## **August Date Set** For New Glanbia **Planning Application**

An early August date has been set for the presentation of a new planning application to Dungarvan Town Council, for a multi-million euro development on the former Glanbia site in the

Billy Clancy of Clancy Construction is to present the new application for a shopping complex on the 42 acre site on August 12th for a development which is ultimately expected to create in excess of 350 new jobs for

The development, which has been hailed as one of the largest in the town's history, was first mooted more than a year ago, but a series of objections from An Taisce, RGDATA and a small number of local residents led to the overturning of the original permission in January of this year.

The planning inspector laid out a number of grounds for its refusal, including a lack of adequate parking spaces and its roads layout, and it's expected that the new application will attempt to address these areas.

Cllr. Michael O'Riordan, confirming that a new application was imminent, said he was delighted with the news coming from the Thurles based developer.

"We have waited with expectation for the last twelve months for this development to go ahead," he said. "It's one of the biggest developments in Dungarvan's history and it's go-ahead would allow us proudly look forward into the future".

Clir. O'Riordan, who controversially called for a boycott of the shop's who were part of RGDATA's objection to the development, added that he hoped on this occasion, no objections would be

## New Study Plan Examines Waste Recovery Sites Near Dungarvan

A new land use study, which allows for the zoning of a number of areas around Dungarvan and Abbeyside for houses and provides a benchmark for future development in the town, has stated that industrial and agricultural zoned areas are suitable locations for a waste recovery facility.

Denis McCarthy, Director of Services for Planning, stated in the new report that the council is actively seeking a suitable site "to enable the possible development of an industrial park based around the recycling and recovery of waste".

While, he added that a suitable site for the new centre hasn't yet been found, the "study recognises the need for such facilities and the possibility of the site being located within the study boundary". The boundary covers the area around Dungarvan from Ballinacourty to Ballymac-

"Areas zoned and regarded as industrial and agricultural are considered suitable locations for waste related activities", he states.

Any area identified for the facility would also have to include the basic infrastructural requirements of the County Council under the Regional Waste Management plan, Mr. McCarthy adds.

While the regional waste plan, which envisages the disposal of one third of waste by incineration, was rejected by Waterford County Council on a majority vote, the County Manager has the power to overturn this decision.

With the local Ballinamuck landfill already reaching capacity, along with the council's decision to enter a six county agreement with other local authorities, any waste management facility **CONTINUED ON PAGE 11**





## Cappoquin - Chanat Disability Awareness

One of the highlights of our recent visit to Chanat La Mouteyre was the street festival featuring Basque and Irish folk singing and Set Dancing. During the festival Esther Barron and Joe Prendergast were astonished to receive a unique honour in a ceremony performed by the assembled Confraternity of Master Bakers, (La Confrerie des Talmeliers du Bon Pain). Having recovered from their surprise they gave this account of the ceremony and its background.

The art of baking is one of the oldest crafts known to mankind and one of the most important. Bread in its many forms has-been the staple diet of all civilisations whether it is tortilla, chapati or Irish soda bread, and good bread has excellent nutritional

On the continent the importance of bread and bakeries is very evident. Bread is eaten throughout the meal and each country has its own unique type of bread and in France there are regional varieties and delicacies. Unfortunately the situation in Ireland is quite the opposite because the majority of small local bakeries have closed down leaving only mass-produced factory bread for consumption. Indeed within a thirty mile radius of Dungarvan the number of bakeries that have closed in recent years is frightening and this trend will continue unless people ac-

It was a great honour and extremely heartening for Barror.s Bakery to be represented by Esther Barron and her husband Joe Prendergast at a recent Fête du Four baking festival in Cappoquin's twin town, Chanat la Mouteyre in the Auvergne region of France. The tradition in this area was for each person to make up their own loaf, then bring it to the village communal oven and bake it there. Each year the inhabitants celebrate this custom by firing up their local oven and all the bakers from the local bakeries come to help.

The oven uses principle as the ovens still in use in Barrons Bakery in Cappoquin. These are stone brick ovens that are fired up before the bread is baked in them, so the bread is baked on a falling heat. This type of ovens gives the bread a unique taste, flavour and crust. The oven in Chanat la Mouteyre was fired up in the old way of putting the timber into the oven setting fire to it, and thus heating the oven bricks. For Esther Barron watching these highly skilled bakers mixing and moulding the doughs and handling the oven brought back memories of her late father, Master



Baker, Joe Barron, in action. It was interesting to see the shapes of bread that they made and the round baskets that the dough proved in.

On Sunday afternoon the local Guilds of bakers, wine producers, cheese makers and apple growers gathered to inaugurate new members into their guilds. Each was attired in the regalia of their craft, the bakers in robes to replicate the colour of bread and its crust. It was a total surprise when Esther and Joe were asked up on stage to join "La Confrerie des Talmeliers du Bon Pain". France is renowned for its sense of style and tradition and that held true for this ceremony.

They recited the oath of the **Talmeliers** 

"Since it is the source of Life,

Whether it is white or brown,

Holy Oracles Have sanctified the bread By Saint Lazare and Saint Honore

I promise to praise in every place

The virtues and the qualities of the bread."

They were then invited to eat a piece of a loaf that had its top opened and expertly cut into four pieces and wash it down with local vintage. The Master of the Talmeliers then tapped them on both shoulders with a specially designed oven peel. Finally they were presented with a medal and a beautifully inscribed scroll.

Afterwards, Esther said " I feel so honoured and proud and I wish my father could have been here for this honour and recognition".

It is encouraging in these

times of high technology that France is upholding its tradition of good bread and despite very difficult times in Ireland for small bakeries, Barrons in Cappoquin are doing their utmost to maintain their tradition.

#### **Asthma**

#### What is Asthma?

Asthma is a chronic inflammatory lung disease, characterized by spasms or constriction of the bronchial tubes, and secretion of thick mucus, that is activated by irritants referred to as triggers. During an asthma attack, the air passages in the lungs narrow and contract, and various types of irritants in the atmosphere can trigger this contraction response. Asthma is thought to be a result of genetic susceptibility. The chance of having an asthmatic child are thought to be six times higher if both parents have a history of asthma. Over the past few years there has been a vast increase in the cases of Asthma, especially in industrial countries.

#### What are the Symptoms and signs of Asthma?

There are common triggers for asthma, and these triggers are substances or situations that set off asthma symptoms, these symptoms are as follows;

- Wheezing
- Coughing
- Shortness of Breath
- Feeling of tightness in the chest
- Persistent cough (especially at night)

The most common triggers are as follows:

- Allergens
- Weather
- Exercise
- Airborne irritants
- Respiratory infections
- Emotions and Stress

Allergies affect about 80% of children and about 50% of adults with asthma. The most common allergens are dust mites, cockroaches, mold and pollen.

The symptoms of asthma are similar to emphysema and bronchitis, so it can be difficult to get a correct diagnosis. One of the tests that are carried out to diagnose asthma is a PEFR (Peak expiratory flow rate), this involves blowing air out as hard as possible which is then recorded. Other tests include chest x-rays, and blood and allergy testing.

Treatment and Outlook

There is no cure for asthma, but there is treatment available that alleviates the symptoms. One of the most important factors in achieving long-term control of asthma is to avoid exposure to tobacco smoke, and to minimize the effect of dust mites, animal hair and mould in the home. Medication is used to control inflammation and to relieve symptoms. The drug treatment will vary from person to person. The use of inhalers also alleviates the symptoms.

It is vital that a person with asthma takes the medication which has been prescribed by their doctor and that they avoid smoking or being near people that smoke. ### Why an Aardvark needs to have such a long nose

THE aardvark, also known as the ant bear, is a species of mammal found throughout Africa.

It gets its name from the Afrikaan word for "earth pig" and is a slow, large animal that many people say resembles a pig.

The aardvark is yellowish-brown, about five feet long, with a two foot tail. It weighs up to 170 lb or more than 12 stone - similar to a grown man.

It has a narrow head and a long snout, designed for getting deep into ant and termite mounds.

The aardvark's ears are large and rabbitlike and it has extremely good hearing. Its short, fat legs, partially webbed feet and long claws are ideal for burrowing and creating large dens in



sleeps. They are also good tearing apart mounds of the ants and termites which it eats with its long, sticky

### Aborigines — the original inhabitants of Australia

Aborigines lived throughout Australia long before Europeans discovered it. As long as 40,000 years ago small groups arrived by sea, probably from southeast Asia to the north coast of Australia.

Before the first European settlement of Australia, there were about 300,000 Aborigines. But today there are only 125,000-130,000 - and 70,000-80,000 of them are mixed Aboriginal and European.

In the past there were about 500 different tribal groups, each occupying a particular stretch of country and speaking a different language or ART: Aboriginal Painting dialect.

Among the best-known Aboriginal groups are the Aranda, Bidjandjadjara, Gurindji, Gunwinggu, Kamilaroi, Murngin, Tiwi, Wailbri,

They used to keep to their own territories but joined with neighbouring groups for religious gatherings and trade. They did not have permanent settlements but made small camps near watering places, building windbreaks and huts.

Because they were mobile, they had few everyday belongings. Men carried spears and various kinds of boomerangs.

They usually went naked, but groups living in cold southern areas made and wore fur cloaks.





### Knives not needed it's already half-cut!

A TANGY ginger-flavoured Chinese chicken dish, aptly named Drunken Chicken, which will bring out the Oriental in you and your dinner guests.

Ingredients:

- 1 x no 6 chicken
- 1 spring onion
- 2 slices ginger
- 2 x 5ml sp salt Half a cup of dry sherry or whisky

#### Method:

Cut the chicken into halves and cover it with boiling water.

Bring back to the boil, then add the spring onion and ginger slices.

Simmer, turning once, for 12-15 minutes.

Turn the heat off and leave in the cooking liquid for a further five minutes. Remove with a slotted spoon, drain and cool.

Cut the meat into quarters, rub with the salt and place in a bowl just large enough to hold the pieces.

Next, pour your sherry or whisky over the top.

Place in the refrigerator and marinate for at least two days, remembering to turn it at least once a day.


The longer you leave the meat in the marinade, the stronger the flavour will be.

When you are ready to serve the meal, remove the meat with a slotted spoon.

Chop it into bite-sized pieces and serve sprinkled with sesame seeds.

TIPS: If you prefer, shred the chicken off the bones instead of chopping it up.

If you like bourbon rather than whisky, feel free to experiment!

DESIGNER cheeseburgers! Tasty meat patty, topped with cheese and served with salad and toasted bread.

### Ingredients:

Serves 4

700g lean ground beef x 5ml sp ground cumin

1/3 cup finely chopped onion

1/2 x 5ml sp oregano 1/3 cup dry bread crumbs 4 slices Swiss cheese 2 x 15ml sp green chillis, seeded and finely

chopped 4 slices French bread, lightly buttered

1 egg

4 crisp lettuce leaves

3/4 x 5ml sp salt 4 large tomato slices

1/4 x 5ml sp black pepper 4 sweet gherkin pickles.

Combine the ground beef, onion, bread crumbs, chillis, egg and spices in a bowl.

Mix thoroughly. When the mixture is completely combined, divide into equal amounts for the number of servings.

Shape each portion of the mixture into a thick patty about 10cm (4 inches) in diameter.

Cook the patties on a grill until they are done to your liking. This usually takes around five or six minutes a side. Place a slice of cheese on each patty and toast the bread slices on the grill during the last few minutes.

To serve, place a toasted bread slice on each plate and top with a lettuce leaf, tomato slice and a cheese-topped patty. Garnish with a gherkin and serve open-faced to eat with a knife and fork.

AN easy yet elegant butter pecan cookie shaped to resemble an acorn, and dipped in melted chocolate chips and chopped pecans.

### Ingredients:

1 cup butter, melted 1/2 x 5ml sp baking powder 21/2 cups all-purpose flour, sifted

11/2 cups pecans, finely chopped

3/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed

1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

### Method:

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees F. In a large bowl, beat together the butter, brown sugar, half of the in the chopped pecans. Cool chopped pecans and vanilla to set the chocolate.

Shape the dough into 3cm (1 inch) balls. Slightly flatten the balls by pressing on to ungreased cookie sneets. then pinch the tops to a point to resemble acorns.

Bake in the oven for 10-12 minutes. Remove the acorns from the oven and cool them on wire racks.

In the top of a double boiler over simmering water, melt the chocolate chips, stirring until smooth. Remove from heat and keep double boiler over water.

### Launch by County Waterford Community Forum of Strategic Plan and Funding Handbook

The County Waterford Community Forum on last Thursday evening in Clonea Strand Hotel, Dungaryan launched two very important and worthwhile documents - its Strategic Plan, 2002-2006 and a Funding Handbook for Community and Voluntary Groups. The honours on the evening were performed by Mayor of County Waterford, Lola O'Sullvan and by Nicola Beresford of WLRfm in front of an audience in excess of 150, an indication of the level of Community activity in the County. The launch was preceded by a funding workshop conducted by Arthur Duignan of CAFÉ and a reception composed of Waterford food and drink rounded off the

evening.
MAYOR'S ADDRESS

As Mayor of the County Waterford, it gives me great pleasure to be here this evening at the invitation of the County Waterford Community Forum to be involved with the dual launch of both the Forum's strategic plan for the next five years and its funding handbook for Community and Voluntary

From the Cork border to Waterford City and from the Tipperary border to the sea, the County of Waterford is blessed with a network of communities, the people of which pay an invaluable contribution to the quality of life for all of us. Waterford County Council fully appreciates that contribution. All the work of State, Development or Voluntary Agencies comes to nothing if it doesn't have the support of local communities. Groups comp are at the coalface of local community life and know only too well the real issues that face people in the pursuit of their everyday lives. Their endeavours make our towns, our villages and our rural communities the places which we are proud to call home.

For too long, however, local communities have been i the planning and delivery of State services. The decisions were handed down and there was a "take it or lee" e it" mentality. Now, though, things are changing – there is a realisation, which is enshrined in national and

local policy, that local communities have a right to be involved in decisions which affect them. Local communities can now, more than ever, make a decisive input into determining their future welfare.

This whole process is, of course, very new, and will take time to successfully evolve. In forging new relationships between Community and State, mistakes will be made along the way, but ones which, with goodwill on all sides, will be always corrected. We all need to learn from one another.

It was never truer than in todayls society that no man, or no woman, or no community, is an island. We can live our own individual lives, but this is best done within the scope of sharing with others – sharing fears and sharing problems but also sharing hopes and sharing solutions. Sometimes, we hear that such-and-such-a-place is a great community – what I hope is that, with the help of this Community Forum, the County will become a place which is bursting with great communities.

What the Forum does, more than anything else, is to give a strength to Communities which they could never have on their own. There can be things done which any individual community could never achieve. The pieces of work being launched here tonight are perfect examples of what communities working together can achieve. The funding handbook is a work which, I know, Community Groups, in Waterford need so badly.

The Forum is aware that many brilliant community projects never get beyond the vision stage because communities are unaware of the numerous sources of funding that are available and frequently lack the technical know-how required to access these sources.

If you want your group to be effective within your community you must be able to access the funds that are there to help get you started, keep you going or allow you to develop further along your chosen path. That Is the reason why the Community Forum decided to prepare this handbook – to make it

easier for you to apply for funding by helping you with your application and letting you know to whom you can apply depending on your area of work. The Handbook, which gives information on sources of funding and advice on how to go about securing this funding will be an invaluable tool for communities.

We hope that you will find this handbook useful and that it helps you overcome the difficulties that so many of us have found with the whole area of funding applications. Our work is too vital within our communities to be hampered by a lack of funds.

On last Friday evening, we launched the County Development Board1s strategy for the development of County Waterford. Within it was a recognition of the role that the Community Forum will play in the future of County Waterford.

With the launch of the Forumls own work here tonight, we must recognise that changes are occurring in the way we do business with one another. We must accept these changes and adapt to suit them and ensure that, between us all, we make our lovely County a better place for everyone.

NICOLA BERESFORD

Nicola Beresford spoke of her own involvement in community activity and her awareness of the contributions that volunteer-led activity can make to local areas. From the time of her involvement in broadcasting with WLRfm, she has also become acutely aware of the issues and difficulties facing community groups, especially smaller ones and, even more especially, those groups representing the more marginalised in society. Regularly, they feel that they are not being listened to. Above all, she felt that the main potential of the Community Forum would be to give that strength and that voice to communities, which each of them alone could never achieve.

Compered by Eilish Corr, the evening had also a contribution from Community Forum Chairperson, Gabriel Foley and a presentation on the strategy by Treasurer, Ger Cusack



HALF-HARDY hybrid fuchsias are some of the most popular of all pot plants

They can be kept indoors or outside on the patio in summer. During the winter they can be kept in a frost-free porch or conservatory.

Fuchsias are usually grown as upright bushes in individual pots but some varieties can be used as trailing plants for hanging baskets.

Colours range from pure white through cream, pink and red to crimson. All varieties have the characteristic dangling flowerheads and the outer petals are usually of a contrasting colour to the inner petals.

Fuchsias will grow happily in a sheltered sunny position and should be watered regularly and fed from early summer to early autumn.

HARDY FUCHSIAS (fuchsia magel-

lanica) will survive mild winters outdoors and grow to a height of 6 ft with a spread of up to 4 ft.

They should be planted in early summer and watered frequently. They produce bright crimson flowers.

Recommended varieties include Gracilis, Versicolor, Pumila and Tom Thumb. **TENDER FUCHSIA** (fuchsia hybrids)

can be used in pots or hanging baskets. They should be planted in early summer in a loam-based compost.

They should be well watered throughout the summer until the plants are brought indoors in the autumn to escape the frost.

Recommended varieties include Cascade (white sepals with red petals), Falling Stars (red), Swingtime (red sepals and white petals), Constellation (white), Miss California (pink), Thalia (red) and Fascination (red sepals and rose pink

### THIS WEEK IN THE **GARDEN**

### **PLANT MADONNA LILIES**

This is the ideal time to plant lilium condidum, the Madonna lily. It differs from almost all other lilies in making quite a lot of new growth in late summer, and it should be planted before this starts. Another peculiarity is that the bulbs grow practically on the surface. You should plant them 20 cm apart and only cover them with 5 cm of soil. After a while they will probably work themselves out until they show; make no attempt to cover them again. This lily prefers a sunny position and reasonably good, but not freshly manured, ground.

### LIFT DAFFODILS AND BULBOUS

IRISES

Daffodils and narcissi, also the various bulbous irises, will now have completed their growth and may be lifted and cleaned off if they are overgrown or you need the ground for something else. Otherwise leave them undisturbed for another year. They do not gain anything by annual lifting and drying, as do tulips and hyacinths. If you do lift them, get them replanted as soon as possible and certainly before the end of September.

### **CUT BACK HELIANTHEMUMS**


Sun roses tend to get rather straggly if left to their own devices, but if cut back a little each year at about this time they can be kept quite neat and tidy. You can do the work with a large pair of scissors or garden shears.

### START TO FEED CHRYSANTHEMUMS

It is a mistake to begin to feed chrysanthemums of any type too early, but you can safely start now. The more varied the feed the better. Give very small doses every five days or so mixed with plenty of water and used in place of the ordinary water. Liquid manure, made by steeping a small sack of cow, horse, or sheep droppings in a tub of water, can be varied with soot water and any good chemical fertiliser made for chrysanthemums and used as directed by the manufacturer.

### Fuchsias: taking cuttings

- Cuttings taken in late spring will produce flowers by summer
- Choose shoots with three or four pairs of leaves and trim off just above the
- Dip the ends in hormone rooting powder.
- Insert four or five cuttings around the edge of a 3-inch pot filled with seed compost.
- Cover with a plastic bag and keep on a warm window sill.
- The cuttings will root within two to three weeks.
- Once they are growing strongly move them into individual pots.
- When they are between for and five inches high pinch out the growing tips to encourage bushy growth.

### Concern Over F.A.I. **Television Deal**



A motion of congratulations passed at last months meeting of the council for Mick Mc-Carthy has now been tinged with regret, according to a Labour councillor.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair proposed that the local authority write a letter to the FAI to protest their sale of the rights of Ireland's Home International's to British company Sky.

He said it was of particular concern that out of the one million plus households, only 200,000 had the satellite station.

His Labour colleague, Cllr. Billy Kyne, was also concerned that the state broadcaster had lost out. Having been involved for many years in local soccer, he said it was clear that it wasn't just the FAI who were to blame.

The Government also came out badly from the deal having not provided RTE with enough resources, he said, while RTE, themselves, did equally poorly as not enough ef- Clir. Billy Kyne



fort was put into past coverage.

However, he was "appalled" by the decision, which he described as "indefensible", although he felt the starving of RTE's funds had ultimately "lead to the debacle" and backed the proposal to send a letter condemning the eur7.5m sell off.

Cllr. Tom Coffey (FG) said he was concerned on two counts. Firstly that selling public events to satellite broad-

casters would draw more people to public houses, while the price of subscribing would prevent a large section of society from viewing the matches live.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said it was vitally important that the County Council's representative "punches his weight" to drawn down the maximum funding possible for the county area. He said he has every confidence that Cllr. Tobin will do so.

### **Bye-Laws On Lismore** To Be Advertised

Bye-laws, which would cover parks, open spaces, playgrounds and recreational facilities in Lismore, are to go on public display.

The newly set-up Lismore Millennium Park would come under bye-laws which would prevent among other things cycling, skateboarding and roller skating/blading.

The public would also not be allowed to leave any vehicle in any park or undesignated open space, according to the draft laws. Controls on animals are strictly laid out in the draft plans while the playing of musical instruments, radio, and stereos at a level as to cause a nuisance is prohibited as is busking.

A person using a camera "for the purpose of business or with a view to gain, without the written permission of the council" would be subject to a fine, meanwhile.

Broadly similar to the Bye-laws put on display by the Dungarvan Town Council in the last few months, the Lismore plans would also prevent clubs and organisations from using undesignated open spaces, playgrounds, recreational facilities or parks "to take part in the game of football or any other game" without permission and subject to conditions. The bye-laws add that any person, club or organisation contravening this may be liable to have their playing facilities withdrawn.

### Tallow Playground Set To Become Reality

A playground for Tallow is finally set to become reality after agreement was reached with the local community on its loca-

It had first been proposed that it would be McDonnell ituated in Cockpit Lane, but a new proposal to locate it at the entrance

of the Woodview Park housing estate in the town has since been agreed with community groups. Local Councillors, Willie McDonnell

and James Tobin both welcomed the news, but Cllr. McDonnell pointed out that the location will still have to be advertised and a report on the submissions made by the public dealt

"There are playgrounds going into many towns all around the county and I'm pleased to see the County Council reacting to needs of Tallow as well", he said.


### **BALLINACOURTY** ZONING **CAUSES CONCERN**

Health and Safety officials stopped work in January of this year when a Cunningham crane used in the operation toppled over the cliff face. Plans on how the work could safely be carried out were since given to these officials.

Local Councillor, Tom Cunningham said he was delighted at the work but was disappointed by the notice given on the road closure and believed not enough advertising had been carried out.

## THIRTY YEARS OF EU

When the European Community was set up, there was no specific mention of consumer protection. In fact, the Treaty of Rome merely included the general provision of ensuring a better quality of life for European citizens. Only in 1968 was a consumer protection unit created within the former DG IV, now called DG Competition. And it was 1972 before an EU consumer policy, as such, became visible for the first time when, at the Paris Summit, the Heads of State and Governments endorsed five basic consumer rights. A year later - just as Ireland was joining the Community - a Consumer Consultative Committee was set up by the Commission.

Against this background, it does seem extraordinary now that primary producers such as farmers were enthusiastically catered for from the very start while the customers who bought their ware were totally ignored. (Anyone that has trouble accepting this

would have been like to live in a world where CAP stood for Consumer Assistance Policy.) Commissioner David Byrne, who has responsibility for Health and Consumer Protection in the EU, recently outlined the sparse history of the Community's awareness of consumer affairs when he addressed the general assembly of BEUC, the sommateurs, on the occasion other EU policies. of their 40th anniversary ses sion in Brussels:

He told the delegates that it was 1975 before the Commission adopted its first action plan, which was followed by a number of legislative measures. From then on, the steady development of consumer policy at EU level had taken place in parallel with the progressive establishment of the internal market, he said. The Single European Act of 1987 laid down that a high level of consumer protection was required in relation to the single market proposals. In sumer issues resulted in the

A further important step was made when the 1992 Maastricht Treaty introduced, for the first time, a proper legal basis for consumer policy. The 1997 Amsterdam Treaty reinforced this by including the principle of integrating, or mainstreaming, Bureau Européen des Con- consumer policy into all

> rinally, over the last decade, there had been a fundamental shift in the importance attached at both EU and national level to consumer policy. Mr Byrne said this had been as a result, in particular, of a number of negative developments affecting the health and safety of consumers that had occurred in the last few years - "and you all know which ones I mean."

In parallel, he noted, we had seen a rise in the profile of civil society movements as part of the democratic process. This increased focus on conpremise should reverse the practical terms, this was put creation of Commissioner

Byrne's Directorate General for Health and Consumer Protection in 1999, with a reorganisation of scientific and regulatory work in this area. The Prodi Commission had put consumer interests firmly among the priorities for its term of office, he said.

But all this progress should not allow us to be complacent, he went on, because there were still many gaps in our legislative framework, along with imperfections in the way it works in practice. Different consumer protection rules applied in different Member States, with the result that EU consumers still had significantly less confidence in shopping across borders than in their own countries.

"With the possibilities opened up by the internal market and the arrival of Euro notes and coins, consumers' perspectives are changing," he said.

"Making the Single Market work for business and producers must be complemented by ensuring consumer confidence in cross-border transactions."

#### IFA PRESIDENT ADDRESSES WATERFORD IFA COUNTY EXECUTIVE

IFA President John Dillon addressed this month's Waterford IFA Co. Executive meeting in Lawlor's Hotel, Dungarvan on Tuesday, 2nd July to over 100 Waterford farmers.

Speaking on the current milk price crisis, IFA President John Dillon said the critical issue now for dairy farmers was to hold the June milk price. "Dairy farmers have already faced income losses over 30% as a result of price cuts and increased production costs", John Dillon said. The IFA President also said, "The dreadful weather conditions of the last few months have raised feeding costs even further. With very bad silage making conditions, I have no doubt that we will have serious fodder shortages next winter, adding further costs and reducing incomes. "Dairy farmers simply cannot afford to take any further price cuts, and it is absolutely critical for them to hold the

Mr. Dillon said "The proposals being considered by EU Agricultural Commissioner Franz Fischler as part of the mid-term review of the CAP, amount to a severe dismantling of the fundamental farm supports in the CAP and is in clear breach of the Berlin agreement in Agenda 2000.

The IFA President said the proposal to decouple of supports from production was fundamentally wrong and a grave political error by Commissioner Fischler. He said the measures being considered would be particularly damaging for the beef sector, which was such an important sector in Irish farming.

John Dillon advised consumers to look for evidence of Feile Bia Quality Assured Certificate in all hotels and restaurants when eating out within the county. He said that over 700 hotels and restaurants have now signed up and the "this certificate is the consumers independent guarantee of the availability of high quality traceable food". The IFA President also highlighted the severe weather conditions and how hard it is to get work done and that many crops are struggling due to these adverse weather conditions. Mr. Dillon also addressed the traceability of some imported feedstuffs, and he urged compounders to maximise the inclusion of quality, native Irish cereals in rations, as imported grain does not have quality assur-Mr. Dillon also addressed the same to other imported commodities.

Mr. Dillon also spoke on other issues including the need for radical changes in the REPS scheme to ensure increased uptake and proposed a major simplification of the complex and unworkable sheep register and the introduction of a more practical system. He also highlighted the animal health concerns on farms, including TB, BSE and brucellosis and the on-farm valuation system.

The IFA President highlighted the fact that IFA members in the county are noting significant savings of up to 30% on their telephone and internet call charges from an exclusive home phone and internet call charges deal with ESAT.

### PROGRESS IN MEETING BETWEEN IFA AND THE TAOISEACH IN DIFFICULT YEAR FOR FARMERS

Following a meeting between IFA and the Taoiseach, Mr. Ahern and the Minister for Agriculture, Joe Walsh recently, the IFA president John Dillon said that he had impressed on the Taoiseach the seriousness of the farm income problem and obtained a number of commitments from the Government. John Dillon said: "The meeting took place against a background of an extremely difficult year for farmers, with farm income down by 15%, or when inflation is taken into account by close to 20%. Milk prices are down by 8%, purchased feed due to the bad weather will add E90 m. to costs, and crop yields are down across-the-board.

"In relation to the Mid-term review of the CAP being proposed by the EU Commission, we got a commitment from the Taoiseach that he would defend the Berlin Agenda 2000 agreement which should run to the end of 2006 and he would reject further reform of the CAP at this time.

### **KNOW YOUR** RIGHTS

#### QUESTION

We are going to France in August. Our 16 year old son who is included on my passport is also coming with us. Should he have a separate passport?

Children under 16 may have their names included on a parent's passport or they may get a separate passport, but children aged 16 and over need separate passports. If they are under 18 years of age, parental consent form, PAS M, signed by both parents or guardians is required to get a passport or to have their names included on a parent's passport.

All applications, whether or not a previous passport was held, must be accompanied by the long form of the Birth Certificate (or an Adoptive Certificate) showing the names of the parents.

Children under 18 may apply for a three-year passport (El or a standard ten-year passport (E57).

Application forms, including PAS M, are available from all Garda stations. They are also available from Post Offices showing the ServicePlus logo as they provide a 'Passport Express' service. The 'Passport Express' service costs E5.40 and guarantees receipt of a passport within 10 working days where applications are completed correctly with proper documentation.

Be wary though of extending the repayment time, as this will increase your debt in the long run.

Finally, if you find that you cannot meet your usual repayments and your loan, call into our office for a chat. We will be able to advise you on budgeting options and your loan repayments.

Members of the Dungarvan Tipperary SR Branch of the Multiple Sclerosis Society attended a meeting organised by the South East Regional Office of MS Ireland on Saturday 15th June in the Springhill Court Hotel, Kilkenny.

Representatives from Carlow, Kilkenny, Waterford and Wexford MS Branches also attended this meeting. The meeting was held in response to a request by the South Eastern Health Board to highlight priority health issues for people with MS. South East.

Katie Hourigan, Community Worker with the MS Society, South East Regional Office, chaired the meeting.

Multiple Sclerosis (MS) is the most common disabling neurological condition of young adults, affecting more than 6,000 people in Ireland and more than 500 in the South East. MS interferes with the brain's ability to control such functions as seeing, walking, talking

The high costs incurred for treatment and care, plus travel to see a neurologist in Dublin or Cork causes undue stress and fatigue for people with MS living in the

following priority needs and issues were highlighted:

- Neurologist and full multidisciplinary team based in the South East with links with services both community and hospital based.

 Information and advocacy Need for standardisation

and high quality community care services throughout the South East Region

Need for improved personal and home support services

Respite for all levels of disability and age groups

- Medical cards on a needs basis and not means tested

While the grant levels recently announced by the

Minister for Social and Family Affairs represents an increase over last year's level they still do not come anywhere near to meeting the cost of sending a child to school. In addition, eligibility is effectively limited to parents in receipt of social welfare. The maximum grant available for a pupil between 12 and 22 will now be just 120 Euro, yet costs incurred by parents are far in excess of this. This is particularly so for pupils entering second level for the first time, or for those entering a new cycle i.e. post Junior Certificate. The Labour Party has estimated that when all factors







# Intermediate Hurlers Try For Munster Title In Paire Ui Caoimh

Waterford v. Tipperary Tonight At 7.30 p.m.

Waterford have played in all seventeen provincial championships since it was first introduced and our only reward so far has been to reach the Munster final back in 1965 only to be defeated by Cork at Fraher Field.

This evening in Cork will mark our fifth meeting with Tipperary, we having lost the first four.

This championship, which is the 'Cinderella' of all Munster hurling championships, began in 1961 and after 12 seasons it was abandoned in favour of the provincial junior hurling championship. Then, after an interval of 25 years it was reintroduced and continued to be dominated by Cork and Tipperary who have so far won 13 of the 17 between them.

Cork have 7, Tipperary have 6, Limerick 2, Kerry and Galway have 1 each

Over the years we have been beaten by all the other counties including Kerry and Galway who were playing in the Munster championship in the early sixties.

In recent years, because of our perceived poor rating in the hurling stakes, we have been allowed play our second best and while we still made no impression in that championship, there are indications that a change is about to take place. This will be our last season enjoying the privilege of fielding our second best. So here this evening it is a matter of winning or forgetting about ever winning the "Sweet Afton Cup" at least for many years to come

Fielding our strongest available team, we must be in with a good chance of scoring a double against Tipperary. They have taken the game very seriously and refused to agree to a Waterford proposal to toss for Thurles or Walsh Park for venue.

As will be seen from the selected team, there are major changes from the team which defeated Crk by 3-16 to 2-13 in the semi-final in Thurles.

Several of the original side had to cry off for a variety of reasons, notably Sean Daly who sustained a fracture of the ankle in a challenge game against Cork's under 21 team. Also Roy McGrath, Stephen Cunningham and Colin Kehoe, who are reported to be injured also.

Into the team comes Stephen Frampton. (If Fergal Hartley injury in the Munster final had been more serious, a replacement of Stephen Frampton's quality would have been needed, hence the rumours that we might see him back on the senior panel before the semifinal). Conal Watt, from the senior panel, is also on the team as well as Billy O'Sullivan, who captained Ballygunner in the Munster Club championship this year.

PROSPECTS? With such a line-up of experienced talent — all of whom have played at intercounty level before, we must expect to do well, even though, Tipperary, having

disposed of Clare and limerick on the way to the final, will be difficult to overcome.



Tony Culhane was interviewed himself by Alistair Down at Newmarket on Thursday and one could see that he was visibly shaken by the abuse he had received since his error. I think he like Johnny Murtagh and Paul Carberry have learned from their recent errors but no doubt some other rider will commit a similar mistake before the end of the
