## Slow Progress Being Made Towards Fresh Glanbia Application

Obstacles and delays to the development of a multi-million euro shopping complex in the centre of Dungarvan, has led to a changed timeframe for the submission of a fresh planning application.

Billy Clancy, Managing

Director of developers Clancy Construction, confirmed to the 'Leader' on Monday last, that proposals for the site have virtually ground to a halt, with "slow progress to no progress" being made.

The announcement comes despite renewed confidence that the arrival of new pro-

posals for the 42-acre Glanbia site was imminent. An initial statement, made last June, said an application

would be lodged "in a matter of weeks" and was followed by pre-planning application

Mossie is one of five Waterford All Stars selected since the All Stars commenced in 1971. His career

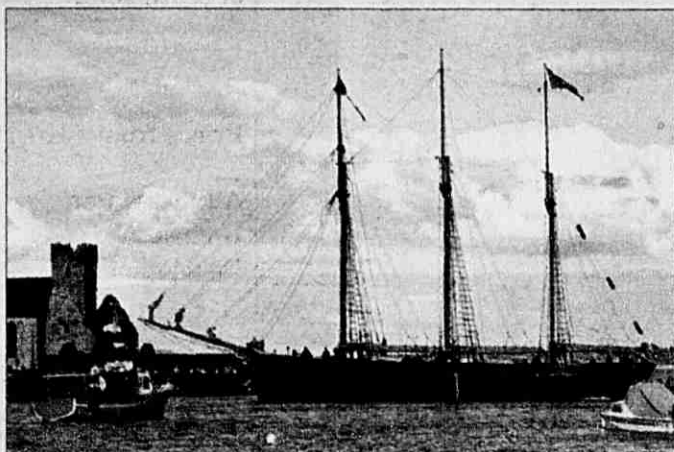
in the Blue/White of his county and the famed red jersey of Ballyduff Upper, endured many years of toiling for national and club honours at the highest levels.

## Slow Progress Being Made Towards Fresh Glanbia Application

talks held with Dungarvan Town Council. A provisional date was also scheduled for last Monday by the local authority for a special August meeting to discuss the application. However, this meeting did not take place, and as yet, no new date has been confirmed in response to the changed timetable.

Mr. Clancy said it was unlikely a new planning application would be submitted "in the immediate future, if the obstacles that have cropped up in the past, keep cropping up."

"The situation has reversed in so far as I would have hoped to have submitted the application by mid-July to early August. But, unfortunately due to a variety of reasons that has not happened."

Mr. Clancy said he was not willing to go into the reasons behind, or the nature of the delays, as the situation, cur-

rently, "is very delicate".

The eur440 million development has been beset with problems since it was first announced, and has led to "the crazy situation" of delays and obstacles which, Mr. Clancy said have faced the project ever since.

However, it is believed, that the complexity of the development and the conditions laid out by An Bord Pleanala for the overturning of planning permission have caused the developers new design team some difficulty.

After the original application was passed, the development team addressed a number of areas of concern to local bodies including the Chamber of Commerce. But, it is believed, a balance will have to be achieved between Bord Pleanala's conditions and the requirements of local groups before a revised application is lodged.

Labour Councillor, Billy

Kyne who has consistently supported the shopping complex development together with the Dungarvan Energy Project, said he feels the projects go-ahead is of critical importance to the further development of the town.

"I accept the right of individuals to object, but equally the interests of the silent majority are not being reflected in the legal challenges which have been made," Cllr. Kyne said.

He added that Dungarvan has always been an industrial town built on industrial jobs and earning power, and every effort must be made to replace those jobs lost in the closure of Waterford Foods.

"It is now going on three years since Waterford Foods closed with the loss of 300 well paid jobs", he added. "Standing still is no longer an option."

Initially granted planning permission by Dungarvan

Town Council two years ago, the development was stalled after objections from the grocery and the small retailers body RGDATA, An Taisce, the Friends of the Environment and a small number of local residents.

Months of deliberation, including a three day oral hearing held a year ago, further delayed the project, while Bord Pleanala's decision to overturn permission arrived a year after the local authority granted permission for its go-ahead.

Under the previous application, the development looked set to create 200 jobs in the first phase, with between 300 and 350 new jobs due to come on stream once the project was completed.

The project would incorporate a major shopping complex with an anchor tenant, a four screen Cineplex, restaurants, pub, nightclub and many other facilities.

# KIDS' STUFF

## HOW DOES THE MOON MAKE THE TIDE COME IN AND OUT?

TWICE every day up and down the shores of Ireland the tide comes in and goes out.

Every day the times of low and high tide change slightly. This is because the change in tide is caused by the Moon.

Much of the Earth's surface is covered by water — and as the Moon moves around the Earth, its gravity pulls the water towards it.

On the area of the earth's surface directly in line with the Moon, there is a high tide. The same thing is happening on the opposite side of the earth — so each day has two high tides each day. As the Moon moves on around the Earth, the high tide follows it.

If the Moon took exactly 24 hours to orbit the Earth the high tides would happen exactly the same times every day. But in fact the Moon takes a little more than 24 hours — so each day the high tides are slightly later.

### How the Moon creates tides



- A: The Moon has its own field of gravity and pulls a at the Earth as it moves around it.
- B: Water from the Earth's oceans is pulled towards the Moon, creating high tides.
- C: As the same time the high tides occur on the opposite side of the earth.

## WHY DOES THE MOON APPEAR TO GET BIGGER AND SMALLER?



THE SUN can shine on only one half — or "hemisphere" — of the Moon at any one time.

As the Moon orbits the Earth every month, the bit of this hemisphere that is visible from the Earth changes each day.

When there is a "New Moon" the Sun is lighting up a side that is turned away from the Earth — and so we cannot see it at all.

But where there is a "Full Moon" the side turned towards us is being fully lit by the Sun.

Every night between a New and a Full Moon we can see a little more of it. This is called "waxing", after an old word meaning to grow.

After it has been "Full", the Moon appears to become smaller or "waning" until it is completely invisible.

On the nights just before and after the Moon disappears we can see a thin crescent in the sky. Most people incorrectly call this the New Moon. But the New Moon is actually invisible to the naked

eye.

The only time a true New Moon can be seen is when it passes between the Sun and the Earth — casting a shadow which we can see during the day time. This is called an eclipse. Eclipses also happen because the Earth casts a long shadow in to space, away from the Sun.

If the Moon passes through this shadow, it grows dim. This can happen only at Full Moon, when it is opposite the Sun. As the Moon's orbit is tilted, it usually passes to one side of the shadow and eclipses like this do not happen often.

The Earth's shadow is not really black, since some sunlight filters into it, and the eclipsed Moon is often a deep copper colour.

A total Lunar eclipse can last for over one and a half hours, it the Moon passes through the centre of the Earth's shadow.

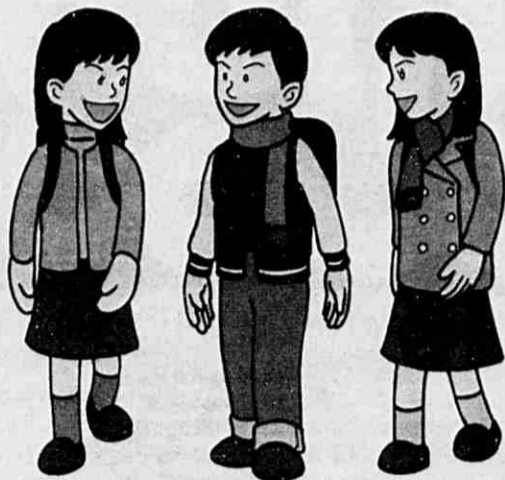

# COOKERY CORNER

## Chilli Chicken Loaf

TRY this as a delicious starter for your next dinner party.

**Preparation: 30 mins**  
**Cooking: 1 hour 15 mins**  
**Chilling: Overnight**

**Ingredients**  
(Serves 6)  
6 whole chicken breasts – boned, skinned and cut into 4

olive oil  
2 onions, sliced and separated into rings  
2 tomatoes, peeled and sliced  
3 tbsps pimento, chopped  
12 pepper corns  
1 tspn salt  
1 cup dry white wine

**Dressing:**  
50ml reserved liquid from chicken  
50ml olive oil  
25ml vinegar  
1 tspn tomato juice  
1/4 tspn salt  
pinch cayenne pepper

**Garnish:**  
fresh coriander  
black olives  
2 hard boiled eggs, sliced  
SET oven temperature to 160C. Brush a 7 1/2 cup

capacity loaf tin with olive oil. Arrange one third of the chicken in a layer on the bottom of the tin.

Place one third of the onion rings, tomato slices, pimento, peppercorns and salt over the chicken.

Repeat layering until all ingredients are used, ending with a layer of tomatoes.

Pour in the wine. Cover loaf tin with foil and cook in the preheated oven for one hour. Remove foil and cook a further 15 minutes. Cool the chicken quickly in the tin by standing in iced water. When cool, place in the refrigerator and chill over night.

Pour off excess liquid and reserve half cup for the dressing and return the chicken to the refrigerator until ready to serve. Make up the dressing by combining all the ingredients and chill until ready to serve.

To serve: Unmould chicken on to a platter.

Serve with dressing separately and garnish it with fresh coriander, black olives and sliced hard boiled egg.



## Dice with carrots and yoghurt

CARROTS and yoghurt may seem unlikely bedfellows but this dish makes an tasty change.

**Preparation: 15 mins**  
**Cooking: 20 mins**

**Ingredients**  
(Serves 4)  
500g carrots  
Salt and black pepper  
1 tbspn flour  
2 tbspn olive oil  
250 ml natural yogurt  
1 tbspn chopped mint

PEEL or scrape the carrots and wash them. Cut them, crossways into 1 cm thick slices.

utes until nearly tender. Drain in a colander, then spread carrots on kitchen paper to dry thoroughly.

Toss the carrots in seasoned flour, shaking off any surplus. Heat the oil in a heavy-based pan and fry the carrots over moderate heat until golden brown.

Season to taste with salt and ground black pepper. Put the yogurt in a separate pan over low heat, and let it warm through.

Do not let it reach boiling point or it will curdle.

Spoon the carrots into a hot serving dish, pour over the yogurt and sprinkle with mint.

## Damson apple tansy: a cool idea

THIS dessert can be prepared well ahead of the meal – indeed it needs to be! – therefore, it makes a good dinner party choice.

**Preparation: 15 mins**  
**Cooking: 40 mins**  
**Chilling: 1 hour**

**Ingredients**  
(Serves 4)  
125g damsons  
125g cooking apples  
50 g unsalted butter  
75g caster sugar  
2 egg yolks  
4 tbsps fresh bread crumbs  
125 ml double cream  
1 tbspn lemon juice  
WASH damsons. Peel and thinly slice the apples.

Melt butter in a saucepan with a little cold water. Cover and boil fruit over low heat until soft, stirring. Remove from heat and rub fruit through a coarse sieve. Return puree to pan and stir in sugar.

Take pan off heat and blend in beaten egg yolks and bread crumbs.

Stir over low heat until quite thick, then leave to cool.

Whisk the cream lightly and fold into the cooled puree. Sharpen to taste with lemon juice.

Spoon the mixture into serving glasses and chill for one hour.

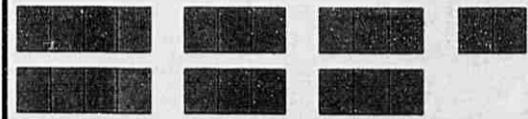

# Cool Season Cauliflowers

CAULIFLOWERS are a cool-season crop and do not usually grow well in areas with high summer temperatures.

But they are an ideal vegetable for the British climate. Several cultivars are frost hardy but cauliflowers may only be harvested all-year round in areas with frost-free winters.

Over-wintering cauliflowers need a sheltered situation outside and all types need a moisture retentive soil with medium nitrogen levels.

Grown as annuals or biennials, cauliflowers form an average head (also known as a curd) of about eight inches in diameter.

They are classified by the main season of use - usually winter, early summer or summer/autumn. Most types have creamy or white coloured curds but there are attractive, distinctively-flavoured types which have purple or green heads.

Success with cauliflowers depends heavily upon sowing the correct cultivar at the appropriate time. Plants should be allowed to develop with as few checks to their growth as possible. The main sowing times and

spacings are given in the chart below.

Cauliflowers are usually sown in seed trays, modules or a seedbed for transplanting although they may be sown in situ and thinned to the correct spacing. Generally the later the planting the larger the cauliflower will grow and the wider the spacing required.

Seed germinates best at a temperature of about 21 degrees centigrade (70 degrees F).

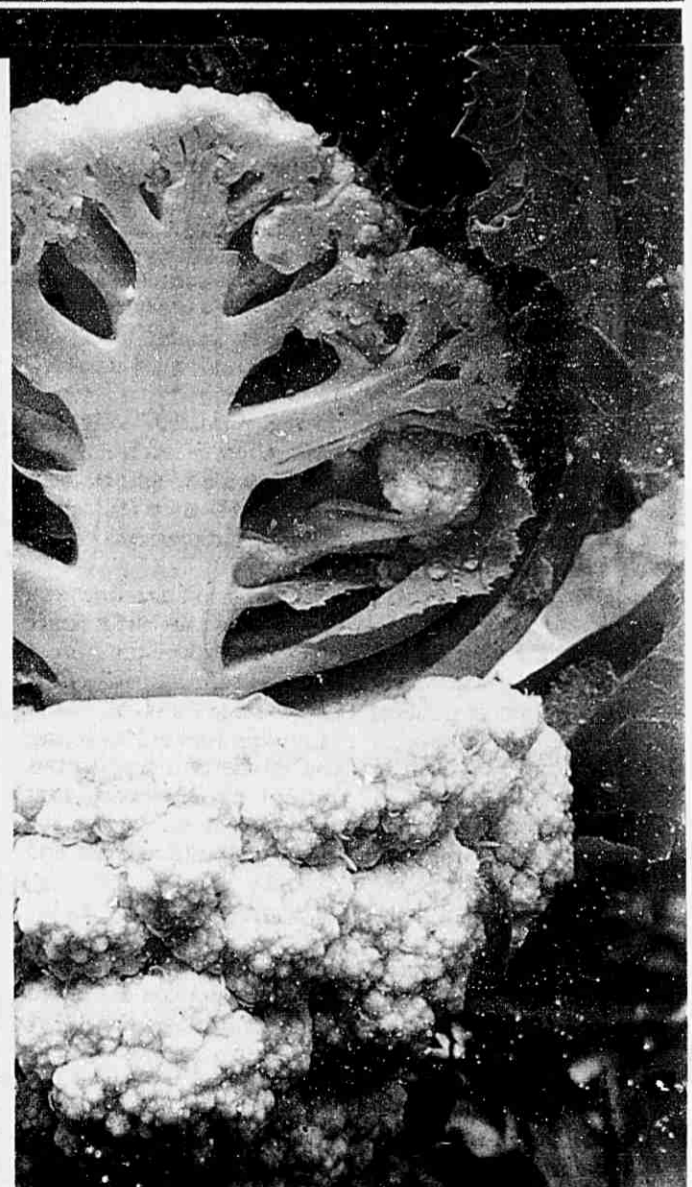
For an early summer crop the seeds should be sown in the autumn in modules or seed trays then seedlings should be reared in small pots. Pots should be put under a well-ventilated frame or under cloches for the winter. Harden off the seedlings before planting them out in the spring.

For a later crop sow indoors in gentle heat early spring and prick out into small pots. For summer/autumn and winter

groups sow the first batch indoors in seed trays or modules or in situ under frames.

Cauliflowers need regular water throughout the growing period. In dry conditions water at a rate of five gallons every square yard every two weeks.

The time from sowing to maturity varies from about 16 weeks for summer/autumn cauliflowers to 40 weeks for winter ones.



## This week in the garden

**Sow stocks for the greenhouse**  
Make sowings of both Beauty of Nice and Brompton stocks for flowering in pots in the greenhouse. The Beauty of Nice will bloom from Christmas until February or March, while the Brompton stocks will follow on in late spring.  
Sow very thinly in well drained trays filled with John Innes seed compost or equivalent and germinate in a frame, shading until the seedlings appear. Prick off or pot the seedlings separately as soon as they have two true leaves each.

**Pot freesias for early flowering**  
Provided the corms are ripened, the earlier freesias can be potted the better. The beginning of August is usually about as soon as you can buy the corms, so if you want a supply of flowers for Christmas pot up some now in 13cm pots. You can place six corms in one pot. Sow in a peat-based compost. Bury the corms 2.5cm deep and stand the pots in a frame. Water moderately and shade from direct sunlight.

# ENVIRONMENT TODAY

## Irish Building Industry is throwing 1.5 Billion Down the Drain

"The Construction Industry throws away over one and a half billion euro into Irish landfills every year," so said Minister for the Environment and Local Government, Mr. Martin Cullen, TD, at the launch in June of the National Construction and Demolition Waste Council. In Co. Waterford, builders are paying up to six times more for disposal because they are not sorting the waste that arises on building and demolition sites. The cost per tonne for uncontaminated clay and rubble is €25 because it can be reused as cover for our landfills, whereas the cost per tonne of unsegregated waste, which has to be landfilled, is €150.

Construction and Demolition waste accounts for about 18% of Ireland's waste arisings, excluding agricultural waste. Proper management of this waste stream will allow the construction industry to make considerable savings on disposal costs and contribute to a more environmentally sustainable waste management regime. The landfills at Dungarvan and Tramore have separate collection areas for uncontaminated clay, topsoil and rubble.

There are also a number of private companies that specialise in recycling construction and demolition waste.

Minister Cullen stated that reaching high levels of C&D waste recycling would be a win/win situation. "This will be a win for the preservation of valuable landfill space, a win for the environment if we can relieve the pressure on extraction of virgin aggregates, a win for the construction industry in the form of lower costs and a win for the consumer in terms of cost savings passed on".

# SUMMER CONCERTS IN LISMORE CATHEDRAL

Before the end of this month two more concerts will take place in St. Carthage's Cathedral, Lismore. An "Evening Music" on Thursday 22nd August will feature William Beare, baritone, and Jan Van Putten, organ. The Very Revd. Beare is Dean of Lismore and Dr. Jan Van Putten is Organist and Choirmaster of Lismore Cathedral. The concert will open with a prelude for organ by the Baroque composer Dietrich Buxtehude. The other organ works include three choral preludes by J.S. Bach, two short pieces based on old Irish tunes by Charles Villiers Stanford and Milonga del Angel by the Argentinian composer Astor Piazzolla. Piazzolla never composed for organ as such, but this work sounds very well on a keyboard instrument. William Beare will sing music by Purcell, Mendelssohn oratorio's Elijah and St. Paul and three songs by Stanford.

Stanford's music receives much attention this Autumn; he was born in Dublin on 30th September 1852, just 150 years ago. (This anniversary will also be reflected in the choice of choral and organ music in the services in Lismore Cathedral from 29th September when the Cathedral choir resumes its activities).

On Thursday 29th August the Cathedral will host The Girls and The Gentlemen of the Choir of Chester Cathedral, as part of their visit to Ireland. The presence of girls is still a kind of novelty in Anglican Cathedral Choirs, during centuries the exclusive domain of the male sex. The inclusion of girls in cathedral choirs has stimulated musicians to compose sacred music for female voices and there is no doubt that the admission to both concerts is free. Financial support has been provided from the Arts Grants Fund 2002 by Waterford County Council. A collection will be held in aid of the Cathedral Restoration Funds. Both concerts start at 8pm.

## DISABILITY AWARENESS

### Ankylosing Spondylitis

#### What is Ankylosing Spondylitis?

Ankylosing means fusing together. Spondylitis indicates inflammation of the vertebrae. Ankylosing Spondylitis is a painful, progressive, rheumatic disability, it mainly affects the spine, but it can also affect other joints, tendons and ligaments. Inflammation occurs at the site where certain ligaments or tendons attach to bone (entheses). This is followed by some erosion of bone at the site of the attachment (enthesopathy). As the inflammation subsides, a healing process takes place and new bone develops. Movement becomes restricted where bone replaces the elastic tissue of ligaments or tendons. Repetition of this inflammatory process leads to further bone formation and the individual bones, which make up the backbone, the vertebrae, can fuse together. The pelvis is commonly affected first. The lower back, chest wall and neck may also become involved at different times.

#### What are the symptoms of AS?

The symptoms of AS include the following:

- Σ Joint Pain (usually beginning in the lower end of the spine in a joint known as the sacroiliac joint) the pain is gradual over weeks or months, rather than hours or days
- Σ Stiffness in the spine – especially early in the morning
- Σ Persistent pain for more than three months
- Σ Feeling better after exercise, and feeling worse after rest
- Σ Weight loss, especially in the early stages
- Σ Fatigue
- Σ Feeling feverish and experiencing night sweats

AS can affect other joints in the body causing pain and swelling in the hips, knees and ankles. AS is an unpredictable disability and is subject to remission and relapse.

The cause of AS is not known, but research into the disability has shown that over 90% of people with the disability all share the same genetic cell marker – Human Leucocyte Antigen B27 (HLA-B27). However, not every person possessing this gene will develop the condition.

What is the Treatment and Outlook for Ankylosing Spondylitis? The main objectives of treatment are to relieve pain and to limit the extent of joint damage thereby maintaining the maximum level of movement in affected joints. Most people with AS take non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, these reduce the inflammation and relieve pain and stiffness. Exercise is very important, and adequate back support when sitting down. AS usually affects people between the ages of 15 and 35, and it usually affects men. It is not possible to prevent AS, but early diagnosis can limit the extent of joint damage, and can limit the extent of permanent disability.

## TIDY TOWNS JUDGING HOTS UP

The second round of Tidy Towns judging will take place in towns, villages and urban centres throughout the country during August. A total of 706 towns and villages have entered the Tidy Towns competition this year and up to 130 centres will be revisited by judges this month to decide national and county awards.

Overall prize money for 2002 is set at 128,680, a 4% increase on last year, with the National Prize set at 13,000. Over 180 individual national and county prizes will be awarded to towns and villages this year. The Competition is again sponsored by SuperValu supermarkets and is organised by the Department of the Environment and Local Government.

The criteria used by the national judges to apportion marks are based on six areas of activity, with a total of 300 marks available. Judging includes an evaluation of the built environment, landscaping and wildlife, as well as litter control and tidiness and the overall development approach for the area. In 2001 Westport, County Mayo, won the Tidiest Small Town Category, while Castletown in County Laois won the Tidiest Village award,

just one mark behind the overall winner. Ennis in County Clare took the title of Tidiest Large Town, with Westport, County Mayo taking the overall National Tidy Towns title on 263 marks.

This year's winners will be announced on Monday 9th September by Mr. Pat the Cope Gallagher TD, Minister of State at the Department of the Environment and Local Government and Mr. Michael Nason, Managing Director of SuperValu, at a reception in Dublin Castle. Regional presentation of awards will take place throughout October and November.

Tidy Towns was first launched in 1958 and Glenties, County Donegal, took the first National title. Since then 30 different centres have won the title Ireland's Tidiest Town. Every year thousands of volunteers take part in Tidy Towns and hundreds of thousands of euro is invested in environmental management work by public, private and commercial interests. Main sponsors SuperValu contribute approximately 900,000 annually, both to support the overall competition management and promotion, and through the locally owned SuperValu outlets that are involved with local Tidy Towns committees.



The Science of Farming and Food

### Cattle

#### Finishing Cattle on Autumn Grass

Performance of finishing cattle on autumn grass without concentrates is poor even in situations when grass supply is plentiful. Feeding meals can ensure earlier finish and can also improve conformation score by up to 0.5 units and gives a good financial margin in most situations.

Earlier finishing off grass in autumn offers many advantages: sale before 30 months at better selling price; avoiding an expensive indoor finishing period which is not justified in the absence of additional premium or a higher selling price; improved extensification prospects with earlier sale of animals especially if over two years and greater availability of autumn grass for other stock which can delay the onset of expensive indoor feeding.

#### Target Gain

ADG should be approximately 1.0 kg / day. Grange trials over 90 days from mid August achieved 1 kg ADG where grass was scarce with 5 kg concentrates or with 2.5 kg concentrates where grass was plentiful. A plentiful grass supply plus 5 kg concentrates achieved 1.1 kg ADG while ad lib concentrates (12.5 kg to 635 kg bullocks) achieved 1.4 kg ADG. Performance on steers in autumn 2002 could be expected to exceed above gains where performance to date was poor and / or where the feeding period is shorter (60 days).

#### Economics and Feed Conversion Efficiency

Assuming a beef price of €2.38 / kg and a feed cost of €170 / t then a FCE of 14 kg concentrate per kg carcass gain or better is required to cover meal costs excluding any conformation advantage to meal fed animals – improved grading from O to R could be worth €30 per head for animals that would otherwise be borderline R's.

#### FCE Grange Trials

##### Scarce Grass

- 11.2 kg concentrate per kg carcass gain @ 5kg/head/day.

##### Adequate Grass

- 9.6 kg concentrate per kg carcass gain @ 2.5kg/head/day.
- 12.3 kg concentrate per kg carcass gain @ 5kg/head/day.

##### Ad lib concentrate

- 15.5 kg concentrate per kg carcass gain @ 12.5kg/head/day

#### Recommendation

Feed 2.5 kg /head with adequate grass or 5 kg if grass is scarce. Exceeding 2.5 kg meals when grass supply and quality are adequate or the feeding of ad lib meals will not be justified unless meals are very cheap (< €150 / t) or beef selling price is significantly higher or that it is imperative to ensure earlier finish to achieve other cost savings or extra extensification payments.

#### Tillage

##### Harvest Update

With most of the winter barley harvest complete, yields and quality are hugely variable. The early onset of Ramularia blotching with subsequent loss of green leaf coupled to the lack adequate of sunshine for grain filling had a definite effect in reducing grain yield from crops that had enormous potential. While yields are back at least 1.25 t/ha (0.5 t/ac), straw yield and price are providing something of a compensation. While it is generally accepted that yields will be back across all the cereal crops this harvest, the total grain harvest is expected to equal last year's production of just over 2 million tonnes. This will be brought about primarily by an estimated increase of 20,000 ha in the total cereal area planted and an increase of 35,000 ha in the area of winter wheat sown.

#### Soil Analysis Campaign

Growing crops without a soil test is like driving in the dark without lights.

Teagasc Johnstown Castle indicates that up to 40% of soils are seriously deficient in lime for tillage. Over 1/3 soils are deficient in the trace elements, copper, zinc or manganese. P and K levels are still at seriously low levels in about 1/4 of soils but a further 1/4 of soils have high levels of P and K and will grow grain crops without added P or K for a number of years.

An S4 soil test provides a scientific basis for successful and profitable tillage farming.

## IFA NEWS

### MINISTER WALSH MUST SUSPEND DAIRY HERD CERTIFICATION DEADLINE — MURPHY

IFA National Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy has called on Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to suspend the 31st December 2002 deadline for signature of Dairy Herd Certificates. He said the onus was then on the Minister to make sure that this scheme would be run smoothly, and that every farmer would have the opportunity to have their Cert signed at the same time as their next annual TB herd test.

"The scheme is currently deadlocked, and no farmer can get a Certificate signed, due to the lack of co-operation by the vets. The Minister cannot allow the dairy industry to be held ransom," Michael Murphy said.

"The IFA Dairy Committee has always held the view that, where farmers have done their homework by filling in eartag numbers in the appropriate form, and by having all legally required paperwork up to date and available for inspection on the farm, having the vet sign the Cert at the same time as he/she does the annual TB test makes most economic sense, and involves minimal additional work," he added.

"Common sense must prevail. Let us not forget that, after initial teething difficulties, the scheme ran reasonably smoothly three years ago. There is absolutely no reason why it would not operate just as simply this time around," he concluded.

### IFA DISSATISFIED WITH COMMISSION'S DECISION TO TURN REQUEST FOR DEROGATION ON SET-ASIDE LAND USE

Waterford IFA Co. Chairman, Harry Gray has expressed extreme dissatisfaction at the Commission's decision to turn down IFA's request to allow set-aside land to be used for grazing or silage.

Mr. Gray said "IFA had sought this derogation to allow for the early use of set-aside in order to help alleviate problems caused by the extreme wet weather conditions over the last two and a half months. This concession had no cost implications for the EU and I am surprised and disappointed at their decision. The Commission's claim that because Austria's request had been turned down, they could not grant this concession to Ireland".

The Waterford Co. Chairman said: "The Austrian situation was completely different to Ireland's. They were suffering from a drought. The extreme cold and wet weather conditions prevailing in Ireland had implications for animal welfare and the granting of a derogation would have went some way towards alleviating this".

### UNWORKABLE SHEEP REGISTER RETURNED TO DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE IN IFA PROTEST

IFA President John Dillon together with Waterford IFA Sheep Committee Chairman,

Michael Looby returned their sheep registers to the Department of Agriculture in Dublin recently in protest at what was described as a totally unreasonable and unworkable system.

In a strong and defiant action by the IFA President and Sheep Committee members, John Dillon said the sheep register and reconciliation requirements are an unnecessarily complex, bureaucratic nightmare imposed on Irish sheep farmers. He said "IFA is calling on the Agriculture Minister Joe Walsh and his Department to undertake a full review of this unworkable system and put in place a practical alternative."

Mr Dillon said IFA understand and accept the need for identification and traceability in the sheep sector. However he said the system must be practical and simple to operate at farm level and effective and transparent at factory and consumer level. He said the current complex system imposed by the Department of Agriculture without consultation does not meet these requirements.

Mr Dillon said the IFA Sheep Committee were returning their sheep registers to the Department of Agriculture today in a strong protest on behalf of the country's 40,000 flock owners. He said the current registration and reconciliation system is so complex and bureaucratic that it is next to impossible for farmers to comply with at a practical farm level.

Mr Dillon said the Department of Agriculture would have to rethink and redesign the sheep

identification and registration system with full consultation.

### SHANAHAN CALLS FOR MORATORIUM ON DAMAGING GRAIN IMPORTS

Waterford IFA Grain Committee Chairman Bill Shanahan has called for a moratorium on grain imports and preference to be given to assured Irish grain at a meeting between IFA and members of the Irish Grain and Feed Association in Abbeyleix on Tuesday, 6th August, 2002.

Mr. Shanahan said "we will be self sufficient in supplies of feed wheat for the coming season and there will be no need for imports. The industry should adopt a voluntary moratorium on the importation of feed wheat until such time as the market necessitates it".

The Waterford Grain Chairman said "IFA has proposed a seven point strategic plan to ensure the survival of our native grain industry:

1. Moratorium on grain imports combined with the orderly marketing of native grain.
2. A minimum price of 100 and 106 / tonne for green barley and wheat respectively, to cover the cost of production.
3. All imported grain must be assured and traceable to the farm of origin.
4. Preference to be given by feed compounders to assured Irish grain.
5. An industry-wide approach taken to the promotion of assured Irish feed, utilizing the maximum inclusion of native Irish grain.

## FARMING IN CHAOS UNDER CURRENT CAP

ICSA president Charlie Reilly has said that Irish farming is in chaos under the current CAP and the industry needs to embark on major change. According to Mr Reilly, "The current system whereby a farmer receives 12,000 euro in direct payments in order to achieve an income of 10,000 euro is unsustainable".

"The Fischler proposals will result in slightly lower output and increased prices and this is what farmers need. Of course like any proposals there are some aspects of the mid-term review, which needs amendment. ICSA is totally opposed to the 20% modulation. ICSA is proposing that no modulation takes place from farmers earning below the average industrial wage. ICSA believes the 300,000 euro threshold should be reduced to 100,000 euro.

ICSA wants to see the positive aspects of the proposals debated rather than dismissed out of hand. There is significant support on the ground for the proposals as indicated by a recent survey of 600 ICSA members, which showed that 74% of farmers were in favour of the Fischler

## FODDER AID SCHEME REQUIRED

At a meeting in Longford organised by ICMSA and attended by representatives of the dairy and livestock Co-ops in the northern part of the country, it was agreed that a meaningful targeted scheme of financial aid to purchase concentrate feed was needed to avoid disaster over the coming winter and spring months.

Mr. Pat O'Rourke, President of ICMSA said: "The assessment of the weather crisis by the Co-ops is that it is unprecedented in its severity - particularly on wetter land. Based on the outcome of this meeting, ICMSA will be seeking Government action and support for an animal fodder scheme. In addition, there is a need for the banks to restructure loans and to provide longer term finance to allow farmers to farm their way out of difficulties".

The meeting was particularly concerned in relation to growing stress on individual farmers and said that farmers should not feel isolated in their difficulties and that help was available from many sources including professional help from their local Health Board.

"Finally, that farm families should make use of the Farm Assist Scheme, which was modified recently based on ICMSA proposals", concluded Mr. O'Rourke.

## In Appreciation Of William Sherwood Brameld

### AN OFFICER AND A GENTLEMAN

On Wednesday evening July 31st as darkness fell on another summer, the unexpected death at his home at Rockview of Major William Sherwood Brameld more affectionately known to us all as Bill, filled all our hearts with an Autumn chill. Suddenly a man so full of life and ambition, with his indomitable spirit and determination, yet gently and kind with a unique sense of humour was gone from our mist, and he is so dearly missed.

On Saturday morning the sun shone down, those gathered in the little cemetery at St. Paul's Church in Ardmore, were witnessing the end of a great era. All so well aware that we had indeed lost someone very special indeed. Earlier in the Church Rev. Susan Watterson led the congregation in a final and very fitting celebration of Bill's life.

The words of beautiful hymn 'Through all the changing scenes of life' filled the air as Bill's remains were received in to the Church. Bill's wife and best friend Elsa and son Peter along with all Bill's friends and neighbours welcomed. The readings and gospel were shared by Bill's wife Elsa and family friend George Perks. During the ceremony Capt. Tom Morgan paid a beautiful tribute to his long friend Bill whom he first met in 1945 in Husum, North Germany B.A.O.R. where they had served in different regiments through the 1939/1945 World War 2, when Bill was posted to Captain Morgan's regiments. A most humble and unassuming gentleman Bill never spoke much of his accomplishments. Bill was a courageous and gallant officer. Beneath that gentle exterior there was a steely resolve which led his men through some of the bloodiest battles in the War. He served all through the War with North-Thumberland Hussars Anti-Tank regiment. They were part of the famous armoured division - The Desert Rats. In action in the Desert War he was wounded during the siege of Torbay and was awarded the M.C. (Military Cross). He served in the invasion of Sicily and Italy before being transferred to Normandy in France, where he was awarded the D.O.S. for leadership and gallantry in action. While he was stationed in Husum he met his wife Elsa. Elsa has experienced a cruel war. Her first husband, a distinguished surgeon was executed at their home by the German Gestapo as an Anti Nazi sympathiser, leaving her alone to raise four young boys. This marked the beginning of a life of love and friendship which continued right up to the time of Bill's death on Wednesday evening. Capt. Morgan went on the recall the resignation of his own commission and travelling to Ireland from Germany previously Tom and his wife Elsie had been in Ireland on holiday with an old army friend and decided to settle in Lismore. At this time Bill took on a regular commission, which would mean he could retire in 1959. From their first visit to Ireland, Bill and Elsa, like the Morgan's instantly fell in love with Ireland in 1959 with the help of the Morgan's, Bill and Elsa purchased their dearly loved home 'Rockview' and to complete their dream some horses were bought. Bill and Elsa spent many enjoyable years of hunting with the West Waterford hunt, and made many life long friendships, while still returning to Germany for seasonal breaks and to spend some time with their family there. Never a man to raise his voice in anger or to utter a discouraging or cruel word, Bill was truly one of nature's gentlemen and one of the finest men ever to hold the rank of major.

To his best friend and wife Elsa, with whom he shared 57 years of love and friendship, sons Uwe, Dieter, Peter and Berti, his brother Herbert, all his family and friends in England and Germany we tender our deepest and heart felt sympathy.

"Nothing is so strong as gentleness. Nothing is so gentle as real strength" Love is eternal.

### KATHLEEN AND MAY

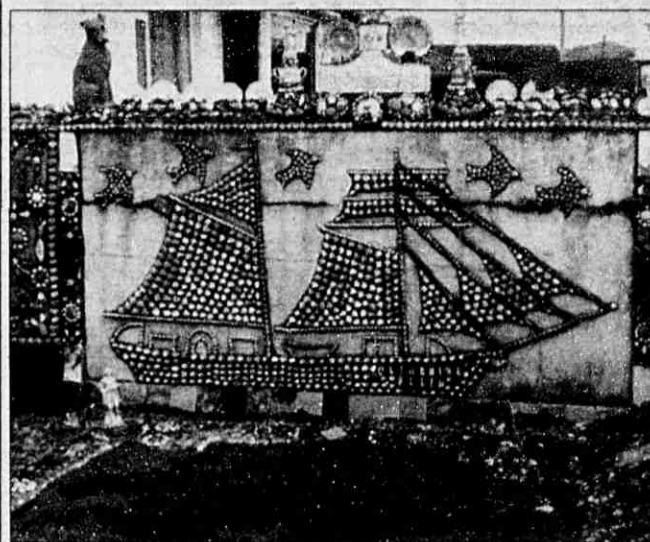
The three masted schooner berthed in Dungarvan Harbour from Friday to Sunday attracted large numbers of visitors.

#### AN IMPORTANT ATTRACTION FOR TOURIST'S LOCALLY

Lot's of rain and no sunshine so not a good year for tourism. However, walking in the carpark of Clonea Strand Hotel at night helps one realise that the Hotel with its leisure - centre facilities, bowling alley and top class restaurants and bars is attracting visitors. The car registration numbers informs one that there are lots of people from Dublin, Kildare, Wicklow and Meath staying there.

Dan Casey, proprietor of Clonea Caravan Park states that May and June were a disaster. July and August showed an improvement but numbers are well down on other years. Heavy showers of rain are a major difficulty in a camping and caravan park as the rainwater is inclined to stay on the surface.

### LOCAL HISTORY LANDS AND GARDENS

In 1760 some land and properties locally were surveyed, a map of the town and environs was prepared and the lessors of the property were listed. The owners of the estate were Sir Patrick Bellew and Mary, his wife, John Donnelan with Mabel his wife and also Mary and Honor, the co-heirs of Matthew and John Hore both deceased. It is stated that these lands were exclusive of other lands that were in dispute at that time. Hence what is in this document is a partial account of property in and around Dungarvan. For example, the Burgery is not mentioned at all. However, the map and the list of lessors gives the document a special worth.

The names of the lessors of these lots of garden and land provide the first list of people from Dungarvan town and immediate district who worked the land, even in small gardens, that is still in existence. That is another important aspect of the list that accompanies the map. It should be remembered that in these days people living in towns grew their own food and had gardens in the town or in gardens or fields outside it. Tillage was still largely a subsistence occupation and not yet fully commercialised. This applies to the smallest lots and gardens inside and outside the town.

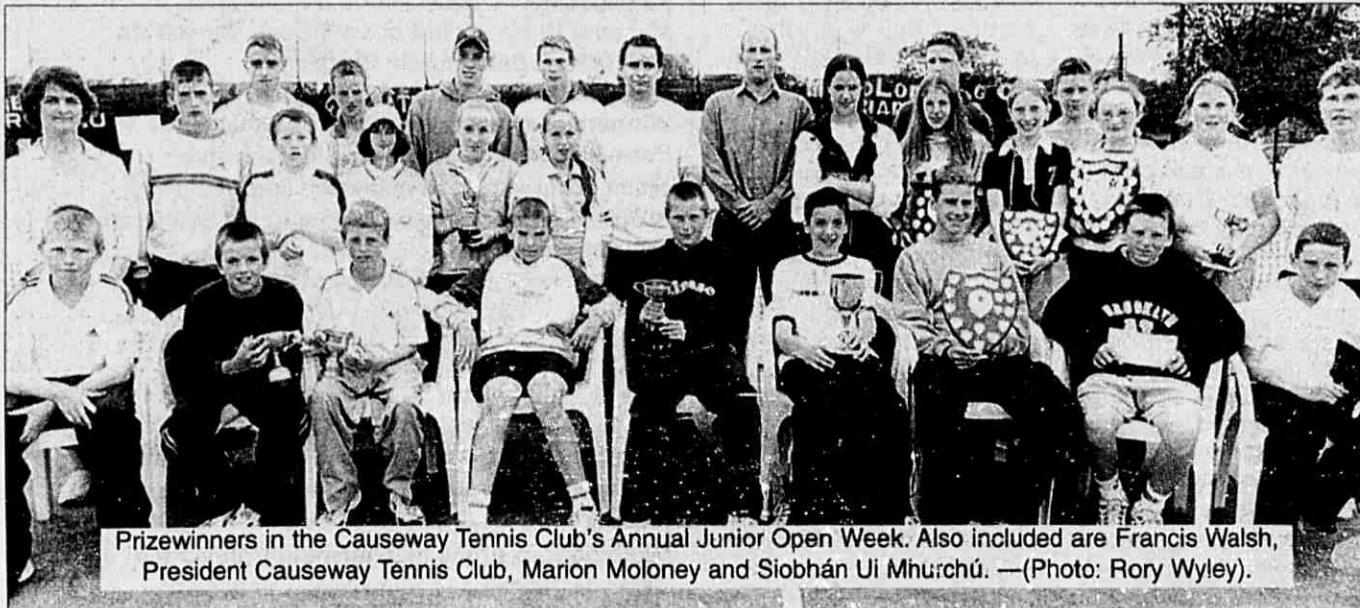
#### KATHLEEN AND MAY

## MONEYMATTERS

### BACK TO SCHOOL CLOTHING & FOOTWEAR ALLOWANCE

The above scheme is now in operation until 30th September 2002. It is a means tested social welfare payment administered by the Health Board. To qualify your income must be below certain limit or be in receipt of a social welfare payment. Among those who will qualify include dependent children whose parents or guardians are recipients of:

- Social Welfare Payments (including Family Income Supplement).
- Health Board Payments
- FAS, C.E. and Back to Work Schemes, etc. (Subject to a weekly household income limit of 317.42)

The payment is 80.00 euros for each child aged 2 - 11 and 120.00 euros for each child 12-17. A child aged 18 - 22 may be entitled to a payment of 120 euros where he/she is in full-time education. If you are refused you will be notified in writing as to why you were refused. If you still feel that you are entitled to a payment you can appeal the decision. Applications should be made to the Community Welfare Officer at your nearest South Eastern Health Board Office as soon as possible.

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

### QUESTION

I have been looking after my brother who needs full time care for the last six months. I only heard about Carer's Allowance recently and I have applied for it. If I am eligible for it, will it be backdated to when I started looking after my brother?

### ANSWER

Carer's Allowance is a means tested payment from the Department of Social and Family Affairs for carers who are looking after certain people in need of full-time care and attention. The person must have so severe a disability as to require continuous supervision and frequent assistance throughout the day in connection with their normal personal needs and to require the care for at least 12 months. A carer will normally reside with the person being cared for, but in exceptional cases a non-resident carer may qualify for the allowance.

Generally, the allowance is paid from the date your application is received. However, if you feel you met the conditions for qualifying for Carer's Allowance prior to the date on which you claimed the allowance, you may be entitled to have the date of award backdated for up to 6 months where you can show "good cause" for the delay in making the claim.

You must be able to prove that you satisfied the qualifying conditions for receipt of the allowance during the period. Good cause may exist where you failed to make a claim due to incorrect or insufficient information having been given to you by the Department. Another reason for a late claim could be illness or some circumstance which prevented a person from making a claim at the correct time. Not being aware of the Carer's Allowance Scheme is not a valid reason to have the award backdated.

You may also request a review of the claim/award. Where a request for a review of the date of claim is made and the original claim was made after June 2000, the review is governed by Social Welfare Law. The review is carried out by a Deciding Officer in the Department and a decision can be appealed to the Chief Appeals Officer. Where the original claim was made before June 2000, the review is not governed by Social Welfare Law and is carried out by a Department Officer on an administrative basis. Such decisions cannot be appealed to the Chief Appeals Officer, but can be reviewed by a Higher Officer.

## Sean O Dalaigh Commemoration at Eigse Shliabh gCua 2002

On Saturday 17th August at 2:30pm, Eigse Shliabh gCua will be unveiling a memorial to Sean O' Dalaigh (1800 - 1878) on the Green at Millstreet. Millstreet is a tiny hamlet in the Knockmealdown foothills, which lies on the main road from Youghal to Clonmel and is about 7 miles from Cappoquin. Sean, who was born at Farnane, a short distance up the road, was a scribe, writer, teacher and publisher and is being honoured for his contribution to the Irish language. Recently, there has been a renewal of interest in his life and a reappraisal of his contribution to the Gaelic and the Anglo-Irish literary revival and appreciation of traditional Irish music.

Sean had a long life, was married twice and suffered the misfortune of burying many of his children. He grew up in Lickoran and while a young man became a Protestant and worked both as a teacher and an inspector for the missionary Irish Society. In the late 1820's he was based at Youghal and later moved to Kilkenny city where he went into business as a bookseller and stationer. In the early 1840's he returned to the Catholic Church. This move was as controversial as his original decision to become a Protestant and many questioned his motives.

In 1845 Sean moved to

Dublin where he eventually established himself in premises at 9 Anglesea Street, a little over 100 metres from O'Connell Bridge where he had one of the finest collections of Irish books and manuscripts in the country. His high profile in the Celtic Society in the 1840's and the Ossianic Society in the 1850's gave him a national prominence for those who had an interest in the Irish language. Similarly in 1844 he published the Reliques of Irish Jacobite Poetry, the first in a long series of books which would bring to the attention of English speakers the glories of the Irish poetic tradition and equally importantly emphasise the deep literary foundations of a language that was then mostly spoken by the poorer sections of Irish society. He followed this up with Fein Teagasc Gaeilge in 1846, which was a teach-yourself Irish book. Then in 1849 his most famous book The Poets and Poetry of Munster came out. Sean commissioned the finest Irish poet in English of the day, James Clarence Mangan, to provide English versions of the great Irish works. Many of the original poems were accompanied by their own music or set to other traditional airs.

This book ran into many editions and influenced a great deal of those who were promi-

nent in the Gaelic and Anglo-Irish literary revival. In 1985, Sean Dunne of Waterford City, the gifted poet and writer who died young, edited poems of Poets of Munster: An Anthology, which was a collection of the works of the then current Munster poets in homage to O Dalaigh's seminal work.

In his long life O Dalaigh published many more books and it was fitting that his Irish Language Miscellany (1876) was the last. Sean died on 22 May 1878 and is buried in Glasnevin Cemetery. There is no headstone on the family plot.

In 1927 Dublin Corporation named a new road in Drumcondra, O'Daly Road after him. Bothar Ui Dhalaigh lies behind St. Patrick's Teacher Training College. Today, only a slight trace of the house where he was born in Farnane exists although his parents Eamonn O Dalaigh and Brid Ni Chadla lie under a headstone in the old part of Modeligo graveyard. Maire, Sean's daughter who died aged 6 in Kilkenny in 1834 is mentioned on the same stones. Eigse Shliabh gCua had hoped to have the memorial in place to mark the bicentennial of Sean's birth in 2000 but now at last we will be seeing the fruits of their efforts.

Accordingly Sean O Dalaigh is the main theme of this year's Eigse, which runs from 16th to 18th of August. At 8:00pm. on Friday, in Halla an Pobail, in Touraneena, Prionsias O' Drisceoil will speak on "John O'Daly of Lickoran, scribe, publisher and pioneer of the Gaelic Revival". Prionsias is a distinguished Irish scholar as well as the Arts Education Officer for the V.E.C.'s in the South East region. He is a native of Thurles and spent 10 years as a book reviewer with the Irish Times. He is the author of Ar Scaradh Gabhail: an Fheiniulacht in Cin Lae Amh-laoibh Ui Shuilleabhain — a study of identity in the Callan diaries of Humphrey O'Sullivan which was published by An Clocomhar in 2000. He is also an authority on the writer Eoghan O Tuarisc and the poet Sean O Riordain. His essay on the writer Seamus O Maolchatha and an Gleann is a raibh ann will be published in the current edition of An Linn Bhui — Irish Ghaeltacht na nDeise. O Maolchatha was from Grange near Newcastle and An Gleann is about life in that part of South Tipperary when he was young.

Prionsias's talk will be followed by a traditional concert directed by Muiris O hAilachain, the well-known dancing master. On the Saturday the unveiling ceremony will begin at Millstreet at 2.30 p.m. The main speaker will be an

tOllamh Pdraig O Machain of the School of Celtic Studies in the Dublin Institute for Advanced Studies. Pdraig is a native of Lismore and among many accomplishments is joint publisher of an Linn Bhui. The short ceremony will be followed by a bus tour of places associated with the life of Sean O Dalaigh.

On Saturday at 11 a.m. in Touraneena Chapel beidh an tAifrin a cheiliuradh ag an tAthair Pdraig O hAilgheanain — as an Astrail, an Nua Guinea agus Ath a'b-heannlomain. Beidh cor ann freisin.

In keeping with the community spirit of the Eigse all events associated with the commemoration other than the bus tour are free of charge and no registration is required. Everyone is welcome so if you wish a stimulating, enjoyable and entertaining weekend the Eigse is the place to be.

It is with deep regret we record the death of Miss Statia Power, Ard na Greinne, Clonmel. Her passing brings to a close almost 250 years of the Power family in Clonmel and its environs, marking the end of an era.

Second youngest of eight children, she was the daughter of a well known County Waterford family of Pierce and Catherine (nee Fogarty) of Derrinlaur. Following her parents death she and Betty maintained the home in Ard na Greinne, which became the rendezvous down the years for family reunions as well as having been the venue for many a good night of singing and dancing. It was a happy house where there was always laughter and animated discussion amongst relatives and friends, who congregated their and also planned some memorable outings.

Her sister Betty's death in 1996 was a severe blow to her as they had lived with each other and shared so much together, for a long number of years. "No man can learn to live until he can rise above the narrow confines of his individualistic concerns to the broader concerns of humanity. Length without breadth is like a self-contained tributary having no outward flow to the ocean. Stagnant, still, and stale, it lacks both life and freshness. In order to live creatively and meaningfully, our self concern must be wedded to other concerns".

What better words than those of the great Civil Rights leader, Martin Luther King can sum up the life of a very ordinary lady, who could give in so many extraordinary ways - Joan Fennell. Generosity was one of her many great hallmarks, which enabled her to look so often beyond the confines of her own life, to the cares and needs of others. Thus her life was enriched with that enviable freshness, manifested in her always welcomed smile, and the many gifts that accompanied her visits. In fact she came with so much in the shopping bags; all that was missing was the supermarket itself! Indeed so many people know that if she could bring that with her, she gladly would. Her caring and friendly way did not go unnoticed, or unappreciated, because many spoke of her as a great source of inspiration leaving a void in the hearts of many who will hold her memory dear. I hope the void will remain for as long as we will, it can never be filled. It reminds us not just of how much our dearly departed mean, but also, there will only be one Joan Fennell. Our memories of people like Joan are in themselves great healing powers to continue on with life's journey, as she often did. Stories of her generosity and friendship will hopefully not remain as memories gathering dust as the mystery of time unfolds. These can be a source of inspiration in our lives, encouraging us to walk in the footsteps of her example. Generosity and care can never grow old; people will always be in need of support. Joan knew what it meant to give to the end of her days. Her story has not ended, but changes, and will live on in those who are privileged to have known her. As we thank God for the gift of Joan's life, the words of the poet Patrick Kavanagh come to mind, as he recalls what his mother's care and generosity meant to him -

You will have the road gate open the front door ajar  
The kettle boiling and a table set

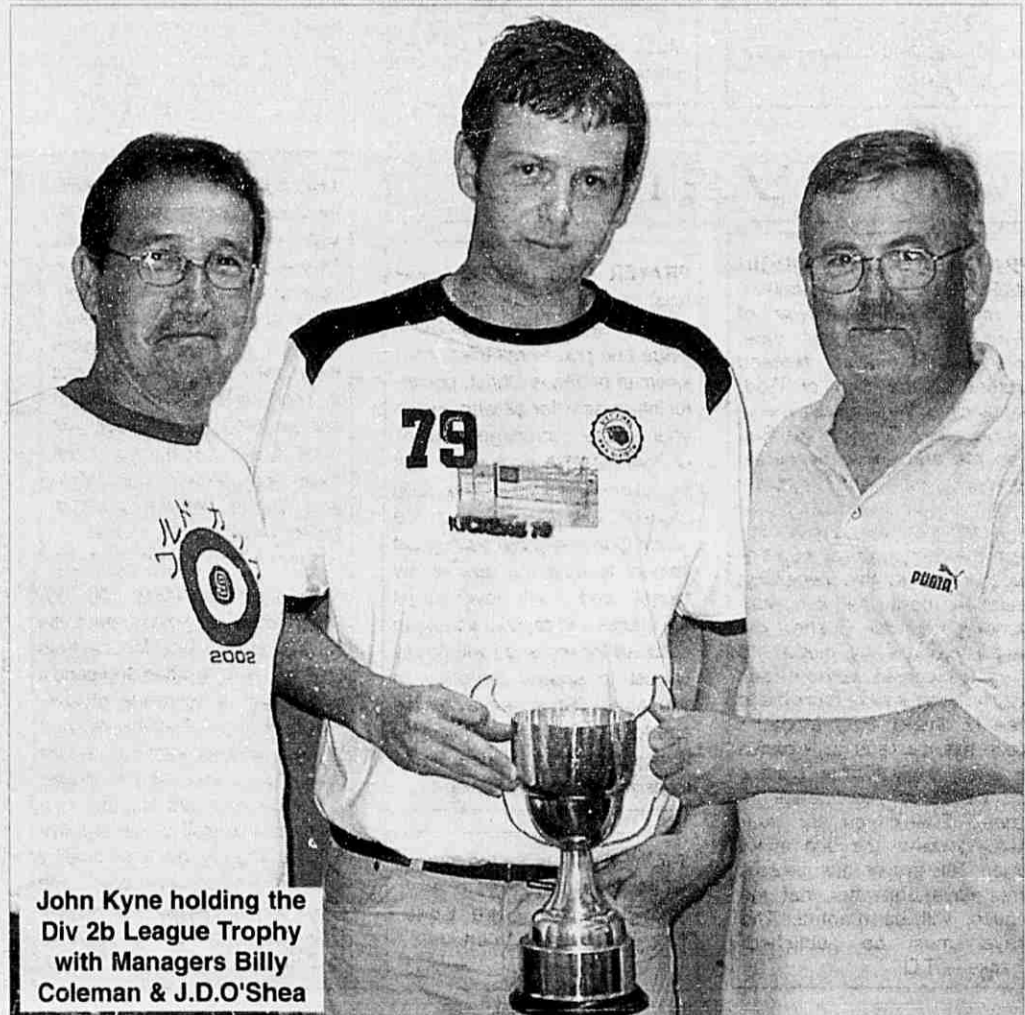

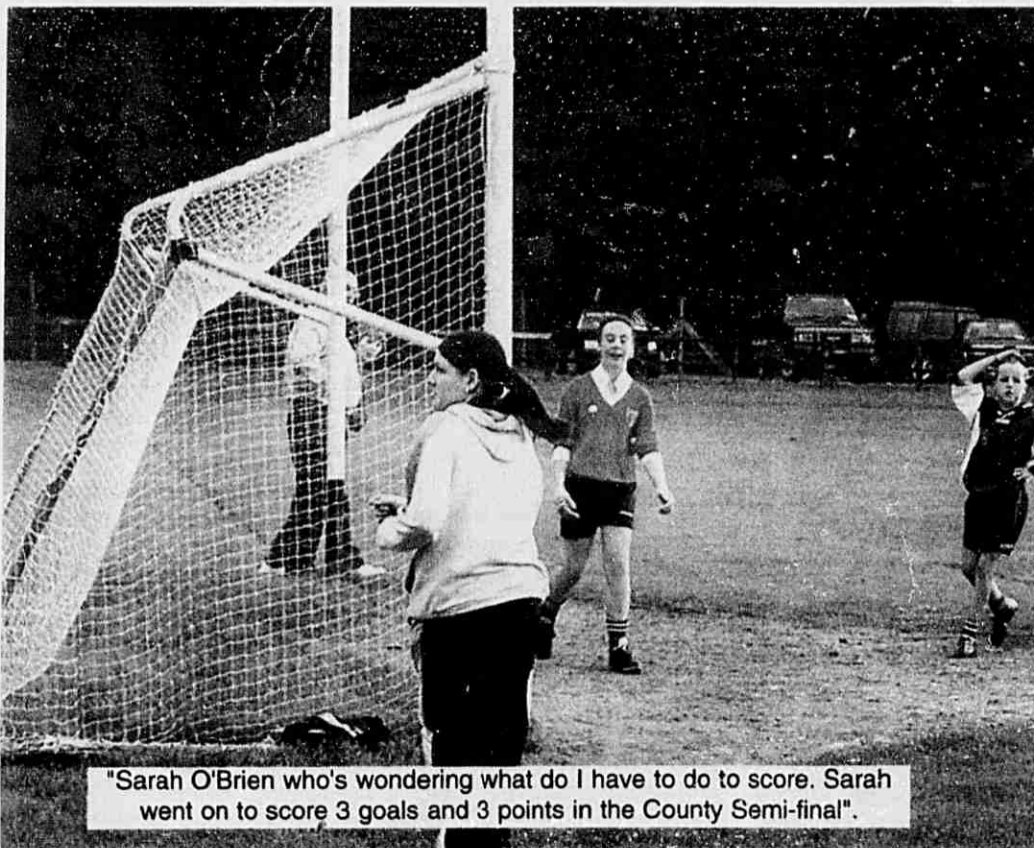

### WATERFORD 1-20 CORK 4-7

Waterford won their 10th Munster title in 12 years at Emly last Saturday evening but they had to overcome a great Cork comeback, but withstood the pressure and went on to record a deserved victory. It just goes to show that there is no easy touch these days and Cork are developing into a very formidable outfit.

This was a great game of football to which both teams contributed and at the end of the day Waterford's experience and leadership qualities brought them through. Waterford split open the Cork defence from the throw in. Mary O'Donnell won possession and combined with Patricia O'Ryan, Deirdre Breathnach and Geraldine O'Ryan to put Mary O'Rourke through and her shot went inches wide. It was to be the young Clashmore players only miss as she went on to score 9 great points all from play in a player of the match performance.

Geraldine O'Ryan who also had a fine game fired over a second minute point and O'Rourke and Martina O'Ryan had Waterford 0-3 to the good after 1 minute. In their first attack of note Cork's full forward Aimee O'Shea pounced on a breaking ball to slam home a goal that did much for the confidence of a young Cork team. In the 17th minute O'Shea nudged Cork in front, but O'Rourke levelled it up a minute later. Then Waterford missed another goal chance as Fiona O'Reilly shot straight at Cork goalkeeper Claire Donoghue from 10 yards.

Waterford then took over, helped in no small way by Olivia Butler in defence and Mary O'Donnell at midfield and shot 6 consecutive

points from Deirdre Broderick (2), Mary O'Rourke (3) and a forty yard pointed free by Geraldine O'Ryan and led 0.10 to 1.2 at the interval.

The opening 10 minutes of the second half was even, Joan Lucey and Valerie Mulcahy from Cork pointed which Annalisa Crotty and Martina O'Ryan cancelled out.

Then Waterford put in a blistering 6 minute spell. Aoife Murphy came on and made a valuable contribution as Mary O'Donnell and Murphy pointed. Mary O'Donnell's great pass found Geraldine O'Ryan and she managed a great goal. O'Donnell and O'Rourke pointed and Waterford headed out of sight as they led 1.16 to 1.4.

What happened in the next 3 minutes was incredible. First Cork's Joan Lucey hit a speculative shot from 30 metres which dipped under the Waterford crossbar. Sixty seconds later Midfielder Valerie Mulcahy drove a bullet like drive into the bottom left hand corner of the net and Waterford were reeling.

Worse was to follow, Cork won possession from the kickout and worked the ball into Aimee O'Shea and the net shook again and then Lucey added a point to reduce the deficit to just 2 points. Just when it seemed that Cork were about to sail

home, experience took over again. Cliona O'Keefe won a vital ball in defence and Mary O'Donnell and Geraldine O'Ryan combined to put Mary O'Rourke in for a vital point.

Rebecca Hallahan and Annalisa Crotty broke up another Cork attack and Hallahan's pass again found O'Rourke and the Clashmore player drilled the posts for a vital score. Virtually from the kick out Mary O'Donnell, fielding magnificently placed Mary O'Rourke for her 9th point in an incredible performance and Aoife Murphy showing a welcome return to form, landed Waterford's 20th point. # Senior Hurling Championships Resume

Now in mid August with all 24 senior clubs (12 in hurling and 12 in football) still with an interest in the championship the pressure to get them finished in reasonable time, is mounting.

Two senior hurling championship ties are fixed for the coming weekend and it is likely that a third game will also be played. The third match referred to is the replay of the Tallow v. Stradbally drawn match. With Stradbally also involved in senior football - they are the champions and are in the winners section - it is imperative that their matches be played soon.

If our championships are not completed by the first week in October we cannot compete in the Munster Club championships and with the rule change made last year, we cannot now nominate a club to represent us.

However now that we are provincial champions we will have a bye in the hurling and also now that we are out of the championships it will be a case of 'full steam ahead' with matches on every

weekend.

The matches for next weekend are Fourmilewater versus Portlaw at Fraher field and Passage v Ballyduff East at Walsh Park.

The losers of the above matches will battle it out for survival or relegation and the three winners will be drawn against Ballyduff West, Roanmore and De La Salle and these will eventually produce a fourth semi-finalist to join Mount Sion, Ballygunner and Lismore.

### Fourmilewater v Portlaw

County intermediate champions, Fourmilewater who played a first round draw with De La Salle (0-10 each), and were defeated in the replay, will find it difficult to beat Portlaw who made it to the county semi-final last year, only to lose heavily to the eventual county champions, Ballygunner. Earlier they had beaten Shamrocks by 2-7 to 2-4 here in a close encounter at Fraher field.

Fourmilewater, like Stradbally are in both senior hurling and (Nire) football

championships and the odds against either winning a senior double are mighty. Eventually as the season progresses we will see these clubs concentrating on football, a championship for which each is strongly in contention.

Fourmilewater have, at best a 50/50 chance against Portlaw who will have county reserve goalkeeper Noel Kelly as their net minder.

### Passage v Ballyduff East

Going on last season's form, these teams are not going to set the championship on fire. They clashed in the first round last year and Passage had a 0-12 to 1-4 victory.

In the second round, Ballygunner took care of the challenge from neighbours, Passage and Mount Sion overpowering Ballyduff.

I do not know of any reason why things will have changed sufficiently to rate either of these teams as serious challengers this time round.

### Stradbally v Tallow

These teams drew seven weeks ago as they did at the same stage last year. It was 3-12 to 2-15 and the replay was every bit as exciting with Tallow winning deservedly on a score of 4-10 to 2-15.

When they clashed in their drawn match this year, Tallow fielded without James Murray. Managing a draw without their intercounty player speaks well for the Tallow challenge in this replay (if it goes ahead).

## Under 21 Hurling Second Rounds

In the initial rounds of the under 21 hurling championships played on the August Bank Holiday weekend, the four matches played in the "A" championship were remarkable in that they all 'went down to the wire' and one was so close that it remained undecided (Fourmilewater and Lismore drew).

Tallow who defeated Colligan by 2-10 to 2-8 will next play Ardmore who survived a great battle with Cappoquin before winning by 1-10 to 0-10.

Ballyduff who had a narrow one point victory over St. Oliver's (3-14 to 2-16) will play Abbeyside who received a first round bye. The winners of that game will play the winners of the Lismore/Fourmilewater match.

It certainly has the makings of a splendid "B" Championship. Dungarvan scored a decisive win over Brickey Rangers in their first round tie in this championship.

## Strategic Review Committee Report

Last week, every club in this county received a letter from the Association President Sean McCague asking members to support the committee recommendations.

The letter asked that club meetings be held to discuss the motions related to the report and which have been circulated to all counties.

The letter states: "I am writing to you as club secretary to urge you and your club members to support the SR process as we must strengthen the association for the challenges which lie ahead. We cannot afford to operate on the basis that if something worked in the past, it will work in the future. I would urge that "future" is the key word to be considered in any review of the SCR recommendations. The whole process is about the continuing development of our Association to ensure that the GAA will continue to be the vibrant force in Irish Society, that it has been for over one hundred years."

In his 4 page letter from his home in Monaghan, the Uachtaran refers in detail to the enormous changes that the Association has undergone in the 30 years since the McNamee Report was published and adopted 30 years ago.

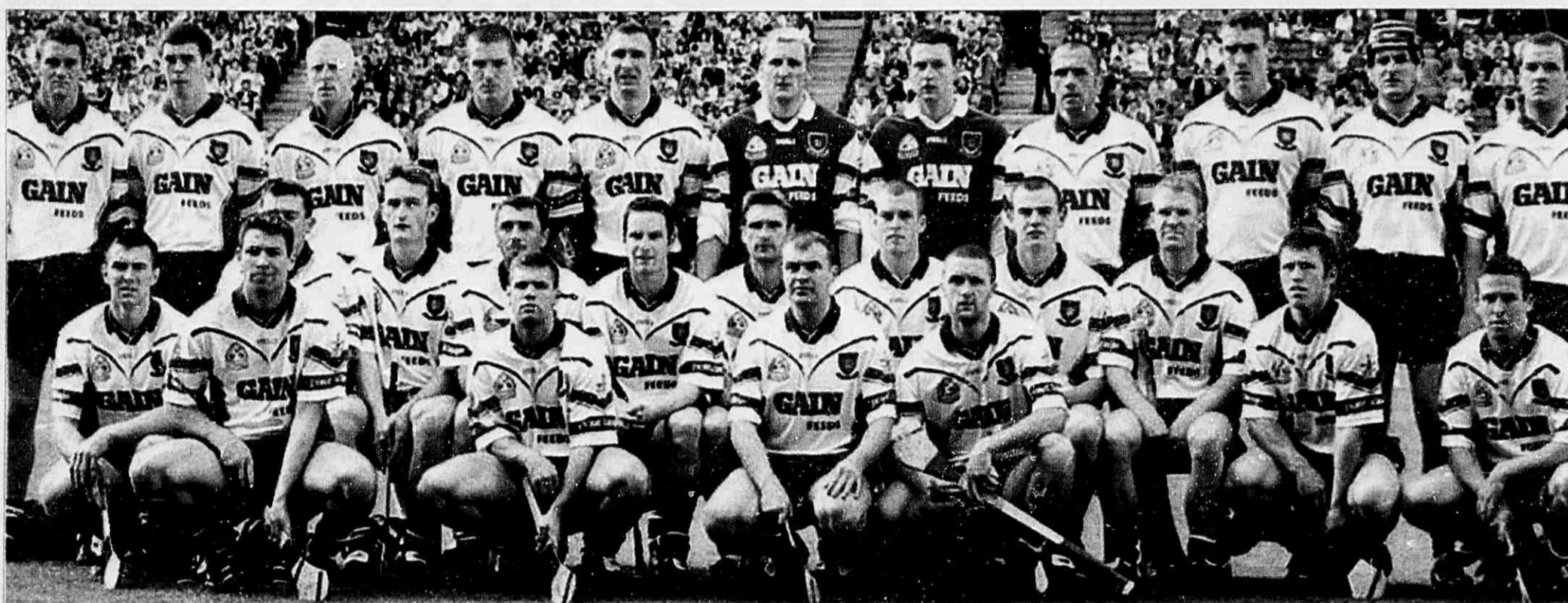
When the report was first announced to county board members there was outrage and the recommendations were ridiculed and criticised all round. In the intervening months there seems to have been a change of mood and now some clubs seem to favour the adoption of some aspects of the report.

# Waterford's Bid Ends In Failure

## CLARE 1-16 WATERFORD 1-13

After living in a county on fire with exciting speculation over the past six weeks since winning the Munster final, our dreams of All-Ireland glory were well and truly shattered shortly before five o'clock on Sunday last after failing by just three points to match the Banner county in a match which saw us surprisingly overpowered in the second half. And as our 25,000 supporters returned to a county engulfed in bitter disappointment on Sunday night, very many will have pondered on the reasons why we lost control of a game that belonged to us for the first 20 minutes or so.

Finding out what went wrong and the reasons why it went so wrong, is something that will be fully examined by the management team in the days and weeks ahead after examining the video and while all this will be very useful for future reference, it will not change the result or relieve the anguish and pain of defeat at Croke Park last Sunday.

Our ten second half wides added to the seven in the first half, were factors, I suppose, but for me the failure must be put down to inexperience and immaturity.

### BRILLIANT START

Four points to the good after only four minutes and moving with the precision of a well tuned machine, the team looked invincible and Clare did not seem to know what was happening.

At a later stage in the half, we were five points clear before the Banner men began to settle. Just before halftime the killer blow came when Alan Markham shot to the Waterford net for a life saving goal that obviously restored the full confidence of Clare who went in at halftime with a one point lead which gave them an advantage much against the run of play.

### ONE POINT BEHIND

It should not have been a big worry as we were at a similar disadvantage in the Munster final at the halfway stage.

### DISJOINTED

When we drew level within a short time of the restart things began to look good. However we were soon to find that things were not looking good and for some inexplicable reason the team became disjointed and began to lose shape when the pressure from experienced Clare began to be felt and nowhere to be seen was the sniper like shooting which saw us overpower All Ireland champions, Tipperary in

the Munster final. Perhaps a number of the ten second half wides could be attributed to the strange surroundings of the new stadium.

### CLARE WERE THE BETTER TEAM

For the Clare team, it was a case of everything going right on the day. In fact their overall performance could be described as a copybook repeat of their display against Galway two weeks previously when again after starting poorly they recovered to win through in the end.

Here on Sunday their stars shone brightly while ours did not. The disappointing fact is that not one of our players played to their Munster final form and this can be attributed to the likelihood that the Banner management team had our top men 'monitored' to such an extent that their opposite numbers were able to nullify their impact on the game.

### ON MY PILLOW!

Early on Sunday morning before leaving for Dublin I wrote a note and left it on my pillow. The note read, "I think that I am going to see Clare beat us by about 4 points today."

I wrote in my column last week that we had a 50/50 chance at best, but having further considered the record of our opponents our rating fell, in my reckoning. After all we were playing a team who had roughly a dozen players who are holders of three Munster and two All Ireland championships won in the past seven years. The experience and maturity gained from those campaigns must have meant a lot against a much younger team of far less experience.

### WHAT THE EXPERTS SAID

Justin McCarthy regarded the fact that we shot 17 wides as a big factor in our defeat. Despite that, he said we were still in there with a chance up to the final whistle. We had a

great Munster campaign and perhaps an All-Ireland was a step too far, so soon. He said: "look what we have achieved in our first year, we have several great young players coming along and the experience of today's game will be of enormous benefit to them, come next year."

**Brian Lohan Said:** — "It looked at the start that Waterford were going to blow us out of the water and it was daylight robbery that we went in at halftime leading by a point, but we were not complaining." The Clare captain said the Waterford players in the second half, seemed to abandon their early and very successful policy of playing the ball to the corners.

**Ger Loughane:** — This 'expert' changes his mind so often that one never knows what to expect from him. Full of praise for Waterford in the lead up to the semi-final, he said after the game on Sunday "The Deise have a huge mental obstacle to overcome if they are to win an All Ireland." They are incapable of performing under pressure and in this regard he mentioned Ken McGrath and Paul Flynn and said that it was a psychological disadvantage for Waterford that Galway did not beat Clare.

### DISAPPOINTING FOR ALL

As I wrote at the outset, the result was a big disappointment, but most of all for the players and all the backroom people who had put so much into the preparation. The agony of the result is not lessened by the fact that as poor as we were in the second half, we were there with a big chance up to the end.

### THE BRIGHT SIDE

It is not easy to find the cloud with the silver lining in a situation such as ours at the moment when we are all in a mood of depression, but we must not forget that Waterford are the very worthy Munster hurling champions and this achievement cannot be taken from us.

Also, we do have a young panel of players who must mature in time and become more experienced in the skills (and muscle) that is needed to win at the highest level.

Also we may yet see our defeat here in a different light after Tipperary or Kilkenny have played Clare in the All Ireland final next month.

# For Hurling Glory At Croke Park



## INEXPERIENCE PROVES COSTLY AGAINST MATURED OPPONENTS, CLARE IN SEMI-FINAL

### THE PLAY

Despite scoring six points in the opening eight minutes at which stage they led by four, Waterford Senior Hurlers lost out to Clare at Croke Park on Sunday last in the All Ireland Semi Final. It was a heart breaking defeat for the team who had brought the Munster title to Waterford for the first time in 39 years.

A hat trick of points from Eoin Kelly and one a piece from Paul Flynn, Eoin McGrath and John Mullane gave Waterford an ideal start. Tony Griffin opened Clare's scoring in the 5th minute but the Deise side continued to set the pace with a free flowing style. Twelve minutes into the game Waterford led by five points 0-7 to 0-2 before two points from '65's' converted by Clare centre back Sean McMahon brought the Banner right back into contention before Jamsie O'Connor reduced the lead still further with 21 minutes of the half played.

A foul on John Mullane 60 seconds later saw Paul Flynn blast the ball to the Clare net to again open up a five point advantage. Clare responded with two Jamsie O'Connor points in as many minutes and suddenly the beaten team in the Munster Championship were back on track. Still Waterford responded and points from Ken McGrath and Paul Flynn opened up a 5 point advantage once again.

Gilligan pointed a free before Clare's goal arrived as the game entered injury time at the end of the first half. Alan Markham was the scorer and suddenly a team that were outclassed for big periods early on had cut the deficit to the minimum. Within two minutes they were pointing for the first time when Markham pointed after Waterford had missed chances at the other end. In the third minute of injury time played by referee Pat O'Connor, Gilligan converted a free to give Clare the lead at the interval on the score of 1-10 to 1-9, a lead twenty minutes earlier that never looked likely. This was a major boost to Clare overall and a major blow to Waterford who despite getting off to a flying start were now trailing.

**Level Terms** — Within a minute of the restart Waterford were back on level terms when Tony Browne sent over the bar from a side line cut in front of the Hogan stand. However, Waterford were not to score again for twenty minutes at which stage Clare had gone in front after scores from McMahon (65), Tony Carmody (2) and David Forde.

In that period, Paul Flynn had failed to convert scorable frees. Eoin Kelly had Waterford's second point of the second period in the 24th minute when Flynn converted a free 3 minutes later only two separated the sides.

Forde stretched Clare's advantage as the Waterford forward division were finding difficulty to make an impression against a very strong Clare defence in which Brian Lehan was the master. Waterford continued to press but Tony Browne's goal effort went wide and sub. Dave Bennett was off target from a free. Ollie Baker gave Clare a four point cushion on the stroke of full time before Andy Moloney had a point deep into injury time to leave only a goal between the sides but it was not to be Waterford's day. The shooting of seventeen wides was to prove costly.

### BREAK IN

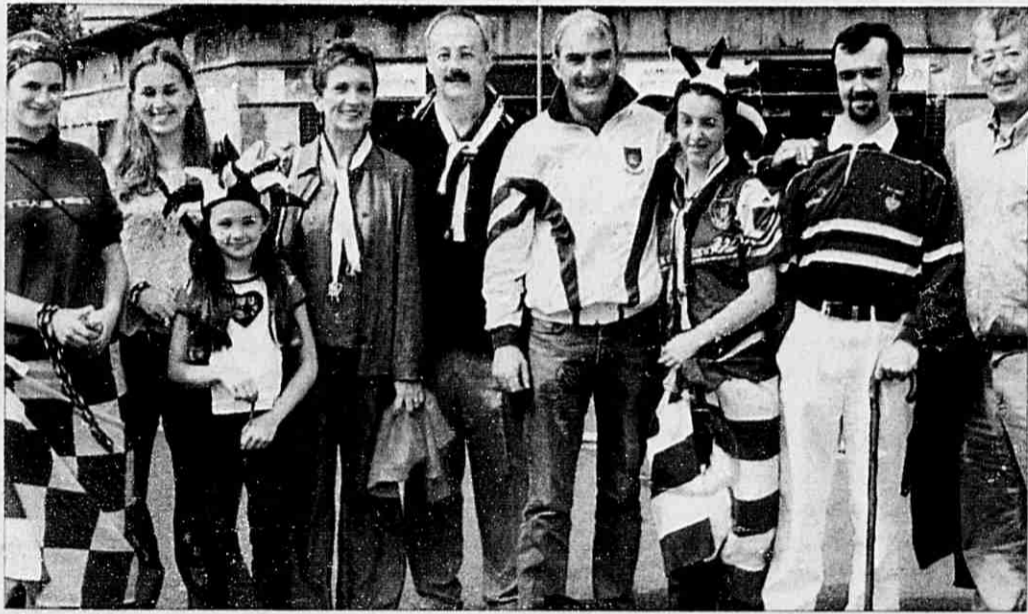
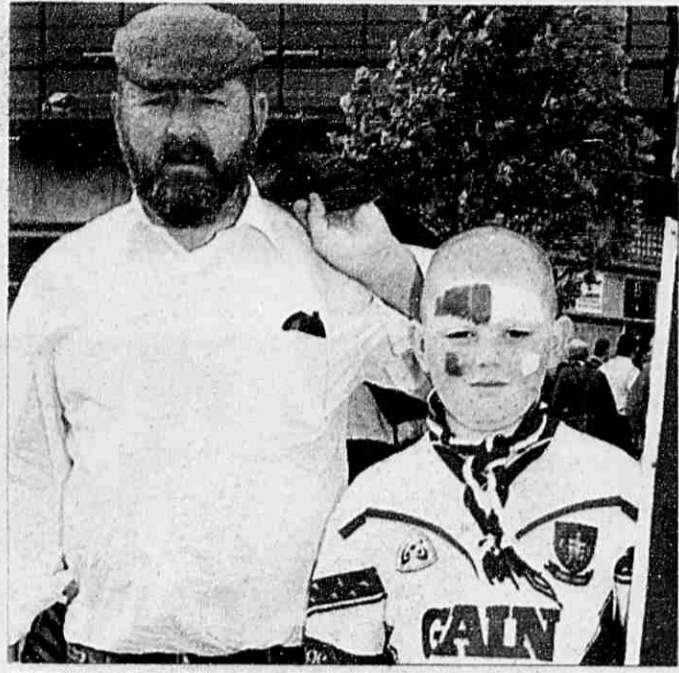

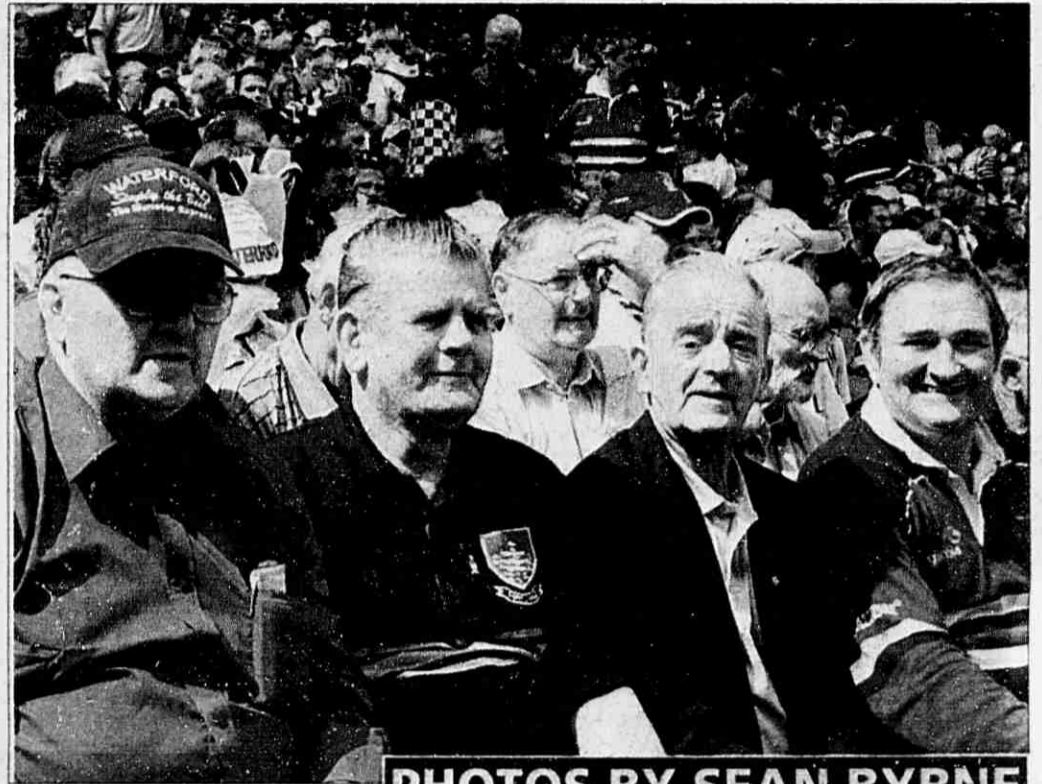
### MOTH BALLS

This very technical event will always have questions asked when athletes are disqualified and others are not over lifting. The rule states that an athlete's foot must be on the ground at all times, these men



are walking at such a terrific pace that it is beyond me how anyone can judge who is breaking the rule and who is not. Last Thursday at the halfway stage of the race with 32 competitors in it something like 7 athletes had been disqualified with a further 6 or 7 including Jamie on two warnings and the remaining were on one. The eventual winner was on two warnings when he finished and to watch him in slow motion after the event both his feet were clearly off the ground as he came up the track to win the gold medal, but that is the sport of race walking and the judges decision is final. But anyway it is more experience for Jamie at the highest level and he is learning and getting stronger as time goes by and have no doubt about it his day will come.

The winner Robert Korzeniowski of Poland broke the world record winning in a time of 3.37.26 to retain his European title, he also is now the holder of the Olympic, World and European championships and has seven gold medals at these championships which is an unbelievable record at any discipline. Indeed in Sydney at the Olympic games he doubled at the 20 k and 50 k walks and is undoubtedly by a long margin the greatest race walker of all time. Korzeniowski a sports store owner from Poland has left a legacy for the up and coming race walkers of the future to follow and achieve, second place went to the Russian champion Voyevodin who was 3.37 behind the winner with the world champion from 1993 Garcia of Spain third in 3.44.32. Less than half the starters got to finish the event because of disqualification.

A large volume of bookmakers have a Euro 5 minimum betting limit but you can then always bet on the tote where there is a minimum bet of 2 Euro. The Tote offers win and place betting. Where there is eight runners or more the Tote will pay out on the first three horses home while if there is sixteen or more runners in any race they will pay out on the first four home.

The Tote also have Forecast, Trio and Jackpot facilities

If you are having a bet on another Irish or English fixture with an on course Tramore bookmaker it maybe better to take SP (Starting Price) as the prices quoted are often two or three points under the actual price of the horse.

Those race meetings held under the aegis of the Red Cross were continued by Mr Murphy until his death in 1920. In that year a new company made up of the renowned Senator JJ Parkinson, Francis Murphy and Thomas Fleming took over control. For many years the Fleming family were synonymous with Tramore Racecourse until in 1997 a new race company was formed headed by well known local entrepreneur Peter Queally. The improvements which have been carried out on the track have received very favourable comments from both trainers and jockeys. The facilities for the racegoers have also been upgraded. The Tramore Racing Festival in August ranks among one of the most popular meetings in the summer.

One of Tramore's characteristics is that it is a right handed undulating track.

This years James Nicholson Ulster Champion Chase at Down Royal, Northern Ireland has been awarded Grade One status.

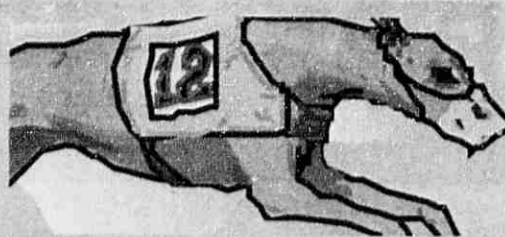
## WEEKEND ACTION

The showcase event on the opening midweek fixture for the month of August was the Euro 1,500 to the winner Hot-show Ben Confined Unraced stake which was kindly sponsored by the Draper Family from New Inn, County Tipperary. A late surge of money for Bestofthebest 1/1 saw this dog replace Gaynors Jet 5/1 as the favourite and after a pulsating final the Michael Flynn owned Bestofthebest (Toms The Best-Some Dispatch)

duly obliged in 28.93. It was Noan Ranger though who showed all the early pace to lead from Coolroe Dean with the eventual winner at the back of the pack after a moderate break. Coolroe Dean ran into the rear of Noan Ranger between the final two bends as Bestofthebest began a decisive run from the rear of the field. In an exciting finish Bestofthebest finished powerfully on the outside to outstay Noan Ranger by a length with Gaynors Jet two and a half lengths further back in third.

The once raced Bonmahon Ranger (Judicial Pride-Dranoel Breeze) 5/2 took on five unraced opponents in the opening race of the night and while Jerpoint Sand displayed plenty of early speed to lead from Dawlish Rocket the Andrew Weldon owned Bonmahon Breeze finished with a flourish to win going away by four lengths from Dawlish Rocket in 29.33.

It was back to the 300 yard trip for the second race and taking a flyer from trap four the Thomas and Kate Morris owned Penny Well (Larkhill Jo-Walsh Wizard) never looked in any danger of defeat this 5/2 chance easily accounting for Jacks Lady by four and a quarter lengths in 16.64.

Favourite backers were on the mark in the third contest courtesy of the 6/4 favourite Black Pal (Droopys Merson-Nicks Doll) this Nicholas Dollard owned and Tony Ryan trained greyhound winning out in 29.38. Recovering well from a poor start Black Pal cruised up behind the early pacesetters Gallows Sarah and Finsbury Park at the entrance to the back stretch. When Gallows Sarah kept a wide berth down the back hampering Finsbury Park in the process Black Pal seized the opportunity to strike the front on the rails. Making steady late headway Glenaharry Lass ran on well close home but failed by half a length to overhaul Black Pal.

The fourth contest produced a very easy sprint winner in the shape of the Joe O'Hanlon and Leo Dunphy owned Gimli this eighty three pound son of Rio Riccardo and Lisnakill Dona coming home alone in 16.57. Breaking in front from trap six Gimli had this race in the bag a long way out and when his opponents were involved in first bend crowding Gimli extended his lead eventually scoring by twelve lengths from Anajojo.

The hurdles were out for the fifth race in which 6/1 outsider Aquaduct Craft (Roanoke-Aquaduct Flower) came good for owner Simon Kavanagh and trainer John Kavanagh. Evens favourite Dysart See set the early pace but lost ground jumping quiet high over the obstacles. Aquaduct Craft was always close at hand and jumping into the lead at the second last hurdle Aquaduct Craft ran on well for a deserved two lengths win over Hendrijke in 29.98.

Three heats of the Phelans Shoes 29.20 stake were also run off on this card.

Heat One. This qualifier is easily described as the Walter Walsh owned Kellsboro Lucy (Spiral Nikita-Proud Roslea) 5/1 went to the front at the first bend from the fast starting Daring Boss before scoring in 29.34. After a disastrous start the 2/1 favourite Mill Vale displayed plenty of early boot to close right up on the leaders on the back stretch. The always prominent Daring Boss took a crashing fall between the final two bends as Kellsboro Lucy stuck to the task in hand to defeat Mill Vale by three quarters of a length. Heat Two. This qualifier produced a thrilling finish as Sparta Leo and Dunmain Jo crossed the winning line in unison. This pair had dominated from the outset with Sparta Leo show-

ing the way to Dunmain Jo from an early stage. Dunmain Jo joined issue off the final turn but a gallant Sparta Leo a Sept 00 son of Roanoke and Peppermint Lady came back for more to post a short head win for owner John Fitzgerald and trainer Phil Gough. The winning time was a solid 29.00.

Tipperary Cup finalist Cavecourt Glory (Vintage Prince-Seskin Daisy) availed of an ease in grade in heat three beating a useful field to score in a speedy 28.69. Barbies Bluebird started well but outpacing his rivals to the opening bend the Michael Duggan owned Cavecourt Glory had Cousin Jack as his nearest rival and increasing the tempo down the far side the strong running Cavecourt Glory was not extended in beating a fast finishing Fitzzy Star by three lengths with Cousin Jack just behind in third.

The final race of the session saw the Suzie Maher owned and Bill Marlin trained Genuinely Serious (Top Honcho-Persian Maid) oblige at the rewarding odds of 6/1. Scaldy Keano the 4/6 favourite found himself short of racing room as Drumboy Prince and Hilldun Pat came in contact at the entrance to the back stretch. The favourite did manage to strike the front over the final two bends but staying wide Scaldy Keano was collared close home by the fast finishing Genuinely Serious who won out by a short head in a career best 29.02.

## MINUTES SILENCE

Racegoers at this fixture were shocked to hear of the death of three people with strong greyhound racing connections. Regular racegoer John Flavin suffered a terrible loss when his youngest son John (16) was killed in tragic circumstances in Tramore on Bank Holiday while a traffic accident claimed the life of well known owner Vincent Moloney who campaigned his runners under the "Bearnabui" prefix. Clonmel Veterinary Surgeon Muiris Dromey was known to all greyhound followers in the South East and his death came as a shock to all. A minutes silence was observed as a mark of respect to all three.

Belmullet Anne was first to show in front but she gave way passing the Stand to the strong running Sparta Dick. Regal Honey gave chase down the back stretch but Sparta Dick was not stopping in front. Conjuring a late effort Metric Tiger came with a steady late run but he ran out of yardage as a determined Sparta Dick won out by three quarters of a length from a gallant Metric Tiger in 40.78.

Finding winners was not easy on the remainder of the card with the results going in favour of the layers.

Knocklong owner Pat O'Connell was on the mark in the opening contest as Luna Rebel (Lassa Java-Danescourt Brook) 2/1 posted a runaway 28.85 victory. Mist My Babe went to the front early on leading from Prince Wonder but recovering well from a slow start Luna Rebel cut through the field like a knife through butter and striking the front down the back stretch Luna Rebel went clear in a matter of strides to come home nine and a quarter lengths clear of Mist My Babe.

Favourite backers latched on to Interloper (Mountleader Peer-Alias Stage) in the second race and this 6/4 favourite duly did the business for Jenkintown owner Finbarr O'Regan

in a good 28.91. Taking over in the lead off the second bend from the early paced Bar Spiral Interloper was then challenged in the lead by Ballygunner Pal but seeing off that challenge Interloper went on to score by a length and three quarters from the luckless Not Good Enough.

After two impressive victories Blokade Tex was the obvious

market leader in the third but this evens favourite sprawled on leaving trap one and then stumbled after another twenty yards. Meanwhile the Stephen Bourke and Alex McKenzie owned and Sean Bourke trained Mega Foxy (Mustang Jack-Short Pass) 3/1 displayed her current well being forging into an early lead to lead from Beirns Mick and maintaining a steady gallop up front Mega Foxy encountered little difficulty in beating Beirns Mick by four and a half lengths in 28.97.

The well bred Snazzy Girl (Split The Bill-Hare Storm) 2/1 made short work of some more experienced rivals in the fourth over 550 yards shooting well clear for an eye catching 29.95 victory. Owned by Denis O'Donohoe and having only her fourth race Snazzy Girl left the inside trap in full flight to motor into a clear lead over a hampered Downing Slippy and stretching her rivals to the limit Snazzy Girl increase her advantage throughout to run out a nine and a quarter lengths winner over Magniers Flash.

Judging by the heats last Saturday night this years Waterford Crystal Stake is going to take some winning.

Heat One was a real physical affair as the dogs drawn in the bottom half of the draw were all crowded at the first bend. The rails drawn Active Nikita (Spiral Nikita-Active Lynx) running for Cahir owner Michele Foley was left in the clear at this point from Tinrah Jack and with this order remaining unchanged for the duration of this heat 6/1 outsider Active Nikita proved two lengths to good for Tinrah Jack in 30.04.

Trap one also housed the winner of heat two as the Albert Draper owned Ballyveelish Jo (Mustang Jack-Odell Gold) 3/1 came from a near impossible position to get up close home posting a dramatic 29.99 victory. Owned by Peter and Desna Hattemore Harlenas Tom was in no mood to lose this heat and while Simply Supreme joined issue off the home turn Harlenas Tom boxed on with fierce determination to beat Simply Supreme by half a length in 30.10.

In heat four Minglers Honcho raced up with the pace but moving out off the opening two bends he forced a number of the runners to check. Staying wide and out of trouble the Thomas O'Donovan owned Drive On Lass (Toms The Best-High Way Lady) 4/1 rounded her field in clever fashion and sprinting clear Drive On Lass held at bay the challenge of a slow starting Dillrock Dot who tasted defeat by two and a quarter lengths in 30.01.

A good nights racing concluded with a graded 550. Having his first official outing over the track The John Doyle owned Kiltrea Court made no mistake from trap five leading early on from Genuinely Serious and maintaining a strong pace up front Kiltrea Court came home one and three quarter lengths clear of Genuinely Serious in 30.36. The winner is a February 2000 son of Whitefort Judge and Rumpoint Barbie and has finished in the money in fourteen of his seventeen races and his win tally now stands at seven.

Roddy Radiation, who started his career with one of Coventry's first punk bands, The Wild Boys and was part of The Specials as lead guitarist and writer of classic tracks such as: Concrete Jungle, Rat Race and Hey, Little Rich Girl is to play Davitts this week.

After the Specials' break up in 1981, Roddy formed The Tearjerkers with his brother, Mark and released the single, Desire Western Song to great critical acclaim. The band built up a pretty big fan base on the live circuit and stuck together until 1987.

Roddy's next band The Bonediggers released the LP, "Dedicated to those who've died trying and EP, De Angelo". They toured extensively throughout Europe and Japan and were extremely popular on the festival circuit.

Four of the original members of the Specials reformed in 1994 to work on a one-off project with Desmond Dekker of "Israelites" fame. This led to the band reforming permanently and releasing the albums: Today's Specials and Guilty 'Til Proven Innocent. Sell out tours of America, Europe and Japan followed until the group took an open ended break in 1998.

Roddy has continued to play live gigs and has made guest appearances with bands such as: The Starlite Junkees, Ska-Boom, The Splitters, El Pussycat Ska and Irish band The Wilnotts to name but a few.

Another sideline project is the hugely successful 2-Tone Collective band which sees Roddy performing on stage with fellow 2-Tone stars; Pauline Black (the selector) and Ranking Roger.

Most recent releases include; two CD's for Trojan Records, Skinhead Girl and Conquering Ruler. And most importantly, the self released Skabilly Rebel anthology CD for which a worldwide licensing deal is being sorted out with American label, Fiend Music.

His new band, the four piece Roddy Radiation & The Skabilly Rebels play a set incorporating tracks from Roddy's entire career from The Specials right through to the present. They are to play Davitts on Thursday (tomorrow) night.

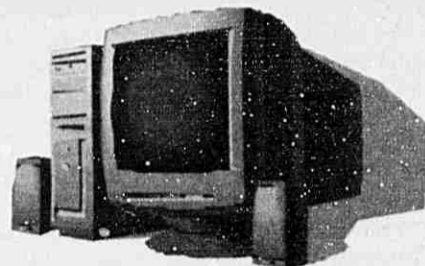

## Design Study Underway On Abbeyside Housing Development

A design study on the feasibility of building the first new Local Authority houses in Abbeyside for more than ten years, is being undertaken on a Waterford County Council land-bank in Murphy's Place.

The proposed three-house development, earmarked for senior citizens, is to be located on the derelict site beside the old railway track in Murphy's Place, adjacent to Sarsfield Street.

The site layout, which is being undertaken by the NBA, is to be presented to Dungarvan Town Council at the local authorities September meeting for approval, and will undergo public consultation including a public display phase.

Development of the two bedroom bungalows, is also said to have the twin aim of removing a derelict site and providing much needed housing for senior citizens in Abbeyside. The site itself had been subject to complaints from local residents about rat infestation and some anti-social behaviour, which led to calls for its clean up and development.

Cllr. Billy Kyne, confirming that a proposal had been put forward for the site, paid tribute to Dungarvan Town Council's Housing Officer, Joe O'Flaherty, for a project, which is set to further reduce the housing list.

He said the proposed development would provide a unique opportunity to provide local authority housing for those tenants who have a preference to stay in the Abbeyside area.

# Visit of Kathleen & May To Dungarvan Hailed As Tremendous Success

The visit of a 100ft schooner, The Kathleen and May, to Dungarvan harbour last weekend, generated huge interest, as the schooner built in 1900 docked on the quayside on Friday.

The cargo vessel, which had been a regular visitor to the town up until 1953, rounded the Cunnigar on Friday evening, and was escorted into the inner harbour by a large flotilla of local boats as well as the Helvick Head lifeboat. She was attended at the quayside by Mr. Sean Micheal Kelly and members of Helvick Head Coastguard. Having docked on the quayside, in excess of 1,200 people visited the vessel over the weekend, giving them a first hand view of the ships interior, and the conditions for those who had sailed her to the town in the thirties and forties.

Mayor, Cllr. Nuala Ryan, greeted the schooner and her crew of six, on the quayside along with members of Dungarvan Town Council, Town Engineer Dan Donovan and Tom Keith who were later escorted aboard by Captain Castle.

The three-masted schooner's visit, was the inspiration of three local men, Frank Shortall of Friars Walk, Michael Keane, Cloncoskeran, and Tom Walsh of Strandside South, who invited the schooner's owner, Steve Clarke, to bring the vessel to Dungarvan.

An RNLI roadshow as well as the ships own souvenir shop were also in operation during its historic visit to the town.

Town Mayor, Cllr. Nuala Ryan, who oversaw Dungarvan Town Council's civic welcome for Captain Castle, the crew and Steve Clarke said that the visit must have had a sense of coming home.

"It is only fitting that in a town which has had such a close relationship with, and such a great dependency on the sea for centuries, that the arrival of such a splendid and impressive ship should be marked in a fitting and formal manner," she said.

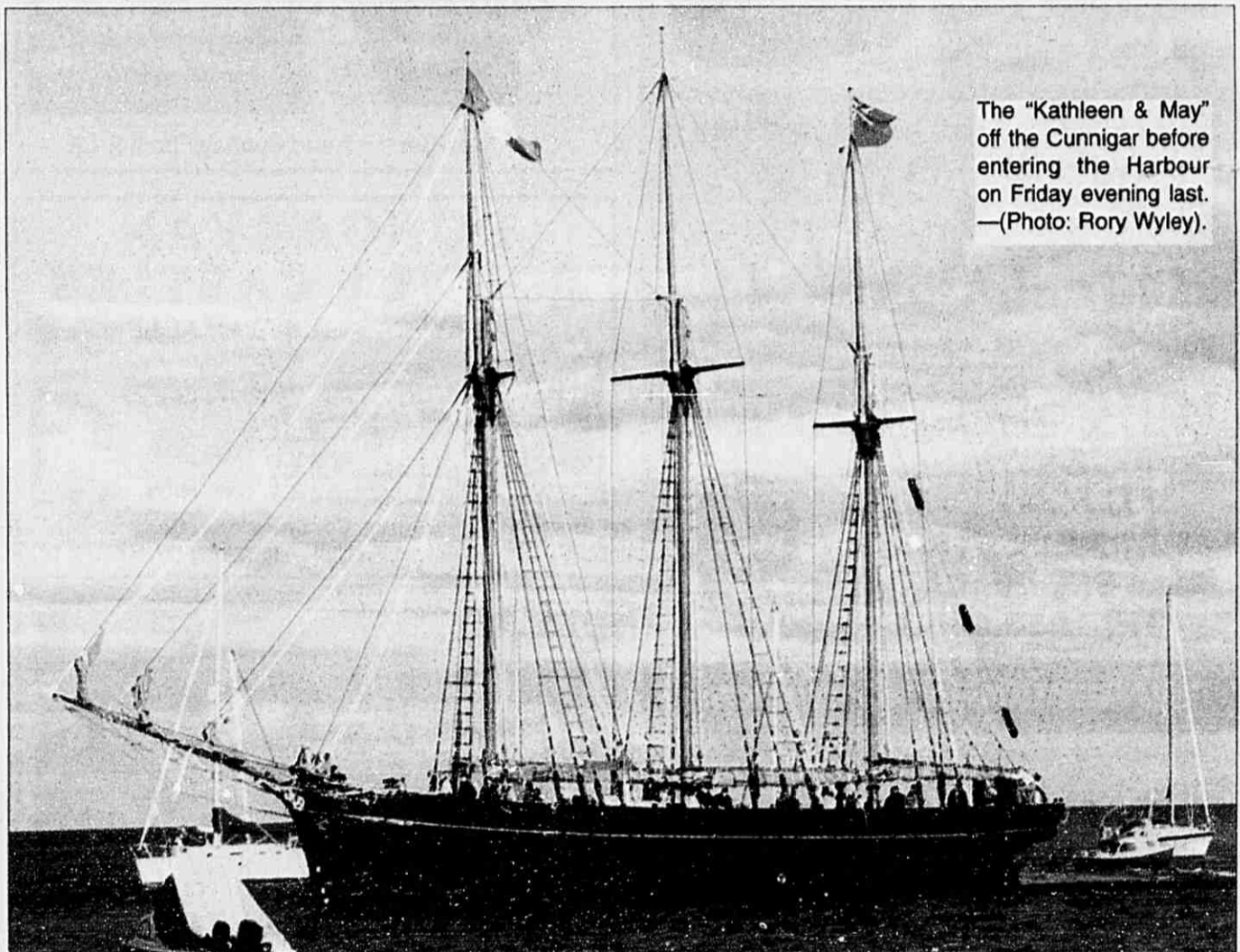
"While we cannot claim that Dungarvan was founded by a group arriving by sea, the history of the town has been marked by several significant arrivals, like this evening. Some of them from the seaward side, and not all of them as peaceful as the arrival of the Kathleen and May", she added.

Dungarvan's crest, the anchor and dolphin entwined, and the towns motto, are all indicative of the Maritime situation of the town, she went on to say.

"In this day and age of instant everything, of speedy communications, internet access and mobile phones, we were all pleased to be reminded by the stately arrival of The Kathleen and May, of a less hurried time, when she was a regular visitor to the town.

"It is a special moment for us to have her nestled again at the quayside, and we look forward to having her return again in the future", she said.

Tourism in Dungarvan has also been given a very welcome "and much needed

boost" in a tourist season, which has "proved very disappointing to say the least", Mayor Ryan speaking in her capacity as Director of Dungarvan Tourism added.

She also hoped that last weekends visit would be only the start of a relationship between the Kathleen and May and Dungarvan and looked forward for an early return for the vessel "to help foster what will prove to be a

blossoming relationship".

Captain Castle, said the visit was a culmination of four years restoration work, which had been carried out the Kathleen and May and said that visit was like a visit home for the vessel.

The schooner's owner, Mr.

Clarke, also thanked Dungarvan Town Council for the welcome afforded them in a short address adding that he was happy to bring the vessel back to a port it had visited in the past.

The Kathleen and May left the harbour again early on

Monday morning last at 8.30 and is bound for a return visit to Youghal, which had been her homeport for twenty-three years in the early part of the last century. Another, possibly longer visit, next year, is, meanwhile, already said to be in the pipeline.



