Deise Erupts As Waterford Win Munster Hurling Title

Waterford Senior Hurlers Bridge 39 Year Gap

Thirty-nine years of heartache and fruitless endeavour was finally laid to rest for Waterford's hurlers and their loyal supporters on Sunday last, as the Deise clinched their first Senior Munster Hurling title since 1963. Urged on by the majority of a capacity crowd in Pairc Ui Chaoimh, Water-

ford overcame the shackles of the past provincial title famine to defeat reigning All-Ireland champions, Tipperary, on a scoreline of 2-23 to 3-12.

Producing a thrilling display of skill and stamina Waterford were more than just deserving of their eight-point victory margin. Scoring a remarkable 1-18 from open

play, the Deise, who had been dubbed the nearly men of Munster Hurling and criticised as a 35-minute team, produced as comprehensive a performance as has ever been seen in a provincial decider.

All six forwards scored from play, with substitute Dave Bennett joining in on the act while Man of the Match, Ken MacGrath led by example, scoring seven points from open play.

Eoin Kelly, a 19 year old who was savouring his first summer at senior inter-county level was among several players who came of age in the hallowed surroundings of Pairc Ui Chaoimh. Eoin MacGrath and John Mullane also helped stretch Tipperary's defence beyond breaking point while in defence, Fergal Hartley produced a vintage display ensuring a rock solid showing by Waterford in the last quarter.

Hartley wasn't the only veteran to sparkle, as Tony Browne, after a poor first half, covered the whole of the ground in the second and ghosted in for Waterford's crucial second goal after 53 minutes.

Paul Flynn, although perhaps not firing on all cylinders, still scored 1-6, including a trademark goal from a 20-metre free. A vital figure in so many of Waterford's games in the past, this time it was all about the squad and when he was called ashore, the wheels failed to fall off the Deise's rollercoaster ride to the title.

Even as past ghosts seemed likely to be resurrected when

Tipperary scored two of their three goals in quick succession to take the lead, Waterford didn't crumble. Instead, their response to each goal proved defiant and emphatic, striking back on both occasions with a flurry of points that appeared to crush Tipperary's normally rock-solid nerve.

Leading by an eight point cushion in the last remaining minutes, the Deise's supporters, many of whom had never before seen a Munster final victory, almost dared

not believe it possible. But, with the final whistle drawing the game to a close, Justin McCarthy's determination that 39 years of hurt would not turn into 40, proved well founded, with the result heralding scenes of jubilation in Pairc Ui Chaoimh.

But, the scenes were not confined to the Cork ground. They were mirrored right throughout Waterford, with the teams' heroic return sparking massive celebrations. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 2**

tions almost every step of their journey throughout West Waterford and into Dungarvan.

All roads lead to the county town, as cars festooned with banners and flags, converged on Grattan Square to honour the historic victory.

The teams' homecoming to the county town was greeted by a sea of blue and white as Grattan Square became awash with colour and played host to 10,000 supporters, who gave the victors a rousing welcome home.

Greeting the team, Mayor of the County and former County Board Chairman, Ciarain O Riain described the Munster Final display as one of the great Waterford performances.

"I've heard great men, who've won many honours in the game in the past, say this was the most skillful display of hurling they'd ever seen in their time", Cllr. O Riain said.

The ecstatic welcome for the players, each of whom were cheered to the rafters by the huge crowd which had begun to gather two hours

earlier, truly mirrored the feelings of pride which pervaded the county on Sunday while a special cheer was given to Waterford's talismanic coach, Justin McCarthy.

"I am thrilled for the players, I'm thrilled also for the County Board, but most of all I'm thrilled for the genuine Waterford supporters who have suffered more than most over the years and yet have remained steadfast in their loyalty to the team", McCarthy said of the experience.

Waterford's inspirational captain, Fergal Hartley, also found the victory and the response from their huge band of supporters almost overpowering.

"Day's like this don't come too often for Waterford hurling. I just felt it in my bones that we would do the business today," the Deise skipper said. "It's a brilliant, brilliant feeling".

The Civic Reception, which had been in the pipe-line for the past week, was also attended by Dungarvan Town Mayor, Cllr. Teresa Wright, Mayor of Waterford City, Ollie Clery along with County Board Chairman, Paddy Joe Ryan.

Mr. Ryan congratulated all those involved in the teams tremendous victory and thanked the Gardai, the Town Council and Tom Keith for their work on the celebrations. He also paid particular tribute to Justin McCarthy, Colm Bonnor and captian Fergal Hartley for their role in delivering the historic win.

Last Monday, it was the Cities turn to bestow the honours on the Fergal Hartley and his teammates while Paddy Joe Ryan confirmed that the team will continue to celebrate throughout this week before preparing for the All-Ireland semi-final and hopefully more history in the making for the Deise.

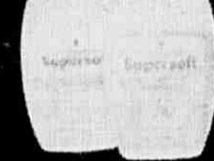

Dungarvan Sewerage Scheme To Begin Construction This Year

Dungarvan Sewerage Scheme has been approved to commence construction this year under the Department's Water Services Investment Programme 2002-2004.

The long-awaited eur28 m scheme, had been subject to a series of setbacks and a standoff between the Departments of the Marine and

Environment due to stringent conditions placed on its running.

While the signing of contract documents last year appeared to leave the path open for its go-ahead, approval to go to tender was only given last month.

But, Minister for the Environment, Martin Cullen, in response to a Dail question from Deputy Brian O'Shea confirmed that the next

stage is ready to proceed.

This stage will involve the invitation to tender, which will soon be made in Ireland and overseas by Waterford County Council. The winning company is then expected to have control of its design, construction and operation as part of its contract.

Minister Cullen confirmed that "it is now a matter for Waterford County Council to invite tenders for this ele-

ment of the scheme".

The nature of the contract itself could create some controversy with union officials who are concerned over the control given to the winning company.

Labour Councillor and Union representative, Billy Kyne has already stated that the plant should be manned by Waterford County Council workers adding that the Co. Manager would be "ill-advised to lose control of the operation".

Some preliminary investigative work has already been carried out on the site, located on part of the former Quigley Magnesite Plant in Ballinacourty.

It will connect up to the main sewerage line and is being hailed as a means towards encouraging new developments in the Ballinacourty area.

Deputy O'Shea said he has taken up the matter of the earliest possible submission of Waterford County Council's tender recommendation for the collection and delivery system for the scheme and the earliest possible invitation of tenders for the wastewater treatment plant.

Monument Unveiled To The 1916 Rebels Interned In Wales

On Saturday 29th June last a monument to commemorate those interned in the aftermath of the 1916 Easter Rising was unveiled in the tiny Welsh village of Frongoch. The village, near Bala in Gwynedd housed a camp for 1,800 inmates and became known as the University of Revolution - due to the activities of the Irish Republican Brotherhood. Irish language classes were organised and a branch of Conradh na Gaeilge was set up in the concentration camp which was a former Welsh whiskey distillery. West Waterford has a connection with Frongoch as Liam O'Reagain, from Ring and John Geoghan from Stradbally where imprisoned there as was Domhnall O Buachalla who had connections and family in the Dungarvan area. The internees were held in terrible conditions, for example the whole camp was rat infested. The internees did not let the conditions get them down, instead they held classes and on their return to Ireland helped organise the Republican movement and later engaged the might of the British Empire in the War of Independence. It was Liverpool branch of Conradh an Gaeilge, supported by Welsh community activists which erected the solid bronze monument. Jim Carroll the Cardiff based Consular General of Ireland attended the unveiling, as did many locals and people who had travelled over from Ireland. For the event, it was fitting that such a large crowd attended to remember those who were held in Frongoch Camp.

Miraculous Escape After Accident In Kinsalebeg Cross

Four occupants of a vehicle who were involved in an accident on a dangerous stretch of road near Youghal Bridge, had a miraculous escape from serious injury last week.

The car they were travelling in collided with a stationary JCB and overturned at around 3.15pm on Wednesday afternoon last, near Kinsalebeg Cross in West Waterford.

Three bridges from Youghal, Middleton and Ardmore attended the scene as did Youghal Gardaí. It took some time to remove the four occupants from the car and they were subsequently taken by ambulance to Cork Regional Hospital.

A spokesman from the Gardaí in Youghal, confirmed that no serious injuries had occurred and traffic continued to operate on one lane throughout the rest of the afternoon although major tailbacks also resulted.

The narrow stretch of road where the crash occurred has already been subject to concerns raised in Waterford County Council and described as a fatality waiting to happen by local Cllr. Tom Cronin at the April meeting.

Realignment proposals have also been made to the NRA and the council is currently awaiting approval for CPO documents.

Nelson Mandela

In the 1950s and 1960s Nelson Mandela was an important leader in the African National Congress (ANC) which fought hard against white minority rule and the unfair apartheid system, which separated black and white people.

The ANC was an illegal organisation and in 1962 Mandela was sent to prison. There he became a symbol of the struggle to end apartheid.

There was much rejoicing when he was eventually released in 1990, and in 1994 he was elected the country's first black president. He has become one of the world's most popular leaders.



The Oudtshoorn Ostriches

Near Oudtshoorn, special farms breed ostriches for their feathers, which are used in the fashion industry. These strange birds are the biggest on earth, growing up to 2.4 metres tall. They are flightless, but can run at 50 kilometres an hour if they need to escape. They also lay giant eggs, so big that one would be enough to make an omelette for 12 people!

Table Mountain

A cable car takes us to the top of Table Mountain in just six minutes, so make sure you are watching as the buildings disappear beneath you. The cable car service was opened in 1929 and today carries nearly 300,000 people every year. From the top of Table Mountain you have fantastic views over the city and port of Cape Town. You can also see Cape Point, where the Atlantic and Indian Oceans meet, and Robben Island, where Nelson Mandela was held in prison.

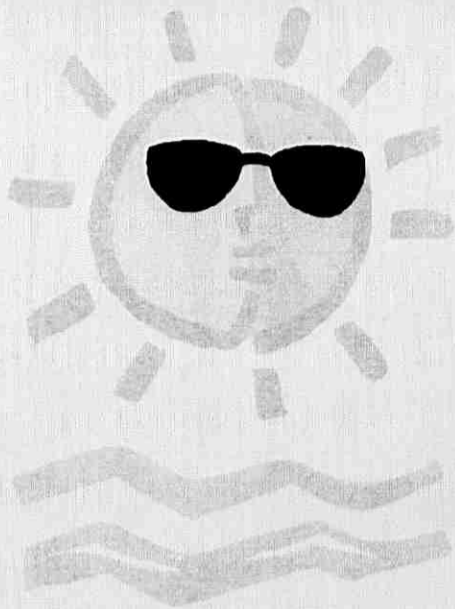

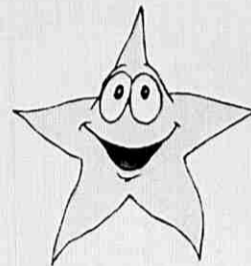

Measures Urged For Expulsion of Disruptive Councillors

Kevin Kirrane New measures have been urged by a former Waterford County Council Chairperson to govern over disorderly behaviour in Council Chambers including the suspension of disruptive councillors. Cllr. Nora Flynn as Chairperson in 1998-1999 had

been forced to abandon a meeting when a heated argument erupted in council chambers on the issue of housing for travellers.

While no serious problems have occurred in recent years, she said when the problems happened during one of the meetings she had chaired, she had been left with no option other than to cancel the meeting.

"You can talk as much as you like about the Chairperson standing up and removing the chain of office, but what I feel is that there was no back door other than to cancel the meeting".

Cllr. Flynn urged the council to consider suspending unruly councillors for the following meeting to allow the council to get on with their business.

"Otherwise how else are we to get on with the important business that's on the agenda. If not people will be left waiting for decisions on

planning and developments", she said. But, despite the problems which were encountered in the past, the new standing orders introduced during the last meeting still provide no cover if they get out of hand, she said.

However, the new standing orders dictating the running of council business, received a broad welcome from the Mayor of Waterford County Ciarán O Riain.

The veteran Fianna Fail Councillor, who will be Mayor until next month's AGM, said that most of the council's running order is covered under the new rules.

However, delays and repeated questioning from councillors were blamed by the Mayor, for the loss of motions put forward previously by councillors. This, Cllr. O Riain said, has resulted in "people asking the same questions five or six times".

The Ballymacarbry based councillor, called on other representatives to revisit the standing orders and call a halt to the delays which have stifled the council's business.

COOKERY CORNER

Tasty Summer Dish

Preparation: 20 min

Cooking: 10 min

A TASTY supper dish for the family this summer.

INGREDIENTS (serves 6-8)

- 4 medium-sized ham steaks
- 4 sheet-ready rolled shortcrust pastry
- 2tsp prepared mustard
- 8 thin slices cheddar cheese
- 440g can asparagus spears, well drained
- salt and freshly ground pepperto taste
- oil for deep frying

CUT each sheet of pastry in half, so you end up with eight strips of pastry. Cut the ham steaks in half. Fill a large pan or deep fryer two thirds full with oil. While oil is heating prepare the parcels. Place a ham steak half on one strip of pastry. Spread ham steak with mustard. Top with a slice of



cheese and two asparagus spears. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Brush the edges of the pastry with a little water. Fold the pastry over the ham steak to form a parcel.

Seal the edges by pressing all around with a fork. Repeat with the remaining pastry and ingredients. You will end up with eight parcels in all. Place the parcels seam side down in the hot oil. Fry until

golden brown and crisp. Using a metal fish slice turn over and fry until golden brown on the other side – approximately 2 minutes' frying time for each side. Serve with a crisp green salad.

Apple Strudel - it's irresistible!

CRISP filo pastry leaves and sweet apples combined make this delicious pudding irresistible.

Ingredients:

- Makes 2 strudels, 6 to 8 servings each
- 8 tart apples, sliced
 - 1 3/4 cups real butter, melted
 - 3/4 cup ground almonds
 - 3/4 cup sugar
 - 3/4 cup raisins
 - 1 cup fine bread crumbs
 - 200 g (1/2 box) filo leaves, thawed
 - 2 x 5 ml sp cinnamon
 - 1 x 15 ml sp lemon rind, grated

Method:

Mix the apples with the raisins, lemon rind, sugar, cinnamon, and almonds. Then set aside. Place one filo leaf on a piece of kitchen roll and brush it with the melted butter. Place a second leaf on

top of the first and brush with butter again.

Repeat this process until five leaves have been used, using about 1/4 a cup of the butter. Cook and stir the breadcrumbs with 1/4 cup of butter until lightly browned. Sprinkle 3/4 cup of the butter-fried breadcrumbs on the layered filo leaves. Now, mound half of the apple filling in an 8cm strip along the narrow end of the filo, leaving a 5cm border. Lift the kitchen roll, and use it to roll the filo leaves over the apples. Brush the top of the strudel with butter and sprinkle with two 15ml spoonfuls of the buttered breadcrumbs.

Repeat the entire procedure for the second strudel. Bake the strudels at 400° F/180° C for 20 to 25 minutes, until browned. Serve hot with custard, cream or ice-cream. Be careful when eating as the apple filling will be piping hot.

Arkansas style cheesecake

THICK and creamy cheesecake which is quick and easy to make – what are you waiting for?

Ingredients:

- Makes 8 servings
- 1 egg, separated
 - 1 x 5 ml sp vanilla
 - 1 1/2 cup cottage cheese
 - 1/8 x 5 ml sp salt
 - 1/2 cup skimmed milk
 - 1/4 pint double cream
 - 6 x 15 ml sp Angel Delight
 - 1 x 15 ml sp lemon juice
 - 1 x 15 ml sp sugar substitute
 - 1 packet gelatine

Method:

Take the cottage cheese and cream, and blend until very smooth. Then set aside. Put the egg yolk in the top of a double boiler and beat well, then add the milk. Next, add the gelatine and salt. Cook the mixture over boiling water until the gelatine

dissolves and the mixture thickens – this will take about 10 minutes. Remove from the heat and add the sugar substitute. Leave to cool.

Add the cottage cheese and cream mixture, lemon juice and vanilla to cooled gelatine mixture.

When thoroughly mixed, chill – stirring occasionally – until the mixture mounds when dropped from a spoon. Beat the egg white until stiff. Fold the egg white and Angel Delight together, then mix into the cottage cheese mixture.

Pour the cheesecake filling into a ready-made crust. Or, pour into pie plate and top with crumb topping. To make the crumb topping, crush two digestive biscuits and mix with a pinch of cinnamon and nutmeg.

Serve chilled with whipped cream and fresh fruit.

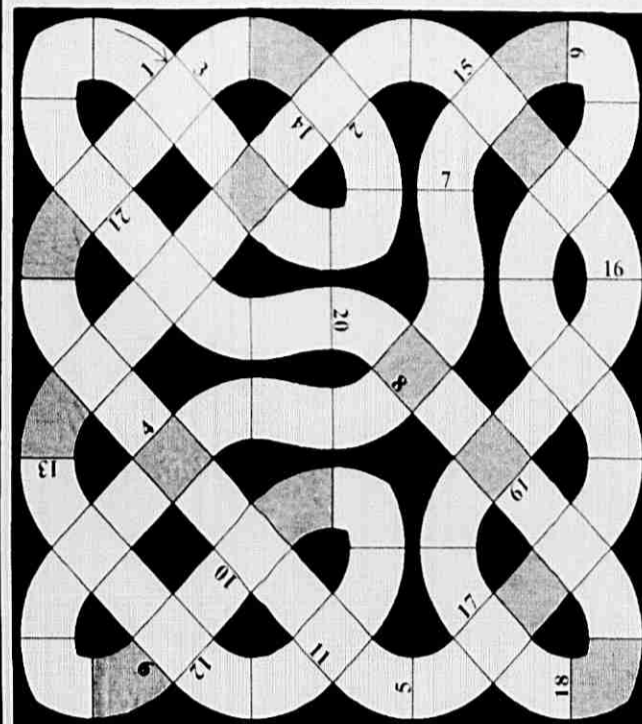

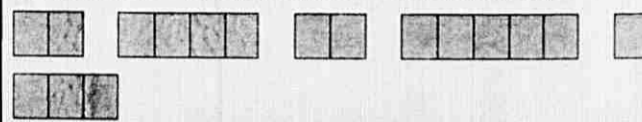

Lola O'Sullivan Elected Unopposed As Co. Mayor

Last Monday's Annual Meeting of Waterford County Council saw the appointment of the county's third Mayor in as many months, with the local authority's youngest member, Cllr. Lola O'Sullivan, taking the reins.

The appointment of the Tramore Councillor follows Deputy Ollie Wilkinson's departure from the post due to legislation barring TD's from heading up the council, while long serving Ballymacarbery representative, Cllr. O Riain filled the absent position for the remaining month.

Her election had been a virtual certainty, with the power swapping arrangement for the position between Fianna Fail and Fine Gael, copper fastening the post.

Labour's three members also backed the Fine Gael candidate who was deemed elected unopposed, having been proposed by Cllr. John Carey and seconded by Cllr. Mary Green.

Cllr. Green described it as appropriate that her colleague, who she said is deeply involved in sport, take the office on the same week

that Waterford's hurlers captured the Munster crown.

While the two previous Mayors held high ranking positions within the GAA, Cllr. Green said her colleague "may not be a former Chairman of the County Board but, as far as I'm concerned, she's the next best thing."

Labour Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, said his vote "hardly mattered" because of the political pact. "But," he said "I'm a socialist and by extension a feminist and I'm conscious of taking every opportunity of promoting women in politics".

"I think all you need to do is look around you in here to realise that women are not as well represented as they should be", he said in support of Cllr. O'Sullivan's nomination.

The new Mayor of County Waterford described the unopposed appointment as the greatest honour that can be bestowed on a councillor and set out a number of aims for the year ahead.

These include the earliest introduction of the Tramore and Dungarvan Sewerage

Schemes which, she said, are of the greatest importance to locals and tourists alike.

Another aim of the Mayor's term she said is the completion of the Civic Offices, which would provide better facilities for councillors, while other wishes are the improvement of recreational facilities across the county.

"I can also assure the members of this council of being fair and impartial", she said and joked that "as everyone supported my nomination, I suppose I don't have much choice in that."

Carrying out her first official duty as Mayor of the County, Lola O'Sullivan deemed Cllr. Ciarain O Riain Deputy after he too was elected unopposed.

A number of tributes were paid, meanwhile, to the two previous holders of the council's top ranking position. Cllr. James Tobin said he was sure Cllr. O Riain's dreams were fulfilled when he took part in the Civic welcome for the victorious Waterford hurlers.

He also congratulated his Lismore electoral area colleague Deputy Wilkinson for

his year stating that "people on all sides of the county can be assured that Ollie will represent them well".

Cllr. Billy Kyne also paid personal appreciation to the two former Mayor's adding that Deputy Wilkinson in particular had a tremendous year culminating in his general election victory.

"It's an onerous task", the Labour Deputy said "but I've no doubt Deputy Wilkinson will fulfil that role with no fear or favour."

Lismore Town Council Elects New Mayor

Lismore Town Council has appointed Independent Councillor, John Campion to the most senior position in the local authorities ranks - Mayor of the Town - taking over the role from Fine Gael's Davy Whelan.

The new leader, who will represent the council at all official functions, was proposed by Cllr. Peter Ahern and seconded by Cllr. Dick Canning at Monday night's AGM.

Stating his ambitions for the coming year, Cllr. Campion suggested members re-familiarise themselves with the Standing Orders and encouraged his colleagues to come forward with ideas which can be followed through.

He hoped for more continuity from meet-

ing to meeting and will lobby the relevant authority right through to conclusion.

Cllr. John Campion takes over from Cllr. Davy Whelan who had achieved a number of firsts during his term in office. He became the first Chairman of the newly named Lismore Town Council and the first Mayor of Lismore.

Cllr. Mark Khan of the Labour Party will take over the role of Deputy Mayor. He was proposed by former party colleague Cllr. Bernard Leddy and seconded by Cllr. Dick Canning.

Other appointments made on the night saw Cllr. Jimmy O'Gorman re-elected to the Library committee, while Cllr. John Madden will continue on the Heritage Board.

Dept. Promises Positive Response To Kilmac School Needs

The dilapidated conditions in Fews National School near Kilmacthomas will be corrected shortly, the Minister for Education, Noel Dempsey has promised.

Conditions in the school had reached such a low that teachers and parents held a public meeting with the General Election Candidates from some of the major parties earlier this year.

However, Minister Dempsey stated in a Dail reply to a question laid down by Deputy John Deasy, that his Department is prepared to respond positively to the accommodation needs of Fews NS and will soon be in contact with the school authorities to outline its proposals on how those needs can be addressed quickly.

New Programme To Deliver For West Waterford?

Progress on a commitment contained in the new Programme for Government to address the nation's "infrastructural deficit" over the next five years will be of concern to people in west Waterford.

That's according to Labour Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair, who argues that Dungarvan and its hinterland will be aided enormously if sections of new road planned between it and Dublin are completed sooner rather than later. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says a range of industrial and economic activity - including tourism as well as development of Dungarvan itself as a town - can be impacted on in a positive sense provided what he refers to as the "opening up" of the county occurs as a result of road network improvement projects presently at various points in their planning stages.

Speaking at a Labour Party National Executive meeting in Leinster House, Dublin on Thursday June 20th, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said: "The motorway extension from Kilkullen to Waterford, by-passing Carlow, is critical in its own right. The second river crossing, new Waterford city ring

road and the spur to the N25 beyond Kilmeaden compliments that link to Dublin. Add in a sensitively planned new by-pass near Dungarvan and there is an opening up of a Cork/Dublin corridor serving our county town and Waterford city as capital of the south east. Adding significance will be a quality branch off to Rosslare and it's ferryport connection to the UK and the European

mainland, in addition to improved access around Dublin and on to Belfast."

"Maintaining and attracting both industry and people to Dungarvan and west Waterford is a more practical task if such an accessible environment comes about. I look forward to working with my colleague Brian O'Shea TD in pressing for delivery of, and adequate attention to, these important projects."

DISABILITY AWARENESS

SENSORY DISABILITIES - BLINDNESS/VISUALLY IMPAIRED

To be registered blind with the Irish National Council for the blind usually will require that vision is equal to or less than 6/60 in the better eye or that your field of vision is restricted. This means that sight is limited to 6 metres compared to a normal sighted person who can see at 60 metres.

Leading causes of blindness are as follows:

Diabetic Retinopathy - diabetic retinopathy is caused by retinal changes in advanced or long term diabetes. It may affect the macula or the entire retina and vitreous. Reading is variable, and print may be distorted or blurred. Some diabetics also develop cataracts resulting in hazy and distorted vision.

Cataracts - cataracts do not affect field of vision but give general hazy vision especially in glaring light.

Glaucoma - glaucoma is caused by elevated eye pressure, which causes optic nerve atrophy. It is usually detected by pressure checks and routine eye examinations. In advanced cases, images may appear faded and side vision may be lost. Print appears to lack contrast.

Hemianopia - hemianopia can result in vision loss in half of the field as a result of a defect in the optic pathways in the brain. Hemianopias leave half of the reading field blacked out.

Corneal - corneal visual problems produce distorted or cloudy vision with greater glare sensitivity. Like cataracts, field of vision is normal. Print appears to lack contrast.

Macular Degeneration - macular degeneration affects the central portion of vision but not the side vision. It is difficult to see faces and print may be distorted or have missing segments of words.

Retinitis Pigmentosa - retinitis pigmentosa is a heredity disease causing degeneration of the pigmented layer of the retina. It leads to

severe loss of peripheral vision causing problems with travel. Reading area is reduced although some letters in the center may be clear.

Professional medical advice should be sought immediately if any of the above conditions are suspected. Early detection is vital and can slow down the progress of most of these conditions.

BENEFITS AVAILABLE TO BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED PEOPLE

Blind persons pension is available for people who are blind or visually impaired, the payment is usually automatically paid to people that are registered with the National Council for the Blind. Otherwise the person will be asked to attend an eye test with an ophthalmic surgeon appointed by the Department of Social Welfare.

The Irish Guide Dogs for the Blind are the only organisation in the Republic of Ireland providing guide dogs as mobility for the blind and visually impaired. They provide residential and aftercare services that are free of charge. If you would like further information regarding this disability awareness article, please contact our office. Share Your Summer Garden

When the hard work of making your garden gorgeous is complete, it's time to share it with your friends and neighbours.

And what better way to celebrate than a barbecue.

The word "stress" comes to mind for some people - a barbecue can seem like very hard work for little reward. And can you rely on the weather?

Don't let either of these put you off. A barbecue can be successful with a bit of planning and organisation.

First things first - watch the weather forecast. Try not to plan your party too far in advance and that way you've got more chance of predicting a good day.

The day before the party, mow the lawn, weed the garden, check that you have enough garden furniture for everyone - give the children blankets to sit on or ask your guests to bring their own deckchairs.

Make sure you have some candles in case the party moves into the late evening - there are lots to choose from at garden centres, DIY stores and the homeware sections of department stores. Buy the type that keeps the bugs at bay.

To help keep the work to a minimum buy cheap plastic cups, bowls and plates. Make sure you have enough charcoal, and firelighters for your barbie - and of course matches or a lighter - or (if it's a gas one), a full bottle and even a spare. Make sure the barbie is clean!

The main message is to keep the party food simple - complicated recipes you've never tried before are bound to end in disaster.

If they are the sort of friends who don't like coming to your house empty-handed, encourage them to bring their favourite barbecue dish.

You can provide the basics - salads, breads and rolls, pasta and potatoes, nibbles, relishes and maybe special main dishes like tuna or salmon steaks.

Prepare as much as you can in advance and store it in the refrigerator.

Barbecue food is best when marinated in sauces overnight. Jerk pork, tandoori chicken, lamb kebabs, steak in black bean sauce can all be ready and waiting for those hot coals.

Don't forget some simple puddings like bananas in their skins stuffed with chocolate buttons and a dash of spirit like rum or brandy - you just need to wrap them in foil and pop them on the barbie when the main cooking is done.

These served with some simple vanilla ice-cream makes a great sweet for everyone from kids to grannies.

If the worst happens and rain stops play - just cook the food in the oven or grill - and get the indoor games out.

Lift tulip and hyacinth bulbs

Tulips and hyacinths will now have completed their growth and can be lifted and cleaned. Lay the bulbs in shallow trays and stand them in a dry, cool, airy place, but not in full sun. Dead tops can be removed.

Do not wait until disease attacks your potatoes. Spray them now with Bordeaux mixture. The potato blight disease is common and some plants are likely to become infected unless you take this precaution.

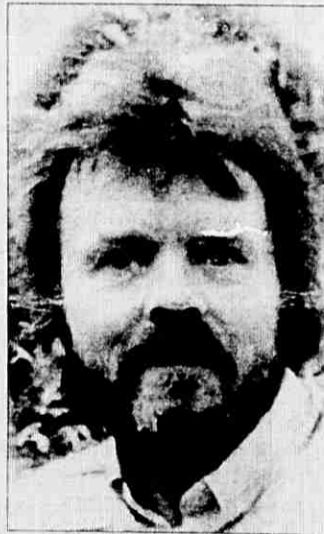

Teagasc NDP The Science of Farming and Food THINK SAFETY AND TAKE ACTION: Pesticides:

- Store all pesticides and farm chemicals in a secure store, made of non-flammable material. Identify the store with the correct safety warning sign. The store should be isolated from flammable materials such as hay or straw.
- Wear suitable protective equipment - wellingtons, coverall, pesticide gloves, a face shield and where necessary a respirator.
- Ensure that the sprayer is in safe working order. Operators should receive training. Consult the Teagasc Code of Practice for further information.

CATTLE: Worm Control in Calves at Grass

When young calves are turned out to grass in Spring they have no immunity against stomach worms or hoose. They pick up worm larvae from the grass, most of the larvae reach maturity in the gut of the young calf and produce large quantities of eggs which in turn further contaminate the pasture. As the weather gets warmer the life cycle of the stomach worm takes less time to complete so that by mid summer a new generation of worms can be produced every 18 - 20 days.

Where calves are grazed continuously or even in rotation as the only stock on the same ground it is easy to see how a huge build up in stomach worm and hoose infection will occur on pastures. With intensive calf rearing systems e.g. where bucket reared calves are grazed on a relatively small area of ground, a routine dosing programme known as the "suppression system" is required. This involves giving the first dose to calves 3 weeks after turnout and continuing to protect calves through anthelmintic treatment for a 12 week period. The principle here is that the worm burden is not allowed develop in the calves and therefore pasture contamination is kept very low. After 12 - 14 weeks, when dosing ceases the pasture contamination will rise slightly but calves can deal with it by their own developing immunity. The interval between doses depends on the drugs used. The white and yellow drenches have no residual effect and therefore need to be given every three weeks, whereas the Avermectin types e.g. Ivomec, Eprinex, Dectomax, Cydectin have persistence periods ranging from 21 to 35 days and therefore 2 - 3 administrations of these drugs is adequate to complete the programme.

GRASSLAND MANAGEMENT: Weed Control

- Farmers using 6 bags of nitrogen/acre will grow 21% more grass by spraying moderately infected pastures.
- Less intensive farmers will benefit from spraying by growing 4% more grass.
- Research shows that the % ground cover of docks relates directly to the % reduction in yield
- And worse, it produces 40-60,000 seeds per plant per year.
- First let us take dock control
- In most cases, the benefits accruing will cover the costs.
- Spray 3-4 weeks after cutting silage on warm, sultry days (very important).
- On pastures where there is some clover, use Azulox (€21/acre), Prospect (€16 /acre but doesn't kill the curled dock) or Eagle (€15 /acre)
- On non-clover swards use CMPP (short-term results) Bandox, Dockstar, Foundation, Pastor.etc.
- With impending nitrogen restrictions it is difficult to envisage situations where we won't want to promote clover, so be careful not to kill it.
- Weeds in pastures not alone reduce grass yield but also prevent animals grazing close to the weeds (thistles etc), so grass is left ungrazed and of course some weeds can cause sickness to animals.
- Generally, either 2.4.D or MCPA will kill most grassland weeds.
- "Spot" spraying of nettles and docks, where infestation is low, is advisable and cheaper.
- Little or no reduction in grass yield results compared with over-all spraying.
- July and August are the two best months to spray weeds.
- Get Ready to Reseed:
- August is one of the best months to reseed.
- New grass and clover get best opportunity to establish itself before weed grasses compete.
- One or two grazings will be got before the winter and this thickens the reseed sward.
- Later sowing results in 10-20% loss of sown seeds.
- By reseeding 10% of the farm (which is advised) you run the risk of being short of grass in August early September.
- Overcome this potential loss by selling off some cattle in August instead of October/November.
- Or, apply extra nitrogen (10-20 units) on the remainder of the grassland area to produce more grass.
- Identify the field for reseeding in early July.
- Apply extra nitrogen to it.
- Plan to cut it for baled silage in late July, early August.
- This leaves the surface free of trash, which kills a lot of young grass seedlings as they germinate.
- Approximately 7 days before cutting or grazing
- Spray the grass with Roundup or Gallup.
- Now you are ready for reseeding in August.

Cheerful And Positive Reading In E.U. Commission Forecasts

A rather startling concept jumps out of the latest European Commission report on the prospects for agricultural markets - the possibility that agricultural supply may not be able to keep pace with the rapid rise in demand for food in some parts of the world.

It's no more than a couple of paragraphs in the 33-page summary document, and it is only included because it is a significantly uncertain element in the entire equation, but it sure makes for more positive and cheerful reading than the usual cautionary and downright negative stuff one normally reads in this sort of report. Actually, that latter statement is a bit unfair because this report concludes that medium-term prospects for the EU are broadly positive for most agricultural products; it makes particular reference to "a sustained recovery in EU cereal exports" and the projection that beef production is set to return to "more normal" levels. For a change, the mainly negative prospects of this document are to do with products that hold only marginal interest for us in Ireland: rice and, to a lesser extent, rye.

The report speaks about the elements such as higher population, the trend towards urbanisation and changes in dietary pattern, particularly in many emerging economies, combining with an improved macro-economic environment and a more broadly based, robust and sustainable growth and says these prospects for stronger economic growth would support a steady increase in food demand. World trade in agricultural commodities would demonstrate strong growth, it says, as demand for food products would outpace production in many developing countries. The extent to which production would become outpaced by a rising domestic consumption is mentioned, the report stating that this remains unclear as the scope for further production increase in some major importing regions constitutes a key uncertainty for the medium-term outlook, notably for crop products.

The report does introduce a cautionary note in this context, advising that "a prudent interpretation of these favourable perspectives is deemed necessary." Which, depending on your inclination, you may regard as either a clause inserted to cover the authors in the event of a downturn in the markets or as a sincere warning that things can go down as well as up.

From our point of view, the beef section is the most relevant section in this report because of the importance of that

enterprise to our exports and to our farmers. In summary, it says: "The lower production in 2001, the assumed prolongation of the OTMS scheme (Over Thirty Months Scheme) in the UK, the quick recovery in beef meat consumption and the impact of the special measures taken in 2000 and 2001 indicate that the balance of the EU beef market is likely not to worsen in the next few years." Intervention stocks could be cleared in 2003, it says, and no buying-in is expected over the forecast period of 2002 to 2009. "Variations in exports would be ex-

pected to be sufficient in order to cope with the cyclical up and down in production," it concludes.

In dairying, it gives "a somewhat more optimistic outlook," notably on the demand side, than it did in last year's projections. In cereals, it says the medium-term outlook "tends to display a rather favourable situation for the EU cereal markets" with total cereal stocks broadly constrained at reasonable levels for most of the projection period. In the medium and long term, a slight downward trend is forecast for sheep production

and consumption. Pigmeat production is expected to continue its growth, while poultry in the medium and long term has an outlook that is "relatively less positive than in the past."

Just as nobody expects a goalkeeper during a penalty shootout in the World Cup to actually make a save, neither does anybody really expect economists to get it absolutely right when they are forecasting prospects for agricultural markets. But there is enough of a positive nature in this report to put some bounce back into the step of most Irish farmers.

GLANBIA CALLS ON EU TO RESPOND TO GRAIN CRISIS

Speaking on Wednesday last (June 26) following the official opening of Glanbia's new seed processing plant at their Graiguecullen branch in Carlow, Ger Mullally, CEO-Glanbia Agribusiness, said: "For the survival of the Irish grain industry, at both farmer and trade level, it is imperative that immediate measures be taken at EU level."

EU commission policy has had a severe effect on grain prices since the start of the 2001 harvest last year.

Firstly, the abolition by the EU of the 10 euro import levy has led to increased imports of 7 million tonnes from the Baltic States into the community.

Secondly, the lack of subsidised exports has contributed to increased closing stocks of 38 million tonnes at a time when the EU grain production for harvest 2002 is estimated to be 213 million tonnes.

Against this background, Mr. Mullally, said, "it is vital that the following measures be taken at EU level:

1. Imports of grain be restricted to the harvest 2000 level of 5.5 million tonnes
2. Subsidised exports of grain be increased to harvest 2000 level of 29 million tonnes
3. Current proposals under the mid-term review of Agenda 2000, to cut grain intervention prices by 5% and abolish monthly increments, should be scrapped immediately
4. Area Aid Payments must be indexed linked."

WATERFORD HOTELS AND RESTAURANTS SHOULD STAND BY IRISH FOOD AND SUPPORT FEILE BIA

Waterford IFA Chairman, Harry Gray has called on all hotels, restaurants, pubs and catering sector throughout the Country to support the Feile Bia campaign to use high quality local produce and produce from Bord Bia approved Quality Assurance Schemes. "These hotels, restaurants and caterers have shown commendable commitment and loyalty to high quality local produce and meat and egg products from Bord Bia Quality Assurance schemes, and they should in turn be supported by farm families and consumers throughout the country. An Agri Aware survey has shown that over 90% of consumers want country of origin identified when meat and poultry is purchased in hotels, restaurants and at retail point of sale."

"Unknowingly to Irish consumers, far too many hotels and restaurants still use imported product. In many cases, they pretend its Irish because they know their customers expect to be served Irish food and that they should commit to and support local high quality food products. The unnecessary use of imported product is putting the livelihood of Irish farmers at risk."

"Local hotels, restaurants, caterers and pubs in the towns and villages throughout the country need to recognise that many of their customers are farmers, farm families and farm related businesses, whose survival depends on demand from the overall catering sector for products supplied by them."

NO WASTE COLLECTION PERMIT REQUIRED OF FARMERS TAKING PIG MANURE

Waterford IFA Environmental Committee Chairman, Gerry Murphy, has reported that the Department of the Environment has made further amendments to guidance notes on the Waste Collection Permit Regulations which make it clear that farmers who collect manure from pig or poultry units for landspreading on their own lands will not be required to obtain a waste collection permit from their local authority provided they do not charge for taking it.

The revised Annex 2 to the guidance note prepared for local authorities, and others, seeking information and guidance on the Waste Collection Permit Regulations 2001 states that, provided farmers are not seeking payment for collecting pig or poultry manure, a waste collection permit will not be required.

Commenting on the regulations and the amended Department guidance note, Francis Fanning said: "The original interpretation of the regulations would have effectively closed off the best and most environmentally sustainable route for recovering the nutrient content of pig and poultry manures through landspreading on farm lands by neighbouring farmers. These farmers would have been required to obtain a permit from their local authority in order to landspread pig manure on their lands. This could have closed down both IPC-licensed and non-IPC licensed pig and poultry farmers without justification."

IFA ADVISES FARMERS TO KEEP BANKS INFORMED ON CASH FLOW DIFFICULTIES TO AVOID PENALTIES

Following a meeting with Michael Dowling of AIB Bank recently, IFA President, John Dillon, has advised farmers to monitor their cashflow and income situation closely, and inform their bank if they are unable to meet loan repayments as they fall due.

He said: "We have received strong assurances that AIB will support farmers during the current weather and product price difficulties. Farmers should be aware that early contact with their bank and any necessary restructuring will avoid penalties or other surcharges, provided farmers keep their bank informed. It is vitally important that farmers continue to communicate with their banks on their business and to keep them informed of their ongoing income and cashflow situation."

DILLON DEMANDS ACTION ON EU DAIRY SUPPORTS IN MEETING WITH MINISTER FOR AGRICULTURE

Following a meeting with the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh recently, IFA President John Dillon said he demanded immediate action on EU Dairy supports from the Minister and the Minister had given a commitment that this would be top of his agenda when he meets EU Agriculture Commissioner, Franz Fischler in Brussels tomorrow.

Mr Dillon said with the bad weather and increased costs, milk prices would have to be maintained at a minimum of £1/gal. to prevent an income collapse in the dairy sector.

Mr Dillon said he had requested an immediate assessment by Teagasc of weather damage losses and he was demanding that the new Government give immediate attention to agriculture and specific commitments to implementation of the FF/PD Programme for Government on Agriculture.

The IFA President said he had sought specific commitments on the timescale and details of the various commitments in the Programme, including a new REPS scheme, grants for environmental improvements, land leasing disadvantaged areas etc.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am on maternity leave and I intend taking additional unpaid maternity leave. How will this affect my annual leave?

ANSWER

An employee is entitled to a basic 18 weeks maternity leave during which they may be paid Maternity Benefit by the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs. In addition, a further 8 weeks maternity leave may be taken which will not be covered by Maternity Benefit.

While you are on the initial paid maternity leave you are treated as if you are in work. It cannot be counted as part of any other leave entitlement, for example, sick leave or annual leave. As annual leave entitlement is based on hours worked during the "leave year", this period of maternity leave can be used to accumulate annual leave. You are also entitled to have the credit for any public holiday(s) that occurs during this leave period. You could receive this credit as an extra day's annual leave for each public holiday.

The additional unpaid maternity leave however cannot be used to accumulate annual leave. Also, you are not entitled to the credit for any public holiday that occurs during that time.

Honour for Abbeyside Woman

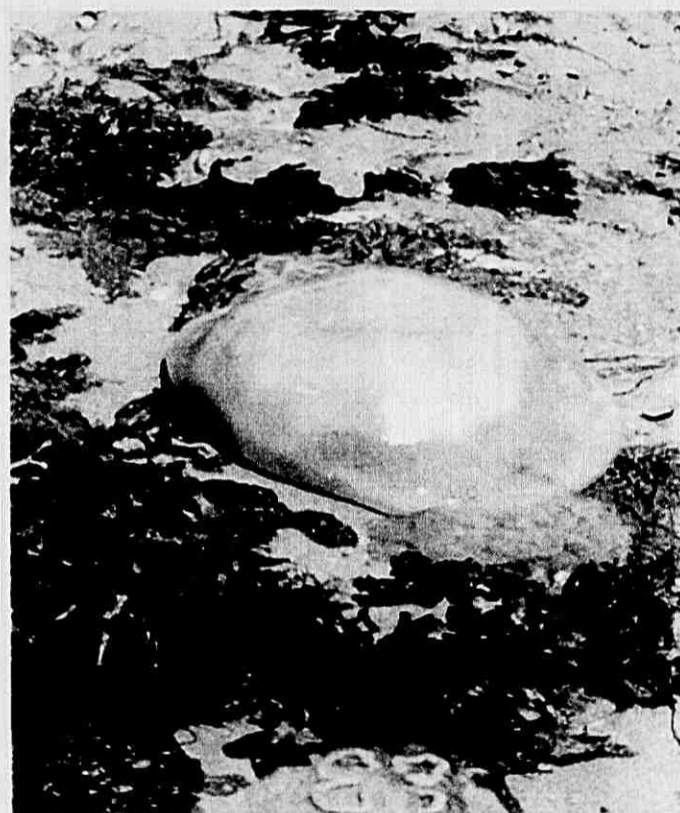

That titanic eruption did not include much lava but the nearby city of Pompeii was buried under gigantic showers of cinders and ash six meters deep while Herculaneum was swamped under a sea of mud. The last three eruptions of Mount Vesuvius took place in 1906, 1928 and 1944.

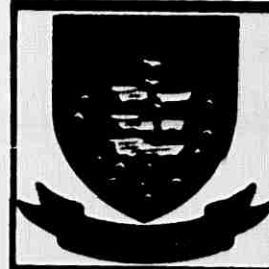


Pictured above is one of the jellyfish washed up on the beach in Abbeyside, one of a huge number to be seen in the area recently.

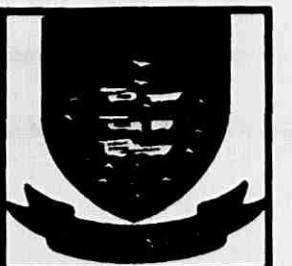

RECOMMENDATIONS ON RING WATER SUPPLY AWAITED

Commitments made by Waterford County Council to the people of the Ring Gaeltacht - made in 1999 - to substantially overhaul their drinking water supply, remain on paper and without the kind of action locals might have expected in the meantime.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilleachair - the Údarás na Gaeltachta representative for the area - says the sanitary services section of agendas for local authority meetings since earlier this year describe Waterford County Council as a waiting a report from consultants it has appointed to examine Ring's water provision and to recommend measures to improve it's source and delivery. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, who has spent the last five years raising issues related to the area's water supply, says a commitment to reform the Ring system was confirmed in 1999 following a protest by local householders at that year's Council Estimates meeting. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says despite subsequent Dept. of Environment funding approval, that many householders remain dissatisfied with the quantity and quality of water supply levels in Ring and that there is disappointment at the length of time involved in addressing an issue of such basic concern.

Speaking on a subject he describes as all too familiar to him, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said:

"The requisite authorities point out that although the taste and colour of the water in Ring may vary, that it is in fact safe. The fact that some townlands have restricted and often no supply at all at various times, due to cut offs, is put down to the system not being able to deliver from source adequately and comprehensively enough. The Ring water infrastructure is old and its' feeding source could be better.

There is an acknowledgement from the local authority on both these points."

"Once again, of late, I had the opportunity to visit every household in the Ring area. There is strong opinion about the water and some families are utilising mineral water purchased in supermarkets rather than depend on the tap water. When Waterford County Council meets in Dungarvan on July 8th next, I want to see this long awaited consultant's report on the table, rather than another reference to it being on the way. We need to move on."

LATE MR. LIAM RYAN

Profound and sincere feelings of regret were widely expressed with the deeply regretted death which occurred after an illness of some duration borne with true Christian fortitude at Saint Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel on Saturday 22nd June at Mr. Liam Ryan, Knockalisheen, Ballymacarbray, Clonmel.

Deceased in his seventy sixth year was a member of a well loved and respected family the Tom Ryan's of Knockalisheen. A man of many talents, scholar, poet, soldier, County Council worker, coal miner, tradesman, musician, sportsman and above all a perfect gentleman.

In the early 30's he began his school days at the old school at Bennett's Church where he received his education having to walk to and from each day, a round distance of about eight miles. On leaving school he took employment with Waterford County Council working in Moneaha Bog at the age of seventeen. In those days of World War 2 all young men were asked to join the Defence forces, Liam with many others of his age duly obliged and joined the LDF. In the late 40's he did his NCO's course at Youghal Camp and in his class was a young soldier from Limerick, he was Sean South of Garryowen, Liam and Sean became great friends, some years after South lost his life in the North of Ireland. With work at the time scarce he decided to try his hand at Coal Mining and took the boat to Wales where he remained for some years. On his return he began his apprentice to the building trade with Connolly's Building Contractors and after many years with the firm he took on the position of building houses for Waterford County Council, those houses are today monuments of his skill.

In the year 1942 he began his hurling days with Fourmilewater minors in a championship game against Dungarvan at Touraneena and for 21 years he played the game with Fourmilewater and with Waterford Junior hurlers. He was a skilful player, a clean player who always played the ball, he won his first title in 1955 and his last in 1963, in those years he made many friends, many were present at his funeral where many Gaels from Waterford and Tipperary were present.

He was a noted Accordion player and in his time he played for many a house dance around the district. He was a noted poet and song writer, many of his songs are in book form. He also took part in Dramatics and took part in many a play.

For some years back he was not in the best of health he was hospitalised for many periods, during his long illness he rarely missed Mass or any function in St. Laurence's Church. In the last few weeks his health began to decline and on Saturday morning in the presence of his family at St. Joseph's Hospital, Clonmel he passed to his eternal reward.

Many tributes have been paid to this fine man, but perhaps the finest was paid to him on Sunday evening when all walks of life were represented in the vast concourse of mourners who were present when his remains after prayers and rosary were recited by Rev. Fr. William Ryan P.P., Ballybricken, a friend and neighbour of deceased, were removed from Condon's Funeral Parlour, Clonmel to Saint Laurence's Parish Church, Fourmilewater where a guard of honour of past and present hurlers walked beside his remains draped in the Blue and White of his beloved Fourmilewater, the team he was for years so much part of as a player and administrator. At the Church his remains were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. Edmund Tobin P.P.,

Deceased in his early nineties was the last member of a well loved and respected Sliabh gCua family, he was also the last member of the Sliabh gCua Junior football team that took the first Junior Football County title to the parish in 1936 and probably the last member of the Touraneena Fife and Drum Band. He was truly one of nature's gentlemen of a friendly, good humoured and generous disposition. His unassuming wit, rich fund of anecdote and his remarkable facility in recalling and relating to experiences of his younger days that held the listener enthralled, endeared him to all whom he made contact. He loved the game of Bingo and travelled on Hallahan's bus to the game in Clonmel at weekends. His demise has evoked feelings of sincere regret among his family, neighbours and his many many friends, the parish is the poorer at his passing.

The measure of the esteem and high regard in which deceased and his family are held was clearly indicated by the large concourse of mourners who were present when his remains draped in the colours of Sliabh gCua, the club and team he was so much part of for many years, were removed after the rosary was recited by Rev. Fr. Cornelius Kelleher P.P., Nire/Touraneena from the Kiely Funeral Home, Dungarvan to Saint Mary's Parish Church, Touraneena where they were accorded a guard of honour of past and present footballers and hurlers.

At the Church his remains were blessed and received by Rev. Fr. C. Kelleher P.P. On Thursday morning, the feast of Saint Silverius (Martyr) requiem Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his immortal soul, the celebrant was Rev. Fr. C. Kelleher P.P. After Mass he was taken to his place of rest and there he was laid to rest beneath the sod of his native Sliabh gCua, may it rest lightly on his grave. Fr. Kelleher P.P. officiated at the graveside in the presence of another large concourse of mourners paying their final respects to a Christian friend. After he was laid in the grave Tom O'Donoghue, Crowhill played a selection of set tunes that Maurice often danced to.

The National Hill Farmers Association

NATIONAL HILL FARMERS ASSOC. MEET WITH MINISTER

Officers of the N.H.F.A. met with Minister Joe Walsh recently to discuss a number of farming issues with him.

One was in relation to the suckler cow scheme for 2002, where applicants who sent in application forms after April 15th 2002 would not get their first installment in 2002.

There was nothing in the guidelines in the regulations to indicate this, when the application forms were sent out. A lot of farmers could not send in their application forms until after April 15th. Those were farmers who were over the 14 cow suckler limit where the compulsory 15% dry heifer scheme applied.

A lot of those farmers were waiting on for those dry heifers to become of age to qualify, as they would have to be over 8 months on the date of application. Most farmers would prefer to use their own replacements rather than buying in and risking bringing disease into their herds. Another issue that was raised strongly with the minister was to get the area based payment paid out on September 1st.

The N.H.F.A. feel that this is vitally important to hill farmers for cash flow purposes, as cattle headage and sheep headage payment under the old live unit system were always paid in September. Usually those farmers got the 1st. installment of the ewe premium June, July, but now that has changed under the fixed ewe premium scheme, which will be paid in full for the first time (but not before October 2002).

The minister was very sympathetic towards the N.H.F.A. views on the situation and is working very closely with his dept. to have those problems rectified the N.H.F.A. and the minister also took into account the hard times farmers are experiencing right now as result of the bad weather.

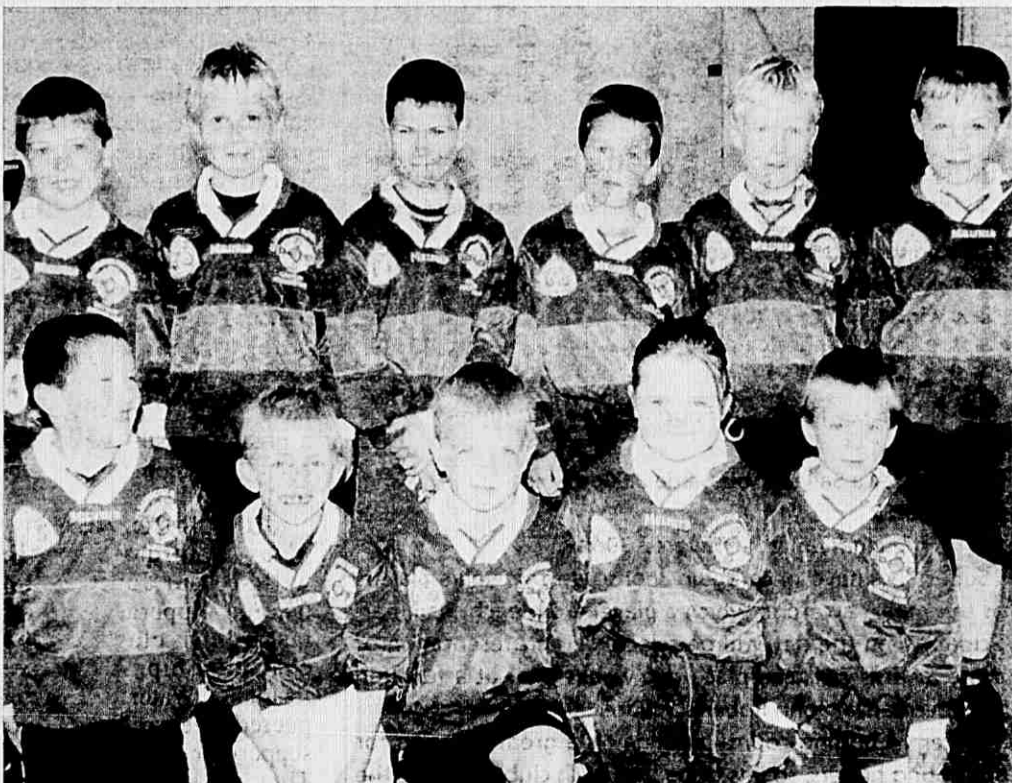

Waterford Overpower Tipperary In Thrilling

The bookies got it wrong, the media got it wrong and all the experts got it wrong. They all got it wrong but that mattered little to the fifteen odd thousand fanatical and emotionally drained Waterford supporters when the final whistle sounded in Pairc Ui Caoimh just before Angelus time on Sunday last. In fact one could sense the start of the massive celebrations for minutes before the last whistle sounded.

Waterford were on fire on all cylinders and the champions, Tipperary looked leg weary, confounded and bewildered by what was happening all around them. They had been kept scoreless for the last 21 minutes of the final and that was something that never happened before to the Premier county.

Tipperary were most gracious in defeat and took their defeat very sportingly. Their manager and master tactician, Nicky English put the whole game in perspective when he said: "no team in Ireland would have lived with this Waterford team on the form they showed out there today."

One of his fellow selectors Jim Bergin, when lavishing praise on Waterford said: "if anyone had told me this morning that Waterford would score 2-23 against us, I would have him certified."

Maybe we were seeing it through tinted glasses, but this was one of the best provincial finals in recent years.

The hurling was skilful and was spectacular at times. Tipperary, too, contributed a lot to the game and for a time in the early stages they looked on course for yet another victory. Paul Flynn's 17th minute goal, Ken McGrath's delightful striking of the ball that landed us seven points, Tony Brown's goal which was struck in the 17th minute of the second half, were all features of the game that deserve special mention, but it would be wrong to convey the notion that the trio were the match winners as this was a full team effort and a team victory.

Having waited for 39 years to win a senior final in the province, one could easily understand the euphoria that followed and outside the stadium very few of the thousands of identifiable and very excited Waterford supporters seemed anxious to move on and this to some extent explains the late arrival back home of such a huge number.

The celebrations in Dungarvan on the arrival of the team was something that Grattan Square had never before experienced, but that report is for

another time.

Waterford can now breathe easy for a time or until Sunday, August 11th. when we play in the All Ireland semi-final.

TRAFFIC

On the way to Cork there was a mighty build up of traffic. People travelled early to be in time for the World Cup final in the pubs around the city and many others were travelling to Fota Island for the golf finals. Shortly before the game the rain stopped but the cloudy conditions remained. All the 40,276 patrons were in the stadium before the President Mary MacAlleese was introduced to the teams.

THE TOSS

Waterford team captain Fergal Hartley won the toss and pointed into the strong wind. A decision that most Waterford patrons would have agreed with.

PLAY

The Waterford lineout showed several switches from the programme team. Brian Greene was moved to left corner back and Brian Flannery moved to the other corner. James Murray was moved to centre field to partner Tony Browne while Peter Queally replaced Brian Greene at wing back.

Seamus Prendergast was brought to centre forward and Ken McGrath moved to full forward. Paul Flynn was played on the left wing of the attack.

Paul Flynn had a Waterford point on the scoreboard before the end of the 2nd. minute and Tipperary's Eoin Kelly had another a minute later (both from frees). Lar Corbett, John Carroll and Eoin Kelly sent Tipp. into a 3 points lead by the 8th minute. John Mullane had a Waterford point and Benny Dunne replied to gave Tipp a 3 points advantage.

In the 13th minute Seamus Prendergast received a yellow card. In the 14th, Eoin Kelly pointed for Waterford. In the 15th minute Paul Flynn hit a great point from play and in the 17th minute a 20 metre free was dispatched 'rocket like' to the Tipperary net — a score which set the Deise supporters on fire. A minute or so later Paul Flynn got a yellow card.

Tommy Dunne pointed a free to leave the teams level 1-4 to 0-7 in the 19th minute. Two splendid points, one from Conor Gleeson and the other from Ken McGrath, kept parity on the scoreboard. A 'beauty' by John Mullane, who as causing all kinds of problems around the Tipperary defence and a free by Paul Flynn sent us two in front after 32 minutes. This, against the strong wind, must have been worrying for the champions.

In the remaining five minutes Tipperary finished the stronger and after Eoin Kelly's 35th. minute goal they had a further point, also by Kelly and Waterford's Eoin Kelly and Eoin McGrath had our 2 scores to leave the state of play at 1-10 to 1-9 at halftime.

Coming back on to the field with the wind in their backs Waterford were in a more confident mood than they were before the start and when Paul Flynn converted two frees to restore our lead, confidence grew still further. However, Benny Dunne's 4th minute goal was something of a temporary shock, but two great scores by Ken McGrath and John Mullane brought us back level within minutes and then the reliable Paul Flynn gave us the lead with a pointed free in the 8th minute.

Eoin Kelly added another from play and the best of Ken McGrath's seven points in the 10th, put us 3 points clear. But a minute later Benny Dunne made his way through for Tipperary's third goal to bring the sides level once more. They went back in front after a great Conor Gleeson point in the 13th minute, but we were back level a minute later with an equally splendid Ken McGrath score (1-17 to 3-11).

Then in the 15th minute the Munster and All Ireland champions went ahead again with a point by team captain Tommy Dunne. Amazingly, this was Tipperary's final score of the Munster final 2002.

Eoin McGrath, receiving from brother Ken, brought the teams level. A minute later a Stephen Brennar hit free set up a sudden Waterford attack and when Tony Browne, now hitting his 1998 form, rounded the Tipperary keeper Brendan Cummins for a goal, this and the tremendous roar from the Waterford section of the stands and terraces set off the alarm bells for the champions who were being virtually run into the ground at this stage. Seamus Prendergast was causing all kinds of problems for the Tipp. defence and set up Ken McGrath for a score that put us 4 points up with 15 minutes of normal time remaining.

Waterford were now in total control and their skill, pace and stamina at this stage of the final were a revelation.

Ken McGrath, John Mullane and Seamus Prendergast had points in that order before Dave Bennett, who came into the game as a substitute for Brian Flannery, had the last say with a super point to leave us a clear 8 points in front of the champions.

It was a day when everyone of the 19 who wore the white and blue was a hero, characters in a history making event like the players of the five Munster champions from Waterford who went before them.

Not one of the team was born when we won our last provincial senior final in 1963.

Stephen Brennar played well in his first major game and his long puck-outs were a factor in setting up score winning attacks.

Tom Feeney knew that he had a major role to play in the game and this he did with distinction. He was brilliant in the final 15 minutes. Putting Brian Greene to mark Tipperary's Eoin Kelly was a master move by Justin McCarthy and co. and while the ace forward got 1-4, only a single point was from play.

Brian Flannery, also playing in a different position, did a splendid job in holding his marker Lar Corbett to a point.

The halfback line was solid all through and steadfast when the pressure came on in the second half when Tipp tried a rescue effort. Fergal Hartley played a captain's part all the way and was inspirational throughout. He was flanked by Peter Queally who had a 'stormer' after settling and Eoin Murphy who must be the toast of Knockanore for his wholehearted performance.

Tony Browne had a rather shaky start but stood out as a star player in the second half. James Murray was put in a position that took a bit of 'getting used to' but when he did he played his heart out and may now be named as a regular at midfield.

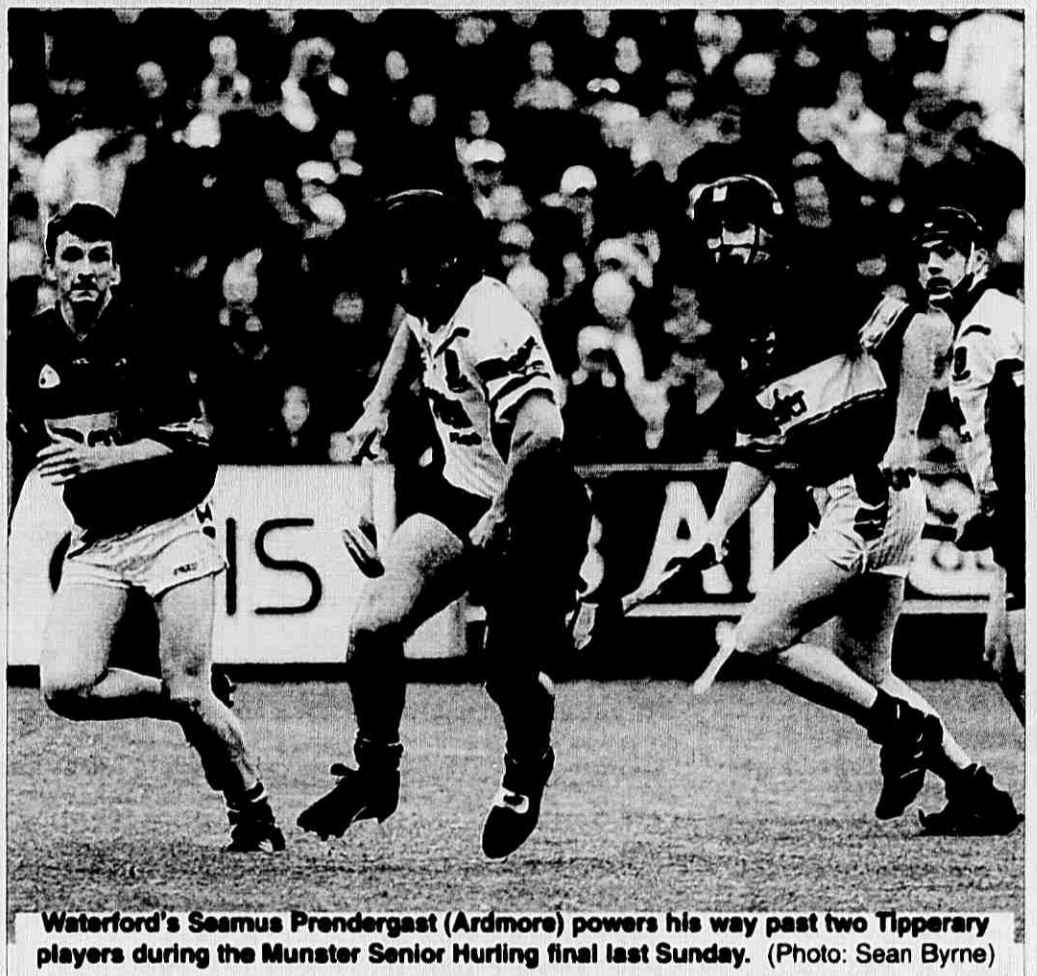
It would be impossible to find words to sufficiently praise Ken McGrath. Everyone of his 7 scores from play looked effortless. Paul Flynn was top scorer in the game and his 1-6 contribution further embellished his record as one of the country's leading forwards. John Mullane, as well as raising 4 white flags, tormented his marker and came off with his reputation vastly improved.

I think that Seamus Prendergast played his very best game in a Waterford jersey. His display in the final 20 minutes or so was truly magnificent Eoin Kelly and Eoin McGrath each proved that he is a star in the making and what good fortune it is for the county to have talent of this standard coming on.

The substitutes, Dave Bennett, Andy Moloney, Dan Shanahan and Michael White all proved their worthiness of inclusion and each played a role in keeping us in control when a boost was needed.

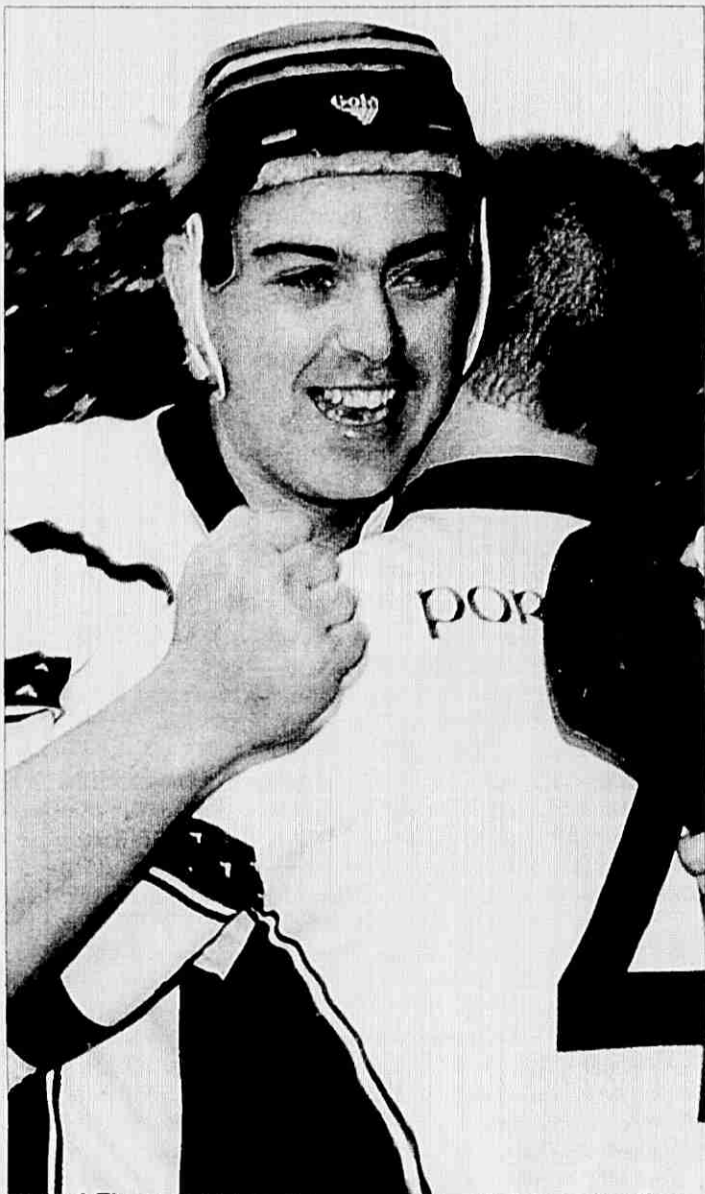

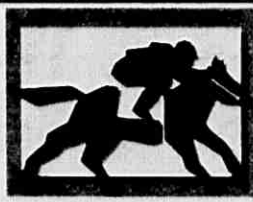

In a 300 yard graded sprint Honeycomb Oak (Minnies Phantom-Charity Millie) was sent off the warm evens favourite and despite being led to the first bend by Hurlley Hanna The John O'Connell and Noel Stapleton owned and Mike Gallagher trained Honeycomb Oak dashed into the lead on the fence and despite drifting wide into the home stretch Honeycomb Oak won a shade cosily by a length in 16.71.

After two sprint outings the Gary Mounsey owned and Desna Hattemore trained Rhiannas Rose (Trade Official-Villiers Desna) turned her attention to the standard trip with the desired result as this 2/1 shot won unchallenged in a best ever time of 29.21. Racing into an early lead Rhiannas Rose increased her lead throughout eventually dishing out an eight and a quarter lengths beating to

Skeard King.

It was back to two bends for the fifth race which produced a very easy victory for the Michael Ryan owned Anajojo this July 00 son of Droopys Merson and Speedy Ivy cutting loose on the run to the first corner before easing his way clear for a comfortable four and a half lengths win over Debs King who came from behind Faros Landing to take the runner spot. Time 16.72.

The well backed Stream Of Light (Upper Spark-Romantic Sunset) showed significant improvement from his previous effort taking the sixth contest in a fast 29.19. Judging by the support for Senan Walsh's Stream Of Light this victory was not unexpected by those in the know as Stream Of Light bounded clear from trap one to lead from Dysert Satalite and despite the best efforts of the latter Stream Of Light won out to triumph by two and three quarter lengths.

The eight contest saw the Peter Brady owned Desert Nikita (Spiral Nikita-Proper Club) 6/4 shed his maiden tag scoring in 29.46. Pushed for a long way by Heathview Linda the always prominent Desert Nikita lengthened his stride nicely in the closing stages to cross the winning line with two and a half lengths to spare over a running on Kuda Club.

The ninth race saw the JJJ Syndicate owned and Leo Dunphy trained Fan Tan (Vintage Prince-Whitefort Jude) 2/1 post an overdue 29.48 victory. Making maximum use of her early pace Fan Tan had this race in the bag a long way from home and she basically won unchallenged by four and a half lengths from Nikkis Princess.

Lawn Walk In Full Flight

There was no shortage of competitive fare at a balmy Kilmacow Park last Saturday night where the card featured the two semi finals of the Waterford Fireplaces Confined Marathon plus the three first round heats of the Well Wishers Confined 28.30 stake.

We start our review with the first semi final of the marathon event and it is easily described as the well drawn Break Away Smart (Mustang Jack-Spinning Sun) the warm 5/4 favourite made every yard of the running for owner John Darcy and trainer Shem O'Donnell in 40.77. Saltee Fleur gave chase throughout but there was always only going to be one winner as Break Away Smart came home all of ten lengths clear of Saltee Fleur.

In A Cooperone was a non runner in the second semi final as easy heat winner Prince Cushie was sent off the red hot 4/7 favourite. The favourite duly set off to make all the running easing his way clear of Folly Lotto however running down to the penultimate turn the favourite began to send out distress signals and in an exciting finish the Tom Moriarty owned Motabeg Dingo (Top Honcho-Marys Star) 3/1 who came from some way off the pace produced a flying finish to get up close home for a half a length victory in 40.91.

The following three races were first round heats of the Well Wishers Stake. There was some serious money floating around for Monroe Scooby 5/4 and Knockeevan Major 7/4 in the first qualifier but this pair however were put firmly in their place as the Dai Burchell owned and Jimmy Power trained Lawn Walk (Boyne Walk-Moyne Ivy) 4/1 carved out an impressive early paced trap to line 29.04 success. Producing an eye catching turn of early boot from trap five Lawn Walk had this race in safe keeping a long way from home leading early on from a slow starting Monroe Scooby before dishing out an eight and three quarter lengths beating to a hampered Knockeevan Major.

Heat two was full of action. At the first bend Interloper and Mist My Babe were fallers as Minglers Honcho disputed the lead with Harlenas Hope who came off second best after a bumping match with Minglers Honcho off the second bend. Kellsboro Lucy came into the picture over the final two bends and while she led into the home straight Kellsboro Lucy was denied close home by the James Moore owned

Minglers Honcho this 2/1 chance winning out by half a length in 29.86.

Having his first outing over this circuit the Michelle Foley owned Active Nikita (Spiral Nikita-Active Lynx) 2/1 was full value for his 29.12 victory in heat three. After seeing off the back stretch challenge of Hammermill Active Nikita allowed the well supported Strange Euro to come through on his inside at the fourth bend but coming with a renewed effort Active Nikita got back up close home for a hard earned length win.

In the opening graded race over the 550 yard trip the John O Connor trained Belmullet Anne (Super Hoffman-Desert Eileen) took over in the lead at the second last bend from the pace setting Spy Catch before seeing the trip out well for a three and a quarter lengths victory over a running on Toss Joy in 30.58.

Having only his second race outing the Pat Barrett and Frank Hamm owned and Richard Walsh trained Quarter Bridge (Spiral Nikita-Jet On Flojo) 2/1 took a flyer from trap five in a graded sprint and striding on nicely up front this July 00 whelp encountered little difficulty in proving two lengths to fast for Cruella Tex in 16.55.

Seafield Fagin made a positive start from trap two in the third race but recovering well from a slow start 5/2 shot Sir O'Flaherty (Right Wish-Mountaylor Pass) found a narrow gap up the inside of Seafield Fagin rounding the first turn. Showing plenty of determination Sir O'Flaherty barged his way into the lead and despite a late flourish by Dinan Tricks the Frances O'Donnell trained Sir O'Flaherty stuck to the task well to triumph by a length in 29.10. The winner runs in the ownership of well known Irish actress Brenda Fricker.

Coming in as a reserve into trap two in the fourth event the E Ching owned Truleigh Heather made every post a winning one in a sweet 28.94. Wasting no time on leaving trap two Truleigh Heather headed a tightly packed group throughout and despite a late flourish by Jagirdar Truleigh Heather held firm to triumph by a length and a half.

Faranrory Tiger was sent off the evens favourite in the final race of the night but after a slow start the jolly was always struggling to make an impact. No such problems though for the lightly raced Peer Border (Mountleader Peer-Tara Bay Mint) 3/1 as this John Sheperd owned and Desna Hattemore trained runner scooted clear from trap two to lead from Premiere Game and with this order of running remaining unchanged for the duration of the standard trip Peer Border encountered little difficulty in posting a three and a half lengths winning margin over Premiere Game. The winning time of 28.85 was a career best effort by the winner who is certainly on the upgrade.

HOT ROD CLUB'S 21st ANNIVERSARY

Just over two decades ago several Waterford based enthusiasts came together to form Waterford Hot Rod club to cater for the growing interest in the sport in the county.

The group hailed from all parts of Waterford, from Kilmeaden came Chairman Dick Mackey (RIP), John Mackey, along with Pat Kennedy, Michael Sheehan and Eddie Shanahan. Club President Tom Murray and son Mike came from Dunmore East, Canice Nolan and Phillip Graham from Portlaw. Virgil and Pat Power, with John, Ray and Ger Darcy all came from Stradbally. Tom Fitzgerald and Tony Mulcahy represented the Dungarvan area and Matt Crowley came from Kill. The new club was launched in the Hibernian Bar in Waterford by the then Mayor of Waterford Tom Browne, and the Irish Hot Rod Federation president of the time John Burke from Mooncoin.

It is apparent that the vision and wishes that these men had for their sport have been realised as this coming weekend sees the Waterford Hot Rod Club celebrate its 21st anniversary of competitive racing on the Raceway at the Pike Dungarvan. In its early years racing was mainly held at grass venues throughout the county, with fields generously provided by such supportive benefactors as the Hayes family at the Pike, the Power family in Stradbally, Freddie Thompson (RIP) of Portlaw, the Hayes family at the Sweep Kilmeaden, the Queally family in Kill, and many others who always contributed so willingly. Soon the committee realised that a permanent track was needed if the sport was to survive on a long term basis and soon after The Pike track was constructed with the help of Anthony and Gertie Hayes and the hard work of all club members. Since then the track has been developed by successive committees and has evolved into the excellent hard surface track that exists today.

Over the years competitors have raced an assortment of machinery, including VW Beetles (list of engines unlimited), Fiat 850's, NSU'S, Imps, Anglias, Escorts and Capris, up to the present-day field of Fiats, Toyotas, Hondas, Peugeots and the ever consistent Fords. As the list of cars has changed, so too has the list of names that have come and gone. However, through the history of the club there are some names that have remained and have been the backbone

of the Waterford club down through the years. These names include Tom Murray, who has been President since the club was launched all those years ago, the hard working Jerry Tobin and James O'Shea, all of whom have been the longest serving active members. THE FIVE KIRWAN BROTHERS

The fourth Kirwan brother was Percy. He was a stylish hurler and footballer, and represented Waterford in both games on numerous occasions. However it was at

athletics that he achieved his greatest success. Among his successes were gold medal wins in the 100m, 200m and long jump competitions during the 1908 Papal Sports Festivals in Rome. In 1910 he went to Britain and won the long jump competition. He again won this title in 1911 and 1912.

In Ireland Percy won eight GAA championships and won three I.A.A.A. Irish championship medals in the long jump, the hop, step and jump, the 120 yards hurdles, the 100 yards and 120 yards. In total Percy won nearly 300 trophies over a 20-year period.

Pat was the last of the five

Kirwan brothers. He was a capable Gaelic footballer and excelled as a half-miler and took part in walking contests. In 1909, he emigrated to America and later settled in Alaska where he died in 1946.

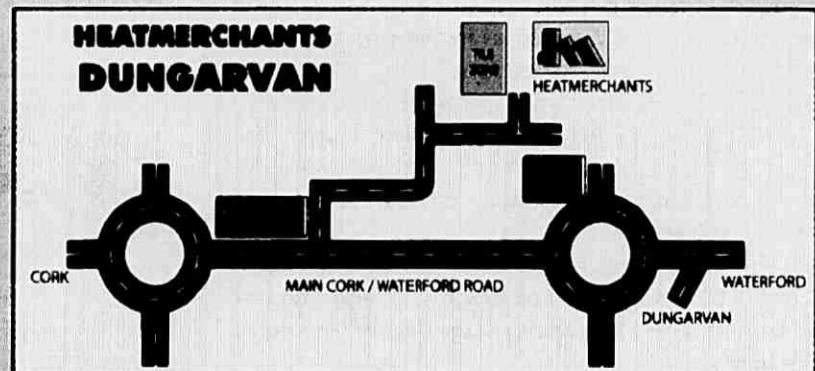
OPEN DAY AT HELVICK HEAD LIFEBOAT STATION




