### One Million Euro **Local Authority Housing Project** Set For Dungarvan

Funding for a eur1 million housing development near the Old Powers Brewery in Dungarvan, and the continuation of work on forty new local authority houses in the Shandon area of the town, was announced by Minister Martin Cullen, on Monday

The funding of eur9.5m for this years local authority housing programme is to cover two main housing projects in Dungarvan, and has been hailed as an almost doubling of the Town Council's housing funds over last

the completion of phase one of the Shandon development, which is in the pretenancy stage and comprises of forty houses. Keys are also expected to be handed over to the tenants of the new homes in the near fu-

The second phase is also included, with eur3.4m announced for a further 40 houses as part of one of the largest local authority housing projects ever undertaken by Dungarvan Town Coun-

Meanwhile, a develop-

The funding is to include ment, expected to make "inroads" into Dungarvan Town Council's housing list for Senior Citizens and Single People, has been allocated eurl million by the Govern-

> The nineteen-house development at the former Powers Brewery, opposite Wolf Tone Road in Dungarvan, is believed to contain mostly two bedroom houses, and its location close to services is thought to be ideal for Senior Citizens.





### **BAHAMIAN** REPRESENTATIVE /ISITS DUNGARVAN

A welcome visitor to Dungarvan last week was Ms. Amanda Moncur, the Head of Delegation of the Special Olympics Team from The Bahamas, who will be visiting Dungarvan next year prior to their taking part in the World Games in Dublin. Ms. Moncur took the opportunity to meet the members of the Host Town Committee who have been making arrangements for the visit of the special athletes to Dungarvan next year and also view the sports facilities available in the town and district.

On Monday evening in the Civic Offices, the Mayor, Cllr. Nuala Ryan and members of the Town Council accorded her a Civic Welcome. The Mayor in her address of welcome said that she was pleased to bid her a formal, but very warm and genuine welcome amongst us.

She said the people of the town and the Members of the Council were thrilled when it was announced last November that Dungarvan would be home to the team

from the Bahamas for a week of acclimatisation and familiarisation next June.

"A special Committee chaired by Cllr. O'Riordan and widely representative of the community has been making the necessary preparations," she said, "and is well advanced in that regard. I have no doubt you will be made familiar over the next few days with what has been done to date, but I am confident that the preparations will be more than adequate for the needs of all our visitors."

She said that as a Council and particularly through the medium of the Council's Sports Centre, they had always tried to be helpful to, and supportive of people with special educational needs, whether as students or

as athletes.

"We welcome this further opportunity to make a contribution in the international arena," she continued, "and know that when your fellow country-people return home after the World Games, they will bring back with them only the warmest and fondest memories of Ireland and Dungarvan.'

In reply, Ms. Moncur said that she had been overwhelmed by the welcome she had received, both at the Conference of Heads of Delegations in Dublin and now in their host town, Dungarvan. "From what I have seen and experienced so far," she said, "I know that our athletes and coaches will be made very welcome and will enjoy their time in Dungarvan and Dublin.'

During the week she visited the sports facilities which will be available to the Bahamian team including Carriglea Training Centre, St. Augustine's College, Dungarvan Sports Centre, Dungarvan Tennis Club and Finnisk Riding Centre.





### Dinosaur

### WHY HAVE SOME **DINOSAURS GOT FOUR LEGS** AND OTHERS TWO?

The answer is simply that dinosaurs walked in the way that suited their lifestyle best.

Most carnovores, for instance, walked on their hind legs because they need to keep their hands free so they could use them to catch and hold on to their prey.

Other dinosaurs walked on all four legs, mainly because their enormous size and weight needed support from four "posts" underneath.

Large herbivores such as Diplodocus were like

Some dinosaurs had the option of walking either on two or four legs, depending on what they were doing at the time.

They could move around slowly on all-fours, feeding on low vegetation, but when alarmed, could rear up and charge off on hind legs alone. These dinosaurs needed special hands that allowed for weight support, as well as grasping.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

in proportion to the body, with only two claws. They were too short to hold pry, but they may have been used as anchor to grip the ground when Tyrannosaurus Rex rose from resting.

Iguanodon had hands with large thumb spikes which it used as a fearsome defensive weapon. The middle three fingers, which ended in hoof-like bones, were used exclusively for walking on and the fifth finger was flexible and used for holding food.

### The Long-Necked Monster

The Diplodocus was one of the biggest dinosaurs ever to walk the earth.

Diplodocus looked extraordinary with its long neck and tail, and a head that was tiny, fitting its lifestyle

It could reach up to feed at the tops of very tall trees. like conifers, that grew at the time. Its small head allowed it to browse amongst the vegetations, where few other dinosaurs could reach. This type of feeding needed a special type of neck - one that was strong, light and flexible, in order to be raised and lowered

Having stripped one area bare of food, it would have ambled off with its companions in search of new feeding grounds.

If Diplodocus was threatened by a meat eater, its only defence would have been its bulk, and its long, whip-

#### DID YOU KNOW?

Diplodocus had quite narrow feet in proportion to its body weight. It would have grazed on dry, firm ground where it would browse its way through conifer forests. It would probably have been part of a herd.

The Diplodocus was 86 feet long and weighted 16 tons.

Giraffes are a little like the Diplodocus, reaching up with their long necks to the tree tops. However, they are unlike the dinosaur, as the giraffe can chew its food and so does not need such a large

The Cucas plant would have formed part of the Diplodocus diet.

### **DEATH OF THE** DINOSAUR

Dinosaurs vanished from the earth suddenly and why this happned it still a mystery.

Arounf 70 million years ago the dinosaurs ruled the Earth. Yet, about five million years later, they had all died out, perhaps only in a matter of months. Scientists have put forward various theories to explain their sudden extinction, but many ignore one vital point: dinosaurs were only one of a whole range of creatures that died out at the same time, including all the swimming and flying reptiles. So any theory to explain dinosaur extinction must explain the disappearance of these groups as well.

The theories are numerous; some people think small mammals ate the dinosaur eggs. This is unlikely as it would not account for the extinction of other species. Others believe that dinosaurs simply grew tired of life on Earth and died of boredom!



#### DID YOU KNOW?

One theory is that dinosaurs died out because they ate new kinds of poisonous plants.

A popular theory is that a massive meteorite from space collided with the Earth causing a huge steam and dust cloud which darkened the Earth for a long time, killing off the plants and the animals that fed on them.

If a meteor had hit Earth the impact would have had an effect rather like that of a massive nuclear war. Dense black clouds would have cut out the sun for

Dinosaurs may have contracted cancer. Fossils have been found with cancerous tumours in the bone.

### Tasty Broccoli and Cheese

A DELICIOUS recipe for a water then set aside. rich, blue cheese flan with healthy broccoli pieces.

#### Ingredients:

(Serves 6) 225-300g broccoli, cut cheese. into chunks

2 eggs 150ml double cream

90ml milk Pinch of salt

Pinch of cayenne pepper gorgonzola 175g cheese, grated

1 x 18-20cm cooked shortcrust pastry flan

Flat-leaved parsley to garnish

#### Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/ gas mark 4. Bring a pan of lightly salted water to the boil and cook the broccoli pieces for 4-5 minutes, or until just tender.

Drain and refresh in iced

Beat the eggs, then add the cream and milk and season with the salt and cayenne pepper.

Add the grated gorgonzola

Arrange the broccoli pieces in the flan case and pour the cheese mixture on top.

Bake in the oven for 35-40 minutes until set and golden.

Serve hot or cold, decorated with parsley sprigs. New potatoes are an ideal accompaniment to the meal with a leafy green salad and halved tomatoes for colour on your plate.

TIP: During the last five minutes of cooking you could sprinkle over extra gorgonzola cheese to give the flan an irresistible sticky finish.

If you don't have gorgonzola cheese, you could use Stilton, roquefort or mature cheddar.

### **Tinkering** With The **Traditional**

TRY this delicious low-fat moist carrot cake.

### Ingredients:

(Serves 12) 175g dark brown, soft

sugar 2 large eggs

120ml sunflower oil 200g wholemeal SR flour 11/2 x 5ml sp bicarbonate

of soda 3 x 15ml sp mixed spice grated zest of 1 orange 200g carrots, peeled and

grated 175g sultanas

For the topping: 250g Quark (skimmed milk, soft cheese) 20g caster sugar

2 x 5ml sp vanilla extract 1 x 15ml sp ground cinnamon

Ground cinnamon for dusting

For the glaze: Juice of half a small

orange 10ml lemon juice 40g dark brown soft sugar

Whisk sugar, eggs, and oil with an electric whisk for 2-3 minutes. Sift the flour, bicarbonate of soda and the mixed spice into a bowl, tip in the bran that is left in the sieve. Stir all this together, fold in orange zest, carrots and sultanas. Pour the mixture into a parchment lined 25.5cm x 15cm x 2.5cm baking tin, bake on the centre shelf of the oven for 35-40 minutes, until springy to

While the cake is cooking, mix all the topping ingredients together in a bowl until light and fluffy, cover and chill for 1-2 hours.

For the glaze, whisk together the fruit juices and sugar, then when the cake comes out of the oven, stab it with a skewer and spoon the syrup over.

Leave the cake to cool, cover with the topping, cut into 12 square and dust with cinnamon before serving.



### **Shortlist Drawn Up For** Wastewater **Treatment Plant** Contract

A shortlist of five companies interested in acquiring the contract to build and operate a new Wastewater Treatment Plant in Dungarvan has been drawn up, according to County Engineer, John O'Flynn.

Setting out the current position of the plant in reply to representations made by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, Mr. O'Flynn said that the tender documents have been issued to the five prequalified consortia within the past week. The bidding process for the running of the plant has a closing date of 1st October and will take approximately two years to complete.

Allowing for examination of tenders and receipt of the necessary approval from the Department of the Environment and Local Government, it is anticipated that construction will commence on this project in May 2003", Mr. O'Flynn states.

The project is divided into two separate contracts, he goes on to say, with the collection and delivery system under a different contract to the treatment plant.

The Department of the Environment has approved contract documents for the collection and delivery systems and all the necessary planning issues are now completed.

As an appetiser we tried the Peshwari Kebab, a delicately spiced, minced lamb dish, which, while not too filling, is the perfect taster for what's to come. The French House White Wine, Cunie Boucharde Aine, is also highly recommended, while Cobra, an Indian brewed beer, specially imported by the proprietors, is another one of the treats in store.

A selection of sidedishes of boiled rice, pilau rice and vegetable rice is also on offer, while the Tandoori breads are one of the highlights of the meal, with plain NAAN, Garlic and Peshwari included in those available.

To finish off a hugely enjoyable night at the Indian

Ocean, we tried the Tarta Fantastica, a chocolate and ice cream treat, while the Irish, French and Bailey's Coffees are the perfect way to round off the evening. The Indian Ocean Tandoori Restaurant on Davitts Quay in Dungarvan opens everyday from 5pm -11.30pm with Special Lunch on Thursday to Sunday between 12.30 -2.30pm. ### Alternative Vision On Waste Strategy Required Says Labour Councillor

The introduction of a National Waste Management Authority, allied to investment in and development of a recycling infrastructure, is the alternative to over dependence on landfill and the drive towards incineration of our rubbish.

That's the view of Dungarvan area Labour Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair, who says such a direction in national policy is required to alleviate what he refers to as an emerging crisis in the management of waste in Co. Waterford.

Cllr. Ó Céilleachair says the publication this week of a Report on Irish Waste Management from Peter Bacon Consultants clearly shows that reduced inward investment from expanding companies, with consequent job losses, could result from stalemate and unfavourable conditions in waste management emerging from ongoing local controversies and varied practices in how we deal with our rubbish.

The same Bacon report, according to Cllr. Ó Céilleachair, says our Government is "extraordinarily ambitious" in it's targets for recycling in the light of an absence of an infrastructure to cater for it.

Arguing that there was little vision or focus to current Government strategy on waste man-agement, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair

"The present landfill facilities at Kilbarry in Waterford, Ballinamuck in Dungarvan and the one in Tramore are at closing point. Waterford County Council's handling of the search for a new landfill site for the county is a matter of legal dispute and may yet be proven as flawed. Although our taxes fund such local authority services in the first place, we continue with a situation whereby householders pay an extra 5 Euro in one part of Dungarvan for their wheelie bin to be collected, with their neighbours in the County Council area an extra Euro on top of that. There is a also a similar difference in what it costs to have their bags of recycleables collected. In Waterford city, householders pay less than nall of what it costs for their County Council counterparts for wheelie bin collection. And in the city there is no door to door collection of recycleables. Then we are told to accept a local or regional waste plan that foresees all the county's waste going to one unknown location inclusive of an extraordinarily expensive ambition to introduce a thermal treatment infrastructure as opposed to investment in the cleaner and safer recycling system with minimum diversion to landfill on a far smaller scale than hitherto. This alternative vision needs to be put to the Environment Minister Martin Cullen and those in authority down along the way whose responsibility it is to deal with waste."

### Melleray Sports & Gala Weekend



### LETTER TO THE **EDITOR**



Dear Editor.

Your report that the 'Kathleen and May' will visit Dungarvan in August, prompts me to write. I first heard about the 'Kathleen and May' many years ago from my cousin, Tom Tobin, of happy memories. He told me some of its history and that I should see it as it was moored in St. Katherine's Dock by the Tower of London.

I had been a regular visitor to all the dock areas in London and knew St. Katherine's well. There were many historic boats there in a living museum and the Kathleen he said was among them.

So off I went one Sunday morning to look for the Kathleen and May. I searched everywhere but I couldn't find it. Disappointed, I made my home on foot via "Tower Bridge" and HMS Belfast, then quite by accident, I found it, for there hard by "London Bridge" in the shadow of Southwark Cathedral, in St. Mary Overie Dock was the Kathleen and May. (St. Mary Overie Dock took its name from St. Mary Overie Church, which was what Southwark Cathedral was known as in Catholic London).

I had occasion to visit the little boat many times as it was a tourist attraction and for £1.50 you could go on board and tour around. I took some 30 pictures as a souvenir and talked to the man in charge. Down in the hold, there was a strong smell of coal, but the man told me it was hemp.

One Sunday morning, however, when I made my way down Clink St., past the Clink Prison museum, I found the dock empty. Not knowing what happened to the Kathleen and May, I went over to St. Katherine's Dock and couldn't find it anywhere. It was several years later when I read a story in the 'Dungarvan Leader' that it was moored in Youghal undergoing repairs.

Now I hear the people of Dungarvan will have the honour of a visit in August. I highly commend this little boat to the people of Dungarvan and it is worthy of support from them and the Town Council.

Lismore Notes

### SAINT CARTHAGE'S SINGERS PREPARE FOR THE NEW SEASON

St. Carthage's Singers - the Choir-in-Residence of Lismore Cathedral - are preparing for another promising season. The choir has gone from strength to strength. Apart from singing in Lismore Cathedral they performed in St. Patrick's Cathedral and Christ Church Cathedral in Dublin, in Glenstal Abbey and, recently, in St. Mary's Abbey in Glencairn. They also sang in a number of churches in South Tip-perary and East Cork where, dressed in their red choir robes, they made an impressive appearance.

Apart from this the quality of the choir improved. They started singing in the usual four parts (soprano, alto, tenor, bass), but are now successfully tackling music in eight parts (dividing themselves in two choirs) and a number of choir members sing solo when required, as recently in a performance of Mendelssohn's "Hear My Prayer".

The next step will be the addition of a small instrumental ensemble, as needed, for instance, for performing a cantata by Joh. Seb. Bach or

At present the choir has one vacancy; St. Carthage's Singers could do with an extra tenor. Potentially there is a vacancy for a bass. For female members there is a waiting list - the Choir has to remain small (maximally appr. 20 members) due to the limited number of choir stalls in Lismore Cathedral.

Despite this restriction, the Choirmaster of Lismore Cathedral, Dr. Jan Van Putten, has decided that it would be worth while to offer training opportunities to four young people who wish to develop their singing skills; one soprano, one alto, one tenor, one bass. These young people will be offered an opportunity to sing music of high

What instrumentalists will be needed in the coming season? Some of the music that is planned for the rest of this year and for the first half of 2003 requires - at least - two violons, two violas, a cello (and/or double bass) and a recorder. We would also be happy to welcome an accompanist (organ/harpsichord), because at present, when the choir sings an accompanied piece, accompaniment has to be provided by either Jan Van Putten himself or the Dean of Lismore who on such occasions - as he is an excellent singer - is dearly missed in the Choir.

The Choir meets every Wednesday in Lismore Cathedral, starting in the last week of September, and sings on average in one service every month. Choir members are expected to attend all practices and all services where the choir is needed. Jan Van Putten is very positive about the loyalty of the choir. "All turn up every Wednesday and learn their music very quickly. All members are highly motivated, we have no passengers - because the choir is relatively small and a privilege to work with such a dedicated choir". The intended instrumental group will meet on different times, to be decided according to the music to be performed.

If this plan can be realised, May and June 2003 will be dedicated to the musical prepa-

#### HOLIDAY FLIGHT PROBLEMS?

The European Parliament is due to pass new legislation this Summer in relation to compensation and assistance to air passengers in cases of denied boarding. Compensation levels are as follows:

- 750 euros for flights of less than 3,500 km
- 1,500 euros for flights of 3,500 km or more

In denied boarding, volunteers will be called on to surrender their reservations in exchange of benefits under conditions to be agreed between the passengers concerned and the carrier and tour operator. Only if insufficient volunteers come forward would operators be allowed to deny boarding.

Volunteers should then be given a choice between:

- re-imbursement of full cost of ticket for the part of the journey not made, and for parts of journey made if no longer serving any purpose
- re-routing the final destination under comparable condi-
- re-routing at a later stage

The volunteers further have a right to care while awaiting a flight, which includes:

- Free provision of meals and refreshments in reasonable relation to waiting time
- Hotel accommodation

### **KNOW YOUR** RIGHTS

I believe it is possible for a person with a disability to get a refund of VAT on certain aids he/she requires. Can you please give the details?

#### **ANSWER**

Under the Value Added Tax (Refund of Tax) (No. 15) Order, 1981 a refund of VAT is available on certain aids and appliances bought for use by a person with a disability. The aid or appliance must be for the exclusive use of the person. Where the refund of VAT is claimed by another person, Revenue may require evidence that the aid or appliance is exclusively used by the person with a disability and is in his/her sole possession.

The relief applies to the purchase of goods which are aids and appliances designed to assist a person to overcome his/her disability in the performance of daily functions or in the exercise of a vocation. Examples of eligible goods range from eating and drinking aids designed solely for the disabled and hoists and lifters designed for invalids, to a computer required so that a person can pursue a course of education or carry out duties at work. 

"The houses in the Brewery development are primarily two bed houses", he said, "which are designed to cater for senior citizens on the one hand and single people on

While some previous developments didn't cater for senior citizens, he said, the new development should "make in-roads into this aspect of the housing list".

The continued funding undertaken by the council in Shandon was also welcomed, but works must also be carried out on access to the development, according to a local councillor.

Cllr. Billy Kyne said that vital work, on pedestrian and cycle access to the development, together with adequate lighting, must be carried out.

This, he added is necessary as pedestrians, often with children, will be walking long distances into the main shopping centres of Dungar-

"I have made representations on this issue in the council before and I trust they will be followed through", Cllr. Kyne said.

However, while Dungarvan has drawn down almost double the previous years funding, Waterford County Council received a rise of just eur2.2m.

The figures released by the Department of Environment and Local Government, show Waterford County Council's allocation falling behind Dungarvan by eur1.5m, while Waterford City has received a record

fund of eur30 million.

However, a spokesperson for the Department, rejected suggestions that urban areas particularly Waterford city, had received disproportionately high funding at the expense of the county.

He said if the Dungarvan and County areas are taken together, roughly eur17.7 m will be handed out for local authority housing outside Waterford City, a figure, which is an 80% increase on last year.

A number of small schemes, consisting mainly of 5 or 6 units, in Ring, Cappoquin, Ardmore, Lismore, Kill, Kilmacthomas and Stradbally, are all to benefit under this years funding, the spokesperson pointed out.

Cllr. James Tobin (FF) welcomed the funding, saying it was deeply appreciated. He said it was now hoped that the Minister would continue delivering for West Waterford and for the rural areas of the county.

A heritage narrow gauge railway follows six kilometers of the abandoned Waterford - Dungarvan route, from the original station at Kilmeaden in as far as Carriganore.

This is an amenity for the people of the South East as well as providing yet another wonderful tourist attraction for County Waterford.

Peter Roche, Chairman of the Waterford & Suir Valley Railway Company said " It is now five years since Frank O'Donoghue invited interested parties to attend a meeting with a view to preserving some of the rich railway history of Waterford. Since then a lot of hard work and perseverance has paid off and we are delighted to have people come along and experience the journey for themselves." He continued " Saturday 3rd of August will be an important milestone for the company, however work will still continue to develop the railway further and open with better facilities and on a more full time basis early next year."

The train will run each weekend in August beginning with the August Bank Holiday weekend, operating Saturday, Sunday and Monday. There will be three trains each day at 2 pm, 3.15pm and 4.30pm. The journey is a 12km round trip and takes approximately 1 hour. Fare are very reasonably priced at 5.00 per adult, 3.00 per child. A family ticket for 2 adults and up to 3 children may be purchased at 12.00. Student and pensioners may enjoy the trip for 3.80.

The W&SVR Heritage Railway operates a special "Friends of the Waterford & Suir Valley Railway". Yearly membership is 45.00 for a family and 32.00 for an individual. Friends of the

railway will receive 25% discount off published fares.

The rolling stock includes a restored Simplex Locomotive, which originated in England and had an arduous working life in the peat industry in the North of England and Scotland. It now pulls two Edwardian style carriages travelling at 15km

### **Enforcers From Centre** In Ireland Police **EU Food Rules**

On the very day that the EU Food and Veterinary Office at Grange, Dunsany, Co Meath, was officially opened, personnel from the office were carrying out inspections in Slovenia, Paraguay, the Slovak Republic, Greece and Cape Verde.

It's a long way from the pastoral plains of Meath to any of those countries, but the inspectors from the FVO were routinely going about their important business - that of checking that EU rules on food, live animals, plant products and other products supplied to various temporary premises the EU market are being around the Dublin city area. complied with and, in this way, they see to it that the Commission decided in 1993

That description during his speech at the opening by David Byrne, the European Commissioner for Health and Consumer Protection, sent a bolt of realism through the proceedings. It brought it home to the dignitaries attending the function that this was a powerful centre carrying out important work on behalf of the European Commission and, ultimately, on behalf of its 390 million consumers.

The FVO has, of course, been based in Ireland since 1997 but has been "living" in When the European Council health of the EU consumer that the part of the Commis-

sion with the unwieldy title of the Office for Veterinary and Plant Health Inspection and Control (now, mercifully, shortened to the Food and Veterinary Office) should be located in Ireland, the then Taoiseach John Bruton persuaded them to have it built on land owned by the Teagasc beef research centre at Grange. People from 14 nationalities (all EU member states except Luxembourg are represented) are on the staff of 150 and about 40 per cent of them have gone to live in the greater rural hinterland around the office, with the remaining 60 per cent choosing to live in Dublin. About 100 of the staff in the centre are inspectors and they travel out from there to all points on the compass and to the furthest places on the earth in their policing work.

Last year, they carried out more than 200 inspections in 52 different countries.

Commissioner Byrne, who has ultimate responsibility for the FVO, described it as an excellent example of the practical work of one of the nary Office here in Grange.'

EU institutions. "Too often we hear talk of the European Commission as being remote, unaccountable, and so on, the sort of criticism that comes up regularly, not just in Ireland but in other parts of the EU as well," he said. "Here in Grange we have the reality, not the fiction put out by our critics. An operation run by the European Commission to enforce EU laws agreed by the Council and by the democratically elected European Parliament, with practical benefit to all of the people of the European Union.

The Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern, who performed the official opening, said Commissioner Byrne was to be congratulated for progressing the development of food safety legislation in a pioneering manner, leading to the establishment of the Food Safety Authority at the beginning of this year.

We in Ireland know that food safety is essential both to public health and to international trade in our agricultural and food products," he said. "We now have the greatest focus we have ever had on food safety, with a top class traceability system.

"We are determined to accept nothing less than full compliance with the new rules in order to uphold consumer confidence in Irish farming as a source of high quality food," he said. "And because we recognise this is a top priority for people all over Europe, we fully support the vital enforcement work of the Food and Veteri-

### DAIRY FARMERS' FEED BILLS SOAR DUE TO BAD WEATHER

IFA National Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy recently said that an assessment by IFA of additional feeding costs related to the current spell of appalling weather showed the dairy feed bill had soared by 20%. He added this amounted to an extra €1,800 in cost for the average dairy farmer. He added that a telephone survey by IFA had evidenced that merchant credit was building up for feed, fertiliser etc. as a result of the current dairy income crisis, and this was becoming a major problem.

He said the weather-related extra feed costs would knock about €1,800 off the average dairy farmer's 2002 income, and the effect on feeding costs of bad silage making conditions would be felt well into 2003.

"This additional blow comes on top of losses due to severe price cuts and production cost inflation in the last 18 months," Michael Murphy said.

"I estimate that the current dairy income crisis has cost the average dairy farmer about €10,000. This is eating into family living expenses, and is affecting dairy farmers' ability to service financial commitments," he said.

'Dairy farmers have taken the brunt of the current dairy crisis. In this context, it is more crucial than ever that EU dairy supports would be increased, and that June milk prices would be held," he concluded.

### SOUTHEAST

MAJOR RETHINK NEEDED ON INCINERATION IN **SOUTH EAST** 

Mr. Eamon O'Rourke, Chairperson, Wexford ICMSA said: ICMSA is totally opposed to the possible development of an incinerator in the South East given the likely impact it may have on the people in that locality and the agriculture sector". "I am very disappointed that the Wexford County Manager has approved the Regional Waste Management Plan. I was the farmer representative on the Strategic Policy Committee of Wexford County Council which recommended the rejection of the Plan as it included an incinerator proposal"

Mr. O'Rourke said: "Agriculture is of critical importance not only to the South East but Ireland in general. In 2001, a huge effort was made to protect this industry during the FMD crisis by all. Now, with the proposed development, any problems could have serious consequences for Irish agriculture given the export orientation of the industry, problems that would be very difficult to cure"

One need only look at the difficulties experienced by Belgium during its dioxin scare a number of years ago. The dioxins from an incinerator has led to disastrous results for Belgium's agriculture. ICMSA have been contacted by many local landowners who are very concerned about their future and also are very much opposed to this possible development given the possible negative impacts that may arise.

The people of the South East must not be placed under an unacceptable risk in order to deal with Ireland's waste problems. ICMSA is opposed to this development given the likely impact it will have on the local community. Those who make these decisions will have to take account of local views and seek alternative strategies to incineration", concluded Mr.

### FARM COSTS RISE TO €150M DUE TO WEATHER

A financial package is now urgently required to assist farmers affected by the bad weather as ICMSA estimate that the cost of providing extra feed has now grown to €150 million.

### IFA SAYS LAMB PRICES ARE HARDENING WITH **SCARCE SUPPLIES**

Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman Michael Looby said recently lamb prices have hardened driven by scarce supplies and stronger market demand. Mr Looby said factories have increased their base price up to 3.36/kg (120p/lb) with some factories paying up to 3.44/kg (123p/lb) to get suppliers.

In France Mr Looby said prices are up 20c/kg (7 \_ p/lb) from this day last week and demand is much stronger in Brittany and on the South coast.

Mr Looby said supplies are also much tighter with the kill back almost 400,000 head to date at the factories.

CHRYSANTHEMUMS can have more than their fair share of problems, but get it right and they can be one of the most rewarding plants to grow.

SOW CYCLAMEN

It is possible to raise cyclamen from seed sown very early in the year and flower the plants the following winter, but the best results are obtained by sowing about the middle of August and keeping the seedlings growing steadily, throughout the following autumn, winter, spring and summer so they make fine big corms for flowering the following autumn and winter.

TAKE PELARGONIUM CUTTINGS

You can take cuttings of both zonal and ivyleaved bedding pelargoniums (geraniums) at any time during August. Choose shoots 10 to 13cm long that are not carrying flowers. Sever them cleanly just below a joint and insert the cuttings around the edge of well drained pots filled with sandy compost. The cuttings will root quickly if you stand them in a frame and shade them from direct sunshine, but they can also be rooted in any reasonably sheltered place indoors or out.

### LOCAL **HISTORY**

Fr. Thomas Browne, the Parish Priest of Dungarvan, went to Tallow to register as the resident priest in Dungarvan as the law directed. He was 55 years of age and was ordained twenty years before this in the Irish College at Salamanca in Spain. Before his time Edmund Hore and John Clancy had been put to death because they were priests but Rev. Browne lived safely in the shadow of a new dispensation. It was the time of the Penal Laws. No curate is named for Dungarvan but there may have been one or more and it is likely there were Augustinian friars acting as curates. The next parish priest was Dr. Teige O'Brien, Protonotary Apostolic and the Dean of Lis-

He died in 1713. Abbeyside was still united with Dungarvan and it did not become an independent parish until the 19th Century.

#### CHILDCARE

Huge changes can be expected in the field of childcare in the future as the government has given a commitment to this sector by identifying it as a priority area of investment in the National Development Plan 2000 -

Childcare facilities in Ireland are changing as we slowly come into line with our European neighbours. Every parent wants what is best for their child and that includes not just formal schooling but also preschool and creche facilities. As part of the N.D.P., it is hoped that by 2006, 85% of all childcare workers will have recognised qualification and it is here that we in the Dungarvan Technical College are playing our part. From September 2002, we will be running two childcare programmes, Level 2 and Level 3, under the auspices of FETAC. Childcare Level 2

In the Childcare Level 2 course, students learn a broad range of skills to specified standards, which lead to employment, further education and/or Level 3 certification. This one year course will introduce students to a general understanding and knowledge of children in the early years. Modules will include Caring for Children (0-6 years), Child Development, Early Childhood Education, Working in Childcare as well as a variety of others such as Art and Craft for Childcare. Work Experience is an integral part of the course and students will gain first hand experience by participating in work placement in a relevant childcare setting. The course is ideal for both school leavers and mature students.

#### A Route to Success - Employment and/or Further Education

On successful completion of the course, students will receive a recognised qualification in the rapidly growing area of childcare and may gain employment as Preschool Assistants, Primary School Classroom assistants or in nurseries, creches, playgroups or with private families. Alternatively students may continue their studies at Institutes of Technology through the Higher Education Links Scheme. This is a scheme whereby places are reserved for those who

have completed a relevant P.L.C. course. Courses at third level which are linked to the Childcare Level 2 qualification include Social Studies courses at Waterford Institute of Technology, Athlone I.T., Sligo I.T. and St. Patrick's College, Carlow. In addition, up to 10 places will be available in the B.A. Early Childhood Studies course at University College Cork to applicants who obtain distinctions in 5 modules in the Childcare course.

#### **Childcare Level 3**

In addition to the current Childcare Level 2 course which has been running very successfully over the last number of years, the college is delighted to announce the introduction of a new course which will commence later this year. Dungarvan Technical College was pleased to be nominated as one of a small number of schools to pilot the Childcare Level 3 Course which has just come on stream nationally. This course is designed for students who already work in the childcare sector and will be run on a part-time basis. Modules will include Social and Legel Issues in Childcare, Supervisor in Childcare, Child Development and Early Childhood Programmes and students can build up modules towards the full qualification at their own pace. This course will suit those who have a good childcare knowledge, have experience at supervisory level and are seeking to progress their own professional development. Course coordinator Antoinette O'Brien welcomes this development:

"I feel that this course will improve the status within the county and it's environs. It is a great opportunity for local facilitators to upgrade their skills and so improve the status of their profession within the wider community".

Those interested in applying to either the Childcare Level 2 or Level 3 course may obtain a prospectus and application form by 'phoning Dungarvan Technical College at 058 41184. Application forms should be returned by the end of August and interviews will be held in September.

### MOTOR NEURON DISEASE What is Motor Neuron Disease?

the name given to a group of diseases in which the nerve cells (neurons) controlling the muscles that enable us to move around, speak, breathe and swallow fail to work normally. Motor neurons are the nerve cells along which the brain sends instructions, in the form of electrical impulses, to the muscles. Degeneration of the motor neurons leads to weakness and wasting of muscles. This generally occurs in arms or legs initially, some groups of muscles being affected more than others. Some people may develop weakness and wasting in the muscles supplying the face and throat, causing problems with speech and difficulty chewing and swallowing.

Motor Neuron disease is generally a steadily progressive disease, but the rate of progression can vary greatly for different people.

#### What are the symptoms of Motor Neuron Disease?

The first signs of this disability are often arm and leg weakness, muscle wasting and faint muscle rippling. These symptoms occur because muscles are no longer receiving the nutrient signals

Motor Neuron Disease is they need for growth and maintenance, a result of motor neurons dying. Motor Neuron Disease nerve degeneration may also cause muscle cramps and vague pains, or problems with speech and swallowing. Some people with the disease may lose some control over their emotional responses. They may laugh or cry much more easily than in the past. Eventually, all voluntary muscle action is affected.

> How is Motor Neuron Disease diagnosed?

There is no specific test for diagnosing Motor Neuron Disease. However, several tests- including nerve conduction studies and electromyogram (EMG) - are used to measure how well and quickly the nerves are working. People showing the symptoms of this disability are usually referred to neurologists, who specialise in the nervous system. The cause of MND is unknown, although recent research has shown that around five to ten per cent of people diagnosed with MND show a definite genetic pattern.

#### **Treatment for Motor Neuron Disease**

Motor Neuron Disease management involves physical, occupational, speech. respiratory and nutrition therapy. Exercise may help to maintain muscle strength and function, although it is recommended in moderation.

Although there is no cure for MND, recent clinical trials have shown that some drugs affect nerve

cell activity and may increase the survival time for people with ND. If you would like any further

### WEST WATERFORD BORD NAn-OG G.A.A. NOTES

A meeting of the Bord with delegates was held recently in The Park Hotel, Dungarvan. The attendance at the meeting was small but this was possibly due to the fact that there was also a large amount of Minor games as well as adult leagues games also played on the same night around West Waterford.

POSTPONEMENTS

Clubs present were told that the calling off of games between clubs was no longer going to be tolerated. The Chairman pointed out that Clubs found guilty of having games postponed were going to be expelled from the competition and fined.

Four clubs had been fined for their non participation in the Under 11 Ground Hurling Blitz, Abbeyside/Ballinacourty, Ardmore, Fourmilewater and Lismore. The chairman pointed out that if clubs had taken the time to phone an officer to tell them then they would not have been fined. The four clubs had been fined E50. Ballyduff had given three days notice of their intention of not fielding and were therefore saved from a 50 euro fine. Abbeyside/Ballinacourty were also fined an additional 50 for not fielding in the under 12 hurling semi final against Cois Bhride.

TOURNAMENT AND CHALLENGE GAMES

Clubs were once again told that they had to notify the Bord of every tournament they held. It would be 12-70 euro for every Tournament held and they would have to pay 25-40 euro to Munster Council if Clubs from other Munster Counties were taking part and 25-40 euro to Croke Park if Clubs were taking part from outside Munster.

**TEAM SHEETS** 

The Chairman pointed out that there were still a number of clubs who were not giving Referee's two team sheets before games. This is no longer going to be accepted. Clubs who fail to give referees team sheets will have to forfeit the game that no team sheets were handed up for if they won and the club could also be suspended.

REGISTRATION

Seamus O'Brien said that the registration of players by clubs in the West was very good but that there were players playing with clubs who were not registered. Clubs who have yet to register their players were urged to do so as soon as possible.

**TIME OF GAMES** 

Delegates were told that at the start of the year clubs were given a list of fixtures for the year, and that on this list was the starting time for each match. Clubs reported for taking to the field late from now on are going to be fined

**CHARTER OF REGULATIONS** 

Delegates were informed that the Bord would be meeting in the coming weeks to draw up a Charter of regulations. This Charter would deal with items such as transfer regulations, Championship format, League formats etc. and once completed would be posted to all clubs before the annual Convention so that it can be either accepted or rejected on the night.

TRANSFERS

The regulations regarding transfers were brought up by delegates. The Chairman pointed out that all players over the age of 14 wanting to transfer between clubs would have to get a general transfer. Players under the age of 14 can transfer between clubs as they wish. However if a player under the age of 14 had played in a single under 14 championship game he would have to get a general transfer. Delegates were told that this rule however was changed recently and that from 2003 all players would have to get a general transfer.

REFEREE'S

Delegates pointed out that for a number of recent games in the County under 16 Hurling Championship no official referee was in place, and that in order to get games played a member of either side playing agreed to referee the game but that this was not entirely satisfactory as it was leading to arguments between mentors on the line for any controversial decisions made.

Club delegates asked must they play a game if the Official referee did not turn up, and if they did not play can they be fined and thrown out of the Championship. The Chairman pointed out that Clubs cannot be fined or thrown out of a championship for not playing when the official referee does not show. The Chairman did ask though that if a referee did not show that every effort be made to get the game played somehow as to have to re-fix a game for any board is a nightmare. The Chairman said that he would always expect clubs up to under 14 to play if a referee failed to show, but that at under 16 he would not expect them to play. If a mentor agreeable to both sides was willing to referee an under 16 game the game should be played, but if a person not agreeable to both could not be found the game should not be played.

Delegates were quite happy with the games in the West all agreeing that Bridget Mernin was doing a very good job in trying to get referees to all Western games and that their only problem was with County Games.

TRIALS

Delegates informed the Bord that there were trials for the different County Team taking place around the county, but that not all clubs were being informed about these trials. Delegates said that they knew of better players being overlooked than what were being selected to play for the county.

\_\_\_\_\_\_

Delegates also said that there were mentors within clubs who wished to be involved in County selections and these two were been overlooked. The Chairman pointed out that up to recent years, the West and East Boards always contacted clubs regarding who they had willing to be involved in coaching and selecting divisional and county teams. The Divisional Bord also contacted Clubs regarding trials for the different teams.

Delegates were told that however in the past two or three years that this has all changed and that Coaching and games Development were now in charge of putting together selection committees and teams. Delegates asked that their views that this system is not working be made known.

Clubs were asked to note that the home team was responsible for contacting the secretary after each game and this should be done as quickly as possible after the full time whistle.

**ABBEYSIDE WIN UNDER 14 TITLE** 

The Division One Final of the Declan Kiely Painting and Decorating Contractor under 14 Hurling Championship took place on Tuesday Night last at Fraher Field with Abbeyside and Cappoquin providing the opposition.

This game was slow getting off and once it did Abbeyside were in control for most of it. For Cappoquin it was never going to be their night. In the first half they sent two very scoreable frees from well inside the Abbeyside half of the field well wide and in the second half miss-hit two 21 metre frees and also saw another very good chance hit the upright and was cleared by the Abbey-

Abbeyside won the game 3-7 to 2-3 and after the game Bord assistant secretary presented the winning Abbeyside team with the winners trophy. Pat Prendergast of Kilrossanty was the referee.

**JUVENILE G.A.A. YEAR TO DATE.** 

The half way mark in the Juvenile G.A.A. is just after passing and here we see who the various winners over the past few months are. The year began with the under 16 football championship, which this year saw clubs play each other twice in the league section home and away before the top teams advanced to the knock-

In division one Ballinacourty and Kilrossanty won their way through to meet in the final. Ballinacourty were very impressive all throughout the campaign and when it came to the final they easily overcame Kilrossanty and then went on to beat De La Salle in the County Final. In division two Clashmore and The Nire needed two attempts before they could be separated in the final. Eventually, it was Clashmore who advanced to the County Final. In division three, An Gaeltacht had it all to do to beat Cois Bhride in terrible weather conditions at Ardmore before advancing to play the County Final at Walsh Park.







# End Of Era—Signature Control of New One of State of State

The Annual General Meeting of the Red House League took place in the Red House, Lismore on Monday 22nd July, with a very large attendance of club delegates present. In fact there was only one club (Modeligo) absent on the night.

As leagues go, player registration is very cheap in one league and the cost of weekend football is minimal compared to other leagues throughout the country. He said to continue with the Oscar Traynor competition because it does take a few years to make the breakthrough and when he saw the Red House play South Tipperary last October he was impressed. He finished by wishing Paddy Pollard the very best and said the league is well represented at meetings in Cork by Paddy. Tommy concluded also saying Paddy was elected to the FAI after just one season in Munster and the Red House League is now known nationally.

The election of Chairman then took place with Ml. McBride being elected unopposed. The committee was elected en bloc with Anthony Kenneally (Inch) also elected. So a historic night finished with a new Chairman elected in 30 years and we wish Michael the very best in the next three years.



There are only a few, and if any of them need help or assistance please talk to the committee. We were able to complete our season almost on time considering the bad weather after Christmas. Also, around March, our fixture secretary, Jim Foley, had to relinquish his position due to business commitments and I helped out to the end of the season. I must thank all the clubs

for their cooperation, the Chairman of the referees, Lenny Fraser and his referees who were more than helpful to me with fixture changes and evening games when ever called upon. There have been many different faces on the committee in the 30 years. The present committee are excellent and the amount of time and dedication they give has to be seen and I am very confident that this league is in very good hands and I wish MI. McBride the very best. Looking back to the start when Tony Bolger and myself started off this league with four teams the goal was to have games on a regular basis. Through the years those goals changed with each passing season - increase the league to 2 divisions, to 3 divisions, became associate members of Waterford but with our own autonomy, and then to became a fully fledged league of our own, and finally my own personal goal, enter our league in the Oscar Traynor and in time who knows what will be achieved.

I would like to thank my colleagues in Munster and I will continue to represent this league to the best of my ability at Munster Council and I can assure I will not let this league down in any way when I represent Munster at FA! Junior Council, and I hope to have many happy years with you all and I'll be still seen on Sunday mornings P.G. at some of your grounds.

Finally I cannot let this occasion pass without thanking the committee and all those clubs who turned up in Ballyrafter on Saturday 18th May for the surprise party. It was a wonderful night for me and I thank all of you who made presentations to me. I can assure you that they will be treasured as will the memories of the evening. I won't be allowed forget it anyway as Pat Casey presented me with a video of the occasion.

Many speeches were made that night, but one sentence Liam Fraser said sticks with me as I never thought of if and I'll finish with that sentence now — This league started with just sixty players and tonight there are with adults and schoolboys 1800 registered. 


