
Local students received extremely good results in this years Leaving Cert, with schools in the area reporting that they were very pleased with the outcome.



Preparation: 3 hours Cooking: 25 mins Ingredients

(Serves 4)

- 1.5kg chicken pieces
- 2 onions, finely chopped 50ml oil
- 1 x 5ml sp dried thyme
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 x 5ml sp paprika freshly ground black pepper
- 4 small courgettes
- 4 small tomatoes

REMOVE skin and bone from chicken pieces, using a small sharp knife. Cut meat into 2cm pieces. Place in a bowl with onions, oil, thyme, crumbled bay leaf, paprika, salt and pepper. Wash courgettes, trim ends and cut into 1cm pieces. Add to marinade and marinate for two to three hours.

Preheat grill. Drain chicken and courgettes, reserving marinade.



Peel tomatoes and cut in half, remove the seeds. Thread pieces of tomato, chicken and courgette alternatively onto four skewers,

dividing ingredients evenly between them. Place on grill rack, brush lib-

erally with marinade.

Sprinkle with a little paprika.

Grill for 20 minutes or until chicken is well cooked, lowering heat to moderate after five minutes and turning skewers to cook evenly.





Add the marrow with the remaining butter cut into small knobs and sprinkle it with the mixture of fresh, finely chopped herbs.

Season with salt and freshly ground pepper.

Cover the dish with a lid or foil and bake it in the centre of a preheated oven at approximately 180°C until just tender - after about 30

Be careful not to overcook. Serve the marrow at once, straight from the dish.

BLACK COHOSH

USES Menopausal symptoms

Black Cohosh is a member of the Buttercup family, originally used by the Native American Indians, who gave it the name 3Squaw

Root2, for its effect on normalising the female hormones. HOW IT WORKS It seems to act both directly on the tissues of the reproductive system and indirectly through the nervous system.

Black Cohosh contains several important constituents. One group of constituents acts to reduce the concentration of Lutenising Hormone, which in turn decreases the relative balance of progesterone in favour of the oestrogens. At the same time, another group has been found to act directly on oestrogen receptors.

The herb provides a natural source of salicylic acid. This accounts for some of the beneficial effects seen with painful menstruation during menopause. (Do not use Black Cohosh if allergic to Aspirin.)



MYTHS AND LEGENDS


MYTHS AND LEGENDS are tales of god and goddesses, monsters and heroes. The Phoenix was a mythical Greek bird, with shimmering feathers of gold and bright colours. Believed by some to have a life cycle of exactly 500 years, the phoenix is a symbol of immortality and renewal. When the old phoenix reached the end of its life, it would burn itself on a funeral pyre. A young bird would then rise from the flames in its place. The young Phoenix would fly with its father to the altar of the Sun God in the Egyptian city of the Sun, which the Greeks called Heliopolis.

The EPA's National Hazardous Waste Management Plan has recorded an increasing trend in the amount of hazardous waste generated in Ireland over the past few years. Hence, the need to counteract the trend. Because prevention is better than cure, the Council has produced a special information leaflet for householders that shows the alternatives that can be used for some of the toxic cleaning products. 



Give Your Plot A Bit Of Balance

MUCH admired by garden- centres and nurseries. They ers for their architectural value and long-term interest, ornamental trees and shrubs are excellent for forming the skeleton of a planting design.

In a mixed border they provide welcome solidarity and substance, balancing the softer pleasures provided by herbaceous plants.

Grouping evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs together also allows you to create an effective display all year round. Such a display also requires relatively little maintenance as well as giving a diversity of shapes and

A wide range of shrubs and ornamamental trees can be grown in most gardens even if the soil is not ideal. Some of the more popular ornamentals include japonica, lilac, laurel, fuchsia, rhododendron, yucca, abelia and acacia. But many of the rarer and less popular species can help liven up a dull garden.

Shrubs and trees may be bought direct from garden are usually sold in containers, either root-balled or bare-

Shrubs on sale should be accurately labelled, healthy, undamaged and free from pests or disease. Inspect the plant before buying and select a specimen with evenly distributed branches close to ground level. Some suppliers may give a guarantee to replace the shrub if it dies in killed. Autumn to spring is the develop before the roots esplanting season for both bare-root and root-balled shrubs. Planting in the autumn allows the root system to establish while the ground is still warm.

Planting may be carried out during mild weather in winter, but not when the ground is frozen. Roots will not grow in very cold soil and there is a risk they will be is that top growth is likely to

tablish, and if there is an early spell of dry weather the plants may need constant watering to survive.

The ground needs to be prepared well before planting by digging in a layer of well-rotted organic matter. Fertiliser can be added if appropriate. The hole for planting should be twice the width of the root mass. After planting water the shrub and mulch.

Newly-planted shrubs can be protected from the elements by hessian or wooden structures and an anti-transpirant spray can be applied to the leaves.

Established shrubs need watering only in periods of prolonged drought but young specimens usually need regular watering.

Most ornamental trees and shrubs benefit from regular applications of fertiliser. Mulching with well-rotted bulky manures helps the soil conserve moisture and inhibits weeds.



DISABILITY AWARENESS

FRIEDREICH'S ATAXIA WHAT IS FRIEDREICH'S ATAXIA?

Friedreich's Ataxia is a slowly progressive disorder of the nervous system and muscles. This disability was named after the physician who first identified it in the early 1860's results in inability to coordinate voluntary muscle movements (ataxia). Friedreich's Ataxia is caused by degeneration of nerve tissue in the spinal cord and of nerves that extend to peripheral areas such as the arms and legs. It also affects upper and lower limbs, and the head and neck. There is also a particular loss of the sensations of touch and pressure in the arms and legs. Unlike some neurological diseases, Friedreich's Ataxia does not affect mental capacity. This disability usually appears between the ages of five and fifteen, but it can be present as early as eighteen months old. This disability is uncommon and is inherited, it affects both male and females and no race is immune to it.

What are the symptoms of Friedreich's Ataxia?

Some of the symptoms of Friedreich's Ataxia are weakness in the legs, unsteadiness in standing, difficulties in walking, speech disturbance, sensory impairment, and as the disability progresses some people will develop curvature of the spine (this is due to the muscle weakening and the person developing scoliosis). The most serious symptom of this disability is cardiomyopathy, when the muscles of the heart gradually weaken causing irregularities in the heart rhythm.

What is the treatment and long-term prognosis of Friedreich's Ataxia?

Although there is no cure for this disability, many of the symptoms can be treated. Orthopaedic treatment can alleviate scoliosis (curvature of the spine), physical therapy and orthopaedic appliances can help with walking and standing. And it is important to remember that everyone with this disability is different, and the person may only have several symptoms, making a diagnosis very difficult, there is no way of knowing how fast degeneration will be. People with Friedreich's Ataxia can go on to lead full productive lives and are completely capable of studying, holding down a job and having children. The Science of Farming and Food Dairy: Building Up Grass Surplus

It is essential to build up grass surpluses in August and September. A grass surplus will provide two options: (a) extra grass for late silage for those farmers short of winter feed, and (b) extra grass for those farmers with dry land to extend the grazing season. This last option will allow farmers to claw back some of the money 'lost' so far this year. Research has shown that for every 3 hrs per day grazing in the Autumn, Spring and Autumn calvers give €1.22 and €0.96 per cow per day respectively more profit than if housed full time on silage. Weanlings would probably leave 40-62 cent / hd/day more profit by being at grass. This level of profit is surely worth looking for.

Grazing Acres Required

Decide on the number of grazing acres required for your herd during August-September. Use the following yardstick: 1 cow needs 0.8 acres, while one acre will feed 700kgs of cattle and one acre will feed 3 calves. Therefore, a farmer with 50 cows, 15 incalf heifers (400kgs) and 15 heifer calves requires 54 acres (approximately) to graze them for the next 2 months. Therefore, a 75 acre farmer will be able to free up 21 acres for late silage or preferably for grazing. At 6.5 tonnes/acre, this 21 acres would provide 136 tonnes of silage for the farmer who is short of silage.

For the farmer above who wants to extend his grazing season this 21 acres, if left 40 days to grow, will extend his grazing rotation for all stock in September by 11-13 days. I call this "3rd cut/graze".

When this field is being set-up in early August for silage cutting or grazing it should get 65-75 units of nitrogen at closing-up, having topped it tightly at the same time. 3rd Last Rotation

Your grazing rotation at this time of year is like trying to exit an 8-lane motorways - you must start getting into the correct lane from a good distance back. So make use of this rotation to set yourself up for next Spring's first rota-

In the spring, most farmers now graze 6-8 paddocks before grazing the silage ground and then finish off the paddocks. Therefore, the last autumn grazing, starting on the 6-10 October and finishing on 20th November will have to have the same sequence of grazing as that for Spring. So, 6-8 paddocks will be grazed in early October and then the silage ground up the 8-10th November and then the remainder of the paddocks. Think this sequence through for this 3rd last rotation.

Supposing your manager said to you that he would give you three choices of spreading 40 units/acre in August (a) 20 units after each of 2 grazings in August, (b) 40 units after the 1st grazing and none after second, or (c) 40 units after the last grazing. Which would you opt for? Definitely not (c) and research has shown that (b) would grow 10-15% more grass than (a). Try to have the grazing rotation at 25-28 days. **Suckler Cows**

Body condition may be below normal following the difficult year and earlier weaning will provide more time to put on condition before calving. This is especially important for cows calving early next year or for first or second calvers. Condition at housing will determine condition at calving next year which has a major effect on the cows ability to go back in calf next year. Approximately 6 - 8 weeks on reasonable autumn grass will allow a dry suckler to improve condition cheaply and significantly before housing

Extensification

The third date for extensification has been announced by the Department of Agriculture as Sunday 28th July 2002. Now we know the first three dates for 2002, these being 10th March, 19th May and 28th July. You should now complete the first three census counts for your farm and return your CEN 1 form to your local Department of Agriculture Offices. Considering the amounts of money involved for most farmers filling the CEN 1 form will be the best paying hours you will work all year.

missioner Fischler's CAP Review plan is to reduce the level of production of beef, sheepmeat and cereals in anticipation of future EU budget, Enlargement and WTO pressures. It is important to realize that if Irish agriculture is wound down, which is the objective of the "decoupling" proposal, there are serious knock-on implications for Ireland's rural economy.

IFA's analysis is that the CAP review proposals would reduce the volume of output in the sectors affected by over 20%, equivalent to €355m annually, and the income loss in the total agrifood sector would be close to €300m annually". This was stated by IFA President, John Dillon, speaking at the RDS Horse Show in Dublin today (Thursday August 8, 2002).

John Dillon said: "Lower agricultural production means a reduced demand for farm inputs and services, and less raw material for the food processing industry. At a time when rural Ireland is already under pressure, if €300m of spending power is taken out of the rural economy it will have a major impact on jobs and on the viability of our rural towns and villages. We estimate that it would mean 19,000 lost jobs in rural Ireland.

He said: "These farmers were just coming to grips with the requirements of the Agenda 2000 changes, but the Commission is now proposing the most radical of reforms to the CAP in its "decoupling" plan. It must not be forgotten that committed farmers are the mainstay of a modern Irish food industry and the main customer of the farm inputs and services sectors".

The IFA leader said that "decoupling" is an insidious plan because it may appear to some people to be positive but its purpose is to cut farm output. He said that this may be acceptable in other member states but in Ireland agriculture is still important to our rural economy. He added: "the Fischler proposals are not the end of the CAP reform agenda. The likely longer-term agenda of the Commission, in decoupling support from production, is to prepare the road for further winding down of direct payments over time".

Mr. Dillon concluded that the Agenda 2000 CAP Reform was agreed to run to the end of 2006. Such a fundamental new reform as now proposed by Commissioner Fischler is not justified by

et situation in the EU. The in this country and (iii) the Irish Government must reject extra cost to farmers in the the proposals on two grounds; they are not necessary, and they are bad for the Irish economy.

IFA Chief Economist Con Lucey, presenting his assessment of the potential losses from the Mid-term CAP review proposals at farm, food processing and farm input sectors said: "IFA estimates that the annual income loss at farm level would be about 150m due to a combination of output loss on suckler and sheep farms, the 20% cut in direct payments, and the cereals price cut. The likely impact of decoupling would be a 35% cut in the national suckler cow herd, a 32% cut in the national ewe flock and a 35% reduction in cereals production. The loss in terms of national agricultural output

is estimated at €355 annually. "As regards the 20% modulation, while the Commission argues that the budget savings from the direct payment cuts would be used to fund "rural development" measures, our view is that at least one-half of the loss would not be restored for three main reasons. These are (i) the

"prosperity clause" contained in the Fischler proposals which could militate against Ireland, (ii) the existing high uptake of the CAP

case of some proposed new measures e.g. animal welfare and the farm audits.

"In the food processing industry, the reduction in the volume of raw material amounting to €355m at farm-gate prices would reduce value-added by about €77m annually.

"Irish farmers purchase current inputs and services from other sectors of the economy valued at €2,270m annually. This includes feed, fertilizers, veterinary services, repairs and energy. In addition, annual capital investment, mainly farm buildings and machinery, has been about €730m annually and this would fall in line with the decline in agricultural output. The lower demand for these inputs and services would reduce value-added in these sectors by an estimated

Con Lucey concluded: "Based on a total income loss in the agri-food sector of €286m and taking average earnings of about €24,000, the total number of jobs under threat would be about 19,000, including those directly affected on farms and in food processing and farm inputs (12,000) and those whose jobs are dependent on the spending power of the primary sectors (7,000)".

In the late 1980's early 1990's he served as county chairman. John's philosophy as county chairman was if there was a problem - arrange a meeting with the relevant people and sit down with them and find a solution to the problem. He really enjoyed helping individuals who had problems and many a time steered people to ICMSA to have their case followed

John won an all Ireland hurling medal with Co Waterford in the 1948 final and had a keen interest in hurling. He was a model farmer and will be sadly missed by all who knew him.

ICMSA would like to extend their sympathy to his wife Maudie, sons Ger and Sean, daughter Margaret, brothers, sister and extended family members. May he rest in peace.

ACTION MUST BE TAKEN ON INSURANCE COSTS

"The Government must take immediate action to address the spiralling cost of insurance and the impact these increases are having on all sectors of the economy. The commitments in the Programme for Government must be introduced to cut the price of insurance", said Mr. John O'Connor, Chairperson of ICMSA's Farm Services & Environment Committee.

Mr. O'Connor said: "The increased costs in the farming sector will run to tens of millions in 2002. Not only are farmers suffering due to increases to their own insurance premiums, but they are also suffering from increases in the input supply sector and food processing sector as insurance hikes are passed on. In the food processing sector alone, insurance costs will be some ?46 million higher in 2002. Such an increase is simply unacceptable and unsustainable". "The analysis has been done and the proposals have been put forward, they must now be implemented immediately to bring insurance premiums back to a reasonable level," concluded Mr. O'Connor.

BEEF INTERVENTION SALES SHOULD BE SUSPENDED Mr. John O'Leary, Chairperson of ICMSA's Beef & Cattle Committee said that the sales of beef from intervention should be suspended indefinitely until such time as beef prices return to a profitable level for Irish farmers.

Mr. O'Leary said: "The EU Commission are expected to release around 50,000 tonnes of beef into the market this year and this may undermine the market for Irish cattle and has and will also be used as an excuse by meat processors to cut the price of cattle.

"Farmers have seen prices plummet over the past two months and the inaction of the Minister for Agriculture & Food has been shocking. Market supports have not been improved, no new markets have been opened and no direct aid has been made available to farmers in what has been an extremely dif-

"The bad weather has been bad enough but the drop in the price of cattle has been the last straw".

This booklet has a dark grey cover and was published by the Irish and Overseas Publishing Company Ltd. Dublin and was printed by The Kerrytd, Tralee definite date of publication but having read the booklet it seems to come from the late 1950's. The booklet is in very good condition and does carry a large number of advertisements of that era. LOCAL HISTORY

Dungarvan almost became the first small Irish town to have a public water supply. In 1750 the Irish Parliament gave a grant of £800 to Dungarvan to bring water from the River Finisk to the town. The water was to be carried in the old roman style in aqueducts. The work began on the 7th August, 1756 and was completed on January 1st, 1758 and 488 workmen were employed on the scheme.

The water supply never reached Dungarvan. Disputes about rights of way and other legal matters put an end to this unusual and far-seeing scheme. People had to depend, as before, on the water collected in barrels from the roofs. For safe drinking water they used copious supplies from the "Springs" at Springmount which was broubarrels each day and sold to the townspeople in the streets

then and for many years.

After 1761 the landlords began to encourage farmers to practise, land-enclosure. They rented land to them, which they were to enclose with a fence and then they were free to divide it into small fields. This was widely resented by those who had use of the unfenced parklands for grazing. It resulted in the foundation of the Whiteboys in County Tipperary and this agrarian organisation soon spread to County Waterford. Fences were levelled at night. In County Waterford the Whiteboys were known as "Sive Oultagh's Society", the society of savage Sive, a female mythical personage. Oaths were forced on people to support the movement. Those who did not accept the landenclosures condemned their descendants to being farm labourers - not always a happy state of affairs. Thus began the wild and bloody formation of Irish agriculture, which has left its mark on the Irish landscape with a patchwork pattern of fields over the countryside.

W&SVR Heritage Railway Enjoy **Bumper Crowds**

The W&SVR Heritage Railway is proving to be a fantastic success. All scheduled trips have been filled to capacity on each day of operation. So much so the timetable has been revised to allow for an extra trip each day. The railway, which opened to the public on the August Bank Holiday weekend, will operate each Saturday and Sunday until Sunday 1st September. The new schedule allows for a fourth trip each day. The new timetable is 1.45pm, 2.45pm, 3.45pm and 4.45pm.

Maria Kyte, Business Development Manager for the project is delighted with the response from the public to the project. "It is wonderful to see the reaction on the children's faces when they hear the Clickitty, Clack of the wheels and then see the train approach the station." Maria said, "The enthusiasm the volunteer crew have for the railway is evident and their efforts have been rewarded by the number of people who have gone out to experience the train

journey. The spontaneous round of applause from passengers at the end of the trip says it all."

Passengers board the train at the Old Station at Kilmeaden. They then journey on 6km of narrow gauge (3ft) track in along the Suir Valley enjoying spectacular views of the River Suir, Mount Congreve Estate and across to South County Kilkenny. The train journey at 15 km an hour and takes approximately 45 minutes to return to the station.

Tickets may be purchased on the day of operation at Kilmeaden Station from 1pm onwards. They are very reasonable with prices ranging from €5.00 per adult, €3.00 per child and €12.00 for a family of 2 adults and up to 3 children. Students and Pensioners are €3.80. There are only two weekends left and they are in demand so it is advisable to come early to ensure a seat.

This particular branch of the line closed to passengers in 1967. It re-opened in 1970 to facilitate trains carrying magnesite and oil to serve the newly opened mine in Ballinacourty. This traffic lasted until 1982, however trains ran on the track up until 1987 as they sprayed the track. This is the first time paying passengers travelled this route in 25 years.

THE KATHLEEN & MAY

The weekend of 9-11 August saw the arrival in Dungarvan harbour of the Kathleen & May, a three mast merchant schooner. Restoration of the ship started in 1998. She was originally built at Connah's Quay on the Dee estuary in north Wales, and was built by Ferguson and Baird. She was a wooden vessel, built for the

local firm of Coppack Brothers & Co. at a cost of £2,700 and launched in 1900. She is approximately 100 feet in length, weighed 136 tonnes and was capable of transporting 250

The emblem on her stem head incorporated the shamrock, thistle, leek-leaf and rose. The original name of the ship was the Lizzie May. However this name changed to its current name in 1908 on its sale to Martin J. Fleming of Youghal. She was involved in transporting bulk cargo around the British coast.

Her first commercial voyage was under Captain Tom Hughes. Between 1908 and 1931 she operated out of Youghal under the captaincy of Joe Aherne of Youghal. She was now mostly concerned with the transportation of coal from Britain to Irish ports. Her last cargo

under sail alone was in 1931. She was then bought by Captain Tommy Jewell and his father William, of Appledore, for the sum of £700. They had an engine installed.

Her first visit to Dungarvan was in 1934 and her last in 1953 with regular visits within this period. The Kathleen & May and another ship, the Irene were the last working examples of wooden sailing ships. She carried her last cargo in September 1960, and was sold in early 1961 for £4000. She changed hands on several occasions after this, until Captain Paul Davis bought her in 1966. However he was unable to afford the repairs. In 1970 she was acquired by the Maritime Trust and restored to her former



HOLIDAY CLUBS

The European Consumer Centre (ECC) gives advice to those travelling abroad this summer who might feel tempted to join Holiday Clubs.

Holiday Clubs offer luxury holidays at knock down prices. The membership cost anywhere between E 3,000 and E 20,000 and is presented as an investment with the membership fee redeemable after the end of the contract.

Generally, holidaymakers are approached on the beach or street in Spain or Portugal. They are given a scratch card and are told they have won a free holiday or a bottle of champagne. They are then invited to a presentation to receive their prize where they are often bullied into signing a Holiday Club contract. Persuasive techniques are used such as serving alcohol and food, keeping couples apart and using children to encourage parents to sign up.

The ECC has dealt with cases where they have found the following problems have arisen after the contract has been signed: Holidays are not always available: Flights depart from the UK: Prices quoted are in Sterling.

When holidays are available they are substandard and are more expensive than those available through ordinary travel agents.

Extra charges are added to renew membership annually No cooling-off period or cancellation clauses apply

If a consumer tries to withdraw from the contract they receive threatening letters. The company's name is not always given in the contract. It is impossible to reclaim your 'investment' when your contract is over.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I believe the income limits for third level grants have increased. Can you give the details?

ANSWER

The Higher Education Grants Scheme provides means tested grants to eligible students who are pursuing approved courses. The grant is paid by your local authority. For the academic year 2002/2003 the application must have been with the local authority by Friday, August 30th, 2002.

The scheme has been extended to full-time students who are attending medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine and teacher training courses in publicly funded third-level institutions in other EU Member States.

People's lives are put at risk every time the River Tar floods, trapping some thirty people in their homes, this is according to a protest group that are pleading with South Tipperary County Council to take some action to alleviate their plight. People living in the Curragh just outside the thing or what if some of the village of Goatenbridge expressed their concern over the delay by the County Council in dealing with this serious matter, despite a long standing assurance that this work would be carried out. When the River Tar floods people who live in this area put their lives at risk trying to drive on flooded roads, because the Council has failed to carry out any improvement work on an alternative route that would bring those residents into Goatenbridge. This road between the entrance of the Curragh and Goatenbridge floods many times in the year and residents want the County Council to take immediate action that would allow those people to use the alternative route to Goatenbridge. At present this alternative route is impassable, children can-residents said that numerous not be brought to school and requests had been made to

people cannot go to work. People are forced to use the flooded road, but it is most dangerous and people have to be towed out of the flood on a regular basis. Are the Council waiting for somebody to be swept away in the river before they do someelderly people living in the area need urgent medical treatment when this river is in flood. A spokesperson for South Tipperary County Council, states that those residents were invited to apply for a community scheme whereby the locals would carry out some of the work on alternative routes and the Council would do the remaining work. An application had not yet been made. It was the intention of the Council to carry out work if not at the end of this year then it will definitely be done next year on this section of the road that floods. 



EU Protection Of Postal Services Urged

A Waterford County Councillor has said that the future of post offices in Ireland and postal services all across Europe should be protected.

Cllr. Fiachra Ó Céilieachair says there should be no diminution of such basic public services, which he says are essential to local community infrastructure in both urban and rural parts of County Waterford. Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said that the Government should remain vigilant about discussions taking place at European Commission level aimed at encouraging the pri-

Internal Market Commissioner Frederik Bolkstein came forward with a draft Directive in May seeking such reforms, a move opposed in the European Parliament by Cllr. Ó Céilleachair's party colleague, Proinsias De Rossa MEP.

"Postal services are of vital importance to Ireland and to the rest of Europe. They employ 1.7 million people, carry 135 billion separate items a year, and generate a turnover of over 76 billion Euro or 1.4% of Europe's total GDP.

"The post office and the postal service is crucial to the vitality and viability of rural and sparsely and disadvantaged urban areas. They also play a major social role in the

community."

"There is still the danger at EU administrative level that thinking could put all of this at risk. Everyone sees the need to modernise our postal services and to prepare them for the challenges of the information age but a more gradual opening-up is what is required in order to safeguard the jobs of thousands of postal workers in Europe and to protect and improve the quality of postal services offered in peripheral

Last March, Taoiseach Bertie
Ahern and other Government
leaders called at the European
Council for rapid liberalisation
of the European postal service.
One hopes that this does not
mandate Commissioner
Bolkestein's drive to liberalise
a basic service to our detriment.

The Turf Club stewards were quite happy to leave racing continue and the horses came into the parade ring for the fourth race. It was only when a number of the senior jockeys protested that the Stewards woke up to the fact that the track was unsafe and a serious accident was in the offing. The meeting was then called off but punters were not refunded their admission price as the mandatory three races were run off. True the track was slippy after overnight rain but the layout of the track left no room for horses to maneuver around the turn past the stand. This meeting should have been

a farce as the vast majority of the riders Their objective for the afternoon was to get around in one piece. The ride that Etak received in the flat contest was disappointing to say the least. He was a stretch but was only beaten six lengths at the winning line. On reflection however his young pilot must have been terrified riding around in this race having seen the horses come down in the opening hurdle race. This meeting was transmitted live throughout Ireland and the UK and presenters on the British produced Racing Channel expressed their amazement as to how racing was allowed continue after the second race.

Day Two - It was a transformed racecourse on Friday. The sun shone brightly and after some work on the first bend where the running rail was totally changed in its layout racing went ahead under glorious conditions where happily everything went off without any problems and the track rode perfectly.
