## Weekend Of Mindless Vandalism

On Friday night/ Saturday morning, up to twenty cars had their tyres slashed between 2am and 6.30am. These cars were damaged at O'Connell Street, Fitzgerald Terrace, Mitchell Street, Wolf Tone Road, St. Garvan's Terrace and Cathal Brugha Place.

At 8.30am, the windscreen and windows of a motor van were broken at Main Street. Later a man was arrested and charged in connection with this incident.

## Council's Spiralling Debts Blamed On Insurance Claims

The compensation culture is causing major concerns for Waterford County Council, with the financially troubled local authority faced with spiralling insurance premiums and legal costs.

Head of Finance, Paul Clerkin, blamed a growing number of compensation claims as a substantial reason for the authorities deeper fall into debt at last Monday's meeting.

The council, which went into 2001 with debts of eur1.77m and is now in the red to the tune of eur2.33m, saw an increase in excess of one hundred thousand in their insurance premiums

last year alone.

"We have seen growing insurance premiums in the past, and again this year there has been a major increase in those costs", Mr. Clerkin said.

On average, the council receives around 40-50 claims every year and although some of these are never pursued, he said the council is being hit with claims that are too far back to gather evidence against.

"One of the areas we're coming up against are claims related to events that happened twelve to eighteen months ago", he said. "When that amount of time goes by before a claim is lodged, it's

very difficult to gather enough evidence to defend."

Roads and footpaths have been the most frequent issues for claims against Waterford County Council, he said, giving the stark warning that any problem with a road could lead to the authority being brought to court.

"Anywhere there's any kind of indentation in a footpath or anything like that, well, we've a potential claim there", he said.

The legal problems the local authority now faces has meant that claims currently account for forty percent of all the council's legal, med-

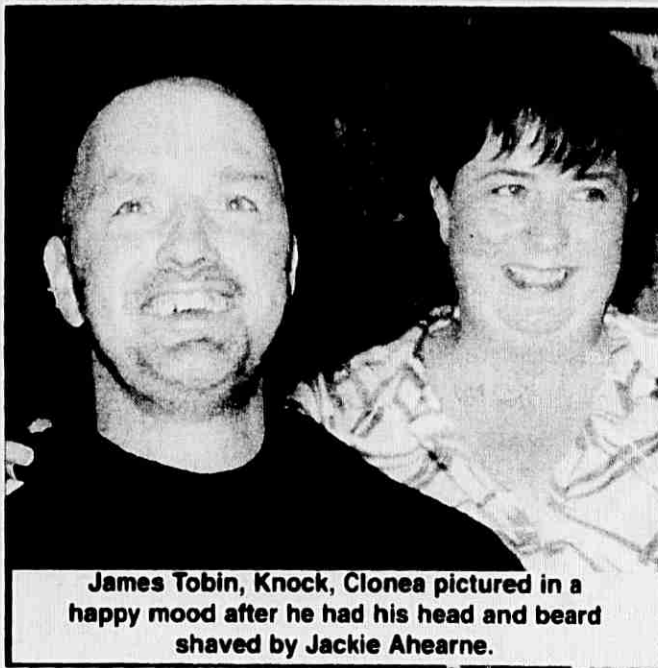

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

### Question

I am separated with two sons aged 18 and 16. I get One-Parent family payment and until last year I have been getting the Back to School Clothing Allowance. Can I still claim the allowance for my son now he is in college?

### Answer

The Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance is a special payment to assist with the costs of children's school uniforms and footwear at the beginning of the school year. It may be claimed for a child aged 18-22 in full time education for whom a Child Dependent Increase is payable. Families claiming a social welfare payment (including Family Income Supplement) or a Health Board payment are eligible for this scheme if their income is below certain thresholds. For example the weekly income limit for a one parent family with two child dependents is 238 euros and 334 euros for a couple with two children.

Those taking part in a Vocational Training Opportunities Scheme (VTOS) or in receipt of Back to Education Allowance are also eligible. The allowance is also available to people on employment schemes such as Community Employment, Back to Work Allowance, and Revenue Job Assist who retain their secondary benefits, (i.e. gross weekly household income is less than 317.43 euros). If they do not meet this condition they can apply under the normal income limits.

The allowance is 80 euros for each child aged 2-11 and 120 euros for each child aged 12-17. The payment for a child aged 18-22 in full time education for whom a Child Dependent Increase is payable is also 120 euros.

The Scheme runs from 1st June to 30th September and is administered by the Health Board as part of the Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme. Families should apply to the Community Welfare Officer at their local health centre.

**Careful Cycling Can Be Fun**

Cycling is fun, it's environmentally friendly and it's great exercise – but it is also dangerous. For a lot of people, riding a bike is the only way to get around – so here are our tips for safe cycling:

- 1) — Make sure the bike fits you, that the brakes work properly, tyres are inflated and chain tension is not too loose or tight.
- 2) — Never carry bags on the handlebars – use panniers or a rucksack instead.
- 3) — Wear bright, preferably fluorescent clothing. At night, wear something reflective.
- 4) — Don't ride on the pavement unless there are special signs saying you can. Otherwise it can be dangerous for both you and pedestrians.
- 5) — Always use arm signals to warn motorists what direction you plan to turn.
- 6) — Ride away from the edge of the road to avoid drains.
- 7) — Remember to keep both hands on the handlebars except when signalling.
- 8) — If riding with other people on busy or narrow road, you should always ride one behind the other.
- 9) — When overtaking parked vehicles, beware of them moving, or of doors opening.
- 10) — ALWAYS, ALWAYS, ALWAYS wear a cycle helmet.



**Summer Sun Protection**

Summer is a great time of year to have fun – but UVB radiation from the sun can be dangerous if you are exposed for too long. Children are very vulnerable to the sun's harmful rays, and taking the right precautions is essential to staying healthy.

Here are some expert tips from the Health Education Authority on staying safe in the sun:

- Cover up with loose-fitting, cool clothing and a hat. Take special care of your ears, nose and neck.
- Find some shade during the hottest part of the day – usually between 11am and 3pm.
- Never fall asleep in the sun unprotected.
- Take care when in water. The sun's rays can become even more dangerous through water.
- Always wear good quality sunglasses in bright sunlight.

## 'Female Pay Discrimination Still A Reality'

A Labour Party representative has expressed disappointment that recent statistics have once again highlighted the fact that despite the adoption of anti-discrimination legislation at European and at national levels over the last two decades, a very significant 'gender pay

gap' continues to exist in all EU countries.

Fiachra Ó Céilleachair, a Councillor for the Dungarvan area, was reacting to a European Parliament report showing that on average, women across Europe earn just 83% of men's earnings. In Ireland, this falls to just 80%, the fourth

widest gap in the EU and one that is bucking the European trend by increasing rather than narrowing. CLLR. Ó Céilleachair says he's concerned that the pay gap suffered by Irish women has gone up from 18% in 1997 to 20% today.

Speaking as a Waterford County Council delegate from the Humbert Summer School in Co. Mayo, which last week included a debate on EU matters on its agenda, CLLR. Ó Céilleachair said:

"Under the economic and

social reforms adopted by European Government leaders two years ago, all European countries committed themselves to facilitating the entry of women into the labour force and to achieving a female employment rate of 60% by 2010. The reform of Member States' employment policies under the 'European Employment Strategy' due later this year is a major part of this process."

"If the objective is to voluntarily raise female employment rates, then the issue of equal pay cannot be avoided. My colleague, Proinsias De Rossa MEP, has called on the EU Commission to incorporate a much stronger commitment to equal pay in its forthcoming proposals to revise the European Employment Strategy, particularly in relation to an increased emphasis on the 'local' labour markets (e.g. work such as childcare, social services, craft trades etc), which as the European Parliament has pointed out, is largely female dominated.

"Such an increased emphasis on equal pay, I believe, would lead both to more women voluntarily entering the labour market and to swifter progress in narrowing the gender pay gap, a right that is recognised by the European and all Member States."

# COOKERY CORNER

## Feast From The East

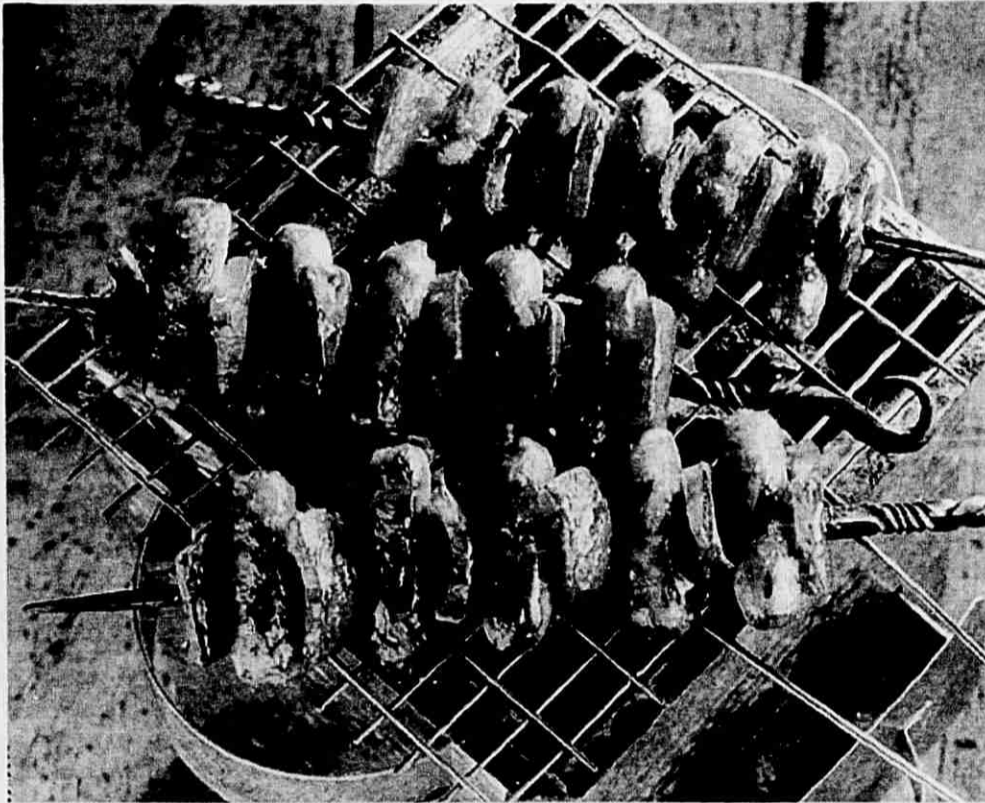
THIS is an ideal dish for an end-of-summer barbecue – it's so simple and tasty that it's sure to become a favourite!

**Ingredients:**

(Serves 4)  
 12-16 Irish cocktail sausages, or 6-8 chipolata sausages  
 1/2 red pepper, seeded and cut into chunks  
 1/2 green pepper, seeded and cut into chunks

**FOR THE GLAZE:**

3 x 15 ml sp (3 tbsps) Hoisin sauce  
 2 x 15 ml sp (2 tbsps) honey  
 1 x 15 ml sp (1 tbsps) tomato puree



**Method:**

If using chipolata sausages, twist each sausage in the middle to form two cocktail-sized

sausages, and then cut to separate. Thread the sausages and pepper alternately on to the skewers. Mix together the

glaze ingredients. Brush over each kebab and cook on the barbecue or under a preheated grill for 8-10 minutes, turning frequently and

basting with the glaze. Serve with noodles or jacket potatoes and mixed salad for a truly tempting barbecue feast.

## Tasty Meatloaf, Australian Style

**Ingredients:**

Serves 8  
 1/2kg ground lean beef  
 1/2 cup water  
 1 onion – finely chopped  
 1/2kg sausage stuffing  
 2 x 15 ml sp vinegar  
 1 x 15 ml sp parsley – chopped  
 1 cup breadcrumbs  
 1 x 15 ml sp instant coffee  
 1 beaten egg  
 1/2 cup tomato ketchup  
 2 medium onions – chopped  
 1/4 cup brown sugar  
 1 cup crushed clove  
 1/4 cup dry red wine or beef stock  
 25g margarine  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce  
 1 x 15 ml sp curry powder  
 2 x 5 ml sp lemon juice  
 Salt and pepper to taste.

**Method:**

Combine the meats, bread-crums, onions, salt, pepper, garlic, parsley, curry and egg in a large bowl. Mix well. Mix milk and water and add to the meat mixture a little at a time until smooth but firm. Shape into a loaf shape and put into greased baking pan. Bake 30 minutes at 375°F. For the sauce, sauté the onions in margarine until golden and add all the other ingredients. Bring slowly to the boil, lower the heat and simmer 10 to 15 minutes. After loaf has cooked for 30 minutes, pour half of the sauce over the meat, return to oven and bake 45 minutes more, basting often with remaining sauce. Serve loaf hot in thick slices with remaining sauce. Also makes great sandwiches.

## Rich and Sweet Cherry Bread

**Ingredients:**

Makes 10  
 1 packet active dry yeast  
 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
 1/3 cup sugar  
 3 eggs  
 3/4 cup warm milk  
 2/3 cup butter  
 1 x 5 ml sp salt  
 1 x 5 ml sp almond flavouring

**Method:**

Soften the yeast in warm milk. Beat in one cup of the flour. Cover and let rise until double in bulk, about one hour. Cream together the butter, sugar and salt until smooth and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Stir in flavouring, then remaining two cups of flour. Add yeast-raised sponge, blending well. Pour into greased 22cm spring-form tube pan or 22cm angel food

cake pan. Let rise until triple in bulk. Bake in moderate (375°F) oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Remove from pan; cool on rack. Prick ring with fork. Place ring on large serving plate. Baste with warm cherry rum sauce. Just before serving, arrange glazed cherries over ring. Fill centre with scoops of vanilla ice cream, if desired. Cherry rum sauce: Drain one can of cherries. Reserve cherries. To cherry juice add enough water to make two cups of liquid. Combine cherry liquid and two cups sugar in saucepan. Boil for 5 minutes. Remove from heat, cool to lukewarm and add two tablespoons rum or 1 1/2 teaspoons rum flavouring. Glazed cherries: To the cherries, add 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 cup corn syrup, and 2 or 3 drops red food colouring. Heat until sugar is dissolved.

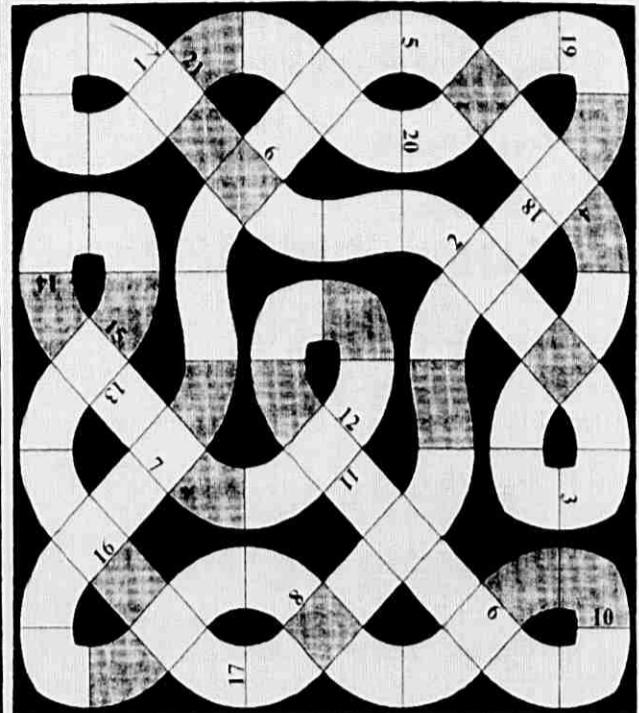

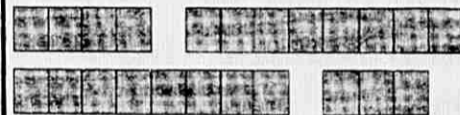

# Applicants With Dungarvan Addresses Discriminated Against

—Claims Councillor

A person who was applying for permission to build two houses in Shanakill, Ring was refused permission by the local authority for no other reason than having a Dungarvan address, Labour Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair has claimed.

The Gaeltacht based representative who has been opposed to the Ring/Old Parish/Helvick action plan, said the problem stemmed from the passing of this development strategy.

Cllr. O Ceilleachair said, that one of the conditions attached to the plan has meant planning applicants now must be a relative of someone already living in the area.

"A lot of people were worried, including myself that people from outside the area would be discriminated against", he said.

But, he claimed that when he argued against this at a meeting of the Dungarvan

area councillors, "the impression I was given by council officials was that this kind of thing wouldn't happen".

However, the plan was passed last year and despite Waterford County Council's decision to spend eur25,000 on a public sewer near the applicants site in Shanakill, "we are presented with a refusal here today for a planning permission for a person with a Dungarvan address."

"Isn't it strange that in 1998, Waterford County Council spent eur25,000 to build a public sewer up that road. And now they refuse someone with a Dungarvan address from building there", he went on to say.

County Manager, Donal Connolly replied that the action plan for the Gaeltacht was similar to others done in the past.

The objective is to take "a reasonable view" of applications for the rural area, he said but added that the same landowner has a significant amount of land zoned for housing on a different site in Ring/Old Parish.

He added that "just because there's a sewer running along the road doesn't mean you grant permission with consideration", the planners have to grant permissions sensibly. "And I think the real reason this was refused was because there was land already zoned which would be the obvious place to go if they wanted planning permission."

## Second South-East Council Rejects Incinerator Plans

The sixth and last local authority in the South-east to vote on the controversial location of an incinerator in the area has rejected the proposal on a vote.

Following on from Waterford County Council's rejection of a waste strategy that envisages the recycling and re-use of 60% of the regions waste and the disposal of one third by incineration, Wexford Co. Council have become the latest to reject the plans.

The strategy is a joint proposal drawn up by the County Managers from the six local authorities and has been given the green light by Kilkenny city, Carlow county, South Tipperary county and Waterford city, councils.

Waterford County Council had been the lone local authority to reject the proposal. But, the respective County Managers can still overturn the decision of the members of both Waterford and Wexford County Council's.

# Council's Spiralling Debts Blamed On Insurance Claims

ical and engineering costs each year, Mr. Clerkin told the members.

But, although proposals have been put forward for a framework to determine the upper limits of damages in certain liability cases, he said there doesn't seem to be any short-term solution to the problem.

"It is seen everywhere as a major cost and a major ongoing problem", the authorities Head of Finance added. "We're not the worst local authority affected as certainly some local authorities, especially urban ones, have a much greater problem than we have. But it is certainly a major concern for us."

First rising significantly after the events of September 11th, the increased insurance costs have become a real issue for all local authorities and to every business in the country, he said.

Meanwhile, the council also footed a bill of eur220,000 in expenses to County Councillors, while the cost of holding elections

accounted for just under eur17,000 and a further payment of a salary of eur23,000 was made to the Chairman (now Mayor). The cash strapped local authority also approved the raising of a loan last year of eur3.150m to finance a number of projects including the controversial eur2.5m extension to the council headquarters, the Civic Offices, which is still on-going.

Increased pay under the benchmarking process is also likely to cost Waterford County Council around eur260,000 though that is subject to negotiations and may be refunded by the Government.

Reviewing the council's Annual Financial Statement for 2001, Mr. Clerkin said "in short, when you look at the figures it looks like a disaster of a year."

However, he claimed that a number of factors have caused the authorities further descent into debt including the conversion to the euro along with the changes in accounting practice.

"Unfortunately, though, there was real over-expenditure and that's something we're going to have to address," Mr. Clerkin admitted.

The County Manager, Donal Connolly, in his report stated that he will continue to re-dress the overall debit balance in this and future years and eliminate it as planned by 2006.

He also described debit on the capital account of eur3.568m compared with a credit balance of eur607,000 the previous year as "a very welcome increase in capital account activity on Housing Construction, Public Lighting, Sanitary Services, Coast Protection and Harbour Improvements".

However, he conceded, "it is essential that the council keeps expenditure in line with available resources and that the debit balance on revenue account is eliminated as scheduled".

The approval of the over-expenditure for the year ended 31st of December 2001 was passed by the

# Launch Of "County Waterford: A Monument Of The Future"

On Friday, July 5th, Martin Cullen T.D., Minister for the Environment and Local Government launched the County Development Board's Strategy for the Economic, Social and Cultural Development of Co. Waterford, 2002-2012 in Clonea Strand Hotel, Dungarvan. On a glorious evening and in the week after the exploits of both hurlers and ladies footballers, it was hardly surprising that a certain air of optimism and pride surrounded the launch.

The potential of the County and the sense of identity of its citizens were never more obvious. And yet there was also a recognition that not all the citizens of County Waterford were in a position to equally enjoy the potential which the County presents. There are sections of society and parts of the County, which are more deprived than others. But that is what this strategy is all about - enhancing that which is good in society while eliminating that which is imperfect.

#### Minister's Speech

The Minister, in his speech, paid tribute to the Board and its staff for the quality of its labours over the previous two years and said that the final product very much reflected the diligence of the research, the deliberations and the consultations, which fed into the formation of this strategy.

The strategy should mean, he said, the provision of public services to the people of County Waterford in a more integrated coherent fashion. To the man and woman on the street, it should mean less confusion and more knowledge.

It should also mean having greater ownership over decisions which affect their daily lives.

In its strategic themes, the strategy highlights the central

issue of inclusion and the idea of building strong and active citizenship to bind people together with a sense of community, commitment and endeavour. The theme of identity, he noted with interest, is reinforced in the importance given to our Gaeltacht community.

The Minister continued: "Quality and excellence have always been, associated with Waterford. A quality environment needs quality infrastructure to support and sustain high quality business. Investment is already committed to the County. You have set yourselves challenging but achievable goals, to make Waterford a place where high quality businesses choose to locate and its citizens enjoy a high quality of life."

The Minister also complemented the Board in recognising that some issues were best tackled in a regional context and none more so than issues, which jointly affect both City and County. The willingness to partake in collaborative actions will ensure that goals will be achieved with greater regularity. Waterford Sports Partnership is already up and running and a joint City/County Energy Agency, to promote sustainable and alternative energy use, is in the pipeline. Of key importance, also, is the commitment to working together to jointly market the County and City - selling our combined advantages, as a place to live, to work and to visit.

He continued: "The establishment of the County Waterford Community Forum has been one good outcome from the process so far. The Forum will provide access for all local community and voluntary groups to our new system of participative local government. Working closely with local

elected representatives, the members of the Forum are learning to bring their influence to bear on the decisions of all the state agencies that work for, and with, local communities. I look forward to all state agencies doing the same, involving local communities in the decisions that affect local services and local development."

The strategy refers to Her Excellency President McAleese when she posed the question whether we could make Ireland the best, the most egalitarian it has ever been. That remains the key challenge. The Development Board's overall

vision for the future of the County is clear and simple - "SA proactive, sustainable community, strong in its own identity, with a good quality of life for all SI. But doing the things necessary to get there will take hard work, and will need all the co-operation and collaboration that can be mustered. While congratulating the Board on the publication of the strategy as the key initial step, he also recognised the difficulties which will present themselves as the Strategy rolls out. He did, however, stress his own, his Departments and the governments commitment to this process and, as the Minister with responsibility for local government, requested Waterford County Council to take a lead proactive role in the implementation phase.

Concluding, the Minister again congratulated the Board on the quality of the local coalition it had forged and on the publication of an excellent piece of work. In wishing it well with its evolving action plan, he encouraged everyone to accept that the benefits reaped would be for all the people and communities of County Waterford. That is something for which we should all strive.

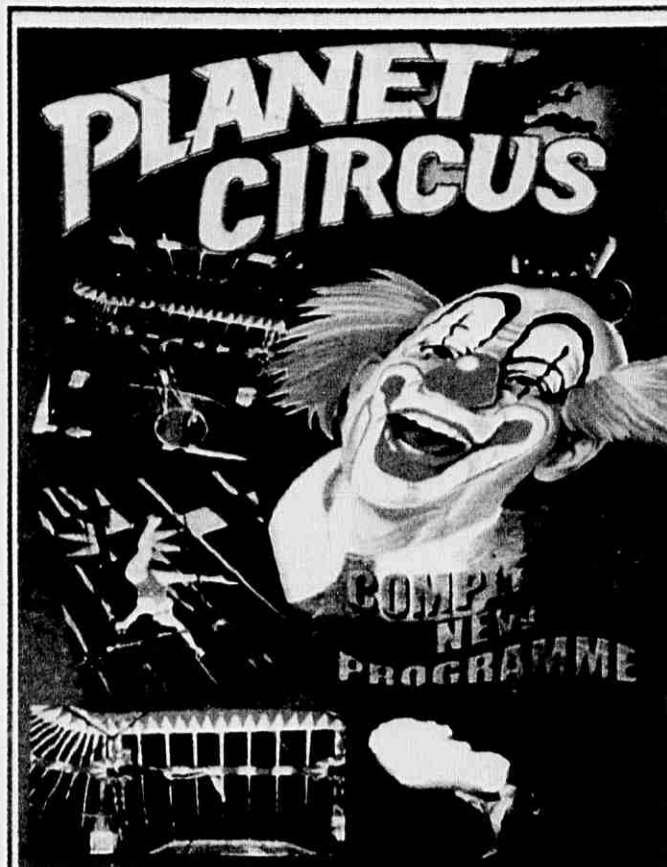

### Patrick Denn (d. 1828)

Patrick Denn was from Coolroe, near Mountain Ash, Co. Waterford. He was a proscribed hedge schoolmaster, as was his father, Laurence. He is recorded as living in Affane in 1800. We later discover him living in Cappoquin. He worked there as parish clerk and schoolmaster. His school was in the Main Street in Cappoquin. One of his many pupils was Dr. John Power, Bishop of Waterford.

Denn also taught Christian Doctrine, in Irish, in the church on Sundays. He wrote and published a number of books to help him in this teaching. Drs. Power and Sheehan were great admirers of his writings and these writings were widely known throughout the county.

Among Denn's main works were 'Aigneas an Pheacaglais an Mbas', 'Comhairle an Pheacag agus aitheantha de Minighthe', and 'Stiurtatheoir an Pheacag'. Denn died on 5 July 1828, aged 72 years. Dr. Power erected a small plaque on the wall of Cappoquin churchyard over his grave. It stated 'Of your charity pray for the repose of the soul of Patrick Denn, whose remains repose beneath this slab. The religious works written by him in the Irish language met with general approval and are proofs of his learning as an Irish scholar, and his zeal and piety as a sincere Christian.'

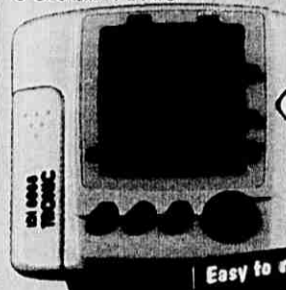

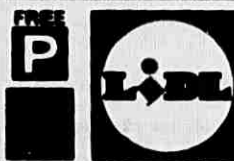

# Friend or Foe? Know Your Bug

Whatever kind of garden you have, you need to get rid of unwanted guests.

But you don't need to work on the principle of killing everything. You don't want to get rid of the garden-friendly predators - nature's own method of dealing with pests.

This type of bug control is part of the overall return to more natural methods of cultivation which has been escalating in recent years. Organic food has

been hitting the supermarket shelves in a big way.

Organic gardening, whether it's food or flowers you are growing, is aimed at getting back to a balance in nature.

Plants are more robust when they are grown in soil kept well fed with organic manure. The use of quick-acting fertilisers induces soft growth which easily becomes the target of many enemies.

Instead of using chemicals

which can kill off too many insects, selective use of predators helps, as does using the right plants.

There are many friendly creatures about - the most useful in the garden being bees whose activities encourage pollination.

And if you thought wasps were the most pesky creatures invented - think again - they eat greenfly.

Toads, frogs and hedgehogs are our allies. They destroy a number of harmful creatures like slugs and snails.

Larvae of the ground beetle are beneficial too. They look like caterpillars, are a dull brown colour and have three pairs of legs. They move very quickly but should not be confused with the harmful wire worm which is lighter in colour and very much less active.

The centipede is another friend, with a rather flat light brown body. It moves very quickly and should not be confused with the harmful millipedes which are either a slate grey or darkish brown colour and very sluggish.

Of the flying insects, the ladybird is one of the gardener's best friends. Both the familiar spotted adult beetles and the tiny rather alligator-like larvae

destroy countless numbers of greenfly.

Some species of hoverfly look rather like elegant wasps. They and their larvae eat huge numbers of aphids.

The common lacewing has a thin, pale green body and is very active, destroying all kinds of small insects.

In the greenhouse, a small wasp called encarsia formosa will keep whitefly at bay if introduced before the problem gets too big.

Another problem, the damaging red spider mite, can be helped by a bug called phyto-seiulus persimilis which eats five adults or 20 young mites in a day.

These two have to be introduced to the greenhouse annually and can usually be bought by mail order - your local garden centre should be able to help you.

Try plants too, nasturtiums help repel whitefly while garlic, tagetes and French and African marigolds, discourage greenfly.

And where possible when you buy any kind of plants or seeds, make sure they are healthy and purchase the ones that are bred to be resistant to common pests and diseases.

## THIS WEEK IN THE GARDEN

### FEED PLANTS IN GROWTH

You should feed all plants that are making rapid growth as you were doing in May and June.

### REMOVE GRASS BOX FROM LAWN MOWER

During July and August, when the weather is hot, it is a good idea to remove the grass box from the lawn mower and let the tiny clippings fall on to the lawn. They will act as a mulch and protect roots from scorching.

### SUMMER-PRUNE WISTERIAS

Wisterias that have filled their allotted space can be induced to flower freely year after year without making a lot of new growth by summer and winter pruning. Now is the time for the first of these operations. Shorten all side growths formed on the main branches to six leaves each.

### SUMMER-PRUNE ROSES

Bush and standard roses of the large flowered type need a light summer pruning now the first flush of flowers is over. Cut stems that have flowered back to about two leaves. Then give the beds a dusting of any good compound flower-garden fertiliser and hoe this in.

### PRICK OFF AND POT PRIMULAS

Greenhouse primulas sown in mid-June will need pricking off. Return them to the frame or greenhouse after potting and shade from strong, direct sunshine.

### SOW SPRING CABBAGE

Now is the time to make a first sowing of cabbages for use in spring and early summer. Keep some seed for a further sowing in the second week in August, as the later seedlings often do best in the long run.

### LIFT AND STORE AUTUMN SOWN ONIONS

Autumn-sown onions should have completed their growth and ripened their bulbs, so you may just as well lift them and have the ground free for some other crop such as winter greens. Lift carefully with a fork and lay out in a sunny place for a few days to dry off. Shake the soil off and store in shallow boxes in a cool dry place.

### Gardeners' friend: the Lethal Ladybird



- Ladybirds eat aphids, mealy bugs, thrips and mites
- A crawling ladybird grub can eat 50 aphids a day
- Ladybird beetles hibernate in winter in their hundreds
- Females lay about 200 eggs on the undersides of aphid-infested plants.

# DISABILITY AWARENESS

## Q (Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder) What is it?

Most children show signs of hyperactivity and are distracted or impulsive at times, so what is different about a child who has it? The child with it will show these symptoms and behaviours more frequently and severely than other children of the same age and developmental level. The disability is evident from an early age and is usually present by the age of seven. Symptoms often become less severe during the late teens, but a small proportion may continue into adulthood.

What are the symptoms of it?

The child with it often displays the following characteristics:

- Trouble paying attention
- Easily distracted
- Changes from one activity to another
- Restless
- Always on the go
- Fidgets
- Impulsive
- Trouble following multiple adult commands

### What causes it?

Extensive research has found it may be genetic, or it may be the result of a head trauma before, during or after birth, or the result of brain damage from bacterial or viral toxins. Research has not found any one single cause for it as yet. There is no blood test or brain scan available to diagnose this disability, but developments in international research (including an ongoing project at Trinity College Dublin) may soon make it easier to understand the factors causing this complex disorder.

### How is it assessed and treated?

It may be associated with speech and language difficulties or behaviour problems. A comprehensive psychological assessment is needed to rule out other causes. An early diagnosis is vital to ensure the child's development in social and educational skills. Research has found that around 70% of people diagnosed with it continue to have problems during adolescence. It is presently under-diagnosed and only a small number of children with the disorder have received appropriate treatment. With increasing awareness of this, it is hoped that this situation will be reversed and that the outlook for this group of children will be improved.

### Research into it

At present there is an increasing awareness and recognition of it, especially amongst the medical and teaching professions. The Departments of Psychiatry, Psychology and Genetics at Trinity College Dublin are currently carrying out research into it. ## Co. Waterford Community Forum Launches Strategic Plan and Funding Handbook

The County Waterford Community Forum, making its first major contribution to community and voluntary development in the county, hosts a funding workshop for the more than 130 affiliated community and voluntary groups on Thursday July 11, the workshop which is free to community representatives takes place at the Clonea Strand Hotel, Clonea at 7 pm.

The Forum believes that many brilliant community projects never get beyond the vision stage because communities are unaware of the numerous sources of funding that are available and frequently lack the technical know how required to access these sources. The workshop will deal with these issues.

The Workshop will be followed at 8.30 pm by the launch of a Funding Handbook. Recently elected Mayor of the County, Councillor Lola O'Sullivan will do the honours. The funding handbook has been developed by the Forum with help from the County Development Board. With feelings of great sadness and sorrow we record the passing of Maurice Dalton, Kilcooney, at his residence on Monday 17th June after a period of ill health that was borne with tremendous courage, dignity and fortitude.

Aged 92 years, and a native of Kilcooney, Maurice's life virtually spanned a century which heralded tremendous changes and

developments.

Predeceased by his brothers Jack, Paddy and sisters Mary and Margaret. Maurice was the kind of man who could turn his hand to anything and make a success of it. When at the age of sixteen, Maurice took on tailoring and learned the art with Philip Hassett whom he served for four years. Later he teamed up with Peter Dalton for 5 years and for another four years he tailored with Paddy McCarthy. Ballinamult Creamery, this was a hive of activity at this time and virtually every trade was patronised by a much appreciative clientele.

While employed at the Creamery by day, Maurice also helped out on the family holding, which was to pass to Maurice on his father's instructions. Maurice was very keen on horses and ploughing and its many a field he laboured in with potatoes, vegetables, mangles and cabbage resulting from his labours. Life was tough with hand milking and the pony and drag brought the milk to the local Creamery.

Maurice was a very conscientious man who did everything well. His work was his true vocation in life and although tough and with hardships a plenty Maurice never complained and took to the many tasks with relish and dedication.

In his spare time Maurice was a master on the dance floor, he loved the sets, waltzes, foxtrots and quicksteps. Many a trophy was won by Maurice and Peg at dancing, in truth they had few equals. In 1972 he assisted Sliabh gCua to All-Ireland Set Dancing success in 1972. He also played in the Fife & Drum Band in Touraneena which was so important in the life of the Parish pre television era.

He was an accomplished and skilful footballer who manned the goal for Touraneena on many occasions. Indeed thanks to Maurice the County title was won in 1936. Even Ireland's Eye and WLR spoke and wrote in detail of Maurice's ability as a goalkeeper of top drawer quality. He loved to listen to all the games on Radio Eireann and when Waterford were the king pins Maurice was overjoyed. Before his passing he often spoke in glowing terms of the local GAA coverage on WLR and on Kieran O'Connor and Jim Joe Landers who were providing such a vital and indeed social service. Maurice no doubt from his celestial home is keeping a close eye on the Deise and is celebrating their emergence once again on the centre stage of Gaeldom after thirty nine years of famine, near misses

and heartbreak.

He loved his game of 45 which saw him frequent at Ahearn's on Mary St. and Tony Mountains in Grattan Sq. and Quealy's in Touraneena.

In times gone by with his great friend Jack Whelan of Kilcooney he would attend all the ploughing matches and no doubt his opinions were aired with his friends over the long winter evenings. He loved people and visiting people where yarns, stories and debates would be the order of business. All the old stock of Touraneena which included Danny Cotter and equals were so dear to Maurice. If a party piece was called Maurice obliged with his cover the buckle.

Maurice Dalton was a man of great energy and had a wonderful enthusiasm for life. He loved his God and attended his Church services with deep devotion. I suppose when one thinks of Maurice we also think of Peg, inseparable in life as husband and wife we know that Peg's life centred on Maurice. He was a wonderful husband and a caring man who loved his father-in-law and who spent some time with him before he passed on. He took a great interest in the Dalton family and when nephew John donned Club and County colours Maurice was thrilled and of great encouragement.

To conclude, Kilcooney will never be the same, a knock on the door, one was greeted with a genuine welcome, a roaring fire and a cup of tea was a must. His wonderful memory and with the gift of story telling, Maurice could entertain for hours. A lovely man who was one of nature's gentlemen, a valued and loyal family friend who will be missed. Monday 17th June was a sad day for us all, Maurice took his leave just short of 93 summers and joined his brothers Paddy and Jack, sisters Mary and Margaret enjoying their eternal reward.

Reposing at the Kiely Funeral Home where prayers were recited by Fr. Kelleher P.P. and Fr. P. Hallihan P.E. the removal took place on Wednesday evening to St. Mary's Church, Touraneena. It has been a few weeks since the Cappoquin Playground Committee has put on a fundraising event as there hasn't been confirmation of a site selection yet. Although we fought hard and put forth a good argument, The Twig Bog site has been rejected by Waterford County Council as their insurance company has advised against a playground going in that vicinity due to the following reasons.

- proximity to the river
- there is a drain which runs down to the river
- there is some industrial activity as well as the Council's own recycling centre.

At this stage, we decided to look at further options for the playground.

The committee held a meeting with Peter Carey, County Secretary, to review the plans for the Barrack Street site and other site options available.

We are now looking at the possibility of a playground at Danesfield, between the two existing soccer pitches. This will take some negotiations with the two soccer clubs yet we feel that is an ideal location and can be beneficial for all parties concerned.

The Cappoquin Playground Committee is committed to bringing this project to fruition. We have received tremendous community support. We have received commitment from Waterford County Council. In fact Peter Carey has assured the committee that Cappoquin has been selected as one of the two towns in the county to receive allocated funds for a playground for 2003. We have also received commitments of funds from a variety of companies in the Cappoquin area.

Time, patience, commitment and perseverance. One way or another, there will be a playground in Cappoquin.

## "Genuine Fear" Of GMOs In Europe

It has been out of the headlines for quite some time now, but the controversial issue of GMOs is most unlikely to be brought back into the limelight with the latest development - the ratification by the EU of the Cartagena Protocol on Biosafety.

The protocol, which received Union ratification towards the end of last month, was described by Environment Commissioner Margot Wallstrom as bringing worldwide access to better information on Genetically Modified Organisms a step closer. It has established an Advanced Informed Agreement (AIA) procedure which ensures that countries are given the necessary information to make informed decisions on whether to import GMOs. The protocol has also established one set of basic international rules for dealing with GMOs so that, for the first time, there is a legal framework for the cross-border movement of GMOs. For example, it sets out the agreed documentation requirements for shipments of GMOs and establishes a Biosafety Clearing House (BCH) to facilitate the exchange of information.

By the end of June, 110 coun-

tries had signed the protocol and 20 had ratified it. It needs 50 ratifications before it can be brought into force; this is expected to happen by the spring of next year.

The issue has gone off the boil in recent times, not least in Ireland where it never did generate as much controversy as in some other countries in the Union. However, on the basis that it will crop up (pardon the pun) in pub conversations in the future as more GMOs come on the market, it is certainly worthwhile arming oneself with some of the facts.

It is more than ten years since the Union first set about introducing regulatory legislation on GMOs and since then the Commission has authorised the commercial release of 18 GMOs. For the record, the 18 authorised products are two vaccines against Aujeszky's disease, a vaccine against rabies, a tobacco tolerant to bromoxynil, four swede rapes resistant to glufosinate ammonium, a soybean tolerant to glyphosate, a chicory tolerant to glufosinate ammonium, two maize varieties tolerant to glufosinate ammonium, a test kit to detect antibiotic residues in

milk, two carnation lines with modified flower colour, carnation lines with improved vase life and two maize varieties expressing a specific gene.

No authorisations have been issued by the Commission since October 1998, although there are currently 12 applications pending. Member States are allowed to invoke Article 16, the so-called safeguard clause, to ban on a temporary basis the placing on the market of GM maize and oilseed rape products in their territories. Currently, there are nine ongoing Article 16 cases involving Austria, Luxembourg, France, Greece, Germany and the UK.

Under the Novel Foods Regulation of the EU, no products consisting of or containing live GMOs have been authorised, although 11 applications concerning such products are pending and are at different stages in the procedure.

So far, two GM seed varieties have been included in the Common Catalogue for seed varieties that can be marketed in the EU. A further 18 applications for maize varieties for inclusion in the catalogue are pending.

In its anxiety to keep an iron grip on all aspects of GMOs, the Commission has proposed new rules governing the traceability of these products. It will mean that traceability will start with the company that develops the GMO - for instance, a genetically modified seed. This company would then have to inform any purchaser of the seed that it is genetically modified; it is also obliged to keep a register of people/companies that have bought the seed. Equally, the farmer would have to inform any purchaser of the harvest that it is genetically modified and he/she would also keep a register of buyers.

Commissioner Wallstrom has said in the past that there is a "genuine fear" of GM crops in Europe. In the same context, she mentioned that consumer confidence has been shaken greatly by a series of well-publicised incidents, starting with BSE. "Such incidents are still very fresh in people's minds," she told an American audience.

### Think Safety and Take Action

#### Your Health:

- Wear protective equipment where the situation requires it: goggles, gloves, veterinary gloves, ear defenders, a facemask or respirator.
- Atmospheres with mould, dust or fumes are injurious to health. Where these arise, ventilate the area thoroughly. A face mask (EN 149 Type P2) gives a high level of protection against dust and spores.
- Adopt high standards of hygiene and cover all cuts and wounds with water proof plasters. Keep a first aid box and attend a first aid course.

#### Dairying

##### Breeding in July - April Calf

It has been a hard time for cows. Current information suggests conception rates have not been good in May and June. The next 3 weeks is your last chance, otherwise it will be May calvers. You have to adopt a 'Never Say Die' attitude. Keep up the heat detection and use tail paint. If you're getting tired of this, bring in the best sub, a stock bull. Any cows you have not seen in heat - get them examined. Use test bulls or beef bulls (with short gestation length) on late calvers or cows with problems.

##### Farm Infrastructure

The recent period of bad weather may have highlighted any weaknesses in your grazing system. Did you have a good network of farm roadways? Was there enough water troughs? Are the gaps to your paddocks a mess? Do they need filling? Do you need some cow paths? Maybe the farm infrastructure can improve to be prepared for the next rainy day. Think about it. If the summer improves maybe some of these deficiencies could be tackled.

##### Sheep

Wean now as ewe is contributing little

Ewes become a nuisance to lambs at this time of year. They produce little milk and compete with their lambs for grass. This coming week should remove much of this competition as lambs are weaned.

##### When to wean

Ewe milk yield peaks at about 3-4 weeks after lambing and by week 8 is only 50% of its peak. By week 12 it is considerably less. Therefore lambs at 12-14 weeks are getting practically all their feed from grass and very little from milk. They are better weaned at this stage. Being able to supply adequate grass to lambs is the key to successful weaning. At 12-14 weeks a ewe requires 2-2.5kg of DM and each lamb over 1.0kg each. Lambs are selective grazers, selecting the sweetest and best grass for themselves. If the ewes are with them at week 14 then this intake of 1 kg is not possible.

If grass is scarce for the ewe - then it is extremely scarce for the lambs. Early weaning should be considered in these situations to allow lambs have the best. The message is clear: don't allow ewes to compete with lambs for grass from 14 weeks onwards i.e. wean.

##### Management Tips

- Ensure lambs are in a well fenced field
- Move lambs to best grass on farm, ideally aftergrass containing clover.
- Don't graze tightly, use a follower group of stock to clean up.
- Remember, during April and May lambs will gain 300 gms/day, after weaning they can only gain 100 - 200 gms/day depending on grass quality
- Consider using a pour-on for flystrike. They

have a shorter withdrawal period than dips. Do not dip if you expect to sell within the next month.

- Clip or dagg around tail to keep clean.
- A stomach worm dose is advisable especially when moving to aftergrass. It is not necessary if a residual drench was used in the last few weeks eg Cydectin
- Treat for cobalt in deficient areas
- Dividing lambs into a light, heavy and ewe lamb group will save time spend gathering and weighing lambs. However, there will be 3 groups of lambs to check each day.
- Smaller flocks can leave all lambs together provided males are castrated.
- Restrict ewe feed for 1 - 2 weeks to stop milk production. This can be on a bare paddock or indoors. Do not restrict for too long and too severe. This could leave ewes too far behind in condition before going to ram.
- Be careful with indoors, if they are not well bedded an outbreak of mastitis is possible.
- Select replacement lambs. Now is the time, not autumn, when only the poor performing ewe lambs are left.
- Lambs on meal will be handling well. Continue to feed meal otherwise a setback will occur.

Successful weaning depends on putting good grass in front of lambs and using other animals to follow and clean up the pasture. Also remember to treat for parasites and cobalt to allow lambs to continue at maximum growth potential.

## Farmers Advised to Conduct Winter Feed Audit

Farmers have been advised by Teagasc to look seriously at their silage and hay requirements for next winter.

Teagasc advisory specialist, Tom Egan, said the unprecedented bad weather will result in both poorer quality winter feed and lower quantities than needed on many farms. "Because of the poor grass growth, many farmers have been forced to allocate the maximum area to stock for grazing and therefore cannot close-off a portion of the farm for a late season cut of silage".

"For some farmers, the best option may be to make maximum use of the limited grass available and purchase winter feed supplies next autumn", he said.

The drier weather last week enabled substantial progress to be made in silage making. Teagasc estimates that up to 75% of first cut silage is now harvested. A limited amount of hay was also saved last week. However, difficulties remain in wetter areas and some animals are still housed because of poor grass growth and wet ground conditions. With warmer weather forecast for the early part of next week, Tom Egan has urged farmers to apply nitrogen in order to get the maximum benefits in grass growth.

# Organic Farming Expansion Will Be Slow Says Teagasc

Expansion of organic food production in Ireland will be a slow and difficult process according to a Teagasc economist.

Liam Connolly told the Teagasc National open day on organic farming at Johnstown Castle, Wexford that organic production in Ireland is currently at around one third of the EU average.

"There are 1,000 organic producers in Ireland at present, farming less than 1% of the land area. Total organic food sales are worth €25m per annum of which close on €10m is imported. Irish consumers purchase just 0.4% of their food as organic compared to an average of 2% for EU consumer", he said.

Liam Connolly said while organic food production will continue to increase it will remain a niche market. A recent Government report projected a trebling of organic food sales by 2006.

"For the foreseeable future, it is difficult to see more than 5% of the land area of Ireland devoted to organic production", said Liam Connolly.

He said beef and lamb make up 60% of organic production at present. Vegetables account for around 15% with dairy products, pigs and poultry making up the remainder.

He gave details of a Teagasc analysis of the economics of organic production, which shows that beef, cereals and potatoes are currently the most profitable organic farm enterprises.

"Our study of organic milk producers last year showed that their income levels were 10% lower than those in conventional milk production. While they received a 29% price premium milk yields were 40% lower than conventional production".

"In order for organic milk producers to have comparable incomes to those in conventional dairying, they would need a price premium of 36%", he said.

He referred to the situation in Denmark which experienced a big increase in organic milk production over the past decade. Because of over-production organic producers are now receiving no price premium for their milk and many have reverted to conventional production.

He said beef is currently the most profitable organic production system. A Teagasc survey showed that organic beef incomes in 2000 were almost 60% higher than conventional incomes. "This was due to significantly lower costs, a 20% price premium and top-up payment of €91 per hectare under the Rural Environment Protection Scheme (REPS).

On the other hand, a similar survey on lamb production showed little difference between organic and conventional incomes", he said.

In relation to cereals and vegetables, he said yields of organic cereals are typically about 60% lower than conventional production. The yield penalty for potatoes is around 25% and between 20% and 50% for vegetables.

"Because of the low level of production, Irish organic wheat and barley growers are making incomes between 20% and 80% higher than their conventional

counterparts. Incomes from organic potato production are around 50% higher".

"As a high proportion of organic vegetables are sold locally, outlets can be easily over-supplied leading to a rapid decline in price premia", he said.

The open day featured organic production blueprints which have been developed by Teagasc at Johnstown Castle Research Centre.

Dr Noel Culleton, leader of the Teagasc organic research programme said that the only farmers who operate to the

highest production standards will survive in organic farming.

"The level of competence in animal and crop husbandry must be of the highest standards. In livestock farming, getting maximum production from clover and high skills in dealing with animal health and welfare are crucial".

"Organic farming is not an easy option. Farmers who run good commercial conventional operations are the ideal candidates for successful organic farming. Poor conventional farmers will make poor organic farmers", said Dr Culleton.

Mr. Mossie O'Connor was responsible for membership in the Kinsalebeg branch, was drawn to be the Waterford representative on the tour at the June meeting of the Waterford IFA County Executive. His entry into the draw was secured on the basis of his hard work to increase membership in their branches. IFA membership in Co. Waterford is now at an all time high and last year saw a 5% increase in membership

from the previous year.

Fifty farmers from IFA branches throughout the country will be heading to Europe to view the threats and opportunities presented by farmers in EU applicant countries following the announcement this week by the farmers insurance company, FBD Trust Company is to continue its sponsorship of the very successful Scholarship Tour launched almost ten years ago.

The European Scholarship Tour, made possible with the generous sponsorship of FBD Trust, promises to be an extensive one entailing an eight day itinerary of visits to farms, research institutions, food processors, advisory services, farm

organisations and agricultural officials. A detailed assessment of the risks and opportunities for Irish agriculture from an enlarged EU will be made by participants.

The travel programme will take the group of Irish farmers on a major sweep along the Baltic Sea and starting in Vilnius the capital of Lithuania and travelling through Tallinn the capital of Estonia and finishing up in Helsinki, Finland, IFA hope to build on the success of the last ten years tours which has brought nearly 500 members to Europe, most of whom would never had the opportunity but for this scholarship scheme.

## Farm Crisis Requires Action By Taoiseach

ICMSA will seek emergency financial assistance and the establishment of a Commission on Farm Incomes directly from the Taoiseach, Mr. Bertie Ahern T.D.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of the ICMSA said: "I am fully aware of the current state of the public finances but extraordinary events call for special action by the Government.

"I will not be side tracked by all the talk of EU rules on national funding. The Taoiseach is the head of a sovereign government and surely he has the right to give assistance to meet the extreme hardship now being faced by farm families in Ireland. "From my own experience and my contacts with farmers throughout the country, morale amongst farmers is at an all-time low. The weather conditions have compounded the already substantial cut in farm incomes. Tomorrow, I will be literally pleading with the Taoiseach to offset some of the costs due to the bad weather. ICMSA has already proposed that there is need of a Government fund of €50 million to meet half the cost of extra animal feed.

"With regard to crucial up-coming talks at European level, ICMSA will also be raising major concerns with regard to the Mid-Term Review and funding commitments for CAP up to and beyond 2006," concluded Mr. O'Rourke.

## More Localised Weather Forecasting

Met Eireann have agreed with ICMSA to provide more localised information in their regional weather forecasts where possible. Mr. John Hempenstall, the ICMSA representative on the AgMet Group, welcoming the deal said: "Farming is critically dependant on the most up to date and the most localised weather forecasting - particularly at present because of the disastrous weather conditions for farming".

Met Eireann will also provide, where possible, more information in their normal weather forecasts. The more localised weather forecasts by region are available through the Weatherdial service.

"ICMSA has proposed that there should be a mid-week farming forecast and that more use should and can be made of the Aertel Service to provide more detailed information to farmers and other people depending on weather," concluded Mr. Hempenstall.

## I.C.A. GUILD CELEBRATES GOLDEN JUBILEE



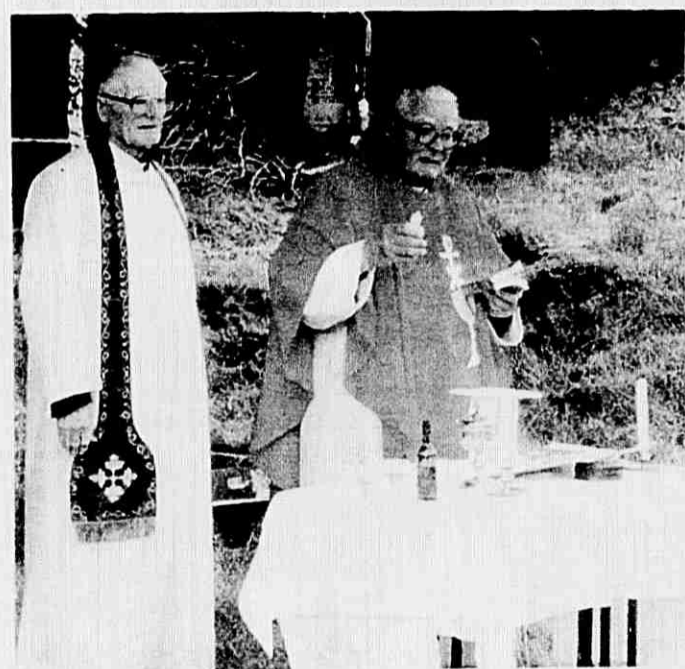

Waterford which sad event took place in the loving care of the doctors and nurses of St. James' Hospital, Dublin on Friday 28th June. He was a man who never sought the limelight or the riches of this world, but he possessed a wealth that money can never buy. He was a genial, compassionate, humble man and his greatest attribute was his loyalty and devotion to his family and his demise has evoked feelings of sincere regret among his family, neighbours and his many friends. Many tributes have been paid to this fine gentleman, but perhaps the finest was paid to him on Monday evening. When all walks of life were represented in the large concourse of mourners who were present when his remains after the rosary was recited by Rev. Fr. ## LOCAL HISTORY

### The Restoration and Afterwards

With the return of King Charles 11 to the throne in 1660 very many of those who had lost their estates in 1653 expected to be restored. Anyone who wished to do so was invited to submit a claim to a Court of Claims for restoration. So many applied for this that the Duke of Ormonde, formerly Earl of Ormond, stated cynically that a new Ireland must be discovered to satisfy everyone.

In 1662 the commander of the garrison in Dungarvan was Major James Dennis. His garrison consisted of one captain, one cornet, a sergeant, three corporals, two drummers and sixty seven soldiers. This was a large garrison for a small port and reflects its continuing importance in the eyes of the government.

Locally the McGrath's nor the O'Brien's, who were transplanted, were not restored. However, Lord Broghill and his brother, the 2nd Earl of Cork, were not penalised in any way for their support of the Cromwellian regime. They retained their political and social positions in the county and the country. So did Sir Richard Osborne, a royalist, who became later a supporter of Cromwell. In 1666 Osborne was granted the land of Gledane in the civil parish of Kilgobinet. Philip McGrath's of Slievegoe.

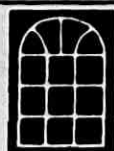

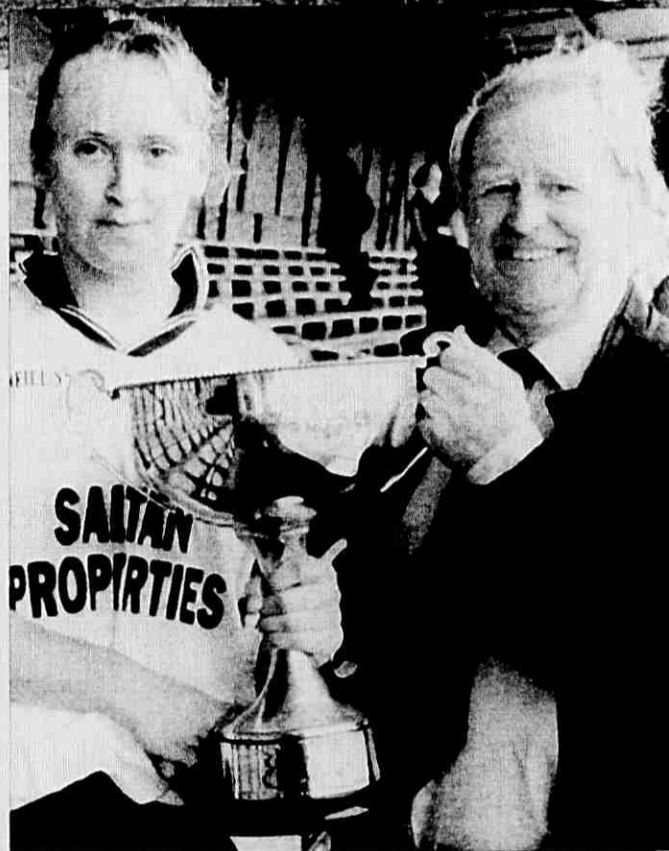

# The Munster Final And The Aftermath

After days of wild excitement and unprecedented celebrations life showed signs of returning to normality about midweek. About 15,000 Waterford supporters had seen the match from the stands and terraces in Pairc Uí Caoimh (this is the number of tickets sold here in the county) and all had their own story to tell. Some were well worth telling and will be retold over and over. What is seldom is certainly wonderful and for most of our supporters this was the most enjoyable experience of a lifetime.

All our players were unborn when we last won the Munster S/H title. The majority of our supporters who were in Cork, were not in Limerick 40 odd years ago when we last defeated Tipperary in the final. It was the first time in history that a Waterford team won a televised Munster final and what a bonus this was for the tens of thousands of Waterford supporters, who, for one reason or another, were unable to travel.

The celebrations in Grattan Square on Sunday night when the victorious team arrived in a blaze of glory to be greeted by about 7,000 fanatical supporters who were delighted to be a part of the splendidly organised official Dungarvan reception. Rumours tell us that the celebrations went on all night and next day.

On Monday night countless thousands of supporters were on the Quay in the city to greet and pay tribute to the panel of players, team manager Justin McCarthy, Seamie Hannon and Colm Bonner as well as the other members of the back-up team.

## MESSAGES OF CONGRATULATIONS

They came from all over the country including messages from officials whom we would normally regard as rivals. It was certainly a great boost for our county to have such genuine messages of goodwill pouring in from all over. Even our old enemy from 1998, Ger Loughnane sounded very genuine when lavishing praise on the quality of our hurling and the manner in which the players were guided from the sideline. We excused Ger for giving himself a little pat on the back for his expressed pre-match confidence in Waterford's ability to beat Tipperary.

Babs Keating is reported to have spent Sunday night on his knees praying that the ground would open and swallow him, following his contemptible comment on radio on Saturday. There was goodwill too in the congratulatory messages out of Tipperary.

## THE CUP

It was taken on visits to a few places during the week, but this is now over and the panel are back in training since Friday evening when they assembled for a session in the Dungarvan club grounds. It is not known if the panel will remain at 25 as it was for the Munster final. It is now permissible to have 30 as Tipperary had in Pairc Uí Caoimh.

## PARKING IN CORK

It has ever been a problem if you take your car near the grounds, as very many did for the Munster final, but a fleet of very cooperative garda helped to ease the problems where possible. In our case a very worrying situation de-

veloped when we were unable to find parking space, but like an angel from heaven, Garda Martin Landers (son of Mickey and Rita) came to our aid and solved our problem in a flash.

## TRANSMISSION

The celebrations now over and the euphoria beginning to dissipate, we find ourselves in a 'transition period' and in a short time we will begin to worry all over again about our chances in the All Ireland semi-final in Croke Park on Sunday, August 11th.

With practically all the top hurling counties (except Limerick) still standing, it is like being back to 'square one.' Cork, Clare, Tipperary, Wexford, Offaly, Galway and Antrim are still in the hunt as well as ourselves and Kilkenny. So apart from having the Munster title, it is like starting all over again.

## GAC MEETING

Next Sunday will be four weeks before the All Ireland semi-final and the close down is to ensure that players will not be exposed to injury risks.

The decision will have repercussions at other levels too. It will mean that the Ardmore versus Ring intermediate first round match cannot be played until after the All Ireland semi-final.

## Double Header At Fraher Field On Sunday

The feature game here will be the replay of the Nire versus Ardmore first round senior football tie. Last year it took three and a half matches to separate these teams in the championships and again this year they finished on level terms five weeks ago. Only last Friday, Ardmore won the replay of the under 21 divisional final and retained the title which they won last year. This must mean something in their favour.

Following the decision of the FAI, to sign a 4 year contract with Rubert Murdock's agents to televise their match on satellite television, there has been speculation that the GAA, will follow suit sometime in the near future if an attractive offer is put on the table.

Two Sunday newspapers added to the speculation by reporting that headquarters would look favourably on such a proposition if the offer was considered worthwhile. One journalist seemed to create the notion that he had inside information about the official G.A.A. feelings on handing over the televising of our big matches to the Sky people..

I, for one cannot ever see this happening. I do not believe that Central Council (who are the ultimate ruling authority in the Association) ever allowing negotiations on such a matter even getting underway.

It would be a betrayal and a sell out inviting open revolt by clubs and members.

I am not and never have been an admirer of RTE and I would feel worried about them having a monopoly of anything, but since T.n.a.G. came into the equation in a big way this year, things have improved with the national broadcasting station.

I have a feeling that we will hear a lot more on the topic in the months ahead.

The GAA. shop on Grattan Square will reopen on tomorrow, Thursday for the sale of emblems of every description. It will remain in business until Saturday, August 10th which is the eve of the semi-final.

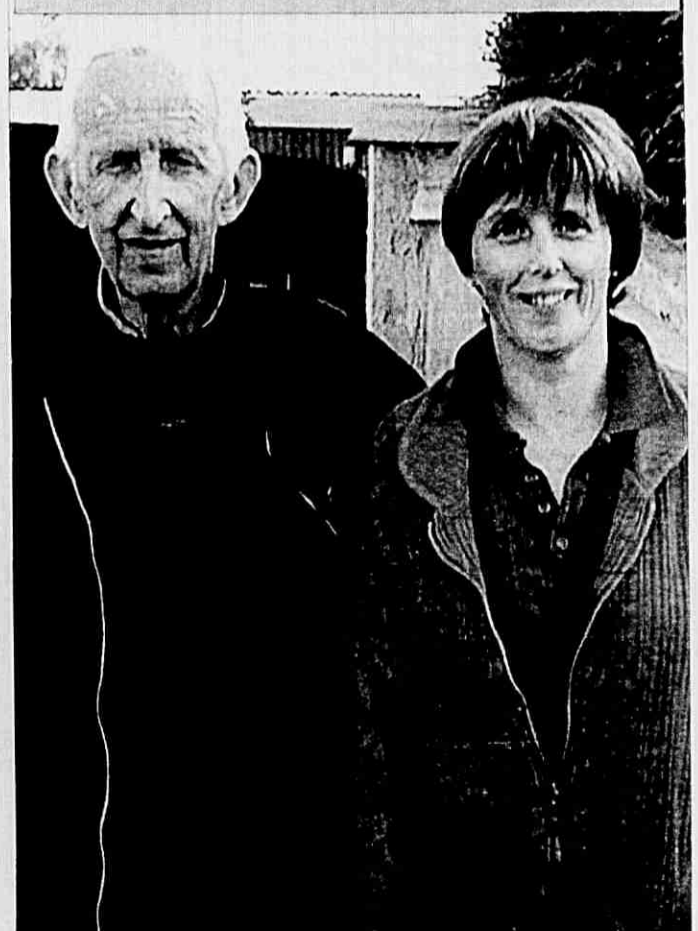

An arrest warrant was made against Egan who is currently riding winners in the UK. The warrant requested Egan to return to Hong Kong by June 30th. Egan was arrested in February 02 as part of an investigation into alleged race fixing and illegal bookmaking. While he is banned from riding in Hong Kong he is free to ride elsewhere and the British racing authorities have no problem with the situation.

**LETTER TO THE EDITOR**

**Munster Final Victory**

The Editor, Dungarvan Leader,  
A chara

When Waterford lost last year's Munster hurling semi-final to Limerick, it was the most frustrating and infuriating experience in my long years of following the county team. It was one of the most open All-Ireland competitions ever, which a moderate Tipperary team eventually won mainly because they played steadier and more economical hurling than anyone else. The best hurling in the competition was played by Waterford in the first twenty minutes of their game against Limerick. However, a combination of appallingly bad sideline management and the age-old problem of temperamental brittleness saw the Déise disintegrate when the Shannonsiders put the heat on in the second half.

My immediate reaction after the game was to throw in the towel. In terms of skill and experience, this was one of Waterford's best ever teams, yet once again they had revealed the lack of self-belief that has dogged the county down through the years. I reckoned this was the end of the line for this particular group of hurlers, whose legacy of failure would place an even heavier burden on the next generation. In other words, the future was bleak and a body can only take so much punishment.

The subsequent appointment of Justin McCarthy as coach did little to raise my spirits. I had heard unenthusiastic reports on his previous coaching work, and in any case reckoned that Waterford's main requirement was someone who could instill belief, and not just technical skills, in the players. McCarthy certainly had failed in this respect with the Clare team of the 1970's. His team selections and sideline decision-making during the National Hurling League did nothing to enhance my confidence in the man. The manner of the departure of Stephen Frampton and Sean Cullinane from the squad also raised questions about McCarthy's management style.

However, things changed dramatically with the victory over Cork. While winning that game against Waterford's bogey team was a massive step forward in itself, it was the manner of the win that was most impressive. Despite the way Cork came back in the second half, Waterford held their shape and kept hurling, finally crafting a marvellous winning point by keeping the head and working the ball up the field. Equally important was the contribution of the new kids on the block - the three Eoins (Kelly, Murphy and McGrath) who all showed great temperament in their first big test. Shortly after that game I read Justin McCarthy's autobiography, (Hooked), which impressed me greatly in terms of his views on training, player management and coaching, his commitment and attention to detail.

I was therefore in quite confident mood coming up to the Munster final, as I expected Waterford to improve considerably over the Cork game and did not think that Tipperary were nearly as good as they were hyped up to be. Indeed, for the first time in my life, I actually placed a bet on a sporting event other than the Grand National! However, when Waterford started very nervously, and Tipperary went four points up, the old doubts returned. But this time there seemed to be a new element of steel in the Waterford approach. The players were sticking to their guns, improving all the time, and responding superbly to each Tipperary goal. Halfway through the second half I was anticipating another stomach-wrenching tight finish. Then, as if driven by a force-field

blowing down from the city end terrace, Waterford just surged to victory. The last eight minutes were surreal, as Tipp threw in the towel and it was just a case of waiting for the final whistle.

Watching the TV coverage afterwards, I was impressed by Ger Loughnane's analysis of Waterford's game plan, which he identified as spreading the Tipperary defence, isolating them individually and taking them on. The previous strength of the Tipperary backs, according to Loughnane, was their ability to suck forwards in and bottle them up with good support play. Well, an analysis of the match video certainly corroborates Loughnane's insightful views.

During the course of the game, Waterford played the ball to or along the wings no less than 35 times, compared to just eleven times for Tipperary. By contrast, Tipperary played the ball down the middle 32 times, as against 21 times by Waterford. The key Waterford players in executing this plan were Tony Browne and Eoin Kelly. For most supporters and media commentators, Kelly has been a complete revelation. However, two years ago, when still a minor, he gave a man-of-the-match display for the Waterford under 21's when they beat Tipperary in Thurles, sending a stream of good ball from midfield into the corner forwards - the same John Mullane and Eoin McGrath who tormented the Tipperary corner backs in Páirc Uí Chaoimh. It is an amazing statistic that neither of the latter played the ball even once in the first half. In fact, Thomas Costello played the ball for the first time in the 54th minute, followed by Donncha Fahy two minutes later.

A second key feature of the Waterford game was combined play (a major area of weakness when Gerald McCarthy was in charge). Waterford completed 36 passes during the course of the game, as against 22 for Tipperary. This was, to an extent, a direct result of the way Waterford played the game, as it was easier to find players in space with the Tipperary defence stretched. In particular, the Waterford forwards frequently had plenty of space and time when shooting. I counted 22 instances of Waterford players shooting without being under direct pressure from opposing players. These shots produced 13 points. Tipperary only had nine unpressurised shots, yielding five points. The difference is eight points - precisely Waterford's winning margin.

So hats off to Justin McCarthy and his fellow mentors for devising the game plan, and instilling in the players the self-belief, the discipline and the sureness of touch to pursue the plan throughout. And hearty congratulations to the players themselves for their super display of conviction and skill. As a young teenager, I was in Limerick in 1963 when Waterford last beat Tipp in a Munster final. That was a tough and dogged low-scoring game which Waterford won by three points (after Tipp, ironically, also had a goal disallowed). Already league champions, Waterford were hot favourites to beat Kilkenny in the All-Ireland final, but indiscipline in defence handed Eddie Keher ten pointed frees and the Cats a one-goal victory. What odds another final this year between these two old adversaries? If Waterford can keep their feet on the ground and maintain their self-belief, they certainly have the players not only to get to the final but to reverse the result of 1963.

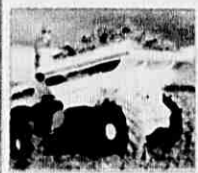

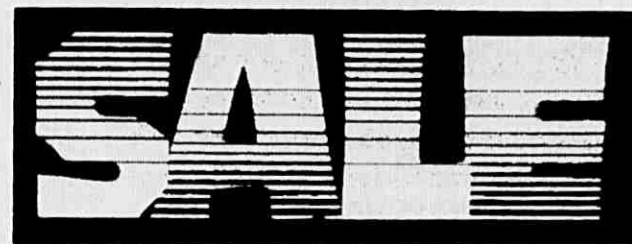

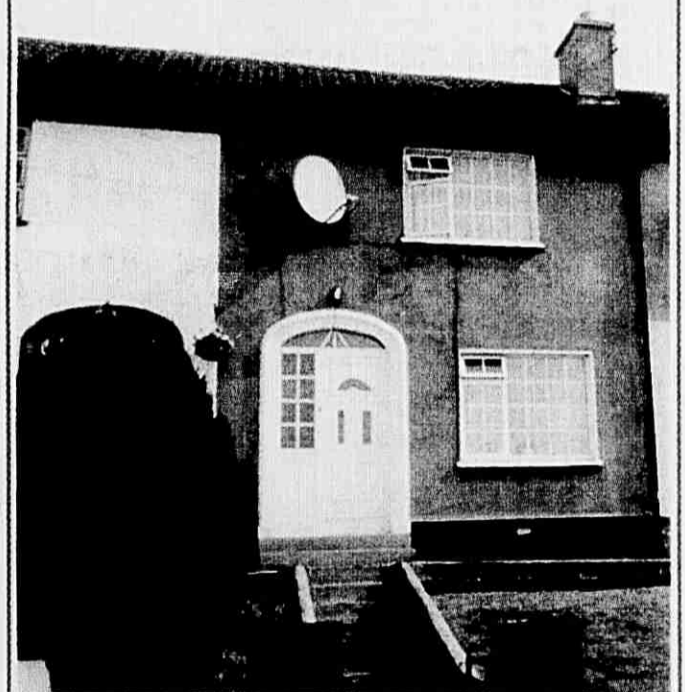
