JNLR Again

For the third survey in succession WLRfm has made substantial gains in the Joint National Radio Listenership survey each day in Waterford 59% of all adults tune to WLRfm - an increase of 7% year on year. In the Waterford area, Radio One attracts 20% of all adults, 2 fm 28% and To-day fm 16%.

WLRfm also increased its share of radio listening - each day in Waterford 54% of all radio listening is to WLRfm. 16% to Radio I and 15% to 2 fm, while To-day fm has a mar-

Students Concerned Over 3rd Level Fees -CLLR. Ó CÉILLEACHAIR

for Education intends to reintroduce fees for third level education is an issue of concerns to young people and their families throughout Co. Waterford, many of whom have only last week confirmed CAO offers.

That's according to Labour Party County Councillor Fiachra Ó Céilleachair, who has said that Minister Noel Dempsey recent comments on the subject does little to assure students as to whether or not they will be paying fees within a year. Cllr. O Céilleachair and the Labour Party will oppose the re-introduction of college fees, if that is what Minister Dempsey decides after his recently announced review of such issues.

Speaking on the subject, Cllr. Ó Céilleachair said: The fees were abolished by Labour in Government in 1996, and this has given huge financial relief to thousands of students from families of PAYE workers. The timing of this revelation on fees by the Minister is irresponsible, coming as it does at a time when many students

Whether or not the Minister families will make life-altering decisions. They now have a cloud hanging over them, in that they are unsure whether they will have to pay fees, possibly from next year. I hope this does not put many students off pursuing a course they had previously considered, because of financial worries.

"This is nothing short of a threatened tax on third level education, designed to raise money for a Government that has made a mess of the economy. Students have already been hit by a 70% hike in college registration fees, while rents and the cost of living for students spiral out of control.'

"If the Minister for Education wants to do more about ending educational disadvantage, he would do well to implement recommendations of the recent Action Group on Access to Third Level Education. Of the over 70 recommendations in that report, very few have been acted upon by Government. He would be better employed using this report as a basis for action rather than threatening students with a in consultation with their tax on third level education".

John Hearne was born in Waterford in 1893 and educated at Waterford CBS. He then went to UCD. On completion he studied for the priesthood at Maynooth. However after a few years he abandoned this and studied for the bar at King's Inns. Soon after completing these studies he was appointed assistant parliamentary draftsman. Hearne held this position between the years 1923-29. In the years 1926, 1929 and 1930 he was legal adviser to the Irish delegation at the Imperial Conferences. He gained international recognition as an authority on constitutional law. Between 1929 and 1937 he was legal adviser to the Department of External Affairs. In 1935 De Valera employed him to draft the new Constitution for the State. As recognition of his work on the Constitution, Hearne was called to the inner bar in 1939. He became high commissioner to Canada between 1937 and 1950. Between 1950 and 1960 he was U.S. ambassador. John Hearne died in 1969.






A CUNNING TRICKSTER





Carole Appeals For Farm Machinery for Bosnia

It is now five years or more conflict. He now has an Irish since the end of the war in Bosnia, but like any other land devastated by conflict, life has yet to return to anything near normality.

Not alone do the people there have to come to terms with the loss of hundreds of thousands of war victims, many of them killed in massacres which are only now being discovered, but they have to try to rebuild the infrastructure deliberately wrecked in a policy of total destruction.

One such town to have suffered is Caplina, a community of about 12,000 souls, who have been trying to reconstruct their town, an almost impossible task without resources and even the most basic of tools. It was a town with a notorious concentration camp during the war, something which has left an indelible mark on the minds of the population, struggling to drag themselves back into the twenty-first century.

It was only quite recently that the land-mines were cleared so that the farmland could be worked again, but the absence of a tractor, farm machinery or hand tools has made the task almost impossible.

Sveto Boljivic is a Bosnian who came to Cork during the war as a result of the efforts of Carole Wiley, the Carrigaline woman who gathered many container loads of aid and supplies and sent them to the Mostar / Caplina area during the worst years of the passport and, as an engineer, is teaching in the Cork Institute of Technology.

He has just returned from a visit to Bosnia where he saw first hand the difficulties the people face in trying to rebuild their lives. He promised to help all he could and made contact with Carole Wiley, now a successful Financial Consultant with Acorn Life in Cork City. Together they are making an appeal to the people of the areas who helped so much during the war, for help to put the town of Caplina back on its feet and help to feed the population who see the land lying idle for the want of a tractor and tools.

"I am appealing to the many groups around Waterford and Cork who were so good during the war, to once more give a little assistance to the needy people of Bosnia," says Carole. "This is a once-off appeal, I am not looking for an on-going commitment. There must be farm implements and out of date machinery out there, which are still in good working order and which would make tilling the land a great deal easier for the people of Caplina. Perhaps those groups and individuals who were so generous in the past would hold just one modest fund-raising event to help stock and send out a container-load of implements."

Carole has also acquired a large number of beds which

she is sending to the orphanage there, which is helping to take care of some of the very many children left without parents after the war. "Parents have been forced to put their children into orphanages as they cannot afford to feed them," says Carole, a situation which is almost incredible almost within sight of the border of the wealthy EU.

After the end of the war, Carole continued for some time to send the aid which was generously donated and collected all around the country. With her loyal band of volunteers, she undertook in 1998 to finance and prophase one of a sewerage on (087) 7800187.

Carole now feels that she cannot turn her back on a legitimate appeal from suffering people and is confident that the farmers and other good people of Munster will respond to her appeal on their behalf.

Dungarvan Leader Gardening

The Greenest Grass at Home

AGOOD lawn takes years avoid mowing too closely. of care and nurturing to achieve. With plenty of time almost any garden can have a lawn fit to bowl on.

But it is far more than simply a case of weed, feed and mow. Here are a few tips on how to cope with everyday lawn problems.

Drought

Symptoms - Yellowish brown patches develop through the lawn and in extreme cases the whole area may become discoloured. The damage usually occurs in late spring or summer. The problem is caused by dry weather and inadequate watering. Free-draining sandy soils are most at risk.

Control - Water regularly in the early evening providing enough water for deep penetration. To improve drought resistance feed regularly and leave cut grass on the lawn if drought conditions are forecast. Allow the grass to grow fairly long and

Symptoms - Lawns and

and the right sort of attention, other grassed areas are dug up, fouled or scorched with

Control - Areas visited consistently by cats should be regularly watered and netting can also be used to protect plants and lawns. Repellent substances based on pepper-dust, naphthalene or aluminium ammonium sulphate are available but these often fail to give more than temporary protection.

Dollar spot

Symptoms - Small strawcoloured patches appear in the autumn. At first they are small but the patches join together to form larger patches. They darken with age. The disease appears mainly in mild damp weather and is caused by the fungus sclerotinia homeocarpa.

Control - Improve soil aeration and remove thatch. Treat the area with a suitable

fungicide such as benomyl, carbendazim or thiophanatemethyl.

Leather jackets

Symptoms - Brown patches appear in the lawn in midsummer and maggots are sometimes visible. The problem is caused by the larvae of the crane-fly which feed on the grass roots. They are greyish-brown maggots up to 1.5 inches long.

Control - Soak affected areas of the lawn with water and cover with sacking or black plastic sheeting for a day to bring the leatherjackets to the surface. They can then be removed and killed. Use carbaryl against newly hatched larvae in mid-autumn. Problems are worse following a wet autumn.

Algae and gelatinous

Symptoms - Slippery areas of green or greenish-black form on the surface of the lawn. The problem is caused by gelatinous lichens and algae which are particularly common on poorly drained

Control - Try to improve the drainage and also aerate the lawn. Prune back any trees or shrubs which overhang the area creating shaded damp sections. Apply any standard lawn care products that contain dichlorophen.

Red thread

Symptoms - Tiny pale pink and red threads of fungus develop on small patches of grass. These later become bleached. The problem is caused by the fungus Corticium fuciforme which is common after heavy rain. It is also troublesome when the soil is nitrogen deficient or poorly aerated.

Control - Improve turf maintenance by aerating, scarifying and feeding as necessary. Fungicides should not be necessary on a wellkept lawn but where the problem is severe use benomyl, thiophanate-methyl or carbendazim.

BATHING WATER TEST RESULTS Stradbally Tourism & En-

terprise Group have been testing the river water and bathing area in the Sea at Stradbally Cove since early Summer to monitor increasing pollution levels from raw sewage which is discharged into the Tay river at the Cove.

Test results for the week of August 9th are as follows; River water above bridge; Faecal coliforms 21,000, Faecal Streptococci 1,700. River water below sewage discharge pipe; Faecal coliforms 6,000, Faecal Streptococci 1,700. Sea Water; Faecal Coliforms 3, 700, Faecal Streptococci 200.

Test results for the week of August 16th are as follows; River water; Faecal Coliforms 1,000, Faecal Streptococci 300. Sea water; Faecal Coliforms 200, Faecal streptococci <100. Irish bathing water regulations stipulate maximum safety parameters to be sea water containing up to 1.000 Faecal coliforms and up to 300 Faecal streptococci, the safety levels for freshwater is lower.

TERFORD IFA NEWS

SUSPENDING HIS OWN **DEADLINE IS ONLY** FOR MINISTER ON DEADLOCKED DAIRY HERD CERTIFICATION - MURPHY

IFA National Dairy Committee Chairman Michael Murphy has called on Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to suspend the 31st December 2002 deadline for signature of Dairy Herd Certificates. He said that while the need for certification originated in EU legislation, the deadline had been set by the Department of Agriculture, and could be changed if the need arose which it evidently did now.

"The onus is on the Minister to suspend the deadline, and then make sure that this scheme is run smoothly, and that every farmer has the opportunity to have his Cert signed at the same time as his next annual TB herd test," Michael Murphy said.

"The scheme is currently deadlocked, and no farmer can get a Certificate signed, due to the lack of co-operation by the vets. The Minister cannot allow the dairy industry to be held to ransom, with over 60 to 70% of TB tests already done at farm level," Michael Murphy said.

"The IFA Dairy Committee has always held the view that, where farmers have done their homework by filling in eartag numbers in the appropriate form, and by having all legally required paperwork uptodate and available for inspection on the farm, having the vet sign the Cert at the same time as he/she does the annual TB test makes most economic sense, and involves minimal additional work," he added.

"Common sense must pre-

vail. Let us not forget that, after initial teething difficulties, the scheme ran reasonably smoothly three years ago. There is absolutely no reason why it would not operate just as simply this time around," he concluded.

IFA SUBMITS POSITION ON NITRATES **DIRECTIVE TO** MINISTER CULLEN

IFA President, John Dillon has submitted IFA's position on the EU Nitrates Directive to Minister for the Environment, Martin Cullen, in advance of talks with Government on the implementation of Action Programmes required under the 1991 EU Directive.

Commenting on the IFA position, Mr. Harry Gray, Waterford IFA Chairman said: "Irish farmers are committed to clean water and protecting water quality. However, if we are to achieve the central goal of the Nitrates Directive of clean water, all sectors of the economy must play their part, measured against an accurate scientific baseline of nutrient loadings, including natural background levels. Farmers cannot be expected, or required, to make any more than their fair contribution under EU and national legislation.'

Mr. Gray highlighted the massive, and on-going, investment that has taken place in environmental protection on farms. He said: "Over €2 billion has been spent since 1990 on farm buildings and their associated manure storage facilities. Over this same period, grant support amounted to just €310 million, or 15% of this total.

For many farm families, any requirement to improve

will threaten their economic viability. There must be greater financial support for this work than has been the case up to now."

Mr. Gray also called for a central role for Teagasc in the State's response to the requirements of the Nitrates Directive. He said: "Teagasc must be directed to adopt a central supporting role in assessing the socioeconomic implications and advising individual farmers on Good Agricultural Prac-

IFA WELCOMES NEW PLANNING REGS SUPPORTING RURAL HOUSING

Commenting on reports in Monday's (19th Aug) Irish Examiner quoting Community, Rural and Gaeltacht Affairs Minister Eamon O'Cuiv that new planning regulations are to be contained in the National Spatial Strategy, Waterford IFA Environmental Committee Chairman Gerry Murphy said: "Rural communities will welcome the opportunity for rejuvenation in new planning regulations which will lift the ban on housing in rural areas."

He said: "The blanket approach from local authorities to rural housing is unfair and has contributed to rural population decline. In particular farm families have been experiencing the brunt of this planning approach where their grown up children have been prevented from living on the home farm."

"This new approach would recognise the nature of rural community based on the town land rather than high density housing in towns and villages.

Mr Murphy said that he did

or increase manure storage not expect new planning regulations to be carte blanche for housing generally. He said that controls would still be necessary to ensure a consistent approach to housing design, location, road safety and proper design of wastewater treatment.

DILLON TELLS MINISTER WALSH TO **DIRECT HIS OFFICIALS** TO STOP THREATENING SHEEP FARMERS

IFA President John Dillon has called on the Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to direct his officials to stop threatening sheep farmers over their ewe premium payments and instead to get on with the job of clearing up the mess they have created over the unworkable sheep register.

Mr Dillon dismissed out of hand the threatening noises from unnamed Department of Agriculture officials saying that they had no right to make the ewe premium payment conditional on their complex and unworkable sheep register when last years simple register would suffice under the ewe premium regulation.

The IFA President said the continual denials from the Department of Agriculture regarding the problems flock owners are encountering with the complex sheep register and reconciliation system are a reflection of how far removed from reality they are in their assessment of the real situation with sheep farmers on the ground.

SOUTHEAST ICMSA NEWS

POSITIVE COMMENTS ON RURAL HOUSING WELCOME

Mr. Maurice Harvey, Chairperson of ICMSA's Rural Development Committee welcomed the comments by the Minister for Rural, Community & Gaeltacht Affairs, Mr. Eamon Ó Cuiv, that there will be no ban on one-off housing in the forthcoming National Spatial Strategy.

Mr. Harvey said: "This is a very positive development and is needed if we are to stimulate the regeneration of coun-

Policymakers have a choice, a countryside where young families live, a vibrant countryside with a sustainable population to maintain essential services. The alternative is a countryside devoid of young people, suffering from rural depopulation and the loss of essential services.

Such a scenario must not be allowed to develop and the only solution is to allow young people to build houses in their country areas.

The An Taisce solution is a non-runner and will not solve the problem of rural decline which must be immediately tackled".

Planning policy, Mr. Harvey said, has a key role to play in the regeneration of rural areas. People living in rural Ireland are always bemused at the concerns expressed by so-called environmentalists about rural housing, said Mr. Harvey. Where were these people and their organisations when there was very poor housing and rural decay and derelict sites in both towns and in the countryside as part of rural Ireland.


ICMSA, Mr. Harvey said, feels that there is a compelling economic, social and regional advantage to allow rural housing to develop to meet demand consistent with all such developments meeting the strict planning laws now in place which include environmental protection measures.

Mr. Harvey said that he is looking forward to the publication of the National Spatial Strategy and said he hoped that it would introduce a policy framework for the regeneration of rural areas.

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

A couple of my workmates are about to receive long service awards. Will they have to pay tax on the awards?

ANSWER

Where awards are made to employees or directors as testimonials to mark long service, such awards are normally taxable. If your colleagues, therefore receive the awards in the form of cash, vouchers, bond, etc. they are liable for tax.

Where, however, the awards takes the form of tangible articles, such as a watch or an ornament of reasonable cost, no tax will be charged provided that certain conditions are met. These conditions were revised as of the 1st January, 2002 and are as follows:

The cost to the employer must not exceed €50 (was £15) for each year of service.

The award must be in respect of a period of service of not less than 20 years.

No similar award should have been made to the recipient within the previous 5 years (was 10 years).

Environment Today

Have we seen the last of plastic bags?

Since the introduction of the 15c levy on plastic shopping bags in March last there has been a 90% reduction in the provision of these bags at points of sale. This represents a significant reduction waste generation considering that over 1.2 billion plastic bags were provided free to the public last year. The levy has generated 3.5 million in the first 4 months of the levy and it is estimated that if current trends continue over the full 12-month period, the levy will realise over 10 million. This money will be ring fenced and used for environmental projects.

The levy was to be imposed on all plastic bags and the change in peoples behaviour is most apparent in supermarkets, where most people now bring their own shopping bags. Supermarkets have supplied a range of different types of reusable bags and plastic shopping bags have vanished from most checkouts. What have started to appear more regularly since the introduction of the levy are the rolls of small bags meant for fruit and veg. These are exempt from the levy but only if they are used for loose fruit and veg or for meat fish and dairy products. If these bags are filled with anything other than this then the 15c levy should be applied.

Another area where there seems to me some slippage is in some clothes, books, and music shops. While many have replaced their plastic bags with paper bags some seem to be slipping back.

The Minister for the Environment, Martin Cullen, has said that the one of the options for the Environment Fund is the establishment of a new Office for Environmental Enforcement.

This office will implement the various aspects of waste leg-

islation including the enforcement of the plas-

The All-Ireland Anti-Litter League



Cutbacks by Default?

Waterford Disability Network (P.W.D.I.) has carried out a survey into the Services provided by Community Care in the Waterford area, for people with disabilities. We contacted all the special schools in Waterford City and County and spoke to the Principals who all agreed that Services were practically non-existent. All the Principals stated that they have not had the services of a Speech Therapist for over a year; this is in schools where children are in need of Speech Therapy for their social and educational development.

Other services such as Social Workers are also lacking, a few of the Principals stated that if they have an emergency in the school, and they need make contact with a Social Worker, it can be very difficult, as they only get an answering machine, and noone ever calls back. This leaves the school teachers and Principal having to cope with difficult situations, when Social Workers should be dealing with these problems.

There is a long list of people waiting to be assessed by the Occupational Therapist for Disabled Housing Grants and for wheelchairs and disability aids and appliances. The Occupational Therapy Services are non-existent at present, if a person tries to contact the O/T department they are told they will have to wait indefi-

nitely. This is making people with disabilities feel isolated and frustrated, and making them prisoners in their own homes in the 21st Century.

There are families in the Waterford City and County area waiting to be assessed for Autistic Spectrum Disorders, these assessments are not being carried out at present because Waterford Community Care do not have the adequate services to support these children, when they are diagnosed. These families are left completely isolated, without any support and have to cope on their own. These families are in desperate need of respite care, and support, but there are only five beds in the city, with a waiting list of over 150 clients. The County has only two beds available for people with Learning Disabilities; there is only one emergency bed available between the City and the County.

It seems that job satisfaction and motivation is at at all time a low in the Therapy Department of the South Eastern Health Board. Maybe the time has come take these Therapies out of the Health Board control and put them in the Department of Education or Social Community & Family Affairs, as these are Social issues rather than Medical. As a society we owe this to these children so they can reach their full potential and for older people, who need some Respect and Dignity in their lives.

Waterford Disability Network have brought this situation to the attention of the Taoiseach, and his relevant Ministers, our local T.D.s and the S.E.H.B. at the beginning of June 2002, and we have not received any positive indication that this situation is going to improve in the near future.







MINOR CUP FINAL LISMORE v UNIVERSITY OF LIMERICK, HARLEQUIN PARK

Lismore Cricketers Win Winor Cup



In this summer of poor weather it was fortunate that this game could be played at all even though weather conditions were far from ideal, with a very strong and cold wind blowing from the city end throughout the day. Indeed so strong was the wind that the bails were removed from the stumps at both ends. The rain during the week meant that the artificial pitch was used instead of the prepared grass wicket. This led to an exciting game with high, scoring on both sides but a good allround team performance with bat, ball and in the field eventually saw Lismore emerging victors by 47 runs, a comfortable margin of victory in the end but the outcome was in some doubt until I the final overs.

Lismore, winning the toss and choosing to bat, got off to the worst possible start when David Campion was bowled leg stump by the first ball of the match. Tim Jackson then joined David Ind at the crease and took 6 runs off the remaining balls of the over. Jackson looking in good form, quickly reaching I I with some delightful shots, including two 4s and it came as somewhat of a surprise when he was out, well caught at backward point by David Lynch off a delightful square cut which he just failed to keep down. Mark Taylor replaced list and with the score 18 for 2 the game was delicately poised. However, Mark quickly indicated his intentions with sonic sparkling shots, being particularly severe on anything short or overpitched and with David Ind playing a fine supporting role blocking the better balls and putting the bad ones away\,. the scoring rate never dropped below 5 runs per over. After 8 overs and the score 40 for 2, UL took off their opening bowlers and having taken a look at the second string, Mark Taylor in particular set about them with a vengeance. 50 was passed, then 75 in the 14th over and when David Lynch was hit for towering 6's by Mark to bring up his 50 and the scoring rate nearing 6 per over, a large score looked in prospect. UL then brought back their opening bowler Matt Callaghan and David Ind was possibly a little unfortunate to be given out lbw to his first ball which appeared to be going down leg side. David had made a valuable 22 runs and provided an excellent foil to Mark Taylor. The score was now 98 for 3. Having hit another 4 off the fifth ball of the same over, from which he was lucky to dropped, Mark was out next ball caught at mid-off off a skier going for one big shot too many. He had made a valuable 57 in a very short time with 5 towering 6's and four 4's, he had also sapped the confidence of a number of the UL bowlers. This brought in John Ind to join Michael Lynch and at 104 for 4 the game was back in the balance again.

However, any fears of a batting collapse were quickly put aside by John Ind who hit 2 delightful 4's in his first over at the crease, one a delicate leg glance and the other his trade mark late cut to the third man boundary. Michael Lynch was quickly into his stride also taking over where Mark Taylor had left off. Again he was very severe on anything loose. Particularly memorable were an effortless towering 6 which cleared the trees at mid-wicket and a straight 6 over long off from the toe of the bat. Combined with the glances and cuts of John Ind and some clever running between the wickets the scoring rate remained well over 5 per over. At 161 John Ind played yet another square cut but hesitated in setting out for a second run, no doubt feeling the exertions of the quick singles and the aches of being hit on the toe and amid ships, was run out by about 2 ft. by an accurate return to the keeper. He had scored 19. This brought in Mubbin, in good nick having made runs in his last game, and Michael Lynch reached a fine 50 before holing out for 53. He had hit two 6's and five 4's. This brought in Andrew Malcolm for the last 4 overs with the score on 196 for 6. The 37th over saw the first and only maiden over of the Lismore innings but Mubbin, after a tentative start, began to middle the ball and hit two 4's in the penultimate over of the innings. He reached 16 not out, with Andrew 5 not out for a final total of 216 for 7 at the end of the 40 overs which included eighteen 4's and seven

At tea the question was asked would 216 be enough? Surely it would, but then again UL had reached 200 for 6 in the semifinal at the same venue and 196 for 9 in the quarterfinal. A good display in the field was necessary therefore to make sure the excellent batting was not in vain. The team discussion stressed the importance of preventing the opposition from scoring boundaries and the field would be set to achieve this.

In the UL innings, Brian Power and Mubbin opened the howling and with the final ball of his opening over Brian had UL opener Lenihan caught by Tim Jackson off a poor shot to a wide ball outside the off stump. The score was 4 for 1. This brought in David Lynch, who scored 88 not out in the semi-final to join

Mark Nestor who had scored 102 in the quarterfinal. However in his third over Brian Power bowled David Lynch leg stump for 4 with a ball that straightened. Matt Callaghan was next in and together with Nestor the total began to accumulate. The scoring was behind the required rate settling at just about 4 per over. Mubbin bowled tightly and well but with little luck his 8 overs costing just 32 runs. Tim Jackson replaced Brian Power for the 110 over and also bowled a very tight spell, his 5 overs costing a miserly 10 runs. Boundaries were few and. far between and the fielding was tight with even the elder statesmen of the side showing unaccustomed athleticism. Michael Lynch replaced Mubbin at the end of his spell and also bowled tightly.

Nonetheless the score continued to mount and 110 was reached in the 25th over. The required scoring rate was now over 7 per over but UL still had some big hitters to come. The result was in the balance again. Then came what was probably the decisive moment of the game. In the 26th over bowled by Michael Lynch the batsmen went for a chancy second run to fine leg, the throw was to the wicketkeeper but a throw to the bowler might have seen a run out. Two balls later Mark Nestor cut hard but straight to Mubbin at backward point. Mubbin made a good stop but the ball ran a little away from him. The batsmen, forgetting the maxim not to run for a midfield, after some hesitation, set off for

a risky second run. Ever alert, Andrew Malcolm at short cover quickly collected the ball threw to the bowler Michael Lynch. Michael collected a bit wide and not risking a throw, dived full length and broke the stumps with Nestor a yard short. 108 for 3 and a new batsman in. Not big hitting South-African Jackie Du Toit but J Callaghan, who found it difficult to middle the ball. The pressure was now really on the set batsman, Matt Callaghan. David Ind had meanwhile replaced Tim Jackson at the City End. In his first over he bowled a bit short. Matt Callaghan then reached a very useful fifty but when he was on 59 David Ind, bowling a much better length, trapped him lbw with a ball that kept a bit low. 120 for 4 now with just 10 overs to go and the scoring rate was 9.7 per over. Du Toit now came in at number 6 and had to try to hit out straight away. In an inspired tactical move, Skipper David Ind replaced the now tiring Michael Lynch with a refreshed Tim Jackson at the Pavilion End. The move worked like a dream and with his third delivery Tim bowled Du Toit with a beauty that beat him for pace as much as anything. 125 for 5 now and the scoring rate of almost I I per over, surely no way back for UL now.

Next in was another South African H. Badenhurst. The 33rd over bowled by David Ind brought double trouble for UL. Off the second ball J. Callaghan played a ball off his legs towards the long leg boundary equidistant from John Ind on the midwicket

boundary and Michael Hickey on the fine leg boundary. Horror, the ball stopped feet from the boundary edge. Given the combined ages of the fielders, approx. 110 years, would the batsman run 3 or 4 or even 5?. Showing a turn of speed not seen for years, Hickey gave chase and closed in on the ball, Andrew Malcolm ran from short mid-wicket towards long leg to facilitate the relay return. The ball was thrown to Andrew, who quickly released it to wicket-keeper Sean Willoughby. Meanwhile the batsmen went for a suicidal fourth run and Callaghan was comfortably run out - 128 for 6 now. Off the last ball of the same over Pat Redmond was bowled for I and the score stood at 131 for 7 with just 7 overs to go.

7 runs were scored off the first 3 balls of Tim Jackson's next over but with the fourth he bowled G. Walsh for a duck and with 6 overs to go 79 runs were still required with just 2 wickets left. Tim had now taken 2 for 17 in his 7 overs. At last the result was no longer in any doubt. While the 35th over went for 7 runs this was still well behind the required rate. Brian Power replaced Tim Jackson and had only I run scored off his first over of the new spell. Then David Ind had the competent Badenhurst caught by Mark Taylor at mid on off the first ball of the 37th over with the score at 146 for 9 and victory was assured. Brian Power, trying to bowl gently to the youngster M Callaghan Jnr, lost his line and bowled 4 wides in the 38th over but it mattered little.

It fell to Andrew Malcolm to bowl the penultimate over and while it cost 5 runs he was a little unlucky to see an edge fly past Michael Hickey at shoulder height fielding first slip. David Campion, bowling in the slinging style of Jeff Thompson (but without the latter's speed and accuracy!) did the honours in the final over. His second and third deliveries were hit for 4's but he had his revenge taking the final UL wicket with his fourth ball. UL were all out for 169 and Lismore had won back the Cup they last held in 1997 at the same venue. Indeed Harlequin Park is a lucky ground for the club as it is their third victory in a final there in recent years - the Towns Cup last year being the third.

The match was a worthy game for a final and was played in a very sporting manner by both sides.

It came as something of a surprise that Matt Callaghan (UL) won the Man-of-the Match award for his batting and bowling as the efforts of Michael Lynch with bat and ball and Mark-Taylor with the bat were the match winning performances.

Finally, the performance of Official Umpire Paddy Comerford, who operated at the bowlers end for all the 80 overs merits special mention and praise, especially given the inclement weather conditions.







NO INVESTIGATION

The referee did report that it was brought to his attention that it had happened. R.T.E. confirmed that any of their seven cameras had not picked up whatever was supposed to have happened.

On Wednesday evening of last week the chairman and secretary of the county board attended a meeting in Croke Park relating to the matter, but whatever discussions did take place, were not conclusive.



Greyhound Community Support Their Own

In the summer of 1997 Steve Seymour was working in Holland and during a lunch hour one day he and a few friends decided to take a swim in a nearby lake a swim that would change his life in the worst possible way for a twenty four year old

He dived into the water and the way he hit the water was like hitting a brick wall, he didn't even hit the bottom it was just the way he entered the water. His friends pulled him from the lake and he was rushed to hospital where his parents Ian and Brenda Seymour found out within twenty four hours that he had broken his neck and would be paralysed from the chest down.

Four weeks later he was airlifted to the Mater Hospital in Dublin and then on to the Rehabilitation Hospital in Dun Laoighaire where Steve spent six months trying to readjust his life. He then came home to near Carrick On Suir where his parents and brother Nick tried to come to terms with everything.

The Seymours live in a remote part of South Tipperary and Steve had to rely on his friends coming to see him or Ian or Brenda had to take him to his friends which was a painful experience for Steve because although he is paralysed he is in pain all of the time where the live nerves endings meet the useless ones.

Steve did regain the use of his triceps to a certain degree and is able to use his arms and wrists but cannot use his fingers which is a double cruel blow.

He spends a lot of time on the computer which he was very adept at before the accident and has special "Tools" to enable him to type while he also has a roller ball mouse which enables him to play most computer games.

Steve spends a lot of him time in Belgium with his brother Nick where he has some sort of quality of life compared to the remoteness of the countryside where the Seymours live outside Carrick On Suir.

Steve would like to get a motorized trike which would give him some sort of independence and wouldn't look so obvious as an electrical wheelchair, he has been advised that the hand controls could be converted so that he would be able to get full use from it apparently the company has adapted models to suit certain disability. These trikes can go 11 m.p.h and can tackle rough terrain so they would be suitable for secondary roads here in Ireland.

To this end friends of the Seymour family who are mostly drawn from the Greyhound community are keen to lend whatever help they can and to that end a race meeting has been arranged for Waterford Greyhound Stadium on Wednesday October 9th and anybody who would like to nominate a greyhound at this fixture are invited to give in their name at the racing office in Kilcohan Park. The cost of a nomination is Euro 10.
