the untimely death of the popular Workers Party candidate Martin O'Regan, the emergence of an unexpected candidate for the fourth seat is a possibility.

The results of the 1992 and 1997 polls show a strong support for Austin Deasy, with 7,723 first preferences in 1992 and 7,335 in 1997. His son, Cllr. John Deasy, is the expected recipient of the majority of this support but may have battle on his hands to retain Austin's support in the city in the face of vigorous campaigning from party colleague Maurice Cummins.

Fianna Fail Candidate Ollie Wilkinson is hoping to boost his vote over the 4.707 he achieved on his first time out. As County Mayor for the past year, Cllr. Wilkinson has raised his profile significantly and is hopeful of gaining a strong West Waterford support.

Martin Cullen is also expected to poll well after his five-year stint as Minister for State with responsibility for the OPW. The trend between 1992 and 1997 has shown growing support with 4,015 as a PD candidate in 1992 and a first preference of 5353 as a Fianna Fail member in 1997.

Brendan Kenneally's vote from 1992 to 1997 fell from 6,793 down to 5,971 but with the spread of votes going to a wider range of candidates he still polled second highest in the last general election.

Labour Deputy Brian O'Shea, meanwhile, topped the poll as part of the "Spring Tide" in 1992 but his vote fell substantially in the 1997 elections to 5271. However, he will be hopeful of gaining some of the 4139 first preferences cast for the Workers Party's Martin

O'Regan. Fourteen candidates have declared, just one more than 1997, with Sinn Fein's David Cullinane, Micheal Flynn of the PD's, Brendan McCann of the Greens and John Halligan of the Workers Party, Jimmy Kelly (Socialist Workers Party) Eddie Walsh (Independent) Declan Waters (Independent) and Conor Halpin (Independent) among those contesting the election.

Minister Gives Progress Report On Two West **Waterford Schools**

schools are included in a progress report, published recently by the Minister for Education and Science, Dr. Michael Woods, in response to a list of 112 schools deemed by the INTO to be substandard.

The plans for an amalgamated Cappoquin Convent and Boys National School have gone to tender, while the Dept. of Education is assessing an application for improved accommodation at Lismore National School.

"It is not possible to wipe out in the lifetime of one Government the cumulative deficit of generations and also deal with emerging needs for new schools and new facilities at the same time", Minister Woods said.

He went on to say the outgoing Government had grasped the nettle and increased spending on school buildings from €91.7 million in 1997 to €441 m (including

However, the INTO criticised the progress report saying the list is "not worth the paper it is written on to many primary school buildings."

John Carr INTO General Secretary said the majority of schools listed are at initial stages of development and cannot expect their projects to advance in the near future.

"Where are the priorities out of all the schools named on the list?" he asked. "Schools are fed up with being told they are on the work in rooms, which a gen-prises examples of projects list. That no longer carries eral election candidate, this where no progress has been weight. Schools want to know when, if ever, urgent necessary and critical work will be done on their schools.

But, Minister Woods defended the progress report, saying that many schools have received substantial funding to facilitate the building of new schools, to carry out refurbishment work and to purchase temporary

accommodation. "Records indicate that over €28m has been approved in grant-aid, mainly for those schools that have been taken off the list since 1996. In addition, each primary school receives an annual devolved grant which amounted to €3,809 plus €12.70 per pupil at an annual cost of €18m in 2001 and which has increased to €20m this year".

Fews National School in Kilmacthomas, which was highlighted as having substandard conditions at a meeting last week, has been approved grant aid for works to deal with health and safety issues as an interim measure, while the long-term accommodation needs are being as-

However, the INTO's John Carr said the measures taken do not match up to the delays in bringing them about.



A Message from Ollie Wilkinson, Mayor of County Waterford

To the people of Waterford Constituency City & County

On Friday you have the opportunity to make a difference. You can choose to make a change or to let things stay as they are. Waterford according to the press is "a boring contest – no change, same as before". Is that what you want? I do not think so. Why? Because you cannot be happy with issues like:—

- Radiotherapy in Waterford Regional Hospital
 Education University of the South East and
- School extensions
 Infrastructure –Airport, Bridges and By-Pass
- development
- Law & Order on our streets and roads and Drug abuse trebling
- 3rd.World Immigrants

Where do I stand on these issues? Let me state my background and my position.

I am married to Bridget and we are blessed with a family of 10 children. I am not a millionaire - nor wish to be one. No one can tell me anything new about the problems of family and parenthood and living. From the cost of clothes and schoolbooks, of secondary and third level education, the worry for their safety, their health and welfare. The stress of putting together the deposit on a new home - then meeting the mortgage. My children and yours are going through it all. All families want the best for themselves and their loved ones and rightly so!!

So on these problems, this is where I stand.

 THERAPY UNIT - Cancer is the scourge of all our lives. Mags Kirwan's shock resignation from SECF continues to highlight this issue. The review body has taken too long to report. It must be disbanded. Population projections for the South-East region justify siting the unit in Waterford forthwith. In any event, sick people being transported in a round trip of over 200 miles taking 7 hours at least of travel time cannot be justified on any basis.

I will move heaven and earth to deliver from a Fianna Fail Government a Radio Therapy unit in Waterford. On this I have been accused of breaking the party line. Where health is concerned there is only one line -the bottom line – save the patient! I make no threats - no empty boasts - just a straight commitment to follow this issue to the limit and to deliver this unit to Waterford. Those who know me know that what I say is what I mean.

e EDUCATION - Our own Institute of Technology is recognised as being in the foremost rank of excellence. But the Education Authority is attempting to "row-back" its devolved authority and restrict WIT in its natural development. But the Minister for Education may confer whatever powers he deems appropriate. This Act empowers the Minister to cut through the "red tape" and the begrudgery that would limit us. Why was it not done before this? Or demanded?

So I will ensure that the new Minister for Education in a FF Government will implement this power to finish what has been started and devolve all powers to award degrees at all levels to WIT.

● INFRASTRUCTURE – Clogged City streets, traffic jams, fumes and noise. Without infrastructure our City and County will stagnate, suffocate and die. The oral public hearing on the development of the second Bridge and By-Pass is actually being re-opened claiming that information received is "contradictory and unclear". This will delay everything even further.

We cannot get such benefits "on other people's wounds", so as a TD and Mayor of the County I will convene a meeting of all parties (including Gracedieu residents and Butlerstown Action Groups whom I have met) with the officials of the County and City to resolve the outstanding problems and reach a compromise.

This will allow An Bord Pleanala to proceed with granting permission immediately.

• WATERFORD AIRPORT – Under-resourced and underused. But Knock, Cork and Kerry airports, no problems with funding. This is scandalous. It confirms what all the Key Indicators in areas of Capital Expenditure show - that Waterford is not getting a fair share of the national cake. Again the lack of leadership and representation in this regard is appalling.

The normal procedure for a new TD is to go along with the role of back-bencher and support the party line. Well this backbencher has some other ideas. That kind of approach is not good for the Country, the TD or the Constituency represented. The days of dummies and being the gentle county must be put firmly behind us. This Constituency deserves better and it is going to get it - if you want it!

▶ LAW & ORDER – Gardai are being killed and injured in the line of duty. Public Order is in decline. Street crime, anti-social behaviour and plain blackguardism is plainly visible in every one of our cities and towns. It is drug related or excessive drinking or just a simple breakdown in respect for the rights of others.

The citizens of Waterford City & County want this criminal activity stopped. So that young and old, children and senior citizens can walk the roads and streets in safety and without fear. As TD and Mayor I will rigorously pursue that objective with the Gardai and the Minister.

e 3rd WORLD IMMIGRANTS- I have listened to many decent minded people who are expressing a reasonable concern about this question. Many who cannot understand why other candidates are just refusing to say one word? For example, fairness in the dispersal of 3rd. World immigrants is not clear. By any standard the numbers now located in Tramore cannot be justified. Also, the policy in relation to such immigrants not working, I know of excellent talented refugees who want to work and do not want handouts. Bishop Walton Empey has called for this situation to be remedied, and I agree with him.

My position on this issue is that genuine cases of people fleeing in fear of their lives from persecution must be handled sympathetically but economic hardship is best solved within the victims' own countries. Better to help a man to sow wheat than to hand him bread. If we allow a massive inflow of 3rd.World immigrants - this State cannot sustain them! Ignoring this issue through fear of being labeled racist is not the way to solve it. It must be seen to be a problem arising from our economic success and record of charity and must be addressed fairly and squarely.

So whether it is bridges in Waterford or fishermens' licenses in Cheekpoint and Passage, whether it is the decline in employment in towns like Cappoquin and Tallow and Portlaw, social facilities in Kilmacthomas, Stradbally or Bunmahon and so many many more problems, all are important, all need positive action. That action can only be driven by balance between City & County. This Constituency can only go ahead City and County together. It must be represented equally and the way to do that is to have a Fianna Fail Government TD in both City and County. As first Mayor of the County I am also proud of my City, my birthplace. I have the Honour and Privilege to serve you as Mayor but I can increase that service by representing you in the Dail.

According to a survey the majority of senior secondary school students in Waterford city and county believe politicians to be corrupt. What a terrible indictment? I challenge that belief. With me what you see is what you get.

This is a County and City of talent and resources, quality people in every respect. THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

REMOVE SIDE SHOOTS FROM SWEET

Early sweet peas grown on the single stem system will need regular attention from now on. Remove all side shoots and tendrils. Be careful not to pinch out flowering stems by mistake; it is quite easy to tell these, as flower buds are evident even at an early stage

SOW RUNNER BEANS **OUTDOORS**

It is time to make a good sowing of runner beans in the open. Sow seeds individually or in pairs about 20cm apart in two lines 25cm apar

If you require more than one double row, leave an alleyway of at least 2m wide between each set. Cover the seeds with 5cm of soil. If you sow the seeds in pairs and they all germinate, you will need to single the seedlings out later on.

START TO PICK GREEN GOOSEBERRIES

It is usually possible to get a first picking of green gooseberries at about this time.

The fruits will still be very small and immature and it would be foolish to strip the branches yet. but if you remove a few here and there where they are overcrowded it will give the remainder a chance to develop more fully - and give you the chance of gooseberry pie early!

Plant aquatics

May is the best month of the year for planting water lilies and other aquatic plants. These may either be planted direct in soil, spread on the bottorn of the pond at a depth of at least 15cm or planted in baskets or pots which are then sunk into position.

LABOUR POLICY ON SCHOOLS PRAISED BY WATERFORD CANDIDATE

Primary and secondary schools throughout Waterford county and city stand to benefit if the Labour Party is elected to Government during

That's according to their general election candidate Brian O'Shea who has welcomed his Party's stated commitment that the state should meet the full running costs of schools in addition to a programme of investment.



Brian O'Shea feels the onus should not be on teachers, parents and students - as is the case with many schools in Waterford city and county - to fundraise in order to meet shortfalls arising as to the provision of facilities and equipment. Brian O'Shea also says a programme to develop primary and secondary school buildings must be in place. underpinned by a transparent system of prioritisation in distributing resources for that purpose.

Expanding on the Labour view on the subject, Brian O'Shea said:

"A recent Irish National Teachers Organisation (INTO) report suggested that many primary schools have inadequate toilet or washing facilities, inadequate heating systems and problems with drinking water, worn doors and windows and insufficient - or even dangerous - conditions in the playground. Claims of Celtic Tiger prosperity delivering a better education system, or indeed notions of good government, are undermined by the publication of such information. Labour's policy on an issue fundamental to so many parents is a sensible one."

VISIT TO CHANAT LA MOUTEYRE FOR THE FETE DU FOUR

Sixteen people travelled to our Twin Town, Chanat, for this memorable visit to a unique area, writes Helen McGrath, where we stayed with lovely, warm and friendly people. Our limited French and their limited English was an inconsequential barrier as we communicated very well though we resorted at times to sign language or the dictionary.

It is impossible to pick out 'highlights' from the very varied programme. The whole weekend was a highlight from the very high-tech, impressive 'Vulcania' centre for the study of volcanology to the traditional local Baking Festival where it seemed enough apple tarts and brioches to feed the population of the Auvergne were baked in an ancient brick oven remarkably similar to the one used by Barron's Bakery.

We also visited the impressive Puy de Dôme with its Roman temple ruins, highest point of the Chaîne des Puys range of over eighty volcanoes - we had been assured at Vulcania that the last eruption had occurred over 7,000 years ago and the next was not imminent!

We were treated to a guided tour of the Museum of Cutlery in the quaint medieval town of Thiers. This town is to cutlery what Waterford is to crystal and the similarity is very clear when one bears in mind that neither place has any obvious advantage such as availability of raw material and that their success is based on the skills of their master-craftsmen passed on through generations.

The warmth of our welcome by the people of Chanat is shown by the efforts that they made to arrange the visits to Vulcania and Thiers. Vulcania has only just opened to the public and is booked out for months to come, the Museum in Thiers is closed every Monday at this time of year but our hosts' persistence gained us entrance to and extensive tours of both.

We also witnessed the French Presidential Election at first hand when we visited the polling station to see their method of voting. Many Chanatois who had not voted in the first round because they worked or studied away from home had made a special effort to return home for the weekend in order to vote; they were determined not to allow apathy determine the outcome a second time. In Chanat the result was announced within half an hour of the poll closing and showed Jacques Chirac had over 90% support.

On our part we performed set dances and introduced our hosts to 'The Siege of Ennis' and Shoe the Donkey' as well as singing a few Irish favourites. Aine Ní Fhiannusa's singing was a huge hit with the Chanatois and with the Basque Folk group who were delighted to have her join them at the open air concert on Sunday. We also took with us the 'raw material' which enabled us to serve up more than 200 Irish Coffees to the public at the concert

Throughout the weekend we enjoyed marvellous hospitality in the homes of our host families where warm bonds of friendship were built up whilst they treated us to many wonderful meals taken in the leisurely French style and, naturally, much wine and even champagne. They must have been left exhausted after providing such a very full programme covering four days. Merci beaucoup to Jacqueline Queyriaux, President of the Chanat Twinning Committee and her team for all their work and to Keith Dransfield for his organisation of the trip.



The Belfast City Marathon was held last Monday the 6th of May and this year the race incorporated the Irish and Munster Marathon Championship. We will all remember last year when this race was held here in Dungarvan when the host club West Waterford had thirty six athletes complete the course.

This year we were represented by a seven man team who made the long journey up north to compete for their club. They were Connie Kelleher, Trevor Mason, Eoin Fitzgerald, George Tutty, Johnny Clark, Brian Collins and James Veale, all athletes were very pleased with their performances considering that the day was very warm.

First man home was Trevor Mason in a time of 2.44 finishing in a very creditable 16th place. This was another great display by the ever consistent Trevor who is one of our top road runners at present, his performance was good enough to give him a silver individual at Munster level behind Cathal O'Connell of Cork who was 6th in 2.26. Next came Connie Kelleher in a time of 3.04 in 90th place, this gave him gold in the over 50 category at Munster level. Wyley is an accountant with Southern Electric at Maidenhead and training is built around his ride to work.
