Hundreds Of Jobs Hang In The Balance After Series Of Setbacks

Three sites, with the potential to create hundreds of jobs in Dungarvan, remain idle and neglected, as objections and a lack of a forceful lobby continue to stall progress, Monday's meeting of the Town Council heard.

The futures of the Advance factory in Shandon, Clancy Construction's major shopping development, and the Dungarvan Energy Power Plant, all still hang in the balance after a series of setbacks.

The largest of the three projects, the 450m shopping

complex on the former Glanbia site, which would create 350 jobs, has been stalled by objections for over a year, with the developers only now hopeful of submitting a fresh application.

Town Clerk, Brian White said that Clancy Construction hope to lodge their fresh planning bid in the next two weeks. A special meeting of the Town Council will also be held to discuss the application once it arrives.

However, despite the positive news, fears remain over

the prospect of fresh objections to the project.

According to Cllr. Billy Kyne "one obvious source" of an objection is likely to come from the umbrella retail and grocery group, RGDATA.

"When RGDATA made an objection last year," he said, "we couldn't find out which members of the association in the town they were representing, and who they were making that objection on behalf of."

Calling on the County Manager to meet some of the

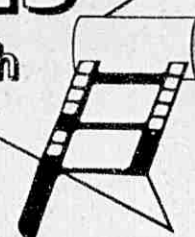
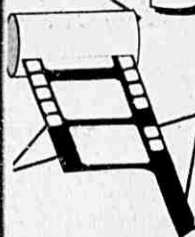
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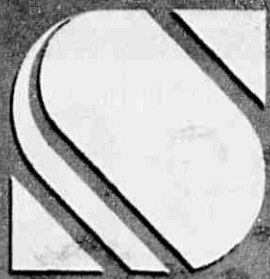
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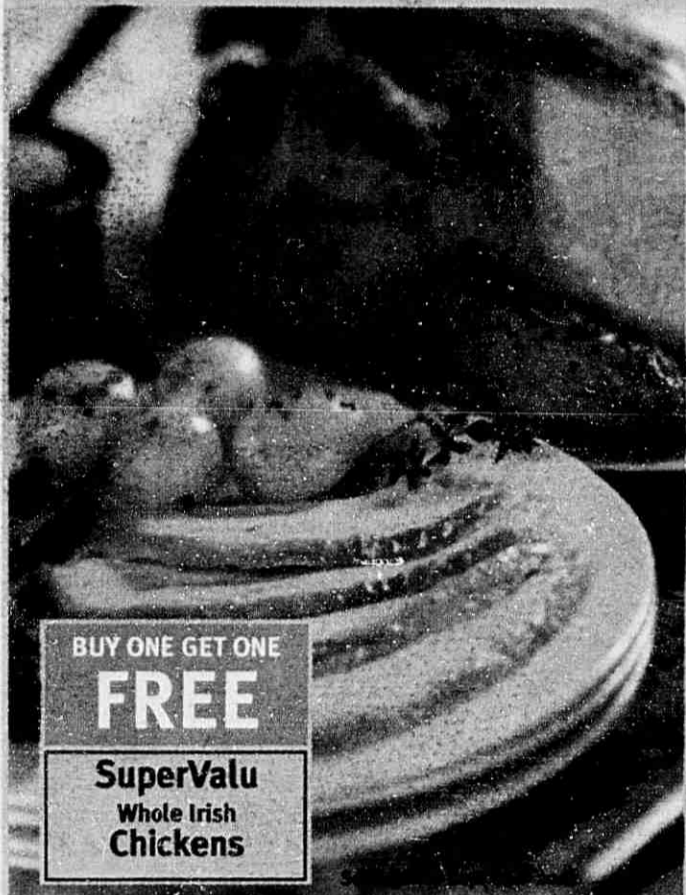




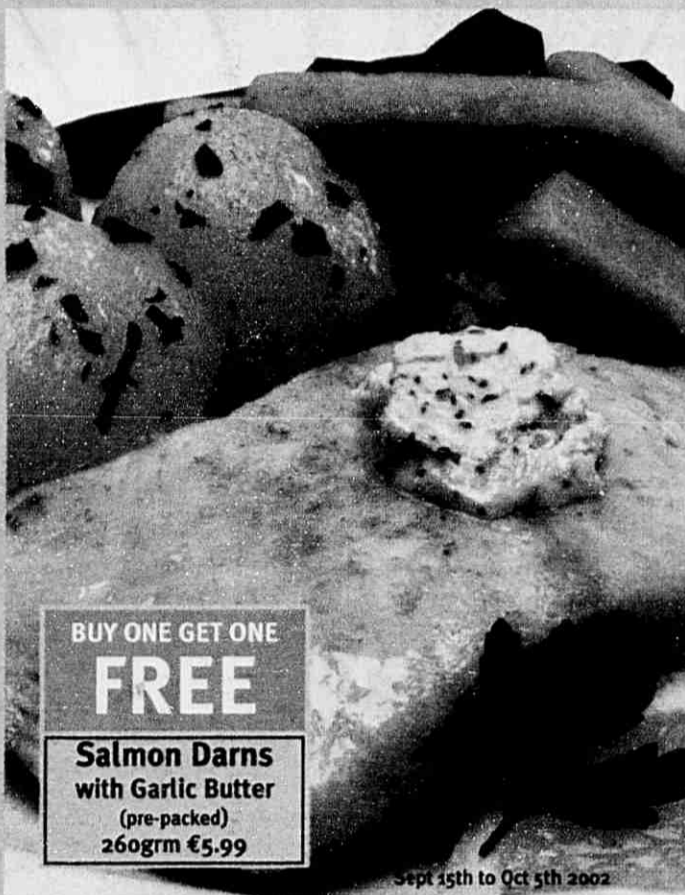
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Chamber of Commerce Expands in West Waterford

retail outlets, he claimed, preventative measures should be taken.

"It's unacceptable that the fate of the project should be stymied by the stalling tactics of people with an interest in keeping this up in the air", he continued. "The County Manager has to be forceful on this."

However, Town Clerk, Brian White, speaking in the absence of the County Manager, Donal Connolly, said it would be putting Mr. Connolly in an invidious position to ask him to push the project.

"He is obliged under Local Authority rules to treat planning applications in a fair and impartial manner," Mr. White said. "It would be unreasonable to ask the Manager to act as Judge, Jury and Executioner on an application."

However, Cllr. Kyne said it was reasonable that the council's "Chief Executive Officer should ask publicly on our behalf who are the businesses in Dungarvan hiding behind the RGDATA flag of convenience."

"They should have the guts to come out and say they are making an objection," Cllr. Kyne continued.

ADVANCE FACTORY

The Shandon located Advance factory, was also highlighted as lying idle since it was built two years ago, with one councillor questioning whether it is now "a white elephant", and other claims about the promoting agencies playing politics with its future.

Cllr Michael O'Riordan said that a recent act of vandalism committed at the facility has once more shown up the fact that it has been idle for so long.

Cllr. O'Riordan pointed out that an industry hasn't located in Dungarvan since the early 1980's, despite a high powered committee being set up to attract businesses.

"Is the advance factory now a white elephant?" he asked.

However, Cllr. Damien Geoghegan felt the problem was with the two agencies charged with the task of promoting the factory rather than the facility itself.

He said "politics are at play here"; claiming that as funding by Irish Businesses Against Litter had provided the factory, rather than Enterprise Ireland or the IDA, the agencies weren't pushing to

attract new industries to the facility.

A visit to the factory by a business has taken place recently, however, Town Clerk, Brian White, said, adding that "the Advance Factory is certainly being promoted".

POWER PLANT

Meanwhile, the future of another project on part of the Glanbia site, is subject to a new legal challenge. Dungarvan Energy Ltd's proposed Gas Fired Power Plant is to be

brought before the Supreme Court in February of next year, after the High Court dismissed a previous bid to halt the development and upheld the granting of an IPC license to the plant in early May.

Dungarvan Energy Ltd, a consortium of Irish backers and Rolls Royce Power Ventures, has already spent €50m on the project, while another €35m has been set aside for the gas turbine and steam turbine/generators.

Stradbally Strikes European Gold

In the Netherlands on Saturday last, the village of Stradbally was awarded the highest environmental honour, which Europe can bestow, when it won the Gold Medal in the European Entente Florale competition.

Stradbally was declared to be a village above all others regarding the way it has respected and enhanced its natural and architectural heritage. Three other villages from Germany, Britain and Hungary, were awarded similar recognition from a wide European entry.

To say that this is a compliment to Stradbally would be an understatement of the highest proportions. Entente Florale is not just about flowers and their colourful displays, it is not just about being 'green' - it is also about how a people show pride in the place where they live, how individuals get together in a spirit of endeavour and shared vision to enhance their communities for future generations, and build a high quality of life. Nowhere is such pride more visible than in the village of Stradbally.

This latest triumph comes hot on the heels of the National Landscape Award it received for its village green during the National Tidy

Towns Awards less than a week before. It also comes in a week when Lismore won the national Tidy Towns award for small towns.

Local Councillor, Ger Barron said he was delighted with the announcement and described it as a just reward for the hard work and dedication put into Stradbally's entry.

Having been present himself in the village when the competition inspectors visited Stradbally, he said they were clearly impressed by how the village was presented. As part of this, he said, the village square has been completely re-formed and a sundial put in place as a centrepiece.

"Down through the years Stradbally has distinguished itself and I'm happy to see that continue", he commented, adding that he wished to congratulate the committee and all the people involved in the Entente effort on their achievement.

Meanwhile, the Entente gold once again signals the success of agencies and communities working together. A Waterford County Council spokesperson said: "Stradbally was awarded a bronze medal when it entered this competition in 1990. This Gold Medal award is a great example of communities doing things for themselves, of a committed community group working with the local authority and leading others to overcome a lot of challenges and achieve a greater goal."

Chief credit must go to the people who make up Stradbally Tidy Towns Committee, ably led by Margo and George Crowley. At the awards ceremony in Amsterdam, the Chairman of the Entente jury praised the Committee's dedication and foresight and paid special tribute to the Crowley's.

The commentary from the adjudicating panel highlighted the great impression that Stradbally made on all the judges from countries across Europe.

They said: "Stradbally is a small village on the Copper Coast of Southeast Ireland and represents Ireland in the vil-

lage category. Nestling between the Comeragh Mountains and the Sea, Stradbally is a haven of peace, respectful of its buildings and of its environment and always open to welcoming new inhabitants. With its dedication and collaborative approach towards the enhancement of its environment, the jury was left with no choice but to award Stradbally a Gold medal".

Reacting to the news of Stradbally's achievement, Minister Martin Cullen described it as a "wonderful week for Co. Waterford".

"This caps what has been a great week for the communities in general in Waterford. Stradbally's success followed the announcement that Lismore was crowned Ireland's Tidiest Small Town for 2002 at the National Tidy Towns Awards Ceremony in Dublin Castle last week."

Minister Cullen confirmed: "the hard work and dedication shown by each and every member of the community in Stradbally has come to fruition and the accolade is well deserved."

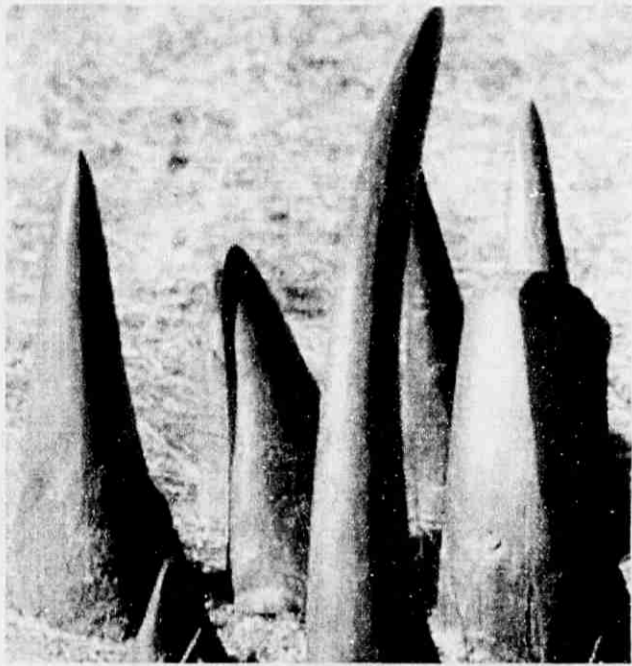

LIVING WORLD IN PERIL

WORLD WILDLIFE LAWS. International laws help to protect rare species, such as tigers, trees, snails and wildflowers. CITES, the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species, forbids people to buy, sell or trade protected species, or products from them such as their tusks, flowers, furs or bones, unless they are properly licensed to do so.



HUNTING AND POACHING some animals are threatened directly by hunting and poaching. They are usually large and powerful species, such as tigers, rhinos, bears, deer, birds of prey, sharks and other big fish. They are shot, poisoned or trapped for various reasons, such as to show the 'bravery' of the hunter and for trophies to sell. They may also be hunted by people who are protecting themselves and their farm animals against attack.

Habitat Destruction

This is by far the greatest threat to wildlife. People alter natural place for their own use, changing them into farms, factories, mines, roads, houses, schools and other structures. The problem is especially serious in some tropical regions, where the human population is increasing fast, but there are also some of the rarest and most precious wildlife habitats, such as tropical forests, swampy wetlands and coastal coral reefs. The problem of habitat destruction is so serious because it affects not just one or two species, but all species that live in that area. Worldwide changes such as loss of the protective ozone layer in the atmosphere, and the increased greenhouse effect leading to global warming, are also upsetting the delicate balance of nature.

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Dungarvan Farmer Cream Of The Crop In Glanbia Milk Awards

Neil and Joan Hurley from Dungarvan, are the overall winners of the Glanbia Quality Milk Supplier Award for 2002. Liam Aylward, Minister of State, Department of Agriculture and Food, presented them with their Glanbia Crystal Churn Award at a special function in Glanbia House, Kilkenny, on Monday.

Their picturesque and well-presented dairy farm is situated overlooking Dungarvan Bay. Neil and Joan run a 50-cow spring herd with an average yield of 1,300 gallons per cow and an average TBC of 10,000 and an average SCC 95,000.

The Hurleys' passion for farming is illustrated both by their management procedures and farmyard layout. They attribute their excellent quality milk results to meticulous cleanliness of their cows and their milking equipment. The milking routines includes a

daily cold wash with Hydrosan combined with a weekly hot descale and a weekly hot wash with Hydrosan and Hypochlorite. The Hurleys attribute their low SCC to a daily teat dipping procedure.

The overall impression on entering this farm is one of an excellently managed farmyard. They supply their milk to both Glanbia's Kilmeaden Cheese Plant and Glanbia's Ingredient Plant to Ballyragget, Co. Kilkenny. Their award winning farm is fully compliant with all regulatory requirements and is quality assured under the Glanbia Farm Quality Assurance Scheme.

Speaking at the awards, Tom Corcoran, Glanbia Chairman, congratulated Neil and Joan Hurley on their success and said, "The need to demonstrate and promote the quality and safety of food has never been greater. For

quality in all its forms is the gateway to winning and keeping consumer confidence. Despite all the improvements made in food production and processing over the past two decades, food scares have been one of the defining stories of Europe in recent years. Independent research shows, for example, that over half of all British women are actively concerned about food safety, up significantly from five years ago. 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Recipes



COOKERY CORNER

Spice up traditional sausages and gravy

AN inventive way to prepare an old favourite.

- Ingredients:**
(serves 6-8)
750g sausages
Salt and freshly ground pepper
60g of butter or margarine
2 onions, finely chopped
1 x 15ml sp flour
1 cup beef stock
3 x 5ml sp Worcestershire sauce
1 bay leaf
Pinch dried thyme
1 cup diced carrots
1 cup fresh or frozen peas
- FOR THE TOPPING:**
1 1/4 cups uncooked rice
2 eggs, lightly beaten
2 cups grated cheddar cheese
Salt and pepper to taste.

Method:
Season the sausages then cut into large chunks. Heat half the butter in a frying pan and add the sausages. Cook over a moderate heat until brown, then add the onions and cook until soft. Remove to a casserole dish.
Add the remaining butter to the frying pan. Sprinkle in the flour, cooking and stirring until brown. Pour in the stock. Bring to the boil, still stirring. Lower the heat and cook, simmering for 3 mins. Pour over the sausages.
Add the Worcestershire sauce, bay leaf, carrots, peas and thyme. Put the lid on and cook at 180°C for 50 min. When the sausages are done, cook the rice in a large pan until tender - 10-12 mins. Drain and add the cheese and egg to it. Remove the bay leaf from the casserole and spoon the rice mixture evenly on top. Cook for about 10 minutes until the top is golden brown.



Mexican chicken enchilada meal

- Ingredients:**
3 servings
3 cooked chicken breasts
8 fresh corn tortillas
1/2 cup scallions (white or green)
3/4 cup sour cream
1/2 cup almonds, chopped
1/2 cup cheddar cheese, grated
1/2 x 5ml sp salt
1/2 cup sliced ripe olives
3 cups enchilada chilli sauce
Sour cream
Scallions
- FOR THE ENCHILADA SAUCE:**
2 x 15ml sp vegetable oil
1 cup water
2/3 cup onions, chopped
1 x 5ml sp chilli powder
1/4 cup green pepper, chopped
1 x 5ml sp salt
1 clove garlic, crushed
1/2 x 5ml sp dried oregano
1 cup tomato paste
- Method:**
SHRED the chicken. In a small bowl, toss together

chicken, scallions and almonds. Sprinkle on salt. Mix and set aside.
To prepare chilli sauce, heat oil in saute pan over medium-high heat. Add the onion, pepper, and garlic. Sauté until vegetables are soft. Stir in tomato paste, water, chilli powder, salt and oregano. Blend well. Lower the heat, cover and simmer for five mins. Preheat oven to 350°F.
Lightly oil bottom of shallow ovenproof casserole dish. Dip a tortilla in hot sauce until partially saturated, then place tortilla in casserole dish. Fill with an eighth of the chicken mix, and top with one 15ml sp sour cream, then roll into an enchilada. Place in dish seam side down.
Repeat with remaining tortillas. When casserole is filled, drizzle remaining sauce over top. Sprinkle with cheese and top with olives. Bake for 15 mins or until cheese and sauce are bubbling. Serve with sour cream and chopped scallions

Company cake - sweet work of art

- Ingredients:**
8 servings
5 large egg whites
1 cup flour
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
1/2 cup sugar
2/3 cup sugar
1 x 5ml sp baking powder
4 large egg yolks
2 x 15ml sp sugar
1/8 x 5ml sp salt
1 large egg yolk
1/3 cup milk
2 x 15ml sp cornstarch
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup milk
2 x 5ml sp vanilla extract
1 x 5ml sp vanilla extract
- Method:**
PREHEAT oven to 325°F. Grease two 8-inch layer cake pans, and dust with flour.
For cake - sift flour, baking powder and salt on to waxed paper, then set aside. Use mixer to cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Add egg yolks one at a time, beat well. Add vanilla. Add flour

mixture alternately with milk, mix until smooth. Divide batter between pans.
For meringue - beat egg whites until they hold their shape but are moist. Add sugar by the spoonful, beat well. Divide between pans. Sprinkle with nuts, divide evenly.
Bake until lightly coloured and cocktail stick inserted into centre comes out clean, about 30 mins. Let stand for 10 mins. Remove cake from pan - set them meringue-side up to cool. Spread one meringue layer with filling. Top with other layer.
For filling - Combine sugar, cornstarch and salt in a large pan. Stir in egg yolk and milk over medium heat. Stir until mixture coats spoon, about 4 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in vanilla. Let cool. If mixture is lumpy, whisk vigorously.

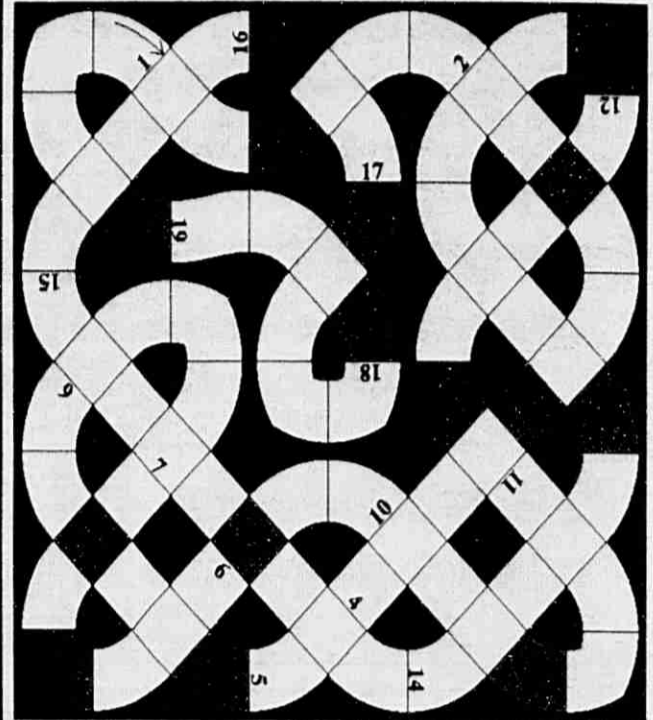

Health Tips from "Remedies"

Artichoke

USES Reduces cholesterol levels; Helps metabolise fats, Protects the liver and stimulates the liver function.
Artichokes grow in warmer climates, where they are considered a luxury food. Like Milk Thistle, the plant belongs to the daisy family.

HOW IT WORKS Artichokes have a bitter taste due to the presence of cynaropicrin, which stimulates the liver function. Apart from that artichokes contain another valuable substance called Cynarin. This has very specific properties, protecting and enhancing liver function in a way similar to Silymarin found in Milk Thistle.

Artichokes also contain a group of compounds known as phenolic acids, which have the ability to reduce blood cholesterol and lipid levels through an action on the liver.

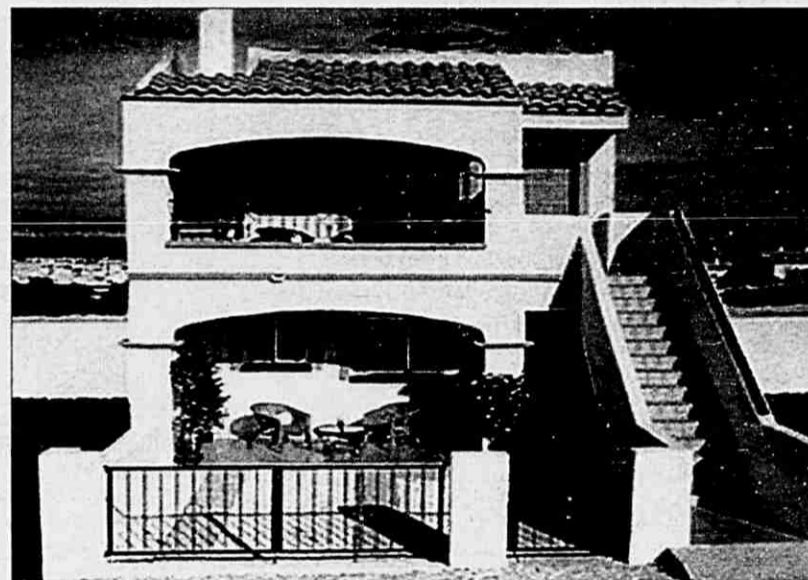

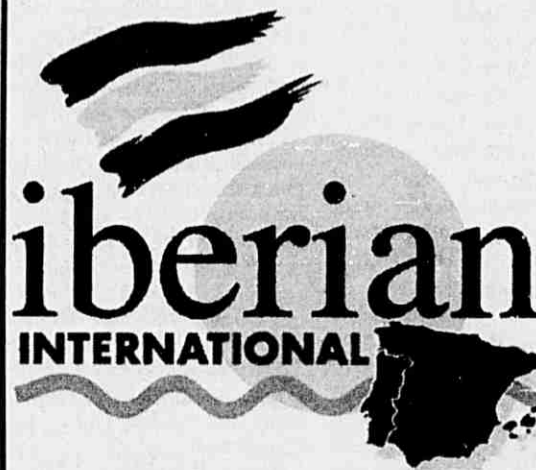

Cappoquin Needs Local Authority Housing



On-going talks on buying property to further the council's housing programme in Cappoquin have not, to date, reached any satisfactory conclusion, according to Cllr. Nora Flynn.

While acknowledging that negotiations can take a long time, she said time is running out on the space to build local authority houses.

Deputy Ollie Wilkinson said the Housing Officer did look at the particular area and did meet the people involved and is to go

back there soon to clarify some matters.

County Manager, Donal Connolly, replied that the council is endeavouring to acquire land in Cappoquin. Considerable housing has been built over the years in the town, he added.

"If the land in question can be acquired, it will be acquired, obviously if not then we'll have to seek alternatives."



SAFETY FEATURES IN LISMORE PARK

Cllr. Willie MacDonnell has called for a review of the safety measures in place in the Millennium Park in Lismore and additional safety features for the protection of children.

The park has proved a big attraction, not just for local people, but for those outside the area as well, and Cllr. MacDonnell has called for more precautions to be taken.

"A big number of children are in there", he said. "They're running out onto the main street at a bad bend. Extra precaution should be taken there."

Co. Engineer, John O'Flynn said he was aware of the danger and is proposing to erect a 10-foot long decorative railing at the outer edge of the footpath to prevent children running out onto the road. It's also proposed that double yellow lines are placed on the bend running for 25 feet back from it.

He said the council intend to put up a railing designed in keeping with the park.

Marriage Law Rules Out Civic Office Wedding

A law dating back to 1844 scuppered a bride and groom's hopes to tie the knot in Waterford County Council's Civic Offices and forced them to hold the ceremony in St. Joseph's Hospital instead.

The Civic Offices were deemed unsuitable under the 158-year-old ruling which states a ceremony must be held in the offices of the registrar - in Dungarvan's case, St. Joseph's Hospital.

The couple had hoped to hold the ceremony in the Council Chambers as they had invited forty guests and the designated room in the hospital can only hold 25.

Cllr. Nuala Ryan, who was contacted by the couple, said the room is not only too small but has paint peeling off the walls. The wedding had been arranged for the Chambers, but was moved back to the Hospital at the last minute due to the antiquated law.

The council has since set about getting its civic offices registered as a venue for hosting civil marriages.

CO. COUNCIL SNIPPETS

Duckspool Works Causing Chaos

The addition of a pumping station in Duckspool, Abbey-side as part of the Councils plans to upgrade its sewerage facilities in the town has been given the go-ahead by the members. But works on sewers along the road have caused traffic chaos.

Arising from a detailed study into the sewers in the area, it was decided to lay new sewers along Duckspool Road - which are now under construction.

Co. Engineer, John O'Flynn said it was decided to do the work now rather than

next year as the road was due to be resurfaced and it was decided against digging up newly lain tarmac.

While the original application would have seen the pumping station just serve St. Augustine's College, the new proposal will serve a wider area including land re-zoned for housing.

But, Cllr. Nuala Ryan said she had received a call from a concerned parent who was very irate that the work on the sewer hadn't be carried out before the children went back to school.

"There's absolute chaos, especially on Friday when it was raining. There are two traffic lights close to the entrance of the college and the kids are in danger of being knocked down", she said.

She asked how long more would it be before the work is completed on this road.

The County Engineer, replied that workers are completing ten metres of road a day. The entire project is

600m so its likely to be 60 days, he said. He also added that it would have been preferable to get the work done in the summer but they had to wait until a study on the areas sewerage needs was carried out.

"Obviously the timing didn't work out for us, but we're doing the best we can to finish it as quickly as possible with the least amount of disruption", Mr. O'Flynn concluded.

Colour Scheme Change Proposed For Milestones

The unique County Waterford feature - milestones - which stretch from Tallow to Tramore should be painted the county colours, according to Cllr. Willie MacDonnell.

The milestones in stone depots on main roads are in reasonable repair, he added, but should be "upgraded to an extent that they would be on view to the people who are travelling".

Cllr. MacDonnell called for the roadside features, currently painted black and white, to be newly painted in a more eye-catching colour (blue and white).

"These are carved out in stone on the side of the road", Cllr. MacDonnell further explained, "and have been improved in recent years by the Co. Council. Not all of them, just some".

Continuing his suggestion for their up-grading and the process of "making them visible", the Fine Gael Councillor called for flowers to be planted in front of the milestones, citing the roadside features "as the perfect location".

"I would like to see these upgraded in a very major way", Cllr. MacDonnell said. "I would also like to see a report brought to our next council meeting telling us in what way they could be upgraded."

Co. Engineer John O'Flynn replied that currently the council is carrying out a nine-month survey on all the milestones and a report will be presented to the council.

Speed Ramps Not The Solution - Co Engineer

Ramps are not the answer for estates suffering from speeding cars, according to Co. Engineer, John O'Flynn.

Responding to Cllr. Tom Cunningham's queries about the laying of speed ramps in Kilmacthomas, Stradbally and Bonmahon, Mr. O'Flynn said there were risks involved with ramps.

The main problem is they cause a hindrance to the fire and emergency services, he said. But, he also warned that if they are introduced to one estate, other residents associations would follow.

"We have a similar situation here in the Urban area (Dungarvan)", Mr. O'Flynn said. "Some of the ramps have gone into the urban area. And I think Dungarvan Town Council are having second thoughts about them."

County Manager Donal Connolly, who also heads up Dungarvan Town Council, concurred that there are difficulties with ramps.

"Very often you find that the speeding is engaged in by the actual people who live in the housing estates", he claimed.

Mr. Connolly suggested talking to the housing management committees and the use of signage.

"If we have them in one housing estate then we'll end up having them in every housing estate," he said.

Updated Position On Environs Scheme

Submissions for the Dungarvan Environs Scheme are currently being dealt with and the study is likely to go before the County Council in October, according to County Manager, Donal Connolly.

In all thirty-four submissions have been lodged for the scheme which has wide ranging implications for the area.

Included in its development strategy for the area is the Dungarvan By-pass and Cllr. Fiachra O Ceilleachair questioned how much progress has been achieved so far and the likely time-frame it will be started under.

Co. Manager Donal Connolly, however, said he did not wish to go into detail on the scheme at this time. The up-to-date position remains that Dungarvan Town Council has adopted it for the urban area and the County Council will look at its implications for the area covered outside this, he said.

Support for Retention of Clonmel Post Mortem Services

The retention of post mortem services in Clonmel was supported by a number of councillors at the recent meeting. The South Eastern Health Board has proposed that all post mortem services be centralised to a proposed eurl.1.5 m Post Mortem facility in Waterford Regional Hospital, which could lead to considerable delays for families in a time of crisis.

Cllr. Tom Higgins said the issue is a major problem for the Health Board. Previously if somebody died in suspicious circumstances the post mortem would be carried out in their local hospital. "Now they are proposing that if a persons dies anywhere in the South Eastern Health Board area, the body is to be brought to Waterford Regional Hospital", Cllr. Higgins said.

The problem has arisen, the Dungarvan based councillor continued, as only five-consultant pathologists are employed to cover the entire region. There is also no consultant pathologist to do this in Clonmel.

"It's a problem for a family at a time of crisis, to bring a body to Waterford Regional Hospital sometimes from as far away as seventy miles away. It's also a problem for the pathologist to drive out and lose a days work in the process," he went on to say.

Cllr. Tom Cronin, the Fianna Fail representative on the SEHB, said he will be supporting the retention of Post Mortem Services in Clonmel.

He said it is a disgrace that bodies would have to be moved to Waterford Hospital adding that something would have to be done about it.

Piltown Cross A Death Trap Claims Councillor

With schools re-opening, dangers of accidents occurring in the Piltown Cross area has intensified, Cllr. Paddy Kenneally said.

Describing Piltown Cross as a "death-trap", he sympathised with young mothers bringing their children to school nearby as having "a mighty ordeal".

He added that the problems with speeding in the area had been on-going for the past seven or eight years, and asked the Co. Engineer was there any hope of coming up with a solution.

"Speed is the problem", Cllr. Kenneally said. "And it's frightening what's happening".

Cllr. Kenneally, made a plea for speedsters to slow down. He also suggested the council resort to the "old fashioned tar barrel".

"Trucks go down there at 70 miles an hour every day...I mean, it is frightening for the people living there."

"The speed must be slowed down, even some bit", he added.

Deputy John Deasy also

said it is extremely dangerous especially when approaching from the seaward side. He asked the council to write to Minister Martin Cullen on the issue.

Cllr. Tom Cronin who

raised the matter on a number of occasions in the past asked that the slow signs be extended back to Youghal Bridge.

"The County Council themselves were working on that road. And it was lucky that a couple of those men weren't killed", Cllr. Cronin said, referring to a recent accident in the area.

The County Engineer, John O'Flynn, replied that the problem was not just with the cross but a good stretch of the road. Compulsory Purchase Order documents have been with the NRA for two years now, he went on to say, and will be held up until an agreement with the IFA can be brokered. Until those documents are processed, nothing can be done, he added.

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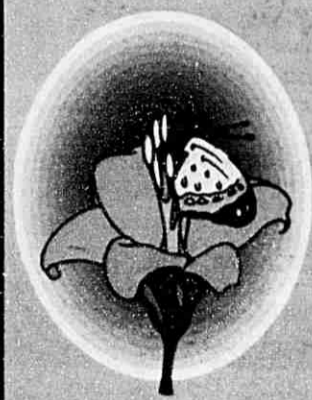
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Naval Commander Honoured For Heroics By US President

The Naval Commander, William D. Byrne, was serving as an Executive Officer on the USS LEYTE GULF, on 18 November 2001, when a distress call from a US Navy Security Team was received.

The Security Team was embarked on a detained smuggling vessel, close to sinking due to the onslaught of treacherous weather conditions. Commander Byrne responded to the call and aggressively manoeuvred LEYTE GULF into a position to render aid. The LEYTE GULF closed at flank speed in poor visibility, gale-force winds, and zero illumination, but the overburdened smuggling vessel had succumbed and sank, putting 22 people in the water.

Vice Admiral, CW Moore Jnr, in his citation for William's medal, carries on the remarkable story:

"Fighting 35 knot winds and eight to ten foot seas, he (Commander Byrne) displayed remarkable ship handling skills and perfect asset management while launching, directing, and recovering both of LEYTE GULF'S small boats and one of her helicopters."

"His masterful coordination of Search and Rescue efforts was directly responsible for saving 16 lives by safely and successfully recovering seven USS PETERSON (DD 969) crewmembers and nine foreign nationals," the Vice Admiral of the US Navy continued.



"By his exceptional professional ability, personal initiative, and total dedication to duty, Commander Byrne reflected great credit upon himself and upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service".
William D. Byrne is the son

of Bill and Breda Byrne (nee Mansfield), grandson of the late Jimmy and Bridie Byrne, 3 Fitzgeralds Terrace, nephew of Lily Geoghegan, Jimmy Byrne, Tony, Sean and Tommy, Merced California and John and Michael Mansfield.

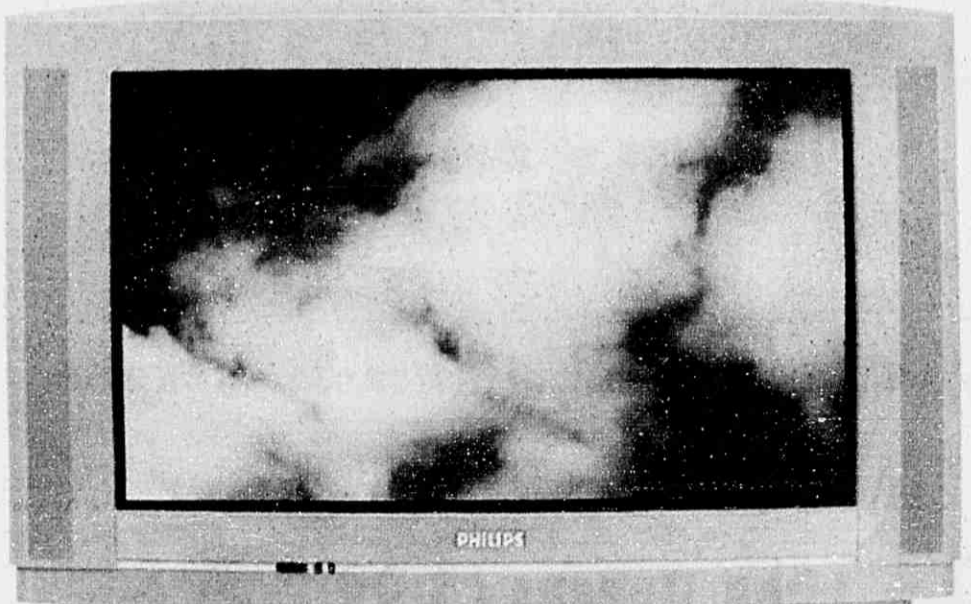
Holy Year Cross

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Dungarvan Leader Gardening

A rosy outlook in the garden

ALTHOUGH the rose is often associated with England – the Tudor Rose, the Red Rose of Lancaster, the White Rose of York – its origins as a cultivated garden flower go back to pre-Roman times.

But it was the Romans themselves who transformed the rose from a wild flower into a cultivated garden plant.

So it is little wonder that, after being cultivated for more than 2,000 years, there are now thousands of types to choose from.

When planning your rose garden, therefore, you have almost unlimited options as to types and colours of roses.

The rose is a very hardy flower and in England most varieties can be relied upon to bloom for about nine months of the year - from May or June right through to the following January. There is nothing unusual about having a Christmas Rose in your garden in December.

Planning your rose garden

A rose garden can be a big or as small as you wish but a traditional version would include climbers and ramblers gracing an arbour, a pergola, a trellis or an ornamental arch along with other varieties in shaped and designed flower beds or containers.

First decide how you want your rose garden to look and draw it out on paper. You can revise your drawing until you have the design you want. Once you have settled upon a design make sure your scale measurements are accurate.

Choosing your roses

Once you have plotted your rose garden you need to decide which colour and type of rose you want to go where. So before you buy your roses it is best to colour in your plan. Once you have decided on your colour scheme you can set about selecting your roses. Because you will be buying a wide variety of roses it will perhaps be best

to deal with a nursery which specialises in roses. They will be happy to help you in the planning and planting of your rose garden.

Preparing the garden

Dig the earth thoroughly before building structures in your rose garden. After the soil has been well dug add plenty of natural fertiliser. Horse manure is still the best for a good rose garden.

Once the soil has been prepared you can build any structures or lay any paths you will need.

Make sure your structures are solid, well bedded and capable of withstanding the onslaught of all kinds of weather including storms and high winds.

Planting the roses

Once your structures are in place, you can set about planting your roses in their beds, containers and at the foot of your structures.

For best effect your climbing roses and ramblers should be planted close to your trellis, arbour or arch

and pruned in the direction you want it to grow.

When planting your rose bushes in flower beds, make sure they are planted in the exact spot you want to balance the colour and variety of the garden.

Routine care

You should always keep your roses well fertilised, free from weeds and spray them regularly to kill any pests. They also need plenty of water for healthy growth.

Plant Violets in frames

Violets growing outdoors since April should now be removed to frames for winter flowering. The frames must stand in a sunny and fairly sheltered position and be filled with good loamy soil to within 20cm of the glass. Plant the violet clumps almost touching one another. Water them freely, but do not close the frames yet.

How to: Plant a bare-root bush rose

- Remove diseased or damaged growth. Cut outcrossing shoots and thin stems at the base to produce a balanced shape. Trim thick roots by one third.
- Dig the hole in a prepared bed and fork half a bucketful of organic compost, mixed with a handful of bone meal or fertilizer, into the bottom of the hole.
- Place the rose in the centre of the hole and spread roots evenly. Lay a cane across the hole to check the bud union will be 2.5cm below soil level.
- Fill the hole with soil, firming with your hands in stages to ensure there are no air pockets among the roots. Lightly tread down surrounding soil. Water well.

GOLD MEDAL STATUS FOR STRADBALLY ENTENTE FLORALE 2002

Last weekend Stradbally village was awarded Gold medal status in the European-wide Entente Florale competition, established over 25 years ago. Entrants compete from eleven European countries with the aim of encouraging the development of an improved environment for urban dwellers through respect for nature and enhanced planting and landscaping. The presentation ceremony attended by Tidy Town Committee members Joe Curran, Eileen Roche and Enda Flynn took place in the town of Alphen a/d Rijn in the Netherlands on Saturday evening 14th September. Both Ennis and Stradbally as Ireland's representatives achieved Gold medal status. Out of the 10 other participating countries Gold medal status was also achieved by 6 countries, Pinkafeld in Austria, Paise in Germany, Eviau in France, Bath in Great Britain, Gyderiak in Hungary, and Alphen in The Netherlands. Gold standard is achieved where the marks fall between 85% and 100%, silver between 75% and 84% and bronze between 65% and 74%.

NATIONAL AWARD FOR STRADBALLY TIDY TOWNS Stradbally village also scooped the top National award for the Village Green at the

2002 All Ireland Tidy Towns award ceremony held in Dublin Castle last week. The Stradbally Tidy Towns Committee were awarded the National & Regional Landscape award for the revamped village green, which now serves as an eye-catching centre to the village. The award was given for the co-ordinated landscaping of approach roads, residential areas and the village centre, each section appropriate to its situation, which in the opinion of the judges added up to a very high standard of design, nurture and husbandry. Further to which the judges declared that the superbly maintained village green has been enhanced by a Millennium sculpture inspired by the history of the Earth, with geological samples inset in the limestone panels, which support the central table with its fossil motif, a visually engaging concept which also serves as attractive seating and picnic table.

SILVER MEDAL AWARDED The Tidy Towns Committee with their diligent work also managed to retain the coveted Silver Medal for the second consecutive year with a total score of 263 out of 300 points. Over 700 towns and villages took part in the Annual Tidy Towns Competition, Castle-town Co. Laois won Tidiest vil-

lage and Ennis Co. Clare was the winner of the large town category, with Lismore achieving Gold winning Ireland's tidiest small town 2002. A spokesperson for Stradbally Tidy Towns Committee would like to congratulate Lismore on winning their category.

GOLD COAST CHARITY MARATHON

On Wednesday morning last the 11th September at 7:15pm., the Gold Coast Golf Club Pavilion and carpark was a hive of activity as golfers, caddies, organisers and staff prepared for the largest charity event ever held in the locality. The morning was mild and calm and as the day progressed the sun shone to ensure the environment was an ultra pleasant one for all involved. At 7:30am. there was a shotgun start and 110 golfers divided into eleven teams commenced playing until one of

the teams reached 1,000 Stableford points. This was achieved at 7:15pm. by John White's team and each of the successful team will be presented with a specially designed medal to acknowledge their achievement. Throughout the twelve hour marathon, golfers and caddies had to be fed and watered and the volunteer catering staff provided burgers, sandwiches, chocolate bars along with tea, coffee and soft drinks and they worked really hard throughout the day. The financial tar-

get for the day was 20,000 but John McGrath, proprietor of the Gold Coast suggested the final figure would be closer to 40,000. Well done to all concerned and after months of planning and hard work by Brendan O'Brien and his enthusiastic committee, it was success well deserved. The golfers and organisers now have the task of collecting the remainder of the sponsorship and a presentation night will take place at a later date to distribute the proceeds to the nominated charities.

TIDY TOWNS MARKS

Abbeyside/Dungarvan were represented in Category E and received a total of 225 marks out of a possible 300 (75%). This is an increase of five marks on last years total of 220. This is a noteworthy improvement and congratulations is due to all concerned. Category E is for towns with a population between 5,001 and 10,000 and this year's winners of the category was Killarney with a score of 260.

LOCAL HISTORY

Dungarvan/Abbeyside was always known as one of the chief centres of seafishing on the southern Irish coast. It was described in 1786 as 'one of the greatest fishing towns in Ireland. This seems always to have been the case from as many centuries back as records have been kept. For example, attention has been already drawn to the payment of subsidies to the King of England by fish in 1295. The one important fishing ground for Dungarvan/Abbeyside fishermen was the Nymph Bank. It was said to be 50km from the shore and it stretched from outside Dungarvan to Cape Clear. There was a tale about a man named Doyle, who sailed in a 12 ton (12.218 tonne) fishing boat to the Nymph bank in June 1736. He said that in six hours he filled the ship's holds with hake, cod, ling and other species of fish, so prolific were the fisheries there.

Fishing boat were said to come from all quarters in the beginning of the 18th Century to fish the Nymph Bank. It sounds like a fisherman's fairy tale to read that the fishermen took vast quantities of gunnards, whiting, pollock, mackerel, bass, mullet, bream, as well as herring, haddock, besides hake, cod and ling.

On Sunday 22nd September the Abbeyside Vigil and Garranbane Choir, with musical director Deirdre Collender, together with Fr. Keogh, altar services, readers minister of the Eucharist and a small congregation will travel to RTE for Sunday morning Mass at 11:15am. The Mass will be transmitted live from the studio at Montrose. This is quite an honour for the parish of Abbeyside, Ballinroad, Garranbane and for the choir.

The Abbeyside Vigil Choir had been in existence for ten years now under the leadership of Deirdre Collender. Two years ago due to falling numbers we joined with the newly formed Garranbane choir and sing in each church on alternate weekends. While we now have a combined membership of 25 there is always room for newcomers at either church - or both. Our members range in age from eight to eighty. Musicians and singers are most welcome. At present we use tin whistles, guitars, keyboards, flutes, fiddles, accordion and bodhran at varying times and according to availability. So if you are thinking of taking up something for the quiet winter months, with a social side to it also, why not consider joining us?. At present we practice once a week for an hour on Wednesday nights from 7:30pm to 8:30pm in Garranbane Church. Just come along.

Waterford County Council launching a new campaign

Waterford County Council is launching a new campaign to tackle the problem of extra rubbish bags left out for collection on bin day. Health and Safety legislation bans collection crews from lifting extra black sacks because of the dangers of unseen materials that may cause injury. Furthermore, the Council's bin lorries are fitted with lifts that can only take wheelie bins.

A member of the Council's collection crew is recuperating at home this week after being injured by unsuitable material in a bag of rubbish left on top of a full wheelie

bin. Because of this danger, the Council's collection crews have been instructed not to collect extra boxes or sacks of rubbish left out with wheelie bins. Celine Horner, Environment Education Officer with the Council, explains "rubbish presented in this manner is a danger to staff and can also give rise to litter, which carries an on-the-spot fine of €125. Furthermore, this extra waste could be avoided if the households concerned were sorting their waste and using the Council's recycling collection".



The Council is advertising in the local media to make people aware that extra bags and boxes of rubbish will not be collected. Litter wardens are patrolling the collection routes and delivering letters and information leaflets about the recycling scheme to households whose wheelie bins are overflowing or who have left out extra bags and boxes of rubbish.

Crews working on the Council's collection routes say that it is easy to tell the households that are not taking part in the fortnightly recycling collection because

they invariably have extra bags of rubbish on bin day. Draft byelaws specifying the type of waste that the Council will collect and the type of bins that it can be collected in will be brought before the Elected Members of the Council shortly. When byelaws are introduced, the collection crews will be instructed not to lift any bins that have recyclable materials in them. According to Ms Horner "it is just as easy to use the recycling collection as it is to use the refuse collection, but recycling is a lot cheaper".



CATTLE: Weanling Management

Report from farmers and marts indicate that weanlings are generally 30 to 50 kgs lighter than this time last year. This is due to the weather conditions which reduced both grass growth and the milk yield.

As a result there should be a better than average response to creep feeding. Some farmers are reporting problems in getting the weanlings started on creep. The sweeter and more palatable (and generally more expensive) nut should be used to get the weanlings started. Where farmers do not have a creep feeder a simple creep gate between fields or raising the electric fence between paddocks have been found to be very effective. When weanlings are being both forward grazed and creep fed the cow-calf bond is quickly reduced and cuts down on stress both in the weanling and cow.

Where grass is reasonably good it is advisable to feed up to a maximum of 2 kgs per day. Care should be taken that all the weanlings get an even share and this may necessitate the dividing of older and younger weanlings.

Now that the export market for weanlings is again opening up it is important that producers have everything in order for this market.

- Animals should be weaned and eating meals for at least 2 weeks prior to sale. This helps to reduce stress.
- Animals should be vaccinated against the viral infections which give rise to pneumonia.
- Export certificates should be available – especially for heifers.

It should be remembered that some of the animals could travel up to 1000 miles in rather crowded conditions to their final feed lot. What the feed lot owners will experience this year may colour his attitude to their plans for next year.

SELECTING REPLACEMENT HEIFERS

More and more weanling producers are now selecting their replacement heifers from within their own herd. This means that the replacements are generally three quarters continental. Some of the economically important maternal traits such as milk yield, fertility, docility and longevity may be lost in such circumstances. The weanling producer did not have to worry so much about those traits when buying his replacements from the dairy farmer. But now that he is breeding his own replacements he must put a huge effort into breeding and selecting from within his own herd. In the small herds the farmers will have a very good knowledge of the breeding records of his cows. In the larger herds the farmer should have some documented records of their performance. Many of the economic traits such as milk yield and udder shape have a fairly high heritability.

Replacement should be selected from cows that have consistently produced a good weanling every year. Factors such as pelvic width, growth and confirmation should also be taken into account. Selecting very highly muscled animals may not be advisable as it tends to give rise to fertility and calving problems. The farmer should make his selection before the sales and put a big effort into it.

For the farmer who has his own bull and may not want to use the bull on the replacement heifers it gives him an opportunity to use AI. He should endeavour to get as much information as possible on all the AI bulls available from his local station. Since low milk yield may be a problem in some threequarters breed continental cows specially selected Simmental bulls – with records for easy calving may be used on the replacements. The offspring from such a cross would be suitable as future replacements.

DAIRYING: MASTITIS - AN ISSUE:

- Sadly, it is on the increase:
 - Several reasons: older cows in herd, no teat dipping, no dry cow treatment, poor milking routines, poor milking machine maintenance etc.
 - It is costing farmers money.
 - Some Co-ops are paying bonuses at under 300,000 SCC's.
 - Penalties exist at 400,000 and if the geometric average is over this figure for 3 months then you cannot sell milk.
 - We are heading for this scenario.
 - More vet and antibiotic costs.
 - Loss of milk and poorer quality milk.
 - It is costing farmers longer milk times:
 - One mastitis cow per row probably increases row milking time by one minute.
 - And the discarded milk may have to be hauled out of the pit.
 - All farmers should get individual cell counts done in early September and again in late September on all their cows.
 - This information will be invaluable.
 - Very high SCC cows can be taken out of herd.
 - After a dry cow treatment at drying off, any cow whose SCC remains as high when tested again next April/May, should be culled.
 - It indicates she is chronic and cannot be cured.
 - Any cow that had three or more cases of clinical mastitis this year should be culled.
 - She also is chronic and cannot be cured.
 - Even if you have not any formal records kept, spend some time identifying these cows.
 - Fill the Teagasc Mastitis Record Card next year.
 - Cows with mastitis in the herd will spread the problem to others.
 - You need adequate replacements (probably near 30%) so as not to let the herd get too old.

MICHAEL O'HICKEY (1860-1916)

Michael O'Hickey was born at Carrickbeg, Co. Waterford on 12 March 1860. He was educated at Carrick-on-Suir CBS and then at St. John's College, Waterford. After his ordination in 1884 he was sent to Scotland. He remained there until 1893 and returned to Kill parish. After a year he was appointed

diocesan inspector of schools. O'Hickey's father had been a member of the Fenian movement. O'Hickey became active in the Irish revival movement. During his time in Scotland he contributed prose and verse to Irish newspapers and periodicals. He wrote propagandist articles for the Gaelic League and also gave rousing addresses both at home and in England and Scotland. He was elected vice-president to the movement in 1903. He advocated that Irish be made obligatory for matriculation at NUI. He made public attacks on certain ecclesiastics including two bishops who as senators of the university opposed the proposal. He was reprimanded and in 1909 was dismissed

from his chair in Maynooth. The bishops retaliated stating that he was 'unfit to train ecclesiastics in habits of obedience, humility, and respect for authority.' O'Hickey responded by saying that his attacks on the bishops were on their standing as senators and not as clergy. He went to Rome in 1910 to plead his case but was not successful. This verdict was given in April 1916. He returned to Ireland, but died at his brother's house in Portlaw on 19 November 1916.

NOTICE

MESSAGE TO LAND OWNER/OCCUPIERS

Owners or occupiers of land are obliged under the Roads Act, 1993, to take all necessary care to ensure that trees, shrubs, hedges or any other vegetation on their land is not, or could not be a danger to those using a public road or to somebody carrying out maintenance or improvement work on the road.

Hedge Maintenance

Where labour is available the most friendly method of hedge maintenance is by hand tools:

- A reciprocation cutting bar is very suitable for hedges which are in good condition.
- A flail cutter is suitable for hedge growth of not more than 2-3 years and has the added advantage of mulching the cut materials. A flail cutter should never be used on heavy, woody growth.
- A circular saw should be used on heavy growth and is ideal for shaping up overgrown hedges.

The Best Time to Cut

- Trim during Winter to fill slack periods of farm work.
- Avoid disturbing nesting birds by not trimming during the period 1st March to 31st August in any year, Section 46(b) of the Wildlife (Amendment) Act 2000 states that it shall be an offence for a person to cut, grub, burn or otherwise destroy during the period beginning on the 1st day of March and ending on the 31st day of August in any year any vegetation growing in any hedge or ditch.
- Trimming can take place from September to February with minimum wildlife disturbance.

Where a landowner/occupier fails to meet his/her obligation under the Road Act 1993, a Notice will be served by Waterford County Council requiring him/her to take whatever remedial action is considered necessary to ensure public safety. Remedial action may range from felling to trimming, lopping of branches or preservation. It is an offence not to comply with the terms of such a Notice. If you have not already done so, it is in your own interest to attend to hedge trimming on public roads immediately.

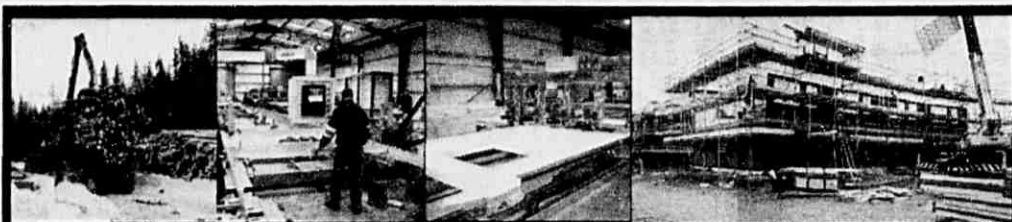

Munster Club championship in brilliant fashion. This was an achievement which also advertised the quality of Lismore's standards.

COUNTY BOARD MEETING

It was one of the better meetings of the senior board in recent times in that far more delegates than normal became involved in the discussions on the various topics dealt with. Paddy Joe Ryan, chairman presided.

COUNTY TEAM BUSINESS

The only team report before the meeting was from Justin McCarthy who gave a comprehensive account of how the senior hurling team fared in his first season as coach/manager. Having referred to winning the Munster championship, he wrote about the disappointment of losing to Clare in the semi-final. He referred in a confident tone to the players and the talent available to the selectors and stated that the panel will regroup in October when the club championships are over.

SAME SELECTORS

As briefly reported last week, the three outgoing, Justin McCarthy, Seamus Hannon and Colm Bonner were reappointed after the delegates had heard a letter read from Mount Sion proposing that the county senior hurling champions have a representative on the selection committee.

It was obvious from the start of the discussion that the board were very strongly in favour of retaining the outgoing three members. A show of hands showed massive support for this.

THE COST

In the course of the monthly financial statement by treasurer Tony Morrissey, it was revealed that the cost (so far) of training and preparing all our 8 county teams amounted to a staggering 225 000 euro and that the figure will be higher when all the accounts are paid. The matter was not debated at length after it was proposed that a full discussion on this topic be held at the October meeting of the county board. The chairman agreed that sufficient time will be allowed for a full and open discussion on the matter at that meeting.

ALL IRELAND TICKETS

The matter of the three thousand tickets that remained unsold for the All Ireland hurling final, despite the huge demand and people in clubs being refused tickets, was raised.

The Central Council delegate explained that as far as he was aware, several of the northern counties who had an allocation of hurling tickets held on to them in the hope of exchanging for

football tickets and that it was too late when the un-exchanged tickets were returned to Croke Park.

Tom Browne, Ballinameela asked the distribution of All Ireland tickets in this county and wanted to know when the allocation for clubs, etc. were each year. he chairman replied that a full account of the distribution is included annually in the report to county convention.

FUND RAISING GOLF CLASSIC

Justin Spratt, chairman of the Golf Classic organising committee was in attendance at the start of the meeting to present a cheque representing the proceeds of the G.A.A. Golf Classic which was run to augment the county team training fund this year. Justin said the event had been very well supported and the fact that they were raising money to help train the new Munster senior hurling champions, was a factor in making this the best yet. On behalf of the county board the chairman thanked Justin and the other members of the committee for the work put in and making the venture such a success.

County P.R.O. on behalf of the official training fund, announced that the response had been good and that very many of the firms and businesses who had been circularised had been very generous and most of the clubs had also contributed. He said the response from publicans who had been contacted, was in the main, disappointing.

INVESTIGATION

John Lyons asked if there was any development in relation to the investigation about the alleged incident which resulted in the injury to Gerry Quinn, Clare in the semi-final. The county chairman replied that the secretary and himself had attended a meeting of the G.A.C., where the matter was discussed but the matter as not yet finalised.

STRATEGIC REVIEW COMMITTEE REPORT

About 18 motions including all those which would be of interest to Waterford were before the meeting and most of the delegates present engaged in the interesting discussions on the various topics.

The consensus opinion was that the vast majority of the 52 motions which will go before the special congress in October, were far too radical and the delegates to congress were in-

structed to vote against them.

There was some support for a number of the motions which were thought to be a bit radical, such as the proposal that the term of office of all officers at all levels should be limited to 5 years. There was no support for the motion calling for a 65 age limit retirement.

2,000,000 EURO FOR TICKETS

The county secretary Seamus Grant informed the meeting that over the year a figure in excess of two million euro was handled in connection with the purchase and distribution of stand tickets. This included the Munster semi-final, final and the All Ireland semi-final as well as tickets for the matches in which the county was not engaged.

MATTERS FROM CENTRAL COUNCIL

A review of the club premiums for the Property Insurance Scheme is to take place in order to ensure that small clubs will not continue to subsidise the bigger clubs with centres, etc. is to take place immediately....

The distribution of the monies from the Qualifier competitions will be decided upon in October, but counties are advised that the receipts are down very considerably on last year.

The appeal to clubs all over the country for donations towards the running costs of the Special Olympics next year, Video evidence, the Blood Rule and the new format for the hurling league, were other topics reported on.

Negotiations between The G.A.A. and the G.P.A., were referred to and the A.C. delegate reported that negotiations were continuing. He said that he viewed the G.P.A. as a rival organisation.

James Tobin, Shamrocks was critical of their demands and asked why players should be paid and officials and others who are working six and seven days a week for the G.A.A. be ignored.

"UP FOR THE MATCH"

The content of the RTE programme shown live on the eve of the All Ireland hurling final was criticised by Paddy Fitzgerald who asked why some of the splendid talent as seen in the Scor All Ireland, be not invited to perform. He said that this is ready made top class entertainment and their inclusion on this programme, would give a deserved boost to the competitions.

Only three further point flags were raised in the closing 18 minutes, two for Kilgobnet by Benny Lynch and the other from Kevin Walsh (C).

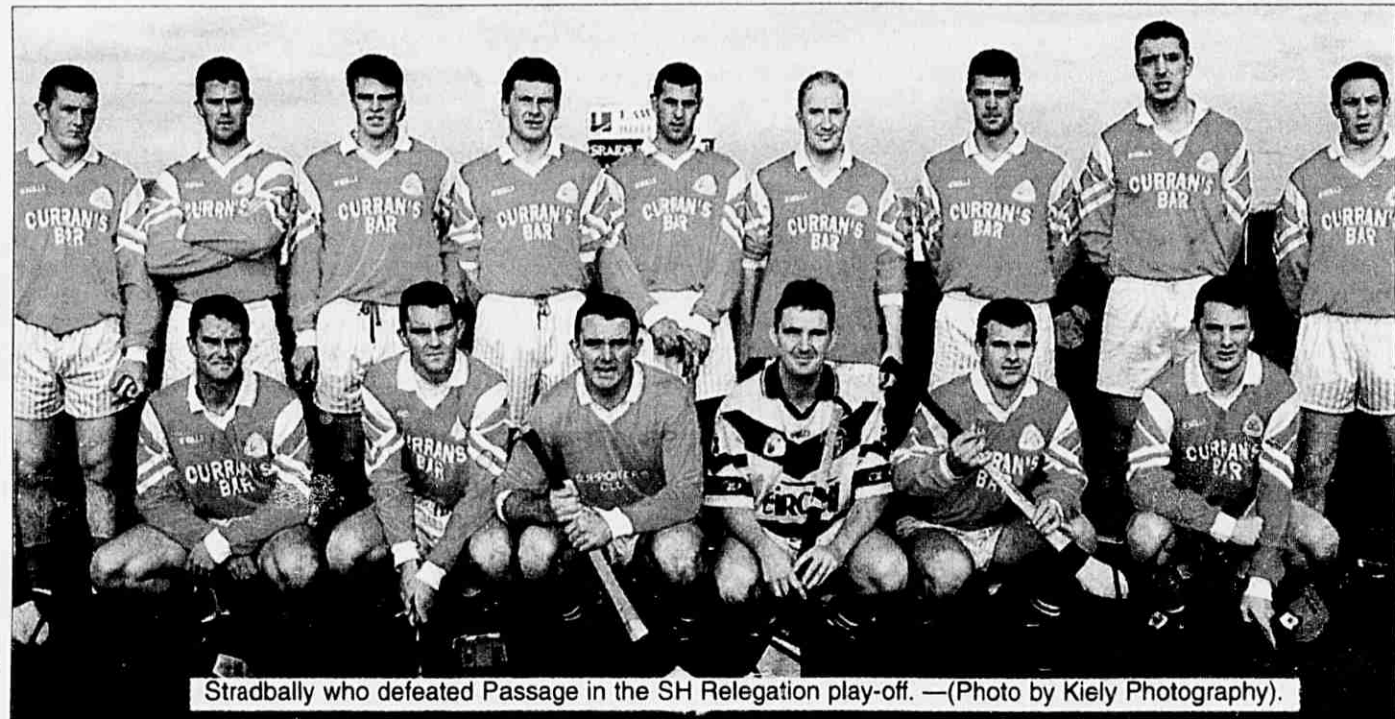

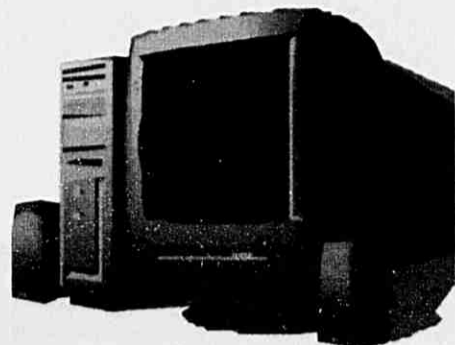

The tournament, which was held in the Park Hotel, on Sunday 8th September 2002 was attended by the President of the IABA, Dominic O'Rourke and his wife, as well as the President of the IABA Munster Provincial Council, John Mahon.

The tournament included boxers from County Waterford's Dungarvan and St. Paul boxing clubs, Tralee B.C. of County Kerry, Clonmel and Carrick-on-Suir amateur boxing clubs, County Tipperary, Fermoy B. C., County Cork and Athy B.C., County Kildare, as well as English boxers from Birmingham City B.C., Birtley B.C. Newcastle, and Ardwick B.C., Manchester.

Following an opening ceremony where the boxers and coaches paraded the ring, and the band played the two National anthems, an enthusiastic exhibition contest warmed the crowd up for the evening's boxing.

The English team won the first bout when the strong, aggressive, Rhys Roberts of Ardwick Lads B.C., forced his way to a majority decision, despite the excellent counter-

punching of Clonmel's Paul Landers in a Boys 3.36kg bout.

At the same weight, Carrick-on-Suir B.C.'s Dean O'Gorman was rescued by the referee in the second round, just as his seconds were about to intervene, against the considerably more experienced, Khalid Saeed of Birmingham City.

The host club's first entrant, Alan O'Callaghan lost a close, majority decision to Birmingham City's Patrick Bailey, in a Boy 3 42kg bout.

At Youth 2. 54kg. St. Paul's B.C.'s south-paw, John Paul McDonagh, was the first Irish victor, coming back from a last round knock-down to withstand the body combination punching of Birmingham City's Michael Bailey to merit a unanimous and popular decision.

In an action packed contest, ruling the crowd on its feet, Birtley's Steven Hall, won a majority decision over Fermoy's John McDonagh in a Youth 2.67kg bout.

Another Dungarvan appearance brought Intermediate heavyweights Emmett Walsh against Clonmel's David Ahearn, in a torrid slugfest where the Clonmel boxer out-slugged the host club's boxer in the opening round, and fiercely repelled Emmett's strong comeback to win an unanimous decision.

Carrick-on-Suir B.C.'s, Anthony McNamara, in a battle of left leads, never recovered his composure following a count from a right

cross from Birmingham City's, John Price, and the referee stopped the contest in the final round, for Birmingham's third victory.

After an even first round, Athy B.C.'s, David Joyce, withstood the body punching of Birtley's Craig Dixon, to box his way to an unanimous decision.

In an exciting Youth 2. bout at 63.5kg, Ardwick Lads' John Joe Keenan, won a majority decision over Tralee's Eric O'Connor.

Despite boxing superbly, Dungarvan's Youth 2. 71kg. Jeremy O'Mahony, lost the closest of majority decisions to the swarming attacks of Birtley's Paddy Ward.

In another Youth 2. contest, at 54kg, Tralee's Kevin Jameson, won an unanimous decision over Tommy Whitfield, of Birtley Boys.

As the entertaining evening drew to a close, Dungarvan's Timmy Coughlan pres-

sured Clonmel's John Mackey in a Senior middleweight contest, but the counter punching of the Clonmel boxer earned him a majority decision.

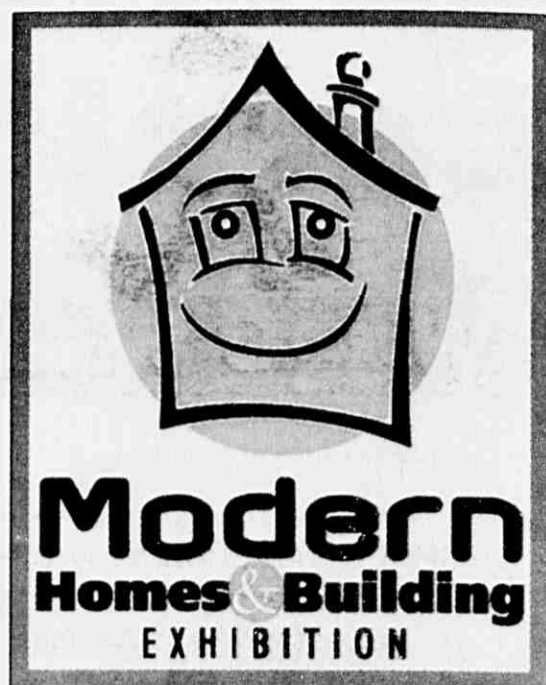

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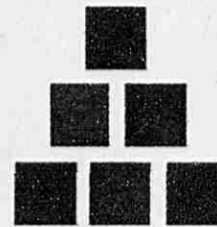

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
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
