Renewal Scheme Fails To Spark Re-Development

A Town Renewal Scheme that promised to revitalise, restore and improve the centres of a number of towns in the area, has seen continued low participation rates, despite its nearing deadline.

Cappoquin, Tallow, Kilmacthomas and Portlaw were all put forward for the three-year tax incentive scheme. But, legal problems with the ownership, planning and title of some of the

designated areas together ahead. Problems have also with the slow take up, has emerged on a national basis seen heightened criticism at its failure to spark re-devel-

Aimed at towns with populations between 500 and 6,000, the residential and commercial incentives were intended to promote the various towns as commercial and social centres.

However, just a handful of restoration projects and developments, have gone







The Council has recently Square will be available in erected some more of the millennium plaques. The Moresby plaque commemorating the bravery of the lifeboat crew that went to the rescue of the Moresby ship in 1895 is erected at the quay. Also erected is a marble wall plaque commemorating Captain William Gibbons for his bequest of £1760 for the layout of the new town park and esplanade in 1894. Captain Gibbons was born in Dungarvan around 1827. He lived in Main Street for a time and then moved to 4 Church Street. He had two daughters and a son. Gibbons spent many years at sea and wrote diaries recording his

various voyages. He eventually established a business as a corn and coal merchant in Carbery's Lane, Dungarvan. In 1885 Gibbons was elected town commissioner and was chairman in 1887. In November of that same year he published a pamphlet titled Dungarvan Town Board 1884-1887 with History & Sale of Town Hall & Buttermarket in 1884. Gibbons and his wife donated the east windows to St. Mary's Parish Church during extensive alterations in 1891. He died on 14 December 1893, aged 67

The first week in October is National Breast feeding Week in Ireland and to acknowledge this, Mother2Mother Breast feeding Support Group are hosting a talk by Barbara Boland, a Waterford based Lactation Consultant. This talk is being held in the Park Hotel on Thursday, the 3rd of October at 8.00PM. Breast feeding is a human right and with the correct information and support, any women can breast feed her child for as long as she wishes to do so. Breast milk is nature's first food for babies and contains all the nutrients necessary for the first 6 months of life, while continuing to be an important part of the child's diet for as long as the breast feeding relationship continues.

Recent studies have shown that breast feeding has many benefits for both mother and baby, as well as for the environment. Here are just some of them:

- Breast milk is constantly changing in composition to meet the changing needs of the baby. It has the exact combination of proteins, fats, sugars, vitamins, minerals and enzymes needed for the human infant at various stages of his growth.
- Breast milk contains antibodies which increase the baby's resistance to infection. Breastfed babies tend to have a lower incidence of respiratory illness, ear infections, diarrhoea and vomiting.
- The stools of breastfed babies are mild smelling and breastfed babies have less nappy rash and are rarely con-
- Breast feeding has been linked with a lower risk of S.I.D.S. [Sudden Infant Death Syndrome]
- Speech and jaw development is enhanced.
- A recent study has shown breastfed babies to have higher IQ's than those bottlefed.
- Breast milk helps to lessen allergy problems in babies born to atopic [allergy-prone] families.
- Breast feeding helps the body to return to it's pre-pregnant state more quickly.
- Studies have shown that women who breast feed have a reduced risk of developing pre-menopausal breast cancer, ovarian cancer and osteoporosis.
- Breast feeding helps to form a close bond between mother and baby.
- Breast feeding makes night feeds and travelling with baby less complicated.
- Breast feeding saves food resources, fuel and energy. No packaging is required and there are no chemicals needed in preparation.

The talk will be of interest to anybody who is pregnant, breast feeding or interested in doing so. The topic will be "Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies" and will cover various aspects of breast feeding both for newborn and older babies. There will be plenty of time for questions and discussion. ing most of the problems have arisen from delays during the legal process.

'A number of problems have surfaced about planning, landownership and about title to the various areas designat-

"Other people are unhappy that there aren't more areas included. But, the scheme as outlined, is a very good scheme. I'd accept that there are problems but not with the scheme itself." Deputy Wilkinson said.

He went on to call for the deadline to be extended as "anything bordering on the legal, takes time.

In Cappoquin, twenty-three sites were recommended for the incentives and approved by an advisory body. However, up until six weeks ago, Waterford

County Council received just one application from Cappoquin with possibly two more thought to be in the pipeline.

Local Cllr. Nora Flynn also stated that the scheme hasn't taken off in Cappoquin at all and believes grants would be more effective for the restoration of old houses

The take-up in Tallow is similarly low, according to Cllr. Willie MacDonnell.

He stated; "The Town Renewal Scheme has been a complete failure from the start. A number of people showed an interest at the beginning but only a very small number took it up".

In one instance, a business, believed to be a big employer in the town, was interested in a house on the main street, but owing to restrictions was unable to develop it. The house has remained on sale two years

"It cost thousands of euro to implement this scheme but the scheme will end in failure", Cllr. MacDonnell said.

Tallow Cllr. James Tobin, agreed that "a whole lot hasn't been achieved through it."

However, he said there has been some up-take, but many more people did not forward for the tax incentives.

"There is an awful lot of people which it didn't affect. Those people who were in designated areas, not in receipt of annual taxable income, were not able to take part in the scheme," Cllr. Tobin said.

Meanwhile, Kilmacthomas and Portlaw have announced a similarly small uptake of the offer with the deadline of July 2003 fast approaching.

"We're now waiting for a response", he said.

However, Cllr. Willie Mac-Donnell replied that the notice has been in place for almost two years.

"The grass is actually growing in the roof of the health centre now", he said.

"I would like for the board, instead of talking about the job, to do the job. This is happening all over the region and it's a disgrace that public property is in such a bad state. I expect a little more action, and a little less talk, and for us to get the job done.'

Week for Dogs

The growing dog population and the shocking statistic that 30,000 dogs are destroyed in Irish pounds each year has sparked a new national spaying initiative. In Waterford alone, Bilberry Kennels, jointly funded at a cost of eur121,000 by the County and City Council's and run by the ISPCA, recently announced that 681 dogs were impounded in 2001, with only 8 reclaimed and 21 re-homed.

Attempting to re-dress these grim statistics the Department of Environment are backing Ireland's first Spay Week at the end of

Co-ordinated between animal welfare groups, individual rescue kennels and the Veterinary Ireland Companion Animal Society (VICAS), it runs from 30th September until 6th October.

Spaying uses good control; general anaesthesia and careful surgical practices preformed by a veterinary surgeon.

It is also the best way to ensure your dog never has puppies and an important way of reducing the numbers of unwanted puppies needlessly euthanised.

Destruction figures are rising annually and will continue to do so unless a long term, practical solution is found. That can only be done with neutering, spaying and education for dog owners to take responsibility themselves.

There are many health benefits to having a dog neutered; breast cancer, common in the bitch, is greatly reduced and can be almost completely prevented if a bitch is neutered before coming into season.

The life threatening condition "Pyometra" is totally eliminated. There are also health benefits to neutering male dogs as well as certain behavioural problems such as excessive urine marking and roaming.

With one unspayed dog capable of producing over 4,000 puppies in just seven years, it makes a compelling argument. As do figures from the UK based, National Canine Defence League. which show a national dog pound destruction figure of 17,000 almost half that of Ireland.

Cat owners are also urged to spay their pets. Tom cats are believed to be six times more likely to die at a younger age than neutered cats. Again, the necessity in reducing the amount of unwanted cats and the growing cats is clearly shown by the fact that in nine years one unspayed female cat, her unneutered male and all their offspring can produce over 11,606,077 cats.

"Spay Week" is an initiative to highlight the amount of dogs being needlessly destroyed and to encourage pet owners not to allow their dogs and cats breed by having them neutered.

The idea of eco-tourism is that people pay money to experience rare species in the wild — visit gorillas in their mountain homes, stroke whales at sea, or feed sharks on a coral reef. The tourism is carefully controlled so that it affects the wildlife as little as possible, and the money funds more wildlife conservation projects.



Setting Up Sanctuaries

ational parks, wildlife reserves and nature sanctuaries conserve some wild places. People may be allowed into certain areas, to enjoy the scenery, plants and animals, while other areas are fully protected. Such areas range from a small wood or pond to a vast area of land or sea, the size of a country. In 1994 the Southern Ocean around Antarctica was declared a huge sanctuary where the hunting of great whales and other threatened animals is now forbidden. But sanctuaries must usually be large. A single tiger needs 50 sq. km or more of forest to hunt in. And several dozen tigers are needed for a sustainable population that avoids the problems of inter-breeding among close relatives. So a small tiger reserve of a few hectares is less useful for the long term.

Planning Restrictions **Central To Consideration** Of New Dungarvan Plan

The county's rural settlement lands in Abbeyside and Dun- Chapter Four of that plan which deals with development control and standards for the county - on page 109 commits Waterford County planners to the view that "erection of new dwellings in locations that are outside the zoned areas will be discouraged". Cllr. Ó Céilleachair points out that the County Council, beyond rare family related exceptions, has gone on to prioritise planning towards the towns, villages and settlement areas as zoned in the County Development Plan and subsequent area action plans. Cllr. O Céilleachair argues that this practice has made life very difficult for anyone who wants to buy, sell or use a site for housing in country areas outside of the zoned settlement areas.

Offering a critical analysis of the Dungarvan Environs Landuse Study Plan, Cllr. O Céilleachair said:

"There are seven parishes in the Dungarvan electoral area, each featuring rural townlands. This zoned settlement areas idea applies in parts of each parish, either through the county development plan or area action plans - of which the Dungarvan Environs Landuse Study Plan is the latest. I have not supported such plans on the

basis that there is an imbalance in relation to people who want to live in non zoned areas of rural communities. I was delighted recently to hear the Government's Rural Affairs Minister Eamon O Cuiv promise that the forthcoming national spatial strategy - operating within the ordinary planning process and with due regard to the merits of individual applications - would set out to address this problem. Of course there is nothing wrong with living in towns and villages and expanding and developing them, but I do believe that when it comes to housing sites outside those areas that we need to listen to people like Eamon Ó Cuiv.

Whilst anyone at any time can look for planning permission subject to the local process and an Bord Pleanala, Minister Ó Cuiv has expressed frustration at the consequences of sites in rural areas going unused due to strategic refusals - whilst at the same time people, regardless of where they work, being unable to realise an aim of living in the rural community particular to them. It remains to be seen if Waterford County Council, through it's elected members, will proceed with the Dungarvan Environs Landuse Study Plan without taking on board the stated position of the Rural Affairs Minister."



Mr. Douglas comments follow in the wake of important findings from 2 national surveys, conducted through consumers and GP's alike. Significantly, 68% of consumers in the South east region favoured home care support in tandem with short term respite care, as the preferred method of helping people in the social management of Alzheimers Dementia. Furthermore, whilst the National prevalence figure of ignorance about the disease was found to be worryingly high at 70% (up to 6% over the past 3 years), the figures for the South East region show lack of knowledge to be below the national average at 62%. The Home Care support service will reach out to families in the West Waterford area, including areas such as Dungarvan, Abbeyside, Cappagh, Youghal, Tallow, Lismore, Ardmore, Ring, Gliddane, Lockre Vie and Coolnasmear. Mary Waters has been appointed coordinator of the service. Presently 2 staff are budgeted for, however as Kate Brennan, development officer with Alzheimers Society points out, this figure is likely to increase, with the provision for at least 2 more staff catering for the likely though put and demand anticipated within the local community. Funding for the aforementioned service is kindly provided through a grant from the South Eastern Health Board, supported by the voluntary fundraising efforts of the local West Waterford branch.

DRAFT LANDUSE STUDY PLAN

This document compiled by Waterford County Council in its Topography and Landscape Quality section mentions specific areas within the parish. The draft states - "The Coastal Zone, on the eastern flank of Dungarvan Bay includes the beach area of Cionea and the zoned area in the County Development Plan 1999 is for intensive tourist uses based on Clonea and Ballinacourty. Inland lie the village settlements of Ballinroad (satellite of Dungarvan) and Garranbane with its church and primary school."

The draft continues, "Landscape quality is the highest order with excellent contrasting features of upland, woodland, pasture, hedgerow, river valley and estuarine landscape all within a radius of 3 miles, providing high scenic and visual amenity. The environs area also contains three 18 Hole golf courses and other sporting facilities (e.g. G.A.A., Soccer and Rugby), hotels, leisure (e.g. tennis, and pitch and putt) and amenity facilities.

LOCAL HISTORY

Last week we wrote about the vast quantities of fish caught in Dungarvan Bay. By the 1740's haddock was no longer to be found in the same numbers on the Nymph Bank which was said to the 50km from the shore and stretched from outside Dungarvan to Cape Clear.

At one time, they said, one man with a line could take 1,000 hake in a night but by 1746 only half that amount was likely to be taken. The traditional fishing method at that time was the hook - loaded line or spiller. The reason for the depletion of stocks was due, it was asserted to over-fishing when different methods of fishing were used after 1736. However, many opined that the depletion in stocks was due to divine retribution for using the surplus hake as fertiliser in the fields. There was a rational explanation for this. One time, the tide rose so high that it flooded the land and when the ebb set in, the ditches were filled with fish.

The figure for hake exports from Abbeyside/Dungarvan in 1729 was 88,100, but fell to 28, 010 in 1738. The average numbers from 1724 to 1730 were 65,521 annually but from 1738 to 1744, the average fell to 39,201.

Test work was high on the list of priorities during the meeting as all knuckled down to the basics, as well as basic drill movements. In the coming week, drill will play a part of the meetings as the patrols compete for the drill trophy. Senior patrol leader Matthew along with patrol leader David organised a badminton doubles competition. This will begin in the coming weeks, when all concerned including those who never played the game before get some practice in. This week's meeting is a mufti one.

On last Saturday, in Ard Scoil na nDéise, in Dungarvan, more than 100 young people from all over County Waterford came together to take part in the first Comhairle na nÓg for the County. The purpose of the day was to provide a forum for young people to voice opinions on issues which affect them, but also to elect four delegates to Dáil na nÓg, which takes place in the Mansion House in Dublin, on October 11th. The first goal of the National Children's Strategy is: "Children will have a voice in matters which affect them and their views will be given due weight in accordance with their age and maturity". This was Waterford's first move in making this goal a reality.

The day was organised by the County Development Board and supported by Foroige. The young people ranged in age from 9 to 17 and participated in a range of facilitated workshops during the day. Early shyness was soon replaced by a passionate eagerness - it was easy to see that that these young people were absolutely committed to the communities in which they lived. They debated a range of issues in a way which indicated that County Waterford, if it can encourage these young people to stay around the place, will be in extremely good hands for the

The quality of debate and input, even from the youngest

of participants, was absolutely heartening and even the adults present were infected by the energy and enthusiasm of the event - a first real opportunity for young people to be a part of genuine "participative democracy". While one could see that these people had a real sense of pride in the County, they also outlined a whole range of issues, which made County Waterford less than a perfect place for young people to live, work and play.

They were extremely articulate in outlining the key problems as they saw them - drugs and alcohol, lack of community facilities, lack of places to hang out and lack of sports facilities. They outlined the lack of access to a whole range of youth services and community and sports opportunities, none more so than in rural areas. They discussed the new multicultural aspect of society in Waterford and felt that there were not enough of Awareness Programmes to counteract growing racial and ethnic prejudices. They need more Drugs Awareness Programmes - not just for themselves, but also for their parents. They indicated a major need for a review of the whole education system and the making of it more relevant to the demands of the 21st century. They spoke of their need to have a quality environment for them and future generations to live in. They discussed their religious needs in an open and frank way. They asked why text messages were so much dearer in Ireland than in other countries. They spoke of their need to be listened to and the way they did it suggested that maybe they were right!

The County Development Board would like to thank all the people who contributed to the day, none more so than the young people themselves. Foroige, Dungarvan Youth Resource Centre, Youth Clubs and Schools around the County, Ard Scoil na nDeise, County Council catering staff, a bunch of adult volunteers and the parents who provided transport. Deputy Ollie Wilkinson, County Council Director of Services Des Page and Susan Pike from St. Patrick's College, Drumcondra all made contributions, but on this occasion they also did something more important they listened.

The successful candidates to represent Waterford in Dail na nOg were Neave Dennehy from Ballinacourty, David Hartery from Tramore, Shane O'Neill from Abbeyside and Sean Coughlan from Lismore. Mol an Oige!



"West Waterford badly needed something like this. For those of us who live here, it's only when we glance through the pages of this wonderful production, that we realise fully, what we have on our doorstep".







Dream Gardens Need Planning

You can cope with all this but the garden is a living mess and rubbish, you can nightmare.

Many people make the mistake of rushing out and planting hundreds of bulbs and seeds on the first warm day of spring.

Many of these bursts of enthusiasm produce badly thought out and planned out gardens which are doomed to failure. The plants wither and the would-be gardeners become convinced that they lack some secret knowledge or inherent skill.

In most cases, a few hours of preparation would have made all the difference. It is

Planning a new garden can be a great deal of fun. After you have cleared away all the start the planning process.

When a garden is over- Don't go out and buy plants before thinking about the conditions you are going to plant in. The three main factors which affect plants are sunlight, soil composition and moisture.

Two of these factors you can influence and improve on - but with sunlight you are stuck with what you are

You will be able to find a plant which will thrive in every condition, from full sunlight to half sun (under a tree or where there is only sun in the morning/evening), to the darkest of shade all day. You will have to watch your plot and determine layers have formed: sand at

Next, you must determine the soil composition - the type of soil you'll be work-

The three main ingredients of soil are sand, silt and clay. Sand has the largest particles and clay has the smallest. An ideal soil would be about 40 per cent sand, 40 per cent silt and 20 per cent clay.

The easiest way to see what type of soil you have is to take a fistful of soil and squeeze it into a ball. If it is unable to hold its shape, your soil is probably too sandy. Try to break the ball apart by pressing on it with your thumb. A good soil will break apart readily - if not, you have too much clay.

Another method is to take a few handfuls of soil and put them in a jar half filled with water. Mix the soil and water around and then let it settle overnight. The next day you will see that three distinct

Once you know what type of soil you have you will have to amend it - the best way to do this is by adding organic matter.


Soil which is high in sand or silt needs a combination of topsoil and peat moss or compost.

If the problem is too much clay, add peat moss or compost and some sand. Sand can help loosen clay soils and allow for proper drainage.

Moisture is obviously connected to the climate of the area you live in. But even in a small garden, there can be big differences.

If your garden is at the bottom of a hill, the soil might stay wet for long periods of time. In this situation, stick to plants that enjoy having their feet wet. If your plot is very dry, don't assume you'll be able to fix the problem by constantly watering.

LISMORE TIDY TOWNS REPORT

OVERALL **DEVELOPMENTAL APPROACH**

Thank you for all the information sent with the entry form and for the superb maps which made it so easy to adjudicate the centre. You are obviously taking a very methodical approach to your involvement in the competition and the development of Lismore in general, and this is to be highly commended. Your Development Plan is excellent. However, you should try to identify what you can realistically achieve within your physical and financial resources on a year by year basis. The objective is to have most items covered at the end of the 5 year period. Do not try to do everything together. This only leads to frustration. Your overall approach is indeed a very good example of what other centres should be doing and you are to be congratulated on it.

THE BUILT **ENVIRONMENT**

All your main buildings were again visited this year the Heritage Centre, Church, Library, Community Centre, and St. Carthage's Cathedral. Schools, Fire Station, Credit Union Building and, of course, your superb Heritage Park of which more later. The Garda Station looked well and public toilets are well maintained. The Public Offices on the Tallow road are in lovely condition and the Hospital and its grounds were superb. The standard of maintenance on these premises is excellent and is a credit to the various bodies which are responsible for them. Work on the Famine House was also noted and is progressing well. Most commercial premises throughout the town looked well. Some, however, looked tired and could do with refurbishrment. The Lismore Hotel, situated as it is in the centre of town, is also being well maintained and the Monument is a lovely feature.

LANDSCAPING

The Millennium Park is superb. The highest congratulations go to all concerned. It is remarkable what has been achieved in the Park over the last twelve months and must now, side by side with Lismore Castle Gardens, be one of the major attractions in the town. Great credit is due to all concerned and the Park will be entered for the Landscape Award. All landscaping sites marked on your map and mentioned in your report were visited. The display outside Lismore Hotel is indeed magnificent and is complimented greatly by the landscaping carried

out on the Cappoquin approach road, at the Grotto and its immediate surroundings, at St. Carthage's Cathedral, and indeed right throughout the town. The hanging baskets on the Millennium Park wall creates a lovely effect as indeed do window boxes, tubs of flowers and other hanging baskets presented by individual households and business premises. On adjudication day, they were a joy to behold. Well done to all con-

WILDLIFE AND NATURAL AMENITIES

The sites at the Canal and the Tallow road were visited but, unfortunately, on adjudication day, wild life was not to be seen. This is not unusual particularly when the weather is bad. The interest of the Schools and the Gun Club are noted and are to be encouraged. By way of items that can be physically seen at all times, it is suggested that you might consider the provision, say in the Canal area, of feeding tables and nesting boxes for wild birds which would create a nice atmosphere and be of further attraction for visitors. Perhaps this is something that the school children could take on

LITTER CONTROL

Lismore was practically litter free on adjudication day. Congratulations to all concerned. Minor littering was to be seen in the car park attached to the Lismore Hotel (much improved on last year) and in the Upper New Street area. This is something which needs to be monitored constantly during the adjudication period.

TIDINESS

On adjudication day the town was presented in a very neat and tidy manner. Pallet storage was seen and your comments were noted. Hopefully this is a problem which will solve itself in due

RESIDENTIAL AREAS

Mountain View, Lis An Oir and Beachgrove were visited. Hopefully these will be completed by next year and will be a tremendous addition to Lismore. The building sites are naturally untidy but this has been taken into consideration when adjudicating. Most houses throughout the town looked well. Some, perhaps, could do with a coat of paint. Lismore has a number of mature housing estates, most of which were visited and were found to be in good condition with their open spaces being generally well maintained. DAIRYING

PASTURE CARE IN OCTOBER

- Pasture damage at this time results in: · Less grass next Spring and throughout the year.
- Reseeding, due to invasion by weeds and weed grasses.
- Sub-soiling or drainage due to soil compaction.
- And, ultimately, lower profits.

• What are the "don'ts" of October grazing?

- Don't allow animal roam over large fields of bare pasture (very common)
- Don't allow animals walk over grazed areas to the next grazing area.
- Don't "strip" graze from the front to the back of a paddock.
- Don't graze animals while it is raining heavily or
- immediately afterwards.
- Don't spend more than 48 hours (ideally 24 hours) grazing any block of grass.
- Don't let animals use dirty roadways or gaps before walking into "nice" grass.
- Don't apply any more Nitrogen
- Don't graze new reseeds in wet weather
- Don't let grass covers get too strong as they take longer

• What are the "do's" of October grazing?

- Do graze out areas in block (squarish), not rectangular because less walking damage is done.
- Do graze paddocks from the back, having walked over good grass at front of paddock.
- Do remove animals from fields after 3-4 hours grazing, particularly, if conditions are wettish.
- Do have several entrances to paddocks.
- Do construct permanent or temporary "spur" roads for getting cows into long or awkward fields.
- New reseeds should be sprayed for seedling docks and chickweed if present.
- Essential piece of advice.
- Use Legumex Extra or Allistel
- For docks only use Legumex, Acumen, or Nintex.
- New reseeds should be grazed to thicken the sward.
- Graze at low covers, that is, more often.
- If they are particularly thin apply 20 units of N and graze again in 15-20 days.
- Use calves or sheep dry weather.

• Get a soil test and apply your O's now:

- 1 to 1.5 bags 0:10:20 is all the grazing area needs.
- 2-3 bags of 0:7:30 for the silage fields.
- Good levels of P & K will promote more Autumn/Winter grass

Empty out slurry tanks now:

- Fierce damage (rutting) and soil compaction is done by
- vacuum tankers on wettish ground
- So plan spreading carefully.
- Apply 2000 gallons per acre on silage fields, never on grazing fields.

DEVINE CRITICISES DEPARTMENT'S DELAY IN IMPLEMENTING BADGER CONTROL PROGRAMME

Waterford IFA Animal Health Committee Chairman James Devine has strongly criticised the Department's delay in implementing its badger control programme as agreed under the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness (PPF)

Mr. Devine said "the recent report issued by Veterinary Ireland supports IFA's contention that the badger population harbours a major reservoir of TB infection and unless an effective badger control measures are put in place, TB will never be eradicated in Ireland. Various reports from the Department show TB infection levels in badgers ranging between 22% and 28%". The Chairman said "the Department's three year delay in making the wildlife unit operational is totally unacceptable as farmers are the ultimate victims of avoidable TB spread. TB in badgers is highly contagious and unless this reservoir of infection in wildlife is significantly reduced in the short to medium term, reduction of the incidence of TB in the cattle herd will never be achieved".

The IFA man said "the Department must take a much stronger approach in the measures it employs to control TB in badgers. A major cost benefit to the state and farming communities will be achieved by doing so. In addition, badger welfare will be improved if diseased animals are removed from the badger population".

Concluding, Mr. Devine said "livestock farmers have suffered major financial losses because of the Department's inability to manage the disease eradication programme properly. Unless a scientific and pragmatic approach is taken to TB control in wildlife, the disease will never be eradicated. IFA is prepared to co-operate closely with Veterinary Ireland to put pressure on the Department and to ensure that the problem of TB in wildlife is fully addressed"

FRENCH SEEKS EXPLANATION ON SUGAR QUOTA CUT The Chairman of IFA's Sugar Beet Section Willie French, has called on Minister for Agriculture Joe Walsh to seek an immediate explanation from the EU Commission why the amount of sugar to be declassified for this year, under WTO arrangements, will now be almost double what was signalled by the Commission in July.

Mr. French expressed amazement that the size of the tonnage now being proposed is in the region of 977,500 tonnes of sugar across the EU, when only in July the Commission was forecasting a declassification of would be 500,000 tonnes. A decision on the final tonnage is to be taken at the Sugar Management Committee meeting in Brussels on Thursday



But there are two areas in which we can improve. Firstly, we can do a bit more to clean our headstones and paint our railings. Much has been done but more to do. Secondly the people of the area have been asked to peg out their plots in the graveyard so as to ascertain what ground maybe available or may not be available for burial ground. It is the intention of the parish committee to mark out areas in the new and old burial grounds which will be available for new plots to be taken. 

KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

A friend of mine, who spent part of his childhood in care, heard that the Department of Health and Children have set up a project to help people, who were in care as children, to access the records which the Department holds on them. How can he access his records?

ANSWER

Among the records the Department holds, are records relating to institutions and to children who were in the care of the institutions. In order to establish what precisely these records contain a project called Access to Institutional and Related Records (AIRR) was setup in July 2002 to index these records. This project will identify files relating to such institutions and also relating to nursing, fostering, boarding out and hiring of children. Once these are identified they will be indexed in electronic format.

Applications for details of personal information held should be addressed to Freedom of Information Unit, Floor 2, Hawkins House, Dublin 2.

In order to process requests for records under the AIRR project, the Department needs as many relevant details as possible relating to the period in care together with full name and date of birth. Proof of identity may be required.

As soon as possible after receipt of a request, an initial search will be carried out under the requester's name. The Department will inform the requester if any relevant personal records are located. Records located during the AIRR project may be released directly to the requester or through an advocacy agency.

If you have already applied to the Department under the Freedom of Information Act for records, your details have already been added to the AIRR project search list and there is no need to reapply.

The Editor, Dungarvan Leader A chara,

I was one of those who appealed to An Bord Pleanála in relation to the granting by Dungarvan Urban Council of planning permission for the development of a shopping centre in the former Glanbia site. I wish to state at the outset that I am fully in favour of the idea of developing shopping facilities, and particularly a major supermarket, on this site. I have no vested interest in relation to the development, apart from my concern that the site should be developed in a manner which will respect the town's existing architectural heritage and which will integrate the site with the rest of thetown centre.

It is important to point out that the planning permission was overturned by An Bord Pleanála because it was contrary to the urban council's own development proposals for the site. Those urban councillors who have been complaining

about the planning appeal should appreciate that they themselves unanimously adopted the town Development Plan which contains these proposals.

It is also important to point out that An Bord Pleanála's decision was not a close-run thing, as some have tried to make out. In the Planning Inspector's report on the appeal, he concluded that the proposed development only fully met two of the sixteen criteria for the development of the site set out in the Development Plan. It partly met four others and failed to meet the remaining ten. Overall, the inspector found that the proposed development was essentially suburban in nature and inappropriate to a town centre location.

He also found that the development would create a traffic hazard which would endanger public safety (especially that of pedestrians). One might reasonably

ask how come the council gave permis-

sion to a proposal which was so much in violation of the town's own development plan.

Many observers have voiced concern that Dunne's Stores might pull out of their proposed involvement in the development if there are further lengthy delays in getting the project under way. Again, it is important to point out that Dunne's Stores are involved in this development for their own benefit, not for the benefit of the people of Dungarvan as such. Whether or not they decide to locate in Dungarvan will be based purely on commercial considerations, and not on any irritation based on planning delays which are the norm for any major shopping development in this country. With all the residential development that is going on in Dungarvan at the moment, it seems likely that the commercial outlook for a major supermarket will, if anything, improve in the coming years.

Thank you indeed for all the information sent with the entry form and for the map which was most useful on adjudication day. Your comments regarding the 3/5 year plan have been noted. This should be done in conjunction with Waterford County Council, FAS and your other partners and should identify what you can do over the period within your physical and financial resources. A tremendous amount has already been done and a very high mark has been achieved by the village. However if further progress is to be made it calls for planning and attention to detail.

THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

Your freshly painted Church, School, Glanbia premises, Garda Station, Hall and Post Office looked extremely well on adjudication day. Commercial premises in the village also looked well on adjudication day and are obviously being well maintained. Congratulations to all concerned. Your stone walls continue to be a feature of the village which, together with the Cemetery and the Grotto, are also being well maintained. The comment made by the second Adjudicator last year regarding corrugated roofs still applies.

LANDSCAPING

All sites mentioned on your map were visited. In particular the area around the Church was noted and looks resplendent as did the river area. As last year, flowers on walls, in window boxes and hanging baskets create a lovely atmosphere in the village.

WILDLIFE & NATURAL AMENITIES

While your comments under this heading are noted, the feeling is that you should consult the Tidy Towns handbook as to what is expected from such an initiative. For example, it might be interesting if initially you were to provide feeding tables and nesting boxes-for birds in the river area or in the School grounds. Perhaps it is a project which school children could get interested in. In any event, consult the Tidy Towns handbook and if necessary the Wildlife Officer of Duchas who will be only too glad to help. In the meantime, you will receive the same mark as last year under this heading

LITTER CONTROL

Aglish was practically litter-free on adjudication day. This is a great achievement and many congratulations are due to all concerned. It will be necessary, however, to keep monitoring this aspect of the competition over the adjudication period.

SECOND ADJUDICATION (3-8-2002)

On second adjudication day litter control was as effective as before, but summer weed growth (encouraged by wet weather) was not coped with here as well as in other villages at the top end of the competition. Ragweed was prevalent in the agricultural property alongside the fine river amenity. The helpful suggestion of the first adjudicator regarding planning- and attention to detail' should be seriously considered.

Leukemia

What is Leukemia?

Leukemia is a form of cancer; it is cancer of the blood cells. The blood is made up of a fluid called plasma, and three types of cells and each of these cells has a special function. White blood cells help the body fight diseases and infections; the red blood cells carry oxygen from the lungs to the body's tissues and take carbon dioxide from the tissues back to the lungs. The red blood cells give the blood its colour. Platelets help form clots that control bleeding.

Blood cells are formed in the bone marrow (the soft centre of bones), new blood cells are called blasts, some blasts stay in the marrow to mature, some travel to other parts of the body to mature. Normally blood cells are produced in a controlled way as the body needs them, this process keeps the body healthy. When leukemia develops, the body produces large numbers of abnormal blood cells, in most types of leukemia the abnormal cells are white blood cells. The leukemia cells usually look different from normal blood cells and they do not function properly.

Types of Leukemia:

There are four main forms of Leukemia, these are as follows:

Acute lymphocytic leukemia (which is common in young children, although it can also affect adults).

Acute myeloid leukemia (occurs in both adults and children).

Chronic lymphocytic leukemia (usually affects adults over the age of 55, although it can affect young adults). Chronic myeloid leukemia (which occurs mainly in adults).

Hairy cell leukemia is an uncommon type of chronic leukemia.

In Acute leukemia the abnormal blood cells are blasts that remain very immature and cannot carry out their normal functions, the number of blasts increases rapidly and the disease gets worse very quickly. In Chronic leukemia, some blast cells are present, but in general these cells are more mature and can carry out some of their normal functions. So Chronic leukemia is usually a gradual process.

What are the symptoms of Leukemia?

Leukemia cells are abnormal cells that cannot do what normal blood cells do. They cannot help the body fight infections. For this reason, people with leukemia often get infections and have fevers. Some of the most common signs and symptoms of leukemia are as follows:

- Fever, chills and other flu-like symptoms
- Weakness and fatigue
- Frequent infections
- Swollen or tender lymph nodes, liver or spleen
- Easy bleeding and bruising
- Bone and joint pain
- Swollen or bleeding gums

Diagnosis of leukemia

Blood tests are used to diagnose leukemia, although blood tests may reveal that a person has leukemia, they may not show what type of leukemia it is. Further tests in include examination of a sample of bone marrow by a haematologist, oncologist or pathologist.

Treatment

Treatment for leukemia is complex, and it varies with the type of leukemia and is different for everyone. Treatment is planned around the individuals needs. Treatments include medication, Chemotherapy, Radiation therapy, Biological therapy and Bone marrow transplant.

What the future holds

Researchers are finding better ways to treat leukemia, and the chances of recovery keep improving every day, and once treatment and recovery have taken place, most people will go on and lead a full productive life.





Unlikely For Dungarvan **Before** 2004

The installation of a Closed Circuit Television system in Dungarvan is unlikely before 2004. Town Clerk, Brian White revealed that the council had hoped to apply for the provision of a community CCTV system. However, when the details of the scheme were announced. it was found unsuitable for the proposed location of Grattan Square.

The Community Scheme does not provide a link to Garda monitoring and "was not the type of scheme we had initially hoped for," Mr. White said.

The Town Council is now to apply for a Garda monitored and Department of Justice backed CCTV scheme. The scheme is funded on a fifty percent Department of Justice and fifty percent Community

Mr. White said a commitment has been given that the Town Council will provide half of the communifunding aspect, providing the Chamber of Commerce provided the other fifty percent.

However, he went on to say it's unlikely that the Department of Justice would respond positively before 2004.

Cllr. Damian Geoghegan described as "crazy" the fact Dungarvan couldn't go ahead even if they paid the full cost of the scheme themselves.

Mr. White replied that a CCTV system would have implications for the Gardai and agreements would have to be reached on the monitoring of the system and staffing with the Department of Justice and so its backing was vital for the proper use of the Town Centre system.

Banklink Machine Needed in Abbeyside

Dungarvan Town Council is to write to all the banks in the hope of having a bank link machine installed in Abbeyside. Proposing the measure, Cllr. I do not know which of the two finals at Fraher Field on Saturday is entitled to be given the profile of the 'feature game' but for some unknown reason there appears to be more of a buzz about the football final than there is about the hurling decider. Being football strongholds in the traditional style must have something to do with the high expectations of the battle between the Seana Phobal club and Kilgobnet. Both are very popular clubs and I know that the neutral people in the crowd here on Saturday will be divided about which side they will want to win.

Old Parish whose catchment area is quite restricted, have not won a football title since 1979. The team incidentally was captained by Michael Hogan who is now the Seana Phobal coach. They next qualified for A final in the early eighties but were defeated then by the Em-

They have now come here by the back door but at the same time they have won more matches than the club has done at any time in the past. They lost to the Nire in the first round but an amazing transformation in the team saw them win their other engagements in the style of champions. I saw them beat Ardmore, Ring, Modeligo, The Brickeys and Dungarvan and was honestly surprised at the improvement in their standards. Also, I was delighted at the change because only a couple of years ago things were at an all time low in the club. This is a welcome change for a club who have braved all the obstacles that have threatened their survival.

Players helping them to win the title will include goalkeeper Aidan Power, full back M. J. For a dog having his first race the May 2001 whelp Tex Kelly came away running from trap five and despite the constant presence of Black Weather the strong running Tex Kelly saw the trip out to the limit to score a shade cosily by two and a half lengths.

The opening novice race of the night fell to the Gerry Kiely owned Airmount Trudy (Smooth Rumble-Airmount Swallow) this 2/1 shot after first bend crowding coming from behind the front running Star Of Rio to shed her maiden tag by half a length in 29.95.

The well supported Honey Rumble (Smooth Rumble-Gemmas Spark) 1/1 captured a novice sprint for local owners Davy and Michael Power in 16.67. The fast starting winner was past by Binsted Gismo near the first bend but when the latter ran very wide on the bend Honey Rumble took the shortest route home to come through for a three lengths success.

In the fourth contest Top Mythos carried the favourites tag of even money and showing good early pace the favourite led around the first corner from Darbystown Trail. The winning time was 30.80.

In the tenth race Graigue Gale scampered into an early lead over Nine Mile Rover but running down to the penultimate turn Bondi Storm 2/1 closed right up on Graigue Gale.

The G Holland owned Bondi Sorm (Pepes Dilemma-One For Tarbert) 2/1 appeared to make contact with Graigue Gale causing the leader to lose ground. In a mad dash for the line Bondi Storm came out on top by half a length in 30.91.

There was very little to complain about the fare on offer at Kilcohan Park last Saturday as a huge crowd enjoyed the final of the Sasha Confined 28.80 stake plus the eight first round heats of the 2002 Aer Rianta, Cork Airport, Munster Oaks. If I was asked to nominate the performance of the year the Cork bitch Society Princess would certainly be on my short list as the David Mahony owned and Liam Callaghan trained Society Princess (Mountleader Peer-Westmead Slick) ran the race of her life to pull the Sasha Confined 28.80 final out of the fire. After two eye catching early paced performances Society Princess was reported to be carrying a slight injury going into last Saturday nights Euro 2,400 to the winner event and she was available at 4/5 at the off. For once the jolly mistimed her break and was then carried over to the rails from her trap five starting point by the rails seeking Davids Ranger. At the first bend Fund Manager and Interloper were involved in early crowding as Dysert Orchid sprinted into a handy lead. Society Princess still had a mountain to climb down the back stretch but remaining glued to the rails she finished like a train to outstay the Dysert Orchid by half a length in 28.84.

Packing to much early dash for her rivals Bettys Beauty opened up a handy back stretch lead over Longvalley Dame and Confident Chick and despite a late flourish by Confident Chick Bettys Beauty was full value for length victo-

Heat 5 — Local trainer Paul Kiely was on the mark here as the Roy Shorter owned Princely Lady (Staplers Jo-That's My Lady) 3/1 overcame a lengthy lay off to post a hard earned 28.88 success. Snazzy Girl showed in front to the opening turn but she moved into lane two at that point losing ground and hampering a prominent Senahel Ridge in the process. Once she got a sniff of a gap on the fence Princely Lady was in front in a matter of strides to lead from Oldcastle Rosie and Claudies Pet. Digging deep Princely Lady was not giving in without a fight and battle

she did winning out by two and a half lengths from Oldcastle Rosie with Senahel Ridge coming back from the dead to take her place in the draw for the second round. The winners time was 28.88.

















