Dungarvan To Head Information Technology

Dungarvan is to be one of six county towns in the south east to introduce extended broadband infrastructure around the town, Dungarvan Town Council heard.

The project will involve the laying of ducts in the form of a ring main around and throughout part of the town to carry fibre optic cable, the County Manager Donal Connolly said.

Costing Dungarvan Town Council an estimated total of eur 800,000, work will also see the development of a control centre on the county council property next to the existing Telecom building. Access will be available to

all telecommunications companies and to Sean Casey & Co.

The main is to be run from Grattan Square out to the new housing estate in Shandon, Kilrush Industrial Estate, Dungarvan Glass and the Youghal Road IDA Estate.

Laying the main will also include extensive excavation work on a number of roads in the centre of the town itself, with Main Street and Mitchell Street as well as O'Connell Street earmarked for the project.

Grant-aid will cover 90% of the cost of the eur 8m six county development, with the remainder to be footed

by the local authorities.

Recommending the project to the council, Mr. Connolly said the Town Council will be able to recoup its costs over a number of years by selling capacity on the network to private telecommunications companies.

"It will also see Dungarvan going to the forefront of information technology infrastructure in the country", he added.

The council will now authorize the South East Regional Authority to design and construct the network after being proposed by Cllr. Billy Kyne and seconded by Cllr. Damien Dillon and passed unanimously.

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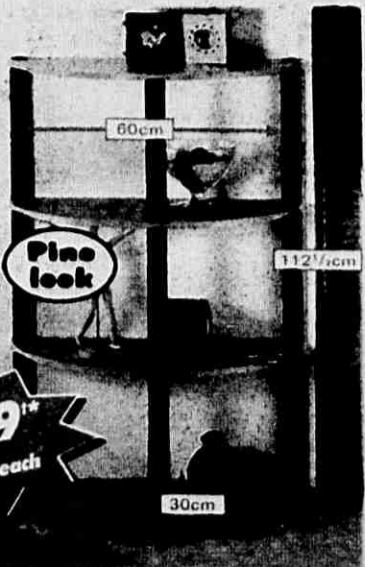
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WATERFORD CRYSTAL - DUNGARVAN 1972 - 2002

Friday the 26th of July promises to be a red letter day in the history of Waterford Crystal-Dungarvan because on that day the work force of the factory celebrate thirty years of the official opening by An Taoiseach Jack Lynch T.D. which occurred on the 28th of July 1972. To mark the occasion a day of remembrance and celebration has been organised by a committee of work-

ers who came together last August 2001 with this special day in mind.

The day itself begins at nine o'clock with tours of the factory complex for retired and former employees followed by the unveiling (11.30a.m.) of a specially commissioned plaque by the CEO of Waterford Crystal Mr. John Foley and Mr. Michael Holland who was the plant manager for thirty

years before his retirement. Following this ceremony the work force, invited guests, former workers and relatives of deceased members of the work force as well as local clergy and the former Bishop of Waterford and Lismore Dr. Michael Russell will con-celebrate Mass (12 noon) in a marquee erected on the grounds especially for the occasion. At the end of the Mass employees who have

bearing the Waterford City and Dungarvan coat of Arms as well as the Dungarvan bridge which symbolises bridging the distance between the thirty years and the two Waterford Crystal plants.

Looking at those thirty years, it is sometimes hard to imagine where the time went. The reason the committee came together to hold this special day is because, if these things are not remem-

bered now as time moves on it will become harder to recall with clarity those times and events that have filled those thirty plus years.

Friday the 26th of July it is hoped will go down as one of those great days when groups of friends and colleagues come together to witness and celebrate the contribution of all to an industry and place we can all be proud of, that place is "Dungarvan."

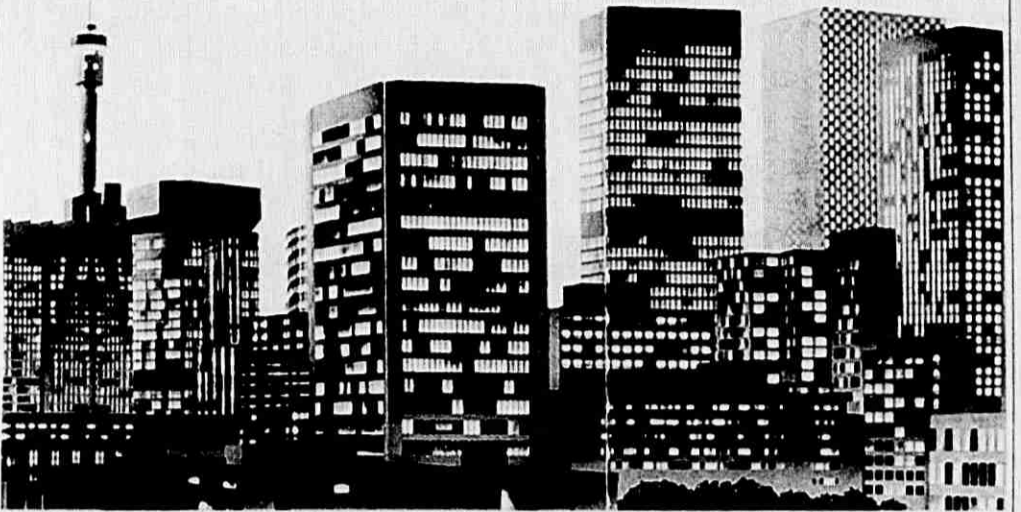
JOURNEY THROUGH AFRICA: SOUTH AFRICA

Johannesburg

Just over a hundred years ago a man called George Harrison was searching for his riches and stumbled across some strange looking rocks which he later discovered to be gold! The lucky find was reported to the government and soon afterwards thousands of people came to look for more.

This started the biggest goldrush the world has known. The few tin shacks that sprouted up to house the first miners grew in number, soon creating the biggest mining and industrial centre in Africa: Johannesburg, 'the city of gold'.

Today Johannesburg is a thriving modern city of tall office blocks, wide streets packed with cars, and about two million people rushing about their business. There are still goldmines on the edge of the city, but local industries also produce chemicals, metal products, textiles, and machinery. The city looks especially dramatic at night when the buildings light up like Christmas decorations.



Kwazulu

The Kwazulu region to the south of Johannesburg is home to the great Zulu people. They were once Africa's most feared warriors and fought fierce battles with the British settlers. Today many Zulus live in the cities, but others graze live-stock and grow crops in the area.



Some still live in traditional Zulu homes made of wooden poles and mud. The poles are woven together, plastered with wet mud and left to bake solid in the sun. Finally, a thatched roof is added.

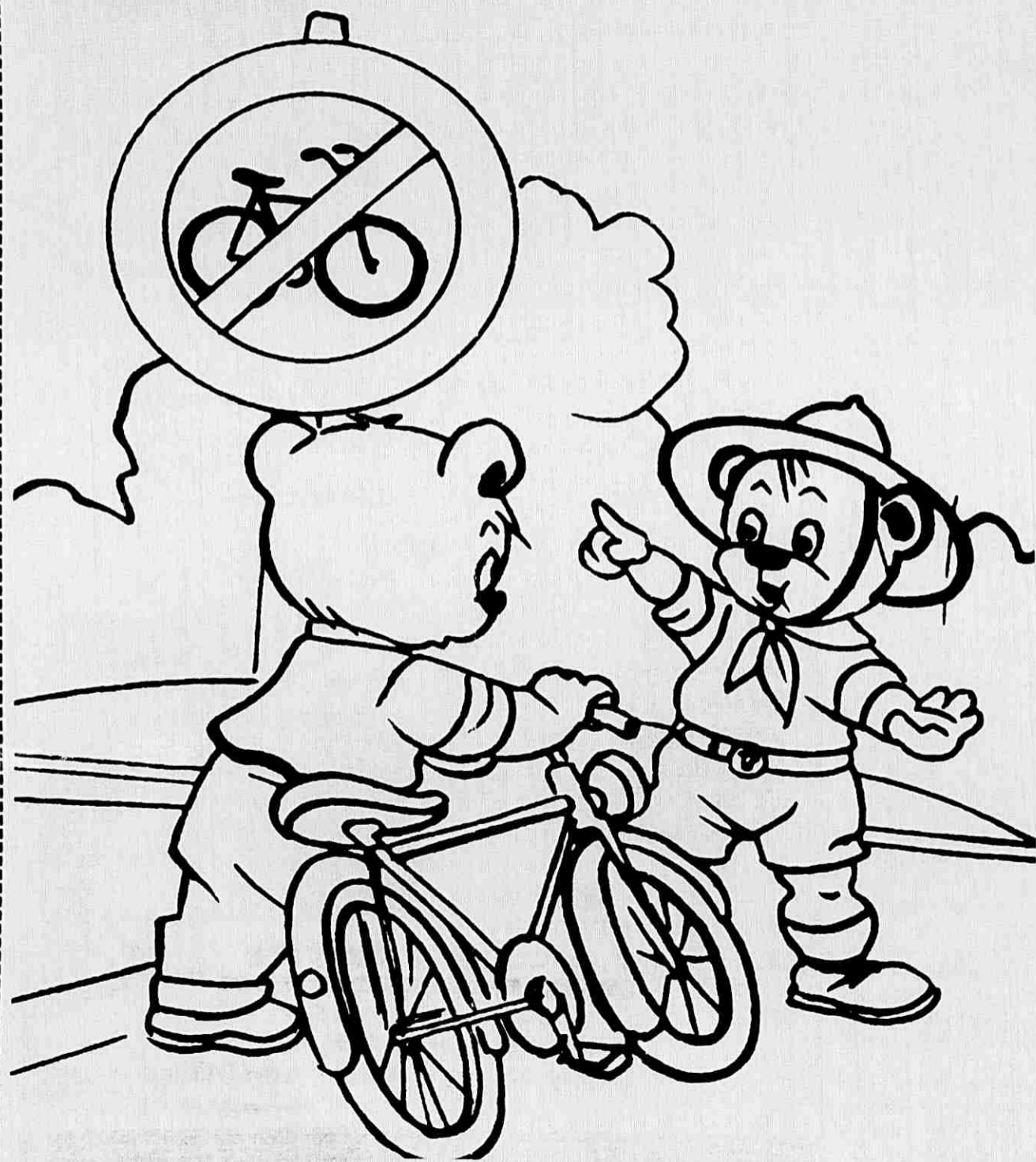
SOWETO

On the outskirts of the city of Johannesburg lies Soweto, which is short for South West Township. It is made up of several towns that were set up by the white government to house the black Africans who worked for them.

Today over a million live in this maze of concrete bungalows and corrugated tin shacks. The conditions are often unhealthy and unsafe. It is hoped that in the 'new' South Africa life will improve, but as you pass through Soweto you see that life is very hard for many people.

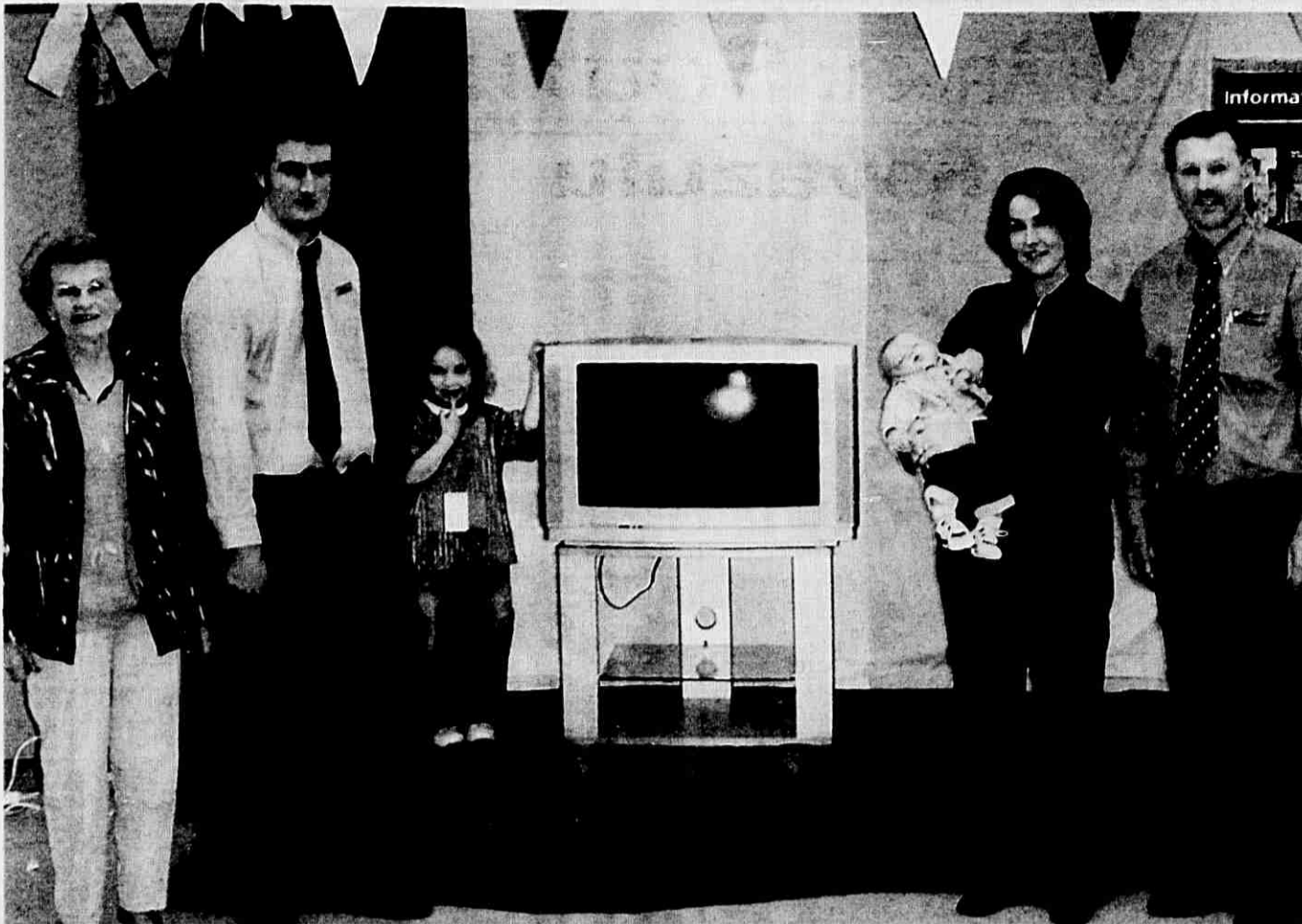

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John Deasy Secures Place On Fine Gael Front-Bench

Dungarvan based Deputy, John Deasy, has continued his spectacular rise up the political ranks with his appointment to the front bench of Fine Gael on Wednesday last. The first time Deputy is to take over one of the hardest briefs in opposition politics - spokesman on Justice and Law Reform.

After the virtual meltdown suffered by Fine Gael during the recent General Election, new leader Enda Kenny has clearly opted for youth in a bid to win back lost support. The appointment of thirty-four year old graduate of law, John Deasy, to face the former Attorney General, Michael McDowell, is seen as one of Fine Gael's biggest gambles.

However, the former aid in the US Capitol Hill, has consistently overcome the odds since he returned from America four years ago.

At his first attempt in local politics, Deputy Deasy, put in a sparkling performance to top the polls in the Dungarvan electoral area for both the Urban and County Council elections in 1999.

The council proved to be a

good building block for John Deasy to mount a serious bid for the Dail with a series of headline grabbing performances. He was nominated as one of the two Fine Gael candidates for this year's election, but doubts were still cast over his ability to pull off another coup after so short a time in Irish politics.

But, as big name Fine Gael candidates fell out of favour with the electorate throughout the country, John Deasy secured 7, 204 first preferences and comfortably reached the quota behind new Minister for the Envi-

ronment, Martin Cullen.

Speaking to the 'Leader', after his nomination to the shadow cabinet, a delighted Deputy Deasy said that the post is a daunting one. But he plans to press for improvements on a number of areas including tackling the year on year increase in street violence, more policing of rural areas and the introduction of more deterrents to crime including CCTV systems.

Deputy Deasy added that Garda morale has been suffering due to in part to poor resourcing. However, he went on to say "the way we police needs to be looked at."

In particular, John Deasy said a closer association needs to be built between young Gardai and the communities they serve.

He also has the greatest respect for the Minister of Justice and Law Reform, Michael McDowell, who he described as "above all else an honest man".

"He's there to provide good Government and I'm there to provide good opposition", Deputy Deasy concluded.

COOKERY CORNER

Warm Salmon and Pasta Salad

Serves: 4
Cooking time: 30 mins

275g pasta shapes
8 sprays Fry Light Olive Oil
225g leeks, trimmed and sliced
100g mange tout, trimmed & halved
100g sweetcorn
20g can red salmon, drained & flaked

Dressing:

15ml/1 tbsp chopped fresh dill
5 ml/1 tsp horseradish sauce
30 ml/2tbsp fresh orange juice
Salt and freshly ground black pepper

Method:

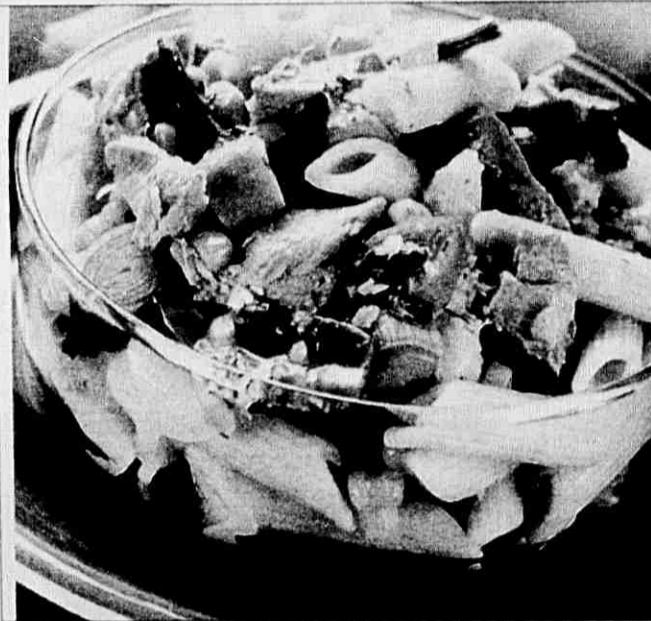
1. — Bring a pan of lightly

salted water to the boil and cook the pasta until tender - this will take about 10 minutes.

2. — Meanwhile, heat a heavy-based frying pan and spray with 3 pumps of Fry Light Olive Oil. Add the leeks and stir-fry for 2 minutes, reduce the heat, cover and cook for a further 3 minutes. Add the mange tout and sweetcorn to the pan and cook for a further 2 to 3 minutes, until heated through. Toss in the flaked salmon.

3. — Drain the pasta thoroughly and spray with Fry Light Olive Oil. Toss with cooked vegetables and salmon.

4. — Mix together the ingredients for the dressing and drizzle over the salad.



Mediterranean Chicken Burgers With Parsley Relish

Serves 4
Prep time: 15 minutes
Cooking time 10-12 minutes

Cals per portion: 171
Fat per portion: 5.6g

4 5 0 g
minced chicken or 4 breast fillets
1 clove garlic, crushed
1 unwaxed lemon
2 tsp sun dried tomato paste

1 tbsp chopped basil
1 egg white
16 sprays Fry Light Olive Oil

Relish:

3 tbsp chopped parsley
1 tbsp chopped basil
1 shallot, finely chopped
2 tomatoes, skinned, seeded and finely chopped
Lemon juice, to taste

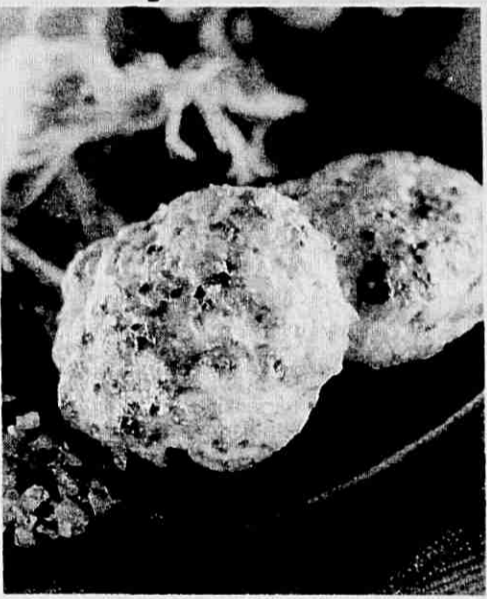
Method:

1. — If using minced chicken, put into a bowl with the garlic, grate the lemon zest and add with the sun dried tomato paste basil and egg white, season with salt and pepper and mix well. Squeeze the lemon and put the juice aside. If using chicken breast, cut into chunks place in a food processor and chop about 30 seconds. Be careful not to process too finely.

2. — Form the mixture into 8 burger shapes. Place foil on a grill rack and spray 4 times with Fry Light Olive Oil. Place the burgers on the foil and spray each 3 times with Fry Light Olive Oil. Cook under a medium hot grill for 5-6 minutes on each side.

3. — While the burgers are cooking, prepare the relish, mix all the ingredients together, adding enough juice to moisten and flavour and season with salt and pepper. (if using a large lemon be careful not to add too much juice).
4. — Serve the burgers with the relish and a crisp green salad. These are also delicious eaten cold and would be good for picnics.

Alternatively the chicken mixture can be shaped like Kofta and eaten in pitta bread with the relish.



French Bread Apricot Pudding



Serves:4
Cooking time: 40mins

6 slices of French bread
18 sprays of Fry Light Sunflower
420g can of apricots, drained & roughly chopped 450ml/1/2pt semi skimmed milk 3 large eggs
50g demerara sugar
pinch of brown nutmeg

Method:

1. — Preheat the oven to 350f/180c/gas mark 4.
2. — Arrange the bread slices into a shallow oven proof dish and spray evenly with the Fry Light Sunflower.
3. — Scatter the chopped apricots over the bread slices.

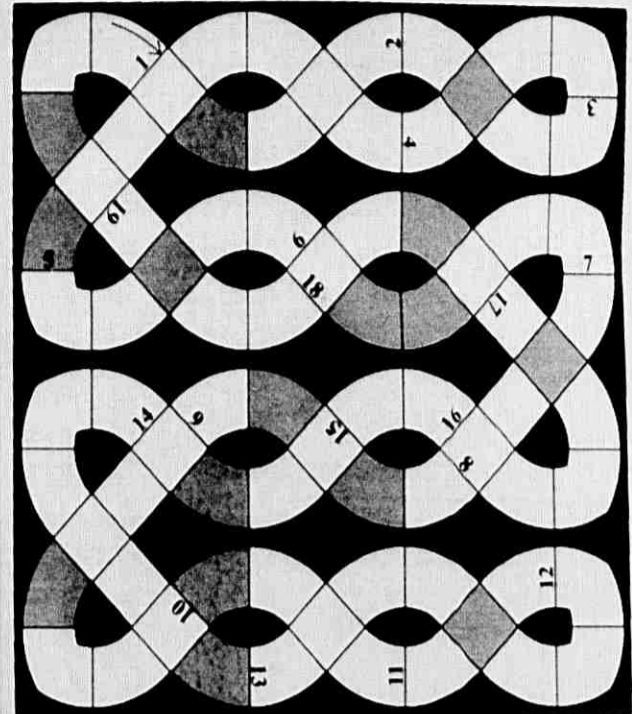

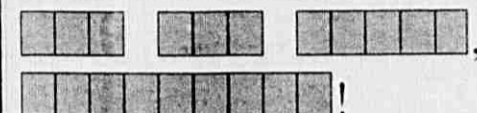

Health Tips from "Remedies"

Aesculus (Horse Chestnut)

USES: Varicose Veins and Heavy tired legs.

The use of Horse Chestnut in venous disorders has been recognised for a long time. A commonly held belief in the 18th Century was that carrying conker seeds (in one's pocket) would prevent gout, rheumatism and back pain.

HOW IT WORKS: The constituent of Aesculus which has been most studied is Aescin. It has the ability to improve the tone of the veins, reducing leakage into the surrounding tissue. Often varicose veins are more troublesome in the summer and starting with a course of Aesculus during the spring can prevent the distressing symptoms during the warm weather. For best results, a 3 to 4 month course of Aesculus drops or tablets is advisable. Those suffering from varicose veins will also benefit from ensuring that constipation is not a factor. Aesculus gel is used for immediate relief of heavy tired legs.

Those On Housing Waiting Lists Losing Out

Whilst there may be some interest in the ups and downs of politicians and their parties in the recent general election, a Waterford County Councillor claims the biggest losers were the thousands of families across the country on housing waiting lists.

That's according to Labour's Fiachra Ó Céilleachair, who was speaking following confirmation that house prices jumped by nearly 3% during the month of May alone - the largest monthly rise in nearly four years. With the amount of applications for housing to

the three local authorities in Co. Waterford still in four figures, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says it's clear that the housing crisis is a most important social and economic issue.

Reflecting on an issue he has raised regularly, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said: "It concerns me that the hard deci-

sions necessary to tackle the housing crisis are not being taken. Local authorities such as Dungarvan Town, Waterford County and City Councils depend on Dept. of Environment funding allocations to enable them to build enough houses to meet the demand. They are clearly not getting that support at the minute."

"Increasing the supply of social and affordable housing, in addition to innovative measures to make houses accessible to first time buyers are the challenges in housing policy for those who are interested. So far this Government has failed to live up to the commitment it gave in the last Partnership Agreement to build 25,000 local authority houses over the lifetime of the deal. As each month passes first time buyers are being priced further and further out of the market. That is the record of Fianna Fáil and the Progressive Democrats."

"In working closely with my colleague Brian O'Shea TD, the voice of first time buyers and families on housing waiting lists throughout Co. Waterford will be heard loud and clear, inside and outside Dáil Eireann. Labour does not want a repeat of the disastrous policies of the past five years."

Urban Forest Park To Be Developed

An Urban Forest Park is to be developed near Fr. Twomey's Road in Dungarvan, Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair has been informed.

The council in conjunction with the residents committee are developing the green area as a "Neighbour Woods Scheme". Pathways will also be put in when the trees, which have already been planted, become established and the Urban Forest Park will be developed over a number of years. But, the provision of railings along the green area has not been considered.

A number of new lights on the road from the Spring area towards the well have also been agreed by Dungarvan Town Council.

Epilepsy

WHAT IS EPILEPSY?

Epilepsy is a neurological disorder, which is caused by brief disturbances of the brain's electrical activity. For people that are affected by Epilepsy, it means that they are prone to recurrent attacks (also known as seizure's or fits). A seizure is caused by a temporary change in the way the brain cells work. The brain consists of a vast network of nerve cells called neurons, billions of electrical messages are sent between cells, controlling every thing we think, feel or do. During an epileptic seizure an upset in the brain chemistry causes the messages to become scrambled, and the neurons are fire off faster than usual and in bursts. It is this disturbed activity that triggers off a seizure. During an attack, these discharges can cause twitching of the muscles, tingling on one side of the body or an awareness of a strange taste or smell, and loss of consciousness.

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS AND TYPES OF EPILEPSY?

Epileptic seizures are classified into two broad groups, there are 'Generalised

seizures and Partial seizures. The general seizures will cause loss of consciousness, and affects the whole body and may occur over a broad area of the brain.

Whereas Partial seizures are usually caused by damage to a more limited area of the brain and are divided into simple seizures and complex seizures. In simple partial seizures, the person remains conscious but experiences some twitching and tingling sensations that can last several minutes. In the complex partial seizures, the person may behave oddly, and appear dazed and fail to respond if addressed.

There are certain causes that can trigger off an epileptic fit, such as alcohol, stress, patterns of light (such as T.V. or playing video games), lack of sleep, illness, hormones and food.

If epilepsy is suspected a medical professional will usually do tests such as EEG (Electroencephalogram), brain scans and blood tests to make a diagnosis.

OUTLOOK FOR PEOPLE WITH EPILEPSY

Epilepsy is usually treated with medication prescribed by a specialist. There are a

number of anticonvulsant medications and the choice of medication depends on the type of epilepsy. Some children affected by epilepsy will grow out of the disability, with no apparent long-term effects.

Many people with the disability lead normal lives and have no symptoms between seizures.

SPATE OF VANDALISM OUTRAGES KILMAC' RESIDENTS

Local community groups in Kilmacthomas have been outraged by the spate of vandalism carried out in the area over Whit Bank holiday period.

Speaking on behalf of the Kilmacthomas Community Development Group, Ger Cusack said the behaviour of certain individuals is putting the good name of Kilmacthomas at risk and putting the future involvement of projects proposed by Waterford County Council and other agencies in doubt.

The main focus of the recent vandalism was St. Declan's

Community College and the Town's Park. In the case of St. Declan's up to fifty windows were broken; the damage to the Park was extensive with destruction of several mature trees and the demolition of the last remaining timber bridge.

The Park, which is the scene of the popular annual "Craic in Kilmac" event, is to receive funding to the value of 126,000 in 2004 from the Urban and Village Renewal scheme. But, fears are already mounting that further vandalism could put this in jeopardy.

Asked for a comment, Cllr. Ger Barron said he was saddened and annoyed by the behaviour of these people, who over a twelve-month period have destroyed all the timber bridges in the park as well as the railings.

Cllr. Barron went on to say that the effort to promote Kilmacthomas as a safe crime free area is being undermined by this type of behaviour and appealed to individuals and community groups to come together to combat further vandalism in the interests of the community.

Plans For 3m Technical College Fall Short Of Requirements

Plans for the new Dungarvan Technical College on the Youghal Road have fallen six classrooms short of the secondary schools requirements, it has emerged.

The problems occurred with the planned size of the eur3.81m school after the substantial rise in the number of students attending VTOS and PLC courses there in recent years.

The VEC may now seek

funding for the refurbishment of the school in the Wolf Tone Road to house the PLC and VTOS students. Refurbishment of the building was estimated at £500,000 last year.

Alternatively, the VEC may yet apply to the Department of Education for additional funding, with prefabs on the Youghal Road site looked at, as an option.

Seeking funding for prefab, it is hoped, would establish a need for the extension of the plans and extra funding for more classrooms in the college. However, fears have been expressed that should the pre-fabs be built, they may not be replaced for another thirty years.

Currently the new College is to include a purpose built sports hall and 12 specialist classrooms on the Youghal Road.

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

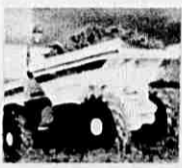

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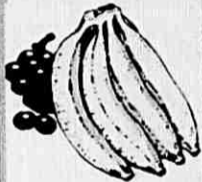

Heavenly Scent For The Summer

LILIES are not only stunningly beautiful, but the fragrance of these irresistible flowers will make you float up to heaven and beyond....

A group of just three or five lilies is enough to fill an average patio with their scent on a balmy summer evening.

Lilies are ideal if you have limited room in your garden because they make the most of vertical space.

Place a pot by your back door or near an open window and let the strong, natural fragrance fill your home.

Lilies are available by mail order for spring delivery.

You should also find a good selection of bulbs in garden centres and other plant retailers from February onwards.

The best bulbs are big and

plump. The roots should not be dry, and they also should be round and firm.

If you wish to plant lilies in a border, try to place the bulbs so they grow through groundcover or low-growing plants - they like their heads in the sun and their feet in the shade.

Recommended time to plant is autumn, but most bulbs are sold in the spring.

Soil should be well-drained and very fertile.

Sharp sand or grit will improve the soil.

You should check the individual plant specifications for planting depth.

If your lilies are to be planted in containers, plant one bulb in a 20 cm pot or three bulbs in a 25-30 cm pot.

Containers should always be at least 20 cm deep and filled with a peat-based multipurpose compost.

Shoots will start to appear in the spring, water lilies regularly at this point, but never completely soak them.

Tall lilies with graceful stems will need support, try not to pierce the bulb when driving the stake in to the ground.

Pests that lilies suffer from can be vicious. The bright red lily beetle will destroy your entire crop. Picking off the beetles and larvae by hand is the best method of control.

Help prevent slug damage by growing lilies in pots or by using a coco-shell mulch around plants in the border.

Telltale signs of viral infections transmitted by aphids include distorted growth which is evident on stems and leaves.

The only way to treat the problem is to destroy the plant - so prevent it by keeping the number of aphids to a minimum.

Recommended varieties of lilies include 'Casa Blanca', 'Mona Lisa', 'Pink Perfection' and 'Star Gazer'.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

SOW FORGET-ME-NOTS

This is a good time to sow Forget-me-nots for flowering outdoors next May and June. It is possible to germinate the seeds in the open, sow in drills 1 cm deep and 15 cm apart. Lightly cover the seeds with sandy soil and water moderately.

DIVIDE MOSSY SAXIFRAGES

Old clumps of mossy saxifrage may be divided and this is a good policy if they are tending to get brown in the centre. Discard the brown pieces and replant the green clumps in a semi-shady place in soil that contains plenty of leafmould or moss peat. Water freely for a few weeks.

LIFT AND DIVIDE JUNE FLOWERING IRISES

This is the ideal time for lifting and dividing all the May and June flower flag irises as most of the plants will be starting to make new roots. It is not wise to lift and divide clumps every year, but after four or five years they get overcrowded and exhaust the soil. Then you should dig them up carefully with a fork, cut off the old central portions of bare rhizome, discarding them altogether, and replant the healthy outer growths with 8 to 10 cm of rhizome attached to each. Plant in well-prepared soil dusted with superphosphate of lime. If you use animal manure, work it in deeply, so it does not come in contact with the rhizomes.

LILIES: Growing tips

The best time to plant lilies is in the autumn.

Add sand or grit to the soil for good results.

Lilies enjoy being in a sunny spot but their base must be kept moist.

Most tall lilies need to be supported to avoid wind damage

NRA May Look Favourably On Resubmitted Application

The NRA may look favourably on a resubmitted application to sanction road safety improvements after two years of unsuccessful attempts by the council.

Waterford County Council has failed in the past to get a number of road safety measures implemented including a 40 mile per hour speed limit placed on the dangerous stretch of the main Dungarvan to Waterford road, where a lorry driver tragically lost his life last week.

At Monday's Co. Council

meeting, Co. Engineer, John O'Flynn, outlined the numerous attempts made since 2000 to improve road safety along the Pike/Cushcam stretch of the Waterford road.

The Co. Engineer said a number of attempts have been made by the Council in the last two years to get the NRA's approval to reduce the speed limit at the Pike/Cushcam to 40mph and to secure approval from the NRA to improve road safety at Cushcam Cross.

Further measures were sub-

mitted last August, which included the blocking off of the existing school junction and the construction of a new roadway to serve the school and Clonea costing around £730,260. A letter was sent to the NRA with this proposal but to date no funding has been provided.

Fine Gael Deputy, John Deasy, said as many as 40 accidents have been estimated to have occurred there in the last 20 years.

Tabling a motion Cllr. Deasy called for immediate

steps to be taken to improve road safety.

However, the NRA informed Deputy Deasy, who has continuously pushed for improvements to be made, that they would seriously consider a re-submitted application.

New Mayor Appointed For County

Due to government legislation Deputy Ollie Wilkinson had to sacrifice his role as Mayor of County Waterford as a TD cannot hold the office.

Deputy Wilkinson's term as Mayor would have come to an end in July at the monthly meeting, but his election to the Dail caused a 'casual absence', which was filled until the July AGM by Cllr. Carain O'Riain.

The longest serving member of the council, who has served more than fifty years in office, had never before been elected chairman.

Fine Gael Cllr. Willie MacDonnell welcomed the unopposed appointment describing himself as proud that Cllr. O Riain was Mayor of the County.

He said Cllr. O Riain was a hardworking and diligent member of the council adding "that even for a short term, it's great that Carain has been appointed."

"I hope that when the opportunity arises again for your party to elect a Mayor that your name will go forward".

Cllr. Lola O'Sullivan said that it was a long overdue appointment and while it may be a brief outing she hoped Cllr. O Riain would return as Mayor again.

Party colleague, Cllr. Tom Cunningham said there was nobody more deserving of the office than Cllr. O Riain.

"He has always been respected by the public and at the recent local elections they proved their respect for him."

FISHERMEN OUTRAGED AT LOSS OF MINISTRY

The scrapping of the Dept of the Marine and the loss of a full Ministry has outraged fishermen in the County, according to Cllr. Geoff Power.

The Dunmore East based representative said fishermen from Helvick and other areas of the county are not satisfied with being represented by a

Junior Minister.

Instead, a full Minister should represent fishermen in the same way as the Dept. of Agriculture for the farming sector, he said.

The loss of the Department could also affect the redevelopment of Helvick and the construction of a Marina in

Dungarvan, Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair claimed.

The Labour Councillor said the County Manager has supported these projects, but has been working closely with officials in the Dept. Now that it has gone, he went on to say, this whole project could be put into jeopardy. He called for the Dungarvan electoral area representatives to meet and discuss the matter.

Deputy John Deasy said that in a fishing industry that has already been decimated the loss of the Department of Marine is another kick in the teeth for the fishing industry. He warned that it will be the last straw for many people.

Mayor Ciaran O Riain was hopeful that the Taoiseach

would move to rectify the issue adding that he had the greatest respect for fishermen.

He also called on the two newly elected Deputies to take the issue up to the Dail.

COUNCIL TO SUBMIT AGENDA'S FOR PUBLICATION

Cllr. John Deasy called on Waterford County Council to follow their fellow local authority's lead and issue local newspapers with the agenda before each meeting for publication.

Dungarvan Town Council passed a resolution earlier this year to publish their agenda's in the local papers.

Cllr. Deasy believes this has been a success with the public who can see the issues of interest to them and attend them if they want. The motion was seconded and passed.

Proposal For Skateboarding Park In Kilmac'

Cllr. Ger Barron called on the Council to provide a site for skateboarding in Kilmacthomas to serve the needs of young people in the area. Cllr. Barron said that the proposal came from a group of young people who came together with their parents to form a committee.

He said that a skateboarding park would serve children from 12-18, ages that haven't been catered for by Playgrounds.

County Manager Donal Connolly replied that there are major insurance difficulties with providing a skateboard park. It is regarded by insurance companies as a high risk. But, he said it is something he will discuss with Cllr. Barron in the future.

POST MORTEMS CENTRALISED TO WATERFORD CITY

Post Mortem services have been centralised to Waterford City, South Eastern Health Board representative Cllr. Tom Higgins said.

A review Board decided on centralisation of the service, which, Cllr. Higgins said, if a person dies anywhere in the South East and it's a coroner's case they will be transported to Waterford.

He said the working group has guaranteed that if a person dies before 12 o'clock the body will be returned to the families in a few hours. The same service will be provided at weekends.

Cllr. Higgins said that this time limit is of religious importance to the 1,500 Muslim populations living in the South East. The Muslim religion dictates that a body must be buried with 24 hours. The belief applies to the 600 Jews living the South East, he added.

Housing Question In Aghlish To Be Examined

JIM O'KEEFFE

- AN APPRECIATION

I have been asked on behalf of my family to say a few words about my father, Jim O'Keeffe.

Jim was born in 1915 in Touraneena, Co. Waterford and was the 13th child in a family of ten girls and three boys. He often spoke of the girls exercising too much control in the household but we were never so sure. As far as we were concerned he seemed to be well capable of looking after himself amongst the women.

The family lived in the O'Keeffe bakery and shop which existed in the village of Touraneena from the middle of the 19th century until the retirement of Aunts Biddy and Betty in the last decade. Over the years all of the family enjoyed visits to the home place. The extended family of the O'Reilly's and the Almans also enjoyed their many trips down to Touraneena.

Moving on to his early adult life, he briefly contemplated a religious vocation. Fortunately for his eight children and fifteen grandchildren he changed his mind and decided to become a teacher. As many people know he spent over 40 years in the CBS in Dungarvan and was part of the famous triumvirate - Charlie Doherty, Bill Comerford and Jimo.

I remember when I was quite young walking up the town and meeting some 'bigger fella' who said "Are you Jimo's son?" I didn't know whether this was presented as a question or a threat. I said I was and he said "Go on so, he's alright". To me this typified the view of many people who were taught by him over the years. He had an excellent approach to teaching. His philosophy was to educate and draw forth ideas from his pupils. An example of this is how he taught Shakespeare's Julius Caesar to my class in the Inter Certificate. He used his experience of drama to make the play and the characters

come alive by getting the students to play the different parts. Of course teaching also brought out the rapier wit for which he was famous. Shortly before my Inter Cert, while we were driving out to the golf club, he asked me four questions on history, none of which I was able to answer. He turned to me and said "My dear boy, I think as far as you are concerned history is a mystery".

Another great passion was his involvement in the Dungarvan Dramatic Club of which he was Honorary Life President and the Dungarvan Musical and Choral Society.

He was involved in many great productions over the years. My particular memory is his performance as S. B. O'Donnell in 'Philadelphia, Here I Come'. He brought a great understanding and compassion to the role of the father who cannot comprehend why his son wishes to leave Ireland for America.

On the Dungarvan Choral front, we suspended disbelief as he became a menacing Arab Chieftain - Ali Ben Ali - in the Desert Song. If nothing else, this showed the great versatility he brought to so many parts over the years.

His other great interest was Golf. He was involved with Dungarvan Golf Club in Ballinacourty for many years as Captain, President and Committee Member. He won many prizes over the years. A solid player, his fatal weakness was the chip shot from 40 yards.

However, his greatest achievement was in the way he developed Juvenile Golf in Dungarvan. He brought the same skills to the development of young talent as he did in his teaching profession. His crowning glory was when he brought the Dungarvan Boys team to All Ireland victory in 1985. He was fortunate in that he had a team

of great talent. His skill was to help them to utilise that talent and harness it to great effect.

While these were all important aspects of his life, the most important one was his family and his marriage to my mother for almost 56 years. They both ensured that all eight children were reared and educated well and then safely let loose on the world. They then enjoyed a good many years together on their own - travelling, playing golf, the annual trip to the Irish Open, and shopping in Dublin. Of course it was my mother who did the shopping while my father sat in the car completing his 'Irish Times' crossword.

The past few years were more difficult as he became unwell, but in many respects it brought them both even closer. My mother visited him twice a day in hospital and occasionally brought him out for a walk in the fresh air when the weather permitted. It was evident during this period they were truly a real couple.

I want to pay particular thanks to all of the doctors, nurses and staff in St. Joseph's hospital for their wonderful care of my father over the last fourteen months.

I would like to thank all of the people who shared with us in the celebration of his life and final journey, especially his colleagues from the Choral Society, Gertie Morrissey and Neil Hurley, who provided the music and hymns that were so much part of his life. I would also like to thank Ned Kiely for his help with the funeral arrangements.

Finally, we have noted over the years that O'Keeffe family events are always marked by momentous sporting occasions. It was therefore appropriate that my father passed away peacefully on the day that Waterford beat Cork in the Munster Semi Final! Michael O'Keeffe.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I have been working part-time for the last five years. I am now giving up work to look after my mother who is very ill and in need of full-time care. As I only work 17 hours a week will I be eligible for Carer's Benefit?

ANSWER

Carer's Benefit, which is based on social insurance contributions, is a payment made by the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs to people who leave employment to look after someone in need of full-time care and attention. It is paid for up to 5 months. Providing you meet the contribution conditions and the Department decides that your mother is in need of full-time care and attention you should qualify for Carer's Benefit.

Previously you would have had to be working 19 hours a week or 38 hours a fortnight in order to qualify. Since 1 April 2002 the number of hours which a person is required to work during the 13 weeks immediately prior to claiming Carer's Benefit has been reduced to 17 hours a week or 34 hours a fortnight.

You should apply for Carer's Benefit 8 weeks before you intend to leave work in order that your eligibility can be assessed before you leave.

You could apply for carer's leave from work and your basic employment rights would be preserved. You would be paid Carer's Benefit while on leave and you could return to work when the carer's leave finished. The right to return is broadly similar to the right to return after maternity leave. You must give your employer notice of your intention to take carer's leave 6 weeks before the leave starts.

THINK SAFETY AND TAKE ACTION

Lifting and Carrying:

- ◆ Prevent back injuries by using mechanical methods of lifting, e.g. loaders, hydraulic jacks, trolleys, wheels under heavy farm-yard gates.
- ◆ Before lifting - assess the load. Use the correct technique by having a well-balanced stance, bend your knees, keep your back straight and keep the load close to your body.
- ◆ Ensure that heavy weights are well secured and that proper stacking takes place.

DAIRYING

Tackling cow fertility in poor weather conditions

Two issues of cow fertility need to be tackled during wet weather conditions. They are:

- ◆ Conception rate.
- ◆ Oestrus activity.

Conception rate

Poor nutrition reduces dairy cow fertility. Wet weather and poor grazing conditions are punishing cow nutrition. Sure signs of a fall in cow intakes are:

- ◆ A drop of greater than 0.05% milk protein in two weeks.
- ◆ A drop of greater than 2.5% milk yield per week (for a cow producing 6 gallons per day this means a drop of greater than 0.15 gallons per day per week).

Either one or both of these two indicators is likely to mean that the conception rate will be lower than normal.

Oestrus Activity

Wet weather conditions also reduce heat behaviour. Reports of unusually low returns to second or third service (less than 25%) are another indicator that the wet weather is taking its toll this year. Time is now running out and cows missed this month will not calve until early April if they are inseminated in July. The following steps are necessary to improve heat detection rate during wet weather:

- ◆ Tail paint all cows during the second and third rounds of the breeding season.
- ◆ Where very few cows are seen in heat, consider introducing the stock bull immediately as he will identify cows showing little heat behaviour.
- ◆ Where available, use a vasectomised bull instead as he will allow you to continue breeding replacement heifers.

Herd Scanning

- ◆ It is likely that because of the poor summer weather conditions a percentage of dairy cows will 'turn up empty' this autumn.
- ◆ Scan all cows now. This allows sufficient time to treat and breed empty cows on at least two occasions before the end of the breeding season.

SHEEP

Big Bales for Sheep

Guidelines bale silage for sheep include:

- ◆ Cut grass when it is leafy, not stemmy if feed quality is important. Very stemmy grass will not be converted into high quality feed in the bale.
- ◆ Soil contamination will be a problem this year. This could lead to Listeriosis. Cut the drier fields for sheep. Do not cut grass too bare. If tedding, set the machine correctly to avoid rooting up soil that may end up in the bale.
- ◆ Wilt grass if possible to approximately 30% Dry Matter (DM). Wilting aids preservation by increasing the sugar concentration. It also reduces costs, allows easier handling of bales and saves on bedding.
- ◆ Move bales to storage site before wrapping. If it is necessary to wrap in the field move immediately and handle very carefully.
- ◆ All the bales must be covered by at least 4 layers. Teagasc research showed that two layers of film resulted in 42% of bale ends having visible mould; four layers showed 3.8% visible mould and six layers showed only 0.5% mould.
- ◆ Damaged bales are susceptible to mould and fungus growth. Trials have shown where bales were inoculated with fungus it did not establish on undamaged bales and lost its viability or growth potential. On the damaged bales growth was evident thus highlighting the importance of careful storage.

TILLAGE

Spring Barley

Early sown spring barley is at the flag leaf to booting stage (gs37-49) with the late sown crops at the first -second node stage (gs31-32).

Growth in spring barley is very variable with up to 20% of the sown area in some regions affected by the yellowing and poor growth that is widespread. In many cases such poor growth can be attributed to waterlogging and nutritional problems. Wet weather diseases such as Rhynchosporium are much higher than in recent years.

Recommendations

Nitrogen: Apply a topdressing of 35-50kg/ha (25-40 units/acre) of N to crops showing yellowing and lack of growth due to nutritional problems

Disease Control: When spraying resumes the next fungicide application is likely to be the final spray, and in some cases may be the only fungicide spray.

A lot of curative activity will be required in the programme as Rhynchosporium is prevalent at low to moderate levels in most crops given the prolonged period of recent wet weather. It is important to get a fungicide onto most barley crops as soon as possible, especially on crops not having any fungicide applied to date. Compromising rates of fungicides is not advisable when disease pressure is high.

Harvest Magazine

The summer edition of Harvest Magazine is now available in the Churches costing just 2E. An interesting item in this publication, it tells the story of Very Rev. Fr. James Hanly, Parish Priest of Queensland, Australia from 1843 to 1857. Born at Moorestown, Lisronagh in the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore in 1815 he was the eldest of seven children of Michael and Ellen Hanly. James studied for the priesthood at St. John's College Waterford and at the time there was no vacancy in the Dioceses of Waterford & Lismore, so he volunteered for the Australian mission. After a journey of over four months by sea he arrived in Sydney in the month of March 1843 and the following September he was ordained. He was the first priest to be stationed in the missionary district of Brisbane. Fr. James built a small church made of wood and later in 1850, completed the building of Brisbane's first stone church, St. Stephens which still exists. He also established Brisbane's first school. He travelled thousands of miles around Queensland Bush country on horseback carrying out his priestly duties. In 1861 he was appointed Dean of Yass and later he was appointed to Penrith and Manly. His final appointment was as Chaplain to the Rosebank Convent, Five Dock here he passed to his eternal reward in 1895 at the age of 80 years. His name is still revered in the Brisbane district. Fr. James Hanly is buried in the Old Catholic section of Rock Wood cemetery in New South Wales.

Mayor Wright congratulated the PWDI on their new office and praised them for their commitment and hard work on behalf of people with disabilities. She said Dungarvan Town Council has tried to keep up with the strategies recommended and implement changes but a lot more remained to be done.

Deputy Wilkinson congratulated the Waterford network on their achievements in getting their office up and running and for the hard work they have done for people with disabilities.

Quoting the Fianna Fail election slogan, Deputy Wilkinson said that Waterford County

Council has done a lot of hard work in living up to the equality legislation, but he said he was acutely aware that a lot more still has to be done.

The facilities now provided and the hard work of the staff of PWDI were complimented by City Mayor Hilary Quinlan who described the network as the first link in the chain in providing access for people with disabilities to express their viewpoints.

Mayor Quinlan said he was well aware of the network's usefulness to the disabled and wished the centre well for the future.

There are twenty-eight PWDI networks throughout the country, but Waterford is one of the few to have an office up and running. CEO of People With Disabilities Ireland, Michael Rose said.

Mr. Rose went on to say that the network is important in en-

suring that the voice of the disabled is heard. An important aspect of this is the Barcelona Declaration, which has recently been adopted by the three local authorities in the area.

THE FIVE KIRWAN BROTHERS

The five Kirwan brothers achieved remarkable success in a wide variety of sports. Among the sports they participated in were football, hurling, rowing, pole vaulting, jumping, walking and running. They were from Clonea where they had a farm. The first ever hurleys made in Waterford were made from ash which grew on Kirwan land. A carpenter from Kilmacthomas made the hurleys.

JAMES KIRWAN

James was the eldest of the brothers. He was a noted footballer in the county in the latter 1890's. However he had an accident to his knee which kept him out of the game for some time. When he became fit again he took up hurling rather than football. In 1902 he

founded the Clonea Hurling Club, which brought the first county hurling title to Kilmacthomas. James was the captain of that team. A year later he captained the Waterford senior hurling team. He led the Clonea Club to three successive county championships. He was also a noted pole-vaulter and half miler.

We will continue with the other brothers in the coming weeks.

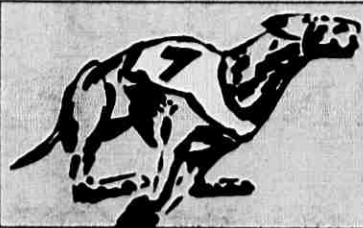

Crokers King Impressed

This midweek card at which everybody availed of free admission featured the semi finals of the Jimmy Maguire sponsored Daring Kennels Unraced event plus the four first round heats of the Bumper Confined 29.80 stake for which local greyhound owners Pat Duggan and Kevin Ayres were the sponsors.

Locally based trainer Gerry Kiely was on the mark in the first semi final of the Unraced stake as he sent out the Jim Treacy owned Crokers King (Lassa Java-Knockmoylan Rose) to an eye catching 29.11 victory. Available at odds of 4/1 "Crokers" produced plenty of early dash to make the first bend ahead of the fast starting Daring Boss. In a one sided contest Crokers King was never in any subsequent danger as he cruised to a three lengths win over Kilmeaden Man with a staying on Daring Boss 5/4 just behind in third.

The second qualifier produced a tight finish with the Carmel Kearns's owned Fagans Leader (Deep Decision-Fagans Cloister coming back a second time to oblige in 29.45. Zero One the red hot 11/10 favourite was very sluggish leaving traps but his early pace carried him into a first bend lead over Sparta Leo with eventual winner Fagans Leader dropping back to fourth spot. It was a case of third time lucky for the Oliver Flynn owned and Gerry Kiely trained Fitz Star (Lassa Java-Knockmoylan Rose) as this 6/4 shot captured the third event in 29.39. The always prominent Fitz Star took over in the lead from Fan Tan at the entrance to the back stretch and despite a late surge by Grove Ryan Lass Fitz Star dug deep to score by a neck.

A 730 yard marathon was virtually a three dog affair at the second bend as the remaining three runners Tour Boy, Running Tara and Rockmount Chief were all badly baulked around the first bend. Blacksmiths Chum made the best of her way home from Shellys Star but the fast

finishing Hampton Spring (Spiral Nikita-Carmagrin Spring) 6/4 produced the better turn of finishing speed to overhaul the long time leader Blacksmiths Chum and score by a head in 41.64. The winner is trained by Stephen Whipp for owner Harry Coppard.

The remaining four races were first round heats of the Pat Duggan and Kevin Ayres sponsored Bumper Confined 29.80 stake. Untroubled by a trap five draw Crokers King outpaced his rivals to the first turn to lead from Kilmeaden Man and while the latter never gave up the chase in second spot Crokers King ruled ok scoring by two and a half lengths.

Trainer Declan Byrne away on honeymoon with his new

wife Eileen missed out on seeing two of his runners Windgap Dixie 4/6 and Bog Warrior 2/1 capture their respective contests. Windgap Dixie (Rio Riccardo-Miss Take) owned by the trainers new wife was forced to do it the hard way in the opening 525 coming from behind the front running Cloncunny Ranger before opening his account by two and a quarter lengths in 29.50. Willie Foley's Bog Warrior (Top Honcho-Maltese Beauty) completed the double for the absent trainer simply romping to an excellent 28.61 sixth race success. Flashing away from trap four Bog Warrior dominated from the front and easing his way clear of Faranrory Tiger Bog Warrior had little difficulty in scoring by seven and a quarter lengths. While Declan Byrne was away on honeymoon his father Frank ran the show at home assisted by the trainers sister Maria but after Saturday nights double the rumour doing the rounds was that former ICC Control Steward Frank may now apply for a trainers license of his own.

The Oldens that is Niamh and Matthew celebrated with a double of their own with Rebeccas Rebel 5/1 and Rebeccas Rock 3/1 winning their races from the front. Both winners are members of the August 99 litter by Seep Decision ex Rebeccas Charm. Coming into trap four as a reserve in a graded sprint Rebeccas Rebel left trap four at a fair rate of knots to make all the running for a convincing four and a half lengths victory over a wide running Airmount Knows in a respectable 16.37.

Trap four held no problems for Rebeccas Rock in the final of the Open 500 as this 3/1 shot made every yard of the running in 27.42. Captain Mackey 4/6 was a raging hot favourite here but after an indifferent break he was always playing second fiddle to the fleet footed Rebeccas Rock who stuck to the task in hand holding at bay the late run of Captain Mackey who tasted defeat by half a length.

Trainer Maria Nierobisz completed a double of her own as Southlodge Prince 5/2 and Lightning Valley 3/1 both posted front running victories. Quarrymount Beta was a warm order at evens to win his third race on the trot in the fifth contest but he was badly hampered at the first bend by Aussie Babe. The Harry Robinson owned Southside Prince (Prince Of Tinrah-Southside Story) was not hanging around at this point as he made the long break for home eventually winning out by six lengths over Quarrymount Beta in a fast 29.15.

The double was completed in the concluding 550 as the Anthony Shields owned Lightning Valley bounced away smartly from trap two to lead from a tightly packed group. Faranrory Maid made her customary late charge up the home stretch but failed by a rapidly diminishing three quarters of a length to overhaul Lightning Valley.

Trainer Mick Hoy was on the mark in the second event over 500 yards with the Brendan Healy owned Greenlodge 2/1 racing to an easy win in 27.74. Well suited to his rails draw Greenlodge displayed plenty of early dash to lead around the first turn from Crehana Star and Truleigh Benji. In a one sided contest Greenlodge was never going to lose out dishing out a five lengths beating to Symphonic Scroll.

The fourth contest over 550 yards went the way of the Walter Walsh owned Kellsboro Pest (Spiral Nikita-Proud Roslea) this 3/1 shot winning comfortably in 30.61. Motoring into an early lead over Spy Catch Kellsboro Pest never looked likely to lose out and it came as no surprise to see the Mooncoin fawn triumph by six and a half lengths over Spy Catch.

In the prevailing conditions the 730 yard marathon was always going to be a true test of stamina. Doctor Tinrah shot clear from trap one but the leader tired in the closing stages as the Martin Stafford owned Actex (Thorgil Tex-Dactari) 2/1 ran on strongly for a length and a half win over Coolstuff Slippy in 41.77.

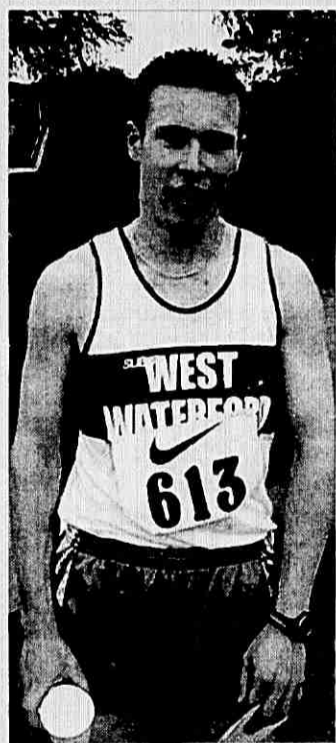

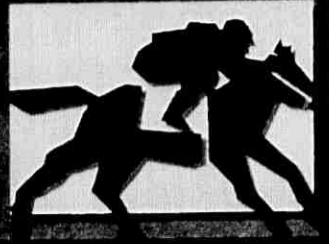

Quarter Moon who was staying on really well at the business end of the English Oaks will now turn her attention to the Irish equivalent at the Curragh where her trainer is hoping for Laytown Off

Special Olympics Athletes Bid For Glory

This week twenty-nine Carriglea athletes will be part of the Munster Team participating in this year's National Games in Dublin, which is the last pre-qualifier for next year's World Special Olympics 2003.

On Friday evening, June 7th, these athletes were accorded a Civic Reception by Dungarvan Town Council in recognition of their achievements and were given the best possible send off in quest of further glory. This was a great occasion and it was an honour and privilege not only for the athletes but also for everybody who was lucky enough to be present.

Twenty of the athletes will stay in Dublin for the full duration of the games (Wednesday, June 19 - Sunday, June 23), while nine of the lower ability athletes will stay in the new luxurious apartments in Dublin City University for the five days of the games and represent Munster in five different sports: Track & Field, Basketball, Swimming, Table Tennis and Motor Activities.

The track and field event will be held in the Morton Stadium in Santry with eleven local athletes participating: Donna Power, Claire Browne, Judy Flynn, Bridie Feeney, Mary McGrath, Ann Flaherty, David Tobin, Kieran Coleman, Michael Keating, Mossie O'Donovan and Richard Lennon.

Four Carriglea athletes are on the Munster Female Basketball team: Martina O'Neill, Nicola Carroll, Jean Fenton and Elaine Hearn. This event will be held in the National Basketball Arena in Tallaght.

Three swimmers: Kerrie Horgan, Denise O'Keeffe and Michael Foley take part in Aquatics which will be held in the Sportsco Pool in Tallaght, while table tennis players Esther Power and Hannah Guina will compete at the Irish Wheelchair Association venue in Clontarf. Last but by no means least, nine motor activities athletes: Niall Costin, Isabel Power, Marie Therese O'Brien, Lily Patterson, Mary Kelly, Marie Kirwan, Isabel Finnegan and Claire O'Donnell will demonstrate their skills and talents in the Belfield Sports complex in UCD. Motor activities comprise of a number of simplified sports tasks involving fine and gross motor skills.

Special Olympics are an ongoing sports training programme for people with a learning disability. It is a non-elitist organisation where it is not just the best athletes who represent the Centre/Club all the time; instead it gives a fair and equal opportunity to all athletes. The emphasis at all times is on participation and enjoyment where everybody gives of their best.

Last November all these athletes were selected on the Munster team based on their achievements in their relative sporting areas. Since January 2002, organised and coordinated training programmes have been in place in preparation for the games. These involve not just training locally, but also squad training sessions for the various sports. Each sport has had at least five such squad sessions, which were held at a number of training locations throughout the province. While sport is important, social development is also high on the agenda, that is, meeting and getting to know other members of the Munster Team and so on.

This year's national games commence on Wednesday, June 19th, with the opening ceremony being held in Parnell Park at 7.30 p.m. None other than the famous Munster rugby captain, Mick Galway, will lead the Munster team. Over 2000 athletes will be involved in this ceremony.

There will be 21 different sports catered for at various venues over the following 4 days with high quality entertainment provided nightly. The closing ceremony will be held in the R.D.S. Ballsbridge on Sunday, June 23rd at 1 p.m.

While the World Cup, with all its euphoria and hype is the largest sporting competition in the world this year, the World Special Olympics 2003 is by far the biggest sporting event in the world next year with over 160 countries represented. These will be held in June 2003 in conjunction with the Host Town Programme, which precedes the games. Dungarvan will host a team of almost 50 athletes from the Bahamas (June 16th - 20th), 2003.

The Sisters of the Bon Saviour have always had a great understanding of the philosophy of Special Olympics and the important role it plays in the lives of people with a learning disability. This support can never be underestimated.

Finally to all the staff in Carriglea who have contributed and helped in the team's preparation we say well done. The inordinate amount of time and effort given is greatly appreciated by all concerned especially the athletes themselves.

Best of luck to all athletes and chaperones at the National Games 2002.

We were so cold at this point that when we finally did mount the bikes again, the only way to warm up was to race the 9 flat miles to Laragh. The final big climb of the day brought us once again up the Sally Gap, this time via Glenmacnean waterfall, on to Glencree and Kilakee and the final 5 mile downhill section back to Tallaght. This was a wonderful achievement by all our participants who had put in so much training together since April, and we celebrated with a lovely meal in Kilkenny on the journey home. Some have said they will NEVER do it again, and others will think it over for a bit when the aches and pains have disappeared.

The Local Employment Service now in its fifth year has continued to provide unemployed people with the information and help they require in obtaining suitable work in their own locality. It has also provided employers with a successful recruitment service, which has placed many people in employment in West Waterford and the surrounding areas.

Over the last five years the service has helped the needs of many unemployed people in the different areas that they have shown interest in. Some have gained experience through different types of training, for example so far in 2002 Computer Training has been high on people's list, with Basic and E.C.D.L. courses being the two most popular.

Some unemployed people have taken the big step to try out new ideas that they may have had, and with the help of the Local Employment Service have become self-employed. The service has given them advice on the best way to develop their idea, has helped them to source any allowances which they may have been entitled to and has directed them to different agencies where grant aid may be available to them to get their business off the ground.

Others have used the service to get the experience necessary to secure a job, for example how to produce a C.V. correctly, how to present themselves in an interview, even how to approach an employer.

On the employer side the L.E.S. has provided a service, which can save a business valuable time and resources by helping them recruit the right personnel.

John Supple who is the Mediator with the Local Employment Service knows the jobseeker on an individual basis. This is of great benefit, as applicants are interviewed and screened, and only those most suited to the job requirements and those who have shown genuine interest in the particular employment on offer are forwarded to the employer.

So far in 2002 the Local Employment Service office which is based at 21 Church Street in Dungarvan has been particularly busy according to John. At the moment on our database we have a number of individuals with a wide range of experience and skills on offer to employers explains John.

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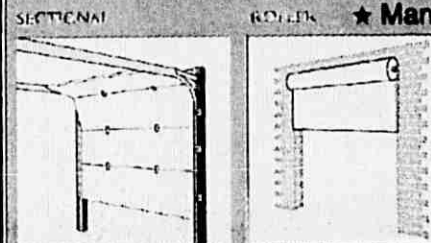
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
