Historic West Waterford Family Archives Up For Sale

FEARS OF ITS LOSS TO FOREIGN INSTITUTIONS

Over ten thousand documents and volumes of "immense historical significance" to the West Waterford area have been put up for sale, leading to a call for Waterford County Council to step in and ensure the collection is not lost to the county.

The Villiers-Stuart collection, which is mainly held in Dromana House, Villierstown, is valued at eur300,000 and contains documents dating from c.1215-1960.

Mealy's Fine Art Auction-

eers valued the papers as being "an immensely important archive of family papers of one of the Principal Families in the South of Ireland".

"The historical importance of this archive cannot be overstressed," the valuation report says.

It has also rare items of printed ephemera that "probably are not to be found anywhere else."

The collection is said to be generally in very good condition and some of the damaged earlier documents have CONTINUED ON PAGE 9

Please Note Saturday Opening Hours 10 a.m. -1 p.m. Major changes to the zoning of land in Ballinacourty is unlikely, according to Director of Services at Waterford County Council, Denis McCarthy.

Mr. McCarthy was responding to concerns from some Ballinacourty residents that councillors and planning officials were proposing to "blanket re-zone 300 acres of farmland".

The zoning of Ballinacourty is to be copper fastened by the Dungarvan & Environs Study Plan, which originally proposed the area be zoned as agricultural. The plan was

recently advertised and put on public display and is due to go before the County Council next Monday for decision.

However, fears have emerged from some residents in Ballinacourty that the zoning would be changed to residential.

In correspondence with the 'Leader', a Ballinacourty resident, said that: "The Dungarvan Environs Study Plan that closed for submissions several weeks ago did not envisage any changes in the Ballinacourty area. But since then, there has been a num-

ber of rezoning proposals discussed between County Councillors and Planning Officials, which if acted on would ultimately lead to the urbanisation of this rural

"While very few would have problems with 'one-off' houses, the blanket re-zoning of up to 300 acres of farmland should not happen without the views of the area's residents being taken into account."



schools and local business. Perhaps this is now the time where you must seriously consider the production of a 3/5 year plan as mentioned on last year's report. This need not be elaborate or expensive and can be done in conjunction with your Local Authority, FAS, your local business interests or residents. community. Consult also with your Regional Tourism authority (based in Waterford) who has long experience of involvement in the Tidy Towns Competition. The Tidy Towns Handbook should also be of assistance to your committee.

The Built Environment -Many of the comments made in last year's report are still applicable under this heading. A lot of work remains to be done on commercial premises and indeed on some private houses in the centre of the town. There are some unoccupied houses and derelict sites which need attention and in connection with the latter, you should liaise closely with your Local Authority who have powers under the Derelict Site Act to deal with these matters. The church, community centre, credit union building and the grotto on the Mount Melleray road were very well presented and looked well on adjudication day. It is true to say also that many shop premises looked extremely well. Others were in need of refurbishment.

If you have not already done so you should try to involve members of the business community on your committee.

Landscaping — New landscaping at Twig Bog was seen. That whole area and its car park are developing very well. Unfortunately the area of Twig Lane is still very untidy and is not enhanced by the dumping of a derelict car. Trees and shrubs planted in the past are now maturing nicely. New planting was also noted and flower baskets and window boxes, where present, looked very well and are being well maintained. Additional planting in and near the Grotto greatly enhances that area.

Wildlife And Natural Amenities - Glenshelane woods and River Walk are indeed a magnificent amenity for Cappoquin and probable in its own right attract many species of wildlife. However it would be nice to have a specific project on the site and the provision of feeding tables for birds and nesting boxes in suggested. Signage at the site is very good but perhaps some indication might be given also as to the type of wildlife which can be seen in the area.

Litter Control — The centre of Cappoquin was practically litter free on adjudication day. This is a very fine achievement in a very busy town. Unfortunately there was some litter to be seen on the outskirts of the town and in the vicinity of the schools. Your recycling Centre is a great addition but again, some litter was to be seen in that area. This is an important part of the competition which needs constant monitoring.

Tidiness — In general Cappoquin was presented in a neat and tidy manner. Twig Lane is the exception. However more attention could be given to open storage which destracts from many of the side streets and with some attention, could greatly improve the overall ambience of the town.

Residential Areas — Cappoquin has many housing estates, most of which were visited on adjudication day. They are being extremely well maintained and open spaces, in general, looked well. Gardens are being well looked after and window boxes and hanging baskets, where present, also looked very well and are being well maintained. Well done to all concerned. There was however some evidence of minor littering in one or two of the estates on the Melleray Road.

Roads, Streets and Back Areas — Approach roads looked very well again this year and the cutting of grass verges seems to have improved over last year. The car park at the Sports Centre and in the Twin Bog area were very neat and tidy. Road surfaces and pathways are being well maintained and in this connection, great credit is due to your local authority.

General Impression — This year the impression is that good work is being done on maintaining existing infrastructure and providing additional items par-

The Museum would be delighted to accept any new members for the forthcoming year. The next memberships will be due in October. Membership fee costs *12.70 per year. 'MAJOR' HENRY EELES (1699-1781)

The museum has recently acquired an important collection of letters and papers associated with 'Major' Henry Eeles. He was not a major, but it was an affectionate greeting by which he was known due to his autocratic bearing.

The Eeles family lived in Co. Wicklow, having originally come from England. Henry's family moved to Waterford around 1685. His father, John, was Dean of Waterford and Archdeacon of Lismore. He died in 1724. Henry had at least two brothers and two sisters. Henry was appointed comptroller of customs for the port of Waterford. In 1724 went to Lismore where he was appointed receiver to the Earl of Burlington's estate. He proved himself to be an excellent businessman and capable receiver.

In 1736 he was appointed sole agent at Lismore. Burlington's property passed into the Cavendish family by marriage, when Charlotte Elizabeth married William, the 4th Duke of Devonshire. Eeles was retained as agent at Lismore. According to William Henry Grattan Flood, Eeles lived in a house now known as the Devonshire Arms Hotel. However according to a document the in possession of the Dungarvan Museum it states that Eeles lived in a cottage in Lismore which was later occupied by Lyons & Co., a drapers store. Eeles never married. His youngest sister, Sarah, stayed with him and acted as his housekeeper until her marriage. His niece, Rose, stayed with him from her birth to his death. She married Samuel Roderick of Ballyquin.

Eeles is especially famous for his work with lightning and electricity. Around 1751 he began to devote himself seriously to natural philosophy, especially to electricity, of which he was the pioneer in Ireland. From 1756 onwards he began to successfully treat people with various ailments and illnesses, by using electrical stimuli. His services were sought by hundreds of patients. He sent three essays to the Royal Society, which were printed in the 47th, 48th, and 50th volumes of the 'Philosophical Transactions'. These with nine other essays are in the 'Philosophical Essay', which book was published in 1771 in both London and Dublin. His publisher, Laurance Larkin Flynn, Dublin, printed 516 copies of Eeles philosophical essays. The essays dealt with his electrical experiments. His ideas however did not accord with Priestly's and Franklyn's theories and so Eeles was snubbed by the Royal Society.


He invented a flying coach. This was a coach with sails and flew a few feet above the ground. He took out a patent on this machine, costing him £34.4.4*. He gave several exhibitions of his flights in Lismore, Cappoquin, Youghal and Tourin.

Eeles died in Lismore on 7 October 1781 and buried on the 9 October 1781. By the terms of his will he was buried on the summit of the Knockmealdown Mountains 'so as to be near the home of his beloved lightning'. Legend has it that he was buried with his horse, dog and gun but according to our documentation an eyewitness states that this is not the case. The eyewitness says that there was a lot of drinking and merriment with dancing and pipers playing during the night. These festivities were requested by Eeles before his death.







EUROPEAN UPHEAVALS

HE 16TH AND 17TH CENTURIES were a time of rapid change throughout Europe. There were upheavals in religion and government, and in ideas about art and science. New inventions like printing and new information about the rest of the world brought back by explorers raised questions in many peoples minds. These were exciting, but disturbing too. People no longer agreed about how they should live and worship. Some, like the Mayflower settlers, left home to set up new communities in distant lands. Others began to question how their countries should be run. Most rulers held fast to traditional beliefs. But in some countries, terrible poverty and economic problems led to government reform.

Imports

xplorers' pioneer voyages also led to an enormous increase in interest. enormous increase in international trade between 1600 and 1800. Many plants, such as tomatoes and potatoes, and animals from America were introduced to Europe and Asia. In return, Asian plants like sugar and African plants like coffee were car-





Ever since 1799, when an American writer invented the name, the religious pioneers who sailed in the Mayflower have been called the 'Pilgrims'. people who made a long, dangerous journey because of their faith

Pilgrims n 1620, a group of 102 men, women and children with strong Christian beliefs decided to leave England for faraway America, where they could set up a new community, run their own church, and make their own laws, based on the Bible. They sailed in a cramped, leaky ship called the Mayflower, and endured a long, stormy voyage across the Atlantic Ocean. They landed (in Massacheussetts) as a bitter winter began. Over half of them died; the rest only survived

because friendly Native

American people gave them food and showed them how to grow American crops like pumpkins and maize. The next year, 1621, they managed to gather a plentiful harvest which gave them food for the winter and made them safe.

Civil War

ing Charles I of England believed he had a divine (God-Agiven) right to rule. Many of his people did not agree, and this led to a civil war (1642-8). Parliament won, and King Charles was executed. England became a republic, and an army commander, called Oliver Cormwell, ruled England as 'Lord Protector'. He, in turn, was replaced by the King's son, who ruled as Charles II.

Spicy chicken kebabs

Preparation: 3 hours Cooking: 25 mins

THIS delicious and warming meal is best served with rice and salad.

INGREDIENTS

(Serves 4)

- 1.5kg chicken pieces
- 2 onions, finely chopped 50ml oil
- 1 tspn dried thyme
- 1 bay leaf
- Half tspn paprika freshly ground black pepper
- 4 small courgettes
- 4 small tomatoes

REMOVE skin and bone from chicken pieces, using a small sharp knife

Cut meat into 2cm pieces. Place in a bowl with onions. oil, thyme, crumbled bay leaf, paprika, salt and pepper. Wash courgettes, trim ends and cut into 1cm pieces. Add to marinade and marinate for two to three

Reheat grill. Drain chicken and courgettes, reserving marinade.

Peel tomatoes and cut in half, remove the seeds. Thread pieces of tomato,



chicken and courgette alternatively onto four skewers, dividing ingredients evenly between them.

Place on grill rack, brush liberally with marinade. Sprinkle with a little paprika. Grill for 20 minutes or until

chicken is well cooked, lowering heat to moderate after five minutes and turning skewers to cook evenly.

Preparation: 30 mins Cooking: 10 mins

THERE are several versions of this recipe for mussels but this is the easiest to prepare.

INGREDIENTS

(Serves 4)

- 4 pints mussels
- 1 small onion 3-4 tblspns dry white
- wine
- loz butter
- 1 tspn plain flour
- 1 tspn chopped parsley

WASH the mussels in cold water, scrub shells and rinse to remove all grit. Pull away the beards. Discard any mussels with broken shells and any which remain open when tapped.

Thoroughly butter the

inside of a large saucepan. Peel and finely chop the onion put in saucepan with wine.

Place all mussels in the pan at once and cover with a lid.

Cook over high heat and shake pan for three to five minutes until all the mussels have opened.

Take pan from the heat and lift out the mussels, discarding any that have not opened. Remove the empty half shell from each mussel and place the other half with the mussel attached in individual soup plates. Keep hot.

Cream butter and flour together and blend into the liquid in pan. Stir the sauce over a low heat until it has thickened and is boiling. Add the parsley and pour over the mussels. Serve at once.

Marrow Zasserole

Preparation: 10 mins Cooking: 30 mins

MARROW has such a high water content that it loses most of its flavour if steamed or cooked in water.

Firmness and taste is preserved by cooking it this way.

INGREDIENTS

(Serves 4-6)

- 1 young marrow
- 50 g butter
- 2 tblspns mixed fresh herbs - tarragon, mint, parsley and chives
- Salt and black pepper

CUT the marrow into 2.5cm thick slices.

Peel and cut them into rough

chunks, discarding all the seeds as you do so. Butter an oven proof dish thoroughly.

Add the marrow with the remaining butter cut into small knobs and sprinkle it with the mixture of fresh, finely chopped herbs.

Season with salt and freshly ground pepper.

Cover the dish with a lid or foil and bake it in the centre of a preheated oven at approximately 180C until just tender after about 30 mins.

Be careful not to overcook. Serve the marrow at once, straight from the dish.



been restored. A smaller collection of 34 archival boxes, presently deposited at the National Library of Ireland, will also be part of the Villiers Stuart sale.

The likely buyers for the important collection are believed to be one of the National Institutions, although the estimated cost has fuelled speculation that they may pass out of the country.

However, according to Deputy John Deasy, the primary concern of seller, David Villiers Stuart, is to make sure the collection is given to an institution that can provide the papers with on-going preservation and protection.

"I've spoken to David Villiers Stuart and expressed my concern that the collection should not leave the country".

"I think the collection is extraordinary from a visual point of view. Just picking out a few from the list; it has designs for the Hindu Gothic Bridge Gateway at Dromana; plans for a timber bridge at Youghal and plans for Dungarvan Harbour. It's something that has to be kept in the country", he said.

Deputy Deasy said the documents should be acquired by an organisation that has the expertise to look after them, with some of the costs shared by Waterford County Council.

"The problem with 13th Century documents is they need careful preservation. My idea is to put them in the care of an organisation that can properly maintain them on an on-going basis and have them on public display in the County."

"From Co. Waterford's point of view this is a very important collection. But for an institution like University College Cork, it's small fry. I'm asking for Waterford County Council to step in, share the costs, put the visual content on display around the county and ensure this collection is not lost to the people of Waterford."

"It would be of great interest, not just for academics, but for all the people of the county and particularly of West Waterford"

County Librarian, Donald Brady, said several National Institutions are interested in acquiring the papers. But, the estimated cost of eur300,000 may be prohibitive.

"Should the papers be pur-

chased by a foreign institution, they may be exported, but under a licence, which would require the provision of a microfilm copy to the National Library", Mr. Brady stated.

The County Librarian added that "the papers generated, are of immense value to the people of Waterford" and their sale could mean they are lost from the county.

Meanwhile, speaking yesterday County Manager, Donal Connolly, said the council was certainly aware of the sale of the Villiers Stuart papers and is viewing the sale with interest.

He said that if the council examine the possibility of purchasing the papers, it would be looking to do so with the help of a national institution.

Included among the ten thousand documents are - deeds and documents from Fitzgerald of the Decies, 1215-1598, documents of the Viscountess Grandison 1674-1701 and the papers and letters of Henry Windsor Villiers Stuart, MP for Co. Waterford on two separate occasions, rules for model farm at Villierstown; design for a pier and fishing village at Ballinaguale, and posters of "Riots of the Slivegrine Mountain".

Prisoner Attempts To Abscond Near Western Bay

A 25-year old man unsuccessfully attempted to escape custody on Thursday afternoon, last, while being transported from Carrick-on-Suir to Cork Prison.

William O'Reilly, with an address in the Thurles area, swam more than a hundred yards into the sea from Western Bay in Dungarvan, despite being handcuffed. He was eventually persuaded to return and give himself up by Gardai.

O'Reilly appeared in front of Carrick-on-Suir District Court earlier that day and was remanded in custody to Cork Prison, and was being brought there by taxi. A Garda accompanied him in the taxi.

O'Reilly faked illness on route and asked the driver to stop the car so he could get some fresh air. As the prisoner and his Garda escort left the car, O'Reilly made his dramatic escape bid by hurdling a fence, and jumping into the sea near Western Bay. Gardai in Dungarvan were quickly contacted.

His plans foundered after just a short time and, responding to Garda calls, he swam to the back of Childers Estate, where waiting Gardai apprehended him, and took him to Dungarvan Garda Station. The man was said to be exhausted, but otherwise uninjured from his escape attempt.

continued: "Locals are concerned that these major changes have developed after the public consultation period closed, and feel the entire process should be put on hold until further public consultation has been entered into".

However, Mr. McCarthy said the members of the County Council would make the decision on the study plan at their next monthly meeting. He said that a report had been drawn up after the public consultation phase concluded and would be submitted to councillors.

Rules governing the local authority's decisions on changes to the original Dungarvan & Environs Study Plan also dictate that another public consultation phase can't be held after being decided on by members of the council.

"Various proposals were put forward in discussion documents, but these were just discussion documents".

He added that it was unlikely that major changes to the Ballinacourty zoning would be made.

The Winged spindle (Euonymous alatus) exhibits even more striking colour in autumn than the Virginia Creeper. A dense, bushy, deciduous shrub, the leaves of Euonymous alatus turn brilliant dark red in autumn, lending a vibrant, warm feel to a shrub border. This plant would also work effectively as a specimen placed in a prime position in the garden, having ample character to stand-alone.

As well as beautiful foliage, the Winged spindle also produces decorative (inedible) fruits in autumn and winter.

These are almost spherical in shape and reddish purple in colour. This plant achieves an approximate height of 2m and a spread of 3m. There is also a compact variety available, Euonymus alatus 'Compactus', which reaches a height of 1m. Like Virginia Creeper, this plant will thrive in most garden soils in full sun or light shade.

Planning for autumn colour is a rewarding way of getting the most out of those precious summer-like autumn days. We aren't guaranteed an Indian Summer every year, but the visual impact of these plants in their autumn dress is sure to warm the heart regardless.

SILAGE ANALYSIS

For some, silage cutting was three weeks late while for others it took three weeks to cut. Either way early indications are that silage quality is well back. Silages appear to be lower in energy, lower in protein and as a consequence intakes will be lower. Such shortfalls in quality will have to be balanced over the Winter. In order to do this it is more critical this year than ever to get your silage analysed. If you are interested in getting it tested contact your local Teagasc office.

FEEDING STRATEGIES

One of the rules of thumb that we often use is that to finish cattle economically you will need at least a 70DMD silage plus 5.5 kg of concentrate if the animal is to gain 1kg/day.

So what if your silage quality is below this? Chances are that many silages will be <65 DMD this year. This adds significantly to costs, every 5 unit drop in DMD will have to be supplemented with an extra 1.5kg of concentrate. Over a 150 day feeding period this would amount to an extra 225 kgs of meal/head (36) just to compensate for poor silage.

Where silage quality is moderate why not consider an all concentrate 90- 100 day finishing period. Animals for example that are due to be finished in December/January could be housed and gradually built up to ad-lib concentrates over a 3 week period. Animals on this type of regime from work carried out in Grange have better killout % and lower levels of carcase fat. Performance is more predictable, it will reduce labour, interest charges and slurry requirements but more importantly it eliminates having to incorporate poor quality roughage into the fin-

It is vital though that animals are built up on ad-lib meals gradually and once ad-lib, that feed is kept in front of them at all times and that they have access to some roughage in the form of straw or silage.

For animals that are not destined to be finished until March they too can be intensively finished but for the initial 50-60 days after housing they can be fed silage ad-lib only or with up to 2kg of meal. Then build up in the last 100 days to all meal.

Farm Safety

DROWNING IN SLURRY!

In the last 10 years, 15 people have fallen into slurry tanks; incredibly, 9 were children.

The problem arises when farmers have to lift slats in order to empty slurry tanks. These slats are heavy and awkward and farmers and do not put them back until time later. The unsuspecting person falls into the tank and drowns.

Installing a safety manhole access cover that will provide full protection, if properly used Since the early 90's, all new slatted sheds are required to install safety access covers for grant purposes; however, there are still a number of farms where access to the tank is by lifting slats.

The cost of the cover is about £350, which is a small price to pay for peace of mind.

Sympathy in these situations is no longer good enough; action must be taken to eliminate the problem. We are challenging and encouraging you to have a safety access cover on all slurry tanks.

Rural Women Share Views At World Congress In Madrid

Over 1500 rural women cipal issues that affect rural erment of rural women. women worldwide. Among the participants are people with responsibility for designing equal opportunities' policies, government representatives and representatives from rural organisations. The key topics for discussion include globalisation, food safety, sustainable development, CAP review and the empow-

The IFA are represented at the event by AnneMacDonald-Hill of the Farm Family Committee and by Equality Officer, Mary Carroll. Speaking at the conference Mary Carroll said: "The huge role of women in agriculture is not reflected in policy or by their participation in decision making".

She continued: "Women in Ethiopia, who have very different problems on a daily level, have key issues in common with women from the West of Ireland. These include the need to increase their access to resources, for example land ownership and economic opportunities; increase their visibility in policies and programmes and recognise the status of women on farms".

The Equality Officer said: "There is a very strong feeling from the Congress of the need for action and not words. This is true in Ireland The IFA is determined to encourage greater participation by women and also to push for policy changes."

According to Anne Mac-Donald-Hill: "The recommendations of the key

report of the 'Advisory Committee on the role of Women in Agriculture', must be implemented. The key recommendations include the need for women to be properly represented, an improvement of legal issues affecting women on farms, and the need for social insurance cover.'

Women can spend their lives working on the farm and when they come to retire it is as if they have never worked as they are not eligible to make PRSI contributions. All Department of Agriculture schemes need to be gender proofed and it must be ensured that the schemes contain no anomalies that work against farm partnerships."

She continued: "Building networks and partnerships that can effect real change is of vital importance. Links have been made with a network of Australian women at the Congress. 

LOOSE Women

Codes of Behaviour and Morality for Waterford Women in the Nineteenth Century

A LECTURE BY JOANNE ROTHWELL, WATERFORD COUNTY ARCHIVIST

The nineteenth century was a period when women (and men) were agitating for votes for women and for improvements to the legal and social position of women. Possibly as a consequence of this it is also the century when strictures on behaviour and the



morals or lack thereof in women was addressed in literature, in parliament and in society in general.

This lecture will identify the standards of behaviour and code of conduct set out for women in the nineteenth century. It will also identify how this affected the lives of women in Waterford as seen in some of the records held by Waterford County Archive. Finally, some cases where women found it impossible to live within these strictures, loose women, will be identified and discussed.

Dungarvan Museum society is delighted to have obtained the services of Joanne Rothwell for their second Lecture of the season.

Joanne has done tremendous work in the County since her appointment to the position of Waterford County Archivist in 1998. Her recent talk at the Civic Offices in Dungarvan and Tramore titled "Raising the dead" kept her audience spell bound for over an hour and warranted a mention in the Irish times.

This particular talk will be of interest to many, Joanne's style of delivery will almost certainly add a touch of humor to a very interesting, if not distressing period for Women in Irelands history.

Joanne has a BA in English and History from UDC, she also holds a Higher Diploma in Archival studies from UCD. She is currently serving as chairperson of the local Authority Archivists group, and is also the training officer with the society of Archivists of Ireland.



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

QUESTION

I am applying for a Fuel Allowance under the National Fuel Scheme. If I am eligible for it how much will I receive.

ANSWER

The National Fuel Scheme is intended to help people who are dependent on long term social welfare or health board payments as their sole income and who are unable to meet their heating needs.

Under the scheme people who qualify for the Fuel Allowance receive an extra 9e per week. If you qualify for the basic Fuel Allowance you may also qualify for an extra 3.90e per week for smokeless fuel, but only if you live in an area where there is a ban on smoky coal.

In order to qualify for the Fuel Allowance you must satisfy a means test. You and the members of your household cannot have more than 50.79e per week in combined income or savings/capital of 41,266.49e or more above the appropriate maximum Irish contributory pension rate in order to qualify. For example, someone without any savings receiving a Widow's or Widower's contributory Pension of 123.30e per week should qualify if his/her weekly income does not exceed 123.30e plus 50.79e i.e. 174.09e. However, if you are already on a means tested payment you will not be subject to another means test for the Fuel Allowance. Where two or more people living in the same household would qualify for the allowance, only one allowance will be paid. The allowance is paid for 29 weeks from early October to mid-April.

If you think you are eligibly you should apply immediately as the allowance will not be backdated if you apply after the start of the heating season (30th September 2002). Application forms (NFS1) are available from any Post Office or your Social Welfare Local Office.

DISABILITY AWARENESS

SCOLIOSIS: What is Scoliosis?

Scoliosis is a sideways curvature of the spine, or backbone. The spine is made up of bones that are called vertebrae. People of all ages are diagnosed with Scoliosis, and in more than 80% of cases a cause is not found, these cases are referred to as idiopathic (of undetermined cause). Conditions known to cause spinal deformity are congenital spinal column abnormalities, neurological disorders, genetic conditions and a multitude of other causes. Scoliosis does not come from carrying heavy things, athletic involvement, sleeping/standing postures, or minor lower limb length inequality. Scoliosis is nearly always associated with some twisting of the vertebrae. In the thoracic regions the ribs will also be carried round with the vertebrae and may form a prominent hump.

What are the symptoms of Scoliosis?

There are several different warning signs that may determine if a person has scoliosis, these include the following:

- Shoulders are different heights one shoulder blade which is more prominent than the other
- Head is not centered directly above the pelvis
 Appearance of a reised prominent him
- Appearance of a raised, prominent hip
- Rib cages are at different heights
- Uneven waist
- Changes in look or texture of skin overlying the spine (dimples, hairy patches, colour changes)
- Leaning of entire body to one side

Once scoliosis is suspected, it is usually confirmed with an x-ray, spinal radiograph, CT scan, MRI or bone scan of the

spine. The curve is then measured by the Cobb Method and is discussed in terms of degrees. A curve is considered significant when it is greater than 25 to 30 degrees. Curves exceeding 45 to 50 degrees are considered severe and often require more aggressive medical treatment.

What treatment is available for Scoliosis?

Once it has been determined that a person has Scoliosis, their medical history has to be taken into account when discussing treatment options, such as the spinal maturity of the person (is the persons spine still growing and developing), the degree and extent of the curvature, the location of the curve and the potential for progression. There are three basic treatments for Scoliosis; these include Observation, Orthopedic Bracing or Surgery.

Researchers continue in their efforts to find new treatments for Scoliosis, and research continues into finding the causes of the disability. (This article is to make people aware of different disabilities, and is information only; it is not a replacement for professional medical advice).



Racing commenced with the two semi finals of a 29.20 stake. Local trainer Mick Cronin was on the mark in the first semi final as his Cork sales purchase Aghadown Full (Frisby Full-Aghadown Panther) 2/1, made all the running to oblige in 29.38. Up an incredible seven pounds in weight from his previous race outing in June of this year Aghadown Full quickly set about the task in hand and when a prominent Claudies Pet appeared to lose her action at the first bend Aghadown Full raced clear down the back from Lough Allen.

This order of running remained unchanged for the duration of this race as Aghadown Full went on to score by a length and a half in 29.38.

With some speedy sprint victories on his book at Thurles Cloughmartin Lad carried the favourites tag at evens in the second qualifier. After a moderate break Cloughmartin Lad eased his way into the lead at the first bend from the wide running Fast Prankster. The latter trained by Sean Bourke and priced at 3/1 took advantage of Cloughmartin Lad tiring up the home straight coming through to lead on the run in beating a fast finishing Sparta Cleo by a length and a half in a fast 28.92.

In the third contest again over 550 yards Lough Lee set off in front to make all leading early on from Magniers Flash but the Ian Seymour owned Longest Day (Vintage Prince-Free Dreams) was always close at hand and quickening the tempo over the final two bends Longest Day 7/2 flashed home to defeat Lough Lee by four and three quarter lengths in 30.25. County Kilkenny owner Anne Hoban was on the mark in a graded 550 yard race as her home bred Stage Gerry (Deenside Spark-Stage Blondie) 2/1 came from off the pace to win out in 30.38. Stage Gerry was only in fourth place along the back stretch as Scallywag Peter led from Minglers Prime but securing a nice run up the inside of the leaders Stage Gerry came through on the rails to lead and when a challenging Broadacres Jack found himself trapped ion the fence Stage Gerry drew clear up the home stretch to beat Minglers Prime by two lengths.



FRANCES CROWLEY

The young Waterford rider picked up a nasty gash and was forced to undergo surgery on his left eye having been transferred from Tralee General Hospital to University College Cork where surgery was performed. Hopefully Gordon will make a full recovery and we send him our best




