Storm Of Protest As Waste Plan Approved

turned Waterford County Council's rejection of a contentious new Waste Management Plan, which had been defeated on a majority vote, two months ago.

The joint plan, approved by the County Managers of the six local authorities in the South East region, was rejected at the June meeting, mainly due to the inclusion of incineration.

But, under powers granted to County Managers last year, Mr. Connolly overturned that decision on Friday last, stating he was statutorily obliged to goahead with the plans.

The statement says, "...the waste legislation requires the County Manager by order to make the waste plan. Once the elected members rejected the plan, Mr. Connolly had no choice under the current legislation but to follow the procedure of making the necessary order, and he did this on Friday last (June 19th)".

The first phase will see the further development of recycling facilities in Waterford, but ultimately envisages the location of a thermal treatment (incineration) plant somewhere in the South East. As one of the key elements of the new multi-million euro strategy, incineration will be used on up to one third of all

spokesman confirmed that electricity, for upwards of

has been identified in the report, and the proposed use of a public private partnership to run the facility, may in effect, leave the decision open to the contracted company.

The project aims to channel 50pc of waste away from landfill, divert 65pc of biodegradable and recycle 35pc of municipal waste.

DISAPPOINTMENT OVER DECISION

However, a number of County Councillors have voiced disappointment that the democratic process has been by-passed.

The decision to grant powers to County Managers to introduce waste plans was made to prevent Councillors from refusing "to make the tough decisions", Minister for the Environment, Martin



Cullen, said on Monday.

But, Cllr. Nora Flynn, who voted against the plan, said that while the members of the council were aware "months ago" of the powers, Fine

Funding

Coastal protection works on the Cunnigar in Dungarvan are now likely to goahead, following the announcement, last week, that funding is to be provided by the Department of Communications and the Marine.

The long awaited announcement comes in the wake of fears that the Western Bay area of Dungarvan could be liable to flooding, unless protection work on the natural sea barrier is car-

Just short of eur200,000 has been allocated for the project, and it is believed a contractor will be got onto the site shortly, to carry out the work.

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who, along with a local environmental group, "Coiste Cosanta na Coise", has been to the forefront in calling for the halting of erosion to the sandbar, welcomed the news.

He also confirmed he has received assurances from County Engineer, John O'Flynn, that once the green light was given by the Department of the Marine, a contractor would be got on

Given that this is now the case, no time should be wasted in tackling the most serious part of the erosion, he said, before urging for a release of further funding for what he describes as essential works, to protect an environmental amenity.

"According to the County Engineers reply to me issued

on July 17th last, the Council forwarded documentation to the Department of the Marine in early 2001, advising proposed works costing over one million euro", he said.


"The local authority expected some 75% or so of that to come from central funding. We've been waiting anxiously since, but the money allocated in recent days enables a start and I hope more is to come."

The County Engineers office also confirmed that the Council has been assessing the archaeology of the Cunnigar and meetings are taking place with Duchas.

Cllr. James Tobin said the woman was told it would cost her eur127 for Eircom workmen to be called out, as it was

Calling on Waterford County Council to invite representatives from Eircom to a future meeting so they could voice their concerns, Cllr. Tobin added that he had no problem with the workmen themselves but with the company's policies. "Don't tell me that everyone has a mobile, because they don't", he said, "and if you ask me, it's a good thing that they don't."

Cllr. Ciarain O Rain warned that a situation where an elderly person was left without the use of a phone over the weekend "in this day and age could have very serious consequences." He said any problems like this one should have been sorted out straight away.

The council agreed to write to Eircom complaining about the weekend repair rates.

Work on Kilmac Sculpture To Begin In September

A 20 ft sculpture of forty stalks of wheat is to be erected near Mahon Bridge this September, according to County Engineer, John O'Flynn, at a recent meeting of Waterford County Council.

The sculpture which cost around €58,000 under the one per cent for art scheme, is to start development in two months time and should be finished at the end of this year.

It already caused a storm of protest because of a perceived lack of public consultation. The art piece contains 40 copper and bronze coloured wheat stalks and was commissioned to mark the development of the N-25 realignment at Kilmacthomas.



TIDY TOWNS JUDGING UNDERWAY

18 Waterford **Entries in 2002** Competition

The first round of judging is underway in the 2002 national Tidy Towns competition. A total of 706 towns and villages have entered the Tidy Towns competition this year. The Competition is once again sponsored by SuperValu supermarkets and is organised by the Department of the Environment and Local Government.

Westport, County Mayo won the Tidiest Small Town Category, while Castletown in County Laois won the Tidiest Village category just one mark behind the overall winner. Ennis in County Clare took the title of Tidiest Large Town, with Westport, County Mayo taking the overall national Tidy Towns title.

Due to the euro conversion this year the National Tidy Towns Competition overall prize money is now set at 128,680, a 4% increase on last year's 123,416 (£97,200). This is due to rounding up of over 180 prizes to even amounts, as well as increases in the value of the Islands award and the Heritage Council award. The overall National Prize has increased 2.4% from 12,697 (£10,000) to 13,000 presented by SuperValu Supermarkets, alongside a commemorative plaque and the prestige of taking the national title. This year's winners will be announced on Monday 9th September by Mr. Martin Cullen TD, Minister for the Environment and Local Government and Mr. Michael Nason, Managing Director of SuperValu Supermarkets, at a reception in Dublin Castle.

18 Waterford towns and villages are taking part in this year's competition. The County Award winner in 2001 was Stradbally on 257 marks. County award runners-up in 2001 were Lismore on 254 marks and Ardmore on 246 marks. Michael Nason of SuperValu said that he welcomed the growing interest in Tidy Towns, reflecting the tremendous benefits that participating towns and villages enjoy.



"Taking the lead down of main road into the primary school bend in Maoil a' Chóirne from Robert's Cross, one can plainly see the ongoing concentration of community activity that should merit a speed limit. The stretch of road in question features a Gárda station, a winter boarding school/major summer college, a primary school, an adjacent housing scheme and 27 other individual residences, a guesthouse/hostel, a community hall, a health centre, a playschool and two places of employment: a factory and television production studios. There are also significant tract of lands zoned for further residential development by the local authority. There are hamlets around the county with far less and they have a speed limit. I have once more made written representations to the County Council on this ongoing issue and will continue to press for progress."


Treasures from the Deep — Underwater Archaeology

ONE of the most exciting forms of archaeology is looking for ancient wrecks under the sea.

A diver has two main problems to face - a lack of air and increasing pressure from the water the deeper he dives. He stays alive by using an aqualung. This provides him with air from tanks on his back. All this means that a diver can only spend a short time each day on the wreck. American George Bass invented a miniature submarine equipped with cameras that can work at great depth. And the Frenchman Jacques Cousteau built underwater villages of airfilled balloons where divers could live for several days.

Over the years many famous wrecks have been explored and countless treasures have been recovered from the ocean. The most famous underwater discovery of recent times has been the wreck of the Titanic, which sank with the

loss of hundreds of lives after hitting an iceberg in mid-Atlantic in 1912.



But underwater archaeology has great dangers. Apart from those posed by pressure and lack of air, divers have been known to be attacked by sharks and other monsters of the deep.

BIRDS OF PRAY — BEAUTIFUL **CREATURES NOW UNDER THREAT**

EAGLES, hawks, vultures, buz zards, falcons, owls and kites are all classed as birds of prey With the exception of vultures, all are able to catch and kill their prev and all have vision which is far superior to that of man.

Owls are able to fly silently because they have soft fringes to their feathers. They are unable to swivel their eyes but can turn their heads 180

Nearly all owls hunt at night. They have exceptional hearing which helps them locate their

Vultures rarely kill. They tend to feed off the kill of other animals and are known to gorge themselves when they find a carcass because they are unable to carry meat like other birds of prey. Their young are fed on regurgitated food.

The most common bird of prey is the kestrel which is also the smallest member of the hawk family. The kestrel has long been a common sight alongside motorways, country roads and cornfields, hovering as it seeks out its prey in the grass below.

Although it has always been the commonest hawk in the country, wildlife experts fear that the kestrel, too, is now under threat. The kestrel was made famous by Barry Hines' book - Kestrel for a Knave - and Kes, the film that was made from the book. It told the story of a small boy who raised a baby kestrel and taught it to hunt.



A TANGY dish which is Method: quick and easy to make, and tastes great.

Ingredients: Makes 2 servings

2 x 15ml sp clive oil

1 x 15ml sp tomato paste 1 x 15ml sp minced fresh ginger root

x 15ml sp so

1 clove garlic, smashed 1 x 15ml sp lemon juice 1 small green pepper,

800g pork tenderloin, in 1-inch cubes

Heat one 15ml spoon of oil in a medium-sized nonstick skillet. Add the ginger root, garlic and green pepper and saute over a medium heat for five minutes.

Add the remaining one 15ml spoon of oil to the skillet.

Dust the pork cubes with the flour, then add those to the skillet as well. Brown the pork cubes over a high heat, turning them so that they brown evenly. cored, seeded and cut in Pour in the beef broth and stir up any browned bits in the skillet.

Add the tomato paste, soy sauce, lemon juice and two 15ml 1 cup pineapple chunks spoons of chutney. Stir the mixture well. Cover the skillet and simmer for 10 minutes. The mixture will thicken - remove the smashed garlic and discard. Stir in the pineapple.

Season to taste with salt and pepper. Cover and simmer for another five minutes. Serve over hot cooked rice or pasta.

Truly Tempting **Almond Pears**

Ingredients:

Makes 30 servings

2 drops almond essence 1/4 cup egg whites

3 cup ground almonds Rose or orange flower water

Whole cloves

1/2 x 5ml sp grated lemon rind, optional

1/2 cup icing suga Additional icing sugar

Method:

Blend the ground almonds with the icing sugar measured after sifting.

Add the lightly beaten egg whites with the lemon rind if used and almond essence.

Mix to a firm dough with hands. Clean your hands and rub with a little butter to prevent dough sticking while shaping.

Break off small pieces of dough the size of a walnut and form into pear shapes.

Insert a whole clove in the top of each to resemble a stem and place upright on a buttered and floured baking

Bake in a moderately slow oven for 20 minutes at 160 degrees C (325 degrees F), covering with brown paper if tops begin to brown.

Sift two cups of icing sugar into a bowl and dip hot Amigthalota into it. If desired, a little rose or orange flower water may be brushed on to the Amigthalota before dipping into the icing sugar.

Place on a wire rack to cool. Sift the remaining sugar from bowl into base of a container and arrange the cooled almond pears upright in a single layer. Sift more sugar thickly over tops and sides, seal and store for a day or two before using.





"I'm very much against the incineration part of the plan. In 1999, in one of my first contributions to the council on my election, I got a promise from the County Manager in which he said that he wouldn't go against the majority of the council's wishes regarding incineration. Cllr. Willie MacDonnell, although voting against the plan two months ago, said that he did so under the party whip and would now be supporting the Waste Management Strategy.


The Broadcasting Commission of Ireland has awarded WLR fm the license to provide a broad based local radio service to Waterford City and County for a further ten years.



THIS WEEK IN THE **GARDEN**

PRICK OUT PERENNIALS AND BIENNIALS

Perennials and biennials sown in June will be in need of pricking out into a nursery bed. This should be in an open position except for violas, pansies, primroses and polyanthus, which grow more quickly in partial shade.

The ground must be well forked and reasonably rich but not recently manured with dung. Get the seedlings up as carefully as possible (if the ground is dry it is best to give it a through watering the day before you intend to move the seedlings).

PEG DOWN STRAWBERRY RUNNERS

The runners of strawberries are most conveniently propagated by pegging them down into pots of compost sunk into the ground. When rooted they are easily transplanted.

PROTECT VINES FROM MILDEW

Thinning of the fruits will now become general with outdoor vines. A thick mulch of well rotted manure spread over the border will help the vines a lot at this time of year. If there is the slightest sign of mildew, dust the foliage and fruits with flowers with sulphur.

PLANT WINTER GREENS

Plant out all manner of winter greens as you clear the ground of early crops such as dwarf peas, early potatoes and the first sowings of turnips and salad vegetables. As far as possible, choose showery weather for this work.

If July is persistently dry, push on with the planting and then water freely for a few days.

CUT OFF FADED FLOWERS

From time to time during July you should examine all the flowerng plants in the garden and remove any blooms or flower spikes that are so faded as to be no longer decorative. This will allow the plant to generate more growth.

TRIM HEDGES

Trim evergreen hedges and topiary specimens to keep then neat and tidy in July.

POND Pointers

- Centre should be three feet deep to be self sustaining and not stagnant
- Leave a ledge 12 to 18 ins deep and a similar width around the edge of the pond - for shallow water plants
- Choose a liner with a 10-year guarantee
- Avoid damage from sharp stones, cover base with sand before fitting
- Don't trim liner until the water is in
- Water should be left a fortnight before adding fish

Indefensible Commercial Rates On Nurseries in can do to address the prob-Dungarvan

Nurseries and pre-schools in Dungarvan are to be charged commercial rates for the first time, in what one councillor claimed is a regressive step by Dungarvan Town Council.

Fine Gael Councillor, Damien Geoghegan, speaking at Monday nights meeting of the Town Council, said that at the same time as the Government was trying to promote the use of childcare facilities, these facilities are now being levied excessive rates.

"Sixteen hundred is being levied on commercial rates on Sesame pre-school", he said. "These people have to go around fund-raising for most of the year to fund its running costs and now they're being faced with this. It's not acceptable that this should happen.'

Proposing that playschools and pre-schools are exempted from paying the commercial rate, Cllr. Geoghegan said it was an indefensible charge.

Cllr. Tereasa Wright also said she had been approached by young teachers about the levy, but said she wasn't aware that it had been introduced, adding that those running pre-schools already faced significant costs for the renting of their premises.

However, Town Clerk, Brian White said the council didn't have the power to choose what businesses should be levied or not.

A new Local Government bill, he said obligated local authorities "by law to levy and collect rates on any property which is used for commercial purposes."

The Town Clerk added that in general schools are exempt from paying rates, but private schools are not. "We'll have to look at the

situation and see what we

lem. It's really an issue for a separate item of the agenda. But we'll examine the financial implications for such a move", he said.

Cllr. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says there are opportunities to fund the ongoing work and development plans of such community groups and that wider advertisement of the functions and responsibilties of the new Department of Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs would be of assistance.

Commenting on the setting up of the new Department, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said: "This new Department has particular relevance to localised groups interested in ensuring the best for their communities. The Community portfolio is transferred over from what was part of the Department of Social, Community and Family Affairs. It is under the aegis of this unit that co-ordination and funding of community development programmes in our towns and cities is carried out, in addition to schemes relevant to rural areas. The Rural Affairs unit itself comes from the previously constructed Department of Agriculture. That unit has great potential in drawing on EU assistance for community initiatives throughout rural Ireland. I'm pleased that the Gaeltacht and Islands portfolio are related to the Community and Rural Affairs units, because the survival and ongoing development of small communities is a central concern in matters relating to Irish speaking areas of the country. I'm delighted that the Labour Party has appopinted my colleague and our Waterford TD, Brian O' Shea, as Spokesperson on this very important new Department. I look forward to regular visits to the constituency by the new Minister and benefit accruing to Co. Waterford communities."

It is with deep regret that we record the death which occurred at the parental home of her husband John at Lickoran, Ballinamult, of Rosaleen Power, Dublin who died suddenly while attending a family celebration. She was removed to her local Corpus Christi Church, Drumcondra, Dublin, on Wednesday, 3rd July, where she was received by Fr. Gerry Thredgold P.P., assisted by Fr. Tommy Mc-Carthy, Fr. Declan Doyle, Fr. Tom Carroll, Fr. Gerry Carroll and Fr. M. O'Loughlin. Fr. Declan Doyle, Airport Chaplain, Dublin Airport, was the principal Celebrant at the concelebrated Funeral Mass on Thursday after which she was laid to rest at Dardistown cemetery near Dublin Airport.

She is deeply mourned by her husband John, her daughters Ann, Catherine (Stacey), Deirdre, John, Carol (O'Neill), David, Niamh (Walsh) and Kevin.

In his homily at her funeral Mass, Fr. Declan Doyle, after reminding the large congregation at Corpus Christi church that life is a gift from God, spoke of the full and productive manner in which Rosaleen used her life from the giving birth and introducing into the Catholic Church of her eight children and how she reared and encouraged

each of them towards good citizenship and meaningful careers, two in the teaching profession, one in hospital administration, one an archaeologist/education officer in the National Museum, and the last two qualified medical doctors one of which (Niamh) changed her career to become an airbus/airline pilot with the national airline.

Rosaleen had been active in many organisations in her parish, in her earlier years many of them children oriented but later in the Ladies Club, the Musical Society in which she took prominent roles. She was also a keen bridge player. In her spare time she was a gifted painter in oil and her paintings of local scenes hang in the homes of her family and extended families from Waterford to Donegal, but she also painted doors and windows, walls and ceilings in her family home. She was a keen gardener and was gifted with her hands, making all her children's First Communion and Confirmation dresses as well as their wedding gowns when the time came for marriage.

Fr. Doyle said that she was

a faithful member of the Catholic community of the parish and in turn brought all her children into the Corpus Christi parish congregation and was a model wife and mother bringing up a family of which she was and could be proud. Rosaleen had many fine characteristics which earned her the love and the respect of many, both within her own family circle and beyond. She was a person of proven sound judegement and as a result of that both her family members and those she interfaced with in her social life whether it be as a committee member of her bridge club or otherwise usually went her way when a judgement was called for. Her value system combined what was best from the old with the better characteristics which she was quick to perceive in the younger generation and she was fiercely defensive of initiatives of young people taking a different approach to that she might have earlier taken herself.

Rosaleen was a great family person whether to her own immediate family or to her extended family she was welcoming and generous and her home was an open house not only to her own extended family but to their friends and associates. She had an unusual appreciation of the needs of young people and she also had great faith in the young. Consequently she was a magnet for not only her own family but also for nieces and nephews and also those outside the family especially when they were in any kind of trouble or in

need of a bit of help. If she had a fault it was that she found it difficult to see any shortcomings in the young people she befriended.

A lady of many parts she could host a crowd up for a match or a family gathering a wedding or a wake with the same ease as she would prepare a family meal and this was best demonstrated on All-Ireland final day every year when family members from Waterford and Longford and Donegal would gather in Arran Road and as many as 40 or more have been known to assemble for both pre and post match sustenance and the long drawn out debate which is usually associated with such events.

It was indeed providential that she should have died in John's parental home in Lickoran, County Waterford, the home in which she and all the Power children spent many summer vacations and of which she and they have so many memories.

She was laid to rest in Dardistown Cemetery, beneath the glide-path of aircraft landing at Dublin Airport, where her doctor/pilot daughter Niamh will be able to remember her each day as she comes in to land at Dublin Airport as part of her daily work routine. May she rest in peace.





Waterford Co. Council **Calls For Greater Care** From Householders When Sorting Their Recycling

Co Waterford's groundbreaking recycling scheme has been an unqualified success. Over the first nine months of the scheme there has been a steady increase in the amounts of recyclables collected. Mr Denis McCarthy, Director of Services for Planning and Envi-ronment with Waterford County Council, says that the Council is happy with the level of participation in the scheme, which is just shy of meeting the government's recycling targets of 35% for municipal waste.

Samshire Recycling Ltd is the Council's agent for the processing of recyclable goods collected from households, shops and businesses across the county. Approximately 150 tonnes of household recyclables are now collected and processed at their recycling factory in Lismore every month. These materials are then sold on to a range of different markets in Ireland and abroad. Plastics and metals are reprocessed into new products, shredded newspapers are reused for animal bedding, and cardboard and paper are recycled into paper and card. All of these markets have exacting requirements for pure uncontaminated raw material. However, the quality of material that Samshire Recycling can supply is dictated by the quality of material collected from households and businesses around the

Leake, of Samshire Recycling Ltd, there has been a decline in the quality of material in household recycling sacks over the past few months. This means that a greater amount of material is being disposed to landfill than at the beginning of the scheme. Mr Leake said "some of the recycling sacks have contained glass, which once broken destroys the usability of papers. Others have contained food waste, which means the whole load has to be dumped. Apart from the loss of recyclables this contamination also presents a danger to staff as they process the material". He added "most householders have been cooperating by

and this really improves working conditions for our staff"

At the start of the Recycling scheme last November, all householders were issued with a recycling calendar and a list of what is and isn't acceptable for the recycling collection. The Council is currently running an advertisement campaign in the local media that calls on the public to redouble their recycling efforts and to take care to avoid contamination of their recyclables. Mr Mc-Carthy said "the Council's phone lines, O58 22000, are open to anyone who has queries about the recycling scheme or for first time recyclers to get involved in he

A very informative and well attended Open day was held jointly by Teagasc and Seedtech in Kilmacow last week. Lots of information was available on managing, processing and ensiling wheat, barley, triticale, maize and peas as well as moist grain preservation through crimping, urea treatment, caustic treatment and inoculate treat-

High yielding gain crops required

The crop is cut when the grain has reached a "cheesy" texture and is about 35% Dry Matter. It can then be ensiled as for conventional grass silage.

- 1. Whole crop silage must be produced from high yielding grain crops with good crop husbandry practices employed. There must be a high proportion of grain relative to straw in the crop.
- 2. The aim is to have at least 20% starch in the harvested crop.
- 3. Experiments carried out at Teagasc Grange showed carcass gains were 21% lower on grain whole crop wheat silage than on good quality grass silage (74% DMD) and carcass gain was 19% higher on high grain whole crop wheat silage than on good quality grass silage(74% DMD).

Beef Cattle

Recent experiments at Grange have shown a poorer apparent conversion of fed dry matter to carcass gain with whole crop silage than with grass silage. This is important when costing the attractiveness of the different options on a farm.

 Fermented whole crop of wheat silage fed alone or mixed with grass silage increased carcass gain. Urea treated whole crop wheat silage increased carcass gain, when mixed with grass silage but not when offered as the sole forage.

A good crop of winter wheat should produce 5 tonnes DM per acre, compared to a two cut grass silage system producing 4.0 t DM per acre at 20% DM.

Feeding 100% of the forage DM as whole crop cereal silage will result in a concentrate saving of 2 kg /finishing ani-

finishing cattle for 120 days on whole crop wheat silage as the sole forage.

ACTION NEEDED ON CATTLE **PRICES**

"Immediate action is required to reverse the recent drop in beef prices of 14c/Kg. Given that the UK market is our principal market and prices have strengthened there during 2002, there is absolutely no justification for the current price cuts. The meat factories are simply taking advantage of the increased supply of cattle", said Mr. John O'Leary, Chairperson of ICMSA's Beef & Cattle

"I am calling on the meat processors to immediately reverse their price cuts. If factories don't respond immediately, ICMSA believe the Minister for Agriculture & Food should meet with meat processors and insist that they return a better price to beef farmers who cannot afford unjustified cuts," Mr. O'Leary said.

"The Minister will have to defend the position of beef farmers to ensure that the factories pay a fair price. Secondly, given the weakening dollar, the Minister must seek increased export refunds to improve the competitiveness of Irish beef on third country markets. In addition, many of our markets are still closed so a greater effort must be made to re-open them," said Mr. O'Leary.

"An Bord Bia are forecasting a reasonably positive outlook for the remainder of the year. The weaker dollar is not a factor at present given that the bulk of our trade is within the EU. There is no justification for the current price cuts, despite what the processors say and they must be reversed," concluded Mr. O'Leary.

Problems With Parking On **Davitts Quay**

Cllr. Lar Hart said that plans were originally in place to prevent cars parking on the quay but at present people are parking "bumper to bumper"

"It's a shame that we can't do something to stop this from happening", he added.

County Manager, Donal Connolly replied that it was all a matter of enforcement and the council was currently in negotiations with the wardens about staggering their hours "as it is happening more later in the evening."

However, Cllr. Billy Kyne argued that people parking on the Quay should not be hit too hard on their first time as it is the height of the tourist season "and the shops down there mightn't be too happy"

Cllr. Damien Geoghegan (FG) said he had received a letter from an American lady who said, "she couldn't believe that so much money was spent on the quay but parking was still allowed".

At lunchtime, she said, employees are being collected outside the factory and blocking the view of those leaving the car park.

Teach Your Child to Manage their Own Money

The spending habits of children are being watched by some of the world's largest corporations. Why is this so? Firstly, the children of today will be the consumers of tomorrow. Secondly, this group of the population has the largest amount of disposable income. As the economy continues its strong growth rate and incomes continue to rise, parents are giving their children more money to spend. If your child gets weekly pocket money or for example cash birthday gifts, it can be an invaluable lesson to teach them how to make the best use of it. Letting your child participate in your won budgeting, will help them learn basic financial concepts when they are young. For example - If you are going to make a large purchase and want to shop around for comparative prices, it is a good idea to let your child do some of the research work with you. If you do this consistently they will begin to learn these skills. If this is not done these same children may fall victim to believing that money is an ever present item, even without forward planning.

- As soon as your child begins to understand the importance of money, explain the purpose of it i.e. you need it for groceries, car, clothes, toys etc.

It may be a good idea to give your child money to give to the cashier at the checkout when out shopping. Ask the cashier to hand the change to your child. (If your child is old enough, have them count the change received).

- Play money games with your children at home.

- Teach them the purpose of writing a cheque and where the money comes from. Older children could also open their own Cashsave Account and be shown how to use it.

 Open a saving account at your local Credit Union. Bring your child with you when doing this and explain how the Credit Union works.

- Spend some time watching TV ad's with your children. You may be surprised to see how many of them encourage them to spend or (ask you to spend) money.

- Teach the child how to use credit cards responsibly. Many children believe that credit cards are a way to get 'free' money and so must be helped to understand that the bill must be paid. There are many advertisements that encourage a credit card payment as a very easy method of paying. However the goods still have to be paid for at the end of the day. Show them the receipts when you purchase something, and when the Statement comes show them the corresponding amount on it. This will allow them to make the metal leap from buying the goods in store and seeing the credit card bill at the end of the month.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am working but I find it difficult to get to work due to my disability. Is there a grant available to help me buy a car? **ANSWER**

There is a Motorised Transport Grant available from the Health Board towards the conversion or purchase of an adapted car.

To be eligible for the grant you must have a disability such that you need to make adaptations to a motor vehicle in order to be able to drive it and the motor vehicle must be essential in order for you to make a living. You must be physically and mentally capable of driving and you must hold a full driving licence.

In certain circumstances someone else may be approved to drive for the person with a disability where he/she is not physically or mentally capable of driving. Sometimes the grant may be made to a self-employed person or to a person who has not already taken up employment but would be able to do so if transport difficulties were overcome. On occasion a grant may be made to someone living in a very isolated area even though they may not be in employment.

You apply to your local Health Board for the grant and you must satisfy a means test. The maximum amount of the grant is €4,370.

Jimmy Rooney Publican, Farmer, Fisherman, Hackney owner and sportsman took his leave of us and his beloved Ardmore recently.

Yes indeed Jimmy was many things to many people but I will try in this little tribute to confine myself to the man that was Jimmy Rooney the G.A.A. enthusiast. Born in Ardmore in 1910 when football was the only game played in the parish Jimmy took his place alongside players such as Mickie Ryan, Richie Troy, Pierre Foley, Mick Carlton, Mickie Fitzgerald, Henry Reilly etc. when the club was reformed in 1927. And though Jimmy was a fine footballer, hurling would have been his first love when he played on a very fine Ardmore in the late 30's and 40's with players like Mickie Power, Tom and Michael Harty. Danny Rourke, John Carey, John Clancy, Jim Norris etc.. In the early 50's when the club disbanded our players went to neighbouring clubs and a public meeting was held on Sept 30th 1957 to re-form the club. Even though we didn't have 100% support we got going again and Jimmy who was one of the founding members gave us a playing field in Dysert free of charge - a wonderful gesture indeed and when the field was tilled in 1962 he gave us a field in Monea before we moved to

Willie Hennessys field in Ardo.

With the passing of Jimmy only three of the founder members remain - Paddy Fahey, Ballinamona, Rev. Wm. Phelan P.E., Dungarvan who was our first Chairman and Padraig O Foghlu who was our first runai.

In our first championship game in 1958 we had to get assistance of two Knockanore players, one was our full back Garry Moloney R.I.P. who in an effort to protect his goalie knocked Mick Carlton complete with ball into the net for a Kilgobnet goal. Even though some thought it was an accident there was a question of having to walk home so our Sagart Og had to take the boys back to Cnoc an Oir and he got lost as he was trying to get back for the rosary. We didn't have any rosary that evening and some people thought that Jimmy should have said it as he had played a little part in the story. Jimmy's two sons Jim and Noel gave great service to the club. Jim who was a hurler before his time in Ardmore played in all grades of hurling and football for Waterford having perfected his hurling skills in St. Kieran's College, Kilkenny. He has also been a great club benefactor.

Noel who was also a gifted hurler gave great service to Ardmore and Waterford before transferring to Cork where he played alongside the great Justin McCarthy when he assisted Passage.

Jimmy remained a true blue to the end and was fully convinced that Waterford would beat Tipperary and we are sure that he was very close to the action in Pairc Uí Caoimh - such a man was Jimmy Rooney. Away from the real action I can recall binding the sheafs as Jimmy cleared the headlands with a scythe before the arrival of the reaper and binder.

On another occasion we had a go at making a knee stack. It kept going up and up as we didn't have the knack of drawing it in as Jimmy would say. The funny part of the joke was that I had to get a ladder to get him down.

I can remember Jimmy fishing a salmon season on crutches having got a kick in training from a Curragh man in wellingtons. It was thought that he had something in the boots.

Slán go foil Jimmy many people will miss the enlightened chats at the Storm Wall. You always got it straight from Jimmy and you could either lump it or leave it but it was always given with honesty and sincerity. Such a man was our great friend Jimmy Rooney who always made a special case for the people from across the strand agus bfeidir go raibh an ceart agat Jimmy.

Ardmore has indeed lost a great character and a true player. —(P.O.F.)

Of all of the people we met I have to say that Brian Crowley gave the most clear and succinct outline of what it was all about and I have asked him to publish his views, in the manner which he informed us. And I would respectfully suggest to all the parties who are pro-Nice, to publish material that we can all understand, without having to consult a barrister for interpretation and of course we should expect the "no lobby" to do similar.

There are articles in most papers regularly, but they do not give us the nuts and bolts or a logical or rational reason for joining or not joining.

For example would somebody set out in a 'yes column' and a 'no column' the reasons why we should not join, just for some of us ordinary people.

In relation to the questions that I posed at the start of the article, items 1 and 2. I believe our politicians have 'no axe to grind', other than what they perceive as being good for the country and to our benefit in the long term.

Regarding the Neutrality issue, this has been dealt with, by way of a written agreement between Ireland and each of the other states to the effect that our neutral stance, in the event of war, still stands. The cynics argue that this is not worth the paper that it is written on, but I would not mind going to court with this as an agreement or contract! The (selfish) or business question is, what will it benefit us? The answers are full of complexities but the perceived wisdom is that we are better to expand our economic and political sphere of influence rather than allow one of the others powers get in first. My own simple view is that, I hope that anyone who will join our 'club' would have something to 'bring to the party'. And I feel assured that the Germans, French or British will be giving away largess without reciprocation.

Finally, there will be some diminution of our position when the expansion takes place. I have been given to understand that we may lose one of our two commissioners and three of the fifteen MEP's. But at the end of the day, we are looking at a larger club. We, the Irish nation, are held up as being the model of success. We shall, also, (by voting YES) have made new friends and won influence with our new partners and with our existing fellow members who gave us the original Celtic Tiger in the first instance.





McGrath who is Chairperson Ballybacon/Newcastle/Ballymacarbry sponsor group that employs fifteen people and one supervisor in Newcastle and surrounding parishes is extremely worried as for the future of these schemes as many sponsor groups have been asked to terminate the contracts of the C.E. workers. This will affect all communities as the schemes are widely regarded as essential to the social fabric of many communities and are also widely regarded as a gateway into fulltime employment.

No national evaluation has taken place of the impact of these schemes at a local level. In light of the impact of these schemes, this decision and the way it was reached many questions have to be put to Minister Mary Harney. Cllr. McGrath feels that it is imperative that the decision to cut C.E. schemes be reversed as to abandon them will have far reaching consequences for all communities involved throughout County Tipperary.

Flies in Your Compost Bin

Compost Bin Sales Day

With the slight improvement in the weather, there seem to be an increase in the number of flies in the Civic Offices Compost Bin. These are fruit flies and are attracted to fruit and vegetable waste, particularly during warmer weather. Keeping your food waste covered at all times will help control them. You could use a good layer of damp shredded paper on top of the bin, tucked right up against the sides of the bin (replace regularly). Alternatively a layer of soil will also do the trick. Because they don't like to bury to lay eggs this cover should keep them away.

Composting is a great way of getting rid of all your kitchen and garden waste in an environmentally friendly way. After a few months, all your fruit, veg and garden scraps will have rotted down into compost that can then be used in the garden. The Council is selling compost bins, which would normally retail at €60, at the subsidised price of

If you have never composted before and you would like to learn more about it why not come along to one of the upcoming sale days.

Staff from the Environment Section will be on hand during the Sale Days to show what can be put into a compost bin and to show what you can expect to get out of your compost bin after a few months. We are expecting a great turn out so I would advise every one to arrive early to be sure of getting a compost bin.

Emphysema What is Emphysema?

Emphysema (also known as Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease or COPD) is a group of lung diseases that are characterized by a reduced ability of the lungs to oxygenate the blood. Emphysema and chronic bronchitis generally occur together. Emphysema usually develops over a long period of time; the small air sacs within the lungs (alveoli) are gradually destroyed, usually by cigarette smoke.

As a result of this, the surface area necessary to exchange oxygen and carbon dioxide becomes inadequate, and patients become more and more short of breath. Chronic bronchitis refers to an ongoing inflammation of the lining of the lungs breathing tubes (bronchi) caused by bacterial infection and, usually, smoke irritation. As the inflammation progresses, the bronchi fill with mucus and grow narrower, hindering the flow of air. This results in a chronic cough, as the body attempts to rid itself of the excess mucus that is irritating the lungs.

What causes emphysema?

The main courses of emphysema are cigarette smoking; it is also the main cause of chronic bronchitis. Other causes include environmental pollution and occupational exposures, and there is one form of emphysema due to a genetically linked enzyme deficiency (alpha-1-antitrypsin). It has been proved by scientific research that the normal lung has a remarkable balance between two classes of chemicals with opposing action. The elastic fibers in the lung allow the lungs to expand and contract. When the chemical balance is altered, the lungs lose the ability to protect themselves against the destruction of these elastic fibers. This is what happens in emphysema.

Treatment for emphysema:

There is no cure for emphysema, but the treatment available to patients is to provide relief of symptoms and prevent progression of the disease. Some of the treatment available includes the following;

To stop smoking

• Environmental Control - exposure to air pollution, dust, and secondhand smoke should be avoided where ever possible

 Bronchodilating Medications – these medications relax the air passages in the lungs, they lead to improved

 Anti-inflammatory Medications – since emphysema involves a chronic inflammation of the lung tissue, medication is used to reduce lung irritation

Supplemental Oxygen - this is prescribed if the patient cannot maintain acceptable oxygen levels on their own, the supplemental oxygen will help to assist their breathing

New advances in the treatment of emphysema include surgery called lung reduction surgery, which is a surgical procedure, which involves the removal of diseased and damaged regions of the lungs so that the normal tissue can function better.

Maintaining overall good health habits, which include proper nutrition, adequate sleep and regular exercise will help to build up stamina and resistance to infections. 

FINAL TRIUMPH OF THE NEW ORDER

In 1688 the Catholic King James 11 fled from England to France and was replaced by Mary, James' daughter and William Of Orange, her husband, both Protestants.

It was a blow to those of the last of the Irish gentry who had not been restored to their lands after the restoration. They decided to support James in his struggle to recover his throne and restore the old order in some fashion.

The Dungarvan area was untouched by the war. However, in the early winter of 1690 part of a Danish regiment was stationed at Dungarvan.

When Limerick surrendered in 1691, the Irish officers and men could return to their homes without further penalty or else join another army. That meant fighting against the English armed forces on the European mainland. To keep them out of Ireland they were indicated and outlawed. Among these were John Fitzgerald of Clonea; Thomas Fitzgerald of Woodhouse, Stradbally; Col. John Hore of Shandon; Richard Nugent of Cloncoskeran; Terence Bryan (O'Brien) of Comeragh and Peter Anthony of Garranbane.

Jim played a leading role in the formation of the club, played a major part in the winning of hurling and football championships with the club and after retiring as a player his association with the Geraldines remained as solid as it was in his playing days.

He was a hurler from his boyhood days and when there was no club in the village, himself, Paddy Kenneally, the late Mick Keating and Johnnie O'Brien (father of well known singer Paddy O'Brien), all played with St. Patricks, Knockanore (now Shamrocks) and helped them win their first championship in 1947. The problems associated with travelling to Knockanore and returning across the Blackwater gave them the idea of having a team in their own

parish. In 1950, the Geraldines was formed with Patrick Morrissey as chairman.

Playing at centre half back in hurling he proved himself to be a leader as well as a splendid hurler. He helped Geraldines to win the junior football championship in 1955 and the junior hurling in 1956 He played a role on the intermediate team which lost to De La Salle in the county final in 1965. Jim also played in the senior football final against Kill in 1965 and had played intercounty junior and intermediate football and hurling for the county.

He was a wonderful conversationalist who would never tire of talking about great club games and the great players like Tom "Stylo" O'Riordan, the clubs renowned goalkeeper Johnnie O'Grady, Paddy Kenneally, Bunny Ronayne and many others. These and very many others were present in the guard of honour when he was being laid to rest. Old players from clubs from all over west Waterford were also present to pay their final respects.

"Hal" will always be remembered as one of the legends of the Geraldines Club, and deservedly so.

To his brothers Mike and Billy and sister Eileen we offer our deepest sympathy.






