





THE FIVE KIRWAN **BROTHERS**

The second eldest of the Kirwan brothers was Rody. (See last week) Rody Kirwan. James's brother Rody, was an excellent footballer. In the course of his career he togged out for three different counties in senior intercounty competition matches. His first important success was a county championship medal won with Lismore Blackwater Ramblers football club. He was on the Waterford team that lost to Dublin in the All-Ireland final of 1898. In 1901 Rody moved to New Ross because photographs, mostly taken in the 1950's. The exhibition will be open to the public from 12 July. If anyone knows people in the photographs

of business commitments. He played with that county while there, and was on the Camblin Rovers team that won the Senior County Championship. The following year he was on the Wexford county football team. Rody again moved due to business commitments

This time he went to Castleisland, Co. Kerry. He played successfully with the Kerry football team between 1902 and 1907.By the time of his retirement from the game he had won two All-Ireland and three Munster titles with Kerry. As well as football Rody was also an excellent oarsman. In 1902 he represented New Ross at

International Rowing Regatta in Cork. He was also an outstanding athlete and won a total 150 Munster high jump and hurdles competitions.

The third of the Kirwan brothers died in a fever epidemic in 1898 aged 18 years. However, even by that stage he was recognised for his pole vaulting ability and


We approach Cape Town along the famous Garden Route and catch a train for one of the world's greatest railway journeys.



- 4 large waxy potatoes (Maris Piper are ideal) (total = 1.2kg)Fry Light Sunflower Pinch of salt
- I. Wash, peel and re-wash the potatoes. Cut into chips 2ins long by 1/2ins wide. Preheat oven to 200'C/gas mark 6. Bring I litre of water to boil in a mediumsized saucepan and add a pinch of salt.
- 2. Add the chips to boiling water and cook for four

minutes. Drain immediately a colander and return the chips to the dry pan.

- 3. Cover with a lid and shake the pan to start releasing starch. This helps create a crisp coating when the chips are baked.

Method:

I. Put the onion and leek into a large pan. Stir the stock powder or cube into the water then add to the pan. Cook over a medium heat, uncovered for about I 0 minutes until the vegeta-

bles are tender and the liquid has evaporated.

- 2. Meanwhile trim the stalks from the spinach, wash and shake off excess water then shred. Add to the pan and cook for 2 minutes until wilted. Tip into a colander and press out any excess liquid.
- 3. Heat the oven to 200C/400F5 gas mark 6.
- 4. Put the vegetables into a bowl add the oregano, egg and cottage cheese, season and mix well.
- 5. Spray a shallow rectangular tin approx 21 x 25cm with 5 sprays of Fry Light Sunflower Oil. Add a layer of filo allowing a little to hang over the edge. Spray with Fry Light Sunflower Oil 6 times. Repeat three more layers of Filo spraying 6 times between the layers Spoon the filling into the tin.





Historic 100ft Schooner To Dock In Dungarvan

A three mast, 100ft long schooner, 'The Kathleen and May' is planned to dock in Dungarvan this August, last Monday's meeting of Dungarvan Town Council heard.

The merchant ship, which was built in 1908 and was initially employed in carrying coal, china clay and cement bricks between ports in Britain and Ireland, is expected to attract large numbers of tourists to the town for its visit.

The schooner remained in active service until 1960 when it fell into disrepair and was restored first by the Duke of Edinburgh and then by the present owner Steve Clark.

It also has the distinction

of having been the last merchant schooner regisitered in the UK to earn her living carrying cargoes.

The schooner, which already docked in Youghal last year, is to be afforded a Civic Welcome by the Town Council when it arrives in two months time.

Proposing the welcome, Deputy Mayor, Nuala Ryan said as a maritime town, the visit of the Kathleen and May would be a real plus for the quays and the town as a whole.

"To see a three mast schooner dock in Dungarvan would be a great attraction and certainly it would create a lot of interest", Cllr. Nuala Ryan said.

Labour Cllr. Billy Kyne also backed the call for a civic welcome. He added that the Town Council should also look at giving a contribution to the ships owner as "there is obviously a great deal of upkeep and costs involved in keeping a ship like this afloat".

County Manager, Donal Connolly welcomed prospect of the visit of the historic vessel. He said Dungarvan Harbour could only be made more attractive to visitors by the visit of ships like the Kathleen and May.

He added that the council would look closely at the option of providing a contribution towards the ships up-

be put in place to ensure that Yard has remained closed set standards are maintained in the design and construction of buildings in Dungarvan, according to Cllr. Damien Dillon.

The Dungarvan based architect claimed that at present the criteria for developments are not well enough set down. This has led to harsh conditions being laid down and rigorously enforced on some developments, while in others, conditions have not been harsh enough.

Cllr. Dillon contrasted the conditions put on shopfronts in the town with the council's failure to enforce the conditions attached to granting permission for the new Credit Union building. He

claimed a walkway from A code of directives should Main Street into Scanlons despite these conditions.

"What happened to that entryway? For the elderly and for the disabled it would have been very convenient to walk into Scanlon's Yard from Grattan Square. Would that not be more important?" he asked.

An Taisce, who were a party to the Clancy Construction development appeal, were also criticised by the Independent Councillor as costing the country money and halting progress.

He accused the Heritage Trust of going overboard, although "not one significant piece of archaeology has ever been uncovered."

But, when building an extension onto his offices, he



claimed work was halted by An Taisce workmen who then used a jackhammer to carry out part of the excavation.

He said a code of practice was all important to ensure proper and fair measures in the planning and development process.

Development Strategy Must Create Sustainable Jobs - Cllı

A County Draft Development Strategy with the aim of improving the quality of life for the people of Co. Waterford must include job creating strategies, Cllr. Billy Kyne

The document presented to councillors by Director of Services Des Page was formulated after a public consultation programme on the needs of the public in Dungarvan and the county in general.

But, Labour Cllr. Billy Kyne believed that not enough job creating aims were included. He argued that the quality of life of the public wouldn't be improved without sustainable jobs, pointing to the example of the idle IDA Advance factory. Although he considered the efforts laudable, he called for the focus to be maintained on jobs and education facilities.

Cllr. Damien Dillon was also concerned about job creation. He asked whether the strategy contained a provision for the laying of a natural gas pipeline and other measures to help employment and the town's infrastruc-

He went on to criticise An Taisce, who were party to

drawing up the strategy saying often they have acted as a stumbling block to development and employment.

However, Mr. Page said that jobs were central to their plans and it was their aim to provide an environment where sustainable jobs can be created and where industries choose to locate. He believed that a structured approach was the best way forward to securing this.

Adding that the plans had been drawn L

up after two years research into the needs of the area, Mr. Page said the plans will see balanced development as a key to the strategy.

Town Clerk, Brian White believed the social inclusion aspect of the plan is all important, and conceded the current position in housing developments where the council acts as developer and landlord "is not good enough". He was hopeful that by working with social agencies more progressive housing developments would be created.







larity of growing herbs has television cooking programmes, combined with the move towards more natural or alternative therapies for health, have contributed towards this trend.

Additionally many cosmetic preparations boast of the benefits of their herbal ingredients, so it's little wonder that many of us are keen to try our hand at growing them.

Herbs are not only deliciously aromatic but also contribute to a variety of contrasting colours and forms to any balcony, patio or garden. If

A herb such as mint (Mentha spicata) is best confined to pots as it tends to be invasive if planted directly into the garden.

As a general rule, herbs enjoy lots of sun and a free-draining soil or compost. Those with variegated foliage are quite tolerant of light shade. Pineapple mint (Mentha suaveolens) is one such herb and is quite happy to be situated out of the heat of the midday sun.

insects like ladybirds and bees are an essential part of garden life.

These insects have a few simple needs: food, water, and shelter. Food has to be available for the adults, which sip nectar in the case of butterlies and bees, while ladybirds and wasps eat aphids and other pests.

Caterpillars are really picky about what they eat. Butterflies lay their eggs on the appropriate plants, so if you want butterflies in your garden, you will have to put up with

BUTTERFLIES and other 'good' caterpillars munching on your plants ing the nectar, transferring pollen from time to time. Some species of butterfly larvae (caterpillars) only eat one species of plant.

> In winter, ladybirds hibernate in sheltered spots, such as sheds or log piles. They emerge in spring and are looking to feed upon aphids, greenfly and blackfly. These pests can do a lot of damage to delicate new buds, and therefore the ladybird really is one of the gardener's best friends

They are usually attracted to purple, yellow or orange-coloured blooms.

Experts have found that they like rudbeckia, joe-pye weed, aster, butterfly weed, liatris, coreopsis, purple coneflower, zinnias, hollyhocks. marigolds, nasturtiums, violets, asters, butterfly bushes and lilacs, although generally, any flower with Butterflies and bees travel from short petals or flat tops as they are easy to land on.

THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

SOW PERENNIALS AND BIENNIALS

Most perennials and biennials if sown out of doors now will make good, sturdy plants for placing in their flowering position in the autumn. The most useful biennials are Canterbury bells and verbascums. Among the easiest to raise from seed are aquilegias. lupins, oriental poppies, hollyhocks and delphiniums. But there are many other things that you can try if you can obtain the seeds. Sow thinly in drills of 15 to 20 cm apart and cover with 0.5 to 2.5 cm of soil, according to the size of the seeds. Violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthus may also be sown outdoors, but it is preferable to choose a shady place for these.

PLACE CHRYSANTHEMUMS IN SUMMER POSITION

Chrysanthemums grown in pots will be better in the open from now. It is a good idea to make a special standing ground for them in an out-of the-way place. The soil should be well covered with ashes or gravel to give good drainage. The plants should be arranged in straight rows at least 75 cm apart, so you can easily move between them. Drive a stake into the ground at each end of each row, stretch a couple of wires between the pairs of stakes and attach each bamboo cane to the wires. This is the ideal method with exhibition chrysanthemums grown to a single stem. With decorative plants horizontal wires get in the

Hearing Loss: What causes Hearing Loss?

There are various causes of hearing loss, it is usually a symptom of an illness, the most common cause of hearing loss is age related and this is called presbycusia. Presbycusia usually begins in mid life and is due to wear and tear, which causes deterioration of the tiny hair cells that line the fluid-filled chamber in the middle ear (cochlea). The deterioration of the hair cells interrupts the transfer of sound waves to the inner ear and to the auditory nerve.

Other causes of hearing loss include in the following:

- Noise persistent exposure to loud noise can also destroy the tiny hair cells in the cochlea (Wearing ear protection in factories, can help to reduce cases).
- Tinnitus Tinnitus is a noise in the ear, such as a ringing or buzzing sound, it can start for no apparent reason, but the causes are usually associated with exposure to loud noises, a buildup of wax in the ear, the use of to much aspirin, diabetes and injuries to the ear. The symptoms may come and go or be constant; Tinnitus can cause other symptoms such as dizziness, nausea, and pressure on the ear.
- Labyrinthitis Labyrinthitis is usually caused by a viral infection in the vestibular nerve, the symptoms include severe vertigo, nausea, disturbances of eye movement, hearing loss.
- Otosclerosis Otosclerosis is an abnormal growth of bone in the inner ear, which results in hearing loss, the symptoms are progressive hearing loss. Otosclerosis is treated with surgery, the procedure is called 'stapedectomy', and other treatment for the condition is a hearing aid.
- Meniere's Disease Meniere's disease is a progressive disorder of the inner ear, which can happen in one ear or both ears, the cause of this is unknown, although it is thought to be caused by abnormal fluid action in the inner ear.
- Otitis Media Otitis media is an inflammation of the middle ear, and is sometimes described as an 'ear infection', it is cause by a bacteria which travels down the Eustachian tube from the throat into the middle ear, it is usually relieved with antibiotics.
- Earwax blockage This is an accumulation of wax which blocks the canal, sound waves cannot pass through the eardrum, and so hearing becomes muffled.
- Genetics Medical professional consider genetics to play a major role in sensorineural hearing loss, the most common inherited condition causing conductive hearing loss is 'otosclerosis', a degenerative disease that damages the small bones in the middle ear.
- Rubella Rubella in pregnancy was the main cause of congenital deafblindness before vaccinations were made available. Other causes of hearing loss include: Diabetes, Blood vessel disorders, including high blood pressure and arteriosclerosis, Tumors or a blood clot that affects the hearing part of the brain or the auditory nerves, Trauma to the ear or a penetrating injury and

LATE V. **REV. CONOR** DALY P.E.

Parish Priest of Ring, Old Parish (1982 - 1994)

A native of Waterford City, aged 76 yrs, Fr. Conor Daly was ordained to the priesthood almost 52 years ago. Working for the Lord and spreading the Good News he served in the parishes of Passage, Faithlegg, Modeligo, Clonmel, Waterford City and Ring/Old Parish. He began his priestly life across the Water in Newcastle on Tyne. A man of high intelligence, he was educated at Mercy Convent, Waterford, Mount Sion CBS and later at Mount Melleray. His priestly studies took him to the Maynooth College where he acquitted himself with dis-

tinction. A classical scholar he was an avid reader who possessed a most admirable thirst for knowledge and insight into the Word of the Lord. Although blessed with a wonderful mind and intellect he could easily communicate with his parishioners and was a great favourite with the young. A simple man he loved the simple things of life, a walk with his dog, meeting the flock and assisting and offering the healing hand of the Lord where possible. Fr. Conor will be missed, his passing has greatly saddened so many. When a scribe takes quill or pen to write the parochial history of Ring/Old Parish, Fr. Daly will be written of in deepest appreciation and with the sincere gratitude of the entire parish. Reposing at Waterford Regional Hospital Mortuary on Sunday with prayers recited by Fr. Art (hospital Chaplain) the funeral cortege left for Seípeal San Níoclás sa Rinn. Rt. Rev. Mgr. Michael Olden PP V.G. assisted by an tAth O Cuilleanáin S.P. led a full choir and clergy and over flowing church present in

prayful tribute. The readings were shared by Brendan (brother), Liam Suipéil (Bainisteori an Chólaiste); prayers of the faithful, Joe and Shay Daly (nephews), Pádraig Breathnach (Prìomh Oide Scoil Naisiunta na Rinne) and Aine O Ceallaigh (Priomh Oide an Méan Scoil); chan Sadie Breathnach an salm agus bhí ceol ar na piopaí againn ó Caoimhin O Fear-

gahil; Garda ónora ó C.L.C.G. na Rinne agus Scoil Náisiunta na Rinne;

Is cinnte go raibh árd mheas ag muintir na Rinne agaran tAith O Dáilaigh, cé go bhfuil se imithe ar shli na fírinne beidh ait speisealta inár gcroíthe dó igconaí a dúirt fear agus Gaeilge breá blasta na Rinne á labhairt aige.

It was early on Monday when Fr. Daly's remains were transferred to Old Parish Church to await his funeral Mass which would be a celebration of his life. Virtually every parish in the Diocese of Waterford and Lismore was represented by clergy and laity at Fr. Daly's Concelebrated requiem Mass. Chief Celebrant was his Lordship Dr. William Lee D.D. D.C.L. In his homily which was delivered in Irish and English he spoke in glowing terms of Fr. Conor, of his immense contribution to the Diocese and of his dedication as a good shepherd tending to his sheep.

The lessons were read by Bill O'Connell (nephew-inlaw) and Prionsias O Domhnaill, Priomh Oide while Prayers of the Faithful were shared by Maire Mariga (niece), Liam Daly (nephew), Marie Jo Breathnach, Francis Nugent and Caitriona Breathnach. Beautiful and much appreciated music was provided by Old Parish Church Choir with Maire Jo Breathnach, Caitriona Breathnach, Maire Ni Mhuiríosa agus Muintir Cófaigh. We thank Declan Terry for his eulogy, delivered in sincerity, it reflected the feelings of all present. Many a silent tear shed to lament the passing

of a beloved sagart. Pupils from the local National School brought the offertory gifts to the altar. Later, the staff and pupils of Scoil Náisiúnta Baile Mhic Airt, under School Principal Frank O'Donnell, formed a guard-of-honour from the Church to the grave - tributes richly deserved by Fr. Daly P.E. who has left a rich spiritual presence amongst his people.

A TRIBUTE **DELIVERED BY DECLAN TERRY** AT THE FUNERAL **OBSEQUIES OF FR.** CONOR DALY PE.

It is just two years since we gathered here with Fr. Daly to celebrate his golden jubilee. It was a simple celebration in accordance with his wishes - Mass here in the Church, then down to the hall for a "little get together" as he would describe it, where he had a chance to meet people and they in turn wished him well and thanked him for all his kindness. In seipéal Na Rinne last night and again here today, we have heard Fr. Daly described as a man with a brilliant mind, a classical scholar and a widely read theologean. My limitations and ignorance prevent me from paying similar tributes. rather would I like to mention some of the other traits which endeared him to so Séipeal Breith na Maighdine, many. His love of the simple things in life, his plainness (if such a word exists) and his ability to bond with everybody. I have no doubt that Fr. Daly would be at ease and comfortable in a roomful of theologians, discussing the loftiest principles of theology, but I am also certain that he would be equally at home among a group of giddy children on first Communion day. Indeed just a few weeks ago despite his rapidly failing health, he was here to celebrate that special day with the local children.

He was not a man to get in-

volved in or excited about trivialities. He always seemed to have a view of what he often called the bigger picture and all things were prioritised with the bigger picture always very much in mind. On the night of the golden jubilee celebration I, just like today, had the honour of paying a small tribute to Fr. Daly and in the days leading up to it, I tried to come up with something suitable to mark the occasion. My mind went back to a little story which I told and I think it is equally

suitable here today. As I have already said Fr. Daly enjoyed the simple things of life, like taking his dog for a walk and chatting with anybody who came his way. One route which he walked took him down Ballinamona past the gate of Nicholas Terry (go ndeana Dia trocaire air). On Summer evenings Nicholas would sit on a chair at his gate and chat with passersby. A strong friendship soon developed between the old man on the seat and the man with the dog.

I know that many an interesting conversation took place over the bars of that old gate. I was coming home from work one evening and I stopped to have a word with Nicholas just as Fr. Daly was leaving the gate to continue his walk. As I rolled down the window Nicholas said, "I'll tell you one thing" he said, looking after Fr. Daly, that's one great priest and a grand man".

That I decided was the phrase I was looking for and I can think of no theory more appropriate as we pay our final tribute here today. Céad slán leat a Shagairt dhílis. You always treated us with dignity and respect.

You are now paying us the ultimate tribute by choosing your final resting place beneath the green sod of Sean Phobal where you will always be fondly remembered as "one great priest and a

The Science of Farming and Food THINK SAFETY AND TAKE ACTION

Electrical Installations:

- Have a competent electrician examine the electrical installations on your farm and upgrade if necessary. Be familiar with the standards of electrical installation, read the ESB leaflet "Farm Well, Farm Safely,
- Ensure that all plugs are correctly wired and that cables are sound. Only use waterproof fittings in damp locations. All sockets should be protected by 30 milliAmp Residual Current Device (R.C.D.)
- Look -out for overhead cables and observe safe clearance distances. Consult the ESB for further information.

DAIRYING

Grassland: Grazing techniques

Have you enough grass ahead of cows/stock? This is indicated by rotation length and/or grass cover. A short rotation, 17 days or less, indicates a potential grass shortage. Where grass is adequate, the difficulty is to utilise it with minimum wastage and poaching damage. Current weather conditions dictate that spring grazing techniques must be used. Consider some or all of the following:

- On-off grazing: Give cows/cattle access to grazing for 2-3 hours after morning milking and again after evening milking. Remove to farmyard immediately grass has been eaten. As cows do most walking damage when it is raining avoid turnout when rain is forecast and house immediately if it starts raining.
- Graze from back of paddock: To prevent poaching of grazed ground, start grazing from the back of the paddock. Prevent access to yesterdays grazed area by back-fencing.
- Several entrances: To reduce soiling of grass from roadways and gaps it would be advisable to have several access points
- Cow paths: These are narrow (2m wide), temporary walkways used to give cows access to the back of long, awkward paddocks.
- Allocation: This depends, but as a general rule give 0.5 acres for 40 cows for each milking. This is an area of approximately 50 metres X 50 metres (square block the best).

Pending grass shortage

Due to late silage cutting and short grazing rotations it is very likely that grass shortages will occur during the next 2-6 weeks. Those shortages can be prevented by some or all of the following

- Nitrogen: Apply 40 units of nitrogen per acre on all of the grazing area when conditions allow. Focus particularly on drier fields on wet farms. If this action isn't taken grass shortages will be prolonged.
- Feed meal: Decide on the best strategy for your farm
- Feed silage: There are two options available. Graze uncut silage ground or feed pit/baled silage. If at all possible grazed the uncut silage crop but pre-cutting would be advised to maximise utilisation. Even zero grazing (drawing grass to animals in house) might be a cheaper option than feeding pit silage.
- Sell cattle: If planning to sell cattle in the autumn, serious consideration should be given to selling now. This will reduce grass demand.

Recovering grass quality

Under-grazing, no topping, and little or no nitrogen has resulted in grass of poor quality being grazed. How can this be

- Topping: If and when ground conditions allow, this must be a priority, but rotation length must be increased by 3-4 days.
- Pre-cutting: Best practised in dry weather. This results in high grass utilisation - re-growth will be of excellent quality. It is best to practice when heavy covers have to be grazed, but only cut down enough grass for every 24-hour period. However, only allocate grass for 12 hours.
- Rolling: Avoid this as it smears and compacts the topsoil, as well as bruising grass leaves resulting in less grass growing.
- Reseeding: Some severely damaged paddocks may need to be harrowed and grass seed sown. Do when ground conditions allow.

Too much grass

This may arise because of housing. Before cows are back out grazing full-time, identify the strongest paddocks and remove as To use up this surplus grass, no meals should be fed cows are out full-time. This will help to recover some of the excess costs incurred during this weather crisis.

INSTALLATION AID SCHEME CHANGES

The Department of Agriculture recently announced some important changes to the Installation Aid Scheme.

- The upper limit of 150 income units between on and off farm income has been removed. A minimum of 20 income units from farming is required with no maximum.
- The initial application (IASI) with accompanying documentation must be lodged with the Department of Agriculture within 6 months of the date of Setup. This period has been increased from 4 months.
- Farmers who were set-up in the period between 1/1/2000 and 7/5/2002 and who failed to qualify for the scheme because they exceeded the upper income limit of 150 I.U.'s may now lodge an application by 31/12/2002.
- The premium payable to eligible applicants remains at 9,523 euros.

I am happy that the unique prestige in which he was held is being recorded in his native Clonmel to respect and remember. His wife Eily remarked that Frank would probably have been embarrassed to have a statue erected in his honour, but she said it would be worthwhile if it inspired future generations to arise and follow their dreams. Joining the Patterson family at the moving ceremony in the town's civic centre in the Borstal Car Park was a large gathering of Frank's American friends, who provided funding for the statue. They included Jerry McKenna from Texas, who first suggested the idea in a letter to Clonmel Borough Council in 2000. The American visitors said that Clonmel had done itself proud by organising the weekend series of events to commemorate the life of one of the towns greatest sons.

Tipperary At Full Strength

Inside sources have stated that Tipperary with all their forces available, will show little or any change from the side which represented them in their two championship games so far this year.

Twelve of the team have Munster and All-Ireland medals. Brendan Cummins in goal, Tom Costello, Philip Maher (full back), Donncha Fahy, Eamon Corcoran, David Kennedy at centre half back, and Paul Kelly will likely form their defence There are rumours of a switch involving Tommy Dunne (team captain and man of and Conor Gleeson. Noel Morris who made his very successful debut against Clare this year will partner one or other at centre field. In attack we may see a reshaping of the section but it seems likely that the outstanding sharpshooter Eoin Kelly (who scored 12 points against Limerick), will play at right corner forward, John O'Brien and Eoin O'Neill may com-(man of the match against Limerick), Lar Corbett, Liam Cahill, Seamus Butler,

Michael Ryan, etc. being considered for the other placings.

TIPPERARY'S RECORD

The Premier county have won the Munster senior hurling championship on 36 occasions while Waterford's total of wins is just 5 (1938, 1948, 1957, 1959 and 1963). In the past half century, our counties have met in the Munster final on 4 occasions and Tipperary have won 3 of these. 1958 Tipp. 4-12 Waterford 1-5; 1962 Tipp. 5-14 Waterford 2-3; 1989 Tipp. 0-26 Waterford 2-8. The exception was in 1963 when we defeated them by 0-11 to 0-8. Of course in earlier rounds before the finals, we did have some sweet victories like 1958 at Cork Athletic Grounds when we led them by 8-2 to no score at halftime.

Our most recent victory has already been referred to and this was the semifinal four years ago in Cork and after which we went on to lose to Kilkenny in the All-Ireland semi-final after the Clare Munster final debacle.

But all records are water under the bridge as far as the present and future are concerned and what counts now is what will happen at Pairc Ui Caoimh on Sunday afternoon.

WATERFORD CONFIDENCE **GROWING**

Although our performance and our victory over a very fancied Cork team in the semi-final in Thurles on May 26th was downgraded in some quarters when it was stated that the match was a bit substandard. We like to look at it in a different light and treat it as a hard earned and well deserved victory over a strong Cork 15 who were very unlucky to lose to Kilkenny by a single point in the national league final two weeks earlier

Since the semi-final, things have been working out well for Waterford and training is reported to be going "superbly" well. NO WATERFORD TEAM

Once again it is the old story of the team not being available to the media until around midweek.

It took several telephone calls over the weekend before I was told that the team was not being released until Tuesday

We had expected and we thought that it was not too much to ask that the team to play in the Munster senior hurling final would be available on Monday for preview. It is most disappointing, but not wishing to rock the boat in the lead up to this vital match, I will reserve comment on the decision.

There have been rumours about who is being dropped but in the absence of official informationwe can only write about the speculation surrounding the selection.

The rumours have Brian Greene at corner back and if this happens, it will involve a reshaping of the defence. Stephen Brennar who continues to prove himself a top class keeper will be in goal. Most speculators had expected the defence who began and ended without change against Cork to be given a vote of confidence. The threat of Eoin Kelly in

the Tipperary attack is obviously causing concerns among the selectors. James Murray started rather shakily against Cork but steadied after ten minutes and played brilliantly. Tom Feeney playing in the fullback position for the first time in championship acquitted himself very well as did Brian Flannery in the left corner. Team captain Fergal Hartley played a commanding role at centre half back and got splendid back up from Peter Queally and Eoin Murphy, making a successful championship debut. This section of the team may well be retained intact.

At centrefield Tony Browne can again be partnered by Dave Bennett. Browne in form can prove a vital cog in the wheel. Bennett (many were surprised to see him replaced against Cork) can also be fitted in the attack as he lies in third this year.

The matter of positioning Brian Greene now comes into question and I wonder if Queally will be played at centre field and Greene placed in the halfback line in his accustomed position,

This would leave Dave Bennett available for inclusion in attack where we have 9 or 10 players for the 6 positions. Two of the six will be Paul Flynn and Ken McGrath, match winners if in form on the day. Andy Moloney has yet to satisfy everyone that he is adequate for the centre forward spot. All our players are fit and fully determined to mount a mighty challenge to Tipperary who are undoubtedly a splendid hurling outfit, very worthy Munster and All-Ireland champions and will be difficult to overcome. They are the raging hot favourites with the bookmakers and the public. But having said that, I feel that their form against a poor Limerick team gave them something of a misleading profile.

I honestly believe that we are in here with a good chance and if all our players hit form, we can win.

TICKETS

The demand for tickets is as great as it was in 1998 and because the number available is less because of the venue, there may be disappointments.

Abbeyside Reference Archive

MAGINE

We have added the first edition of the new quarterly magazine entitled "Imagine" to our collection.

This magazine is published by the Tallow Writers Group and deals with writing, arts and debate.

We welcome this new addition to the market and wish all involved with the production well for the future. This Sunday evening Eddie Cantwell will be at the Parish Office minding the new magazine and visitors will be most welcome along.

LOCAL HISTORY

In 1659 a census of sorts was held throughout Ireland by the Cromwellian regime. It was not detailed, as modern censuses are.

For example, it gives the number of Irish surnames in each barony but not the actual names of individuals, except the names of those with a title to property. This census appears to have been taken for taxation purposes.

The surnames in "Deaces" Barony, later the Baronies of Deices within and Decies without where Dungarvan is in a central position, are not the surnames of the native merchants. The population of the barony was given as 3, 703 of whom 129 were English, about 4%, one of the three lowest in the county.

The population of Dungarvan town is given as 213 of which 35 were English. This is about 16%.

"Dungarvan Towne and halfe plowland thereunto belonging" are now under the names of Francis Vaughan gentleman, John Dalton gentleman, Richard Williams gentleman, Thomas Swann gentleman and Michael Hore, merchant. So in spite of the plantation there was one of the Hore's still in a position of influence in town.

In Abbeyside James Oldfield gentleman, is noted as holding the title of "the Abbeyside", probably Captain James Oldfield who leased the towerhouse in Abbeyside with the lands at and around the old friary and towerhouse. There were 44 people on this land, only three of which were English, presumably Oldfield, his wife and child.





The wide running Toss Joy and Folly Lotto attempted to get on terms with Narabane Dancer but the leader kept going in fine style to defeat a running on Bartlemy Rd Sue.

Enniscorthy marathon stake winner In A Cooperone was all the rage in heat four and the Cait Turner owned 5/4 favourite duly did the business in a creditable 40.77. Hy Brazil Blue set the early gallop but relishing her rails draw I'm A Cooperone cruised into a third bend lead. Recovering

well from a disastrous start Mountaylor Glory went in pursuit of the winner but increasing her lead with every strode Im A Cooperone won going away by eight lengths.

The E Ching owned Truleigh Heather (Truleigh His-Charlevile Gold) produced a career best performance to take the first graded race in an eye catching 29.05. Kellsboro Lucy broke in front but Truleigh Heather 5/2 cornered in front to motor clear for a well deserved four lengths success.

The second event produced an exciting finish. When lans Prince ran wide off the first bend hampering Tree Tops Hotel and Mexican Jack we were basically down to three runners. Not Good Enough made the long break for home ahead of Dunmain Jo and while Dunmain Jo hit the front over the closing two bends the Laurence Rowe and Diarmuid Anglim owned Clearmor Queen (Chart King-Cushie Terri) 5/1 came with a well timed challenge on the wide outside to pounce close home for a short head victory over Dunmain Jo in 29.27. lans Prince damaged a hock in this race and is unlikely to race again.

A 300 yard sprint went to 6/1 outsider Rugged Ranger (Come On Ranger-South Lodge Lady). Owned by the Second Generation Syndicate and trained by Niall Dunne Rugged Ranger packed to much early dash for a fast starting Bally Dean to shoot clear for a length win over Bally Dean with a slow starting 5/4 favourite Hes Brandy back in third. The winning time was a fast 16.35.

The camera was called upon to sort out the principals in a tightly graded fourth contest. Seafield Fagin (Droopys Fintan-Seafield Fagin) 4/1 made the long break for home ahead of Shergar Star but the leader looked in trouble as Big Pockets cruised up to join issue at the penultimate turn. Back To Harry was sent off the 6/4 favourite in the fifth but after a moderate start the favourite failed to get in a blow at the principals. Those principals included the Slip Syndicate owned and Mick Cronin trained Water Bank (Frisby Flashing-Ciabatta) 2/1 this early paced sort sticking to the business in hand to beat a fast finishing Thandis Mikki by three quarters of a length in a best ever 27.97.

The final contest of the night was decided over the 550 yard trip. There was very little in it on the run to the first bend where Lightening Cover took over in the lead from the rails seeking Cooly Merson. Owned by Ger Healy and trained by Damain Quigley Cooly Merson 2/1 drove up the inside of Lightening Cover midway down the back stretch and lengthening his stride the popular Cooly Merson who never runs a bad race came home five and a quarter lengths clear of Lightening Cover in a sweet 29.97.

There was some unscheduled post race entertainment when a male streaker ran the length of the home stretch. The streaker was rumoured to be an English visitor obviously frustrated at England being knocked out of the World Cup although one prominent local owner/trainer suggested that the streaker was sent back from England for fighting and was having a clearance trial after racing.
