Lismore Business **Park Secures €200,000 Funding**

A new Business Park in Lismore is set to become reality, after funding of eur200,000 was secured under Enterprise Ireland's first round of project approvals for community enterprise centres.

The project, which was put forward by Lismore Mochuda Development Company and Waterford In Business, has been in the pipeline for the past two years, and should pave the way for the construction of the first purpose built industrial facility

in Lismore for thirty years.

The funding from Enterprise Ireland, together with contributions from Mochuda and other groups, is also expected to allow for the development of five, 2,000 sq ft industrial units, along with 3,000 sq ft of office space on a site on the Mayfield

Planning permission has already been granted and it is believed that the next step in the project will see Lismore Business Park Ltd seek tenders for the construction of the units.

Lismore Town Councillor and Chairman of Mochuda, Bernard Leddy said the new industrial units would be a particularly welcome addition to Lismore as they are also adaptable to other uses, apart from industrial. The Business Park's future had also been subject to this vital "keystone funding" from Enterprise Ireland, he added.



An historic vessel, The transported a 180 tonne load of anthracite from Swansea. The anthracite was destined for the former Moloneys Stores in Dungarvan, and was dug out by hand and transported off the vessel using winches.

Despite its weight, it took just eight hours to unload all the transported material, commencing the operation at 8am and finishing at 4pm that same day. She then left the harbour on January 30th.

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



Question

My uncle needs hearing aids. Can he get ers and from: any help towards paying for them?

Treatment 8

Answer

If your uncle is working and paying PRSI Class A, E, H or P then he may be eligible for assistance from the Department of Social and Family Affairs. If he has a Medical Card his Health Board will provide hearing aids free of charge.

Under the Department's Treatment Benefit Scheme the Department will pay up to half the cost of hearing aid or of repairs to a hearing aid. The maximum amount it will pay for each hearing aid is 350 euros.

To qualify for benefit your uncle must satisfy the PRSI contribution conditions of the scheme. If he satisfies the PRSI conditions when he reaches the age of 60 or age 66 he will remain qualified for life. If he is eligible for benefit under the scheme his dependent spouse is also entitled to benefit unless she qualifies in her own right. A person that qualified on their spouse's insurance record at the time of his/her death will retain his/her entitlement as long as the person remains widowed.

To claim Treatment Benefit your uncle must apply to the Department on claim form MA 1 (MA 2 for a dependent spouse)

The Health Boards provide Aural (Hearing) Services free of charge to Medical Card holders and to children. Children over the age of 18 in full-time education are also eligible.

Adults may be referred by an Ear, Nose and Throat Consultant or by their own doctor to a Health Board Hearing Aid Clinic. Children are generally referred to hearing aid clinics by Area Medical Officers when defects are noticed at Child Health Clinics or School Health Examinations. If a hearing aid is prescribed it will be supplied by the Health Board.

Kenneally Secures Senate Nomination

Brendan Kenneally has become Waterford's newest Senator, following his nomination by Taoiseach, Bertie Ahern, recently. The former Minister of State was one of the Taoiseach's eleven nominees.

His appointment means that two representatives from Waterford will be in the Upper House this term – Maurice Cummins (FG) secured his seat in the Labour panel during the Seanad elections three weeks ago.

Mr. Kenneally ran unsuccessfully in last May's General Election, losing out to party colleague Ollie Wilkinson. Further electoral misery followed during the Senad elections when he polled far down the Industrial and Commerical panel, ultimately failing to capture one of the nine seats.

However, with the Taoiseachs nomination, Mr. Kennelly – a member of the Dail for 13 years – is expected to attempt the revival of his political career and use it as a launch pad to regain his seat.

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KIDS' STUFF

EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE SOLAR SYSTEM

The solar system is a group of planets and moons that orbit around the sun. The planets are called Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, Neptune and Pluto — and there are two recently discovered planets called Smiley and Karla. There are also 60 moons which orbit the planets, and thousands of lumps of rock called asteroids, which orbit the sun. HOW WAS IT FORMED?

Scientists believe the sun and its planets formed from a cloud of gas and dust whirling around in space. The cloud was pulled together by gravity and became very thick. Most of it became the sun and the rest formed the planets, moons and asteroids. HOW OLD IS EARTH?

The earth and the rest of the solar system are about 4 billion years old.

ARE THERE OTHER SOLAR SYSTEMS?

Our solar system is a tiny part of a galaxy called the Milky Way which contains 100 billion stars. The Milky Way is a tiny part of the Universe, which is made up of 10 billion galaxies, so it is almost certain there are more planets — although they are so far away they are hard for scientists to find, even with the strongest telescopes.



Earth is the only planet we know to have life. Its atmosphere is rich in oxygen, and there is plenty of liquid on its surface.

EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT THE WEATHER

WHAT IS A CLIMATE

The type of weather that a place has is called its climate. Some places are warm all year, others are cold all year — and in some areas like Ireland, the weather changes from season to season.

WHY DOES IT CHANGE FROM PLACE TO PLACE?

The hottest climates are usually in places near the Equator. Here the sun's rays are more concentrated as the sun is closed to the Earth. Because the earth is rounded it curves away from the sun, so the further north or south you go the less concentrated the rays and the colder the climate.

WHAT ELSE AFFECTS THE CLIMATE?

Places near the sea have milder climates than those inland. Ocean currents can make climates warmer or colder, while mountains tend to have colder climates than the areas around them.

DO CITIES HAVE THEIR OWN CLIMATES?

Big cities such as London are often warmer than the areas of country around them.

This is because they are made up of concrete buildings, which absorb the heat from the sun during the day, releasing it into the atmosphere at night and keeping the overall temperature of the air warmer.

WHY DO WE HAVE SEASONS?

As the Earth moves around the sun different parts of it are tilted towards the sun at different times. The part leaning towards the sun gets more of its rays and is warmer — it is having its summer. As the Earth moves on, that part gets further away from the sun and cools down. When it is furthest away and at its coldest, it is having its winter.



Twister

A tornado can be devastating. Its swirling winds travel at up to 800 kilometres per hour. At the centre of a tornado, the air shoots upwards, and this can uproot trees and hurl cars into the air.

The air inside the tornado is very cold, and mist forms. This is why a tornado looks like a rapidly rotating cloud.

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Post Leaving Certificate Courses At Dungarvan Technical College

NCVA LEVEL 11 IN SPORTS AND RECREATION STUDIES

The leisure industry is currently one of the fastest growing sectors in the world, and this is certainly true in Ireland. Sports and leisure is closely linked to the tourism industry and many new centres and activities are being developed to cater to that market. As such, many career paths now exist in this area, for those interested in sport.

Dungarvan Technical College offers a Post-Leaving Certificate course in Sports and Recreation. In operation for the last six years, this course was specifically developed in response to employment opportunities in the leisure industry. This is a one year course which contains modules in

Course co-ordinator Paddy O' Keeffe comments:

"Increasingly, students who opt for this course are those who want to incorporate sport and fitness as part of their careerplan. Many of these students for recreation and leisure courses at 3rd level but were unable to achieve the points.

This qualification offers them a second chance to apply to the course of their choice, while at the same time giving them a year to concentrate on the area they most enjoy."

He points out that many of the students who have completed the course in the past have opted to continue their studies and are currently in leisure management. - Exercise to Music.


Students must achieve the FETAC (NCVA level 11 award in Sports and Recreation before they can be certified for the NCEF award.



Ada number of accidents in the ditional works have also been proposed, including the realignment of the road from Piltown Cross towards Youghal Bridge, with the Compulsory Purchase Order documents sent to the NRA last year.

However, to date, approval of the CPO documents has not been approved, effectively putting a halt on the realignment work. At present, it is not known when these will be approved and when funding to construct the new road will be made available.

Another road, this time in Grange, which has also come under close scrutiny in recent years, hasn't been allocated any funding as yet.

Although the NRA has announced their road allocations for this year, Waterford County Council received no allocation for traffic calming at Grange. But, a renewed submission for next year will be submitted in Octo-

Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair, who has raised the matter on a number of occasions, from 1998 onwards, has expressed concern at the absence of funding for the Grange Traffic Calming measures.




Voluntary Redundancies **At Stafford**

Over a hundred employees took voluntary redundancy from Stafford Miller under the businesses restructuring


The drug and health care company, located on the Youghal Road Industrial Estate, has been one of Dungarvan's main employers down through the years, but following the transfer of its Sensodine brand of toothpaste to a plant in Maidenhead in England the company set about putting together a redundancy package.

Part of the multi-national GlaxoSmithKline group following its acquisition of Stafford-Miller in eur1.24 billion two years ago, it is expected that the focus of the plant will now be on the denture product, Poligrip, and the positioning of the plant as a denture care facility, which, it is hoped, will provide a platform for future growth.

The Stafford Miller facility, which was formerly owned by the Block family has been located in the town since 1981 and has provided the town with high quality employment over that time. A presentation of Waterford Crystal to the 106 workers, who accepted the severance packages, was made on the night of the companies' annual leave.









Allocation For Selection Of Outer By-Pass Route Falls Short

The news came just two years after the project was first undertaken, when the council appointed Tramore Regional Design Office to design the Dungarvan By-

At that time, a brief was given to the Tramore Office contentious issue of mapping the areas earmarked for compulsory purchase orders.

When the Regional Design Office eventually finishes its work on the Route Selection Phase, the "Preliminary Detailed Design" of the new bypass will be prepared.

At this stage sufficient design of the road will have been carried out, to allow the compulsory purchase order

to proceed. When the Route Selection Phase is completed it will then be a matter for the National Roads Authority to decide the timing of and funding for the further development of the project". Mr. O'Flynn said in reply to representations by Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair.

Historic Three Masted Schooner To Visit Dungarvan

that eight dockers undertook the task - M.L. MacCarthy, F. Fallon, J. Power, R. Moylan, M. Healy, M. Daly, D. Mulcahy and M. Kenneally.

While the schooner is thought to have been a fairly regular visitor to Dungarvan up to that year, the 1953 visit proved to be her last, until this week.

The visit promises to be a unique chance to view a vessel, which became famous as the last merchant schooner registered at a homeport in the United Kingdom to earn her living at sea carrying cargoes.

Built at Connah's Quay at a cost of £2,700 as the Lizzie May, she was sold in 1908 to Martin J Fleming of Youghal and registered at Cork, where she became the Kathleen and May. Just 23 years later she was sold again, this time to Captain William Jewell of Appledore in North Devon, who was in partnership with his son Captain Tommy Jewell. Her yards, except for the foreyard, were sent down and she was fitted with a semidiesel engine and sailed in the Irish trade.


She also carried coal from Mersey to the south coast and she continued trading right through the war. A new engine was fitted, her hatches were enlarged and her masts poled off to give her "an efficient and handsome sail plan as a motor vessel with sail assist".

The commercial success of the Kathleen and May into the 1960's was said to be a remarkable phenomenon and she remained in constant employment in trades that Captain Thomas Jewell was well established in with merchants and shippers. In 1960 he retired the Kathleen and May from active service.

The present owner, Steve Clarke, found the schooner in a dilapidated condition in 1998 in Gloucester, England. He made enquires about the status of the boat, and four months later was the owner of the Kathleen and May.

"She stayed moored to the quay at Bideford whilst we explored various options including the funding of the project. The initial idea was to spend about £50,000 on restoring her to a static exhibition to attract visitors into our town."

However, he said, it soon became obvious that cosmetic renovation was not possible and it was decided to do a full structural renovation, allowing the ship to sail again.

Practical completion of the hull was made in 2001, when she was re-launched by HRH, the Duke of Edinburgh, who was the first restorer. Due to the mammoth task of running and maintaining the vessel, a trust

fund was set up – the Kathleen and May Trust. The trust carries out vital work in keeping the historic vessel afloat, and for those interested in donating sponsorship a fundraising Jazz session will take place at 9.30 in the Dungarvan Harbour Sailing Club.

A Civic Reception on the night of the vessel's arrival for Captain John Castle, and the crew of the Kathleen and May is also to be held by Dungarvan Town Council.

Plane Forced To Land In Ballinacourty Cornfield

A two-seater Piper Super Cub light aircraft was forced to make an emergency landing in a cornfield outside Dungarvan, after weather conditions deteriorated significantly on Thursday afternoon.

The Swiss pilot, Victor Bosshard and his wife Erica, were part of an organisation of aviation enthusiasts. As part of an event organised by the group, a convoy of twenty-seven planes took off at different times from Kerry Regional Airport on Thursday last. But, weather conditions and poor visibility forced the convoy of planes to split up. Some of the planes turned back and landed in Kerry and Shannon while others continued on to Cork Airport and Waterford Regional Airport.

The Swiss pilot, who was trying to maintain his route by following the coast along Cork and Waterford, was destined for Havordford West in Wales. But, he was forced into making an emergency landing in a cornfield in Ballinclamper near Clonea, when it was clear that weather conditions were not about to clear. Gardai in Dungarvan attended the scene throughout the day.

€259,000 To Fund New Fire Appliances

Mr. Martin Cullen, TD., Minister for the Environment and Local Government has announced that he is giving sanction to Waterford County Council to purchase a new fire appliance for its fire service. A grant of over eur259,000 will be made available to the council to meet the full cost of the appliance.

Commenting on the funding, Minister Cullen said; "the provision of this funding enables Waterford County Council to continue to enhance and improve its fire services. Waterford County Council has demonstrated its commitment to the development of its fire and emergency services and as Minister with responsibility in this area, I am happy to support their efforts".

"The new appliance represents an important upgrading to the council's first response fleet with new modern appliances, something which will benefit the people of Waterford," Minister Cullen concluded.





A GREENHOUSE to most gardeners is a private place where plants are protected and rely on the gardener for their very exis-

Results in a greenhouse depend entirely on the skill of the gardener rather than the evils of the soil types and weather in the outside world

If you are going to buy a greenhouse to cultivate your plants, then the best advice you will get from any experienced gardener is to buy a greenhouse book on how to grow plants, what temperatures to keep them at and the pitfalls to avoid. But don't be fooled into thinking a greenhouse reduces the amount of work. Constant attention is needed at most times of the year, adjusting watering systems, allowing for ventilation and coping with temperature changes.

Do not be fooled by claims from manufacturers that greenhouses will pay for themselves within a year. A greenhouse fitted with staging will cost you £300 a year and a further £100 a year to keep the temperature at a minimum of 42'- 45'F during an average winter.

Tomatoes are a favourite crop to grow in a greenhouse, as are strawberries, turnips and pota-The group classified as green-

house plants includes Azalea, Cineraria, Cyclamen, Freesia and Primula, for starters. Start off with easy plants and

work your way up. There are no strict rules about what to grow, but try not to grow too varied a mixture.

Ask your local garden centre manager for advice on which plants to start with. As a beginner, it pays to take all the advice you can get.

THIS WEEK IN THE **GARDEN**

SOW SCHIZANTHUS FOR SPRING FLOWERING

Sow now in order to have really large schizanthus for spring decorations in the greenhouse or conservatory. Sow seeds thinly in well drained seed boxes, using a seed compost and germinate in a frame. The cooler the conditions the better.

SOW WINTER SPINACH AND SPINACH BEET

Choose a sheltered place and make a sowing of prickly-seeded spinach to stand the winter. Sow the seed thinly in drills 2.5cm deep and 30cm apart.

You can make a sowing of spinach beet now for use in winter and spring. This useful variety of beetroot is grown solely for its leaves. used as a spinach substitute.

START TO GATHER MUSHROOMS FROM **OUTDOOR BEDS**

If you were able to make a mushroom bed in the open in July you should examine it now for the first mushrooms. Gather the 'buttons' (young mushrooms) as they form. The bed should continue well

MAKE NEW STRAWBERRY PLANTATIONS

Strawberry runners pegged down early last month should have made good roots and can be severed from their parent plant. A few days later, lift them carefully and plant them in new beds. Choose a good open position and soil that has been deeply dug and well manured. Plant 30cm apart in rows 60cm apart.

Pick and summer prune apples and pears

During this month and through September you should continue to pick apples and pears as they ripen. Continue to summer prune the trees but strive to complete the work by the end of the month.

TREAT VINES

Vines, indoors and out, will be in various stages of growth. Early vines from which you have gathered the crop should be ventilated freely and sprayed with water if there is any sign of red spider on

Here Jimmy would be the life and soul of the party, he would be in his glory belting out the words whether it was "Patsy Fagan" or "The Galway

Shawl" he gave it his all. He won many trophies over the years in talent competitions, his last seisúin was at the Lyre Heritage Centre in Mahonbridge on 9th July 2002.

Jimmy was a keen GAA supporter and followed with pride the progress of his sons Michael, John RIP, Jimmy and David over the years. He was an avid supporter of An Rinn but had a soft spot for the 'Green and Gold' of Kilrossanty. He was delighted to see Waterford winning the Munster Final but heartbroken that he was not able to attend the match.

He was caretaker and gravedigger at Ballinroad cemetery for forty-eight years and was never found wanting when it came to sharing respect for the dead and their families.

Jimmy was a wonderful husband and father. He loved the simple things in life and was at one with nature. He loved the outdoor life - tending to his animals when he had them, cutting turf and walking with his dog and often spoke of the wonders of nature over the different seasons of the year.

He always enjoyed the annual trip to Tallow Horse Fair with his friend Hiker and many tales have been told of those days and maybe many are best left untold.

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MUCKING IN - IRISH GARDENERS GET COMPOSTING

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A survey of visitors to the recent Garden Heaven Show in Dublin, has revealed that

79% of gardeners compost their organic kitchen and garden waste. The survey also revealed that the majority of people are using compost bins purchased from their local authority to recycle their waste.

The Irish Peatland Conservation Council (IPCC) conducted the survey as part of their Peat-free Garden Campaign. IPCC_s Conservation Officer, Noreen Mc Loughlin states that "the outcome of the Garden Heaven Show survey is very encouraging, as it demonstrates that the public are becoming more conscious of the waste that they generate. This seems to be especially true for gardeners"

IPCC hope that the increasing number of people composting their organic waste, will mean a significant reduction in the use of moss peat in the garden. Home-made compost is a far superior gardening product to peat - and its free! Garden compost improves the ability of the soil to retain water, it can be used as a mulch to cut down on weeding and it can be added to the soil to improve structure. Peat has been used by gardeners for soil improving and mulching for years. "It has been a tragic waste and has caused immense damage to our wild boglands", says Noreen McLoughlin.

Compost bins can be purchased at a subsidised rate from local authorities. Once a household starts to compost, they will quickly see the effect on the amount of rubbish in the dustbin - a reminder that they are making a substantial contribution to wildlife survival. It_s easy to get started - just collect 1 bucket of fresh weeds, 1 bucket of shrub clippings or prunings, 1 bucket of dead heads, 2 buckets of grass clippings and 1 bucket of kitchen scraps. Mix well, place it in the bin and in 6 months time you will have wonderful garden compost to use.

OT RETTER TO



I read with interest comments attributed to County Councillor Tom Higgins in a recent edition of the Dungarvan Leader. He expressed concerns that the failure of the new Dungarvan & Environs Study Plan to rezone areas of Ballinacourty as residential would adversely affect the development of the area. While Councillor Higgins is obviously entitled to his views I feel he has to be challenged on some of the assertions he makes. Some of the comments attributed to him only muddy the water on what should be a reasoned debate on how Ballinacourty, Ballinroad, Clonea and Garranbane should develop over the next five years.

He reportedly said that failure to, rezone as residential, areas of Ballinacourty might sound the death knell for the local GAA club and school. The local club for the record is Abbeyside / Ballinacourty whose

grounds are located in Abbeyside and while it has many members from Ballinacourty, the area's zoning is largely irrelevant to the club's future development.

As regards the local school Garranbane is if anything I would think struggling to cope with the already increased population of the Ballinroad area that under the new draft proposals will increase further.

The Dungarvan & Environs Study Plan is available for inspection in the Planning Office in Dungarvan. It shows that the rezoning of additional land around Ballinroad will make it the main population centre for Ballinacourty Ballinroad / Clonea / Garranbane area. This from a

planning point of view makes sense as Ballinroad is an already established hub with supermarket, pub, church, parish hall, offices and leisure facilities catering for soccer, rugby and tennis.

The plan also shows that Clonea is envisaged as being a major tourist destination with large areas of land radiating from it zoned for Tourism Development. The future development of this area will provide the Planning Authorities with major challenges in the years to come when the need to develop will have to be sensitively balanced with the need to preserve the existing attraction of the area particularly the coastline that is to be designated 'visually vul-

nerable' Councillor Higgins expressed concerns about the future development of business in Ballinacourty if no land is rezoned residential. There are effectively only two main business occupations in Ballinacourty i.e. tourism and farming and both are well catered for under the proposals. Ballinacourty has always been an agricultural area and the importance of this activity is reflected in the fact that most of the townland will continue to be zoned agricultural. This zoning complements the adjoining Tourism zoning as the reason that most people visit Ballinacourty and Clonea is because of it's relatively unspoilt rural nature. There is no logical reason to rezone land in Ballinacourty as residential as it is almost entirely devoid of residential services e.g. shops, church, school etc or for that matter any recognized population centre. There is currently and will continue to be plenty of scope for 'one-off' houses for local people under agricultural zoning as is evidenced by the substantial

number of houses that have been built there in the last decade. I can see no evidence however of a need for the housing estates that residential zoning would imply i.e. estates of between 10 and 15 houses per acre (including 10% social housing & 10% affordable housing) completew with suburban roads, footpaths and street

I disagree with the contention that Ballinacourty exists as a separate entity. It is part of the community that includes Ballinroad, Garranbane and Clonea in the hinterland of Dungarvan. The rezoning of land in Ballinacourty as residential would do nothing to enhance that community but rather encourage an uneconomical provision of suburban services for a commuting population in a rural area that is miles distant from the nearest town centre. Residential zoning would in my view copper-fasten Ballinacourty's main role into the future as a dormitory suburb of Dungarvan. Is that what the people of Ballinacourty, Dungarvan or our many tourist visitors want?

I am sure there are many view divergent to my own and it is up to every individual who feels strongly on the issue to follow one of two courses - let their Councillor know their views or write to the Planning Department in Dungarvan and make a submission. In that way everyone can have a say in how our community develops.

Re-seeding costs at least 220 per acre (545 per ha.) It is therefore very important that it is properly planned and carried out to ensure success and maximum benefit.

Autumn Grass

It is important following the difficult year to ensure a good supply of quality autumn grass to take advantage of below average animal performance to date and to extend grazing for as long as possible to delay start of indoor feed-

Poorly grazed fields up to now may need to be topped to remove dead material and ensure a better quality re-growth. Building up grass cover from August can be achieved by increasing rotation length with introduction of aftergrass, nitrogen use and sale of cattle.

Nitrogen & Phosphate

Given the difficult year to date and delayed silage / hay cutting the response to nitrogen should be better than normal as conditions improve. Best response will be achieved in fields cut for hay or silage and where there is a fair amount of perennial ryegrass. The application of some phosphate will help boost root development which is particularly important on soils that have suffered from waterlogging and / or compaction. Pasture sward can be used to

CALLS ON CO-OPS TO **HOLD JULY MILK** PRICE IN SERIES OF MILK PRICE MEETINGS

President John Dillon today recently announced that the IFA would be running a series of four milk price meetings starting next week in advance of the August co-op board meetings which are to decide on July milk prices.

"Farmers have taken a huge cut in their family incomes, and as the first signs of recovery on the internal EU market for feed-quality SMP are showing, co-ops must help farmers cope with an extremely difficult year by holding milk prices for the month of July," the IFA leader said.

Announcing the details of the meetings currently being organised by the National Dairy Committee, Chairman Michael Murphy said the venues and dates would be as fol-

Michael Murphy urged all dairy farmers to attend the meetings en masse. "The Dairy Income Crisis of 2002 has not gone away. Although most of the peak milk has now been produced, the cost-price squeeze has cost the average dairy farmer 10,000 this year. This is a huge income loss, one which will not only affect the ability of the farm business to meet financial commitments, but also bite into the living expenses of the family," he said.

"Farmers have taken the brunt of the pain due to the downturn in dairy markets, but now that the early signs of recovery in EU commodity prices are starting to show, it is absolutely critical that co-ops would share some of that pain and hold July milk prices," he concluded.

GRAIN GROWERS PROTEST AT INDUSTRY FORUM

DILLON SAYS PRICES ARE €20/T BELOW COST OF PRODUCTION

IFA President John Dillon has accused two of the main grain importers R & H Hall, which is owned by IAWS, and Comex McKinnon of conspiring with some of the major feed compounders to force down the price of native Irish grain by €20 per tonne this harvest, which will put cereal growers out of business.

The President said "R & H Hall and Comex McKinnon are effectively acting as an extended arm of the major feed compound mills, sourcing cheap grain, whether it is native or imported. In the past 12 months, they have imported over 500,000 tonnes of grain".

Mr. Dillon was addressing an IFA protest by grain growers at a meeting in Dublin of the Cereals Association of Ireland Pre Harvest Forum, which includes all major players in the Irish grain industry.

"Irish grain prices are being sacrificed so that these companies can capture a higher share of the valuable protein feed market. Imported grain is being brought into the country at critical times, deliberately closing off market outlets for native Irish grain, with the objective of driving down prices to native growers".

Mr. Dillon said "grain farmers and merchants are being forced to discount their prices substantially if they want to move dried grain. The major compounders and importers are acting in unison and are abusing their dominant position in the marketplace. The result is that farmers are being forced to sell grain at a price substantially below the cost of production. Independent surveys have shown that it costs in the region of €95 to €105 to produce a tonne of wheat and €100 to €105 to produce barley excluding depreciation and the cost of conacre".

Concluding, the President said "the trade's effort to set a price of €82.50 per tonne for green barley will force many cereal growers out of business as up to 40% of the land being farmed is conacre. IFA will not stand idly by and watch an important native industry go down the tubes, enabling major corporations to hold Irish farmers to ransom over animal feed prices. If cereal farmers are forced out of business, this will have major ramifications for the pig and poultry industry and lead to its rapid demise".

LOCAL HISTORY

The fertilising of tillage ground was agricultural development that was introduced by the planters from England. In the local district and along the coast 'triskar' was used. This was simply seaweed but it also could mean a compost made of withered grass, weed, straw and even mud from the rivers. Marl, a clay containing carbonate of lime, which is an invaluable fertiliser, was also used where it could be quar-

Smith stated that one sixteenth of the land was cultivated in the county, yet the amount of corn produced was more than was needed by the people. Much butter was made but little cheese. This ancient Irish word for cheese was still used then - mulchan. Sailors going on long voyages, especially to the fishing grounds of Newfoundland, brought mulchan with them because butter could not remain fresh on the long voyage but the rough cheese could.

A favourite food was a mixture of oats and butter or oats and cheese for sailors, a diet that had been the food of the medievil Irish warrior. However, potatoes were rapidly becoming the principal food crop around Dungarvan as they were every where else in Ireland. The situation of the land by the seaside ensured early crops of new potatoes above all in Ballinacourty. (Ref: A history of Dungarvan, town and district by Patrick C. Power M.A., PhD)



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

ICMSA WELCOMES SLURRY SPREADING EXTENSION DATE

"Following on from our request, ICMSA welcomes the decision of the Minister for Agriculture and Food, Mr. Joe Walsh T.D., to again extend the date for spreading slurry under the old REPS scheme", said Mr. John O'Connor, Chairperson of ICMSA's Farm Services & Environment Committee.

"The Minister has delivered on his commitment to review the situation. This decision will provide all farmers participating in the old REPS scheme an opportunity to spread their slurry and catch up on the back-log of work due to the exceptional weather conditions," concluded Mr. O'Connor.

MID-TERM REVIEW WILL FURTHER DEPLETE SHEEP SECTOR

"The fact that the Ewe National Reserve now stands at 500,000 ewe quota clearly highlights the current problems in the sheep sector and the need for action to address the issues which have resulted in declining sheep farmer and sheep numbers", said Mr. Dermot Moynihan, Chairperson of ICMSA's Sheep Committee.

"The Mid-Term Review of CAP will do nothing to address the problems in the Sheep Sector.It is absurd that a Sheepmeat Reform was agreed last October with a new fixed ewe premium introduced and now, less than one year later, the EU Commission are proposing a totally new system of payment for sheep farmers with a 20 per cent cut", said Mr. Moynihan.

It is impossible for sheep farmers to plan with this uncertainty. While the reform of last autumn had many weak points, the new system proposed for sheep farmers is definitely worse. It will result in a further reduction in sheep numbers and farmers, and will cut sheep farmers direct supports by 20 per cent.

"The Minister for Agriculture & Food, Mr. Joe Walsh, TD, must fully protect the interests of the sheep sector at negotiations on the Mid-Term Review. The result must be an improved system of support and an improved income position," Mr. Moynihan concluded.



WATERFORD TAKE ON CLA Titanic Battle Croke Park On



After five weeks of anxious waiting since winning the Munster championship, the count-down has begun and now with just days to go, the entire county are keeping their fingers crossed that the team will again rise to the occasion and win a place in the first All Ireland since 1963.

For us, winning would fulfil a double purpose in that it recommenced training after the provincial final, because would also spell very sweet revenge for the results of our two meetings with the Banner county in 1998. Because of our recent record against Clare, most Waterford supporters would have preferred to have Galway as our opponents, as I wrote last week, but I understand that the panel are looking at the situation in a different light and are looking forward to the challenge and the opportunity of making a satisfactory adjustment in the record books as far as ourselves and Clare are concerned.

As the count down continues and the speculation about our prospects increases we look forward to the announcement of the line-out which will be named from the 20 -players who played in the Munster final, but which might see a few positional changes.

As might be expected in a situation such as ours at the moment, rumours about players will abound and in most cases

these are untrue. Most relate to players fitness and form. I have heard a few such rumours about certain members of the panel showing improved form and selectors hinting that so and so will replace so and so.

If there are to be a change, or changes they are not likely to come about as a result of the challenge games or training stints that the team has been involved in since they these type of activities and the form of players in them, are very unlikely to influence the experienced selectors.

We played Antrim in a tournament in Fraher field and this was nothing more than a stroll in the sun, but nevertheless a useful exercise. We had the full panel training in Croke Park and last week a challenge game against Munster under 21 champions Limerick that was splendidly contested before we came off winners on a 1-16 to 1-15 scoreline.

In my opinion the form displayed on these occasions, mean very little as far as the form of players are concerned.

Nothing counts like the championship and in the end it will all boil down to what happens on the day and how each team and each player performs during the 70 minutes of battle in Croke Park

GOOD RELATIONS

Clare's role in the awful things which happened in the re-

play of the 1998 Munster final made them unpopular with Waterford people everywhere but it was soon forgotten by the remainder of the counties.

Now a declaration by the Waterford county board chairman, P. S. O'Riain has put an end to any poor feelings that might have existed in our case when he said that what happened between the counties in 1998, is now past

history and relations between the counties are excellent. This is the way that it should be and we all hope that it will remain so.

OUR RECORD SINCE THEN

After that extraordinary Munster final Waterford went on to shock Galway in the All Ireland quarter final on the following Sunday and the magnitude of our first ever visit to Croke Park with that panel of players, left us in a state of overconfidence when we faced old rivals, Kilkenny in the semi-final. Here we fell down on the job and left the game behind us and to put the matter into perspective the result was an embarrassment, even though losing by just a single point.

Last year, Waterford hurled Limerick 'into the ground' and then for some extraordinary reason, we surrendered an eleven points lead and were knocked flat out of the Munster championship to the almost of our supporters in Cork.

JUSTIN McCARTHY MAKES

Having spent some months 'feeling his way' through the national league, Justin McCarthy whose impeccable track record at intercounty level as a player and coach, helped to bring about change by his different style of coaching. Adopting a policy of improving the skill aspect of team preparation, rather than the physical, he seemed to win the confidence of the panel at the crucial time before the commencement of the championships and he was given a fair amount of credit for our victory over his beloved county. Then came the Munster final against Munster and All Ireland champions Tipperary whose rating in the public mind was to a great extent reflected in the bookmakers odds of 1/4 as against 4/1 on Waterford.

A Year Of Shocks & More To Come?

In a season that so far, has thrown up more than the normal quota of shocks and surprises, the unexpected victory of Waterford in the Munster final will be viewed by some as being no less a surprise than the unexpected emergence of Clare as strong challengers for another All Ireland title. The arrival of the Banner county on the scene at such a late stage has opened up the speculation about a second very popular county having a chance of glory, come Septernber 8th.
