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
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SHOPPING COMPLEX PLANNING NOTICE

The development of a major shopping complex on part of the Glanbia site in Dungarvan is firmly back on track, with details of fresh plans outlined in a new planning notice, it has emerged.

The planning notice published today (Wednesday); outlines all the areas proposed for development and addresses a number of criticisms detailed in An Bord Pleanala's report early this

Included in the plans is an associated tiered car park for 303 spaces on two levels at the rear of O'Connell Street. The tiered car park should satisfy An Bord Pleanala's oral hearing report, into the Clancy Construction failed bid last year, which was critical of "inadequate" parking in its original proposal.

Indeed, the plans contain a far greater number of spaces, with 217 surface parking spaces at various locations, in addition to the spaces in the tiered car park.

The main part of the new application is contained in Blocks C and D, with a total area of approximately 12,801 sq metres. It will include a retail shopping centre with supermarket, a shopping galleria, unit shops, restaurants, medical centre, crèche, Class 2 and 3 services uses, in one, two and three level buildings. Compromise Ballinacourty Zoning In Place KIRRANE Ballinacourty will remain

zoned for agriculture with 'special consideration' given to tourism initiatives in the area, it was decided at Waterford County Council's monthly meeting.

Under the agriculture zoning, residential housing will be allowed where a landowner gives a site to a member of his family or where a local need is estab-

County Manager, Donal Connolly, said other uses, such as small industry and tourism uses will be encouraged but will be subject to ordinary planning criteria.

"We're also saying that special consideration be given to tourism/housing development in the Ballinacourty area, in recognition of its status as a tourism loca-

Scotching rumours about large residential developments claimed to be destined for the area, the County Manager added that there was never any question of zoning for 600 houses.

The zoning of Ballinacourty has already caused acrimony among some Dungarvan Area Councillors, with a recent area meeting failing to find agreement, and causing the walkout of a number of councillors two weeks ago.

According to Cllr. Patrick Kenneally rezoning looked on the cards at the meeting, held two weeks ago.

"There's been a complete u-turn since, and I don't understand that", he said.


"Only for a person, who really shouldn't have been at that meeting, we'd probably have come to an agreement."

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County Councillors To Get Pay Rise

The General Council of County Councils (GCCC) has announced that the elected members are to get summary increases in various allowances.

The twenty-three Water-

ford County Councillors, including two serving Dail Deputies, will get a representational payment increase, subsistence rates increase and annual allowance increase this year.

The salary for County Councillors will be eurl2,618 per annum gross, following the 4% final phase of the Programme for Prosperity and Fairness (PPF) effective from 1st of October.

The new salary represents a rise of eur485 on the previous amount.

Subsistence rates are also increasing with a new overnight rate of eur124.11 from the last year's eur112.88. For a full day the subsistence rate is eur35.17 up from eur32.

The increase in the full day subsistence will feed into the annual allowance paid to councillors by their councils. The payment for a councillor in the lowest banding category who lives 10 miles from the council office will increase to eur4,007 per annum; similarly a member in the highest banding category will now receive eur6,556 per annum.

According to the GCC, "the approach of October brings estimates or budget time. This year councillors will have a lead role in the preparation of the annual budget in anticipation of changes to council budgetary procedures under the Local Government Act 2001."

"In order to equip councillors with the knowledge necessary for an effective role in the budgetary process the General Council proposed that a training programme be initiated during the current budget season."

Government Must Honour Commitment On Cancer Care — RYAN

Labour Councillor Seamus Ryan has called on the government to state clearly whether a Radiotherapy Unit is to be commissioned for Waterford Regional Hospital. Pre election promises made by Fianna Fail and the Progressive Democrats on the provision of a radiotherapy unit in Waterford Regional Hospital must now be honoured according to Cllr Ryan who is also a member of the South Eastern Health Board. Cancer statistics in the South East continue to show 1000 new cancer patients each year. However according to Cllr Ryan this government has failed to prioritise Cancer Care for funding.

"Despite promises made by Fianna Fail in this constituency to deliver a radiotherapy unit for Waterford Regional Hospital we have seen no progress whatsoever on the issue. The suffering of cancer patients and their families because of the lack of a radiotherapy unit in the South East continues yet this government fails to deliver. I first raised this issue with the Minister for Health two years ago yet we have seen the government fail to publish the report of the Expert Review Group which was set up then to examine the provision of a Radiotherapy service in the country. I am calling on the government to honour the promises it made to the people of Waterford and the South East and commission a Radiotherapy unit for Waterford Regional Hospital without delay.



Strong Support From Waterford Chamber, IBEC & IFA For Nice Referendum

"A YES vote on October 19th is good for investment, good for jobs and good for the future success of all sectors in Waterford", Minister Martin Cullen has said.

Minister Cullen was speaking following a series of meetings with Waterford Chamber of Commerce, Waterford IFA representatives and IBEC.

Campaigning in the city and county has intensified, something Minister Cullen welcomed. "The coming together of business, agriculture and trade unions interests here in Waterford for a YES vote on October 19th is significant.

"Already one-in-six Water-

ford workers are in jobs that depend on foreign investment. We have heard repeatedly from IBEC and the IDA that rejection of Nice will not only isolate Ireland within the EU it will also be used by competing countries to try and entice investment away from us"

Alternatively, according to Minister Cullen, a YES vote will open up markets with 100 million customers to Irish firms.

"Key business organisa-

tions and companies are calling for a YES vote. These are people who create jobs throughout the county. Leading trade unionists are also strongly urging the Irish people, as a matter of national importance, to vote YES.

"Every time the EU has been expanded Ireland has benefited and this time will be no different. We can't take low unemployment for granted - we have to keep working to ensure that we protect jobs.

"Already we have seen exports to the applicant countries increase seven-fold over a six year period. This is just a tiny fraction of what can be achieved if we return a YES vote on the 19th", he

Commenting on his meeting with farming representatives, Minister Cullen said: "A Yes vote is the only secure option for Irish farmers. All sectors of Irish life have gained from being part of the European Union, and one of the sectors that have gained most is Agriculture.

"The EU has been the engine for growth for the Irish agriculture and the Irish agri-business sector over the last three decades. Irish agriculture has benefited not just financially but the EU has also enabled this sector to modernise.

"The benefits of EU membership to Irish agriculture and the food industry have been enormous - nearly 30 billion since we joined.'

"We have done extremely well from the Common Agricultural Policy. We have been the largest per capita beneficiary of CAP. While farmers do face a number of challenges at present, without the EU, Irish farmers would be significantly worse off both economically and socially," he said.

Since joining the European Union, Ireland has received almost €28 billion in price supports. These transfers have been of vital importance in helping to keep people on the land and in sustaining our rural commu-

"The expansion of the single market to five hundred million people will open up the prospect of supplying many new customers with products and services and we, as major agri-food exporters are ideally placed to exploit those opportunities.

Ireland stands to gain much from a greatly expanded marketplace with over 100 million new customers. Assured and free access to that new market will bring substantial opportunities for this country. This offers great opportunities, and assures a future for Irish farming," the Minister said.

"To guarantee Irish Agriculture a prominent and assured position within the European Union, I believe that Irish farmers must vote yes when they go to the polls and ratify the Nice Treaty. the Minister concluded.



With the aid of an artificial limb, he ran almost 3,500 miles over 143 days. This would have been an extraordinary achievement even for an able-bodied athlete. Sadly, Terry died before his journey could be completed. However, his spirit lives on in hundreds of runs held in his name in over 50 countries around the globe, including Ireland, where the cause is supported by leading Olympic medallists Sebastian Coe and Sonia O'Sullivan, patron of the event in this country. Today the Terry Fox Run is the world's biggest fundraiser for cancer research.

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

WHAT DOES THE EARTH LOOK LIKE?

he planet Earth is sphere-shaped, slightly flattened at the North and the South Pole. Satellite photographs show that much of its surface is covered by seas and oceans, separating the continents with their mountains, open plains, forests, rivers and lakes. The solid outer surface of the Earth which forms the continents and the ocean beds is called the Earth's Crust.

The Blue Planet

Earth is called the Blue Planet because, seen from space, it looks blue. The waters of the seas and oceans cover about two thirds of the Earth's surface.

FACTS + FIGURES

- Scientists believe that the Earth, like all planets in the Solar System, began to form about 4600 million years ago.
- The diameter of Earth measures 12757km; the distance between the poles is about 12714km.
- The surface of the Earth above sea level is about 149,600,000 square kilometres.
- The combined expanse of the oceans is about 360,650,000 square kilometres.

THE EARTH?

A geologist reconstructs the story of our planet by studying the structure of the Earth's Crust and all that happens as a result.

A geophysicist studies all the natural happenings (phenomena) which take place in the atmosphere, on the Earth's surface and inside the planet.

A geographer studies and maps out Earth's natural features - mountains, rivers, lakes, etc. - and man-made additions, such as roads, bridges and canals.

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Chilli chicken loaf

Preparation: 30 mins Cooking: 1 hour 15 mins Chilling: Overnight

TRY this as a delicious starter for your next dinner party.

INGREDIENTS

(Serves 6)

6 whole chicken breasts boned, skinned and cut into 4

olive oil

2 onions, sliced and separated into rings

2 tomatoes, peeled and sliced tblspns pimento,

chopped 12 pepper corns

1 tspn salt I cup dry white wine

Dressing:

50ml reserved liquid from

chicken 50ml olive oil

25ml vinegar I tspn tomato juice

1/4 tspn salt pinch cayenne pepper

SET oven temperature to 160C. Brush a 71/2 cup capacity loaf tin with olive

Arrange one third of the chicken in a layer on the bottom of the tin. Place one third of the onion rings, tomato slices, pimento, peppercorns and salt over the chicken. Repeat layering until all ingredients are used, ending with a layer of toma-

Pour in the wine. Cover loaf tin with foil and cook in the preheated oven for 1 hour.

Remove foil and cook a further 15 minutes. Cool the chicken quickly in the tin by standing in iced water. When cool, place in the refrigerator and chill over night.

Pour off excess liquid and reserve half cup for the Dressing and return the chicken to the refrigerator until ready to serve. Make up the dressing by combining all the

ingredients and chill until ready to serve.

To serve: Unmould chicken on to a platter. Serve with dressing separately and garnish it with fresh coriander, black olives and sliced hard

Damson

Preparation: 15 mins Cooking: 20 mins INGREDIENTS

(Serves 4)

-500g carrots

Salt and black pepper

1 tblspn flour 2 tblspn olive oil

250 ml natural yogurt

I tblspn chopped mint PEEL or scrape the carrots and wash them. Cut them, crossways into 1 cm thick slices. Bring a pan of salted water to the boil and cook the carrots for about 10 mins until nearly tender. Drain in

a colander, then spread carrots on kitchen paper to dry thoroughly.

Toss the carrots in seasoned flour, shaking off any surplus. Heat the oil in a heavy based pan and fry the carrots over moderate heat until golden brown. Season to taste with salt and ground black pepper. Put the yogurt in a separate pan over low heat, and let it warm through. Do not let it reach boiling point or it will curdle.

Spoon the carrots into a hot serving dish, pour over the yogurt and sprinkle with mint.

Preparation: 15 mins Cooking: 40 mins Chilling: 1 hour **INGREDIENTS**

(Serves 4) 125g damsons

125g cooking apples

50 g unsalted butter

75g caster sugar

2 egg yolks

4 tblspns fresh bread crumbs

125 ml double cream 1 tblspn lemon juice

WASH damsons. Peel and thinly slice the apples. Melt butter in a saucepan with a little cold

water. Cover and boil fruit over low heat until soft, stirring. Remove from heat and rub fruit through a coarse sieve. Return puree to pan and stir in sugar. Take pan off heat and blend in beaten egg yolks and bread crumbs.

Stir over low heat until quite thick, then leave to cool. Whisk the cream lightly and fold into the cooled puree. Sharpen to taste with lemon juice. Spoon the mixture into serving glasses and chill for 1



CANON PATRICK POWER (1862-1951)

Patrick Power was born at Callaghane, near Waterford on 8 March 1862. His home was a thatched farmhouse,

1970's. It was reported to have been a hiding place for Eamonn De Valera when he was on the run during the Troubles. Power received his early education at Ballygunner National School, and later at the Catholic University School, Waterford. He then attended St. John's College. He was ordained in 1885 and spent the following three years working in Liverpool. Whilst there his health deteriorated (threatened tuberculosis). As a result he went to New South Wales, Australia. He came into contact with the Aborigines.

Power seems to have developed his interest in archaeology during his seven-year stay in Australia. On his return to Waterford he was attached to the Cathedral for three years. He then became diocesan inspector of schools, followed by De La Salle Training College chaplain, and curate at Portlaw. His great interest started with ecclesiastical antiquities, but then moved on to local history, place names which was demolished in and local archaeology. He museum.org

travelled widely throughout county Waterford in his explorations. He was editor of the Journal of the Waterford and South-East Ireland Archaeological society for many years. Power published many articles and books during his

The most of these is the Place Names of the Decies, first published in 1907. Between 1910 and 1931 he gave lectures on archaeology in Maynooth. He became associated with U.C.C. and in 1915 was appointed Professor of Archaeology. He held this ost until his retirement in 932. In 1926 the National Iniversity of Ireland awarded him the Degree of D.Litt. He died on 16 October 1951 and was buried in St. Otteran's graveyard, Waterford.

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

Plant Soon For A Spring Crop

WHILE most popular come-again crop. Sow broadvegetables are planted in the spring and grown throughout the summer for harvesting in the autumn, a handful of vegetables are planted in the winter for a spring or summer harvest.

These winter vegetables include shallots, garlic, leeks and salad rocket. So if you have never tried growing a winter vegetable before, why not give it a try this year.

Salad Rocket

This hardy, spicy-leafed Mediterranean plant is used in salads although older plants may also be cooked.

Salad Rocket is also known as Mediterranean rocket, roquette, erugala or rucola. It grows best in cool weather in moisture-retentive soil in a cool climate. It is excellent under cover in winter and as a cut-andcast or in rows to cut as seedlings or thin to 15cm to cut during growth other than keepwhen larger.

Garlic plants grow up to 60cm tall with a spread of about 15cm. Each produces an underground bulb up to 5cm in diameter.

Garlic tolerates a wide range of climates but needs a period of about two months at zero to 10 degrees centigrade in winter.

Some types are very hardy but you should use the kind recommended for your area. Garlic grows best in an open, sunny position on light soil that does not need to be very fertile.

For planting split off individual cloves from a mature bulb. Always use healthy, virus-free stock. To produce large bulbs garlic needs a long growing sea-

Plant the cloves upright with the flat base downwards at twice their own depth, 10cm apart in

Little attention is required ing the beds free of weeds.

Garlie takes from 16 to 36 weeks to mature depending on the variety. The plants should be uprooted as soon as the leaves have started to fade. Store in bunches with plaits made from the dried leaves.

Shallots

Possibly the most versatile in the onion family, the distinctly flavoured shallot forms clumps of about a dozen bulbs. They may be used fresh or after storing and can be eaten raw or cooked.

Shallots are very hardy and can be planted during the winter in mild areas. The sets should be sown in rows about 15cm apart. For an early crop of green leaves for spring onions plant small sets in the autumn or in trays under cover about 3cm

needed. For good-sized bulbs do not pick the leaves but lift the bulbs once the foliage has died down. Good stocks of shallots can be stored for up to a year.

Leeks

Leeks are a cool season crop and grow best below 24 degrees centigrade. They need a long growing season and should be started as early in the year as possible. Seeds should be sown in an outdoor bed for transplanting when the plant is about 20cm tall. They should be transplanted in rows 15cm

Water thoroughly until the transplanted plants are well established. Thereafter they should only be watered in exceptionally dry conditions. Leeks may be harvested about 20 weeks after sowing but may be left standing for many months.

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DAIRYING:

Thirteen times a week milking

Bernie O'Brien, Teagasc Moorepark compared twice daily milking with 13 times per week milking of low somatic cell count cows from early October until drying off in December. She found no difference in milk yield, milk composition or somatic cell count (SCC). Milking once daily reduced milk yield substantially (by almost one third) and the increase in composition did not compensate for the reduction in milk vield.

- Dairy farmers around the country are operating a 13 times per week system with good results. Unfortunately on a small number of farms the technique is being abused.
- Milking 11 or 12 times per week instead of 13 or 14 times will reduce milk yield and is likely to result in an increased SCC.
- The system is not suitable in dairy herds where bulk milk somatic cell counts are already high (greater than 250,000 cells/ml).
- Milking once a day is risky if SCC is already high.

Replacement heifers

- The target pre-calving weight for replacement heifers is 540kg for British Friesian-type and 570kg for Holstein Friesian-type two year old heifers. For February calving heifers these heifers should weigh 460kg and 480kg in mid-October.
- Over heavy heifers at calving will lose more condition during the first lactation and this may result in poorer reproductive performance. Light heifers produce less milk (50kg less per 35kg below target liveweight from one study).
- · Light weight heifers will respond to meal feeding and where grass is in short supply should be fed 1-2kg concentrate/day (10% protein is sufficient).
- Once housed, replacements will continue to need meals if silage quality is poor. Increase the protein content of the meal fed to approximately 15% if silage quality is poor (less than 67% DMD). Feed light heifers an extra 1kg meal/day.
- Cease meal feeding by 4-6 weeks pre-calving.

SHEEP: Mating

Ewes in good condition, rams looking well and plenty of grass. Sounds like the ideal conditions for the mating season. But a word of caution - the season continues well into November so don't let the good start deceive you.

It takes about 30 days for a fertilised egg (embryo) to become attached to the uterus. Up to this period there is a risk that the embryo will be lost or reabsorbed. A ewe comes into heat every 17 days. Therefore all ewes could be safely in lamb by day 47 after the ram joins the flock. This is never the case but top flocks are achieving 90% to first service.

Any disturbance to the flock during this period will cause excessive embryo loss. This will either show up on a lower litter size or repeat ewes. Avoid the following during the seven weeks after ram introduction

- Severe changes in feed, e.g. to beet tops
- Excessive handling
- Dipping
- Moving to unfamiliar ground

Raddling rams during mating has many advantages. You can identify which ewes will lamb first and to repeat cycles. Normally raddle colour is changed every 16 days, roughly before the next cycle begins. Be sure you start with a bright colour which can be overmarked by a darker colour, e.g. yellow to green to red to blue to black. Marking fluids/powders rub on raddle markers and harness can be used. Take the sheep easy where ewes have to be flocked to change colours.

Some farmers change raddle colours less than 10 days. They claim this helps in supervising lambing, there are less ewes to look at. It may be sensible where your lambing area cannot accommodate the whole flock.

Raddle colours also help in the accuracy of pre-lambing vaccines, e.g. 8:1. If the product has to be given, say 4-6 weeks before lambing, then the only way to know that is to have three raddle colours. Similarly meal feeding is more accurate. Normally ewes are fed about 7 weeks before lambing. A March lambing flock may get meals from mid-January. If the first and second repeats are not identified they may be getting meal for 9 or 11 weeks. Lambing difficulties especially with singles, could be a problem.

Some young rams may not be up to it in their first year. If they are mixed with older rams this may not be noticed. But if it is a single group mating you need to check them. As well as raddle marking some farmers gather the groups after 4-5 days mating and put a distinctive mark on the mated ewes. If these ewes start to repeat on day 18, 19, 20, etc., after the ram joined - take action. He needs to be replaced.

MAIN DIRECT PAYMENTS OF OVER €400m TO BE PAID NEXT WEEK

It is that time of the year again when the first issue of premia payments commence. Under EU Regulations payments under the Suckler Cow. Special Beef and Slaughter Premium Schemes are not allowed to commence until 16 October. Normally these advances are limited to 60% but the Minister this year secured an 80% rate.

The 16th of November is normally the earliest date for the start-up of the Arable Aid payments. However, again this vear a 50% advance payment has been secured and these advances will start to issue on 16 October.

In addition 2002 Ewe Premium payments will issue on the 16 October for the first time. Starting this year Ewe premium will be in a single payment. Up to now this premium issued in three instalments with the final instalment delayed until the year following the year of application. Under the new arrangements the payment is at a flat rate. Previously the rate fluctuated based on the market.

This is good news nationally in that between Wednesday and the end of next week in excess of €400m will issue. This follows quickly on the back of

payment of the €200m Area Based Compensatory Allowance.

Initial payments will issue to all applicants who have established eligibility at this stage and will continue over the coming week until all entitlements are paid. Minister Walsh advised any farmers who have received query letters to respond to them as quickly so that outstanding claims can be finalised.

WALSH'S ACTIONS ON BEEF

Minister Walsh explained that he had taken every possible action to ensure the most favourable trading situation for beef this autumn and these efforts were ongoing. "In July and August I put a lot of work into ensuring that there were as many outlets and as much access as possible to beef markets. This included the lifting of the Russian six county beef export ban (on Counties Cavan, Monaghan, Meath, Limerick Cork and Wexford) and securing from the EU Commission increases in export refunds of up to 30% to help exports to Egypt.

Minister Walsh said that a big factor in the margin for beef producers is the premia and he had made special arrangements this year to speed up payments. egg industry here has advan-He also obtained Commissioner Franz Fischler's agreement to increase the advance payment from 60 to 80%, the result of which is that over 400 in premia will be paid in the next week or so.

Minister Walsh explained that it would be inappropriate for him to interfere in the cattle price dispute between beef processors and producers. Price had to be negotiated between the processing industry and the suppliers. The Minister said that he cannot set price and could not for a variety of reasons become directly involved.

A major disappointment for the Minister was the fact that virtually all of the co-ops, apart from Dairygold, have got out of beef processing. Joe Walsh said that this was retrograde and it was a pity that the example of the dairy industry where co-op ples have farmers controlling the processing end of the sector could not be also the case in the beef industry

ADVANTAGES OF IRISH POULTRY & EGGS

Speaking at the Irish Poultry and Eggs Conference in Athlone, Minister Walsh said that the indigenous poultry and tages that can be exploited to ensure it retains the competitive edge in the marketplace.

The Minister praised producers for maintaining consumer confidence in the quality of Irish poultry and eggs. This was evident at the time of the recent problems with imported processed fillets when the poultry processors here were able to offer the consumer the guarantees of quality and safety required. He also pointed out that egg producers have been successfully operating a quality assurance scheme for a number of years and 70% of eggs sold here are quality assured and a scheme for poultrymeat will be operational shortly.

The quality assured symbol is widely recognised and trusted as a guarantee of reliability and a genuine mark of quality. These schemes also serve the purpose of highlighting the interdependence of the various participants in the food chain and the importance of trust and partnership across the board."

The Minister pointed out that a quality assurance scheme for poultrymeat is at an advanced stage and should be operational shortly.

DYSTONIA WHAT IS DYSTONIA?

Dystonia is a neurological movement disorder; this disability causes involuntary sustained muscle spasms, which can be extremely painful. This can affect various parts of the body and cause abnormal movements and postures. Dystonia can affect any part of the body including the arms and legs, trunk, neck, eyelids, face, or vocal cords and muscle contractions interfere with normal function. Early symptoms of the disability may include deterioration in handwriting after writing several lines, foot cramps, and a tendency of one foot to pull up or drag after running or walking some distance. Other symptoms that may appear are tremor and voice or speech difficulties. Birth injury (especially lack of oxygen at birth), certain infections, reactions to certain drugs, trauma, or stoke can cause dystonic symptoms.

Around 50% of all cases of Dystonia have no connection to disease or injury and are called primary or idiopathic dystonia. There are several areas relating to primary Dystonia, these include the following:

- Spasmodic Torticollis this is the most common form of primary Dystonia (focal dystonia), this involves the neck, the muscles spasms causing the neck to twist to one side, and the neck may pull, turn or jerk.
- Blepharospasm this focal dystonia affects the muscles around the eyes and causing uncontrollable blinking especially in bright lights.
- Oromandibular Dystonia affects muscles in the jaw, tongue and mouth.
- Laryngeal Dystonia affects speech muscles of the throat causing strained or forced speech.
- Writer's cramp affected the hand and forearm, causing difficulty in writing.

Sometimes the Dystonia may be more widespread and this is known as Segmental and Generalised Dystonia most cases are idiopathic (meaning the cause of the Dystonia is unknown) this Dystonia is usually starts in childhood in one limb (often the foot). It can spread to involve other parts of the body, including the back, neck and arms.

What causes Dystonia?

Dystonia is a movement disorder, which need not involve any other functions of the brain, and the intellect, personality, memory, emotions, sight, hearing and sensation are normal in a person with primary dystonia. The symptoms of dystonia are due to malfunction of a small area of the brain known as the basal ganglia, which controls certain aspects of movement. It is believed that dystonia may be caused by an imbalance of the chemical messengers in the basal ganglia. Dystonia can also be caused by a gene inherited in a dominant manner; dominant means that each child of a parent who carries the abnormal gene has a 50/50 chance of inheriting that gene.

Treatment and Outlook for Dystonia

Dystonia is not a life threatening disability, but the more severe forms can have a devastating effect on a person's quality of life. Treatment is available to help relieve muscle spasms and pain, and alternative treatment such as acupuncture, could help to relieve the stress. Researchers continue in their efforts to find the causes and treatment of Dystonia. Research has focused on the basal ganglia (part of the brain), as this controls move ments in the body, and where messages that initiate muscle contractions are processed. Natural Resources need to take a leaf out of the Dept. of the Gaeltacht's book and come on board in the redevelopment of Heilbhic Harbour in West Waterford. That's the view of local Údarás na Gaeltachta member and County Councillor Fiachra Ó Ceilleachair. The Labour representative says there is no doubt as to Waterford County Council and Roinn na Gaeltachta's interest in the project to date but is disappointed that Roinn na Mara has not been more forthcoming in financial commitment to a matter Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair says is vital to the survival of fishing as a prominent local industry.

Speaking in support of redevelopment plans, featuring a major input from Meitheal Mara na Rinne - the local fishermen's co-op in the Ring Gaeltacht, Cllr. Ó Ceilleachair said: "The various Gaeltacht agencies and the local authority have understood the case being made in Heilbhic that a phased programme of major dredging works, improved and expanded fish landing facilities and the putting in place of marine leisure, angling and yachting resources is what is urgently required to secure the location's future as a live marine feature on our coastline.

There is pressure enough on the fishing industry without stalling it through lack of development. The limited resources of Waterford County Council have been utilised on the study and preparatory phases of this project and Roinn na Gaeltachta is already on record as saying they will commit 1

Compromise Ballinacourty Zoning In Place

"It was thought if the area was claims about 600 houses. zoned limited tourism it would have given developers the opportunity to develop tourism potential in the area. And would allow some of the landowners into the tourism area as well." But as agreement couldn't be reached at the area meeting "the chalice has been taken from us'

"It has gone back to the planning department and they have drawn up this form of limited tourism development and a very, very limited form of resi-

KNOCKATEEMORE

Lethal Blackspots Must Be Addressed Urges Deasy Five Roads Listed On NRA 'Blackspot' Report

Five lethal stretches of road in the county have been listed as blackspots in a recent countrywide National Roads Authority report, Monday's meeting of Waterford County Council

The five locations; Piltown Cross to Youghal Bridge; the Pike – Cushcam junction; the N25 junction with the Tallow road; Master McGrath junction to the Clashmore/Clonmel junction; and the Tramore Cross to the Kill junction, were cited as having an above average incidence of road accidents.

According to Deputy, John Deasy, the new report confirmed the location's councillors and officials have been raising for years. However, the NRA has failed to fund vital improvement works.

"It's obvious to many of us that these stretches of road, these junctions in particular, are lethal," he said.

'They're causing people's deaths and they're causing horrific injuries'

The issue of accidents near Cushcam was raised at a recent meeting on the Dungarvan bypass, Deputy Deasy said.

"It was given as a reason why we needed Dungarvan By-pass. And it is needed.'

In the last two years, three people have lost their lives on the stretch of road running from the Pike to Tarr's Bridge. A number of serious and minor accidents have also occurred on the same stretch, he said. "I don't know what we have to do to impress upon the NRA to make these locations a priority. But we must do something to show we're very concerned.

"More people are going to die unless we do something about it," Deputy Deasy said.

Speaking on the report, Cllr. Tom Cronin said he was surprised to see Grange left out as it "has a very bad record on crashes.

The Gardai also submitted a letter six months ago highlighting the dangers of the Grange road.

"The National Roads Authority would want to wake up a bit, because there's going to be people killed there. It's a disaster waiting to happen."

County Engineer, John O'Flynn said that in four out of the five cases, improvements are underway or planned.

The one case in which proposals haven't been submitted is for a seven mile stretch on the Cappoquin to Dungarvan road where the reasons for the accidents "mystifies" the engi-

Seventeen accidents have occurred on the stretch over a sixyear period but from the accident forms, "there doesn't appear to be any great clue as to the reasons"

At Piltown Cross vital Compulsory Purchase Order documents for the improvement of the road remain tied up, a year and a half after they were first submitted to the National Roads Authority.

However, proposals put for-ward by the council for road safety measures at Cushcam are now ready to go before the NRA, Mr. O'Flynn said.

At the N25 junction with Tallow road, the construction of the Youghal by-pass together with a major roundabout is hoped to resolve the problems in this area. Meanwhile, Tramore cross to Kill will be levitated "traffic wise" by the construction of the Waterford City by-pass, Mr. O'Flynn

An Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) will be submitted to the planning authority with the application.

He added that the Glanbia development and its retail centre would offer people a greater range and choice, and once up and running would be a major draw into Dungar-

There was, I think, unanimous agreement north and south on the success of the Naomh Columcille visit to our club. I must compliment all, not alone in the G.A.A. but in the community as a whole for the welcome extended and the hospitality shown to our northern hurling friends. I received a lovely thank you card from a local lady who summed it up very well when she said hurling is much more than a game, it is also about extending the hand of friendship and building relationships. We carried on to Killyclogher where we took a bit of a drubbing.

Watching some of these same lads going through their paces in the coaching sessions with Eamonn De Paor and Justin McCarthy, I knew I was in the right business. The East Tyrone boys hung on their every word, every morsel of knowledge and hurling technique, imparted by two of the greatest hurling coaches this island will ever know, was hungrily devoured. (It's a pity more of our own lads didn't seize the day-).Later on, as the Red Hand Hurlers pitted their skills against Tallow and Shamrocks, it dawned on me . This "business" is paying off. The lads have a way to go but they can hurl as good as anyone given a chance. They're not that far off the mark. Alas, their is an elitism within the G.A.A., which I have to say is more particular to the hurling fraternity, that is often dismissive or at best patronisingly tolerant of the efforts of

"non traditional" counties.

As Ned and Justin both said you can not do a crash course in hurling, but I feel the Tyrone lads will have benefitted enormously from their short visit. It is a huge boost to morale for these lads to know they have friends in the south who support their efforts at promoting hurling in the north and will give them encouragement to stick with it. KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

I am receiving Disability Allowance from the Department of Social and Family Affairs. I have recently been offered a few hours work a week in a local shop. If I take up the job will it affect my Disability Allowance?

ANSWER

Whether it will affect your Disability Allowance will depend on how much you earn and whether the work is considered rehabilitative by the Department.

A person in receipt of Disability Allowance can work while in receipt of the allowance but the income from the employment is assessable as means in the means test for Disability Allowance. Since 3rd April, 2002 the first 120e of weekly earnings from employment or self-employment which is considered to be of a rehabilitative nature is disregarded for means purposes. Any earnings in excess of this amount are assessed as income and entitlement to Disability Allowance reduced accordingly.

For your employment to be considered rehabilitative you must get approval from the Department of Social and Family Affairs and you must apply for the approval before you start work.

You should write to the Disability Allowance Section, Social Welfare Services Office, Government Buildings, Ballinalee Road, Longford. You will require a letter from your doctor certifying the rehabilitative nature of the employment as well as a letter from your employer describing the nature of the proposed employment, the number of hours being worked and how much you will be paid. You should request confirmation of the approval in writing from the Department.

If you are receiving a fuel allowance under the National Fuel Scheme with your Disability Allowance you will continue to receive it provided your employment is considered to be rehabilitative by the Department.

MONEYMATTERS

IS BEING IN DEBT NORMAL?

A recent seminar on problems of over-indebtedness began by asking "is there anyone here not in debt?" not surprisingly there were very few participants who did not have debts. Many Irish people now regard being in debt as a natural state of affairs. It seems that only a small minority of people said that debt should be avoided except in exceptional circumstances only.

To this end have you ever been refused a loan or a hire purchase agreement? Ever wondered why you were refused? Or would you like to check your credit rating before you apply for car finance or loan? If you have had an uncertain credit history than the Irish Credit Bureau may be able to give you further information. Its members consist of all the major banking institutions and Building Societies.

The information which is held on the ICB Database, relates to credit agreements between ICB members and their customers. A condition of such agreements is that the customer agrees that the financial institution may use the data supplied for the purpose of credit checking. Consequently, where an individual enters an agreement with an ICB member, details of the individual's performance in complying with the terms of the agreement are input onto the ICB "credit file" database. This may then be assessed by all member institutions of the ICB. At present ICB holds approximately 2.7 million names and addresses on its "Credit File". The Data Protection Act 1988 provides the person whose details are on the file with important rights to ensure that the data about them is accurate and that it is used properly.

Section 4 of the Act provides a general right of access for an individual to all information known about them on computer.

Nan and my Mother shared a close and intimate amity throughout all the years since, borne along together with mutual comfort and gladness on such wings of friendship as, in Charles Dickens' words, "never moults a single feather".

It is only a few short months to Christmas. A time so well loved by Nan, one that she so often spent with us, coming laden with a superlative extravagance of gifts, a whole cornucopia of plenty that was quite overwhelming, for if one word typified her, it was surely generosity. On those Yuletide fireside evenings illuminated by her charm, wit, laughter, stories and repartee, how many times I recall her favourite expression. "One of the best of people". How aptly it described her own most truly cherished self.

Just as once she sat at our table of festive celebration, so too she will ever hold a most special place in our hearts as we continue our journey through all times of the year, gladdened, warmed and encouraged by the wealth of great memories she has left us, until that day when we too must go to that mysterious place where there is nothing to fear, for I know she will be waiting to welcome us at that threshold where all earthly cares and sorrows give way to everlasting peace and joy - Kevin
