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Tallow Public Library Officially Opened



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



Exploring The World

In 1419, explorers from Portugal began to sail along the west coast of Africa. It was the start of 200 years of pioneering voyages in ocean-going wind-powered ships. These voyages had dramatic consequences. For the first time, Europeans and peoples from America, India, Southeast Asia and the Far East came into regular contact; sometimes they worked peacefully together, sometimes they fought.

Religious Wars

In 16th and 17th century Europe, many people quarrelled about religion. Campaigners, known as 'Protestants' brokeaway from the Roman Catholic Church to set up new churches of their own. They disagreed with Roman Catholic beliefs, wanted to worship in their own languages, and to decide how their local churches were run. For over 150 years, between around 1500 and 1650, Europe was torn apart by bitter religious wars. They were fought between rulers and peoples who supported the rival Protestant and Roman Catholic branches of the Christian faith.



Thirty Years War

One of the worst religious conflicts was the Thirty Years' War (1618-48), between Austria and Spain (Catholics) and some German states, Denmark and Sweden (Protestants). Spain and Austria ruled parts of Germany, and wanted to ban the Protestant faith from their lands. The war caused dreadful damage and terrible loss of life. No one could 'win', but when it ended, the German states were given freedom to worship as they chose.

Pork & Camembert

Cooking: 15-20 minutes

This unusual recipe with apricot sauce needs to cook at 200C, gas mark 6.

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 2) 2 x 100g pork escalopes 50g Camembert cheese 1 x 15ml spoon plain flour Salt and black pepper 1 egg, size 3 beaten 50g fresh breadcrumbs 2 x 5 ml spoon paprika.

Sauce:

4 x 15 ml apricot jam 150ml white wine or orange juice Method:

Place escalopes on a board between two pieces of clingfilm, flatten with a rolling pin. Cut the Camembert into two even pieces and place a piece of cheese in the centre of each escalope.

Fold meat around cheese. Mix flour and seasoning and use to coat pork and cheese parcel. In a bowl, mix breadcrumbs and paprika. Dip meat in the egg and coat thoroughly in breadcrumbs. Place on a baking sheet. Cook in a preheated oven for 20-25 minutes until golden.

In a saucepan, combine apricot jam and wine/orange juice. Bring to boil and simmer, uncovered, until sauce has reduced and thickened. Pour sauce over pork. Serve with new potatoes and selection of vegetables.





AN easy, no cook snack ideal for the family. The dip brings out the flavours of the juicy fresh fruits.

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 6)

2 large oranges, peeled 1 peach, stoned and sliced

1/2 watermelon, made into balls

1/2 cantaloupe melon, peeled and cut into small wedges

1/2 honeydew melon, peeled and cut into small wedges

225g seedless green grapes

mint sprig to decorate

The dip:

100g low fat soft cheese 300ml Greek style yoghurt

1 tspn finely grated lime

2 tblspns reduced sugar marmalade

2 tspns crystallised ginger

1 tspn finely grated lemon rind to decorate.

Method:

Divide oranges into segments. Arrange orange segments and other prepared fruit on a large serving plate. Garnish with mint. Cover plate with cling film. Chill until required.

For the dip put cheese into a mixing bowl.

Beat with an electric mixer until very soft and fluffy.

Beat in yoghurt, lime rind and marmalade until smooth and blended. Chop ginger and stir into mixture.

Spoon dip into bowl. Cover with cling film. Chill for one hour. Garnish with lemon rind.

Serve with the fruit.

PARTY FRUIT PLATTER LAYERED FRUIT SUNDAES

Preparation:

15 minutes

Prepare this mouth watering layered dessert in tall glasses for a professional

INGREDIENTS:

(serves 4)

290g can raspberries in apple juice

100g strawberries sliced 2 kiwi fruit, peeled and sliced

500ml tub of soft vanilla ice cream

12 raspberries

4 mint sprigs to decorate Method:

Drain raspberries and reserve 2 tblsns juice from can. Mix with a fork until smooth and runny.

Using a spoon, press raspberries through a fine sieve into a small bowl.

Discard seeds. Stir reserved juice into puree.

Divide 50g of the sliced strawberries between 4 tall dessert glasses. Put half the sliced kiwi fruit over the strawberries. Spoon 2 scoops ice cream into each glass.

Drizzle raspberry puree over ice cream. Put remaining strawberry slices, kiwi fruit and raspberries around the side of the

Cholesterol

There are two types of cholesterol: HDL, high-density lipoproteins and LDL, low-density lipoproteins. HDL is considered good and LDL bad cholesterol.

The total amount in the body of a person weighing 70 kilograms (10 stones) is around 140 grams, and the amount present in the blood is 3.6 to 7.8 m.mol per litre or 150 to 250 milligrams per 100 millilitres. A blood-cholesterol level above 6 m.mol per litre

(238 mg per 100 ml) is considered high.

To lower Cholesterol eat / take: - Beans - Artichokes - Pure apple juice / Two apples a day - Organic porridge oats -Special aged garlic extract (Kyolic) - Choline & Inositol, fat emulsifiers found in Lecithin. - Fish oil capsules / oily fish like salmon, tuna, mackerels. - Unsaturated fatty acids, like unrefined sunflower oil and Olive oil. - Milk thistle, which is a liver tonic. The liver produces over 60% of the cholesterol. - Niacin (Vitamin B3) increases the activity of enzymes that help to break down fats and cholesterol and decreases the deposition

Major Burgery Development Site To Be Sold In Lots

A major commercial and residential development on 21 acres of land at the Burgery near Dungarvan, has been put up for sale in individual lots. The news comes just four months after a local consortium received planning permission for a hotel, retirement village and 133 houses on the site.

The prime development land was advertised last week by selling agent, Spratts Property Partners, as being of interest to owneroccupiers or developers and will be sold by private treaty in one or more lots.

The consortium behind the project, believed to comprise of around twenty to thirty local and Clonakilty based backers, launched the development in October of last year and secured planning permission in May.

It was proposed at the project launch that the site be developed by the consortium itself, and then sold on to a hotel group, a group for the retirement village, and tenants for the houses, including a percentage for affordable

dicted an early start date for the project; of late summer for the residential stage and before the end of the year for the 4/5 star hotel.

But, the sale of the entire plot has sparked some concern that one or more sites may never be developed and raised fears that some of the projects could be dropped in favour of extra residential units by outside developers.

The "Dungarvan Leader" has been reliably informed that the consortium may still develop some of the sites at a later stage, if interest is not forthcoming. It is also believed that both the local and Co. Cork financial backers have remained on board the consortium.

However, the sale of the development sites in lots, "is a source of disappointment" according to Abbeyside based Councillor, Michael O'Riordan, who attended the project launch in October.

Commenting on the sale, he said: "I'm disappointed as someone involved in politics and as someone very interested in the development at the Burgery. Now that it's going to be broken up into different lots, the main conopment ever take place there"

While the planning permission includes three particular developments - the 114-bed hotel, 133 residential units and the retirement village future developers could resubmit fresh applications for different projects, he said.

"It's in the county area, which means the planning permissions granted there, will be outside our (Dungarvan Town Council's) con-

"The councillors making the decisions would be councillors from say Dunmore East, Passage East, Tallow, who would know nothing about the environs of Dungarvan and the effects the wrong development would have on Abbeyside and Dungarvan.'

There's nothing to stop them from changing their planning. For arguments sake the hotel, could be dropped. The retirement village could be dropped and they could be made residential."

The same danger exists with the two other sites, listed as commercial and retail, he claimed.

Cllr. Billy Kyne also said at the retirement village.

The consortium also pre- cern will be, will the devel- he was very interested "to see this major potential development re-advertised."

Clearly, the preference would be normally for the construction to start, and see the development come on stream. The sale of the development in lots or collectively, at the very least must indicate a delay.

"What will be interesting to see, is how much of a delay will be created in this strategy. There's always a reasonable concern that if nobody is interested in acquiring this site immediately, they will postpone or delay the development even into next year."

'But", Cllr. Kyne added, "the market and time will tell on that.

The major development site faces onto the main N25 Waterford road, and if a developer or owner-occupier comes on board, it is hoped it will include one of only two retirement villages in the country, while the cost estimated at last years launch for developing the entire site would be in the region of 50m. The original proposal would also have created 250 jobs in the construction phase, the hotel and staffing



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



Residential Areas

Individual houses, particularly on the approach roads, looked well and some had lovely gardens which were in full bloom. In general open spaces are also being well maintained although, on adjudication day, some of them needed cutting. The quayside apartment complexes also looked well.

Wildlife and Natural **Amenities**

Unfortunately the adjudicator found it difficult to identify Fr. Twomeys Road but accepts that work is progressing there on a wildlife project. This is to be commended. Perhaps clearer directions on next years map as its location will initiate a better sighting. The existing signage at Dungarvan Bay is being well maintained and is very informa-

All in all the footpath situation in Abbeyside urgently needs to be looked at and hopefully the Town Council will do the right thing and take the problem on board by commencing with Murphy Place.

PINEWOOD DEVELOPMENTS



Cash flow has been squeezed on many dairy farms due to lower milk prices and higher costs. As a result the cash surpluses that would normally occur around now are very low or non-existent.

- Work out a simple cash flow budget for the next few months. Include all likely receipts (farm and other) and all farm payments. Factor in a figure for family living expenses. Don't forget taxation payments - due in November. Estimate the resultant cash surplus or deficit.
- · Postpone any expenditure (farm or other) that isn't absolutely necessary.
- List out everything that you owe and find out the relevant interest rate for each. Could all the various different loans be restructured into one loan over a suitable
- Be prepared for any meetings with creditors (people you owe money to) or the bank manager. Have your most recent set of farm accounts and cash flow budget avail-

Some possible solutions to cash flow problems include:

- Restructuring existing loans
- Look for a moratorium (loan repayment break)
- On some farms, it may be possible to sell drystock or cull cows earlier than normal

The Farm Assist Scheme may be an option for smaller dairy farmers on low incomes.

ICMSA SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS **PESSIMISM ON FARM INCOMES**

The result of an ICMSA Farm Survey conducted at the National Ploughing Championships confirms the depressed state of farm incomes, with virtually all farmers (97 per cent) suffering an income decline this year. 56 per cent of farmers surveyed expressed pessimism about their futures in farming.

63 per cent of farmers expect their incomes to decline

by 15 and 20 per cent this year and a further 20 per cent of farmers expect to see their income fall in excess of 20 per cent.


ICMSA President, Pat O'Rourke said that 90 per cent of farmers expect no improvement on their income situation in 2003. "This points to the central issue of farm incomes that needs Government attention and this was the message we conveyed to the Taoiseach when he visited the ICMSA stand"

Pat O'Rourke again pro-

posed to the Taoiseach the establishment of a Commission on Farm Incomes to direct national and EU policies to restore profitability in farming. "I am encouraged that the Taoiseach now has a full grasp of the severity of the problem and the need for action. It was agreed that further discussion on this issue will take place in the coming days", concluded Mr. O'Rourke.

REPS BUDGET MUST BE FULLY UTILISED

Mr. John O'Connor, Chairperson of ICMSA's Farm Services & Environment Committee said that the REPS budget has been considerably underspent to date and must be fully utilised to ensure the objectives of this Scheme are fully met and the rural environment and farming receives the investment it requires.



If you were to ask a professional to draw up a blueprint for fixtures in the county that would sow confusion and disaffection and be guaranteed to strangle the development of club adult hurling they couldn't do it better than we are doing it at the moment.

For some time now, through the medium of these notes, I have railed at the catasrophic

system(non system more like) of fixtures in this county.

If the feeling at our own meeting last week is anything to go by we at last are getting a groundswell of opinion from clubs who are no longer willing to put up with inept planning and lack of continuity in our fixtures.

There is no cohesion whatsoever. Clubs play a game and are then idle for months on end. The board take a notion and then fixtures are fired in at will, usually on a bank holiday week-end. Tough if you and your family have made long term plans for a holiday or you have tickets booked for months for a concert. I understand two inter county players who have devoted more time to hurling and football than could be reasonably asked of any professional sportsman may miss their clubs most important championship game of the year because they have holidays booked and paid for. You cannot treat players, selectors and club members like this.

We have seen the confusion in our own club and Tallow is no different to any other. God knows it is hard enough to get people to take on a bit of responsibility and look after teams. A couple of years ago I worked with Pat Murphy and Tom Doyle as a selector. In my naivety I thought we could sit down and draw up a planned programme of preparation and training. I tore it up within weeks. It was always a guessing game. Well we might be playing championship on such a date but if Waterford win you don't know. It could go off for months. To add to this you had county and college teams pulling players right left and centre - but that is a separate, though no less important, issue and I want to concentrate on the fixture fiasco. "You don't know" is probably the most commonly used phrase in Waterford clubs.

Many counties produce a fixture booklet (with a lot of other valuable information as well) at convention. Naturally there will be changes as the playing season unfolds but it allows members plan their year to some degree. People, especially younger people, have a life outside G A A

Get out your spread sheet and factor in the variables. We know intercounty fixtures in advance and it doesn't take a genius to come up with a cohesive continuous set of fixtures for Waterford hurling and football for the year. Assuming of course we do not wrap our county players in cotton wool. We have seen that it doesn't work and successful counties like Kilkenny and Armagh have respect for their club championships. If the men (and it invariably is) charged with the responsibility of restoring sanity to our club fixtures are not up to the job my advice would be to get help.

In the past I have been critical of the organisation within Bord na nOg but I must compliment their fixtures secretary. We got a list of fixtures at the start of the year which were for the most part adhered to and championships ran on schedule though this should not be seen as an end in itself. There are of course problems, often created by clubs including our own, with regard to grading, fulfilment of fixtures and timing of competitions, but there was at least some structure, with a start and finish date, to the games plan.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I heard that there has been an increase in the monthly threshold for the Drug Payment Scheme. Can you please give details of the scheme?

ANSWER

Since 1st August 2002 under the Drugs Payment Scheme an individual or family will have to pay €65 (previously €53.33 per month for all approved prescribed drugs, medicines and appliances for use by that person or his/her family in that month.

Family expenditure covers the nominated adult, his or her spouse/partner and children under 18 years or under 23 if in full-time education. A dependent with a physical or mental disability/illness living in the household who is unable to fully maintain himself/herself, may be included in the family expenditure regardless of age.

You should register for the scheme by completing the registration form which is available from pharmacies or from the Health Board. A plastic swipe card will be issued for each person named on the registration form. This card should be presented whenever you are having prescriptions filled. You should use the same pharmacy throughout the month.

You should not have to pay more than 65e in any calendar month to the pharmacist. If you do, for any reason, pay more that 65e in any month then you can apply to your Health Board for a refund.

You can claim tax relief on medical expenses (in excess of €125 for one or €250 for a family in tax year 2002) for which you have not already been refunded or reimbursed through insurance.

SHOPPING SAVERS

We are all familiar with dashing around the supermarket doing a quick weekly shop. That short trip however may be enough to upset your budget on a regular basis. The following tips may be useful in cutting down the cost and even saving you money.

- Frozen meat and fish can be cheaper than fresh.
- · One large French stick will cost less than individual bread rolls.

- Buy a whole chicken instead of fillets, and use the extra to make a tasty stir fry the next day.
- Avoid convenience foods and prepare from scratch.



DISABILITY AWARENESS

Huntington's What is Huntington's?

Huntington's disability is a hereditary disorder of the central nervous system. It is sometimes known as HD (Huntington's Disease) and it can affect both men and women. Huntington's disability results from genetically programmed degeneration of the brain cells, called neurons, in certain parts of the brain. This disability is caused by a faulty gene on chromosome 4, the gene which produces a protein called Huntingtin, was discovered in 1993. The faulty gene leads to damage of the nerve cells in areas of the brain including the basal ganglia and cerebral cortex. This leads to gradual physical, mental and emotional changes. Each child of an HD parent has a 50-50 chance of inheriting the HD gene. If the child does not inherit the HD gene, he or she will not develop the disability and cannot pass it onto future generations. If a person has inherited the gene, they will eventually go on to develop the disability themselves.

What are the symptoms of Huntington's?

The early symptoms of Huntington's disability include the

- Slight, uncontrollable muscular movements, stumbling and clumsiness
- Lack of concentration
- Short term memory lapses
- · Depression and changes in mood
- Aggressive and anti-social behaviour

Diagnosing Huntington's disability can sometimes take a long time, and a lot of strain can be put on the person with the disability and on the family. As the disability progresses the symptoms include involuntary movements, difficulty in speech and swallowing, weight loss, emotional changes resulting in stubbornness, frustration, mood swings and depression. The disability usually developes when people are between 30-50 years old, although it can start much earlier or much later. The symptoms can differ from person to person, even in the same family.

What Treatment is available for Huntington's?

There is no known cure for Huntington's disease at present, but there are ways to manage the symptoms effectively. Medication can be used to treat and improve symptoms such as involuntary movements, depression and mood swings. Speech Therapy can significantly improve speech and swallowing problems.

Research into Huntington's?

Although Huntington's attracted considerable attention from scientists in the early 20th century, there was little sustained research on the disability until the late 1960's. Research now includes the following:

Basic neurobiology - Now that the Huntington's gene has been located, researchers are studying the anatomy, physiology, and biochemistry of the nervous system to define how it causes disease in the human body.

Clinical research - Neurologists, psychologists, psychiatrists, and other investigators are improving our understanding of patient's symptoms and progression of the disease while attempting to develop new treatments.

Imaging - Scientific investigations using specialized technologies are enabling scientists to visualize what the defective gene does to structures and chemicals in the

Dungarvan Museum Notes

The museum has recently published the memoirs of George G. Lennon 1990 -1991 on its web site at www.dungarvanmuseum.org. The memoirs contain first hand accounts of the Burgery Ambush and the activities of the West Waterford Flying Squad during the Irish War Of Independence. Born in the South of Ireland of old Northern ancestry, George Lennon was the leader of an Active Service Unit (Flying Column) during the War of Independence (1916 - 1921). As a pacifist he was, in part, instrumental with the late Chester Carlson (inventor of Xerography) in founding a large Buddhist community in the United States. He later played a prominent part in the American anti-war movement that sprung up in opposition to the Viet Nam war. His home was in Rochester, N.Y.

Other recent articles published include: A Brief History of Mountain Castle, Millstreet, County Waterford by Catherine Nugent. The Civil War In Ireland (1641-1653), Contemporary Accounts From Waterford by Catherine Nugent. Master McGrath - The Master Craftsman by Michael Maguire. Lewis's Topographical Dictionary edited by Jackie McGuire. Samuel Lewis's Topographical Dictiin 1837. We have reproduced the City and County of Waterford section in its entirety on the web site. The opinions, views and spellings are Mr. Lewis's own and present an excellent picture of the County as seen by a gentleman in the 19th Century. Every parish in the county is listed along with an often detailed description of housing, topography, industry, population and general conditions in which the people lived.

Charles John Kean

(1811-1868)

Charles John Kean was born in Waterford on 18 January 1811. He was the second son of Edmund Kean. Kean was sent to Eton College to be educated. However on the breakdown of his parents marriage he was removed from Eton.

He was aged sixteen at this stage. Soon afterwards he quarrelled with his father and decided to take up acting as a career. His first engagement was at Drury Lane, where he remained for three years. During that time his salary rose from £10 to £12 per week. He became reconciled with his father and they both acted together for a time. Kean married Irish actress,

The Kathleen Murphy owned Priceless Style left nothing to chance bounding clear from trap four for a pillar to post 28.35 victory cruising to a six and three quarter lengths win over Pearl Of Wisdom. The winners clock was the fastest time of the session.

The Leinster Lawn Syndicate owned Lotto Princess was forced to come from behind to capture her qualifier in 28.71. Woodville Lady displayed a nice blast of early pace to lead to the third bend. With Lotto Princess looming up to challenge "Woodville" lost her action and Lotto Princess was left in the clear to win out by seven lengths from Longvalley Dame.Most punters were of the opinion that Lotto Princess may have clipped Woodville Lady causing the latter to lose her action. WATERFORD HOT ROD NEWS Driver of the Year Championship 2002

The Heffernan Transport sponsored 2002 Driver of the Year Championship finally reached its conclusion on Sunday 22nd September and ended months of speculation as to who would eventually claim this years title. With individual class honours still undecided prior to the final round the tension amongst the drivers was evident as they calculated their championship points and determined in which position they would need to finish to secure victory

The Class 1 title fight was always going to be a close encounter. Since the season began the Fiats of Kevin Healy and Eoin Mackey had been enjoying tremendous battles with both drivers swapping paint along with positions as Healy sought to take the title away from his rival. As the two cars assumed their grid positions, Kevin had a slight 4pt advantage but still needed to finish ahead of Mackey if the title was to be his. The opening few laps saw the East-Cork driver put under Eoin under intense pressure as he searched for a gap. With the white car of the Waterford pilot not yielding the inside line Healy tried to overtake around the outside but inexplicably lost control and rolled the car, allowing Mackey to take the Championship for the second year in succession.

Class 2 resulted in a 17 pt winning margin for North Cork driver Liam Healy in his tri-coloured Fiesta over the challenge of the Kerry duo of Ned Hannon and Dave Hallinan. Several impressive displays over the course of the year saw Healy distance himself from his rivals to take home the title. As the Class 3 season began predictions as to who would win the title were treated with scepticism as the volume of cars in the class made it impossible to single out anyone in particular. However as the year got underway, three drivers managed to break from the pack and establish a dominant force in the 1300cc class. Prior to Sundays action Waterford driver Jason Ryan had a 6pt lead over Charlie MacNamara with Kenny Treacy waiting in the background. Unfortunately for Jason, his car did not want to co-operate with him and broke down, leading to his retirement from the race as well as the championship hunt. Kenny clinched 3rd spot with a strong display but it was the all-conquering form of MacNamara which

However, as the season progressed it became apparent that O'Shea was not going to be denied as he consistently fought his way through to the front of the pack and secured the Class 4 title by a staggering 23 pt margin ahead of a close battle for second between the powerful Starlet of Willie Bumster and the similar car of Darren MacNamara.

Several weeks ago John O'Connor heralded his return to Class 5 with 2 podium finishes which signalled his intent on winning the driver of the year title. The wonderfully prepared Toyota has since then scored 36 pts from a possible 40 which proved sufficient enough for the number 9 car to edge ahead of the swarm of Hondas in the class.

Limerick driver Donal Shanahan underlined the importance of consistency throughout the Class 6 cam-

paign as his continuing presence coupled with the strength of his 2.8 litre Starlet saw him secure the trophy by a mere 2 pts from the powerful Honda engined car of Kevin Roche. The Ladies championship was split into class 1,2 and 3 cars and class 4,5 and 6 hot-rods. The 1,2,3 competition was dominated by one driver from the outset as Sandra Clancy showed her ability to battle against higher powered cars and claim victory on a regular basis by finishing almost 20 pts ahead of her closest challenger Mary Moore. The 4,5,6 championship was also won in convincing style for the second consecutive year by Geraldine Bumster who masterfully piloted the Class 4 Toyota all season and never once looked threatened for the class honours.

The Junior class always provides huge entertainment value and the unbelievably close finish to this years season is a great reflection on the ability of these young drivers. With seven drivers having a feasible chance of winning the title as Sunday approached the racing was guaranteed to be tough and exciting. Jonathan Keating overcame a 9 pt deficit to eventually claim victory, the Corsa of Richard Harney finished a mere 3 pts behind with the similar Opel of Stephen Bumster bringing home 3rd place.

With the Class championships decided, the focus changed to the Overall Driver of the Year Championship and to the driver with the highest points total at the end of the season. James O' Sheas domination of Class 4 had him reach a total of 87 pts yet Charlie MacNamaras strong finish to year saw him top Class 3 with an impressive 97 pts. However it was Car number 611 driven by Eoin Mackey to Class 1 victory which eventually claimed the prize of the Overall Driver of the Year Championship 2002 with a total of 99 points.

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
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
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
